Village Council to meet on Tuesday

The Ruidoso Village Council will meet at 6:30 p.m. Tuesday, August 10, in council chambers of Ruidoso Municipal Administrative Center. Trash partners kiss & make up

The mood was friendly Wednesday as Lincoln County officials met with Otero County representatives about plans for their shared regional landfill.

The smiles related directly to cost reductions in the project. Quite a difference from the last session when members of the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority butted heads with Bob Stockwell, Alamogordo city manager and the man who will be running the operation.

Alamogordo is part of Otero County and the landfill is situated south of the city.

At that previous meeting, Lincoln officials were upset over expenditures they thought had not been authorized, about high project cost figures and other issues that have since been resolved with their counterparts on the Otero Solid Waste Authority.

Wednesday, after going over the physical plans and reviewing some cost cuts by Stockwell and city engineer Joe Moore, authority chairman Frank Warth asked Stockwell whether he needed any action from the board.

When Stockwell shook his head no, Warth laughed and jabbed.

You just wanted to make sure we don't raise hell at the next joint meeting.

Stockwell smiled and shook his head, yes.

This time he was delivering good news in the form of cost reductions on the landfill project.

Instead of going through Camp Dresser & McKee (CDM), the project engineering firm, Stockwell arranged to use a consultant on the

archaeological survey of the landfill site for \$16,500. That will save \$1,500 from CDM's \$18,000 estimate.

Stockwell said he also thought the \$60,000 for onsite inspection (resident project representative) projected by CDM was "ridiculous."

"We feel we can hire someone for \$20,000 or else use the geophysical people already out there," he said.

CDM also "grossly overdesigned" a water well, Stockwell said. By reducing the size of the bore hole and pump capacity, the price can be dropped from \$250,000 to \$150,000.

Instead of spending \$20,000 for GDM to write the operating and maintenance manual for the landfill, Stockwell's staff will do the job, costing \$5,000, down from \$20,000.

Joe Lewandowski, general manager of the Lincoln authority, said the two solid waste entities only have one more small phase of work with CDM, amounting to about \$10,000.

The money will cover the company's handling of the bid specifications for construction.

Additional cuts in the overall project were realized through the close scrutiny of Moore. Lewandowski told **The Ruidoso News** later. His cuts from some estimates by CDM and consultant Len Stokes brought the overall landfill cost down from \$2.5-million to \$1.5-million, Lewandowski said.

In his report to the Lincoln authority, Stockwell said the landfill property contains two archaeologically significant sites. One will be fenced to be protected. The other will be excavated and any artifacts will be carted off to sit in

Council chooses lawyer

Ruidoso's new village attorney will likely be a familiar face around village hall.

When the Ruidoso Village Council picks a new attorney on Tuesday, it is expected to be its former contract attorney, John Underwood.

The council recently voted to return to a past practice of working with a contract attorney, eliminating the staff position of village attorney.

When a past council voted to add a staff attorney, the contract with legal adviser John Underwood was terminated. The village hired attorney Dave Thomsen after adding the position, and when Thomsen resigned, the village hired Patricia Ortiz, who held the position when it was eliminated.

Requests for proposal for legal services went out and four lawfirms responded.

A selection committee interviewed representatives from the four firms: Underline, which is Underwood's firm; J. Robert Beauvais, Don Dutton; and Dave Thomsen.

The committee is recommending the council award the contract to Underwood's firm, and Underwood, who also serves this district as state representative may be back on board.

Members of the selection committee, who conducted interviews with all four proposers, were Mayor Jerry Shaw, village manager Ron Wicker, village clerk Tammie Maddox and personnel department staff member Terri Ward.

Police investigate 3 deaths

An unidentified man died Friday in Ruidoso as the result of a gunshot wound, apparently self-inflicted.

According to Ruidoso Police reports, officers and emergency medical personnel were called about 7:10 p.m. Friday to a local motel where they found the victim, a 36-year-old man, with a 32 caliber semi-automatic pistol still in his hand.

Police said the preliminary investigation is consistent to death caused by a single gunshot to the head.

The victim was pronounced dead at 7:38 p.m. by medical investigator Danny Sisson.

Clerk Don Ghandi told **The Ruidoso News** he registered a man into the Super Savers Inn at 2803 Sudderth. The man, according to Ghandi, asked for a single room at about 4 p.m.

Ghandi said the man came back to the office at around 5:30 p.m. for a book of matches. Ghandi said he didn't have any matches.

The hotel had been without clean towels when the man checked in, so Ghandi was placing towels in all of the rooms at around 6 p.m. when he found the man on his bed with a gun in his hand and blood on the sheets.

someone's basement."

He added, "I guess anywhere a Native American ever slowed down is a site that must be protected."

A special area for construction debris was eliminated, because there is not enough demand, Stockwell said. The debris will be dumped into the cell with garbage at the same charge.

"We're convinced an asbestos disposal site would be a money

maker, because there is no other place," Stockwell said. It will be fenced and separated from the regular garbage.

Lewandowski backed his assessment, saying the cost would be minimal compared to the whole project, about \$50,000.

Hydrocarbons, which consist of contaminated soils, also will be accepted. However, instead of burying it, the soils will be spread in a thin layer on top of the ground where the sun can bake it. Sufficiently

cleansed, it then can be mixed with other soil to be used as covering.

Stockwell said he will bring a recommendation for onsite security later.

He should be ready to go out for bids on the landfill by the end of August, Stockwell said. The overall estimate on the project, for the sale of bonds, including the up-front land and testing costs as well as equipment, is \$3,145,000, down from \$4 million. The bonds will be secured by a pledge of the environ-

mental gross receipts taxes of each of the 10 different government entities involved in the regional landfill.

Lincoln authority attorney J. Robert Beauvais warned that any city or county that failed to pass a joint powers agreement currently being circulated, would be bounced from the project.

The agreement has been changed to spell out the exact 50/50 percent partnership of the two authorities.

"I found the guy dead on the bed and I closed the door quickly," said Ghandi, who immediately called his boss and then the police.

On arrival, Ruidoso Police detective W.H. Born found the victim, whose name is being withheld until his next of kin is notified.

According to police, the investi-

gation is continuing.

Ruidoso Police and the Lincoln County Sheriff responded Sunday to the scene of an unattended death in the Cedar Creek area.

Police made a welfare check at the home of an Upper Cedar Creek Canyon resident, and they found the body of a 75-year-old man. His name wasn't released.

A Mescalero man died this weekend, and his death is still under investigation.

Mescalero Police Lt. Ivan Bowekaty said a 22-year-old man died about 4:59 a.m. Sunday near Cow Camp #1 where feasts were being conducted. Lt. Bowekaty said witnesses are being questioned, but the cause of death and the man's

name were not being released at press time.

Reports indicated a gun was involved.

The victim was taken to Lincoln County Medical Center by ambulance, and transferred to Eastern New Mexico Medical Center in Roswell where he was pronounced dead.

Mescalero meets little resistance with request for a \$2.8 million study grant

When the Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe announced last week its plans to go forward with studies leading to the storage of high-level nuclear waste on the reservation, the quiet response from its neighbors was in stark contrast to the uproar caused by the original study.

Senator Pete V. Domenici, a Republican and New Mexico's senior senator, issued a statement of opposition to this new study, but it was lonely, short and to the point.

Fred Peso, project manager for the Mescalero's work toward hosting a Monitored Retrievable Storage (MRS) facility, announced that the tribe has written to the Secretary of Energy, Hazel O'Leary, requesting "credible, formal discussions" on the siting of an MRS on the reservation.

The Mescalero Apache Tribe, funded with grants totaling \$300,000 for Phase 1 and Phase 2-A of the process, is asking for up to \$2.8 million in Phase 2-B of the study process.

When Mescalero was the first community in the nation to respond to an invitation from the U.S. Congress to consider voluntarily hosting an MRS, neighboring communities were fearful that such an operation might harm the environment and the economy.

A hue and cry followed that first announcement, with several groups organizing to stop even the studies. Groups organized and protested; a handful of tribal members declared their dismay; the State Legislature passed memorials in opposition and the state's congressional delegation lined up against the MRS.

Several national environmental groups joined in the efforts to stop the Mescalero tribe's efforts to boost its economy by hosting an MRS.

Those first two grants were earmarked for education, and apparently that public information campaign has raised the awareness of tribal members and their neighbors.

This latest announcement didn't prompt any public outcry.

"We understand our neighbors have an interest in the outcome of this study," said Peso in his announcement. "We want to involve them in the process and give them access to all of the information the tribe has gathered."

Ruidoso's governing body, the only one to form and fund a group to oppose the MRS, has undergone a change in membership, and apparently a change in policy on this issue.

The village has spent several thousand dollars on telephone calls and trips for a group of appointees to lead the opposition.

Ruidoso's new mayor, Jerry Shaw, has questioned why this village is taking on, single-handedly, what appears to be a national issue. She announced during the last council meeting that she'll revamp the village MRS advisory committee, gearing it more toward a regional study group rather than a one-village protest committee.

Since Mayor Shaw's announcement, Ruidoso MRS Advisory Committee Chairman Robert Walters has resigned.

With the village's change in philosophy, a new relationship — more neighborly than adversarial — may be in place if and when the Mescalero tribe embarks on this new study.

The grant funds, if approved, are to be used for extensive environmental studies and for a public participation process that will involve communities neighboring the reservation.

Mescalero Tribal President Wendell Chino has assured tribal members that their health, safety and the environmental integrity of their lands and people will be safeguarded. If and when the Tribal Council reaches an agreement with the federal government to actually place nuclear waste on the reservation, the tribe will have a chance to vote on the issue in a special referendum.

"It remains to be seen whether we can get an agreement with the federal government on our terms," said Peso.

Senator Domenici, at this point, adamantly opposes any agreement.

"I believe New Mexico is already doing more than its fair share in helping our nation solve our nuclear waste storage issue," wrote Domenici in a news release. "I do not think we should even begin to proceed down this new path," he added.

"Finally, no matter what decision the Department of Energy makes, no action can be taken to go beyond a study unless the Congress gives its approval.

"I hope the issue does not advance to that point, but if it does, I will strongly fight Congressional approval of this project," said Domenici.

Senator Jeff Bingaman and Congressman Joe Skeen also have voiced their opposition to placing this high-level nuclear waste, which is generated by nuclear power plants, in New Mexico. This latest grant request didn't prompt any new statements from their offices.

The federal government regulates the nuclear industry, and has agreed to take custody of the growing stockpile of nuclear waste at nuclear energy plants throughout the nation — mainly on the east

coast.

The government imposes a surtax on those plants, and that money is being used to fund the study grants on the MRS. Those nuclear energy-generated funds are expected to continue to pay for studies and the MRS siting process.

Since President Bill Clinton took office in January, nuclear utility operators and nuclear waste disposal protesters have been wondering about the future of the Nuclear Waste Negotiators Office.

Department of Energy Secretary Hazel O'Leary hasn't drafted a new policy yet, and has been acting as Nuclear Waste Negotiator until her appointee is confirmed.

The Denver Post reported that another Indian tribe, the Ute Mountain Ute Indian tribe, wants to study the possibility of constructing a nuclear waste dump on its reservation in southwestern Colorado.

According to the Denver Post, the tribe has applied for a \$200,000 federal grant to look into the feasibility of storing highly radioactive spent nuclear reactor fuel.

Like the Mescalero grant, this agreement with the Ute nation carries no commitment to build the site.

Nine tribes have applied for the \$200,000 grants, and the Mescalero and Skull Valley, Utah tribes have been approved, according to the published report.

Applications also were received from Fort McDermitt Paiute in Nevada; Ponca, Eastern Shawnee and Miami in Oklahoma; Prairie Island in Minnesota, and the Utes and Northern Arapaho. Eleven tribes reportedly dropped out after initial studies.

Mescalero leads the way with this new request to go into Phase 2-B of the study process.

Near-drowned pup gets one more chance at the shelter

The black sky rumbled as torrents of rain spewed from the heavy clouds and streaks of lightning sparked overhead.

Fast moving streams from the foothills washed across the road southeast of Las Vegas, carrying free limbs and rocks with them. The water joined other new rivers and created lakes on the lower terrace of the highway.

The driver, heading back to Ruidoso from a visit to Raton, glanced out her window. Something small caught her eye as her car crept through another sudden wash.

A small black puppy, soaked by the heavy thunderstorm, was fighting his way through the water just off the road shoulder.

"I pulled over, ran outside and called to the pup," the woman said. "He just rolled over in the weeds and waited while I picked him up. No houses were around, there was nothing out there. He was on his own and may have drowned if he had lost his footing."

Wrapped in a towel, the puppy quickly fell asleep in the woman's car.

Now called Chance, in the hope that his second chance at life will be better than the first, the three-to-four-month-old pup is a new resident at the Lincoln County Humane Society animal shelter.

Although the woman cannot keep the pup, he is sponsored for adoption. Kim Mills at Pampered Pets dipped and groomed him, removing literally dozens of ticks from his body. In time, the ticks alone could have killed the pup.

Chance appears to be a border collie mix (possibly some Labrador) with a small white blaze on his face, a patch on his chest and two paws. He gets along well with young adult female dogs, loves to play, but moans and groans like an ancient when he is picked up or in distress.

Chance is well on his way to being housebroken. His rescuer has been using a playpen for him at night and it has been clean in the morning. She recommends taking Chance outside immediately after waking, and praising him when he performs, using the word "outside" repeatedly. His new owner will need to watch him for reinforcement.

Shelter workers want to find a stable home for Chance, with someone willing to give him the love he has been denied.

Sweet Jennie

Another well-behaved animal in need of a new home is Jennie, a light tan/gray Sharpei mix.

Her owners said they had to give her up, because the operator of their mobile home park would not allow them to keep her. She has been spayed and has current tags.

Jennie is housebroken, but enjoys being outside during the day in a secure yard. She also rides well in a car.

With short hair, she will require little grooming. Nine months old, Jennie is good with children of all ages.

"The owners were in tears and

continue to call about her, because they want to be sure she finds a good home," said shelter manager Esther Harper.

Each animal adopted from the shelter receives a free examination from any of the three local veterinary clinics and a free first grooming from Pampered Pets or from long-time society supporter, Hondo Valley Kennels.

Dog snatchers

Several Huskies and Malamutes have been reported lost during the last week, Harper said. Dog owners should be aware that there may be a dog snatcher in the area picking on certain breeds that could be sold in Mexico or other areas of the United States, where they are not as common.

It's also possible that dogs could be sold to laboratories as subjects for experiments. That image should be enough to convince pet owners to keep their animals inside or in a secured area outside.

Great friends

Ironically, the shelter often is home to Husky and Malamute mixes and pure breeds, good dogs in need of new homes.

A previously featured Husky/Chow mix called Chinook is one of the best dogs in the shelter. With a beautiful white coat and mellow disposition, he would be a great companion for a single individual or a family with children.

The shelter is crowded with puppies and adult dogs including collies, a springer spaniel, shepherd mixes, Labradors and one wolf hybrid, Sheba, who has been spayed.

Past pets featured in the newspaper, but still in need of homes include cleancut Adobe, an Akita Inu mix; Sugar, a golden Lab mix with cropped ears; darling Moe, an affable blue heeler/shepherd mix; Gumball, an older soft-coated chocolate Labrador retriever; Bud, a big friendly and energetic gray

shepherd; Zodiac, a blue-eyed shepherd/Husky; Kiko, a tender and timid brown-eyed small Shepherd mix; Petunia, a Labrador mix who's been at the shelter since she was a pup; and Stripe Jr., a brindle Staffordshire terrier mix, who's a sweetheart.

Spay and neuter

The only way to stop the needless destruction of millions of abandoned dogs and cats each year is to convince pet owners to spay and neuter their animals.

With the help of many supporters and animal lovers, the annual Ruidoso News garage sale last month generated more than \$800 toward the society's spay and neuter fund. Several hundred dollars more was raised on the signature page and sponsorship center pages of the special Humane Society edition written and published by The News.

That's a good start to ensure that many animals will find homes. The cost of adopting a sponsored animal is significantly lower. The sponsor pays for the altering procedure, which usually is part of the adoption fee.

Still looking

The shelter still needs a newer refrigerator. Old reliable isn't so reliable anymore and repairs can be costly, taking money that otherwise could be directed toward the care of the animals or toward new equipment that will be needed after the shelter is expanded this fall.

Food donations always are welcome. Several people, visitors to the area who appreciated the society's efforts to care for abandoned animals, recently brought many sacks of regular food and the special food needed for puppies, kittens and nursing mothers.

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Business

New businesses fight "boom & bust"

Business in Ruidoso boomed this spring and summer. Restaurants, shops and recreational businesses popped up everywhere in vacant buildings, but do they have what it takes to survive the off season?

Although the streets have been packed the past few weeks with tourists carrying plenty of spending money, established businesses realize that the flow will begin to ebb as fall turns to winter.

The village of Ruidoso has registered 90 new businesses since the beginning of the year, including restaurants, craft shops, clothing stores and a variety of service businesses. That number compares to 53 registered businesses through August 1992.

All new businesses including home businesses, sales representatives of out-of-town companies, general contractors and temporary booths are required to register with the village. Mary Seelbach, deputy clerk for the village, said this would even include such businesses as an Avon representative or the Schwan's delivery person.

Each business must also have a tax identification number and must be OK'd by the building inspector, the fire chief and the planning and zoning director before receiving its business registration. Restaurants must also be checked by the environmental department and the waste water treatment plant director.

Although 90 businesses have registered, the village cannot keep track of those who go out of busi-

ness when the tourist flow slows down.

To help businesses prepare for the peaks and valleys of a tourist town, the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce and the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County plan to present workshops for business owners and managers this fall.

Chamber executive director Joan Bailey said the workshop topics will be based on results from a survey the chamber sent out to its membership.

EDCLC executive director Karen Kopp has also sent letters to the Carrizozo and Capitan chambers of commerce and to the village of Ruidoso Downs asking for topic ideas.

Concerns that came up repeatedly in the chamber survey included hiring and dismissing employees, making a good employee better and workmen's compensation. Other topics may be Small Business Administration loans, alternative financing, group insurance, advertising and public relations.

"Even if we have many different types of businesses, they basically all have the same challenges," Bailey said.

Kopp said business retention is definitely an area the EDCLC is interested in, and it should play a part in the group's yearly activity goals. The group said at a leadership retreat it wants to serve five area businesses with assistance during the year. It could include employee training or assistance in going into a foreign market among

other things, she said.

A new business retention committee was also formed during the recent retreat but will only serve on a as-needed basis with Kopp planning to take care of most of the problems they may have. She could also call on the Small Business Administration Center in Roswell to offer assistance.

Kopp said if a business has a problem keeping its doors open or wants to plan for the future, the owner needs to call the office to receive the assistance.

MainStreet Ruidoso also understands the importance of retaining businesses. Director Don Miller said MainStreet is developing a business retention program which will include educating businesses on the need to plan for the slow times.

"Those that don't plan won't last," he said.

Another approach to help these businesses survive in a tourist economy is to try to fill in the slow times with more visitors, Miller said.

Bailey agrees, and said the town used to experience a dramatic gap between the summer season and the winter ski season but that is lessening.

"In the past after Ruidoso Downs race track ended, you could roll up the sidewalk even during the day," Bailey said.

Now people are coming to Ruidoso during the fall season just to watch the aspen tree leaves change colors, which extends the summer season, she said.

Winter may keep ski shops, motels and restaurants busy, but downtown businesses could still use a boost during the season to maintain a good year. Bailey said the chamber will continue to make a conscious effort to build on the winter and spring season.

Since tourism is a service industry, one concept that will keep the doors of a business open is to maintain a high standard of service which keeps people coming back. Bailey said she hears fewer complaints all the time about the service here.


"I am so proud of this community and how well they treat people," she said.

Businesses also realize the local people are the "bread and butter" customers. Shops are encouraged to stay open later to cater to the working people of the community.

One event that local people and local businesses enjoy is the annual Christmas Jubilee because it makes people aware of what the business community has to offer. Bailey said she personally makes an effort to look for products here first and has little problem finding what she needs at a good price.

"We hear from the tourists all the time that we have great shopping here. Most anything you could want is here in Lincoln County," she said.

Another change that has come about gradually that should help keep more businesses alive is that they try not to duplicate themselves as they have in the past.

Pine needles seem like lawn clutter to many people, but for Kara Matheson of La Naturelle Pine Needle Baskets, the needles are art.

Matheson's store in the Four Seasons Mall, features pine needle creations of all shapes and sizes and kinds.

"Primarily, I make pine needle baskets," said Matheson. "It's a very old craft that I am giving a new facelift to."

Matheson, an artist of pine needles since 1980, decided a year ago that Ruidoso would be the perfect place for her art since their is

always a good selection of the needles.

"As far as I know, I am the only one in the area that makes pine needle baskets," she said.

She opened her store in a local art show last year and then moved to her present location in the Four Seasons Mall in May.

Since she began her work, Matheson has kept herself busy trying to keep enough of her handmade creations in her store.

"I seem to sell them as fast as I can make them," said Matheson.

To make a six-inch circle out of the needles, it takes Matheson about an hour. She then has to mold the needles into the shape

that she needs.

Eventually, after the basket is shaped and sewn, Matheson coats it several times to make the basket about as hard as a little wooden box.

"All of the baskets are very durable," said Matheson.

The baskets range in size from thimbles to large baskets. And according to Matheson, they are all one of a kind creations.

"Each basket is a little bit different and are one of a kind," said Matheson. "Every one is also a signature basket for collectors."

Matheson also makes custom

designed baskets. In fact, all of the different designs are given names.

The naming helps Matheson catalogue her inventory and it is a good way to remember who suggested that particular design.

"It helps me keep track of my inventory and it is nice to recognize the people who helped me," said Matheson.

La Naturelle Pine Needle Baskets is located in the lower level of the Four Seasons Mall in Midtown, and is open from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. every day but Tuesday, when Matheson goes out and hunts for her pine needles.

EDC exec heads to OU for classes

The education and travel never ends for the executive director of the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County, Karen Kopp.

Kopp, in an effort to learn more about her chosen field of economic development, will spend the week in Norman, Oklahoma, at the Economic Development Institute.

The institute, located at the University of Oklahoma, is open to economic developers throughout the nation.

"People take the course as professionals so they can be certified as economic developers," said Kopp.

The course runs during the second week in August every year and takes three years to complete. That is not including a year of classes that must be taken before the three-year class begins.

Kopp has chosen to write her thesis on some aspect of hotels and convention centers and relate it to the current situation in Ruidoso.

"That is a very hot topic around here right now," said Kopp.

After going through the classes for the three years, Kopp will become certified as an economic developer.

"It is important to be certified in your chosen field," said Kopp. "It is like being a certified public accountant."

Other than this class, Kopp has attended several other conferences and workshops that she says will make her more effective for the EDCLC.

Kopp says she also spends time away from her office attending trade shows and visiting prospects.

During that time away, Kopp says that she can be found by her board of directors or Ronnie Paulger in case of a current prospect needing attention.

"Joanna (the EDCLC's secretary) comes in and checks the messages on the machine," said Kopp. "They can find me at class or at the hotel."

Mesa continues to grow and succeed.

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

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County worker protests her firing

The former director of the San Patricio senior citizens center is protesting her firing.

Yolanda Baca, who was fired last week, asked Lincoln County commissioners Tuesday to schedule a grievance board hearing. Baca said she was leaving after two and a half years "with a sad face."

She attributed her termination to "back-stabbing" and jealousy.

Baca said she was aware that everything was happening behind her back, but still was surprised when handed the termination letter last Monday.

"There's a lot of jealousy and bickering," she said. "I did my job."

She contended, in fact, that she performed many extra jobs, helping the elderly apply for additional

government programs and benefits. "Nobody put money into the center, but me," she said. "The budget never was there. You have the money, but we didn't get it," she told the commission.

"I was paying for basics like towels. You don't realize how much the people of Hondo Valley need help.

"Every possible program was brought into the center for the seniors and I wasn't paid for it. I did it out of my heart.

"I want a closed meeting with all of you. I want everybody to know what's happening, not just accuse the site manager of not doing her job. I want everyone to hear my side," said Baca, who has been the Zia Senior Citizens site director in San Patricio for the past two and a half years.

During her time at the center, she never took a vacation, Baca said.

"I gave 100 percent and was totally dependable," she said.

The center never received the county attention that it deserved, Baca said.

"No one came (from the county government)," she said. "I invited the director, the other site managers for fiestas. No one came.

"I'm upset with some of you and you know who."

County manager Andy Wynham asked Baca to return the center's account books. The records need to be under the control of Zia director Cheryl La Belle, he said.

County officials declined to comment on the firing, noting that personnel matters are confidential.

August full moon


On the first came a light shower onto the hot land. The ground was grateful for the moisture, but seemed to say, "Thanks, but we would be grateful more. Yet we will be patient."

McGuire then struck a brilliant pitch shot to within 18 inches for his par and the match was left to Tankersley. A one-putt would give his third match play win and two-putt meant extra holes.

He missed. The first playoff hole was Cree Meadows short and narrow par four Number one. McGuire blocked his iron shot to right where it found the out of bounds. Tankersley again hit a perfect iron shot to 75 yards of the green.

McGuire then changes clubs to a wood and knocked it on the green, four feet from the hole. Tankersley's approach gave him an uphill eight-footer for the win.

He missed. McGuire then calmly rolled in his par (with an out of bounds) and it was on the next hole. Both players recorded pars on No. 2 and both players hit the green in two on the par-5 third hole at Cree Meadows. Tankersley was the to first putt and his approach putt left him with a tricky five-footer.

McGuire had a 15 footer for eagle that was very difficult to get close. The cup was very near a ridge that would have sent a bold putt down to another level and a poor lag would leave him with an equally difficult putt.

He didn't have to worry, his putt was the perfect speed and stopped within inches of the cup and Tankersley conceded it.

Now, once again, the match was left to Tankersley and his putter. Facing a very difficult 5-footer that he had to make to stay in the match, again his putter did not respond and he missed. The match was over and McGuire's perseverance was rewarded.

Both McGuire and Tankersley had a tough road to the final match. McGuire defeated 1992 champion

Tom Baker and Tankersley had to get by Leroy Gooch, who has also won this tournament twice and has been the runner-up the last two years.

In the quarter finals, it took McGuire 19 holes to shake Carlsbad's "Moon" Mullins and Tankersley beat Don Wilson on the last hole, 1-up.

Opinions: what the Press is all about

Newspapers are so important to the workings of a democracy, that they are protected in the First Amendment of the Constitution, which reads:

"Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof, or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press; or the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the government for a redress of grievances."

The Press was given special attention in that amendment, and thus over the years the legitimate, professional press has been diligent in encouraging high standards. Newspapers must meet certain criteria and keep complete and accurate records to maintain their second class postage status, and that's why few fly-by-night newsletters and political action pieces ever can become real newspapers, circulated as second class material.

A hallmark of a newspaper is its Opinion Page or Editorial Page. Journalists scrutinize governmental bodies and society, reporting their findings on page 1 and throughout the news hole of the paper, and thus have a duty and an obligation to form educated opinions — passing them on to readers through editorials and columns on pages clearly set apart as "opinion" as opposed to news.

Such diligence and commitment takes a certain amount of courage, but for a newspaper to turn its back on that responsibility would be cowardice.





COURSE REPEATING

If you are repeating a course, be sure to fill out repeat forms at the time of registration.

ATTENDANCE

Attendance is required at all sessions for each course for which the student is enrolled. When circumstances make attendance impossible, such absences should be reported to the instructor. Possibilities for makeup work should be discussed with the instructor on an individual basis. No extensions of vacation periods are given to a student. Non-attendance of classes due to late registration is considered the same as absences incurred after registration.

A \$10.00 contract fee plus 30% of the total amount of tuition and books is due at the time of registration. WAITING LIST

During registration, the College Office maintains a waiting list for classes which have already filled. If a course is closed by the time you register, please put your name in the Waiting List here at the office. Be sure to list a phone number where you can be easily reached. Every effort will be made to try to get you into a class or classes.

FINAL EXAMINATIONS

Dates for final examinations for the Fall semester will be December 11 (Saturday classes); otherwise Monday December 13 to Thursday December 17. No final examinations will be given early; therefore, please mark your calendar now and plan to be present during Final's Week.

ENROLLMENT IN MATH, ENGLISH OR READING

Students planning to enroll in any classes for the first time, particularly the above subjects, should take the college's ASSET diagnostic tool prior to registration to avoid registering for the wrong class. Developmental classes (MATH 100 and MATH 101; ENG 100 and ENG 101; and, RED 100) are available if needed to allow students to brush up or acquire basic skills. The ASSET test is given cost free each week during office hours in the Ruidoso Center Office, 1400 Sudderth Drive. Please call the Student Affairs Office to make testing arrangements.
