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## Chino lambasts the guy

President Wendell Chino lashed out Wednesday at Governor Bruce King.

Speaking before the legislative committee on Indian Affairs Chino, holding up a copy of a story in the Santa Fe New Mexican, quoted reports that King blames Indians for dragging the state down statistically.

"King says national statistics show New Mexico to have the lowest rates of per capita income and low (test) scores due to conditions on the Navajo Reservation," read Chino in a booming voice.

"Eliminate the Indians and New Mexico's rankings wouldn't be nearly so bad," he continued.

Chino said the governor's press secretary, John McKean, went on to explain that the governor meant that the eight to 12 percent of the population who are Indians drag down the state because of the nature of their lifestyle.

"I'm incensed by the governor's remarks and by Mr. McKean who claims to know everything in the state," said Chino.

Chino said the Albuquerque Journal reported Wednesday the state's ACT scores are down again.

"Is the governor going to blame the Indians again?" he asked.

Chino said King wants to go to bat for the ranchers, but he's

not inclined to do the same for the Indians, who are citizens, too.

"If the governor really wanted to improve the economic conditions of the Indian people in the state, why did he veto measures passed by the last legislature designed to improve conditions?" asked Chino.

toward the Indians of his state.

Senator Billy McKibben (R-Hobbs) wanted to go a step further and ask the legislative leadership to sign onto the letter. Representative Shirley Baca (D-Las Cruces) suggested the leadership's support could be solicited, but pushed for the committee to go forward on its own with a strong stand.

McKibben, the senate minority leader and an announced candidate for governor, took a strong party line in discussions.

"I'll apologize for Republicans who make such remarks," said McKibben, an adviser to the committee. "When a Republican governor's been off base in the past, I've been the first one to tag 'em."

McKibben said the governor used revenues as his excuse for vetoing measures that would have helped the Indians, but he wasn't buying that.

"We know for a fact that the state coffers are spilling over with excess funds," he said.

"We don't need to kid ourselves about politics — what it's about — it's votes, votes, votes."

"We need to send a message to the governor that this committee does not condone this kind of publicity," said Senator Thomas E. Atcity (D-Shiprock). He said the committee's letter should express concern about the derogatory remarks about Indians.

## Council stands firm on tough issues

Village ordinances are going to be observed, even if it sometimes hurts, was the message the Ruidoso Village Council sent Tuesday.

The council turned down a picnic license for Cochera's, a banner request for the Chili Cookoff and a proposal to temporarily rent a vacant convention hotel site during the motorcycle rally.

Only Councilor Bill Karn was absent from the meeting.

According to Councilor Barbara Duff, Karn was remaining in Los Angeles, California, allegedly to "be a police witness for some crime that had been committed."

Of the three denials during the

council meeting, Paul Crown's request for a banner to be placed in Tall Pines trailer park advertising the traditional Chili Cookoff appeared the most difficult decision.

In an effort to crack down on banner abuse, the council notified village merchants that after Labor Day, no banners would be allowed with the exception of non-profit groups. The council ruled that banners for charitable organizations would have to be placed in four designated areas.

Merchants complied immediately to the council edict, and councilors at Tuesday's meeting were hesitant to grant any exceptions during this period, which they

regard as critical to the success of the program.

Only Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce director Joan Bailey, in an apparent bite-the-hand-that-feeds-you attempt, said she tried to test the ordinance by buying and displaying a banner knowing the council disapproved.

She explained her actions by saying she thought banners added sales value to the community and were a reason tourists visited the village.

After displaying the banner on the chamber building, she was told by village planning and zoning director Cleatus Richards to take it down and she did.

"Let's think of our priorities here," Bailey told the council, noting the merits of a banner as an advertising tool.

Mayor Jerry Shaw said that without the proliferation of banners, which she called confusing to tourists, the town looked cleaner.

"I'm proud of the way our town is looking," Shaw said.

Councilor Frank Potter also took exception to Bailey saying that banners are the way to attract tourists to the community.

"This week the town looked clean and in order," Potter said. "The sign ordinance has been abused. I can't believe how fast it has gotten out of hand."

Councilor J.D. James mentioned a banner in the Midtown Free Parking lot (one of the four designated banner sites) that has fallen and been allowed to hang over another existing banner. He called its disheveled appearance a disgrace.

Potter said the civic events center banner is just as atrocious.

"This is not the way to attract tourists to Ruidoso," Potter said.

"Hopefully, we can acquire a good sign for the Civic Events Center."

Crown said he would abide by whatever the council ruled and even praised the council for its stance to adhere to the village ordinance.

Councilor Frank Cummins noted that Free Parking, a banner approved site, is next to the cookoff area and asked Crown if it would be adequate.

Crown said he would put one in Free Parking, but he preferred the Tall Pines lot.

## Fair deed baffles county

The deed that never was continues to confound Lincoln County officials in their search to determine ownership of the county fairground in Capitan.

"I can't find any deeds and I've had The Title Company searching all week," county manager Andy Wynham told The Ruidoso News Wednesday. "I even went down there myself to work with her. I thought, well, I'm an old county clerk, I should be able to find something."

The apparent lack of clear title to the fairground was brought to the attention of the commission last week by Commissioner Wilton Howell. He questioned whether the state and county could invest money in substantial improvements without owning the land and knowing exactly how much property is available for expansion.

He suggested that the money might be better spent in another location with adequate acreage for expansion and a clear title.

The commission at that time authorized the title search. A week later, Wynham said the only new information he knows is that there is even less information about the land than originally thought.

"I've heard the stories about a family deeding the land for a school with a reverter clause if it was not used for educational purposes, but there's nothing in the official records," Wynham said.

In the 1970s, the Fair Association gave the county a deed for the fairground, but we can't find any basis for their (supposed) ownership," he said. "We can't find a chain of ownership, a progressive of titles. We know a school was there at one time."

"However, I have found out a lot about the Village of Capitan, that it was platted around 1900 by the Alamogordo Improvement Co. and there is a family by the name of Gray involved. But I can't find any specific reference to Block 58 (the fairground)."

"It wasn't broken up into lots, however, as if someone intended for it to be reserved for public use, but there is nothing to show it was ever owned by anybody."

In researching county commission records, correspondence was found between surveyor Tim Collins and then county attorney Gary Mitchell about the need to file a quiet title suit to clear up the county deed, Wynham said.

After checking with Mitchell, Howell said apparently, that suit never was filed.

Information given to County Clerk Martha Proctor was that old School Board minutes indicate the board was going to deed the land back to the village, Wynham said.

"We did find a deed on a small insignificant piece among the several little pieces that add up to make the fairground," he said. "But most people wouldn't think of it as being part of the fairground proper."

"I was hoping we had done a better job in educating the executive branch," said Senator Leonard Tsosie (D). "These comments show they don't want to learn or they just don't want to get it."

As far as per capita income being down, Senator Tsosie said the State of New Mexico is sucking money out of the Indian nations.

"The state is taxing the hell out of the mining operation in McKinley County," said Tsosie, claiming that the state is taking \$4 million from Jicarilla and giving just \$35,000 back.

"It's not just the lifestyle," he added.

But Chino wasn't through. He had some scolding criticism for the media, too.

He said the 8th Circuit Court last week decided in favor of the Indians of the Cheyenne River Sioux Tribe in South Dakota in an Indian gaming case. He said that court struck down the 10th and 11th amendments — the ones used by King in his opposition to Indian gaming.

Chino said when a decision was rendered against the Indians, the press jumped on it, but in this case the court ruled in favor of the In-

dians and the media has ignored the case.

"Media in our state haven't said anything about the 8th Circuit decision because it was pro-Indian," said Chino. "When a decision was pro-state the media loved it."

Chino said his examples are evidences of the oppression and obstruction that the Indian people of this state face.

"We are taxpayers; we pay all forms of taxes except the ad valorem tax," said Chino.

President Chino asked the committee to remind the legislature that the State of New Mexico gleans funds that come to the Indians.

"They have to get the first lick," said Chino. He spoke of payment in lieu of taxes (PILT) and funds for education and other Indian programs.

He said the Indians have even suffered double taxation, but when King established a committee to study that issue he appointed just two Indians and the rest non-Indians.

Fred Peso, a member of the Mescalero Apache Tribal Council, was asked to serve on that committee, but has declined, saying he won't be a "token Indian." Also, Peso said he can't speak for all the various

pueblos and tribes in the state.

"It behooves the governor of the State of New Mexico to appoint representatives from each tribe," said Chino.

President Chino recalled that when the Hondo school burned down several years ago, a replacement facility was in place within a matter of months.

"Why didn't the governor come forward and provide us with some political support to have our school replaced?" he asked.

In his remarks, Chino stressed both Indian sovereignty and citizenship in the state. He read aloud Article 21 from the State Constitution.

"As far as we're concerned, tribal sovereignty under our Indian treaties is non-negotiable," said Chino. "That doesn't mean we can't enjoy a government-to-government relationship."

"This committee can at least sensitize the non-Indian population to some of the facts about Indian peoples, otherwise we'll continue to be at odds," said Chino.

The Committee members, many of them native Americans, were as angry as Chino.

Advisory member Senator Atcity suggested Indian tribes might want to think of seceding

from the state, adding he'll even introduce the legislation.

Senator Tim Jennings (D-Roswell) represents the Mescalero Apache Indian Reservation. He spoke to the issue of the tribe's problems in replacing its school after the building burned.

"The Hondo School should have been closed and never opened up when it burned," said Jennings.

"That school should have been closed and (they should have) moved those kids to Capitan," he said.

Jennings said the State School Board had the authority and should have done that.

Jennings also responded to Chino's remarks on Indian gaming, saying the state has an obligation to work out some kind of agreement on gaming.

Also during the meeting, Chino, Peso and Miller Hudson reported on the tribe's studies of hosting high level nuclear waste in a Monitored Retrievable Storage (MRS) facility.

Peso showed a videotape of a news program prepared and aired on British television. The documentary, which was partly taped on the Mescalero Reservation, also was shown on CNN.

Peso detailed how the MRS siting project has changed from one

administration to the other.

"I will be in Washington next week to shine a spotlight on the MRS question — to make sure that our invitation to participate is not withdrawn as part of some back-room deal," said Peso.

"If this process is abandoned anyway, we want those responsible to justify their actions to the American people. The voluntary siting process is the way the government should be doing business with state and tribes.

"The difference with the MRS is

that this time we get to write the treaty. And, I should add, you can count on us to keep our word."

The issues of education, Indian gaming and the MRS all came together Wednesday under the banner of economic development for the Mescalero tribe.

The reluctance on the part of the governor to support the Indian's endeavors was illustrated by his comments in the press, and his actions by vetoing various measures and by refusing to reach an agreement on gaming.

Wynham said he would welcome any concrete evidence of ownership at any point in the history of the land through official documents or correspondence.

Meanwhile, he said he plans to ask the commission to file a quiet title suit, taking in the fenced area and a small section outside the fence.

"We'd be laying claim to the whole block we have been using,

but there is no dispute with the neighbors about the boundaries," he said. "We would claim it by possession.

"It's really something, all these years and the county has not really had anything."

Councilor Joe Gomez, sympathetic to Crown and the merits of the event, said it was a difficult decision not to allow the exception, because of how well Crown runs a promotion.

But what if one (banner) is turned down and one is accepted. Where are we headed? Gomez asked Crown.

Shaw assured Crown the council supports and will attend his non-profit event. She said the village appreciates all the many areas in which Crown helps the village, but the council has to stand firm on the banner ban other than the four approved areas.

In a last ditch effort to allow the banner, the village attorney was asked to define "inside" as it relates to the ordinance. Did the ordinance mean other banners could be strung inside the property or inside a building, the mayor asked.

Underwood interpreted the ordinance to read inside a building. "Thanks, John," Crown said good humoredly.

Councilor Barbara Duff made a motion to allow an exception. Her motion died for lack of a second.

In a related matter, village manager Ron Wicker told the council that the part-time enforcement officer is working and has been instrumental in issuing warnings to merchants with illegal signs.

The council had no problem in denying Cochera a picnic license for the Huns (motorcycle group) Festival that would allow beer to be sold outside Cochera's bar during the motorcycle rally.

Shaw told Cochera owner Shamie Mills that an incident outside another bar during a motorcycle rally in 1991 led to a committee recommendation to disallow selling liquor from outdoor areas adjoining liquor establishments.

Mills said that the Huns are a respectable group that would provide security in addition to Cochera's security.

"They even provide metal detection for weapons," Mills said. "This is strictly monitored."

James said the past history of drinking outdoors had not been good.

"I've never caught so much flack in my life as what happened there (a shooting in the Winner's Circle parking lot). The council made the right decision not to allow this type of activity. I still feel that same way," James said.

Cummins said because of the effort to a study committee put into the policy, the council should stick with that policy.

Marlon Mills said the village has allowed other permits.

Shaw told him one had been allowed, the Win Place and Show's (WPS) traditional thank you to the

community with free food. She said that would be looked at again next year.

James told Mills if his request is denied, the next time WPS comes before the council, he would vote against it.

Shaw and James both indicated that the event was not the problem, but rather selling liquor outdoors.

Officials of Champion Outdoor Sports, a Harley Davidson-Honda dealership out of Roswell, asked to rent the hotel site near the Civic Events Center.

Attorney David Stevens of Dutton, Griffin, Stevens, Hakanson Ltd., said Golden Aspen Rally promoter Ron Andrews told Champion owner Jimmy Allison last Wednesday that he was terminating Allison's right to space in the Civic Events Center during Andrews' rally. Stevens indicated there was a dispute with another unnamed entity.

Stevens said another spot was needed immediately to mitigate damages and accommodate prior commitments by Champion Outdoor Sports. He said legal issues on what has transpired would be left to another day.


Stevens asked to rent the hotel property and to place a tent on the site.

Councilor Cummins said he thought the notice was too short for all the adjustments that would be necessary.

Shaw agreed, stating that she was confident a hotel would be under construction on that site next year, and too much in the preparation of the site was necessary for such a temporary use.

Stevens said he "painfully" understood what the council meant by short notice.

"We weren't given any notice either," he said. Stevens said he was just trying to put out a fire.



Banners flop unceremoniously at the Free Parking area downtown. Councilor J.D. James told the council Tuesday that event promoters should not allow banners to fly unchecked in this manner. He said the tangled banners were "atrocious."

James asked where customers would park if the area was rented for a tent.

"When Mr. Andrews leased the center he also leased the parking," James noted.

The councilor said if the village allowed one tent, they would be obligated for other tents in other areas.

"I have problems with putting tents on village property. I'm afraid we would be setting a precedent to let others come in," James said.

The council denied the request to rent the hotel site.

Later, Allison told The Ruidoso News that Champion Sports would set up a tent at Tee and Ski Sporting Goods at the driveway entrance to the Civic Events Center.

"We'll have the regular stock motorcycles, soft goods, accessories, leather jackets, T-shirts, the whole works, along with free coffee and doughnuts," Allison said.

Everybody who visits his tent will receive a free bandana that says "We support Champion Sports," he said. The organization also is auctioning a 1976 Bicentennial edition Harley-Davidson Super Bike in a silent auction, in which written bids are collected throughout the day and posted on a chalkboard.

In other council business, the Arts and Film Commission and the Transportation Board were abolished, but the council agreed to restructure both at a later date.

Councilor Potter said the arts and film ordinance lacked substance.

"This is the village's fault," Potter said. "There's nothing to it. We're trying to represent all the artists. We have 14 galleries in Ruidoso. Art is a major industry of Ruidoso. In my own opinion, the drawback is the way this ordinance is structured."

Potter said he would like to see

all the artists in the area represented, not just Ruidoso.

"We may be talking to a whole new group of people," he said.

Shaw said another private, non-profit group, Friends of Music, was similar to the village's art group with mostly the same members. She suggested they meld into one entity.

Shaw said the Transportation Board was another commission that hasn't met in a public building and hasn't met on a regular basis in months.

Duff said the board did contribute to a transit study but the public was misled because of the word "mass" transit.

Shaw said residents overwhelmingly were against (taxpayers subsidizing) a transit system at this time.

The council unanimously voted to abolish the existing boards and will restructure them at a later date for future reconsideration.

In other business, council action included:

—passing Ordinance 93-20 to establish rules on Grindstone Lake Recreation Area.

—an agreement to participate up to \$500 in the installation of a 24-inch corrugated metal pipe to cross Gavilan Canyon Road for John Brown in exchange for two and one half acres of right of way.

—passing a request by chamber director Joan Bailey to amend the current chamber contract.

—agreement to offer a similar lease contract to prospective hotel developers that was offered previously to R.D. Hubbard.

—Mayor Shaw again saying she was against the storage of spent nuclear fuel rods locally, but wanted to see more protest participation by other entities.

—hearing former councilor Al Junge discuss the history of water costs in the community.

# State officials discourage appeal of lease

Hazel Haynsworth said the state has not treated her fairly and she wants her day in court.

State officials said they will oblige, but they also indicated it won't do her any good.

Haynsworth still wants a forum and State Representative John Underwood (D-Ruidoso) has said that cabinet members Laura Threat, Secretary of the General Services Department, and Dick Heim, Secretary of the Human Services Department (HSD), will come to Ruidoso to answer community questions regarding a controversial lease agreement.

The controversy stems from several issues surrounding the selection of a bid for a new Human Services office in Ruidoso.

Haynsworth's bid on a lease for office space was \$100,000 lower than the winning bid. She said a number of other contradictions still have not been answered by state officials, including the fact that inaccurate evaluations were allowed, new construction took precedence over existing buildings and essential information was not made pub-

lic. Even now, HSD officials are inconsistent in their answers regarding Haynsworth's right to protest. When Haynsworth became aware of incongruities in the review process, which was not made public, she lodged a protest.

Sigrid Olson, HSD general counsel, wrote Haynsworth to tell her that there were no stated procedures for protest at the time she offered her bid in 1992. She said the rules changed in 1993 to provide for protest.

"Please be assured that lease procurement RFPs (requests for proposals) issued since approximately March 1993, set out protest rights and procedures in accordance with the Procurement Code and GSD (General Service Department) regulations so that this type of situation no longer exists," Olson wrote Haynsworth.

However, in an interview with The Ruidoso News, HSD spokeswoman Helen Gordon said that the procurement change with protest rights was in March 1992, not 1993,

as Olson wrote.

The News asked Gordon again if the added section for protest was recent.

"No, it's not," Gordon said, "It came in March '92."

She said Haynsworth's RFP was initiated before March 1992. But the RFP to Haynsworth was released by Human Services in April 1992, a month after protest procedures were in effect.

Nevertheless, now that the lease has been signed, Olson said she would send all available information to Haynsworth "so that you may satisfy your concerns."

Haynsworth argues that after a lease is signed it's too late to protest. She contends that she should have been able to satisfy her concerns with earlier disclosure by the state.

Haynsworth said the state gave both her and the selected bidder, Don Elwell of Roswell, one last chance to revise their RFPs regarding cost, and only cost.

Haynsworth said she was surprised that Human Services opted for Elwell to construct a new build-

ing when she had been told that time was essential and that Human Services needed to move to the new facility within 120 days.

Haynsworth said that apparently, Human Services had to renegotiate this time factor with Elwell, since they extended their current lease at the Stroud building to accommodate Elwell's construction schedule of an additional year.

Olson recently wrote Haynsworth that she could now review the proposals and evaluations. If Haynsworth still feels she has a legitimate claim against the state for breach of procurement responsibilities, Olson said she would waive any time requirement to protest and allow her to proceed through the court.

"As a practical matter," Olson wrote. "I can tell you that this entire procurement has been thoroughly reviewed by both HSD and General Services Division and neither agency has found any defect in the RFP, evaluation criteria, or award which would suggest a change in the September 15, 1992 lease award to Mr. Elwell."

To coincide with the 60th Anniversary of the White Sands National Monument, planners are limiting the number of balloons to no more than 60.

## Health Department conducts statewide telephone survey

The New Mexico Department of Health will conduct a confidential statewide telephone survey during September and October on issues related to substance use and health.

According to a news release, the survey's purpose is to determine the need for substance abuse treatment services throughout the state.

Two thousand adult New Mexicans, randomly selected from all 33 counties, will be contacted for an interview, which will cover general health, AIDS, alcohol, tobacco and drug use and dependence.

"I would encourage people to respond to the telephone survey being conducted by the Department," said Geraldine Salazar, director of the Division of Substance Abuse.

"The information gathered from this survey will allow the department to better determine both the need for substance abuse treatment services and the allocation of funds to those programs and areas of the state most in need. This data is important for the future determination of service delivery benefiting our citizens.

The Substance Abuse Epidemiology Unit of the Department of Health, which is conducting the survey, has been involved in a number of research projects over the past two years to determine more accurately the level of substance use and abuse in New Mexico. The studies help assess the effectiveness and improve the quality of substance abuse treatment services.

# Late-night, high-speed chase lands fast-moving driver in local jail

A wild speed chase sent Ruidoso police, state police and sheriff's officers down main street, winding through back roads and finally ending in the middle of a pasture to capture a local man under the influence.

Nick Gonzales, 19, of Ruidoso, was arrested Wednesday for evading an officer, being a minor in possession of alcohol and two counts of speeding and reckless driving.

According to police reports, around midnight, Ruidoso officer Roxanne Pfeffer, using radar, clocked Gonzales driving a white 1984 GMC pickup at 56 mph in a 35 mph speed zone on Sudderth Drive near Arby's.

Instead of pulling over for Pfeffer's red light, Gonzales sped up to speeds of 65 mph approaching Midtown, a 30 mph zone.

Gonzales turned north on Country Club Drive and ran the stop

sign at North Street.

At that time, Officer Bill Heineken, sirens blaring, joined Pfeffer in the high speed pursuit.

Sgt. Bobby Barnes and officer Dwayne Gear set up a roadblock on Country Club Drive at Cree Meadows Drive, but Gonzales disregarded the stop sign and slipped through the roadblock, turning east on Cree Meadows Drive, still traveling at speeds of 60 mph.

Gonzales then ran another stop sign at Cree Meadows and Hull and raced north on Hull at speeds of 70 mph to Gavilan Canyon Road with police following.

Traveling north at high speeds on Gavilan Canyon Road, Gonzales forced one unidentified vehicle off the roadway.

Barnes and state police officer Sal Beltran set up another roadblock on Gavilan Canyon at Highway 48. Gonzales weaved through

that roadblock as well and continued north on Highway 48.

At that time, out of the Ruidoso area, Barnes advised all police units, with the exception of Pfeffer, to discontinue pursuit.

State police officer Beltran and Pfeffer, two county units, Bobby Angermiller and Trinidad Zepeda, continued the pursuit.

Gonzales then turned off Highway 48 into Alto Village, still maintaining excessive speeds.

Finally, Gonzales turned into a cul de sac area, where he had to leave the roadway into a brush area, but he managed to circle around, come back onto the roadway and surround himself with police units. He continued to evade police, racing through them at high speeds.

The chase continued for another three miles until the roadway ended. Gonzales then took a dirt

road across country.

Beltran and Angermiller continued to follow the vehicle. Pfeffer and Zepeda stopped on the roadway for a possible return.

A few minutes later, Beltran advised by radio that the vehicle had stopped and Gonzales was placed under arrest.

Pfeffer said Gonzales was stopped in the middle of a pasture. His pickup had a flat on the front right tire, probably caused from the bullet hole. Brush and tree limbs were broken off in the front grill.

Sierra Blanca Wrecker was called to impound the vehicle. Pfeffer transported Gonzales to the police department.

Gonzales told Pfeffer he had consumed a six-pack of beer earlier in the evening.

Additional charges were filed against Gonzales by county and state police.

# RHS Warriors face tough test against Tularosa Wildcats

The Ruidoso Warrior football team, coming off its first win of the year, should have another barn-burner Friday night as they travel to Tularosa for a 7:30 p.m. meeting with the Wildcats.

Currently ranked No. three in the AP Poll among AA schools, the Wildcats are 3-0 this season — soundly defeating Cloudcroft and Hatch in their first two games and beating Santa Rosa's single wing last week 6-0.

Last week, the Warriors beat

AAA rival New Mexico Military Institute, 13-8, in Roswell, to break into the win column. The Warriors have lost to AAA football's second and fourth-ranked teams, Artesia and Lovington.

Both Ruidoso and Tularosa are improved football teams in 1993.

The Warriors have gained some offensive prowess and the Wildcats are much better defensively.

That should be an interesting matchup in that Tularosa has not been scored on this season.

While last year's victory over the Wildcats was the only bright spot

for the Warriors, the Wildcats used that loss as motivation to challenge their AA rivals in the playoffs — losing to Eunice and Jal by only one touchdown.

Warrior head coach Mike Gaston expects that his young team will have their hands full Friday night.

"We're very concerned about them and we're going to have to get ready for them. This will be one of the few teams we go against that we're bigger and stronger ... but you can throw that out when rivalries get into it," said Gaston.

"They've got about eight kids

that play on both offense and defense and we're going to still try to do a two-platoon system so if everything goes well for us we'll have an advantage in the second half," said Gaston.

When asked to compare the Wildcats with last year, Gaston saw some similarities with the Warriors.

"They're just like us ... there's no comparison. They've got a sophomore quarterback that can throw the football well and they've got some real aggressive defensive

ends that played last year. Right now, they look like the team that ended the year last year that lost to Jal, 3-0," Gaston said.

Offensively, the Wildcats and the Warriors have similarities. They run a modified Wing-T just like Ruidoso. They prefer to run the ball, but have had some big plays while passing.

Defensively, the Warriors will face the "Split-six" for the third consecutive week ... which should help.

Lovington uses that defense and

the Institute surprised the Warriors a little by changing to it after Lovington's success.

The Warriors have won 10 of the last 14 meetings with Tularosa. But that statistic means nothing.

In 1990, the Warriors were beaten by Tularosa, and went on to smash its district 3-AAA opponents (losing the district championship because they had to forfeit a game they won, 55-14).

## High school athletes dream of college scholarships

I suppose that it is the dream of every high school athlete that they will someday get to play college ball — whatever shape that ball may be.

I don't know the statistics, but the chances of that ever happening are remote at best. It seems like about two percent of high school athletes go on to play college sports.

Size, strength and speed are too important these days. In football it takes someone over 6'1 and 200 pounds to catch a recruiter's eyes. In basketball, you better try about 6-5 — just to get a look.

Without question, a kid's best opportunity at college sports is golf or tennis. Those factors don't apply here.

You can hit a golf or tennis ball if you're 5'5" and weigh 125 or 5'10 and 165 like most graduating seniors.

All you have to do is work hard. It's a tragedy to me for kids that work so hard in the gym and weight room for the four years of high school, believing that they can make it, only to have their hopes crushed because they are too small or too slow.

I predict that in the decade of the nineties, Ruidoso High School will send at least 10 athletes to college on golf scholarships. That will average up to 20 percent of the varsity players — not bad.

It all boils down to money. College sports have to have gate receipts and TV money to operate. It's just impossible for sports like track, swimming, volleyball, golf and tennis to pay their way at the collegiate level.

That means that the football and basketball teams have got to carry the load — and win a lot of games.

That means coaches have to recruit the ab-

solute best athlete out there, whether they are interested in school or not. Those athletes' ambition lies in going pro, not a degree in business administration.

I suppose, in that light, one understands why it's important to win at the college level, but what about those non-revenue producing sports?

I use this week's Junior College golf tournament as an example. New Mexico Junior College has four of its top five golfers with home towns in Sweden or Canada. I can't for the life of me figure out why this is done.

Granted, most of these kids pay their own way to go to college (or at least their government does). But how many spots are available on a golf team? Does some deserving kid from Raton not get to play college golf because Oolf Johannsen plays at NMJC?

It's not fair and it needs to be changed. Two years ago NMJC recruited one player from New Mexico — Ruidoso's Nathan Baudo.

Last year Nate was the only New Mexican on the team. A junior college with one local kid. What is going on?

To its credit NMJC did a much better job this year.

The school got the second-best player in the state in Jason Carlyle (Clovis) and two other

good players from AAAA golf, Waid Hutchens (Goddard) and Wade Blevins (Clovis).

But we've still got more kids on the team from a foreign country than the old US, not to mention New Mexico.

If the Athletic Director at NMJC told the golf coach he's going to lose his job if he doesn't win golf tournaments, then the AD is the one who needs to get fired.

I use golf as an example, but there are many, many other examples. UTEP, a national track power, doesn't exactly recruit from Van Horn — unless it's Van Horn, Ethiopia.

My own school, New Mexico State, doesn't have one basketball player from New Mexico. Most are from Chicago, and most don't finish school. They use NMSU to get to the pro's like NMSU uses them to fill up the Pan American Center.

I can't help but think that the fathers of NCAA athletics are rolling over in their graves. Is this what they had in mind when they offered a free education for athletic endeavors?

My NCAA solution is simple, and you rabid sports fans will hate it. Simply allow schools to offer athletic scholarships only to legal residents of their respective states. UNM and NMSU can only pay for the educations of the kids from New Mexico. If any other kids want to play here, let them pay their own way.

I know, I know. Who could we beat? Similar conferences would have to be set up. I promise we could beat the Idaho's, the Nevada's, the Wyoming's, etc. It would be as exciting, it wouldn't be as big — but it would serve the purpose that it was intended to — giving an education to those want one and might not be able to afford it.

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# Capitan Tigers can't be tamed

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

### The Downs sets record with \$1,594,934 handle

Ruidoso Downs broke a New Mexico State handle record when a total of \$1,594,934 was wagered on the 12-race Labor Day program which included the 35th running of the Grade I \$2.2 million All American Futurity.

The record handle broke the previous mark set at the New Mexico State Fair in September 1989. It was also the largest handle in the 47-year history of Ruidoso Downs.

"We're obviously extremely pleased with the handle and attendance figures for the meet and we would like to thank all the racing fans for making 1993 a banner season," said general manager Max Johnson.

The overall weekend figures for the five raceday weekend exceeded all-time records. The total handle of \$4,591,569 was the most wagered on any Labor Day Weekend at the

mountaintop track.

The on track attendance of 10,130 on the holiday was the sixth highest in history.

The all-time record of 10,801 was set last summer.

Total attendance and handle for the 70-day race meeting were up considerably from last year's figures in nearly all categories.

The 9.5 percent increase in total handle was even more impressive

considering there were four fewer race days this year compared to 1992. Average total handle of \$540,109 was up nearly 16 percent while the on track average of \$321,176 per day showed a 5.2 percent increase.

Both average and total attendance were up and the 4,842 average per day increased 6 percent, while on-track average was down less than one percent.

### Future stars fall under the hammer at horse sale series over the Labor Day weekend in Glencoe

Ruidoso Horse Sales Company's All American Yearling Sale, Super Select Sale, and two other sessions held September 3-4, generated a large number of people looking for top prospects for the upcoming racing season.

Two hundred and fourteen horses were sold during the sale's four sessions including 67 horses from the Six G's Stables, Inc. dispersal and nine horses from the Quarter Horse Mixed Sale.

The Super Select Sale sold 72 horses and total sales were just over \$1.8 million. Eleven horses were repurchased and sales less repurchases were nearly \$1.55 million. This year's sales average less repurchases of \$25,369 is up from last year's sales average less repurchases of \$23,894.

This year's All American Ses-

ion's average sale price was \$11,369 which is up 64 percent from last year's average sale price of \$6,912.

The average sale price less repurchases of \$12,105 was up 83 percent from last year's average less repurchases of \$6,606. This year's All American Session sold 66 horses generating total sales of \$768,200. Seven horses were repurchased during the session and sales less repurchases were \$714,200.

The Six G's Stables dispersal sold 67 horses and its total sales were \$941,200. The average sale price was \$14,048. No horses were repurchased during the dispersal.

Nine horses were sold in the Quarter Horse Mixed Sale.

Total sales were \$426,500 and the session's average sale price was \$47,389. Sales less repurchases

were \$106,500 with three horses being repurchased. The average sale price less repurchases was \$17,750. The session was not held in 1992.

The highlight during the Quarter Horse Mixed Sale Session was the bidding for top stakes performer Royal Down Dash.

The First Down Dash filly won the Grade II West Texas Derby and also qualified to the 1992 Grade I All American Futurity. The bidding for the talented runner reached well into six figures with owner Victor Diaz eventually repurchasing her for \$200,000. The buy-back was a wise one for Diaz as Royal Down Dash went on to win the Grade I All American Derby one day later.

Two First Down Dash colts in the Super Select Sale each went for

\$90,000, the session's highest selling price. JW Champ out of Kellys Coffey was bought by Jacqueline Spencer from consignor Dorothy Boothe. Bob and Sandy Erwin purchased Quarter Back Dash out of Miss Flicka Te. Stern Ranches, Ltd. consigned the colt.

The Six G's Stables' session's top seller was Ima Ten Too by Hempen and Saucy Gal. The mare was purchased for \$60,000 by JY Ranches.

Whizevi was the most expensive horse sold in the All American Session at \$65,000. Bob and Sandy Erwin bought the Zevi colt out of Frisco Floopie from consignor Joe Shuttlesworth.

Outside of the Six G's Stables dispersal, the largest session was Joe Kirk Fulton who sold 10 horses. Jesus and Sandra Soto purchased the most horses with 10.

Post time changes to 1 p.m. beginning February 18 through closing day.

The Sunland Park meet is highlighted by the inaugural A.Q.H.A. Challenge Championship Day on November 21 and 22 which features the nation's finest older quarter horses running in five championship caliber races.


The Grade I West Texas and

# Feds stall Ruidoso Downs village hall project

The federal government can take the blame for a delay in starting construction on a new municipal building for the Village of Ruidoso Downs.

Mayer Joe Hayhurst reported Monday that the plans have been held up because of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA). Hayhurst said he'd learned that the plans will have to be slightly modified in several areas to meet the standards established in the ADA, a piece of federal legislation.

"Once the ADA releases the plans, we're on a roll," said municipal clerk Leean Weibrecht. Meanwhile, Ruidoso Downs continues to lease a modular building placed on the All American Park. The police and municipal offices both are in that building, but village officials and staff are looking forward to replacing village hall in its old location on U.S. Highway 70. Also Monday, the board approved a replat combining two lots into one in the Ruidoso Downs Club House Estates.

Vassar Thompson, on the agenda to speak to the board, wasn't at the meeting; but Ron Andrews, who wasn't on the agenda, was present to invite trustees to his motorcycle rally.

Andrews, owner and operator of the Golden Aspen Rally, passed out

patches and invited the board to visit his trade show anytime it's open this Wednesday through Saturday in the Ruidoso Civic Events Center.

Andrews said the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce sponsors hospitality night when everybody is admitted free, but for the trustees that free admission was extended through the entire rally.

Andrews made a point to invite Downs Police Chief Will Hoggard and his officers, too, handing Hoggard a stack of the rally patches to be given to Downs police.

Andrews said 8,900 people went through his trade show last year, adding that registration was already up by 10 percent. He expects to hit 10,000 visitors to his trade show this year. Admission to the show is \$5 each.

Thursday night cyclists will participate in a night light parade, and Saturday morning the big parade will line up at 9:30 a.m. and take off at 10.

Another feature of this year's rally is a stunt cyclist who will jump through a wall of fire on Friday and Saturday.

"Hopefully, we won't cause too much trouble in your town," said Andrews. "Except to spend money," he added.

Andrews said the motorcycles

will be gone by Sunday.

In other regular business, the board changed its October 11 meeting to 7 p.m. Friday, October 8, because the regular meeting date is an official holiday.

The board received copies of monthly departmental reports in Monday's agenda packet.

In the police report, Hoggard listed 14 arrests and 34 investigations for August. Arrests include three DUIs, one felony case, two misdemeanors, four juveniles and four court-ordered detoxifications.

Officers issued 52 traffic citations and recorded five accidents without injuries and one accident with injuries.

Downs police assisted the Ruidoso Police Department four times and the Sheriff's Department twice in August. Four ambulance calls were received and answered.

Under miscellaneous calls, the department listed, among its 28 calls, 11 general disturbances, 11 domestic disturbances, two bar fights, nine juvenile problems and one assault & battery.

Downs police recovered one vehicle in August.

Ruidoso Downs Volunteer Fire Department reported answering a call on Sunday, August 1. Six firefighters spent an hour and a

half at the fire on Highway 70.

Maintenance supervisor Dennis Riddle reported that his department purchased a 4X4 pickup for \$2,000 at the state auction. The board had approved the purchase.

He said all daily routines had been completed within the water, sewer and street departments and in the shop.

Riddle reported that his department had put down more than 80 tons of hot mix in its patching program. His staff also had been cutting weeds and trimming trees.

"The Water Department did an outstanding job this summer," said Riddle in his written report. "The water system is in better shape than it has been for several years thanks to a lot of hard work."

The animal control officer reported that he had handled 58 animals during August. In that number are 27 dogs boarded, 18 cats boarded and 13 dogs returned to owners. Six skunks and seven cattle were handled in August by the animal control officer.

The code enforcement officer, Tom Armstrong, supplied a list of violators that he has cited in Ruidoso Downs. He has achieved compliance in all but four cases, and is working with those four.

## Roadblocks set up

# Hummingbirds know when it's time to go south for the winter

Contrary to much of the advice hummingbird fans may have heard, keeping feeders out after summer doesn't endanger the birds, according to Betsy Rosenbaum at Bitter Lake National Wildlife Refuge.

"I've kept mine out, because hummingbirds still are migrating from points further north," she said.

Rosenbaum is an outdoor recreation planner with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and a member of

The Audubon Society.

"The birds you've been feeding in the summer may be gone, but others may be traveling through," she said. "We've had hummingbirds show up in Roswell as late as December."

"A lot of different advice has been offered. People are worried if they keep the feeders out, the birds will stay here too long and they'll get caught in the winter weather, or that they'll start migrating too late and all the food sources will be gone further south along their route."

The feeders fool the birds into thinking flowers still are blooming and they may misjudge the advance of fall, some bird enthusiasts contend.

But Rosenbaum said that advice doesn't take into account the birds' natural migrating instincts.

"They'll do it when they are ready whether or not feeders are still available," she said. "I'm not saying a few stragglers might not get caught, but generally, the majority will migrate when the time is right."



# Rodeo gets stamp of approval in Capitan

board agreed to pay for the athletic letter.

Saddle up ole Paint, Capitan's new rodeo team was approved by the district School Board last Thursday.

Proctor said rodeo scholarships are available at many colleges and universities throughout the United States.

Vocational agricultural teacher Todd Proctor will coach the group on his own time. The district will not be responsible for travel expenses. Parents will pay.

"Not only can a student gain local recognition but they can gain national recognition in high school, colleges and later in life," he told board members.

With board sanction, rodeo officially is recognized as a team sport at the school, open for students in grades nine through 12. Students will be excused from school when necessary to participate in sanctioned rodeos and will be allowed to make up missed school work.

In another matter, construction of the new Capitan middle school probably will begin in November and proceed through the winter.

"The New Mexico Activities Association has no problem with Capitan having a rodeo team, said high school principal Darrel Stierwalt.

Superintendent Diana Sonnamaker said bids on the project will be accepted through September 30 and an award is scheduled to be approved during a special meeting at 7:30 a.m. October 4.

"They favor any activity to keep kids involved with their own high school."

In another matter, the school board:

"We'd like to give students one more option to be competitive," Proctor said. In the past 15 years, several Capitan students have fared well at a state level, he said.

—accepted the resignation of Frank Sidwell as school custodian.

Stierwalt said most rodeos are scheduled on Saturdays, but occasionally, a student may have to leave on Friday.

—hired Gretchen Becker as a part-time speech pathologist. She cannot be brought on board as contractual service until she completes her master's degree, according to new state rules.

Proctor attached a mandatory minimum grade point average of 2.5 point for the grading period prior to the rodeo a student is entering. That's half a point higher than the two points required by the New Mexico Activities Association.

—asked Sonnamaker to study alternatives to the current access situation to parking and for buses in back of the schools. # Capitan board OKs annexation in spite of water worries

Concerns over Capitan's ability to serve water customers in the future didn't stop village trustees from voting unanimously Monday to annex about 26 acres.

Patricia Seymour, who had requested annexation for two tracts (number 66-67) totalling about 18 acres, told the trustees she had no intentions of subdividing the land and they could attached restriction to that effect.

A third tract (number 68) of about eight acres owned by an out-of-state resident, also was annexed. Otherwise, it would have been the only lot in Mesa Verde subdivision at the edge of town not within the city limits. The owner did not object.

Trustee Alfred Leroy Montes voted for approval, but not without some words of caution.

"Last year, we had to lease extra water rights to continue to serve our people and it may be a few years before we have a second source," Montes said. "There's a potential for 25 lots in that tract to be annexed. If we take it into the village, we have to come up with 25 (water) taps if they wanted. We should be more careful about what we bring into the village until we are sure we have the Bonito Lake source. We need to take care of what we have first."

"We do have alternatives," said Mayor Frank Warth. "We could cut off those customers outside the city limits."

Then Warth asked Montes, "Are these (three tracts) to be subdivided into 25 lots?"

"No, but they may someday," Montes answered. "We may not see it, but my children and grandchildren will be living here."

"We're opening 25 acres instead of the three or four they need for their home."

Dorothy Smith of the planning and zoning board reminded trustees that in the past her board has advised not to annex, but the trustees have ignored the recommendation. This time the planning board recommended annexation, based on several circumstances, including that Seymour had been careful to research whether city utilities were available on the land. She was given inaccurate information, Smith said.

Village attorney J. Robert Beauvais said no restrictive covenants are tied to the land, but the trustees could impose a restriction that the lots stay the same size and cannot be subdivided.

Even without that restriction, if the owner of the lots ever tried to subdivide, she would have to obtain approval from the trustees and it could be stopped at that point.

Warth said it should only take about six months to resolve a problem with the Eagle Creek pipeline.

"I think we're making real steps to correct the situation so we won't be leasing water rights again," he said.

Beauvais noted that the village has just entered a new five year cycle of water rights and trustees have years to reconcile the water problem.

"If we keep using more water, we may not make it to even three year this time (before additional water rights must be purchased)," Montes said. He added that by buying a larger water meter, up to eight units could be hooked up to one water tap and the village would have no control.

Warth said the amount of water used will be monitored closely.

Seymour assured the trustees, "We plan on having one mobile home on each tap and I don't mind if you place restrictions. We don't plan on subdividing."

She said the land currently has a total of three residential taps on two lots.

In another development issue, the board heard a request from Karen Kopp, director of the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County, for feedback on property or buildings owned by the village that might be available for

new businesses. She also asked about incentives the board might offer to lure businesses to Capitan.

"Our goal is to have this information by December 31," Kopp said. She has requested the same information from each municipality in the county, Kopp said.

Warth pointed out that without changes in the state's anti-donation law, villages aren't allowed to do much for private businesses.

"What could we offer?" Warth asked Kopp.

"Property taxes (breaks)," she said.

"Three quarters of the tax goes to the county," Warth said. "We only get 25 percent."

Leasing village owned land, which is not subject to property taxes, is one approach, Beauvais said.

"I guess I'd like to know if you guys even are open to incentives or you just want to see what business might be looking," Kopp said.

"And what their requirements are and out financial situation is at the time," Warth added.

"Why don't you guys discuss it and have Gordon Ross (who serves on the economic development board) get back to me," Kopp said. "I need to find out where each village stands so I have information at hand. I don't want to have to say that I have to check and get back to

them. "I want to know what you guys as a governing board feel about that."

In other business, the board of trustees:

—approved the replat of tract three in Mesa Verde subdivision to correct a construction error that resulting in a structure being built across a property line. The replat cures the encroachment.

—reappointed Trustee Gordon Ross to the Eagle Creek Water Board and David Rouleau to the Carrizozo-Capitan Gas Co.

—watched as village clerk Deborah Cummins swore in Tony Cano, formerly with the Deming Police Department and Western New Mexico University campus police, as the new village police chief.

—approved the terms of a lease for the Smokey Bear Museum to be operated by Teresa Engleking. Ross was assured the lease carried no restriction that would prevent Friends of Smokey from using Mrs. Engleking to take messages and perform some other duties for the non-profit organization.

The board will carry insurance on the building and Engleking will insure the inventory. Provisions for a 30-day cancellation and for rent abatement in case a roof blows off, the heating system breaks down or the building is unusable for some

other reason. —rejected unopened all bids to rent, lease or buy a building deeded to the village by the power company for \$9,450 several years ago. A previous offer was submitted for \$600 and rejected. The trustees decided to rebid, asking for purchase only, to give everyone a fair shot.

The board will set a minimum bid based on advice from local real estate agents. Appraisers contacted wanted \$1,000 to establish its value, Warth said. The building sits on two, 25-foot lots.

Trustee Gilbert Montoya said the village has been trying to sell the building for years. He initially was in favor of at least seeing what bids had been submitted, noting that all of them could be rejected.

—heard a report by Warth that the village's wetlands sewage treatment natural filtration system is installed and appears to be working.

"It's filling up and the plants are alive," Warth said. "And there are bugs living in the final treatment pond that don't live in dirty water."

The other Community Development Block Grant project, the installation of fire hydrants, also is going well. Terry Cox said his crew try to give residents advance notice if water is to be shut off, but a line was cut by accident in the Big Country subdivision.

# Tobacco is taboo for everyone at Capitan Tigers sports events

They listened politely to those who objected, but Capitan school officials were unmoved by the arguments to modify the new tobacco-free policy on district property.

School Board members last Thursday stuck to their decision to ban chewing tobacco and cigarettes from school buildings, school functions and on transportation vehicles.

During a workshop before the meeting began, member Russell Shearer briefly proposed a compromise by setting up an outside smoking area for sport fans.

But board member Jack King countered that by creating a smoking area, the board would be saying it was all right for adults to smoke. "I don't think that's consistent," he said.

During the regular meeting, John Paul Sedillo handed out a petition with 175 signatures collected in a two-week period from persons who oppose the tobacco-free policy.

A non-smoker, Sedillo said he

still objects to the board imposing regulations on adults attending outdoor sporting events. He checked the legal powers of the board and doesn't see any authority for that move, he said. He also had the impression that the board contends it can search on campus cars for tobacco.

"I found nothing in the powers and duties of the board to make rules and regulations for the public," he told board members. "The board has no authority to search me."

He contended that forcing school district employees to go outside the campus fence to smoke is humiliating to them.

"That's not the American way," Sedillo said. "I can see not smoking in buildings or the gymnasium, not in the open air."

Board President Tom Trost said the policy does not mention searching the general public or their cars.

"We're not imposing rules on the general public, we are governing the school district and its property, which is the first duty and power listed on the sheet," Trost said,

referring to one of the sheets Sedillo handed out listing board powers.

The section provides for the board to "supervise and control" the property.

"And that's what we did," Trost said. "The policy covers our property here only. We have that power, we're not stopping them from smoking elsewhere."

District Superintendent Diana Sonnemaker said that in 1989, 95 percent of the school districts in the country already had adopted similar policies.

The petition also criticized the board for lack of notice that the policy would be considered.

Trost pointed out that he brought up the policy one month before it was enacted and that The Ruidoso News published information about the policy in an advance story about the meeting.

Roy Baca, whose son plays football, said he smokes at home and his son will be exposed there.

"All these parents who smoke, their kids get it at home anyway," he said. "Now you're telling us not

to smoke. I'll do it for the school, but I believe you're wrong."

Shirley Sedillo pointed out since the policy says no tobacco products on campus, "What are you going to do, search us?"

"We do have the legal right to search students, their backpacks and cars, but not the parents," high school principal Darrel Stierwalt said.

Sedillo said parents are complying, but he has seen district staff members violating the policy.

"We'll address that with the staff, if that's the situation," Stierwalt said.

Frank Silva, who operates the school buses, said a smoke free policy already is in effect on the vehicles.

"We're not going to save the world with this policy," King said. "We're not going to stop all the kids and parents, just control our little piece of property here."

"We feel it's a bad example to allow students to use tobacco on campus. It's not right to tell students no and teachers yes. To be fair, we must be consistent."

Earlier during the workshop when Shearer proposed creating a smoking area, he said, "I'm a non-smoker, but I had the habit many years. If we are going to make it work, we may have to do certain things. We may have to amend it, although I understand why we did it this way."

"Is it our intent to ban smoking entirely or to protect students from a smoke atmosphere?"

"If we do the first, we do the second," Trost said.

"Could we set aside an area for smoking?" Shearer asked. "We could stick with (the policy) inside, but outside around the track and stadium, we could set aside an area. I want us to have a policy that's very enforceable. I realize it would be easier with an all out ban, but I'd like to have an area."

Trost responded, "I don't buy that."

"Our responsibility is to set an example. The Surgeon General has said whether it's firsthand or second hand, smoke is not healthy and we're trying to teach our kids to be healthy."

"We need to impress upon them that it's not good. The majority start smoking under the age of 19."

Shearer said when he was in high school there was a smoking ban, but that didn't stop students from smoking.

"I've been looking at the stands during the football game and the policy has been adhered to, but I'd like to see a person be able at half time to go to an area and smoke and not be illegal and not be infringing on someone else," he said.

"I think it is enforceable," King said. "I think it will take time to get used to."

"We have an obligation as parents. We want our children to be tobacco free. I think it is our obligation as a board to make the campus tobacco free, because we have to consider the health of students. We can't worry whether everyone will abide by the rules. It's legal for us to drink, but we don't allow parents to bring liquor on campus."

"They can go off campus to smoke. They may not like it, but they know it's right. I don't think we need to back down."

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# County's garbage gurus get a good deal on dumping fees

With little more than a whimper, Alamogordo officials agreed to grant solid waste partners in Lincoln County a dumping fee discount to offset their extra miles to a shared regional landfill.

Members of the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority were prepared Wednesday to argue for a differential of \$1.50 for each of the 22 miles between one of the first proposed landfill sites at Three Rivers and the final selection at Orogrande.

They were even willing to compromise the figure downward.

But that wasn't necessary. Bob Stockwell, city manager for Alamogordo, which will be responsible for managing the new landfill, told members the \$1.50 figure was just fine.

He said he was a bit confused about why the mileage was based on the difference between the Three

Rivers site and Orogrande, however.

"I'm probably beating a dead horse, but no one in the world could have gotten a landfill at Three Rivers, so I was wondering why we used that point," Stockwell said. If land had been purchased there, it would have cost a great deal more than the \$30,000 for a full tract bought from the State Public Lands office, he said.

County Commissioner Wilton Howell, a solid waste member, said it might be more appropriate to use the distance from Orogrande to Carrizozo, the Lincoln County seat many miles farther north than Three Rivers.

Ron Wicker, Ruidoso village manager and vice chairman of the authority, said the search for a regional landfill started with three sites all about the same distance from Ruidoso. When a site south of Alamogordo and much farther away was picked, Lincoln insisted on

some compensation, he said.

Authority attorney J. Robert Beauvais credited Lincoln County manager Andy Wynham with winning that concession from Otero authority members.

He said Wynham refused to budge on changing the site from the Three Rivers or Tularosa area. The differential was suggested as a compromise.

"Bob's right," Stockwell said, his memory jogged. "I was the one who suggested the differential."

That formula amounts to about a \$33 credit off the top of each load of garbage brought to the regional landfill by a Lincoln authority member. Each authority is comprised of the county and its municipalities.

Stockwell said the charge for dumping will be based on tonnage and not by the yard. He said he'd like to see the differential locked in for a reasonable period of time. But Lincoln members pointed out the

agreement specifies the differential will be reviewed annually.

In a related matter, Lincoln chairman Frank Warth congratulated Stockwell and Alamogordo city engineer Joe Moore for their good work in negotiating a contract for construction of a well at the landfill site.

Following the recommendation of Moore, authority members approved accepting a negotiated bid from Stewart Brothers Drilling Co. of Milan, New Mexico.

Moore pointed out that while both bids received were well in excess of the \$150,000 budgeted, he had down-scaled the project and brought the project cost to about \$166,577 using Stewart, which had submitted the lowest figure.

"Major modifications include elimination of pilot hole and associated items, and reduction of bore hole diameter from 16 inches to twelve and three quarters," Moore wrote in his memorandum to the

authority.

"In addition...we have requested they drill to a maximum depth of 1,000 feet. We believe a production well can be completed at this depth, and probably in the range of 600-800 feet."

That would save \$36,850 from the total price authorized of \$205,454, a decrease of \$122,743 from the original bid of \$328,197.

A storage tank also will be eliminated since a pond will be created by the contractor, said Lincoln authority manager Joe Lewandowski.

In other business, the authority:

—heard Stockwell explain that since neither Otero nor Lincoln entities own mineral rights that can be deeded to the state in exchange for those at the landfill site, private rights will have to be purchased.

The state cannot sell mineral rights on its land, but it can trade.

State officials don't want to risk that at some future date, a company would want to mine for sand or gravel under the garbage at the landfill.

—the next meeting of the authority was set for 2 p.m. September 30, at the recycling compound. Stockwell will bring the bids received on construction of the landfill. The bids will be opened September 23.

—heard that Beauvais still is waiting for documents from some authority members before they can approve an ordinance to pledge environmental gross receipts (sales) taxes to pay for landfill construction and startup costs.

Stockwell said the bond market continues to improve for the authorities and they probably will be able to shorten the period of payback from 15 to 13 years and still save \$50,000 a year in debt service.

# Ranchers get a one-year reprieve on increased grazing fees

Ranchers who graze their livestock on federal land may be given a one-year reprieve from higher grazing fees by the U.S. Congress.

By a vote of 59-40 Tuesday, the Senate passed an amendment by U.S. Senator Pete Domenici (R-New Mexico) that would prohibit the Clinton Administration from implementing its proposals to hike grazing fees by 130 percent and to change regulations affecting the traditional use of land in the rural West.

"Tonight's vote is a major victory for the small ranchers and townspeople who live in America's rural west," said Domenici in announcing the vote.

The Administration's proposed executive action went well beyond previous debates concerning just grazing fees. The Administration plan would have fundamentally altered life in the rural areas of the West.

"I am very pleased that the

Senate voted for a moratorium on the plan, and I hope we will be able to keep the moratorium in conference."

Domenici's amendment, which was co-sponsored by Senator Jeff Bingaman (D-New Mexico), would prohibit the Department of Interior from using any funds in the 1994 Interior Appropriations bill to carry out its executive order. The Administration's action is scheduled to go into effect on July 1, 1994.

The battle for the moratorium will be waged in conference committee, scheduled to meet over the next two weeks.

The committee is charged with resolving difference in bills passed by the House and Senate.

The House bill on Interior appropriations doesn't include Domenici's moratorium.

The senator has asked to be named to the conference committee and "will work from dawn to dusk

to get the job done," said his office spokesman Ari Fleischer.

"This is a very simple proposition," said Domenici in seeking support for his amendment during debate on the Senate floor.

"Are we going to let the executive branch of government, by executive order, not only raise grazing fees on American's permittees by 130 percent over the next three years, but in addition to that, the proposed policy changes will do many other things to change the relationship between ranching families in the West to their federal government.

"For decades, ranchers were responsible for improvements to their lands. If they aren't doing their job right, they were punished and penalized. But all of a sudden in a newfound interest in more government, these proposed rules will say the government will make these improvements. Now who

would believe that by executive order, you're going to do that to the ranching community of New Mexico, with their families and small communities dependent upon them."

Domenici also contended that people in the rural West already are being unfairly impacted by the proposed executive order.

As a result of the Administration's proposal, banks in the West are halting loans to ranchers, because the proposal has led to declines in the value of the permits ranchers use as collateral to secure loans, he said.

Domenici specifically cited the following provisions as being unfair:

—government assumption of future water rights, including title to irrigation improvements made by the rancher, which would mean that water based states like New Mexico would have extraordinary

difficulties in revising their water rights laws.

—government assumption of responsibilities and financing of new permanent range improvements, which has the effect of increasing significantly the size of the federal bureaucracy and the costs to American taxpayers of managing public lands.

—changing the present fee structure that channels fees collected from grazing permittee away from local communities for roads, schools and range improvements, and to Washington to cover federal administration costs.

—changing the scope and size of grazing advisory boards with the potential of complicating the use and management of federal lands.

—altering long-standing leasing arrangements that leave permittees with little financial or management flexibility.

Just last week, Domenici and 15

other senators deluged Interior Secretary Bruce Babbitt with letters requesting a 90-day extension on the public comment period on the proposed management reform for public lands leased to ranchers by the Bureau of Land Management/U.S. Forest Service.

Last month, the Administration unveiled its comprehensive set of reforms that would drastically change the federal regulation of the 170 million acres managed by the bureau and the 94 million acres controlled by the forest service.

Babbitt on Friday granted a 30-day extension to the comment period that ended Monday. Meanwhile, Domenici and Senator Harry Reid (D-Nevada) continued to work to gain support for the amendment to the appropriations bill for a one-year moratorium. Domenici contends the delay would give Congress time to debate and enact its own reforms.

# Tons of ticks turn up after the rainy season in Lincoln County area

The abundance of rain falling on Ruidoso not only produced plenty of water sources for wildlife and a bumper crop of spectacular wild flowers, it also fostered a healthy population of annoying ticks.

Dr. Mike English with the entomology department of New Mexico State University said the rain brings more rodents and deer into an area, and they bring ticks.

While humans may not appreciate the ticks' position in the eco-system, English said they do serve a purpose in nature. They constitute a food source for birds and some other predators. By spreading disease, they control mammal populations, killing the weak, he said.

"New Mexico doesn't have a lot of different types of ticks compared to other parts of the world," English said. "We have about 10-12 common types, including the brown dog tick."

Often people think they have found a mother and baby ticks

when they see a large tick on top and smaller ones underneath. But English said the small ticks are males and they are mating with the larger female tick, who may produce thousands of eggs in her one fling before dying.

Ticks may require one, two and three hosts to survive.

"Over a period of two years as they change from larvae to nymph to adult, some females will gorge, then drop to the ground, climb onto some brush and wait to catch another host, gorge and drop to the ground again to repeat the process before she lays her eggs (in the fall)," he said. The period of feeding grows from two days to as much as seven days.

The multiple host types are the most dangerous, because of the exposure to different blood sources.

Diseases that can affect humans include sleeping sickness, Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever, encephalitis and Lyme disease, although not many cases of the latter have been reported in New Mexico. "And the ones that have involved

people who have been back East," he said.

Although some dog owners are reporting problems with ticks this month, the pest is far more prevalent in the early spring or summer.

Ruidoso's dry and cooler climate tends to discourage heavy tick population development.

"But after a lot of rain, it's a good climate for rodents," English said.

With no eyes or ears, it's a wonder the tick can find a host. Scientists believe their sensory palps pick up tiny differences in temperature, that they are sensitive to chemicals such as carbon dioxide in exhaled air and that they respond to vibrations as an animal passes through the underbrush.

While waiting, they position themselves on a leaf or twig and wave their front pair of legs in the air. Once they find a host, they crawl until they find a comfortable spot and dig in.

Removing a tick that has begun to feed can be tricky, he said. Ticks

use a long, slim mouth covered with barbs, called a hypostome to drill a hole in the host's skin until its tip enters a blood vessel. Then it goes along for the ride, sucking up blood like drinking through a straw.


"There have been lots of stories about how to remove them, but the best method seems to be to use forceps or gloves. Raise the body to an upright position so the mouth is straight with the body and exert a constant pulling pressure until it comes loose," English said.

"Don't jerk or the mouth parts could be ripped off and become embedded. Then there's the possibility of an allergic reaction."

Tick parts embedded at the base of the skull of a child have been known to cause paralysis.

He advised that after the tick is removed from either a family pet or human, the wound should be cleaned with alcohol.

Prevention is one of the best ways to avoid possible side effects. Use a repellent when going into the woods or fields and routinely spray or powder your pets.



A member of the Arachnids, the Greek word for spider, ticks share the eight-leg trait of spiders. The photograph shows a highly magnified view of adult deer ticks. The female is at left and the male at right. A parasite, ticks don't kill their prey. They hitch a ride for a few days on an animal host. The major danger to humans from ticks is the spread of disease since most use multiple hosts as they transform from larvae to nymphs to adults. Dogs, cats, cattle and horses are among the 29 species of mammals that may be chosen for hosts, as well as 49 species of birds. In addition to spreading diseases such as Rocky Mountain spotted fever, Q fever, Texas cattle fever, sleeping sickness, Colorado tick fever, tularemia and Lyme disease, ticks may transfer parasites of their own to hosts.

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

### Remember money isn't everything

Putting material and situations into perspective can and is a difficult proposition.

I remember standing on the rim of the Grand Canyon. It really didn't appear very large. In fact, it looked flat and lacking third dimension. Looking at it, I could not perceive its massive size. On a later vacation, I took an excursion to the bottom of the canyon. Only then did I appreciate the awesome size of this natural creation.

There are many arenas that are simply too vast or powerful to perceive, the violent force present in an active volcano, the size of the universe, the depths and size of the worlds oceans, etc. Only those who experience these can perceive the

power or the vastness.

The future may hold a similar phenomena for the Lincoln National Forest area, the Monitored Retrievable Storage installation. No one would want to have a personal experience with the material parked there. It is very powerful and nasty stuff. Maybe, having worked with it in a laboratory setting, I can provide a little insight:

1. The power of the material: A piece the size of a grain of rice embedded in the carpet of a small home would deliver a fatal dose of radiation to all occupants, human, animal, and plants. The only survivors would be black cock-roaches.

2. The magnitude of the material: 15,000 to 20,000 tons. That's 30 to 40 million pounds

folks. That's the equivalent amount of Highly Radioactive material found in more than 100 Nuclear Power plants. Perspective—Chernobyl and Three Mile Island nuclear accidents released only a fraction of the radioactive material present in a single reactor. There will be more than 100 times this amount at the MRS. Is the money really worth this size risk? Common sense shouts a clear NO!

So, as best I can, I have stated the reality. However, if money is the only consideration, may I make a suggestion, clear-cut the entire Lincoln National Forest. That idea is not nearly as off the wall as siting an MRS.

# Hospital volunteers donate thousands of hours at LCMC

Lincoln County Medical Center administrator Valerie Miller told hospital auxiliary members Tuesday that she often brags about their accomplishments.

The auxiliaries, gathered at the Tepee Lounge at Ruidoso High School to install its new officers, gives her plenty to brag about.

Outgoing president Nellie Ruth Jones reported that the board of the non-profit all-volunteer group had just approved purchasing \$116,100 on hospital equipment including refurbishing some rooms at a cost of \$28,000.

Just this year, the auxiliary expanded its services to assist in the hospital labs.

Next year the volunteers are starting a program called Silver Spoon where volunteers will be trained to feed patients who need some help.

Jones said 18 new members went through orientation this year.

"It has truly been an honor to serve," said Jones before passing the gavel to the incoming president Charline Jones.

The new President Jones will have her hands full keeping up with the former President Jones who was given a standing ovation by the group of about 50 members and guests.

Dorothy Stirling of Las Cruces was present to install Jones and her board. She compared their tasks to a game of golf, and wished them well as they "tee off" for the new year.

Dorothy King will serve as vice president, Greta Cabot as secretary and Al Guzeika.

Administrator Miller had more words of praise for the volunteers who support the hospital she leads.

Miller said she was at a national hospital administrators' workshop recently and relayed the statistics of this group's donations and accomplishments to a group of big city healthcare executives.

"They just dropped their teeth," said Miller, adding that these people who lead much larger hospitals wanted to know the secret of the LCMC auxiliary's success.

She told them of a group of people who are committed to seeing that their community hospital stays open. Miller said that in rural American hospital have a lot of support from the people they serve.

The hospital staff thanked Nellie Ruth Jones for her year of service and presented her with a Name bowl.

## Hotbugs headed for Smithsonian

Hope Dickens, eight, and Traci and Marlo Maroon, ages 11 and 11, had the unusual experience of collecting "hotbugs" in the Rio Bonito near Lincoln.

Hope is the daughter of Karen and Giddings Brown, managers of Wortley Hotel and Restaurant in historic Lincoln. Traci and Marlo are the daughters of Cindy and John Foglesong, country western entertainers in Capitan.

The three girls collected hotbugs under the guidance of Milton Sanderson, biologist and specialist on aquatic insects.

Also known as creeping waterbugs, the bugs are one quarter of an inch long, flattened, and crawl

about over rocks and pebbles in shallow riffles in streams in search of other insects on which they feed.

The girls collected samples of these bugs by holding a waternet in the stream and tumbling rocks upstream so the dislodged bugs would float into the net. The contents of the net were dumped into a large flat baking pan.

The bugs were picked up with tweezers or forceps and dropped into preserving alcohol in a small jar. These bugs are unusual in that most kinds spend their entire lives under water so are seldom seen unless they are searched for.

They breathe by securing oxygen through a thin layer of hairs and a flattened air bubble on the underside of the body. Their bite feels much like that of holding a match

to the skin. It may be painful for a few minutes but it is not dangerous.

These may be the first bugs of their kind ever taken in the Rio Bonito. Eventually the collection of bugs will be presented to the Smithsonian Institution in Washington D.C. where it will become part of their research collection.

This collection will include the girls' names as collectors and such important information as New Mexico, Lincoln County, Rio Bonito, and the date of collection.

This is a unique experience for these three girls. They can be proud that their collection of hotbugs will remain forever in the nation's largest collection of insects.



AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE ADOPTING AND EXECUTION OF A JOINT POWERS AGREEMENT, THE RATIFICATION OF AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF ALAMOGORDO, NEW MEXICO, AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF THE CITY OF ALAMOGORDO OTERO/LINCOLN COUNTY JPA ENVIRONMENTAL SERVICES GROSS RECEIPTS TAX REVENUE BONDS, SERIES 1993 B, IN THE PRINCIPAL AMOUNT OF \$ FOR THE PURPOSE OF ACQUIRING, CONSTRUCTING, ENLARGING, BETTERING, REPAIRING OR OTHERWISE IMPROVING OR MAINTAINING SOLID WASTE DISPOSAL EQUIPMENT, EQUIPMENT FOR OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE OF SANITARY LANDFILLS, SANITARY LANDFILLS, SOLID WASTE FACILITIES OR ANY COMBINATION OF THE FOREGOING, ALL AT THE OTERO/LINCOLN COUNTY REGIONAL LANDFILL LOCATED NEAR ORO GRANDE IN OTERO COUNTY, NEW MEXICO, PLEDGING THE MUNICIPAL ENVIRONMENTAL SERVICES GROSS RECEIPTS TAX DISTRIBUTED TO THE VILLAGE OF CAPITAN AS AUTHORIZED BY (SECTIONS 7-19B-1 THROUGH 7-19B-7 NMSA 1978), PROVIDING FOR THE DISPOSITION OF THE REVENUES DERIVED FROM SAID TAXES PRESCRIBING OTHER DETAILS CONCERNING SAID JOINT POWERS AGREEMENT, SAID BOND ORDINANCE AND SAID TAXES; RATIFYING ACTION

PREVIOUSLY TAKEN IN CONNECTION THEREWITH; AND REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HERewith.

The following is a general summary of the subject matter contained in such Ordinance.

The preambles recite that the Village of Capitan (the "Village") is a municipal corporation of the State of New Mexico; that the Village, along with the City of Alamogordo, the Town of Carrizozo, the Village of Cloudcroft, the Village of Corona, the Village of Ruidoso, and the Village of Ruidoso Downs, (collectively, the "Municipalities") currently impose an environmental gross receipts tax of 1/8th of 1%; and that such

environmental gross receipts tax has been dedicated to the acquisition, construction, operation and maintenance of solid waste facilities and related facilities; that the Municipalities and the Counties (together, the Participants") will enter into a "Joint Powers Agreement for the Financing and Establishment of the Otero/Lincoln County Regional Landfill" to exercise common solid waste disposal powers pursuant to Sections 11-1-1 through 11-1-7, NMSA 1878; that the City of Alamogordo, New Mexico ("Alamogordo") will acquire a solid waste facility (including facilities already acquired by Alamogordo) to be known as the Otero/Lincoln County Regional Landfill (the "Facility") on behalf of the Participants by issuing the "City of Alamogordo Otero/Lincoln County JPA Environmental Services Gross Receipts Tax Revenue Bonds, Series 1993B (the "Bonds"); that each Participant will pledge the revenues received from its environmental gross receipts tax (the "Pledged Tax Revenues") to the payment of the Bonds; that Alamogordo also will pledge the Net Revenues from operation of the Facility to payment of the Bonds; that the Bonds constitute a first lien on the Pledge Tax Revenues and the Net Revenues; that the Participants, acting through the existing Otero or Lincoln County Solid Waste Authorities, will have joint ownership of the Facility; and declares an emergency.

Sections 1 through 4 ratify previous action by the Board of officers of the Village; authorize the Facility; ratify the Joint Powers Agreement previously approved and executed by the Village and ratify the Bond Ordinance previously adopted by Alamogordo to authorize issuance of the Bonds.

Sections 5 sets forth the pledge by the Village of its 1/16th of 1% environmental service gross receipts tax (the "GRT Tax"), requires that the Village make monthly deposits of the GRT Tax, immediately upon receipt, into a separate fund of the Village designated as the "City of Alamogordo Otero/Lincoln County JPA Environmental Services Gross Receipts Tax, Village of Capitan Income Fund," and requires the Village to transfer all amounts in such fund monthly to Alamogordo for deposit into a separate fund to be used as described in the Bond Ordinance.

Sections 6 and 7 ratify Alamogordo's pledge of the Net Revenues of the Facility to the payment of the bonds and acknowledge that the Bonds constitute an irrevocable and first lien (but not necessarily an exclusively first lien) on the Village's Pledge Tax Revenues.

Section 8 and 9 acknowledge that the term of the Joint Powers Agreement is perpetual and that any withdrawal from the Joint Powers Agreement by the Village does not affect the Village's obligations, financial or otherwise, under the Joint Powers Agreement and provide for the exclusion of the Village from participation and ownership of the

Facility of the Village fails to approve the Ordinance by the majority required for adoption of emergency ordinances.

Section 10 through 15 delegate certain powers to Village officers, provide separability and repealer clauses, provide an irrepealability clause, provide for an effective date and provide a summary for publication.





### HOW TO READ THE FOOD GUIDE PYRAMID



Reducing saturated fat, cholesterol and alcohol, while increasing dietary fiber and reducing body weight, is the goal for healthy living.

Starting at the base of the Pyramid, most foods should be eaten daily from this group. The groups above that

represent, in order, how much should be eaten to form a daily nutritious diet.

The Food Guide Pyramid is a summary of what to eat each day. It is not a rigid prescription, but a general guideline that helps you design a healthful diet that's right for you and your family.

## START WITH THE BASIC FACTS

**Cholesterol.** Dietary cholesterol is present only in foods of animal origin, like meats, poultry, seafood, butter, milk, eggs, cheese, ice cream and lard. Vegetable oils, margarine made from vegetable fat, fruits and vegetables *do not* contain cholesterol. *Some* cholesterol is needed for bodily functions like, the building of cell membranes and the production of hormones. Therefore, all cholesterol is not bad (*serum cholesterol*). It just needs to be controlled and consumed at an acceptable level. This level should be determined by you and your doctor.

**Fats.** There are two main types of fat: saturated and unsaturated. Although it is recommended that we do not consume excessive amounts of any kind of fat, we especially need to control the amount of saturated fat in our diet. Saturated fat is often solid at room temperature: lard, solid vegetable shortening or butter.

*Tropical oils* (coconut oil, palm kernel oil and palm oil) usually found in commercial baked goods, non-dairy creamers and non-dairy whipped toppings, are heavily saturated and should be avoided whenever possible.

**Sodium** is a mineral essential for bodily functions. However, in our daily diets we usually consume too much sodium. Sodium is naturally present in most foods and water. But, some foods have a significant amount of salt (very high in sodium) and added ingredients that contain sodium.

**Dietary Fiber** is divided into two categories, soluble fiber and insoluble fiber. The first, soluble fiber, may reduce serum cholesterol levels. Some research has shown oat bran, whole oats, dried beans, apples and carrots are a good example of this.

Other research has shown the soluble fiber in fruits and vegetables to be effective in controlling blood sugar levels in some people.

Insoluble fiber adds bulk to the diet and accelerates the movement of food through the digestive system. It is found primarily in whole grains, wheat bran and vegetables, and may reduce the risk of developing intestinal disorders. As a rule, all foods in the plant category (vegetables, fruits, whole grains) contain dietary fiber.

It is important to know that too high an intake of dietary fiber may result in decreased absorption of important minerals from foods, and could adversely affect your health. Check with your doctor for recommended amounts that are right for you.

**Sweets and Alcohol.** Because sweets and alcohol provide few nutrients and are high in calories, they should be used sparingly.

**PLEASE NOTE:** Recipe analysis provided in this book are not appropriate diabetic exchanges.

Also, portion sizes should be reduced by one half for children under 6.

Many baked goods, such as cakes and muffins, which are a part of this group, are high in fat and are not the best choices in this food group.

When selecting and preparing pasta and rice, stay clear of high-fat, pre-packaged varieties with cream sauces. A better selection would be whole-wheat pasta and brown or wild rice.

Look for ready-to-eat cereals that are low in fat (no coconut or palm kernel oils), and high in fiber. Use the "Rule of Three" for ready-to-eat cereals:

- No less than 3 grams of fiber per serving.
- No more than 3 grams of fat per serving.
- No more than 3 grams of simple sugar per serving.
- No more than 300 milligrams of sodium per serving

**It may seem like 6 to 11 servings is a lot to eat in one day, but this can be achieved more easily than you think. Here is a sample menu, which illustrates how to reach the serving recommendations for you and your family.**

Breakfast: A bowl of whole-grain cereal and toast. **2 servings**

## Weatherschool

The Weatherschool curriculum is endorsed by the National Education Association, the Council on Children's Television and Media and by the New Mexico Superintendent of Schools for our commitment to this project.

When selecting canned tuna, be sure to choose the varieties packed in water, not oil.

**Q.** Is pizza fattening?

**A.** Pizza can be a very nutritious meal, especially if you make it yourself. Just be careful of which toppings you choose.

**A good base for a healthy pizza is to start with a whole-grain pizza dough.**

**When selecting cheese, choose lowfat reduced-calorie varieties.**

**Add plenty of fresh vegetables like broccoli, mushrooms, tomatoes, green or red peppers, onions or spinach.**

**If you choose to use meats, use sparingly.**

**Selection and Preparation**


Always choose the freshest vegetables. Don't buy produce in large amounts or store for long

periods of time. One week is probably the maximum storage time, except for root vegetables. Store potatoes, hard shelled squash and onions in a cool, dry place. Most vegetables should be refrigerated in plastic bags to maintain freshness.

Wash all vegetables thoroughly to remove pesticide residue. Eat vegetables raw and unpeeled, for maximum nutritional value.

Steaming, stir-frying, baking or microwaving are the healthiest ways to cook vegetables.

Remember the three **R's** for nutrient conservation when cooking vegetables: **Reduce** the amount of cooking water; **Reduce** cooking time - cook vegetables "al-dente"; **Reduce** trimming of leaves and stalks.

Vegetables are full of vitamins and minerals, low in calories and an important source of dietary fiber. Because vegetables differ in their nutrient content, it is important to include a variety in your daily diet.

Dark, leafy vegetables provide vitamins A and C, B vitamins and calcium. Carrots, sweet potatoes and other red and dark green vegetables provide beta-carotene as well.

Vegetables make an excellent entrée choice. Try making a vegetable dish the main course of your meal. Some easy dishes to prepare are: vegetarian lasagna, fresh vegetable stew, ratatouille or a simple vegetable stir fry.

Serve a variety of vegetables to your family and set an example for everyone. By experimenting and trying new produce, you may come across some vegetables you had previously overlooked.

### Fruit Group

2 to 4 servings per day

*Adults and children over 6, one serving equals:*

- 1 medium apple, banana or orange
- 1/2 cup fresh cooked or canned fruit
- 1/4 cup dried fruit
- 3/4 cup fruit juice

*Servings for children under 6 are approximately 1/2 the amount.*

#### Selection and Storage:

When choosing fruit, select the freshest fruit possible. Select firm,

un-bruised fruit, avoiding over-ripe items. Many fruits can be further ripened at home. Ripen fruits at room temperature and then refrigerate. Shop frequently and use fruits as quickly as possible. Avoid buying pre-cut fruits, which lose freshness very quickly. It is very important to thoroughly wash all fruit before eating.

Fruit juice can substitute for a fresh fruit serving. If not freshly squeezed, be sure to select 100% fruit juice and juices with pulp, for increased fiber content.

Juice drinks, punches and juice blends usually contain little fruit juice, with water and sweeteners as the main ingredients. Carefully read the labels when selecting these items.



### JOLLY GOOD GELATIN



- 1 packet unflavored gelatin\*
- 1 cup grape or apple juice concentrate, thawed
- 1 cup boiling water
- 2 cups sliced or diced fruit

In a medium bowl, sprinkle gelatin onto the concentrated juice. Let stand for 1 minute; stir. Wait at least 1 minute and add boiling water. Stir mixture about 5 minutes. Pour over fruit in a bowl or mold. Cover and refrigerate overnight. Makes 3 (1 cup) servings.


Fruits are full of essential vitamins and minerals, like vitamins A, C, potassium, phosphorous, niacin, thiamin and iron. Fruits are low in fat, and rich in fiber.

Vitamin C-rich fruits, like oranges, grapefruits, tangerines, strawberries or cantaloupe, should be eaten at least once a day. Vitamin A-rich fruits include apricots, cantaloupes, peaches, nectarines and mangoes. Try to eat several of these a week. Dietary fiber is most

abundant in apples, kiwi, pears, strawberries, raspberries, figs and prunes.

Whole fruit is more filling than fruit juices. You should always have fresh fruits washed and ready-to-eat, for in-between mealtime snacks.

Most dried fruits are high in fiber, iron and potassium, but contain added sugars and sulfites, a preservative which can cause an allergic reaction in some people.





### Milk, Yogurt & Cheese Group

2 to 3 servings per day

**Adults and children over 6, one serving equals:**

- 1 cup milk or yogurt
- 1-1/2 ounces natural cheese
- 2 ounces processed cheese

*Servings for children under 6 are approximately 1/2 the amount.*

#### Selection and Storage:

Make sure you check the expiration dates on all dairy products. Don't buy dairy products with a past due, or even close to past due, expiration

date. Store milk in the coldest part of the refrigerator, not in the door, which is constantly exposed to warmer air.

Choose lowfat milk for adults and children over two. Skim milk or 2% milk contains less fat than whole milk, but will supply the necessary nutrients, while reducing fat and cholesterol intake.

Choose natural cheeses more often than processed cheeses, which contain more sodium and cholesterol. Also, select part-skim, reduced-calorie or lowfat cheeses, whenever possible.

When buying yogurt, select a nonfat variety. Be aware that fruit-flavored yogurts are higher in calories and contain sugars as sweeteners. Plain yogurt also makes a good substitute in recipes, instead of sour cream.



### HOT DOG! IT'S MACARONI



- 1 cup corkscrew or elbow macaroni
- 2 lowfat turkey franks, cut into bite-size pieces
- 8 oz. reduced-fat American cheese, in pieces
- 1-1/2 cups frozen peas or mixed vegetables

Milk and dairy products are a very important part of the daily diet, because they are the primary source of calcium. They also provide protein, phosphorus, magnesium, vitamins A and D, B vitamins, niacin and riboflavin.

An adequate intake of calcium-rich food aids in the growth of teeth and bones. Calcium also helps protect against osteoporosis, or brittle bones.

Cheese is also high in protein and calcium. But, most cheeses have the disadvantage of high sodium and added ingredients that contain sodium. This is especially true for processed cheeses and cheese spreads. Try instead, the lower-fat and lower-calorie varieties, and limit your intake.

Some products to avoid in this group include non-dairy creamers (powdered or liquid), unless made with polyunsaturated oils.







This group supplies proteins, as well as B vitamins (niacin, thiamin and B<sub>12</sub>), iron (especially red meat), and other minerals (zinc, phosphorous).

Very careful selection of food in this group is important, because some meats have high levels of cholesterol and saturated fats. Consider serving more "meatless" meals and selecting lower fat foods.

Meats graded "prime" are higher in fat than the same cuts labeled "select" or "choice." Some items, like luncheon meats or canned tuna, may be high in sodium, but lower-salt varieties are often available.

Generally, we eat far more protein than our bodies need each day. To remain full and satisfied, choose additional daily calories from fiber-rich food groups like fruits, vegetables and bread.

Store in freezer if you want them to keep for longer periods of time. Fresh foods properly cleaned and carefully wrapped will result in better food upon thawing.

When cooking dry beans, be sure to rinse and drain thoroughly. Remove any foreign particles that may have been missed in processing. Canned beans may be used as a quick substitution for dry beans. Be sure to rinse beans to lower the salt content.

Eggs yolks are high in cholesterol. Use only one yolk per person in egg dishes. Make larger portions by adding extra egg whites.
