Lightning causes a power outage

A bolt of lightning struck Otero County Electric Cooperative's main transformer on Biscuit Hill Friday afternoon, knocking out service to Alto and shutting down the line to Carrizozo.

Buddy Guthrie, area supervisor for the cooperative's north district, said close to 4,000 people were without service for about 25 minutes. Carrizozo lost power again later that night when a breaker malfunctioned.

"We moved in a portable station and by early Saturday were in good shape," he said.

MRS neighbors need money, too

David Leroy, former nuclear waste negotiator, called on the Clinton Administration to free grant money for states to create their own evaluation and participation in activities regarding the Monitored Retrievable Storage (MRS) facilities.

Leroy's letter was written to Hazel O'Leary, Secretary of Energy, and was his last action before leaving office.

Leroy writes that the grants should be offered New Mexico and Oregon first, and could be extended to Colorado, Nevada, Oklahoma, Utah and Wyoming.

Officials from the activist organization Greenpeace called the action to seek federal funds "a bribe to state governments."

In the past, Village of Ruidoso officials were denied grant money to monitor the Mescalero MRS progress.

Good News for Ruidoso... We've got a new mayor! Congratulations to Mayor Jerry Shaw

Ruidoso installs its 1st woman mayor

For the first time in the history of Ruidoso - a woman will wield the mayor's gavel.

Councilor Jerry Shaw was sworn in as the village's number one politician during a special hour long meeting early last Friday at village hall.

Shaw replaces former Mayor Victor Alonso who quit his post May 10. Shaw also was the first woman councilor for the village.

Councilor J.D. James was named new mayor pro tem and former village manager Frank Potter and Joe Gomez were voted into the two vacated seats.

Former mayor pro tem Barbara Duff called the special meeting to order after waiting for Councilor Bill Karn, who did not attend.

The village councilors, on a motion by Councilor J.D. James, opted to hold the meeting in open session rather than closed to the public.

The motions to fill the vacated council positions began with the unanimous selection of Potter for councilor.

James said he nominated Potter because he has 26 years experience with Ruidoso municipal government and at one time was the president of the state village managers organization.

Shaw, in seconding the motion, said Potter's experience would be most helpful in the short period.

Village clerk Tammie Maddox administered the oath of office.

Shaw, nominated by James and seconded by Councilor Frank Cummins, was then unanimously voted in as mayor and was officially

sworn in by Maddox.

Shaw said she realized if she didn't win the election for mayor in March, she would be out. And if she didn't accept the mayor's position, she could have had two more years on the council.

"But that's the chance you take in life, and I accept that challenge," Shaw said. "I hope to show I can be a positive force for the village ... and believe communication is the number one goal. We're going to have open government. I welcome all suggestions, I need your help."

Shaw suggested her vacated council seat be filled and opened the floor to nominations.

Joe Gomez was then unanimously approved for councilor on the nomination by Cummins and a second by James.

James was then appointed

mayor pro tem, replacing Duff, on a nomination by Cummins.

Earlier, the position of village attorney, filled by Patricia Ortiz, was eliminated by unanimous vote.

Shaw made the motion to eliminate the position of in-house attorney immediately with two weeks severance pay and begin developing a request for proposals for a contract lawyer. James seconded the motion.

Former councilor Al Junge said the village's past experience with a contract attorney was costly because of a lack of control.

James said he was aware of past costs and the enormous amount of litigation conducted at the time. He said steps would be taken to be more cost effective.

Fee hikes could spell the death of ranching

An increase in federal grazing fees will signal the end to the ranching community in Lincoln County and to ranching across the West, warned the chairman of the county's rural affairs committee.

Chairman Bill Hays told county commissioners Tuesday that Howard Shanks of the Southcentral Mountain Resource, Conservation and Development Council, is preparing a survey to send local ranchers to gauge the impact an increase in grazing fees on federal lands will have on their operations.

"Fifty percent will be out of business, if our area follows the rest of the West," Hays said. "That will impact county revenue and tax the base."

Don't mess with it

"We want to go on record as favoring the existing (grazing fee) formula, because we realize once it is broken, the increases will continue. It may start with a 33 percent jump and then keep going up until it's \$7-\$8 and we will no longer be a ranching community."

The fee is paid by ranchers to the federal agency that administers the land in exchange for being allowed to graze livestock. It is based on the consumption of vegetation by the sheep, cattle or horses and is tied to current market conditions and other measurable factors.

Commission Chairman Monroy Montes said municipalities soon may join coalition groups that are attempting to stand up to federal bulldozing. He said new water

restrictions will severely impact towns.

Let's get together

"I'm glad they're more aware," he said. "We may be able to join forces and take a stand."

"People all over the nation are starting to wake up that this isn't just a West problem or rancher problem. Land is being taken out of production and restrictions imposed because of the wetlands protection, endangered species protection and the clean air and water act," Hays said.

The committee is using Catron County's land use plan as a base and adapting it to Lincoln County, he said. The plan will set up land use regulations and give the county more standing in decisions regarding federal property within its boundaries.

Commissioner Wilton Howell told Hays while he's aware the sooner the county has a plan in place, the better its position.

"I'd rather we work on it six months and come up with one that doesn't invite lawsuits," said

Howell. "Let's do it right the first time."

He was referring to the county's past attempt to use an interim land plan to pressure federal agencies into consulting the commission before embarking on major programs. Attorneys later said the plan would not stand up in court.

Hays said the commission missed a previous opportunity to comment on a resource management plan for the Roswell district of the Bureau of Land Management. That plan contains proposals to turn into a park a site where many apparently believe an unidentified flying object crashed, he said.

"Not as individual commissioners," Howell said.

But as a commission and that's now in the record. Hays said. "We will have a recommendation for you in time."

About open meetings

Responding to new and stricter requirements for calling and conducting public meetings, Lincoln County Commissioners voted to cut down the notification time needed

for special and emergency meetings.

County manager Andy Wynham explained that new rules approved by the State Legislature took effect June 16. Public boards no longer can add items to their agenda for official action after the agenda has been set.

Agenda rules & regs

Acting on Wynham's recommendation, the commission approved a resolution that requires a proposed agenda for the regular monthly meetings of the commission to be available at least 24 hours before a meeting, instead of "during the week before" a meeting. A sentence requiring 10 days notice for any other regular meeting was deleted.

Changes affecting the date of a regular scheduled meeting will be mailed to media that has submitted a written request, at least seven days prior to the new meeting date, according to the resolution.

Notice for special meetings, called by the chairman or the majority of the board, was reduced to

24 hours notice from three days. The notice for emergency meetings was cut from 24 hours to three hours.

In other business

In other business, the commission

—approved a replat (new layout) on Fox Run subdivision using four lots as collateral against completion of about \$6,000 in road work by the owners.

—directed Wynham to work with Ruidoso village manager Ron Wicker on developing a cooperative road work agreement with the town's street department.

The agreement would allow the county to use the village's hot mix plant and some chip seal equipment when it otherwise might be idle. In return, the county might handle some other work for the village or pay for the use.

—approved an amendment to the county's anti-litter law that will allow the deputy who enforces the ordinance to cite persons who dump trash to accumulate within 200 feet of a property line or right-of-way. That should cover a neighbor who contends a mess is too close or debris visible from public highways, commissioners said.

—directed Wynham to check the county's lodgers tax ordinance to determine whether it specifically excludes the Bonito Lake Campground operated by the city of Alamogordo.

"Our ordinance exempts certain government facilities, but I think it was aimed at things like jails, not a campground," Wynham said.

Village loses on county land pockets within city limits

Foot dragging by Ruidoso village officials continues to cost taxpayers thousands of dollars in lost revenues.

It may take several years to recoup village expenses from annexing Carrizo Lodge and the property along Carrizo Road. While other areas slated to be annexed could be bringing income to the village immediately.

The Stroud Building is one example where money is being lost from two different areas — a failure to annex and a failure to keep current records on what properties fall within village boundaries.

Village councilors have diligently pursued annexation of Carrizo

Lodge at the request of the lodge owners. The owners want to cure a brown water problem and officials want to bring in tax money to the village.

At a snail's pace, the village planning and zoning department has been working for years on annexing other county pockets of land surrounded by the village that could bring in huge revenues in property tax to Ruidoso.

The Stroud Building is inside one of those pockets. Councilors and village officials have been aware of this pocket and have planned to annex the property.

But the movement is not nearly as swift as the Carrizo annexation.

According to public records, last year the Stroud Building paid

\$19,027.50 in property tax at the 1992 rate of \$26.38 per thousand. That money entered county coffers.

If that building, surrounded by village property, was annexed as planned, property tax would have been \$41.95 per thousand, with the village also receiving a hefty share.

The Stroud Building pays regular village water and sewer rates. According to village officials, rates should be double for property owners who live outside the village, but use Ruidoso utilities.

Stroud's water bill last month was \$559.52, and sewer bill, \$150.76 for \$710. Doubled, the charge would leap to \$1,420, since the building is not located in the village limits.

Village employees in the utility

department said they were unaware that the Stroud building was not in the village limits until The Ruidoso News brought it to their attention last Thursday. Apparently, the village manager or planning and zoning department didn't pass along that knowledge to the utility department.

The Stroud Building has been paying county property taxes since 1987 when the building, land and improvement, was valued at \$1,342,041. In 1988, the land jumped to \$2,516,949; down to \$1,792,913 in 1989; stayed the same in 1990 and 1991 at \$1,287,247; and jumped nearly \$800,000 in 1992 to \$2,075,598.

The council has said that it intends to annex all pockets of

unincorporated properties within village limits.

Unlike the Stroud tract that costs the village money by not annexing, the B.J. Watkins subdivision, also under consideration for annexation, would cost the taxpayers money to bring that subdivision up to municipal code.

In the mid-80s, when a master plan was discussed, debated and finally adopted, a commitment was made to annex all pockets of unannexed land in village limits.

According to village officials, there is no priority list to determine which tracts should be annexed first.

Meanwhile, village officials work leisurely toward annexation while the village continues to lose.

Other villages in the state experiencing similar problems split responsibilities. Whomever is hired as a contract attorney handles routine litigation such as foreclosing on liens. Any suit of consequence would be assigned to another attorney. The contract attorney has no stake in major lawsuits being filed.

Ortiz, in a failed bid to keep her job, argued that the position of in-house attorney has cost the village less than \$40 per hour. She said the

cheapest lawyer in the village cost \$60 per hour.

Ortiz said by having an in-house attorney for the past two years, the village has warded off litigation that would run up attorneys' fees, by handling matters before they reached litigation. She indicated the reason for eliminating her job may be personal.

Resident Genevieve Sewell asked how the village could save money with a contract attorney, noting the past high costs.

James said a legal secretary could handle some routine paper work.

Village manager Ron Wicker said he would like to see the new contract lawyer spend one day a week at village hall to conduct business. According to local lawyer's fees, that would be a minimum of \$500 a day.

Councilors agreed that a committee should draft the RFP guidelines for council discussion and approval.

New, restructured council to meet Tuesday

Tough decisions will greet a new mayor and two new village councilors during Tuesday's regular meeting at village hall.

Mayor Jerry Shaw may be familiar with the issues, but new councilors Frank Potter and Joe Gomez will have to study several items that previously were discussed in closed meetings.

Public hearings include an appeal of planning commission approval for construction of a human services building in a pine studded area next to the downtown business district.

The council will rule if the planning commission erred in its recommendation to approve the plan.

There were two bidders for the office. Don Elwell from Roswell was the successful bidder, although his bid was substantially higher than a local woman, who proposed using an existing building.

Elwell currently is building facilities in Silver City and Truth or Consequences for the human services department.

Elwell and county human services director David Devitt pressured the council during its last meeting to throw out the appeal.

Devitt further lobbied Councilor J.D. James by letter. He severely criticized the protesters' attempts to stop the project on that wooded site by calling their criticisms subjective, errant, personal in nature, moot, and not substantiated.

Councilors were concerned that due process had not been given protesters who appealed the com-

mission decision. They allowed the appeal to stand until Tuesday's meeting.

The other bidder, a local woman who did not want to be identified at this time, was upset that the only notification that she has ever received from the human services department was a letter over a year ago notifying her that her bid was not selected.

Several protesters, who live in a residential area next to the wooded site and want to save the trees there, contacted the bidder to find out details of the bidding process. Only then did the woman learn that she was the low bidder by a substantial amount of money.

Confused and disturbed, she vowed to start an investigation of the proposed bid award that would cost the taxpayers about \$100,000 more and would extend the term of the lease from six to eight years, an option she was not offered.

Devitt wrote James that Elwell has been a successful bidder to contract several office facilities in the state.

The local woman said she had gone to an architect to draw up plans, made modifications in lighting and traveled to Santa Fe. She said her proposal was to use an existing building, but that human services officials have their minds set on a new building.

"There are too many buildings reclaimed by the FDIC sitting empty now," she said.

"Here's a situation where the little guy goes to a lot of time and expense to put in a government bid and then is not considered in the

least."

In other issues, two public hearings are continued from past meetings regarding a state certificate for towing businesses and a minimum standard requirement for the airport.

In the wings waiting for the airport ordinance to clear, are airport leases for Hido Enterprises, Inc. and United Helicopter, Inc.

The council also asked the village staff to bring past contracts that may be in violation of the current minimum standards ordinance.

Under regular items, the public will hear discussions about the Short Street bridge for the first time. The issue to date has been handled only under closed session.

The bridge was built with the approval of the village council after a flood wiped out the existing road and redirected the river.

Because of a number of problems with the bridge, mainly that it is unsafe and unsightly, the village planning and zoning department initiated action to correct those problems at the owners expense.

The owner, for fear of being landlocked, has said she doesn't have a lot of money but was forced to hire an attorney because of an inability to communicate with village planner Cleatus Richards.

She was not advised that she could appeal Richard's decision to the planning and zoning commission without legal advice.

The property is along the main area targeted for The Riverwalk. Richards will ask the council to

pursue legal advice.

The council will be asked to approve lodgers tax fund requests for special events for 1993-1994.

The Lodgers Tax Advisory Board approved \$12,525 of \$19,800 requested.

The board denied requests of the Ruidoso Lions Club, \$300 and Castle Mountain Tour Services, \$1,500.

Three groups withdrew their requests, Ruidoso Arts and Film Commission, \$1,500; Friends of Arts/Music (play), \$1,500; and Art Fest USA (apple/chili).

The board approved funds for The Golden Aspen Rally Association, \$1,500; Sierra Blanca Amateur Radio, \$1,500; Rocky Mountain Music Entertainment; \$1,500; Friends of Arts/Music (pop); Lincoln County Cowboy Symphony, \$1,500; Museum of the Horse, \$1,500; All American Festival, \$875; C of C Greeters - Jubilee, \$1,500; and the Chili Society - NM Open, \$1,500.

According to village clerk Tammie Maddox, the lodgers fund has a total of \$30,000 allocated for special events. The advisory committee adopted a policy to limit the initial allocations to \$15,000. Applications for the second \$15,000 will be available after September. Lodgers tax chairman Bob Carey will be present to make the recommendation from his advisory board and answer questions from the council.

In other business the council will consider:

—the purpose and use of the Civic Events Center.

Downs board to meet tonight

The Ruidoso Downs Board of Trustees will conduct their regular monthly meeting at 7 p.m. tonight at the Ruidoso Downs Volunteer Fire Department Building.

The board is scheduled to hear from Art Reagan concerning the fencing of an alley way, issue plaques to fire department members, issue a plaque to Ida Hale, hear from building inspector Tom Armstrong and approve the new fire department bylaws.

The board will also consider the approval of the monthly reports from the villages various departments.

Routine school board agenda

The agenda for the Ruidoso School Board meeting Tuesday is light and consists mostly of routine items.

Starting at 7 p.m. in the public meeting room of Ruidoso High School, the board members will hear a report from Superintendent Mike Gladden on goals the board set for 1992-93.

Other items on the agenda include a budget increase for a suicide prevention and intervention program, approval of bus drivers contracts, and a call for bids on concrete replacement at the high school and for disability access projects at Nob Hill playground, White Mountain Elementary and Horton stadium.

Recommended by Gladden for employment are John Fritsch as a student assistant coordinator at Ruidoso Middle School and Jack Nelson as a counselor at the same school.

McGary art set for DC show

Sculptor Dave McGary will be exhibiting 18 images of Native Americans July 26 through July 30 in the Russell Senate Rotunda in Washington D.C. The exhibit will be open from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. daily, with as many as 5,000 visitors expected to view the Lincoln County artist's work.

Senators Pete Domenici and Frank Lautenberg have invited members of the Congressional Arts Caucus to a reception honoring McGary on Tuesday, July 27.

McGary's interest in art was encouraged during his youth. As a teenager he was singled out by the sculptor Harry Jackson to study the art of bronze making in Italy.

Upon returning to the United States, he secured a job at a prestigious foundry in Tesuque. For the past decade McGary has run his own bronze finishing foundry near Ruidoso. His work is well-known throughout the United States and in many foreign countries for its historical content and attention to detail.

Ag tourism maps available

Tourists wanting to get off southern New Mexico's beaten paths can visit an ostrich farm, a winery or 20 other sites, now that a new agricultural tourism map is available.

"Explore New Mexico's harvest Trail" is a combination placemat and brochure developed by New Mexico State University's Center for Hospitality and Tourism Studies. The map is the result of a \$25,000 state economic development grant initiated by State Representative William Porter (D-Dona Ana).

About 18,000 maps are being distributed to restaurants, chambers of commerce, welcome centers, hotels and motels, said Priscilla Bloomquist, agricultural tourism project director at NMSU.

Some are printed flat and some are folded. The map traces the southern end of the 300-year-old El Camino Real Corrido that stretches from Array to Sunland Park.

Trash revenues fall short for special pickups

The monthly cost to the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority of providing extra service such as picking up pine needles, limbs and brush, could be as high as \$8,110, according to a memorandum from general manager Joe Lewandowski.

But the authority doesn't collect a penny for providing that service, or for hauling away carpets, appliances or going back to clean up after bears.

That may have to change to keep the authority in healthy economic shape.

Lewandowski broke down the

number of service calls received during the last month as part of his manager's report to be presented to the authority board today.

The authority will meet at 10 a.m. in the recycling center on Second Street in Ruidoso Downs.

"This area of our authority is the area I have the biggest concern about," Lewandowski wrote. "Our costs are extremely high in this area with no revenue to support it."

He will come up with some suggestion on how to handle the situation by the board's August meeting, he said.

Under the breakdown, Lewandowski showed 32 cleanups

around containers; 60 bear/animal cleanups; 135 extra emptying of containers; 169 pine needle pickups; 83 limbs and brush pickups; and 63 miscellaneous (carpets, appliances).

The authority already has enough containers in stock (30-35) to handle new customers it will be taking over from Southwest Disposal in July, he wrote.

Lewandowski has set a goal of 75 dumpsters a month to be repaired now that a system has been put together at the recycling center.

Recycling director Kerry Krum-siek had good news for the board in

his report for the year.

His department exceeded its projected annual sales figure of \$26,750.

Total sales hit \$29,174, representing 357,843 pounds delivered and sold. About 548,000 pounds was taken in at the center, putting the monthly average at slightly under 23 tons.

Included in agenda items is a letter from the State Department of Finance and Administration giving interim approval to the authority's \$1,040,561 budget for 1993-94. The budget reflects a beginning cash balance of \$124,519 and excess revenue over expenses of \$82,415.

Dropped with her sister at the shelter in May, Brownie the Labrador mix is about a year old and is extremely playful.

"If her new owner will be away during the day, Brownie will need either access to a yard so that she can run off some of her energy or some training," said shelter manager Esther Harper. "She hasn't been given the attention she needs. An owner willing to spend time with her will help. She's very bright."

Brownie also is sponsored for the cost of her spaying, which is the major expense associated with adoption. All animals adopted from the shelter must be spayed or neutered, a requirement of state law, village ordinance and society policy, to ensure they don't contribute to the pet overpopulation problem.

In one of the outside pens, Chinook, a white chow mix found

wandering in the Capitan area, is ready for adoption.

"He has a real mellow personality," Harper said. "He loves to be hugged and is very affectionate. He'd be good with children. He's a little intimidated around all the barking dogs."

Other past pets still waiting for adoption include Adobe, a golden Akita Inu/shepherd mix. She would be a splendid companion for a woman, but apparently, was abused by a man and does not respond well to men.

She is sponsored, as are Sugar, a lab mix with cropped ears, and Kiko, a shepherd mix, who both were previously featured. A woman from Texas saw their photographs and was moved by their stories. Six-toed Chickums, a fox terrier/smooth collie mix, also is sponsored and is very loving.

The shelter desperately needs foster homes for new litters of puppies. Without a safe place for them to stay while protective shots take effect, they could be exposed to disease. Recently, two dozen pups had to be destroyed when they became infected at the shelter.

Foster homes keep puppies for two weeks to give them a chance at a healthy life.

H&R Block announces IRS changes

In a news release dated June 16, the IRS stated that it has amended its September 1992 decision to eliminate the direct deposit indicator which notifies the electronic filer whether the taxpayer's request for a direct deposit of the refund will be honored.

According to a news release, the consequences of the IRS decision are significant to H&R Block Tax Services' electronic filing and Refund Anticipation Loan (RAL) programs because the direct deposit indicator helps control the risk of loan losses and, therefore, encourages participating lending institutions to make RAL's under relatively favorable terms to the company's clients.

The original IRS decision to remove the direct deposit indicator was in response to the growing incidence of fraudulent tax returns filed electronically in previous years and with the assumption that eliminating the indicator would curtail future losses resulting from fraudulent refund claims.

IRS statistics suggest that various screening methods and other safeguards implemented during the 1993 tax season by the IRS, the tax filing industry and the participating lending institutions were effective in curbing losses associated with fraudulent electronically filed returns.

Culinary group initiates program on Mescalero Apache Reservation

The American Culinary Federation (ACF) and the ACF Southwestern New Mexico and Texas Chapter have started the first Mescalero Apache Indian Apprenticeship Pilot Program in the United States.

According to a news release, this is the first time the ACF has ever conducted this program on an Indian Reservation.

"This opens the doors for all Indians in the United States to have this program on their Reservation," reads the release.

"The Mescalero Apache Tribe has been very instrumental in developing this program."

The program will be taught at the Inn of the Mountain Gods in Mescalero. With the help of their resort hotel, Inn of the Mountain Gods and their managing staff, this program will be open to young and old — Mescalero only.

The classes will be taught at the hotel by executive chef James Muldowney, as well as 43 members of the ACF Southwestern New Mexico and Texas Chefs Association.

This three-year program includes 6,000 hours of study.

When the apprentices complete this program, they will graduate as "Certified Cook." They will receive

diplomas from the American Culinary Federation and the U.S. Department of Labor.

The ACF is registered by the Department of Labor, registry number N-900-93 in Washington, DC.

This program is so dramatic because, not only theory is taught, but hands-on classes will also be taught at the job site.

The American Culinary Federation has placed the name of the Mescalero Apache Tribe as well as our chapter's name in the National Archives as the first Native American Apprenticeship Program in the United States.

No liquor license is no problem at J.D. Bulls

Attempts to secure a special events (picnic) license to cover the sale of liquor over the weekend at J.D. Bulls fell through, but patrons seemed to enjoy the entertainment anyway.

Owner Jerry Cazares told **The Ruidoso News** Sunday that a good crowd turned up at the restaurant on U.S. 70 Friday and Saturday night to enjoy the food, to sip soft drinks and non-alcohol beer, and to watch and ride the bulls.

He may not even try to secure a liquor license, Cazares said.

"It's going pretty decent without it, so we may try to go on with it as is," he said.

Cazares has been invited by Lincoln County Commissioner Wilton Howell to a special commission

meeting Friday to try to iron out differences. During a previous meeting last week, commissioners had passed along complaints about the business, but Howell said after a personal visit Saturday, he doesn't see a problem.

Last Friday, Mary Ann Hughes, director of the State Alcohol and Gaming Division of the Department of Regulation and Licensing, told **The News** that she would not issue a special events alcohol sales license, because J.D. Bulls is an on-going business and there was no special event.

"It didn't sound like a function that should be issued a license (which covers a one-time catered or public event)," Hughes said. "For last weekend, they applied at the last minute, but then kept calling back saying they didn't want it and

then they did. We ended up not issuing one.

"We've been requested by the county not to issue the license. I have a real concern that the (business) he monitored this weekend concerning any use of alcohol.

"It's totally against the law if someone shows up with their own liquor. It would be subject to seizure and the place could be closed down."

Cazares said enforcement officials with the division of public safety showed up Friday night.

"They made a big scene parading around in their uniforms, but the guy just laughed when he saw that we were drinking non-alcohol beer," Cazares said.

Hughes said to secure a regular license to serve alcohol could take five or six months. Restaurants

that serve sit-down meals can apply for beer and wine only licenses, but that takes about the same amount of time, she said.

The business, located in the building that used to be called The Barn, serves food.

Cazares said he plans to accept Howell's invitation to attend the special commission meeting set for 9 a.m. Friday. He's disturbed by some of the hearsay information commissioners passed along during the previous meeting without coming to see for themselves or verifying the allegations.

"One commissioner said there had been calls to the sheriff's department. I checked and neither the sheriff nor the police department received any calls," Cazares said.

Police Chief Richard Swenor told

The News last week that he had been at the restaurant every evening and there were no problems. A disturbance connected to a private party nearby had been blamed on J.D. Bulls, Swenor was quoted as saying in an article Thursday.

Cazares said Howell visited the restaurant Saturday evening.

"He came to see firsthand," Cazares said. "We sat down and talked and worked things out. I just think the commissioners should have been more careful about what they said until they checked."

Howell told **The News** Sunday that he was impressed with the way Cazares was running J.D. Bulls.


"I think it's unfortunate there were so many allegations and I didn't go (check it out) before the first commission meeting," he said.

"All I had to go on and the reason I reacted, I feel obligated to my constituents and I had four or six people call me. When I brought up (the criticisms), I voiced what their concerns were."

Howell said he prefaced his remarks at that commission meeting by saying he was passing along reports from other people.

"All I can testify to is that the night I went there, it was very family oriented and nothing was going on," Howell said. "The average age was 15-16 years old and there were a lot of families. I took my daughter and felt secure turning her loose. If someone was drinking alcohol, they sure were fooling me. Mr. Cazares related to me that he'd like to see it go without the alcohol."

"I invited him to attend the special commission meeting and try to iron out any differences."

Also, the Twenty-third Psalm: "The Lord is my Shepherd, I shall not want..."


And from the First Epistle of the Apostle John: "Behold what manner of love the father hath bestowed upon us that we should be called the sons of God..."

This is being sent to you just at sundown on July 7 and will reach you on July 12, the eighteenth birthday of Gerald Tully.



Clinic says 'yes' to b'ball 'no' to AIDS

Two University of New Mexico athletes hosted a clinic at Mescalero Friday in an effort to educate kids about basketball and AIDS.

The combination may seem a little odd, but UNM basketball player Canonchet Neves and former track athlete Willie Goldsmith did their best to combine the two for a program sponsored by the Mescalero Health Education Department.

The clinic was promoted as a basketball clinic, but was designed to have the athletes share information on the Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS).

"What we are doing is some basic AIDS education with the basketball clinic," said Barbje Johnson of the Health Education office. "It gets through to the kids better than just sitting them down and giving them a lecture."

During the clinic, the athletes were able work in some information about the disease and how to prevent it.

"They can throw out a message here and there, and the kids are more likely to remember it because they're having fun," said Johnson.

Johnson also said that it is important for the kids to see that people are trying to live a healthy lifestyle.

"Obesity is a major problem on the reservation, and exercise is one of the cures for that," said Johnson.


If the kids start to exercise young, according to Johnson, then it most likely would become a lifetime activity.

"If you develop a healthy lifestyle when you are young, it will become a lifetime activity," said Johnson. "Activity is the key."

But, Neves was not brought to the reservation only because he is a healthy athlete.

Neves is a Native American from the Narragansett tribe and is one of about three Native Americans playing in division I NCAA basketball.

Neves said that means he has to

do as much as he can for people.

"I guess I have been put in the role of a role model for kids," said Neves. "That means I have to act like one, because it is important to people."

Neves was a part-time starter for UNM for the 1992-93 season and averaged 7.7 points per game

while averaging 3 rebounds per game. He transferred from Detroit Mercy College after his sophomore year.

Goldsmith was a three sport athlete at Valley High School in Albuquerque and was a member of the track team at UNM in the early 1980s.

His performance at the Institute was reminiscent of his 78 during the Leroy Gooch Invitational, which ultimately gave the Warriors their first-ever Gooch title.





Here's the scoop on the golf course lease

TO THE EDITOR:

Ordinance Number 89-2, an ordinance for leasing of the tract of land known as the old airport tract to Jim Colbert Golf, Inc., to construct and operate an 18-hole golf course and to SWD Motels, Inc., to construct and operate a luxury resort hotel.

Of course the SWD hotel part of this ordinance has gone by the boards but the golf course part is still ambulating along.

If you are like me, you have heard all kinds of descriptions of the golf course lease, so I was able to get a copy of it. If for no other reason, I wanted to be informed. Regardless of the consequences, I think Ruidoso people need to be informed.

The old cliché that said "don't bother me with the facts, my mind is made up" may be true in this case.

Article I, Section 1, gives the term of the lease to be 15 years

with an additional option of 15 years and 20 years at the option of Colbert.

There is no two-way street on this. It is up to Colbert Golf as to whether the lease is extended or not, period. I'll have to admit, in all fairness that if I were Colbert, this is the way I would want it.

Section 2 describes Time and Manner of Payments.

In the years one to 15 Colbert is to pay 20 percent of all gross sales to the village if gross sales exceed \$1.5 million per annum. Now the stickler in this, in so far as the Village is concerned is that \$1.5 million is a whale of a lot of gross sales. Think about it. In a resort town high in the mountains, I would think I would be concerned about the number of days that weather would permit golf. I would think December, January and February would be impossible. Then another month somewhere which

would make eight months of golf. Now if each golfer spent \$35 to play a round of golf, including his cokes and his part of the golf cart, it would take about 42,857 golfers in that eight months to have gross sales of \$1.5 million. Now that is a bunch.

So far, no payments have been made on the lease as I understand it, because they haven't grossed \$1.5 million.

In all due respect, this is the kind of deal I would want if I were Colbert Golf, a Nevada Corporation.

Section 4 of the lease says the appraised value of the 160 acres leased to Colbert Golf approximates \$2,550,000. Section 4 also says that the Village is to provide 200 acre feet of water rights reasonably necessary to keep the courses in top condition. I would want water rights if I were Colbert Golf. Long before Colbert, the Village paid \$200,000 for approximately 64 acre

feet of water rights so you can use your pencil.

Remember when the Village borrowed the money to clear that land of debt from the FAA? I think it was close to the appraisal price. If that borrowed money has an interest rate of 5 percent, it is costing us taxpayers \$127,500 in interest alone on that much money. I'll bet we are paying more than 5 percent, too.

No, I can't argue about it, this is the kind of deal I would want if I were Colbert Golf.

One thing for sure, Colbert Golf sure prettied up that land with a real good golf course. Seems like everybody who plays golf there, likes it.

If you would like to check this lease out, it is public information; and you can ask the Village Clerk for a copy.



"Innocence Lost: The Verdict"

Last year, one of the largest child sexual abuse cases in the country concluded its first trial. After nine months of testimony, Robert Fulton Kelly, owner of the Little Rascals day-care center in Edenton, North Carolina, was found guilty on ninety-nine of one-hundred counts of child sexual abuse. Kelly was sentenced to twelve consecutive life terms, one for each of the children he was convicted of molesting.

"Innocence Lost: The Verdict," a two-part Frontline Special Report, is the culmination of the three-year-long examination of the history and prosecution of this case.

In 1991, Frontline broadcast "Innocence Lost" which meticulously detailed the tangled roots of the charges against seven people, the claims and counterclaims, and the poisoned atmosphere which consumed Edenton's once-peaceful, church-going community of five thousand.

Now, in "Innocence Lost: The Verdict," Frontline returns to Edenton for the long-awaited trial of Bob Kelly, the first of seven separate trials.

Part I of "Innocence Lost: The Verdict" begins in an empty courtroom as the jurors in Kelly's trial deliberate. Using footage from the original broadcast with added material never used, the program outlines the earliest history of the case — how it all started.

Part I of "Innocence Lost: The Verdict" concludes with the medical evidence presented in court. As there was no other evidence to the alleged crimes, the results of medical examinations were eagerly awaited. The charges were clear and terrible: sodomy, rape, knives, forks, and needles inserted into the children. But the

medical evidence was contradictory, and ultimately, opinions were split and inconclusive.

In the end, without any definitive physical or material evidence of abuse, without adult eyewitnesses, without the therapists' appearance in court, the heart of the case would be the children's testimony.

Part II of "Innocence Lost: The Verdict" focuses on the testimony of the twelve children who took the stand, the questioning by prosecutors and defense attorneys, and the jurors' decisions on what they heard.

Since cameras were forbidden in the courtroom when children and parents testified, their testimony, in this program, is read by adult narrators and depicted through courtroom drawings. At the time they testified, the children were three years older than when the alleged crimes occurred.

Finally, through the perspectives of five jurors, the program examines how, after three-and-a-half weeks of deliberation, the jurors finally address their doubts about the state's case and resolve on a conviction. Bob Kelly is found guilty on ninety-nine of one-hundred counts. His conviction is a vindication for the parents, but a shock to other defendants now facing their own trials.

Finally, "Innocence Lost: The Verdict" examines the predicament of the six remaining defendants in the case, which has dramatically changed since Robert Kelly's conviction.



