

The Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County (EDCLC) cancelled its regular Thursday meeting for lack of a quorum. County jail inmates stage food strike

According to county manager Andy Wyniam, who supervises the jail operation, the incident only lasted a few hours. When the loudest complainer was separated from the main group, the other inmates soon returned to their regular meals, he said. Inmates did not return a call from The Ruidoso News requesting more information about the basis of the protest.

Capitan hires new village police chief

Capitan's new police chief will be on the job September 9. Mayor Frank Warth has hired Tony Cano, now chief of the campus police at Western New Mexico University, for an annual salary of \$21,000. Cano's 27 years of experience includes serving with the Deming Police Department as a patrolman from January 1978 until July 1984, according to the department's personnel spokesman. Cano left Deming to join the university police force.

Airline may fly in here

An Albuquerque based air firm pitched the Ruidoso Village Council last Friday for service to the Ruidoso area. The council was cautious, but agreed to discuss it further.

Mayor Jerry Shaw called the special council meeting after being contacted by Peacock Air Flying Service. The council also approved a contract for audit of additional lodging vendors.

Peacock Air is proposing scheduled airline service into Sierra Blanca Regional to serve the city of Ruidoso and the surrounding communities.

Bill Brown, director of marketing for Peacock, said Ruidoso Downs Race Track and Ski Apache were two major attractions already contacted.

"Because of their willingness to work with us, we are certain we can provide air transportation service to your area," Brown said.

According to Brown, scheduled airline service will generate additional revenues for the city utilizing shipments of freight.

"Our airline anticipates hiring local personnel to handle our interest at the airport, i.e. ramp personnel, ticket counter agents and station manager," he said.

Brown said the people in the surrounding communities will be able to get non-stop service to Albuquerque from their local airport and will not have to travel to Roswell for airline service.

"Our intent is to provide one-stop service to Dallas-Fort Worth by the first quarter of 1994," he said.

The council was concerned that El Paso should also be a main consideration. Brown said he saw no problem and offered several alternatives in route service that included El Paso. He also suggested several types of planes that could be used.

"Our company chose the Fairchild Metroline III for the start up of operations in Ruidoso," Brown said. This aircraft will accommodate 18 passengers in a single seat arrangement.

He said the aircraft has a large cargo area and can easily accommodate pallet sized loads, ski equipment and excess baggage.


Brown said Peacock Air is in the process of arranging for charter flights in jet aircraft from Albuquerque to Laughlin, Las Vegas and Reno, Nevada; Branson, Missouri; and P lox, Mississippi.

"I am sure we can arrange some additional charter trips to bring in vacationers for the winter season," he said.

Brown said he was working with Artesia on a similar proposal. When he mentioned the possibility of passengers to Ruidoso, (he gave 10 as an example), Councilor Frank Potter said a study would have to be made first that would entail talking to the business community and surveying all the options to prevent subsidy if necessary.

The council was in agreement with Potter's assessment and Brown said he would come back at their request with firmer details.

Potter goes to court

Ruidoso Councilor Frank Potter entered a plea of "Not Guilty" Monday to a larceny charge, with the trial to be set at a later date in the court of Municipal Judge Charles Hawthorne.

Potter was charged with removing and stealing Showase Protection signs from the state right-of-way.

Ruth Sikes of Pampa, Texas, said she had permission to place state property the signs, which advertised a private event at the Civic Events Center.

Potter said the signs were illegal and represented a threat to the health and welfare of the community.

Mayor Jerry Shaw had asked planning and zoning director Cleatus Richards to remove the signs early on Friday the 13th, but Richards said the signs were not within his jurisdiction.

When Richards would not remove the signs, Councilor Frank Potter decided later that afternoon that he would take care of them later.

Potter said if an accident occurred because of the signs, the village and state might be held liable.

Warriors get close in opener

In an outstanding opener against the defending state champions, the Ruidoso Warriors were outscored 34-19 by Artesia Friday night, in the Bulldog Bowl.

That score, however, was not a true indicator of how the game went.

The Bulldogs took the opening kickoff and with the aid of their all-ways dangerous starburst return, senior David Patterson went 75 yards to paydirt - almost.

A clipping penalty brought the ball back to Artesia territory where their run-and-shoot offense got one first down before giving the ball to the Warriors on a punt that was downed in the end zone.

In their first possession, the Warriors marched 80 yards to paydirt in a brilliant mix of running and passing. With head coach Mike Gaston and offensive coordinator Rodney Webb calling the plays, junior quarterback John Echols had the Warrior offensive group gulping yardage from Artesia's inexperienced defensive unit.

In a 16-play drive, the Warriors chewed up six minutes on the clock before sophomore fullback Rex Comanche scored from the two yard line. During that drive the Warriors lost yardage only once, and had gains of 13, 10 and eight yards. The key to the drive, however, was two pass completions from Echols to sophomore tight end Byron Soules. That passing combination got the Warriors 27 yards, with the last catch putting the Warriors on the two yard line. Comanche scored on the next play.

The try for point was blocked.

After the Warriors kicked off, it took coach Cooper Henderson's potent offense just eight plays to tie the score again at six after a one-yard quarterback sneak. The try for point was missed.

The Warriors got the ball back with 1:38 left in the opening quarter and they picked up where they left off. Most of the yardage came in one spectacular run from senior wingback Ricky Devara. The run netted 30 yards and a face mask penalty added an additional 15, putting the Warriors into Bulldog territory at the 37.

Three plays later, Devara went in on another great run from the 19 yard line. The Warriors led again, as Jimmy Varnadore nailed the extra point, 13-6.

Artesia got the football back as the second quarter opened and went 80 yards in 12 plays to score from five yards out. The drive was sustained by two consecutive encroachment penalties on the Warrior defensive line. After the two-point conversion, the state champs led 14-13.

Echols and crew got the ball back with 7:48 left in the first half and marched down the field to the Bulldog five yard line. At that point the machine started sputtering a bit. On third-and-goal from the five, Echols was sacked for a five-yard loss. The next play, the offensive line was caught holding, which backed the Warriors up to the 20 yard line.

A third down pass from Echols to Jimmy Varnadore fell incomplete. The Warriors had failed to score from the five yard line, a

series that would haunt the team for the rest of the game.

When play continued in the third quarter, the Bulldog defense was very impressive as the Warriors lost two yards in three plays in a drive for extra point.

The Bulldogs got the ball on the 50 after a short return, and scored in six plays, with David Patterson doing most of the work.

The PAT gave Artesia a 21-13 lead.

The kickoff gave the Warriors good field position at their own 39 and Echols turned to the fullback to carry the load. At 5:10 and 1:60 Rex Comanche reeled off runs of 3, 8, 5 and 13 yards before Echols quarterback sneaked across from the one.

Forced to go for the two-point conversion to tie, Echols attempted a pass to halfback Raul Davis, which fell inches short of his mark. The Warriors trailed by two extra points, 21-19.

The Bulldogs got the ball back at 2:35 left in the third quarter and lightning struck quickly. After a first down that put the ball on the Warrior 41, David Patterson was the recipient of 59-yard bomb and he raced into the end zone untouched.

The Warriors went "three and out" in their next possession.

The Bulldogs drove from their own 26 to the Warrior 36 before fumbling at the 17 after another long gain. With 7:50 to go in the game, the Warrior defense had given the offense a last chance to tie it up.

From deep in their own territory, the Warrior offensive unit would now be asked to go 83 yards

to paydirt.

With some time left in the game, Comanche and guard reeled off runs of 10 and 13 yards before Echols quarterback sneaked across from the one.

The punt gave the Bulldogs the football back with an eight yard lead, at the their own 42. Artesia got to the 50 before the Warriors defense forced a punt.

Unfortunately, the punt was the game breaker. Reaching the end zone was called after a performance that Rod Stieger or Charles Henderson would have been proud of. The Bulldogs got the ball back and scored five plays later, providing the final margin of 34-19, with 53 seconds left in the game.

The Warriors didn't win the game, but they won a lot of battles. The crafty Henderson had to use almost all of his tricks to win, but better yet to escape.

The Warriors didn't stop Artesia. But geez, how many high school football teams run the run-and-shoot? The Dallas Cowboys can't stop it either with players that make a million dollars a week.

You have to give Henderson credit, he has two very talented football players on offense (a quarterback and a receiver) and they touch the football almost every play. Our sophomores couldn't stop two All-State seniors. That's no crime as long as they learned something.

What did the Warriors accomplish except another loss? They showed themselves that they can play with anyone.

Before the game Coach Gaston would now be asked to go 83 yards. Please see Warriors, page 2A

has held that "A municipality ... has full and complete charge of its streets (and they have such charge in New Mexico except over state highways) ..."

But state statutes also say that permission can't be granted for the type of private signs or the attaching of those signs on state traffic poles.

Sikes said that state traffic engineer Tim Basler gave her permission to place the signs.

State traffic engineer Tim Basler admitted he gave Sikes permission after she told him she had taped

him giving her permission. He said he never heard the tape, but that a statute allowed him to grant permission to put signs on the right of way under certain circumstances.

The statute Basler read to *The Ruidoso News* indicated community agreement. Richards and Basler had no communication about the signs prior to Basler giving Sikes permission.

Carroll Young, deputy secretary for highways for the state, said that the signs were illegal and no permission could be granted.

Potter said Sikes had charged him with intentionally removing

signs that were legally placed on the highway. He asked if the signs were legal, why didn't village planner Richards collect permit fees according to ordinances.

Potter said that he was convinced the complete story on how the signs were allowed has not yet been told.

Sikes, in signing a contract with the Civic Events Center, agreed to abide by both state and local laws.

When *The News* asked Richards why he had not collected a fee from Sikes, he chose to refer that question and any further questions on the matter to village attorney John Underwood.

In other action, the council approved an extension of a contract with Ronnie Hemphill for audit of lodging vendors to include seven more vendors.

Councilor Joe Gomez drew the seven lots from a container. The names are to remain confidential.

According to Tammie Maddox,

village clerk, Hemphill found errors in one of the two vendors audited last fiscal year and as a result the village collected \$842 in lodgers tax, penalty and interest from one vendor.

The lodgers tax budget has been approved for \$5,000 for audit services for the 1993-94 fiscal year. Last year the council selected two

vendors for auditing and paid Hemphill \$1,014.72 including gross receipts tax.

Maddox requested the council to increase the vendors to be audited to seven. She said this could be accomplished under the \$5,000 already allocated.

The council voted unanimously to extend the contract.

Walkers take to the hills in and around Lincoln County

Vitality of body and spirit characterized the men and women clustered around the picnic table at Cedar Creek Thursday.

They shared another trait. They all were wearing comfortable walking shoes.

Members of the Ruidoso Mountainmarchers gather annually at sites in the Lincoln National Forest to share good food and stories about past walks, and to plan for future events.

The local chapter boasts as one of its members, Inez Killebrew, the oldest registered volkmarcher in New Mexico.

"I joined the group when it was first organized," Killebrew said before dishing up a plateful of food.

"I've lived here permanently since 1970, and until recently owned the Teepee Cabins and Mobile Home Park."

The only area of the state she hasn't walked is Albuquerque, Killebrew said.

But I've been told by members of the chapter there that no one walking is older," she said.

The dates of September 25-26 have been set aside for the next scheduled walk sponsored by the Mountainmarchers and sanctioned by the American Volkssport Association, a member of the International Federation of Popular Sports.

The local group is supported by the Eastern New Mexico University Instructional Center at Ruidoso and the Ruidoso Woman's Club.

The fall volkmarch will start near Bonito Lake and will cover about 12 kilometers in the Sacramento Mountain high country. The course is considered of moderate difficulty.

Only a qualified 10 KM course is being offered. Those who want additional IVV Distance Credit may walk it twice without an additional charge, but they should register with time to receive a start card.

The walk will begin at the City of Alamogordo campground above the lake.

The Bonito Volksmarch this year is a special event of St. Judes Children's Research Hospital. Lap cards and sign up sheets will be available at the start/finish point for participants who wish to contribute to that work.

The march may be started any time between 8 a.m. and 1 p.m., but must be finished by 5 p.m. on either or both days.

Signs identifying the location of the starting point will be posted on State Highway 37, at the Bonito Lake turnoff and at the forest service road turn to the Alamogordo and Southfork campgrounds.

The preregistration fee for an A-Award is \$5 and will be accepted through September 18. After that date, the fee will be \$6. Only the first 100 to register will receive their award on the day of the event. The rest will receive it by mail within eight to 10 weeks.

The A-Award this year will be a cloisonne pin, the second in the Ruidoso club's wildflower series.

"B" awards are medals from prior volkmarches and will be for sale, if the course has been walked.

Those not walking for credit may register at any time for free and participants who want only IVV credit will be charged just \$1.50. All participants must register and receive a start card. The cards will be available at the start point the days of the walk for those who have pre-registered.

Rain or shine, the march will go forward. No refunds will be given to registrants who do not show up. Members warn that walkers should bring water repellent gear to protect against the ample summer rains.

The event is open to everyone, but children ages 12 and under must be accompanied by an adult. Dogs should be kept on leashes. The course is not suited for strollers or wheelchairs.



Overbreeding is death for dogs

They should know better.

But hunters continue to breed more and more hounds and then dump their overflow into cages at the Lincoln County Humane Society animal shelter.

Eight were brought in from the Capitan area several weeks ago, three were Walker hounds and five were Plott hounds.

Knowing the chances of adopting out that many hounds are extremely slim when the shelter already is filled with other dogs, manager Esther Harper had to pick the best candidates and destroy the other healthy owner castoffs.

The remaining hounds are females and about six to seven months in age. They must be spayed when adopted in compliance with state law governing shelters, no matter where the adopting owner lives.

"Hounds need plenty of exercise and do better in less populated areas, because they like to howl," Harper said. "They're gregarious, friendly and warm with people, but fierce when chasing wild game. According to our hooks on dog breeds, they can be trained to be loyal guardians of children."

Plott hounds originated in Germany. The shelter residents are handsome-looking with rich brown coats and brindle markings.

"They're big eaters, but should only be given moderate servings so they don't put on weight," Esther said.

While shelter workers try hard to find new homes for the purebred hounds they have confined in cages, some irresponsible persons continue to breed them and let them run loose. Several hounds, adults and puppies, were picked up late last week in the Upper Canyon and a litter of 11 barely weaned hounds

came in Friday.

Another strikingly good looking animal at the shelter is the Australian cattle dog, Kiwi, who would make a great companion pet.

With a sweet gray face and gentle eyes, she has a heavily flecked coat that appears to be gray from a distance. But up close, the patterns range from hyena spotting Australian shepherd flecked.

She was picked up wandering in Upper Canyon.

"She's petite and gentle, with a really pleasing personality," said shelter secretary Kathy Tretreault. "She's a perfect family dog."

According to the shelter book on breeds, cattle dogs (the basis for the "heeler" type dog) are quick learners, active, alert. They are friendly with their human families, but may be wary and reserved toward strangers, human and canine.

A note of caution for pickup

truck drivers who enjoy taking their dogs along on a ride. Ruidoso ordinances call for the dogs to be restrained. The easiest and safest solution for a canine pal is to let them ride in the cab of the truck, instead of being perched precariously on the edge of the bed, where a sudden stop could send them flying through the air to injury or death.

For feline lovers, the cattery next to the main shelter is temporary home to many varieties of cats from kittens to adults. They are lovingly tended by several dedi-

cated volunteers, who have created a comfortable atmosphere for viewing and interacting with the animals.



Equine surgeon settles in here for the winter

People have warned Becky Washburn to leave New Mexico if she aims to be a successful veterinary equine surgeon.

But Washburn likes it here and wants to stay close to her roots on the family's Corona Ranch.

The 26-year-old jockey and recent graduate from Colorado State University in Fort Collins will be turning the Green Tree Animal Clinic into a year-around operation.

"I'm going to lease it this winter," Washburn told The Ruidoso News. "As soon as I had my license the first of July, I began sharing part of the clinic with Dr. John Harlackner. He's going to Sun-

land (race track) this winter and I will keep the clinic open."

Washburn's name may sound familiar. She's been riding race horses since she was 16, and participated in the high school national rodeo finals in 1984, in barrels and poles. During her college years, she competed in barrels, goat tying and break away roping at the college national finals.

"I've been riding horses since I was nine months old on my family's ranch in Corona," Washburn said. She made the transition to jockey when "the guy training my dad's horses asked if I'd like to learn how to ride them and I said sure."

She rode primarily in New Mexico where she attended undergraduate school, and a little in Colorado, while she finished up her

education there.

"I decided when I was in first grade that I wanted to be a veterinarian," Washburn said. "I've always loved animals and stuck with the decision."

Although Green Tree, which is situated on the edge of the racing complex, is equipped with a large X-ray and ultra sound machines, Washburn said she will be treating small and large animals.

Eventually, she would like to specialize in equine surgery.

"But I realize around here, not many people can afford to do surgery on their horses, whereas in Florida, California and Kentucky, they spend and invest a lot more on their animals," she said.

In her free time, Washburn enjoys a unique relationship with

Poky, her pet porcupine.

"I found him one weekday when I was at home at the ranch," she said. "He was sitting behind the barn crying and crying all day. I don't know where the mother went. I caught him and now he's my pet. He's very gentle. I never dreamed that I'd keep him. I thought I'd raise him and then turn him loose."

"But he's so gentle and friendly, I'd be afraid someone would kill him. You can't even see the quills unless he's startled. People think porcupines shoot their quills, but they don't."

The clinic's business hours this winter will be 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., but Washburn will be on call 24 hours. The clinic's number is 378-4907 and Washburn's mobile phone number is 430-8614.





Cisco Bob wins Ruidoso's annual fun run

Cisco Bob, star runner when he was at Ruidoso High School, won the men's division of the Village of Ruidoso Fun Run Saturday.

Bob, an RHS grad, finished the 10K run in 33:19 to win the race and a pair of New Balance shoes donated by Mac McDougal of Ski West. He also won the 20-29 age division.

The women's title was shared by two runners, Janelle Johnson and Becky Foster who ran over the line in a 44:40 "photo finish." That time won the 20-29 title for Foster and the 30-39 title for Johnson.

A full field of runners turned out early Saturday morning to run and walk the mountain course which started and ended at Ruidoso Village Hall. The event included a one-mile fun run, a 5K walk, a 5K run and a 10K run, with eight age categories in each division.

10K runners

Benjamin Smith, 9, the only entrant in the youngest category for the 10K run, finished the course in 61:03. In the 11-13 age group, the one runner was Collin May, who was clocked in at 50:41.

No runners took to the course in the 14 to 19 category, and Bob, who is 25, won the 20 to 29 bracket. Greg Fouratt, 28, took second in that category with a time of 42:52, followed by Owen Little, 25, at 48:54.

In the women's division, 20-29, the champion and overall women's co-winner Becky Foster, 27, was the only runner.

In the 30 to 39 for men, Leo La Paz Jr., 35, ran the course in 46:36, with Chuck Kiser, 36, at 67:08.

Johnson, 32, won the 30 to 39 women's division, as well as shar-

ing the overall women's title. Also in the 30-39 age group, Glenda Bob, 30, was timed at 50:33, followed by Donna Potter, 35, who came in at 58:30.

In the 40-49 age category for men, Frank Cannella, 44, was the winner with 49:47, followed by Frank Potter, 48, at 56:01, and Ruben Reyes, 40, with a 56:15.

Irma Wilson had the 40-49 category for women all to herself. Wilson, 45, ran the 10K in 65:25.

Bob Wilkins, 52, was tops in the 50-59 division, stopping the clock at 46:01; followed by Doug Armstrong, 55, with 61:21.

Doris Calloway, 56, the lone entry form women in her category, ran the course in 67:37.

Ruben Ramirez, 63, took the 60-69 title with a 61:00 followed by Jim Lilly, 64, with a time of 62:10.

5K runners

The 5K run drew 20 runners, including Rex Pinal Jr., 18, who ran the course in just 18:30. He was the only runner in the 14-19 category, and was the fastest finisher in the entire 5K field.

The youngest runner in the 5K was Rowen Chee, 8, who was made the run in 34:24.

Set Record Breaks 43-year-old mark in Ruidoso Thoroughbred

The overpowering juvenile Set Records lived up to his name by shattering a 43-year-old stakes record with an authoritative nine-length triumph in the \$85,960 Ruidoso Thoroughbred Futurity, Saturday.

The Kentucky-bred colt by Sauce Boat out of the Star de Naskra mare Super Set, ran the six furlongs in 1:10.4, the fastest clocking in the prestigious stake since its inception in 1950.

The win marked the second stakes victory of the summer for the regally-bred colt who previously captured the \$77,000 Norgor Futurity in June.

Set Records broke sharply from the #2 post position as the 2-5 favorite in the 12-horse field and was just off the early lead in the early stages of the sprint.

Midway down the backstretch,

the colt moved up confidently under jockey Glen Murphy to grab a one-length lead then, widened that margin to five at the top of the lane.

In the stretch, Set Records drew away from the rest of the pack and was hand-ridden to the wire.

"He was well in hand early on, then he relaxed really nice until it was time for me to let him run," said Murphy.

"When we turned for home I was going to let him go if they came up on him, but it wasn't a contest so I never uncocked my stick."


Trainer Doyal Roberts said that what separates Set Records from the rest of the 2-year-olds at Ruidoso this year is he doesn't make any mistakes.

"He's just a good horse who does everything easy and doesn't have any problems."

Set Records is owned by Margaret Bloss and Margaret DuPont of El Paso. The colt is undefeated in five starts at Ruidoso with earnings of \$84,680. His only career setback came in the Grade II Hollywood Juvenile Championship in Los Angeles when he ran seventh against the top 2-year-olds in the nation.

31-1 longshot Pets Will Win out-finished Supartica to secure the place position by a 3/4-length. Manuel Ortiz Jr. was aboard the Oklahoma-bred son of Will Win. The Danny Mirabal-trainee earned \$18,911 for owner George Kleier of Fort Smith, Arkansas.

Sam Ewan's Supartica earned \$10,315 for his efforts. The New Mexico-bred son of Superbity was ridden by Carlos Rivas and trained by Don Farris for Ewan of Irving, Texas.



Easily A Rogue secured a spot in the Grade I \$51,518 All American Gold Cup final by becoming the second fastest qualifier in the trials at Ruidoso Downs Thursday. The four-year-old mare sprinted the 440-yards in 21.79 seconds and won by a neck over Andreas Shadeov. Roy

Baldillez rode the California-bred by Calyx for trainer Russell Harris who is co-owner with David Clymer of El Dorado, Kansas. The All American Gold Cup, which features the top older quarter horses in the nation, will be run at Ruidoso Downs on September 4.

Those Were The Days is fastest in All American Gold Cup trials

The tough gelding Those Were The Days overcame a rough start to win a trial division for the Grade I All American Gold Cup and post the fastest qualifying time of :21.79 for the prestigious race, Thursday.

The ten fastest qualifiers from the three trials qualified to the \$51,518 race which will be run Saturday, September 4.

The Gold Cup annually features the nation's finest older quarter horses running the classic distance of 440 yards.

Those Were The Days broke a step slowly from the gates as a 14-1 longshot in the second trial and was bumped from both sides by Celadon and Vital Class before regaining his stride.

Under constant urging by jockey Larry Layton, Those Were The Days rallied from fourth to first and just held off Vital Class by a neck at the wire. The 4-year-old Oklahoma-bred gelding by Six Portunes won a division of the World's Championship Quarter Horse Clas-

sic in his last start, but failed to gain the respect of the local handicappers in this race.

The Robert Turner-trainee has much stakes experience after finishing third in both the Remington Park and Blue Ribbon Derbies last year. Vital Class, winner of the Grade I Rainbow Silver Cup, qualified to the final with a clocking of :21.81.

The Russell Harris-charge Easily A Rogue beat Andreas Shadow by a neck to win the third trial and post the second fastest qualifying time of :21.80. The 4-year-old California-bred mare by Calyx broke on top and never surrendered the lead at any point in the race to win handily under jockey Roy Baldillez.

The filly ran fourth behind Refrigerator in the Grade I World's Championship Quarter Horse Classic in her last outing and rarely gives a dull effort versus top competition.


Prior to coming to Ruidoso, Easi-

The 4-year-old Oklahoma-bred daughter of Dash For Cash broke fourth from the gate, but rallied strongly along the rail under jockey Raul Ramirez to narrowly defeat her adversary.

The time was :21.91, the seventh fastest. Dash Master Miss also qualified with a :21.92 clocking.





My most sincere thanks go to Mayor Jerry Shaw, village councilors Barbara Duff, Frank Potter, J.D. James and Bill Karn, former village councilor Jess Stinson, Police Chief Swenor and former Chief Bill Newman for their support and nurturing of "Santa Cops."

Also, my most sincere thanks to every youngster, service club, individual and "secret santas" in the past who have joined hands and united to make whatever effort pos-

sible to make Christmas a more joyous occasion for the elderly, lonely and less fortunate people in Ruidoso and Lincoln County.

Those of you who never participated will just never know the heart-warming and far-reaching experience you have missed.

It is my most sincere prayer that the legend of "Santa Cops" lives on forever, in some fashion.

Richard A. Viguere wrote in the Senior American "that to date top appointees look like Americans only in two areas: gender and race. That's important, but a person's values and a person's world view are more important. So far, all your appointees have the same rather narrow view."

I learned in the second grade, in a country school, that Congress appropriated the money, so am sick of those who blame presidents Reagan and Bush for our high national debt.

Many times there was one important thing in a bill, but so much pork barrel and ridiculous expenditures were attached, the President had to veto it, and then he was severely criticized for not signing the bill by the mass media, but they never mentioned the ridiculous expenditures attached.

Senator Pete Domenici and Congressman Joe Skeen and Steve Schiff are not abstractionists, but have intelligent sound ideas which should be considered.



Area construction recovery falters in July

Village building topped the \$1 million mark again in July, when the Village of Ruidoso issued 51 permits for construction valued at \$1,392,442.

After a four-month mini-boom, construction levels falters in what used to be the biggest building month in the year.

The July total brings the year-to-date to 329 permits totaling \$9,497,355 for the first seven months of 1993.

Commercial building has been a bit slower to rebound from the construction industry slump this village has suffered, but in July one new commercial building permit was issued.

Don Elwell, doing business as Elwell Construction, was issued a permit to build a new commercial office building at 101 Fifth Street. The permitted value on that building is \$223,661.70.

The Elwell building, which is slated to be leased for a state human services office, brings the total new commercial building permits for the year to seven

with a valuation of \$620,020.

In June, the village issued one permit for a commercial building worth \$110,000, and that was for commercial storage units being constructed at 1107 Mechem by Eagle Creek Construction.

While new commercial building starts have been few and far between, village real estate agents continue to have good inventories of commercial property available to lease and sell.

The village issued eight new single family dwelling permits for a total of \$919,727; bringing that category to 53 permits worth \$6,795,767.

A trend toward remodeling and fixing up has continued with 36 residential addition/alteration permits, valued at \$226,879, issued in July.

That brings the total fix-up category for homeowners to 225 permits for the year, with a value of \$1,734,300.

Commercial addition/alteration permits totaled six worth \$22,175 in July, bringing the year-to-date in that area to \$320,279.







Home security

Don't leave your home unprotected

Here's some help for repairing water damage

Q. I own a four-bedroom, ranch-style home. The ceilings on the lower floor are finished with stucco. Some time ago, a little flooding occurred from a broken washing machine which caused damage to the ceiling underneath it. Over a period of time, a small area of the stucco became loose and discolored from the water seepage. I also noticed some staining on the drywall which surfaced right through the paint. Can you give me some information on how I might restore the stucco finish and repair the drywall?

A. Before you can even begin any repairs, be sure that no remaining water or moisture still exists. The only way to prove this is to remove any loose stucco from the damaged area. Provided that all dampness is gone, you can now start your work.

Don't be frugal about removing more of the damaged stucco than you should. It is better to extract more and be assured that you did the correct job. Use a mason's brush or any other type and be sure the area is free of dirt, dust and

other foreign materials.

Lightly dampen the area to be worked on just prior to applying your new coat of stucco. The use of any type of plaster from your local paint dealer will be adequate. Make sure the initial or base coat of stucco is packed tightly into the damaged area with a trowel. Afterward, your final application of stucco can be done with either a textured trowel or even a household sponge that has been dampened.

Regarding the water stains on your drywall, simply block sand the wall with a fine grade of sandpaper. Use a paint primer on the wall before applying any paint.

NOTE: Try to duplicate the texture of your existing stucco and blend in as evenly as possible. Your finish will eventually match as time goes on and the new part ages.

RUST RINGS-I solved a friend's problem very inexpensively. She complained that her husband's shaving cream can marked up the bathroom vanity. I suggested using a coaster to put under the can. It can even be color-coordinated with the bathroom to add a pretty touch. Maria T., Los Altos, Calif.

CARD TRICK-Why put a card on top of a gift? The card covers part of the beautiful gift wrap. At a birthday or wedding, it is obvious whom the gift is for, so you don't have to put on an envelope with a name on it. It should be placed on top of the tissue inside the box. 
