### Grand jury to convene in 'Zozo Tuesday

A second grand jury will convene in Lincoln County Tuesday to handle cases prosecutors want to review during the next three months.

In June, a grand jury was seated specifically to hear information about possible public corruption charges against State Representative H. John Underwood. The jury declined to return any indictments against Underwood, but did hand down a misdemeanor charge against Ruidoso Downs Police Chief Will Haggard for failure to respond to a subpoena.

Earlier this month, a second grand jury was seated and members picked July 20 to begin hearing information. Grand jury proceedings are secret, as are the names of the members.

## MainStreet picks art and history as themes for Rio Ruidoso Riverwalk

MainStreet Ruidoso brought the dream of a Riverwalk one step closer to a reality as initial plans for the project were unveiled Thursday.

The plans were presented during the group's regular monthly board meeting.

"The theme we are suggesting is the promotion of Lincoln County through public art," said MainStreet executive director Don Miller.

Miller's plan would include using public art, such as sculptures, to chronicle the unique attractions throughout Lincoln County while promoting Ruidoso as the focal point of the county.

"The concept would be reasonably sized public art with placards to tell the story of Lincoln County," said Miller.

Among the possible art pieces for the project are statues of Smokey Bear promoting Capitan, Billy the Kid for Lincoln, the railroad in Carrizozo, mining around White Oaks, and the race horse promoting Ruidoso.

"Anything that depicts the history of the county could be used in the plan," said Miller.

But, other than the art theme for the Riverwalk, plans are still up in the air.

"What we are talking about is strictly the theme," said Miller. "Once the theme is approved we will work on developing the program."

Miller said that MainStreet will be finding an architect for the project. The group would also be working with the Corps of Engineers to determine the best manner in which to proceed with the plans.

Initially the project would run from Fern Street to Country Club road along the river behind Sudderth. The Riverwalk will begin in the same area that is slated to be a part of the first phase of MainStreet's Streetscape project which is scheduled to begin with construction on September 7.

According to Miller, the Streetscape project is the group's first priority and would not be affected by the Riverwalk planning.

"We are committed to the MainStreet Streetscape program and we would not let the Riverwalk get in the way of that," said MainStreet Board President Tom Battin.

Although nothing has been set in stone, or even in writing, Miller said that the Riverwalk will be fully handicapped accessible and will be a minimum of six feet in width or wider. The walk will also be parallel to the river but will sit above the river bed.

Another aspect of the project that has been on Miller's mind is funding for the project.

First of all, with the use of public art, many federal and state funding possibilities will be available. For the construction costs, other grants will be available to the group.

"It's too early to estimate the costs but there are many sources of funding out there," said Miller.

One need for funding will present itself within the next 120 days.

## Developer deals with county on subdivision

A 4,700-acre subdivision with lots ranging in size from five to 80 acres is proposed for construction along the road to the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport.

But the developer wants some changes and variances to Lincoln County's subdivision ordinance or the project may not be financially feasible, representative Kelly Kilber told county commissioners Friday.

The subdivision would be developed on property that used to comprise the Bar M Ranch, Kilber said. Representing Properties of the Southwest, he said the majority of the lots would be five to 20 acres.

A few may be laid out in 60- to 80-acre ranches," he said. The land lies about four miles west of the airport, said Gary Lynch, the local Realtor handling the sales transaction.

Kilber said the county's subdivision regulation appear to be overly restrictive, especially when it refers to requirements for central water and sewer service.

Pointing to a map showing one proposed layout of the subdivision, county manager Andy Wynham noted that in the central portion, 109 lots are proposed with 75 under 10 acres.

"The layout concerns me because it is more concentrated than the other areas with 20- to 30-acre (lots)," Wynham said.

Kilber pointed out that where the Bonito River runs through the development, the lots are smaller at five acres each, because they are heavily wooded and secluded. In the area backed up to the Fort Stanton Reservation, the lots are between 10 and 40 acres in size because it's rough terrain and not heavily wooded, he said.

The company's main concern is the economic feasibility of developing five-acre parcels and installing central water and sewer, Kilber said. It's just not financially feasible, he said.

If we did the development in 24 lots at a time, central water and sewer would not be needed, but if we go past that, there is a requirement to serve anything under 10 acres.

"We want an amendment to develop five acres or more without central facilities."

"We have to walk carefully on this, because normally, you don't change an ordinance to suit one development," Wynham said. "But it's not very practical to require central sewage for five-acre lots. Normally, that's reserved for lots of a half-acre or less in a city environment."

Kilber noted that no matter what the county eventually agrees to, the company would have to satisfy the requirements of the state.

"We're well within the guidelines of the (State Environment Department) on water and wells, according to (local employee) Jim Edwards," Lynch said. No irrigation water rights come with the property, he said, but residential wells may be installed.

Company officials also may want a variance on road requirements. The ordinance stipulates a 28-foot wide base course with double sur-

## Landscaping rules enforcement varies

Recently, Ruidoso residents banded together in a failed effort to save giant Ponderosa pines that fronted their neighborhood off Sudderth Drive.

Those residents were concerned that the removal of the natural forest screen that now blocks their neighborhood from the high traffic of Sudderth would impact their quality of life.

Although many pines will come down, residents will have to settle for the landscaping the village requires for all improved sites.

According to the village code, landscaping requirements have been set forth to:

—encourage quality development within the village and to provide a smooth transition between adjoining properties.

—to screen service yards, parking lots and other areas which tend to be unsightly.

—to facilitate the buffering of one land use from other land uses.

—to encourage harmonious relationships between buildings which are part of one development and buildings located on abutting properties.

—to provide open space and recreational areas to serve the needs of the residents of the village.

—to soften the effect of development.

—to improve erosions and storm water runoff control.

—to reduce the particulate matter in the air.

—to encourage a sense of commitment to the village and its residents on the part of the developers.

—and to provide for the health, safety and general welfare of the residents of the village.

The village describes landscaping as: naturally existing vegetation; lawn or grass areas; trees, shrubs, ground cover and other plantings; sprinkler or irrigation systems; decorative rock, natural or man-made; decorative lighting; benches, tables, fountains, planters or other similar outdoor furniture; decorative fences, detention and retention of ponds; waterfalls and man-made streams; and berms or mounds.

The code reads that landscaping shall be located in such a way as to provide substantial benefit to the general public as well as to the site itself.

Furthermore, where practical, landscaping shall also be provided with parking lots in a manner which will serve to visually reduce the expanse of paved areas.

The village has minimum landscaping requirement that specifies the number of trees that shall be planted on a site plan.

"Trees shall be provided for all parking lot areas. A minimum of one tree shall be provided for each 10 parking spaces.

"Trees shall be a minimum size of two inches in diameter as measured at four feet above ground, and shall be distributed throughout the lot to maximize shading and eliminate large expanses of unbroken paved parking areas.


"Not less than six percent of the interior of a parking lot shall be

landscaped with trees, shrubs or other durable landscaping materials.



## Air Force man killed in a car-motorcycle crash

A 31-year-old Holloman Air Force Base man was killed Saturday when the motorcycle he was riding struck an automobile about 2:42 p.m. near mile marker 244 off U.S. Highway 70.

New Mexico State Police spokesman Reggie Selman said Carlton Wickliffe was westbound on a 1982 Honda Gold Wing motorcycle when a 1992 Ford Festiva entered the highway from a side road on the Mescalero Apache Reservation.

The car, which exited from Old Road, was being driven by a 12-year-old resident of the reservation,

according to Lt. Ivan Bowekaty of the reservation's law enforcement office.

Wickliffe's motorcycle hit the car broadside.

Wickliffe was taken to Lincoln County Medical Center in Ruidoso where he was pronounced dead by medical investigator Danny Sisson.

An autopsy will be performed to determine the exact cause of death, according to Sisson.

Bowekaty said the driver of the car was issued a citation for not having a drivers license, and the accident still is under investigation.

landscape plan for any residential, business or industrial development, shall be installed prior to the is-

suance of any occupancy permit, unless a financial guarantee in the amount of 150 percent of the cost of the materials and labor is submitted to the village.

During an executive session, the MainStreet Board approved to take up a 120-day option on land for the project.

With the option, MainStreet can hold the land, owned by Bill and Ann Wilson, for 120 days until they find the funding to buy it or set up a long-term lease.

The property located on Eagle Drive and River Road, is in the heart of the project area and would be used to set up additional park-

ing, public restrooms, and an overall entrance to the Riverwalk.


Miller's timetable for the project would have the design complete by the first of the year, funding requests into the state agencies by March 1, and construction started by this time next year.

In other agenda items during the meeting, Ruidoso Village Councilor Frank Potter and chamber director Joan Bailey were added as

new board members.

Since both Bailey and Potter also work at area businesses, Bailey at Story Book Cabins and Potter at the Museum of the Horse, they will both be voting members and not ex-officio members. Potter was not present at the meeting.

Board members also approved minutes of the last meeting, the group's financial reports and a service contract with the Village of Ruidoso.



## Council responds to merchants' complaints about civic center use

Village employee raises and plans to protect village merchants against trade practices allowed at the Civic Events Center drew strong support from the Ruidoso Village Council at a special meeting Friday.

Councilor J.D. James, noting that some village employees haven't had a raise since 1987, said the councilors should hang their heads in shame for waiting so long. He made a motion to give each village employee a \$100 per month raise. Councilor Joe Gomez said the raise should be retroactive to July 1, and the motion passed unanimously.

Mayor Jerry Shaw said the raise was in addition to a longevity bonus employees will receive in De-

cember.

In other business, the council discussed the use of the Civic Events Center as it relates to downtown merchants.

Last Tuesday, during the regular council meeting, a packed council hall listened to several merchants explain how the arts and crafts fairs being offered at the center are hurting their business.

Shamie Mills, owner of Cochera Restaurant and Cantina, said she is not against fair competition.

"To come into town only on the good weekends and then take your part and leave is not fair."

Most wholesalers protect their retailers by not selling to the general public.

Mills said local merchants have been buying their merchandise

from these wholesalers at the same prices the wholesalers are selling from booths at the center.

There also was concern that the gross receipts tax (sales tax) was not being collected during the fairs.

Planning and zoning chairman Robert Donaldson agreed with center director Kathleen Michelena that the center can set limits.

He referred to a list submitted by Michelena of other centers that don't allow hard rock concerts as opposed to other concerts.

He said a problem might arise from arbitrarily enforcing regulations that would discriminate.

"We can allow conventions, meetings, social events and exhibits, these being non-sale events. Sale events can be limited to non-profit organizations where sales

primarily benefit some group within Lincoln County, like the chamber and gymnastics group."

Donaldson said the center can limit sales that are incidental to major conventions from meetings where people or activities, not vendors, are pre-registered to the general public for a fee. He said that would take care of the motorcycle rally.

He said there could be sales that are closed to the general public if a market, such as wholesalers, were to come into Ruidoso to sell to the businesses in town.

Donaldson said that an appeal process would be necessary. He gave an example of an applicant who might not fit into any category, but should have a body or board in which to appeal.

Donaldson said the approach to ensure fair competition should be broader than just the arts and crafts fairs of the summer, but all events booked at the center.

Ruidoso lawyer and MainStreet board member Don Dutton said that he disagreed with village manager Ron Wicker that because of free enterprise, persons could not be turned down.

He suggested a center fee structure that differs from profit to non-profit groups. He said if fairs are going to be held, sales should be restricted to artists and craftsman in the booths and not wholesalers.

The council leaned heavily toward canceling future arts and crafts fairs as currently structured, although they agreed the August shows, already paid for in full, would have to run as scheduled.

The council approved a committee of four persons, MainStreet board member Don Dutton, chamber director Joan Bailey, center director Kathleen Michelena and P&Z chairman Robert Donaldson to draft fair competition regulations for the council to approve during the first meeting in August.

In other business, the council approved the chamber of commerce contract for the next fiscal year.

—discussed a request for proposal for legal professional services to be advertised in the newspaper.

—approved \$150 for a tennis trip for six Ruidoso youths who participated in the parks and recreation summer program to play in the NJTL Regional Tennis Rally in Phoenix, Arizona.

the application.

We've been led to believe that the county prefers gravel to paved, but we feel paved is more appropriate for development in higher density areas and gravel is preferable in lower density," Kilber said.

As I understand it, this subdivision ordinance has never been utilized. It was passed when things were going real fast and then they slowed down.

Looking at the county's ability to maintain the roads, we'd be willing to work at any county standard" but would like to build 24-foot wide roads with shoulders," he said.

The company also is asking the commission to consider a variance to the 50-year storm criteria for bridges and culverts, he said.

"The Bonito runs through the property and the ordinance says there should be two crossings into every area," Kilber said. "We're asking if we could have one low water structure for one and the other would meet the 50-year criteria. In that manner, there would always be a way out (in a big storm), but for everyday use (there would be two accesses)."

"Are we talking aesthetics or cost?" Chairman Monroy Montes asked.

"Cost is the primary consideration," Kilber said. "We could build one to a 100-year storm standard

cheaper than both to 50 years."

All construction will be on site, no modulars, mobile homes or move-ins, he said.

"What kind of commons area are you proposing, a golf course or parks?" asked Commissioner L. Ray Nunley.

Kilber said parks are being designated along the river and no golf course is planned.

### Project timing

Lynch said within 120 days from June 1, company representatives have to put up "a lot more forfeit earnest money" if they want to hold onto the property.

Meanwhile, officials of the company are trying to firm up what the commission will require to determine if the yield would justify the cost, Kilber said.

"If the commission says the 10 acres must be adhered to, it would be a question of the feasibility of the project," he said. "It couldn't be five-acre lots. We'd have to go with one-acre lots, it simply wouldn't be feasible with central water and sewer."

"So I'm asking the commission, do you see development occurring in smaller tracts or larger parcels?"

Kilber suggested the commission direct Wynham to meet with company officials and come back with a recommendation.

"I'm not for amending the ordinance to accommodate one devel-

opment, but you've pointed out general problems that need adjustment to address this type of development," said Commissioner Wilton Howell.

Commissioner Stirling Spencer said that although he applauds the "overall airiness and openness, which is a quality of this county," he won't act until members of the planning and zoning board review the proposals and offer a recommendation.

"He did go to planning and zoning and they asked him to come here," Wynham said.

Lynch said he's already taken three members of the zoning board out to see the site and videotape the property.

"Our manager's been through this before and knows the commission's thinking," Spencer said, suggesting that Wynham meet with company officials, then take the results to planning and zoning.

"That will take 30 to 45 extra days if they go back to planning and zoning," Montes said. "I would like a proposal back (to the commission) in two weeks."

"I agree," Howell said.

"If we like it, we can advertise for a public hearing and incorporate the changes," Montes said.

"That will give me an opportunity to take the proposal to planning and zoning for a recommendation and to schedule a public hearing in September," Wynham

said. "The process will be moving."

"Meanwhile, I suggest every commissioner try to go out and become familiar with the site," Montes said.

### Company history

Kilber said Properties of the Southwest is wholly owned by Patten Corporation, a national land developer, with a home office in Boca Raton, Florida, and 40 other sales offices across the country.

A typical project of the company consists of five- to 25-acre parcels in rural areas.

"This property is unique, but lends itself to that type of development," Kilber said. The land has been put under contract and a feasibility study now is under way to determine the cost of development and the overall plan.

In a brochure left with Wynham, about a dozen other developments by Southwest are listed.

Kilber said six projects around San Antonio, Texas, are in the 500- to 3,000-acre range. Six others in the Houston area are from 200 to 2,200 acres, he said.

A 700-acre development is planned for an entertainment mecca in Missouri, and the company is just beginning a major project in the north Dallas area, Kilber said.

"This is our first venture into New Mexico," he said. "Our presi-

dent, Charles Patterson, is an avid Ruidoso fan and has come here for years."

Patten offers financing on the purchase of the lots, and therefore, is tied to a project for 10 to 15 years, Kilber said.

The company locally is working with surveyor Tim Collins, he said.

Lynch assured commissioners that the company "does not beat up on people" in its sales approach. It has a long history of successful developments and money can be refunded up until the day of closing.

Kilber said marketing is done on site, by mail and through advertisements in the newspaper.

"We have not used telemarketing, other than direct personal contact," he said.

Kilber has assured him the company doesn't promise vacations, special prizes and sets of steak knives, Wynham added.

"Each project has some kind of registration with HUD (the federal Housing and Urban Development agency)," Kilber said. The company is a public corporation, listed on the New York stock exchange, he said.

### Neighbors pleased

Charles Busch, former mayor of Little Elm, Texas, said Southwest officials appear to be good neighbors so far. The company is building Eagle's

Landing there and Busch was in office when the first plat was signed.

"They're coming through on all their promises," he told The Ruidoso News Friday. Eagle's Landing consists of 150 lots from one to five acres in size, he said. It's built on the edge of a lake outside of Houston.

"I heard good and bad things about them, but I think the development is pretty top-notch," Busch said. "We have pretty stringent requirements on paved road construction. They've sold all of the lots already, but we won't allow construction of any homes until all the streets are completed. I think August is the target for that. I heard before they cut in the roads that half of the lots were sold."

The subdivision is served by a local water company and uses septic tanks, Busch said.

"We hired an engineer to oversee the project and inspect for us, but they agreed to pay for him. They also donated property to the city for a future city hall and park," Busch said.

The company already has started on a second 700-acre development in the area, to be called Emerald Sound, he said.

"It looks pretty good," he said. "It was a rough piece of property."

Busch said he was told the cheapest lots were selling for about \$15,000 and one seven-acre piece backed up to the water went for \$82,000.



## Bob Rowe named to state group

Robert K. Rowe of Alto has been named to a planning group working with New Mexico Public Service Commission.

Rowe, who recently attended a training session with the close to 100 members of the Integrated Resources Planning Project, will work on one of six sub-groups.

The volunteers, who pay their own expenses to attend meetings and training sessions, include utility company employees, engineers and consumers. Their task is to study rates and services of electric, gas and water companies in New Mexico.

"Our overall goal is to consider leased cost planning for utilities and control of demand side management and supply side management at the least cost," explained Rowe.

This group, after more study, will prepare a filing system for utilities to file their rates and will develop a system which encourages public involvement, said Rowe.

Rowe said members of the Public Service Commission (PSC) were aware of his interest, and may have appointed him in their efforts to obtain statewide representation.

WCA Ombudsmen, experts in management of Workers' Compensation claims and claim disputes, provide information and guidance to injured workers and any party involved in a Workers' compensation claim.

—a rear yard variance for the North 67 feet of NE 1/4 Lot 73, Block CC, Singing Pines Sd., for David and Ruby Greenhaw,

—a variance for front and side yard for Jack Ricks of Lot 138A-1, Block B, Sleepy Hollow Sd.

Ricks plans to demolish his existing residence and construct a new 26 x 44-foot residence with a 12 x 26-foot carport.

Meetings of the Planning and Zoning Commission, as well as meetings of all village boards and commissions are open to the public.

# Hubbard Foundation donates to schools

A new multimedia approach to capitalize on the fact that many students are visual learners will be integrated into the Ruidoso School system next fall, compliments of the R.D. and Joan Dale Hubbard Foundation.

"Image Processing for Teaching," described as a highly motivating computer instructional system, allows students and teachers to use images retrieved from space satellites, CAT scans, X-rays, aerial photographs, microscopes and other video equipment.

It's an especially important program for students from the diverse linguistic or cultural backgrounds found in the Ruidoso district, said superintendent Mike Gladden.

Mrs. Hubbard handed over a check for \$22,100 to Gladden last week to cover employee-related

costs of computer and mathematics instructor Jim Dickinson, who already has been trained in image processing.

The district paid for Dickinson to attend the University of Arizona IPT Teacher Training Project during the summer of 1992.

The district also purchased the basic equipment necessary for staff training and instructional purposes during the 1993-94 school year.

But to implement the technology, it will be necessary to provide on-site demonstration and presentation of the variety of technology to all students and staff this fall, according to the application submitted to the foundation.

"This awareness level component will precede an in-depth one week training seminar during the summer of 1994 during which time a team of teachers from each site will become trained as site coordi-

ners for each of six campuses in the school district," the writers stated.

During the upcoming school year, the district will purchase more computer equipment for each campus, probably using bond issue proceeds.

But it needed the Hubbards' help to pay for the employee and benefits.

The Hubbard Foundation was founded by R.D. and Joan Dale Hubbard of Fort Worth, Texas, and Ruidoso, in 1986.

Both former teachers in Kansas, the Hubbards maintain their strong ties to education.

In 1992, the foundation awarded 42 grants totalling \$3.1-million in the categories of arts and humanities, and education.

The Image Processing for Teaching project was developed at the

University of Arizona Lunar and Planetary Laboratory. It aims to teach the use of digital image processing and in the scientific content of digital images.

Using those resources, master teachers have developed classroom activities for students in a wide range of grades and subject areas.


During the pilot phase of the project, which was paid for by the National Science Foundation and Apple Computer, children worked with digital image processing in more than 50 schools in diverse geographical settings.

Supporters say that results from schools show the project is a way to excite both traditional and non-traditional learners about sciences and mathematics.

The project may have the potential to revolutionize the way these subjects are taught.

### Local travel journalist wins national photography award

Ruidoso area travel writer and photographer Dave G. Houser was among top award winners in the Ninth Annual Lowell Thomas Travel Journalism competition.

It is now one o'clock, and the light showers are coming down the valley. Let us thank Our Lord for the good rains and all our many great blessings.



# Downs mayor lured into a reel hobby

Most fishermen like to have an extra couple of rods and reels around in case they need them.

However, Ruidoso Downs Mayor Joe Hayhurst has taken that idea to an extreme.

In about four years, Hayhurst has collected more than 300 reels and 200 lures.

The difference is that Hayhurst's lures and reels don't go any further than the case he has for them in his home in the Downs.

"I don't go fishing much any more," said Hayhurst. "I used to but not in the past year or so."

So, instead of sitting by the lake in search of fish, he and his wife go to garage sales, flea markets and antique shows looking for the old reels and lures.

But of course Mrs. Hayhurst always takes the chance to try and pick up a few things for herself.

"My wife collects thimbles and I collect old fishing gear," said Hayhurst. "It's something fun that we enjoy and can go and do together."

The Hayhursts travel throughout the area, El Paso, Las Cruces, Artesia, Roswell, Alamogordo, in search of new items for their collections.

"We have even gone up to Albuquerque some weekends," said Hayhurst. "The flea market up at the State Fair Grounds is just enormous."

Hayhurst said that he started looking for the fishing gear to help out his son.

"My son started collecting first," said Hayhurst. "I would look for them for him. But now, most of them that I find stay down here with me."

Most of Hayhurst's collection are antiques that range in value from several dollars to several hundred dollars and come from about 10 different lure companies and eight different reel companies.

"Probably the oldest one dates back to 1898," said Hayhurst.

That reel was hand crafted by Julius Vomhoff.

Even though that may be Hayhurst's oldest lure, it's not

necessarily the favorite of the collection.

"My favorite would have to be the all-in-one Hurd Supreme," said Hayhurst.


The casting reel was made attached to a walnut handle which then attaches to a separate pole. According to the Mayor, it was crafted in about 1920.

Hayhurst, a member of a national lure club, said he thinks he is one of the only lure and reel collector in the area. But, since he loves it so much, would be more than happy to help people appraise their antique equipment and maybe a tour of the collection.

"These things would make some good museum items," said Hayhurst. "Some people donate them to museums, I think the closest collection is in Oklahoma."

Who knows, with the constant growth of Hayhurst's collection a museum may be in it's future.

Could Ruidoso Downs be the home of both the Museum of the Horse and a Museum of the Fish? Only time will tell.

## Amandas Nice Boy takes the Rio Grande

Amandas Nice Boy took the lead midway in the backstretch and was never seriously threatened as he coasted home by 2 1/2 lengths under a hand-ride by jockey Roger Gomez to win the \$70,041 Rio Grande Futurity Sunday.

The gelded son of Brave Lad broke sharply from the #3 post in the field of twelve New Mexico-bred 2-year-olds and had a head lead at the quarter pole in the six furlong sprint.

At the top of the stretch, Amandas Nice Boy had a comfortable two-length advantage and

proved much the best at the wire. He stopped the timer in 1:13.2 over a sloppy track.

"He broke pretty sharp, but I didn't want to take the lead too soon so I got him to relax and slowed down the pace," said Gomez who has ridden the Fred Danley-trained in all six of his starts.

"He'd run second twice before, (in the Norgor and Kindergarten Futurities) but today we finally got the big money."

Gomez added that he felt confident in his mount although the race was run in a driving thunderstorm.

"It was his first time in the slop, but he'd worked in the mornings over it so I wasn't worried because a good horse can handle any kind of surface."

Amandas Nice Boy has three wins and three places in his young career and doubled his career bankroll to \$70,724 with the \$35,020 winner's share of the purse. The gelding placed in the May 31 Rio Grande Kindergarten Futurity behind the speedy filly Saint Patties Lucy, then repeated that effort in the June 20 Norgor behind the undefeated colt Set

Records. Amandas Nice Boy was part of a three-horse entry owned by William Stradley and Tom Williams of Hobbs.

Major Macho, a stablemate of Amandas Nice Boy in the Danley-shedrow, finished five lengths in front of McReason for the place. Owned by Danley's wife Rita, Major Macho earned \$15,409 for his efforts.

Manual Ortiz rode the gelded son of Totality. McReason and jockey Joe Martinez also came from off the pace to secure third.

"Dona Tules" to appear at the Museum of the Horse Saturday

The Museum of the Horse features actress VanAnn Moore in a rowing performance of "La Tules" at 7 p.m. Saturday, July 24. The Chautauqua performance is part of the Museum's ongoing membership program. The evening performance is free and open to the public.

VanAnn Moore makes her second appearance at the Museum of the Horse with her portrayal of Dona Maria Gertrudes Barcelo or "La Tules," one of the most colorful, independent, wealthy and influential women in the history of New Mexico and Mexico.

A red-head of Spanish descent, La Tules operated an elaborate gambling establishment in Santa Fe during an extremely turbulent period of history.

Dona Tules played a prominent

role in the events of the 1840s when Santa Fe was a bustling center of trade at the end of the Santa Fe trail. It was a period of changing values, a clash of cultures and civil strife.

It was during this decade that Tules played her part in assisting the American Army of the West in wresting New Mexico (known as the Northern Province of Mexico) away from the Republic of Mexico.

The famous gambling hall of Dona Tules was patronized by soldiers and wagon traders, conspirators, priests and society members. All classes gambled in New Mexico — it was a natural part of life.

La Tules was said to be the most expert monte dealer to be found anywhere from St. Louis to Califor-

nia. The Spanish card game of monte was a "game of chance," however it was her expertise with the cards that made Tules a very wealthy and influential woman who dominated the society of her day.

Some say she was even the "power behind the throne" of Governor Don Manuel Armijo, the last Mexican Governor of the Province.

Dona Tules died in 1852 at the height of her glory as the favorite of New Mexico officialdom, hostess to elite parties and balls, and a shrewd and astute business woman.

La Tules is known to be the last person to be buried under the floor of the old parroquia church where St. Francis Cathedral now stands.

Her colorful rags-to-riches story is from the Spanish woman's perspective and experience.

VanAnn Moore is an accomplished singer, actress, director and coach with more than 35 major roles to her credit.

A graduate of the University of Colorado and the University of Denver, Moore also has 12 years of intense operatic and classical voice study behind her.

Her visit to the Museum of the Horse last fall as Susan Shelby Magoffin received rave reviews from an enthusiastic crowd.

Moore will be accompanied by Andre Garcia-Nuthmann for her role as Dona Tules. Garcia-Nuthmann is the music director of Highlands University in Las Vegas, New Mexico.

He has a masters in piano performance from the University of New Mexico and has also studied in Salzburg, Austria. In 1992 he was a performer with the Santa Fe Opera Guild Touring Company.

During the Museum's Chautauqua presentation, he will be performing original music composed specifically for "Dona Tules."



## Editorial

### What's a forest without trees?

What's all the big deal about sick pine trees?

A controversy erupted last week over whether or not it's OK for a property owner to clear his land to build, how many sick trees are growing in and around Ruidoso and if they're so sick, how long will it take for them to die.


This tree debate has raged on for years, and continued at length through the public hearings on the village's comprehensive plan. A forest service representative spoke out for cutting as many Ponderosa pine trees as possible in the village and replacing them with other species. He recommended every property owner do some clearing, calling trees "fuel," and warning of the danger of wildfires.

We're not tree experts, but neither is anybody else that we've heard from so far. The village planner and the P&Z have no special knowledge about trees, but it didn't stop them from debating the issue. It won't stop us either, because the wellness of these trees is not the point here.

Here's the point: if a property owner wants to build a commercial building on a lot that is zoned commercial, and his site development plan meets the specific requirements, then that owner has a right to do just that. If that means cutting down some trees — be they healthy or infested — so be it. The village certainly can and should require the replacement of trees through a landscaping plan, but such a policy must be across-the-board and not selectively administered.

The issue of sick or healthy trees never should have been raised about the property discussed before the village council last Tuesday, and as it turns out the trees were not a consideration when the council voted.

On the other hand, if we have a serious infestation, then individual property owners should begin to thin those diseased trees and replace them with golden aspens or some other species. We heard that if these trees are on death's door, then the entire Lincoln National Forest may soon be extinct. Bringing the entire forest into the debate is absurd — yes many trees out there are diseased and, yes, many of them will die. Many won't and the forest will continue and the world will keep turning.

### Domenici responds to editorial on new BIA office

#### TO THE EDITOR:

Thank you for the opportunity to respond to your June 10 editorial on my bill to establish an Office of Indian Women and Families in the Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA). ("Is this how our senators cut back on federal spending?") As we both agree, Indian women are the poorest of the poor; and there must be a way, as you say, "to right the wrong."

Like you, I have an immediate adverse reaction to expanding any "overfed federal bureaucracy," and I certainly agree that the BIA is a classic example of such a beast. My bill does not "establish and fund yet another such agency." Rather, it would establish an office within the BIA to identify, monitor and coordinate activities of the BIA and other agencies.

The only new government position required in my bill is a director for this office. To avoid new hires, I encourage the transfer of existing personnel to this office by requiring

the Assistant Secretary of Indian Affairs to "ensure that senior-level staff members and other employees are participants in and responsible for carrying out the purpose of this Act."

So why create this new office? As you have noted in your editorial, "the very people the BIA is supposed to serve have seen a decline in their resources and their standard of living." From our review of this issue and discussions with many Indian women and families have been ignored — whether it be for data collection, directing grants or other program resources to them or ensuring that programs and projects take their needs into account within the context of their traditions and cultures.

In fact, Indian women have basically been ignored, despite the fact that they constitute a centuries-old link to the survival of their culture.

The Office of Women and Families is designed to take these issues into account, establish the BIA's Policy on Women and Families and organize the process that will begin the integration of these factors into all of BIA's programs as well as other government programs that pick around the edges of the issues.

While I would prefer a situation in which the government programs were not the key to so many Indian people's well-being, the reality is that our national government has a trust responsibility agreed to in hundreds of treaties. I believe we owe it to the Indian people to find better ways to manage this huge responsibility to everyone's mutual benefit, but primarily to enhance their own self-determination and self-governance.

Until I see a better way to improve policy and program activity for Indian women and their families, I will continue to persuade my colleagues to support this effort

to do a better job of targeting scarce resources in health, education, housing and business development efforts to help the poorest of the poor on our nation's 300 Indian reservations.

Only then, can we honestly say that we have tried to right a wrong that keeps Indian women at the bottom of our economic ladder.

Only then can we say we have tried to redirect a bloated federal agency with failures that are painfully obvious to those of us who share some part of our lives with our Indian neighbors in New Mexico.

Clearly, we agree that there is a problem with our national policies and programs for Indian women and their families. I just believe that my legislation will address this problem directly rather than continue to hope for the best from a federal agency with a reputation for failure and negligence.

### Persons with disabilities need a little consideration

#### TO THE EDITOR:

During the past few weeks I have had an opportunity to observe people attempting to negotiate the perilous condition of our main street sidewalks. I've also observed a disabled person trapped in the cab of a pick-up truck with his electric wheelchair in the back of the truck, probably unable to utilize his mobility vehicle due to the deplorable condition of the sidewalks.

At the same time, I watched a woman struggle with a wheelchair-bound person in the street trying to walk between a double-parked semi

truck and parked cars. Finally, she gave up, turned around and walked back to her car and left.

I also am a disabled person and have a terrible time trying to walk on the crumbling sidewalks. It has become so frustrating for me that I generally avoid the main street unless I have a specific purpose or shop I need to go to.

The American Disabilities Act was passed some time back and gave most businesses a grace period to complete any renovations. I don't see any of the shops on main street as handicapped accessible, much less able to accommodate a

wheelchair. I would think in a town that has as high a percentage of retired persons, and certainly more disabled than we see, there would be more focus on maintenance and repair and basic accessibility — even for those with two good legs.

In addition, I would like to address the issue of parents instructing their children in common courtesy toward a disabled person. Please tell your children not to run in the aisles of the grocery stores or to play and run with the carts. Disabled persons can fall easily and injure themselves.

I no longer walk with my walker

or crutch, but often feel as if I needed them just to protect myself from rambunctious children. As a disabled person, my equilibrium is very sensitive, and I am not able to stop quickly without losing my balance. For some of our elderly citizens, this is also true.

So please remind your children of their manners before you enter the store and correct them when they get out of line. It could mean the difference between someone's ability to walk or being confined to a wheelchair.

The project area is located in the Patos Mountains near Patos Creek in T6 S, R.13 E., Section 35; and T7 S., R.13 E. Section 1 and 2.





Not too many poets make a living at their craft. Baxter Black does.

As America's best selling cowboy poet, Baxter has taken the art of rhyme one step further, using his lunatic wit and animated delivery to create a whole new field of entertainment. In part one of the Smithville Fiddlers' Jamboree viewers will see the top three contestants in bluegrass

band, junior buck dancing, junior fiddlers, and senior buckdancing. Each year junior fiddlers (to age 51) and senior fiddlers (over 51) compete in separate competitions. Last year, top fiddle playing honors went to a 13-year old Tennessee girl, the first junior fiddler to ever win the coveted title of "Grand Champion" in the Jamboree's twenty-two year history. Part two features the square dancing competition and the fiddle off between the junior and senior fiddlers.

Smithville Fiddlers' Jamboree, Part I, will be broadcast Tuesday, July 27th, 1:00 p.m. and repeats on Wednesday, July 28th at 7:00 p.m. Part II will air the next week in August on KENW-TV.


