### Area power was off for an hour Friday

Ruidoso and the surrounding area experienced a power outage at 11:10 a.m. Friday, with power restored at 12:22 p.m.

According to a news release provided by Texas-New Mexico Power Company, the outage was caused by a tree falling on a 115-KV transmission line owned by Plains Electric Generation and Transmission Cooperative. The tree was located on the Mescalero Apache Reservation just west of Pena Canyon.

Crews from Texas-New Mexico Power and Otero County Electric Cooperative assisted in the restoration of electric service.

# A Classic Dash upsets Treacherously to win the 1993 All American Futurity

Treacherously's attempt at capturing the elusive Quarter Horse Triple Crown was nixed by California invader A Classic Dash who posted a nose win over Heza Fast Man in the Grade I \$1.9 million All American Futurity, Labor Day at Ruidoso Downs.

Treacherously, who had won the first two jewels in the Triple Crown earlier this summer, was sent off the 2-5 favorite in the field of nine 2-year-old quarter horses in the 440-yard dash.

The gray gelding started a step slowly from the gates, then was bumped hard by Merganser Line who broke from the neighboring gate.

By the time Treacherously regained his stride, A Classic Dash had a head lead on the outside part of the track and battled with Heza Fast Man to the wire to post the narrow victory.

Treacherously was a length and a quarter behind in third. The time was :21.51 over a sloppy track.

"When you're in the All American and your horse is shaking and hot in the paddock, it's not real good," said jockey Nancy Summers who is the only female rider in history to win two Triple Crown races.

Eddie Garcia, Los Alamitos leading rider, rode 2-1 second choice A Classic Dash to a 1 3/4-length win in the August 20 time trials and said afterwards the best thing was that he knew his horse could run better in his second Ruidoso Downs start.

"He was on the lead 70 yards out of the gates, then when we passed the grandstand he wanted to stop so I went after him and he picked it up again," said Garcia. "I knew I won it, but to wait for the photo was almost too much. I'd never breathed so hard in my whole life."

The 28-year-old native of Jalisco, Mexico, has been riding in the United States since 1981, but had ridden in only one All American prior to today.

The victory in the World's Richest Quarter Horse race was worth \$1 million to A Classic Dash's owner Abigail Kawanakoa of Honolulu, Hawaii.

The 2-year-old California-bred colt by First Down Dash is conditioned by Los Alamitos-based trainer Connie Hall who is the first woman trainer to win an All American. Only five female trainers had

saddled an All American starter in the 35-year history of the race.

He's always a perfect gentleman," said Hall. "He walked over there like he had a big job to do and sometimes he's a little quiet, but he's a classy horse."

Hall had never started a horse at Ruidoso before the trials and has a 100 percent success rate at the mountaintop oval.

Owner Kawanakoa, a descendant of the Hawaiian Royal Family, has a string of quarter horses throughout the west, but is also a newcomer to Ruidoso.

"As far as I'm concerned, it's

about time a two-woman team won a big race like this. We worked really hard for this and looked after him. A Classic Dash morning, noon and night."

The win was the seventh in eight career starts for A Classic Dash whose sire has produced the last three All American Futurity winners. His career earnings now total \$1,078,617.

The John Bassett-trainee Heza Fast Man had been suffering from a foot abscess for most of the past week ran a game second considering the adversity he overcame.

"We couldn't do nothing with him for the last four days and I can't believe he even got to the track," said Bassett who is one of the top trainers in Arizona.

"We made the decision to run him a half hour before the race and he sure wasn't 100 percent today, but he has a heart as big as all the great outdoors and I'm really proud."

The Arizona-bred son of The Signature earned \$321,755 for owners San Tan Tillage, Mike Hastings et. al. of Queen Creek, Arizona, just outside of Phoenix.

Henry Garcia who is no relation to Eddie, was the rider.

Wayne Dallas' Treacherously rallied gallantly after his disastrous start, but could not make up enough ground to catch the leaders. The son of Runaway Winner lost for the first time in nine career outings, but still earned \$143,744 for his efforts. The Sam Sandoval-trainee has amassed a bankroll of \$547,999 in his young career. The majority of his earnings came from his three Grade I victories which include the Ruidoso and Rainbow futurities.

# State "rules" cost taxpayers millions of dollars

An unwritten policy allowed state officials to operate for years under a cloak of secrecy in awarding leases that led to construction projects worth millions of dollars.

State officials say the loophole that prevented disclosure of bid awards has been changed, but a recent case involving a Human Services lease in Ruidoso casts doubt on that assertion.

According to State Representative H. John Underwood (D-Ruidoso), who has investigated the matter for Ruidoso resident Hazel Haynsworth, the secretaries of the state Human Services Department (HSD) and General Services Department (GSD) will come to Ruidoso in October to answer community questions.

The procedure has outraged several Ruidoso residents who claim they have been treated unfairly by state agencies.

"Why should we go to the expense of submitting bids, if the state already knows who they are going to award the bid?" one Ruidosan asked.

Helen Gordon, a spokeswoman for HSD, claims the Legislature's policies actually encourage a system that results in wasteful spending.

By not providing capital outlay money, the Legislature often forces state agencies to pay in rent several times the cost of what it would take to construct a new building.

The process also results in the government picking up the construction tab for private entrepreneurs at a huge cost to the tax-

payers. The system begins with a state agency budget like HSD that has no capital outlay money for a building. HSD officials then arrange for a lease, finding extra money in their existing operational expenses to pay the higher lease cost.

A request for proposal (called an RFP, which outlines what the agency is seeking in a lease) is sent to a mailing list of people interested in leasing their building to the state agency.

Although the RFP doesn't mention that new construction is favored over an existing building, deputy secretary David Ortiz for GSD said that often is the reality.

"Obviously, employees given the opportunity to make the selection between a new facility and an existing facility, will choose the new fa-

cility," Ortiz said.

He said more community concerns should have been taken into consideration and more upper management involvement is needed in the selection process.

After the RFPs were sent, HSD made up a review committee of lower level employees who inspected the proposed building site and the existing building.

In the Ruidoso case, out of 100 possible points, 60 points of the RFP were designated for quality of atmosphere (color of walls and carpet), spatial relationship (restroom accessible from the reception room) and geographic designation (closer to an existing social services building.)

Cost to the taxpayer was worth only 15 points.

That the leasing of an existing

building would cost the taxpayers less than constructing a new building was not a consideration.

Ironically, the HSD committee placed Haynsworth restrooms in a wrong location, deducting points from her overall rating because of their mistake.

They also failed to call to the attention of higher level state officials that the existing five-year-old social services building on Mechem Drive has a huge adjoining lot for sale. The owner of the lot was never contacted.

Based on the findings of the review committee, the bid was awarded to Don Elwell of Roswell. His winning bid was about \$100,000 over Haynsworth's low bid.

# Ragamuffin shapes up to be perfect house pet

A mop of white hair with a few black and brown accents, little Ragamuffin promises to become someone's perfect house and traveling companion.

The terrier mix is about three months old, but probably won't grow much larger, said Esther Harper, manager of the Lincoln County Humane Society shelter.

"She has a sweet disposition and gets along well with other animals," Harper said. "She's still a puppy and will need the usual house training necessary at that age."

The shelter has literature available on crate training a new canine family member. It's an extremely effective approach to eliminating accidents in the house. Sheets also are available on digging and excessive barking.

In addition, a friend of the shelter and a trainer of champion

Labradors, Linda Turck, has offered to counsel over the telephone new owners of shelter adopted animals who are experiencing behavior problems with their four-legged companions.

Shelter workers hope someone will find a special place in their home and heart for Panda, a sweet female, who appears to be a border collie/Australian shepherd mix.

Abandoned by their owner, Panda and her sister, Cajun, were brought to the shelter as pups.

Cajun, a strikingly good-looking animal was featured in the newspaper, but was not adopted that week. Two weeks later, she died suddenly in the same cage with her sister, Panda.

Workers worried that Panda might also have contracted one of the diseases that take so many puppies lives in a shelter, but she survived.

Eight to nine months old now,

she needs a home of her own. Workers say her will to survive and her affectionate personality has caused them to keep her when the shelter has become over-crowded and some animals had to be destroyed.

Panda has a dark face with brown eyebrows and a medium coat.

Another residents of the shelter since she was a little pup is Petunia, who is sponsored for the cost of her spaying, the major expense associated with adoption.

Petunia has short black hair with white accents. She appears to have Labrador blood, but is mixed with a smaller breed. About the same age as Panda, she would require very little grooming and is good with children.

The weekend animal and education literature outings at Wal-Mart have proven very successful in terms of animals adopted from the

exposure (either in person or on the posters showing pets still waiting for homes) and information distributed.

It's always gratifying when people stop to admire the puppies and kittens and dig deep into their pockets to help. Many who pause to read the horrendous statistics on pet over-population, leave with a new perspective on the need to spay and neuter all dogs and cats.

The shelter needs more volunteers to continue the weekend program as long as the weather permits, to exercise the dogs and play with the cats.

Playpens are needed, both for the weekend program and for a new approach being used at the shelter to try to cut down on puppy deaths from disease.

The society also is seeking a sponsor to help build a more comprehensive medical supply chest for the abandoned pets. Information

from other shelters indicates new medicines are available that may help kittens fight off deadly respiratory diseases that have wiped out many litters.

# Lovington Wildcats tame the Warriors

A dose of sports 4-AAA reality set in Friday night as the Lovington Wildcats put on an offensive and defensively showcase while handing the Ruidoso Warrior football team a 28-7 thumping at W.D. Horton Stadium.

The Wildcats, obviously with something to prove, played games in the first quarter, trying to pass the football on virtually every play. But after having no success with the aerial attack, Lovington put the ball in the hands of the running backs and the young Warrior defense was no match.

The Warriors received the opening kickoff and drove the ball to a couple of first downs with the aid of a couple of Wildcat penalties. The Warriors were then forced to punt the ball away.

It was three and out for the Wildcats with three incomplete passes.

Both teams weren't able to move the football with much success through the opening quarter, but Lovington moved to the ground game in the second half.

With average gains of almost 10 yards, the Wildcats moved into scoring territory in the second quarter with relative ease.

They ran the football at will, throwing an occasional pass to keep the Warriors honest.

The Warriors moved into Wildcat territory, but were again forced to punt the football back to the Wildcats. Lovington tried a running play, and didn't try to call a time out you would think to run out the clock, which had ticked to the 1:30 minute mark.

Then they tried a pass play, to pick up the first down. It was picked off by Anthony Torres and the Warrior offense was in business again, deep in Wildcat territory. Again, a strange coaching move.

The Warriors took advantage of the break and scored their only touchdown of the game with a beautiful pass play from John Echols to Raul Davis. While the

pass only travel 10 or so yards in the air, Davis provided most of the fireworks, with some nifty running after the catch. The Warriors had struck from 24 yards out.

Jimmy Varnadore added the point after, and the Warriors had moved to within a touchdown.

The second half was not much different than the first. The highlight for the Warriors didn't result in a touchdown, but was impressive none the less.

After Lovington scored to give themselves a two-touchdown lead, the Warrior offense got the kickoff and marched the football down the field 75 yards in 12 plays. The drive, stalled at the five yard line and the offense came away empty handed.

That drive marked the second time in as many weeks that the offensive team had put together an impressive multiple play drive that consumed a considerable amount of time, and came off the field with no points to show for it.

Both drives would have had major impacts on their respective games. That's water under the bridge, however. At least the Warriors are improving enough to put the drives together.

Hopefully, this experience will

give the squad the know-how to punch in the end zone when it counts, during district play.

Lovington scored again in the fourth quarter and that was the game.

Our kids didn't look as well as we had hoped, but then Lovington was much better than most people expected.

Week three will give the team a chance to win. The Warriors will travel to Roswell next Friday to meet the NMMI Colts, a team that has lost twice so far this season with meetings from schools in the El Paso area (Santa Teresa and Clint).


It just costs \$25 to fish both days, and the proceeds support Kiwanis Club's local charities.

# New Mexico ambulance services haul in \$1.88 million in state funds

New Mexico Department of Health Secretary Michael J. Burkhardt today announced the distribution of \$1.88 million to providers of emergency medical services statewide. Last year these providers responded to more than 190,000 calls for emergency assistance.

Lincoln County received a total of \$62,699. Funding was made available

through the Emergency Medical Services (EMS) Fund Act and covers the current state fiscal year of July 1 through June 30, 1994. According to Barak Wolf, Chief of the Public Health Division's Primary Care and Emergency Medical Services Bureau, the majority of applications received were from counties.

Lincoln County's allocations were to: Alto Ambulance for \$3,994,

Bonito Volunteer Fire Department \$3,192, Capitan Ambulance for \$3,374, Carrizozo Ambulance for \$5,200, Corona Ambulance received \$3,427, Fort Stanton Ambulance received \$3,363, Hondo Ambulance received \$3,321, and Capitan Ambulance received \$3,107.

Ruidoso EMS received \$16,815, Ruidoso Fire Department received \$3,556 and Ruidoso Downs Volunteer Fire Department

received \$3,350.

In fiscal year 93-94 counties received a total of \$1,032,380 (61 percent) on behalf of 202 local EMS providers. Included in this number are 18 Native American EMS providers. The remaining applications were received from 82 cities, towns and villages who sponsored 89 local EMS providers. These cities will administer \$661,388 (39 percent) of the distribution. Wolf said each

service is guaranteed between \$3,000 minimum and \$20,000 maximum.

Additionally, \$186,250 of the total fund will go to special systems projects for such items as improved central dispatch and communications systems or automated defibrillators.

Initially passed in 1978, the EMS Fund Act carried a direct appropriation of approximately

\$500,000. The "Dollar for Life" amendments increased the fund through a one dollar annual assessment on every motor vehicle registration and also expanded the permitted use of the fund to include training and licensing of EMS personnel.

Wolf indicated that of the 291 providers receiving funds this fiscal year, 103 are transporting services.



## Those Were The Days wins the All American Gold Cup

The hard knocking veteran Those Were The Days used a strong late-closing kick to score a neck win over Sound Dash in the Grade I \$51,518 All American Gold Cup over eight of the nation's finest older quarter horses, Saturday.

The 4-year-old Six Fortunes gelding broke slowly under jockey Larry Layton from the #4 post and was a length behind Dash Master Miss in the early stages of the 440-yard race. Midway through the contest, Those Were The Days inched to within striking distance of Sound Dash who had a slight lead, then blew past her to just get up at the wire. The time was :21.75 over a fast track.

"The first jump he was about a length behind, but for him it was a good break because he likes to stay

off the pace," said Layton. "The filly (Sound Dash) had me beat by three-quarters of a length when we passed the grandstand, but he passed her real fast. He jumped a shadow nearing the wire and lost a little ground and the only time he was in front was the last two jumps."

The Bobby Turner-trainee ran the fastest qualifying time of :21.79 while winning the second of three Gold Cup Trial Divisions on August 26, but was sent off the 3-1 second choice in the classy field. The Gold Cup was the first stakes victory for Those Were The Days.

Layton has ridden Those Were The Days in all of his lifetime starts in which he has finished in the money 15 times. The consistent gelding increased his career

bankroll to \$91,014 with the \$25,759 winner's share of the purse. Those Were The Days is trained by Bobby Turner for owner Sherril Nilson of Locust Grove, Oklahoma.

Leonelo Trevino's Sound Dash finished second, two lengths in front of 35-1 longshot Super Clyde. Sound Dash earned \$8,758 for the place. The 4-year-old Dash For Cash filly also won her trial division for trainer Robert Madrigal. Raul Ramirez was the rider.

Super Clyde closed from well back to get up for the show under jockey Dewey Smith. Third place was worth \$5,151 to owner Raymond Welsh of Bullard, Texas.

The 4-year-old gelding is trained by Jann Jones.

## Royal Down Dash takes off to grab '93 All American Derby

Victor Diaz' Royal Down Dash exploded from the gates and led from start to finish to completely devastate her competition by 1 3/4-lengths in the Grade I \$349,883 All American Derby, Sunday.

The daughter of First Down Dash had a head advantage in the early stages of the 440-yard dash for the nation's finest 3-year-olds, then widened that margin to one length with 100 yards to go. Nearing the wire, jockey Joe Martinez wrapped up on the filly and she drew away from the field to win under a tight hold. The time was :21.48.

"I never had to uncock my stick," said Martinez who won his second All American Derby in two years. "She's run perfectly in her last four

starts. She's a nice mare."

Royal Down Dash has won four straight races including the A.Q.H.A. Challenge at Santa Fe, August 8. She also won the West Texas Derby at Sunland in April.

Diaz nearly lost Royal Down Dash earlier in the week when she went into the sale ring at the Ruidoso Horse Sales Friday night. The bidding didn't reach the \$250,000 Diaz expected to get for his prize filly so he repurchased her for \$200,000.

"We had a live bid for \$160,000, but it was not good enough," said trainer Jose Dominguez. "Mr. Diaz is a businessman and you've got to sell a hot item." Diaz voiced relief that he still had Royal Down Dash; "I am happy, very happy that I

bought her back."

The filly doubled her career earnings to \$289,675 with the \$144,421 winner's share of the purse. She has eleven wins in 20 career starts and is six of ten this year.

Zory Kuzyk's Check Her Twice closed late on the outside to secure the place position. The First Down Dash filly was ridden by Steve Treasure for trainer Jerry Lazenby. Check Her Twice earned \$66,021 as runner-up.

Specially Fast, with Bruce Pilkenton aboard, was a half-length behind in third. The Dwayne "Sleepy" Gilbreath-trainee earned \$33,885 for his efforts. The gelded son of Dash For Cash is owned by Six G's Stables.

## Gee Ryder goes wire-to-wire to capture Ruidoso Mile Handicap

The speedy gelding Gee Ryder jumped out to an early lead and desperately held off a late charge from Lt. Roberts for a nose win in the \$29,950 Ruidoso Mile Handicap, Saturday.

Gee Ryder broke well from the #9 post and quickly grabbed a two length lead as the field entered the backstretch in the two turn contest. At the top of the lane, jockey Vickie Smallwood uncocked her stick on

Gee Ryder and he dug down deep for more to outbatttle the fast-closing Lt. Roberts to the wire. The time was 1:40 flat.

The 5-year-old son of Red Ryder had been running primarily in sprints this summer, but had won the one-mile Ruidoso Derby Prep in similar fashion during his 3-year-old campaign. Gee Ryder is trained by Simon Buechler for owner Mike Weatherly of Las Cruces.

First place was worth \$17,970.

The Doyal Roberts-charge Lt. Roberts was 3 1/4-lengths in front of longshot E's Ego who closed late for the show. Lt. Roberts who is owned by Jerry Givens of Abernathy, Texas, earned \$6,589 for his efforts. Glen Murphy rode. E's Ego is trained by Ramon Gonzales and owned by Joe Garcia of Albuquerque. Third place was worth \$2,995. David Mitchell was the jockey.

## Lucky Aces N Eights rallies for an upset victory in Derby Consolation

11-1 longshot Lucky Aces N Eights closed late under strong urging by jockey Tome Green to post a half-length victory over Dash Thru Traffic in the \$62,720 All American Derby Consolation, Saturday.

The Tommy Sasser-trained colt ran a strong second to Runaway Cash in the Aug. 19 trials, but did not receive much support at the betting windows. Lucky Aces N Eights broke a step slowly from the gate, but got even with leaders Mr Eye Opener and Dash Thru Traffic

with 100 yards remaining in the 440-yard dash.

Nearing the wire, the son of Special Effort shifted into another gear and won driving. The time was :22.02.

"He's left the gate sharper, but I wasn't worried about the others after the start because I knew he has a good kick at the end," said Green who won her second stakes race in two weeks here. The Santa Fe-based jockey won the Zia Sophomore Championship aboard Merry Ego last Sunday.

Lucky Aces N Eights earned \$15,267 for the win and raised his earnings to \$58,106 for owner Max Webb of Farmington.

1992 All American Futurity winner Dash Thru Traffic nosed out Mr Eye Opener for the place. Dash Thru Traffic will get \$9,077 as runner-up. The First Down Dash colt is owned by TNT Racing and trained by J.B. Montgomery. Joe Martinez rode. Mr Eye Opener, who hails from the Jack Brooks barn, got \$7,014 for third. Jacky Martin was aboard for owners Billie and Dale Smith of Tulsa, Oklahoma.

## Former claimer Signing Bonus steals Brigand Handicap victory on Friday

Former claiming horse Signing Bonus surprised stakes winners Stamen and Way Cool with a two-length victory in the \$11,950 Brigand Handicap, Friday.

The Cliff Lambert-trainee was sent off at 8-1 odds in the field of eight quarter horses and thoroughbreds going 1000 yards in the

Brigand. Signing Bonus broke well from the #3 post and battled for the early lead with 4-5 favorite Way Cool and 2-1 second choice Stamen. In the turn for home, Signing Bonus took a slight lead over the two favorites and had stretched that margin to two-lengths at the top of the lane.

In the stretch, the colt kicked into another gear to win under strong handling by jockey Todd Fincher.

The time was :52.86 over a fast track.

Fincher was very familiar with Signing Bonus after working him in the mornings for Lambert.

## Racing season ends with big crowds

Ruidoso Downs racing fans beat the mountain track's all-time handle by betting a total of \$1,594,934 on Labor Day. Of that total, \$1,069,456 was wagered at the track, with the rest of the handle in simulcasts at other racetracks.

On Saturday, August 5, 1989, the track tallied its handle record of \$1,548,330, with the next six largest handles all on labor days.

The total attendance at the track was 10,130 for this year's All American Futurity — the biggest race day of the season, just under the record set last year when 10,801 people lined up to watch the world's richest quarter horse race.

When the off-track, simulcast bettors are added to the attendance total, the number jumps to 13,046.

The track was busy all weekend, starting out

Thursday with 1,844 attending on track and 2,705 total, with a total handle of \$393,166 — \$176,592 of that on-track.

On Friday, 2,506 fans attended the races at Ruidoso Downs, with that number at 3,696 when off-track bettors are added. They wagered a total of \$427,110, with \$242,921 of that on-track at Ruidoso Downs.

Saturday saw 6,974 fans at the track, boosted to a total 8,697 with simulcast viewers.

On track betting total was \$697,957 Saturday, which jumped to \$972,262 when simulcast betting was added to the total handle.

Sunday's on track attendance was 9,666; with total attendance at 10,937.

On track wagering was at \$907,598, with the total handle on Sunday at \$1,204,097.

## Shes Gotcha is awarded the 550 title through a disqualification

Victor Lozano's Shes Gotcha won the Grade III Ruidoso 550 Championship when 2-5 favorite Six To Five was disqualified and placed second for interference in mid-stretch.

Shes Gotcha earned \$7,260 for owner Lozano of Denver City,

Texas. The 4-year-old filly by Sail On Bunny is trained by Jimmie Claridge.

Six To Five had a four race win streak at Ruidoso snapped in the 550 Championship and earned \$2,662 as runner-up. The 5-year-old gelding by Six Fortunes is owned by Steve Duran of Santa Fe and trained by Jimmy Jones.

# New Federal Initiatives Combat Adult Illiteracy

**T**o understand where the literacy movement is now in the United States, think about building a house.

The late 1980s and early 1990s saw passage of milestones such as the 1991 National Literacy Act and creation of a National Institute for Literacy in Washington, D.C. For literacy leaders, this was like deciding where to live, obtaining financing and laying the foundation.

Now they have to finish the house and get people to move in.

"What we need to do is build on what we already have in place," said Sharon Darling, president of the National Center for Family Literacy in Louisville, Ky. "We know a lot of information now about how adults learn. We need to translate that to the field, build a practice in adult education, so we can really help families and adults who need our help. Right now we don't have an infrastructure to do that."

Creating the infrastructure leaders speak of is a top priority for the balance of the 1990s. Darling said success will come from literacy programs in every community and a system to train teachers, and evaluate and disseminate the practice.

Leaders say that will be essential if they hope even to approach Goal 5 of the Clinton administration's National Education Goals. Goal 5 states that every American adult will be literate by the 21st century.

"It's going to be no easy pickings," agreed Dick Lynch, chairman of the National Coalition for Literacy, a volun-

teer association of about 35 public and private national-literacy organizations. "That's not to say we should not have lofty aspirations. We have 23 million illiterate American adults. Those figures are simply staggering."

Goal 5 is "lofty, but it's a target," says Ron Pugsley, acting director of the U.S. Department of Education's Division of Adult Education and Literacy. "The question is to what level is the delivery system up to being able to meet the needs."

Pugsley and others hope to have a somewhat clearer answer this month,

with the expected release of the National Adult Literacy Survey. The survey, funded by the Department of Education and administered by the Educational Testing Service, looked at the literacy levels of 15,900 American adults.

"This will probably be the most important review of what's happening out there of any document we have," Pugsley said.

Literacy advocates expect the report to let them know how well the current effort to educate adults is working and give them some sense of how to expand that effort. But equally important to the movement will be attracting the tens of millions of people who need services and are not getting them.

Pugsley says the challenge will be to improve on huge gains made in the last 13 years.

In 1980, he said, 2 million adults were enrolled in literacy programs. Today, there are 3.8 million, an increase of nearly 90 percent. Much of the increase is due to skyrocketing numbers—about 35 percent of the current population of literacy

enrollees—who are taking English as a second language, Pugsley said.

As of press time for this article, literacy leaders were preparing their recommendations for a director for the National Institute of Literacy. They expected to have one in place over the summer.

Peter Waite, president of Laubach Literacy Action in Syracuse, N.Y., said he

hopes one of the institute's first priorities will be to help the states. He wants to see the creation of resource centers, mini-National Institutes of Literacy, in each state.

Lobbying for more money for literacy efforts will naturally be a big part of advocates' work. The current federal budget provides \$254 million for literacy efforts. President Clinton has proposed \$261 million, a 2.7 percent increase.

"We have under 4 million [illiterate persons] receiving instructional services," said Helen "Jinx" Crouch, president of the Literacy Volunteers of America in Syracuse, N.Y. "It's more money for those, but if you tried to serve the population in need, it's certainly not enough. The battle continues, or the war continues."

Lynch said literacy advocates understand the fierce competition for federal dollars, but they believe funding literacy efforts can save a lot of money in other social programs. He said study after study has shown that illiteracy is directly linked to problems that cost taxpayers hundreds of millions of dollars a year.

"If you look at drug abusers, juvenile delinquents, pregnant teenage girls, the unemployed, the underemployed, the homeless, you will find illiteracy statistics that go off the charts," Lynch said.

Waite said literacy advocates also try hard to make the point that literacy programs work and the money is well spent.

"It still is one of America's most solvable problems," he said. "It's something that people can do something about." ■

# At Graterford Prison, Visiting Day Is Reading Day

Until a few years ago, visitors day at Graterford Prison, a maximum security facility in Pennsylvania, could be a strained affair. The

families of the prisoners, having gone through the strict prison routine for visitors, sat packed in visiting rooms. Children were forced to sit quietly, while their parents conversed nearby.

Then in 1987, a Reading Is Fundamental (RIF) program offered prison dads a chance to give books to their children when they visit. Since then, family visiting days have been transformed from a stressful time to a family time centered around books.

Now when children visit on a RIF distribution day, they browse through a selection of books to find one to take home. They may also enjoy a puppet show performed by prison fathers—since the beginnings of the RIF program, inmates have developed

puppet shows and flannel-board stories based on children's classics.

Prisoners earned the money for the first children's book distribution by

contributing wages they had earned. Since prisoners are paid between 13 and 38 cents an hour, it took real commitment to come up with the \$625 to buy books for their children.

Now, the program receives help from Episcopal Community Services of the Diocese of Philadelphia. Prison organizations, such as Lifer's Inc. and the Holy Name Society, an inmate organization for Catholics, also provide support.

Children of prisoners face special challenges. Consider these facts:

- Of the nation's prisoners, at least 75 percent of the women and 50 percent of the men have children.
- These children are among the most disadvantaged in America. Large numbers fail in school. Many drop out. Some end up in juvenile court.
- Studies have consistently shown that prisoners who have strong family ties have half the recidivism rate of prisoners who do not.

The RIF book distribution is one way to counteract those problems. "The program encourages children to read," says Lufay Butler, a social worker with Episcopal Community Services. "It also helps create a stronger relationship with their absent father."

But fathers, too, benefit from the program, she says. "It empowers the fathers in their role as a parent. It gives them an active and positive role to play in their children's lives."

The RIF program also serves as a motivator for the fathers to improve their own literacy skills. Before

distribution day, inmates have sometimes asked authorities to let them take books back to their cell blocks so they can practice reading them aloud.

Steven Steurer, executive director of the Correctional Education Association, strongly supports programs like the one at Graterford. "Having inmates read with their children helps create a strong and positive relationship," he says. "Programs like these see a whole person, not just an inmate. We hope that programs like this will help children from becoming the indirect victims of their father's crimes." ■

The block is filled with music and water and happy



happens!" Junior Boy finishes.


Matthew laughs and says: "That's why I like living on the Car Washing Street!"




# ENMU-Ruidoso trains Student Literacy Corp

On September 7, two new billboards will be posted in Ruidoso Downs hoping to attract the attention of many.

The billboards will read, "FREE TO ADULTS — LEARN TO READ, READ TO LEARN. Private lessons available, confidential. Help is just a phone call away. Call ENMU at 1-800-934-3668

Eastern New Mexico University's Student Literacy Corp (Ruidoso), coordinated by Gloria Pafford, is currently in its second

year. Student Literacy Corp, funded by a federal grant from the Department of Education, gives college credit for learning how to teach adults to read.

"It is designed to appeal to the servicehood of college students by offering a credit-bearing elective (EDF 293) to teach college students adult learning strategies so that they may tutor other adults in the community in reading and basic skill acquisition," said Pafford.

The students also receive a 12-hour inservice using the Laubach Way of Reading.

Upon completion of the training, students tutor an adult for 60 hours and receive three hours of college credits.

This training benefits the individuals — both tutor and student — and the community as well.

In New Mexico, one out of five adults (20 percent) cannot read functionally.

"These adults have difficulty reading a job application, directions on a prescription bottle or even a bedtime story to their own child," said Pafford.

These adults often adapt, and sometimes don't know that help is available. Requests for adult tutors often come from family members, who recognize that the non-reader is missing out on a lot that society has to offer.

Referrals also come from Income

Support, New Mexico Probation Office and from concerned employers and/or acquaintances.

A tutor then arranges with the student to meet and discuss a place to meet at a convenient time for both.

## Altrusa takes the lead in teaching adults to read

Ruidoso Altrusa Club has taken the lead on literacy training in Ruidoso since 1979.

The club, part of an international service organization, has a reputation for supporting education and literacy, and it was only natural that its members would tackle the problem of adult illiteracy.

For years, Altrusa has provided scholarships for continuing education and for vocational training,

and that tradition is continuing.

But, since 1979, the club and its members have made a commitment of time and money to teach adults to read and to pay for the materials needed for that training.

Altrusa has had three tutor training workshops since 1979.

One included training tutors for English as a second language, which helps in teaching students whose native language is anything

other than English.

"Our tutoring is done on an individual basis and the Altrusa Club of Ruidoso provides all the necessary materials free," explained Altrusa Literacy chairperson Liz Munro.

Tutors meet their clients at the Ruidoso Public Library where they work one-on-one in sessions that are scheduled according to both their schedules. The program is

completely confidential and non-threatening, with the tutor working at the student's natural pace.

If the student's schedule doesn't fit with the library hours, then another public building or church can be used, said Munro.

"The library staff is also helpful in passing along information to those seeking help," said Munro.

Altrusa's referrals come from many areas of the community, in-

cluding businesses, medical staff, schools and by word-of-mouth from other students.

If you have a friend or family member who would benefit from adult literacy training, encourage that person to call and make an appointment to meet with a tutor.

## Hubbard Museum promotes reading


The Hubbard Foundation joins with *The Ruidoso News* each year to provide newspapers to area students through a Newspapers in Education project.





# GED on TV Program Helps Adults Earn Their Diplomas

**W**hen Pam Moore of Morehead, Ky., dropped out of high school in 1971, she knew that "you could get a factory job and earn a living wage." Although she occasionally thought about returning to school to earn her degree, there was no real urgency. "I worked when I wanted and managed to make fair money," she says. Besides, with two young children, returning to school was virtually impossible.

Health problems caused Lilly Hawkins of Stonewood, W.Va., to drop out of high school in the 10th grade. After that, she says, "I kept myself hidden away. I stayed home. I raised my son. But I always wished I had my high school diploma." A lack of transportation, however, prevented her from attending adult education classes.

Economic pressures caused Jim

the 8th grade level. They also need "real self-discipline."

For Jim LaFever, passing the GED became almost a full-time job. He recorded each televised class on his VCR. Then after work, he'd sit down for "eight to 10 hours of studying." When he needed help, he says, he would "look back at the program and then try again. I also called the 800 number, which helped me out a lot."

For students who are successful in completing their GED, the rewards were both immediate and long lasting. Nationwide, 46.4 percent of the students who graduated from the GED on TV program used it to obtain a job, keep a job or receive a promotion. Of the 53.8 percent of students who were unemployed when taking the GED, half are now employed.

A few months after Pam Moore had passed the GED, she ran into Sharon Jackson in the grocery store. "She asked me if I would come to work on a part-time, temporary basis," Moore says. That was in 1984. Today, Moore spends her days helping other students who are enrolled in the GED on TV course. "I tell them that if I could do it, they can do it," she says. She's also taking college courses. "I can't let my oldest daughter get too far ahead of her mother."

Today, Lilly Hawkins works as a nursing assistant with elderly patients. "I feel that my GED helped me get my job," she says, "and it also helps me do it better."

LaFever's boss gave him a raise. Now that he's planning to buy a new home (a home that will include a study room), LaFever says, "the extra raise is going to help me out a lot." ■

Tonight, Sept. 8, at 10 p.m. Eastern time, PBS will carry an hourlong national call-in show, "GED—Get It!" Hosted by actor Edward James Olmos, the program will feature a clip from the CBS series "Northern Exposure" and appearances by Dave Thomas, founder of the Wendy's restaurant chain, and country singer John Michael Montgomery, both GED graduates. The program will encourage viewers to take the first step toward getting their GED by calling a toll-free number for localized information on how to prepare for the test and where to take it. (Check local listing.)

LaFever of Louisville, Ky., to leave school in the 10th grade. "I had to work," he says simply. After a stint in the military, he briefly considered going back to school. But, he says, "nowadays you have to work to pay the bills."

Today, Pam, Lilly and Jim have all completed high school by earning a General Equivalency Degree (GED). Each of them enrolled in the GED on TV program developed by Kentucky Educational Television (KET) and broadcast on public television stations throughout the United States and Canada.

Began in 1975, the KET/GED series

has enrolled more than 2.1 million students. The series is available in all 50 states. Beginning this month, PBS will provide a special satellite feed of the series in English and in Spanish to public television stations. Each year, approximately 150,000 adult students enroll in the 43-part tutorial designed to help adult learners prepare for the GED.

There is a growing need to provide opportunities for adults to complete their high school education. In Kentucky, over a million adults age 16 and older have not earned a high school diploma. All the adult education programs in the state combined serve only 3 percent or 4 percent of that population, according to Sharon Jackson, state director for the KET/GED program in Kentucky—a percentage that is similar in other states.


LaFever says he tried to enroll in adult education classes "two or three times," but they were always full. Limits on class size are one of the reasons adults don't return to earn their degree.

Health problems, family responsibilities and transportation difficulties prevent others from enrolling. "Sometimes," says Jackson, "people are just too darned tired to attend classes, especially after their regular work day." For many adults, the GED on TV program "eliminates those barriers," Jackson says.

LaFever first learned of the GED on

TV program when he was "surfing through the channels." A televised ad caught his attention, and he decided to give the televised program a try. Like more than 46 percent of those who enroll in GED on TV programs, LaFever "wanted the self-satisfaction" of earning a high school diploma.

Jackson points out that the televised GED program is not for every student. "Although I think this program is wonderful, it's not the answer to everyone's prayers," she says. To be successful, students need to read on




# Where's the most unusual place you've been caught reading? What are you reading now?



## 10 Ways You Can Use the Newspaper With Your Child

As a parent, you probably use the newspaper for information: How much does hamburger cost this week? What's the weather going to be? Did my favorite team win or lose? What's happening in the world that may affect me or my family?

But you can also use the newspaper as a rich resource for enjoyable learning activities with your child. Here are 10 suggestions of ways you can use the newspaper to help your child do better in school.

- Ask your child to cut out a picture of a famous athlete, movie star, politician, or other person he or she would like to meet. Ask, "What would you say to this person? What do you think the person would say to you?"
- Read the newspaper's weather forecast to your child. Look for pictures that illustrate different weather conditions. Look at the forecast for tomorrow and help your child choose appropriate clothes to wear. Or, use the weather map to learn more about weather in other places. For example, ask, "What is the weather like where Grandpa lives?"
- Find an announcement in the newspaper about a free event in your community. Decide whether you and your child would like to attend.
- Look for pictures that show people's facial expressions and emotions. Ask your child how each person feels. Then ask questions like, "What makes you happy? What makes you sad?"
- Look through the comics. Have your child choose a favorite character. Ask, "How are you like this character? How are you different?"
- Using the newspaper's food section, choose a recipe with your child. Prepare it together, asking your child to help you read the directions. Then serve it to family or friends.
- Have your child choose an object pictured in the newspaper and describe it to you. See if you can correctly identify it based on your child's description. Switch roles and repeat.
- Look through the newspaper with your child. Ask your child to find examples of:
  - "Foods I like"
  - "Clothes I like to wear"
  - "Toys I like to play with"
  - "Animals I like"

Talk about each selection: "Why is a cat your favorite animal?" Tell your child about things you like and why.

■ Read the TV listings together. Help your child choose a program for the whole family. What would you choose to watch by yourself?

■ Find a story or picture of a group of people who need help (for example, victims of a fire or flood, homeless people, people in a hospital). Talk about ways your family might help: By spending time with them? Sharing talents? Or contributing money?
