MRS studied by lawmakers

Whether or not to store high level nuclear waste in New Mexico will be at the center of discussions from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. Friday, September 24, at the Inn of the Mountain Gods.

Fred Peso, a member of the Mescalero Tribal Council and head of the MRS project, reported last week to one state legislative committee, and he'll get a chance to talk to another group of lawmakers this Friday.

When the Radioactive and Hazardous Materials Committee meets at the Inn of the Mountain Gods Friday, its members will hear a report on the Monitored Retrievable Storage (MRS) facility being studied by Mescalero.

The legislators also will hear from opponents of that high level nuclear waste storage system.

Peso is scheduled to report right after 10 a.m. on the Mescalero site study that could lead to storing spent fuel rods on the reservation.

Concerns will then be raised beginning at 11 a.m. when Ruidoso resident Connie Kumler of Kumler and Walters Consulting and Information Services is scheduled to speak.

The meeting is open to the public.

Members of the public also will have a chance on Saturday and Sunday to see what spent fuel rods look like. The MRS Information Center will be open from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. Saturday and Sunday.

A spent fuel truck transportation cask will be provided by the Department of Energy for outdoor display, and technical experts will be on hand to answer questions.

Last week Peso reported to the Indian Affairs Committee that the Tribal Council had commissioned a trial showing that four out of five New Mexicans believe elected officials should be working with the tribe to see if a satisfactory agreement can be reached.

"And two-thirds believe we have the right to be studying the MRS," said Peso.

"We expect an attempt to be made during the next few weeks to torpedo the MRS siting process in

Congress," said Peso. That process was one where the Department of Energy would find a volunteer to host high-level spent fuel rods from this nation's many nuclear power plants. That volunteer would be eligible for millions in federal funds to be used for any number of economic development projects.

The Mescalero Apache Indian tribe has stayed one step ahead of every other group that has expressed an interest in storing the nuclear waste. The tribe, currently working on a Phase 2B grant, is still ahead of other potential MRS sites.

Since the new administration took office in Washington D.C., it has been unclear if the Nuclear Waste Negotiator and his office will continue its search for volunteer sites. Richard Stallings has been nominated to serve as nuclear waste negotiator, but he hasn't yet been confirmed.

Peso and MRS public information officer Miller Hudson are concerned that this waiting period will be the time when opponents will attack the MRS process.


"Two opportunities present themselves to opponents," said Peso. "They may try and quietly remove funding or create insurmountable hurdles through amendments to the DOE's appropriations bill or they may simply try and block the confirmation of Dick Stallings as nuclear waste negotiator."

"In other words, opponents will attempt to reverse congressional policy and ask Congress to break its work to the tribes that responded to the U.S. government's invitation to study the MRS," said Peso. He's heading to Washington to shine a spotlight on the MRS question.

Peso said he'll make sure that the tribe's invitation to participate is not withdrawn as part of some backroom deal.

"If this process is abandoned anyway, we want those responsible to justify their actions to the American people," said Peso. "The

Fewer rally riders roar in for weekend

Ruidoso taxpayers coughed up about \$4,000 for extra village protection during the Golden Aspen Motorcycle Rally, according to police chief Dick Swenor.

The extra show of enforcement helped provide a second straight year without the type of violence that marred the 1991 rally.

According to Swenor, during the four-day period, Thursday through Sunday, the police personnel accumulated a total of 272.25 hours of scheduled overtime, which translates to about \$4,000 in compensation. It does not include another \$1,560 in per diem costs for additional New Mexico State Police officers to assist with the rally.

Swenor said that during that period, police affected 38 total arrests ranging from six DWIs, 16 arrests for drinking in public, and seven motor vehicle accidents without injuries in the village limits.

Swenor said that police counts reflected 3,700 to 4,000 bikes on Saturday, with overall population increase to the village of 10,000 to 12,000 persons.

The count was considerably lower than the 10,000 bikers the

promoter had expected and Swenor said he thought the bike count was down from last year.

He said no major problems materialized, but considerable police effort was expended to control and supervise a potential confrontation between two motorcycle groups known as the Dirty Dozen and the Huns, on Saturday through early Sunday.

In a carefully worded memo to the village, the chief said, although crime was present, it wasn't all that bad.

"Overall, from a public safety view, the Golden Aspen Rally period was essentially quiet and without major incident or crime," Swenor wrote.

He wrote that letters of commendation are being sent to officers and agencies that provided public safety assistance for the rally. He said their assistance was invaluable.

Swenor's report did not include the Sheriff's department costs. Sheriff James McSwane's highly profiled roadblocks leading into the community were credited for preventing the more unsavory bikers from entering Ruidoso.

Lawmen named in suit

A Hondo Valley woman has filed a federal lawsuit against the state police and local sheriff's department for \$600,000, alleging her civil rights were violated last October during a massive drug raid.

Diana Vazquez contends in the suit filed Friday in U.S. District Court in Albuquerque that three state police officers, wearing ski masks and camouflage clothing, "terrorized" her family for more than one hour as they conducted a search of her home without identifying themselves.

"It was not until they completed their search did they identify themselves as New Mexico state police officers and informed the plaintiffs that they had the wrong residence," she stated.

A previous suit filed by Vazquez in the Twelfth Judicial District Court by Ruidoso attorney Gary Mitchell was dismissed without prejudice.

Vazquez also is suing on behalf of her children Leticia Vazquez, Chriselda Acosta and Saul Acosta. Named as defendants are three unidentified New Mexico state police officers, the state police agency, the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department and Deputy Sheriff Paul Wersich.

In her suit, Vazquez stated that about 6 p.m. on October 9, she saw two men in dark clothing wearing ski masks in her yard running toward her house carrying military type weapons.

She feared for the safety of her children and was attempting to protect them when she alleges the following actions occurred:

- the officers assaulted family members
- they performed an illegal search of the house
- they pointed firearms at family members
- they falsely arrested and jailed some family members
- they defamed the good character

Dumpster detail makes progress

He knows, he knows, he knows. Some dumpsters still need to be repaired, painted or to have new lids installed.

But Joe Lewandowski, general manager of the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority, told *The Ruidoso News* this week that he's proud of the staff's record since he was hired in mid-June.

"By putting together a new system here at the recycling yard and reassigning employees, we've been able to repair three hundred plus dumpsters," Lewandowski said Monday.

"That's more than the village of Ruidoso (which operated the service in town before the authority took over) and the authority repaired in five years."

He noted some of the dumpsters have been in use without being repaired for 15 to 18 years. About 2,500 dumpsters are placed throughout the county, he said. His first priority has been to repair rotted bottoms.

With the service intensive summer season winding down, additional employees will be directed toward the repair program, Lewandowski said.

"I've had two people everyday cleaning up around dumpsters, doing the bear runs and setting containers back up that have been knocked over," he said. "Within the next 30 days, they will be cut loose a few days a week to help."

"We could do them all in 15 days if we hired 15 more people, but this way, we're doing it for under the budgeted amount, because we're doing it ourselves with existing staff."

But he's not promising every dumpster will be handled by a deadline, nor is he playing politics by replacing or repairing those near the homes of authority or village officials.

"We have a list and we handle them in order, except if some sort of emergency comes up," Lewandowski said.

He discovered early on the job that most of the damaged dump-

sters could be repaired and put back into service. Previously, many had been junked and new ones were purchased to replace them.

Even though the authority has been picking up new commercial customers as the private firm, Southwest Disposal, has backed out of the area, Lewandowski said, "We're trying to use what we have in stock."

"I've cut \$10,000 in budgeted new dumpsters. We can repair three or four for the cost of buying one new container."

"We do mass production here. On Monday morning, we have a line up so that once the paint gun is ready, we can run through 30 to 40 at a time, instead of taking two to three hours on one."

Before painting, the dumpsters have been steam cleaned, sanded and welded by staff.

"Before, they didn't have a container man, but now we have a welder and that has freed up the mechanic to do the trucks," he said.

Warriors blamed for vandalism

Somebody trashed the Tularosa school's athletic dressing room on the same night the Ruidoso Warriors beat Tularosa on the football field by 17-14.

Opinions differ concerning that September 17 locker room incident, which resulted in damage to the newly remodeled Wildcat facility, but Ruidoso football players apparently are prime suspects.

Although Tularosa officials didn't go on the record blaming the Ruidoso athletes who showered in the facility, they were concerned enough to call for a meeting with Ruidoso school officials.

The damage to the locker room apparently occurred while the game was in progress or shortly thereafter when the teams had gone to the showers.

Pam Miller, Tularosa athletic director, confirmed that damage was done in the locker room.

"It was enough damage that it was brought to the attention of the superintendents of both schools. We don't want it broadcast; it will be handled between the two schools," Miller said.

Ruidoso school officials were called late Friday night and asked to appear in the Tularosa locker room by 10 a.m. Saturday, September 18, where they were met by the Tularosa School Board, athletic director and the superintendent of schools.

Ruidoso head football coach Mike Gaston said his athletes didn't damage anything, and Ruidoso Superintendent Mike Gladden stood firmly behind the Ruidoso players.

Gladden said that as a guest in the facility, he felt responsible to work with the Tularosa schools to remedy the situation. But, after meeting with Gaston, neither he nor principal Don Weems believed the Ruidoso students caused any damage.

"The part I was concerned about was the dings (in the doors)," said Gladden. "We've had such a great reputation as athletes; we work as a team," he added.

Tularosa's 40-year-old athletic department was remodeled this year, and, according to Tularosa officials, a major part of the damage was to the shower walls, stalls and lockers and looked as if it had been done by kicking and punching.

"As reported by the Ruidoso coaches, our players are/were supervised at all times and no athlete was out of control," said Gladden in a press release.

"Prior to leaving the field house, the coaches made a final inspection and asked the Tularosa custodian if there were other areas to be addressed. All agreed the locker room was fine and the team returned to Ruidoso, the release continued.

"Later, that night, I was informed there was damage to the locker room.

"I have spoken to the football coaching staff and athletes and am not convinced that this damage was done by our students," concluded the release.

"I don't want anything to be of detriment to the spirit of the two schools," added Gladden. "We want to help them keep the facility as

nice as it is."

Coach Gaston reacted strongly when he learned that fingers were pointing to his players as the culprits.

"That's a lie," said Gaston. "We had coaches in there the whole time. They (Tularosa) must not have taken care of their business, they must not have locked the door," he added.

"When we go somewhere we leave it cleaner than when we got there. We run a first class operation," Gaston said.

"My guess is they left the door open and someone got in there after we left and banged it up," Gaston added.

Rivalry between the two schools has been long standing.

Last year a decision to delete Tularosa from the Warriors' football season schedule caused a public outcry from the alumni and business owners in both communities.

Ronny Maske, the previous Ruidoso High School athletic director, admitted school officials did not realize the impact of the game between the Warriors and Wildcats.

The decision not to play Tularosa originally was made because of size differences between the two schools. Tularosa is 2A while Ruidoso is classified 3A.

"I don't want anything to cause detriment to the spirit of either school. We will take care of the problem," Gladden said.

"The Ruidoso Schools will continue to foster good sportsmanship and respect for district and student responsibilities."

Downs man charged with burglary

A Ruidoso Downs man facing burglary and drug charges, added to his troubles earlier this week by resisting arrest.

Ruidoso Downs Police filed a third degree burglary charge and two misdemeanor charges for possession of paraphernalia and resisting and obstructing arrest against Benjamin Herrera, Jr., of Turkey Creek, Ruidoso Downs. Bond has been set at \$9,000.

Charges were filed as the result of an 11 a.m. burglary at the Valley View home of Virginia Daniels.

Daniels reported the break-in Saturday, September 18, to the police department. Reported missing were a handgun, three rings and several two-dollar bills.

A neighbor, who wished to remain anonymous, reportedly saw the intruder and gave the information to the officers assigned to the case.

Patrol officer Chris Condon approached the suspect around 3:30 p.m. Saturday. When questioned, Herrera was nervous, according to the police report.

After an initial conversation, Officer Condon asked the suspect if he could, "pat him down." Herrera began to run, according to the officer's report.

During the chase Condon fell and separated his shoulder.

Police Sgt. David Hightower and Corporal Dana Terlecky continued the pursuit.

The police report stated Herrera had in his possession at the time of his arrest an ICC syringe, forceps and some two dollar bills. Daniels identified the bills as the ones taken from her residence.


After being read his rights, Herrera reportedly admitted being at the residence.

Finger prints taken at the scene have not been processed.

"Pending the outcome of the prints, the charges may be upgraded to aggravated burglary," said Police Chief Will Hoggard.

That would bring the charges to a second degree felony.

Condon was treated and released from LCMC, and will be on light duty for the next week.

"Because of that, we haven't had a truck breakdown.

"We were nearly caught up (with dumpster complaints) until the photograph of our man welding appeared in the newspaper and then the requests came rolling in," Lewandowski said. "Some of those (containers) are not bad, just not as pretty."

One of his priorities also has been to replace dumpsters in high visibility areas such as across from the chamber of commerce in Ruidoso and at the "Y" where Suddeth intersects U.S. 70.

He also was instructed by the authority board to replace any non-conforming containers, such as the blue units on school district property and multi-colored at some businesses.

Another approach to streamlining the repair operation instituted by Lewandowski was to consolidate all of the collected dumpsters in the recycling yard.

"Before we had containers spread out all over, but we collected them from the transfer station (on Gavilan Canyon Road). We also picked up those not being used or paid for by commercial accounts," he said. "Now we have about 100 in the yard, but they're stacked and ready to be processed."

Office manager Beverly Foote said before the system put in place

by Lewandowski, "We used to fill up two message books a week on complaints, but now we go through a week's worth in a few pages. We're not getting yelled at anymore."

Lewandowski said being able to double up on job assignments and schedule people on a flexible basis has been a key to turning around the authority's operation.

"One thing I made clear when I was hired, I told employees don't ever tell me you're just a driver," he said. "We're too small for someone to have just one job. We all have to pitch in and be willing to bend. I think they find the approach keeps their work more interesting and fun."

This week, Lewandowski added another new system. Each driver carries a report sheet on runs to jot down dumpsters needing work or other problems they see in the field, he said.

"I call it project clean sweep. (The repair person) can follow the driver's route and initial as the containers are fixed. We can do that now, because the worse ones are caught up."

Repairs then are scheduled in designated sections of the county.

"They used to spot all over and it took lots of driving," he said. "It was like a lottery. The county is divided into five areas now and we do one at a time to conserve mileage."

"It took years to get them this messed up and I'm not going to change it in 90 days, but we've done more than was done in the previous two years (since the authority was formed)."

In his continuing emphasis on neatness among trash, Lewandowski sent recycling director Kerry Krumsiek to the authority's transfer station to help put it in order.

"It no longer has dumpsters or other activities there," he said. "It's now mostly for the trucks and drivers."

"We've put safety rails inside the building by the compactor and installed parking bars to separate personal vehicles from the trucks. The interior floor has been painted."

Krumsiek has been able to help at the transfer station, because recycling also is functioning more efficiently, moving larger loads of material and handling them more quickly. Using Krumsiek in other functions, but keeping him as recycling supervisor, moved his salary into another section of the budget.

"I don't think we'll see recycling with a \$70,000 deficit as was projected earlier," Lewandowski said. "I think we'll see it break even this year."

The next portion of the business scheduled to receive his intense scrutiny will be dumping violators, including contractors.

voluntary siting process is the way government should be doing business with states and tribes.

"The difference with the MRS is that this time we get to write the treaty. And, I should add, you can count on us to keep our word," said Pese.

Plans already have been announced to study a site near Three

Rivers for possible placement of the spent fuel rods.

Although an MRS is a temporary storage facility, the government plans to use it for about 40 years. The Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe has asked to serve as the host in the hopes of creating jobs for tribal members.

The federal government has obligated itself to take on the storage of

nuclear power plant nuclear waste, and it has been collecting fees from the plants.

So far the tribe has received \$300,000 in study funds, and is in the process of seeking another grant to continue the study.

This part of the study, is the grant is approved, will be to educate and inform the Mescalero's neighbors.

ter and name of Vazquez and their neighbors

—they violated family member's rights guaranteed by the U.S. Constitution.

Vazquez contends that the officers had no probable cause for the

search and that their acts were "willful and wanton," and constitute "excessive and dangerous force and brutality."

She is asking for compensatory damages of \$300,000 and punitive damages of \$300,000. She contends she and her children have suffered sickness, mental and emotional dis-

tress, anxiety and embarrassment because of the police action.

Vazquez' Alamogordo attorney, Albert Rivera, has asked that the trial be moved to a different judicial district to ensure impartiality and a fair trial.

Sheriff James McSwane could not be reached for comment.

Fair board turned off by commission's plan to move the fairgrounds to Glencoe

An arctic blast blew into Capitan Wednesday, creating a chilly reception at the Lincoln County Fair Board meeting for three visiting county commissioners.

Board members gave the cold shoulder to a proposal by Commissioner Wilton Howell and Commission Chairman Monroy Montes that the county consider purchasing property in Glencoe for a new fairground.

Howell said questions about the title to the fairground land in Capitan prompted him to look at other alternatives.

"Why did you raise the question about the title now," challenged Capitan resident Kathleen Hellman. She answered her own question later, contending an allocation of \$100,000 from the State Legislature for fairground improvements in preparation for Smokey Bear's Fiftieth Anniversary in 1994 might be one reason. Uncertainty about ownership could put that money on hold.

Howell and Montes told members that if they don't allow the fair to grow and appeal to more interests, it may become obsolete, just as

ranching is being threatened with extinction.

The commission probably will file suit to establish title to the land in Capitan, Montes said.

"Our real problem is what is the future. What direction will the fair take," he said.

More opportunity and potential exists at the Super Select Sale property on U.S. Highway 70 in Glencoe than in Capitan, he contended.

"There's a rumor going around that one or two commissioners stand to gain (by a move)," Montes said. "That's not true at all. It's being said the fair will be moved to Ruidoso. That's not true at all."

"We're dealing with a way of life that really is in jeopardy. To me, it's almost as if it is the death of a culture, not Hispanic or Indian, but rural existence. We need friends to survive. We must expand the fair beyond livestock exhibits. We need a fair that addresses other interests and appeals to those in urban areas. If we don't have an opportunity to show them our agricultural way of life, we'll need a museum, not a fair."

Although not committing him-

self, Commissioner L. Ray Nunley appeared to be willing to listen to the plan proposed by his fellow commissioners, but also invited input from Capitan residents.

He urged fair board members to reach out and make new friends, especially in Ruidoso, as a way to survive.

The temperature switched to boiling during a few tense moments when long-time fair supporters Lamoyne Carpenter and Fletcher Hall challenged Howell and Montes to back up claims that moving functions to Glencoe would serve more people in the county.

They pointed out that most of the work is performed by volunteers who live in Capitan and Corona. The fair was never meant to be a money-maker. It's a way to encourage accomplishments by the youth of the county, members said.

"Johnson Stearns and I underwrote the first (livestock) sale," Carpenter said. "It (the fair) has a little place in my heart and I don't have a damn thing invested in Glencoe. It's built on a rock pile and it's 10 miles from the nearest restaurant. It's 10 miles from everything. I think you're plum out

of your mind to think of moving to Glencoe.

"If either of you is thinking about running for higher office, you won't get one vote out of Capitan if you move the fair."

Hall contended that worries about the lack of title to the fairground are a smokescreen for other aims by the commissioners. That situation could easily be remedied with the quiet title suit.

Several members urged the commissioners to take the money they would spend buying the new land and sink it into acquisition of property next to the existing fairground and into more improvements there.

They pointed out that residents from Corona and Ramon already face a long drive to participate and Glencoe would be even further for them. Only in the last few years have Ruidoso residents become involved. Capitan is more centrally located for everyone, they said.

Commissioners are scheduled during a special meeting today in Carrizozo to discuss the title to the fairground and the possible purchase of land. However, the discussion will follow an executive session, which will be conducted be-

hind closed doors with the public excluded.

Spectator and former Capitan mayor David Cummins warned members, "They're going to buy the sale barn no matter what we say."

Fearing the accuracy of Cummins' remark, board members took some action steps of their own after the commissioners left the meeting.

On a motion by Ralph Duniap, they voted to reinstate the organization as a non-profit corporation. That status was dropped in 1988, when the independent fair association became a commission-appointed fair board to gain protection under the county's insurance.

"When we became a county board, everything we had title to was given to the county and we leased it back," fair board president Gordon Barham said. "That was the only way we could get insurance and take advantage of the grants available."

But Barham said they lost much more than they gained. Now members serve at the will of commissioners. Their nominations for new members often are ignored and they were the last to be consulted

about the possible fair changes.

"If they had come to us first to discuss alternatives, it would be different," Barham said.

Once reinstated as a corporation, the association should present a contract for managing the fair and the annual Smokey Bear Stampede to the commission for a set fee, Barham said. Commissioners already have signed a 99-year lease of the property in Capitan to the fair group. If commissioners reject the contract offer, the association could try to stage the events without county money, as they did for many years, he said.

If commissioners still want to buy the Super Select horse sales barn on U.S. 70, they could proceed independently of the fair association and conduct whatever events they envision, including carnivals.

Board member Scott Schaffer said Howell and Montes "weren't very specific about what they expect."

"I don't think we can have things like the Cowboy Symposium every week (at the sales barn). They would create a monster that this board couldn't handle. It's not our business to meet everyone's needs."

Local man accused of beating biker

A Ruidoso businessman was charged with assault and battery following an altercation near his home at Two Rivers Park.

Johnny Durham, 58, owner of Sierra Blanca Motors, was charged with beating Jorge Parada of El Paso, Texas, after the motorcycle Parada was driving ran over Durham's Cocker Spaniel dog on Robin Road.

According to police reports, dispatchers received a call about 3 p.m. Sunday that a dog had been hit by a biker. Durham's wife, Rebecca, told the police that the dog was OK, but her husband had walked down to the area where the bikers had parked.

Officers Robert Layher and Ramona Wheeler arrived at the scene and saw Parada bleeding from the right eye and nose area.

According to the reports, Durham told police he had hit Parada. The biker was transported by ambulance to the emergency room at Lincoln County Medical Clinic.

After Parada was released from the hospital, he drove to the Ruidoso Police Department to sign a complaint against Durham.

According to Parada, 26, he and his wife, Lucia; brother, Jesus, and sister, Parla, were camped and cooking on the small park site off Robin Road.

He said he and his wife were returning from the grocery store when a dog chased his bike. He said he increased his speed to avoid the dog, but the dog was faster and

turned into his bike. He said his wife's leg also hit the dog causing a bruise to her leg.

After hitting the dog, Parada said he returned to the site and a few minutes later, one of Durham's workers, an inmate from Camp Sierra Blanca, approached the group near the camp and then left.

He said about 10 minutes later, Durham, followed by four inmates, one of which allegedly carried an axe, approached him at the site.

According to reports from witnesses at the scene, Durham then asked "Who was the M---F--- that was driving the green bike?"

Parada told Durham he was the driver, and then, according to the witness reports, Durham started hitting Parada in the face, breaking his glasses. The witnesses reported that the inmates warned bystanders that no one was to interfere or they would get their "ass kicked."

Parada told The Ruidoso News that while Durham was hitting him, he kept accusing him of speeding, driving 60 mph.

Parada said he wanted to explain to Durham, but Durham wouldn't listen.

"I just covered my face," Parada said. "He was still able to get through. I didn't say anything after he started beating me."

Parada said Durham hit him about 10 times in the head area. Parada said he was on the ground at one time, but when he got up Durham allegedly engaged him in a head lock and continued the beating.

Parada said his brother at one point tried to stop the fight, but one of the inmates pushed him away.

After the fight ended, Parada said he was informed by Durham that the police had been called to come pick him up.

Parada said his wife was screaming to let him go, but Durham told her to shut up, that her husband had it coming for running over his dog and driving too fast.

Parada said when the police arrived, they separated he and Durham for private discussions.

Parada said the officer told him the dog shouldn't have been loose and that he shouldn't have struck him. He then told him he needed to get an ambulance because of his eye.

"Everybody thought he had taken out my eye," Parada said. "My eye was popping out, because the outside cover was hanging down and the blood wouldn't stop."

Parada said the officer asked if he was going to press charges. He said the officer asked the inmates if they had anything to do with the fight. Parada said they told the officer they didn't and he told them they could leave.

Parada said he asked the officer why Durham wasn't being arrested. He said the officer said there were no witnesses and that it was Parada's word against Durham's word.

"I told the officer to look at my face, and to look at his hand," Parada said. "He said we had to go through court. I told him I couldn't

talk anymore because I was feeling faint. I guess I lost about a pint of blood. I started seeing double." He said the ambulance then took him to the hospital.

Durham told The News that he didn't see the accident, but was standing out by the road when the biker passed him.

He said he was concentrating on the work being done in the river when one of the four Sierra Blanca Camp inmates working for him told him a biker had just killed his dog.

Durham said the dog normally stays within a fenced area, but had followed him to the road and was standing beside him moments before he was hit.


Durham said he was sure the dog was dead, not breathing for about 10 minutes, but then after a good shaking, the dog responded.

He said he called a local veterinarian and then he called police when an inmate told him that the biker had stopped at the campsite.

Durham said he had no intentions of fighting the man, he only wanted to talk.

He said the inmates that followed behind him, did so not at his request. He said one inmate held an axe as the driver passed, but he was not aware of anyone carrying an axe to the campsite.

Durham said he was extremely angry that the man didn't stop and report the dog had been hit. He also complained of a steady stream of bikers that had been speeding on Robin Road all day long.

Feds extend the comment period on environmental statement

The public has 30 more days to comment on the draft environmental impact statement for proposed regulatory changes governing livestock grazing on Bureau of Land Management property.

Secretary of the Interior Bruce Babbitt announced the second 30-day comment period extension last week. Babbitt said he was respond-

ing to a request from Governor Bob Miller of Nevada on behalf of Western governors.

The decision comes in the midst of a move in the U.S. Senate to impose a one-year moratorium on changes in grazing fees and regulations proposed by the Clinton Administration.

"My friends, the Western govern-

nors, feel that their constituents haven't been given enough time to evaluate the specifics of the reform proposal," Babbitt said. "I hear their concerns and the concerns of Western members of Congress on this same issue."

The 30-day extension will end October 17. Following analysis of

all scoping comments, the bureau will publish draft regulations and a draft environmental impact statement, which will trigger another public comment period.

Public meetings also will be conducted in each affected state during the comment period on the draft regulations and impact statement.



Warriors prepare for toughest test

The Ruidoso Warrior football team returns to the reality of district 4-AAA football when they entertain the No. 3 ranked Portales Rams Friday night at W.D. Horton Stadium.

The Warriors and Rams share 2-2 records. Both teams' losses have at the hands of very good football teams.

Portales has lost to Clovis and Canyon Randall while the Warriors came up short against Artesia and Lovington.

The Rams racked up wins at Friona, Texas and St. Pius while the Warriors have beaten NMMI and Tularosa.

Early in the year former Warrior coach Cooper Henderson tabbed Portales as the likely favorite to win the 4-AAA title.

Current Warrior mentor Mike Gaston concurs with his predecessor.

"Portales is the best team that we've played so far. They are very solid offensively, defensively and in the kicking game ... it'll be a challenge and I think that our kids will be very excited about that," Gaston said.

Most years it is Portales that the Warriors match up best with from all of the 4-AAA teams. Portales is the closest school other than Tucumcari from that district to the

Warriors size.

It was Portales that the Warriors met in their last appearance in the State Championship in 1988. We lost but could have and perhaps should have won that game.

Offensively the Rams run the veer which gives the quarterback the option handing off to a halfback on the dive play, keeping the ball himself or pitching the ball to the other running back.

Portales likes to run the football. Like Lovington, the Rams are big and strong, but unlike Lovington, they know where their bread and butter is.

Defensively the Rams will show the Warriors the familiar split-6 formation, just like Lovington and NMMI. Nothing new but the past experience that the Warriors have against the defense should help.

But it was the kicking game of the Rams that got the rave reviews from Gaston.

"They're big, strong and fast ... they've got a great kicking game. They ran back a kickoff back against (Canyon) Randall and they do a great job of covering punts ... they're very solid in the kicking game," Gaston said.

The Warriors met similar competition in the first two weeks of the season in Lovington and Artesia, but how much better are

the Warriors after four weeks and two wins than they were when they played those football powerhouses?

"I might of not have showed on Friday, but we are considerably better than when we played Lovington. This will be the first week of the season that we had the same exact offensive line that we had the week before," said Gaston.

"Sergio Guerra, Adam Chavez and Zack Turner had great games in the offensive line for us ... in fact the whole offensive line is coming around for us. That will help us a lot because John (Echols) will have more time to throw the ball and we can do some more things," said Gaston.

"We're improved greatly. When we grade films we see so many things that we're doing better, things that you have to do to win games. But the biggest improvement may be in their hearts ... like coming back in a rough situation with a hostile crowd when the other team was fired up. I'm just really proud of them," said Gaston.

The Rams are the second-to-last stop for the Warriors in the pre-district. Then its on to district 3-AAA play. If the Warriors keep improving from game to game like the past four games, we might just see the Rams again, a little later down the road.

On The Sideline

Last Friday the Ruidoso Warrior football team traveled to Tularosa to play a football game. We won.

In Wednesday's edition of the El Paso Times, the Warriors were singled out for damaging the Wildcats' locker room. While very possible — this seems just plain weird to me.

I've heard many times of locker rooms getting smashed around but it's usually the losing team that does the smashing.

"We won a game — let's rip the sink off the wall," doesn't make much sense to me.

According to Coach Gaston, at no time were the players left in the locker room without at least one member of the coaching staff present.

It just doesn't seem possible that one of these coaches would not notice the vandalism the Tularosa officials say went on.

It's even the policy of the coaching staff to lightly clean up the locker room. In this case, when the Warriors left Tularosa at 10:15 p.m., the coaches asked the janitor if everything was OK — which it was.

Then at 11:30 p.m. one of the Tularosa coaches returned to the field to run an errand and spotted the damage. Pretty weird.

Again, let me emphasize that it is possible that we did it; in my opinion it is far more likely that the locker room was left unlocked at someone else did it.

Such is the stuff that rivalries are made of. It was a thrill last Friday to watch our football team play. As a broadcaster, there haven't been many thrills during the last couple of years.

On the surface, all we did was beat a team that we've pretty much dominated during the past ten years — but this year was different. Tularosa is good. They weren't intimidated

by Ruidoso — they thought they could win.

After the Wildcats opening drive, it looked like they were right. Six plays and a score.

Part of that was their enthusiasm, part of it was our lack thereof.

In Tularosa, they announce one score every week — Ruidoso's. If we're losing, they cheer. If we're ahead, they boo.

Tularosa isn't really what you call Warrior country.

I can remember in school, when the tables were reversed, we never beat Tulie in football — never. They were a big AAA school and we were just a AA team.

Doyle Howell, who was the Warrior coach at the time, took the Warriors to the State Championship twice, took Jal a couple of times when he was there and had many, many playoff appearances, but he never beat Tularosa.

It wasn't because their coach was better than ours, in fact he couldn't carry Coach Howell's headset. It was because Tularosa was supposed to win the games. Their kids believed not no matter what their record was, Tularosa was supposed to win the game.

The early 1980s changed that. When Ruidoso moved up to AAA the entire attitude changed. We thought we could win.

I remember the first time we beat the Wildcats, the game was a barnburner. Darrell

Stierwalt was the coach; we had an exceptional group of kids.

The game went down to the wire. My two recollections were going down to the sidelines with a couple of minutes left to bask in the glory of the win and Bill Turner, my friendly insurance agent, jumping offside to give the Warriors a first down that iced the game (sorry, Bill).

From that point on the Warriors owned the Wildcats.

Only once since 1984 has Tularosa beat Ruidoso. This year was probably their best chance for a while. Next year, the Warriors will be in the playoffs in district 3-AAA and the year after that — well it looks like mid-'80s football is on its way back.

We won the game last Friday because we were supposed to win — because we had to win. The Warriors fumbled the football four times and still won.

A couple of weeks ago in this space I expressed a concern about why kids quit the football and basketball teams. About how our JV program's were not competitive and that we should allow JV-age kids to move up and play varsity and then play JV as well.

An Update: The JV and "C" football teams are doing very well. Coach Gaston is doing a great job of letting the kids stay within their age group and they're successful.

Even the sophomores that are playing on the varsity aren't having to get at 6 a.m. to go to Silver City after a tough Friday night game.

The result? The kids are still excited with football.

They win (the freshmen are undefeated) and they all get to play. It's really fun to see what's down the road for the Warriors in a couple of years.



Fishing fun isn't over 'til you set the table

So, the fishing trip is all over. You head for the house and decide to have some nice filets for dinner.

You carefully prepare the fish with a terrific recipe and cook it up, but it tastes terrible, real "fishy". Well, it looks like catching fish is great fun, but eating them is a different story.

Folks that face this problem should maybe take better care of those fish before the cooking ever starts. Even with a great recipe, fish that is spoiled will always taste fishy. Look at it this way. You go to the store and buy a gallon of milk. Instead of rushing home and putting the milk in the refrigerator, you leave it in a hot car all day, or go to the lake and dangle it over the side of the boat in the lukewarm water to keep it cool. By the time you get home and try to drink the milk it has spoiled and tastes terrible, right.

The same holds true for fish. Taking care of freshly caught fish is very important and will pay dividends when that fillet comes out of the skillet. Show that fish no respect after it's caught and it will take it out on your taste buds.

If you fish from a boat, having a livewell is as good as having a refrigerator in your car for carrying home that milk. The purpose of a livewell, obvious from its name, is to keep fish alive and stop them from spoiling.

However, if you just fill the livewell with lake water and throw in the fish, it won't survive for long and that culinary delight will still



end up tasting fishy. There are chemicals you can add to the water that will help fish survive longer, but a much simpler method is to put some ice in the livewell.

If you keep the water temperature about 15 degrees cooler than the lake water it will slow down the fish's body metabolism, keep them calm, and allow them to live longer.

Of course, most folks don't have a fancy boat with a livewell. No problem, an ice chest will keep that fish from spoiling.

Just gut the fish and throw it on ice in an ice chest and it will reward you by tasting great out of the frying pan.

No boat either, you fish from the bank and have to walk a long way so carrying an ice chest is out of the question. You could use a fish basket, stringer or creel to keep the fish in, but it won't survive long this way. The best

choice is to gut the fish and wrap it in a wet towel or grass and keep it in the shade.

Don't let that fish stay in the bottom of your creel or hang dead on a stringer all day. Get that catch cold as soon as possible and it will reward you later on.

Whether you want to keep a fish alive for a flavorful meal or to release it later, like in a bass tournament, don't play a fish to exhaustion. This adds stress to an already agitated fish and may cause it to die. Prevent this by using heavy enough tackle so you don't have to "play" the fish a great deal to land it.

If a fish is to be released, handling it is also an important consideration. That fish is covered with slime. I know it gets all over your hands and causes a mess when you pick up the fish, but it also serves an important function for the fish. The slime layer acts as a protective coating and helps keep parasites and fungus from attacking the fish.

If you grab the fish with dry hands it removes the slime, so wet your hands before grabbing the fish.


The best way to pick up most fish is to not grab around the body at all. Grasping the fish by the lower jaw provides an excellent handhold and prevents the angler from being stuck by the numerous sharp spines found on the dorsal fins. I wouldn't recommend this method for the toothy walleye or northern, though; you may end up losing a finger or some skin.

The Capitan Tigers kicked some Hagerman Bobcats bottom Friday 47-0 to keep their winning streak rolling at four.

The Bobcats couldn't move the ball all game long.

On the Tigers first possession, quarterback Michael Fish threw a blue darter to Orlando Baca who grabbed the perfect pass and scrambled to the end zone, only to fumble. Trevor Cox, however, saved the day and pounced on the pigskin in the endzone for the touchdown.

The extra point strayed wide and the Tigers were on the board early at 6-0.

On the second possession, Fish tossed a 22 yarder to Ernie Trujillo who broke free for the Tigers second score. Fish faked a pass in the flat, and then swept right to run untouched for the two point conversion. Tigers now on top, 14-0.

A couple of flags stopped the Tigers from another Fish to Trujillo 20-yard touchdown. The first touchdown pass was called back to the 25

"We play the Belen Eagles junior varsity this Friday for our homecoming game. The pressure always is on when you're undefeated."





Greeters get funds to promote jubilee

The Lodgers Tax Advisory Board met long enough Tuesday to approve an additional \$625 request by the Ruidoso Valley Greeters.

The lodgers board had awarded the Greeters \$875 for the 1993-94 fiscal year "Christmas Jubilee."

According to the application for lodgers tax, the Greeters will hold the Christmas Jubilee on November 12, 13 and 14.

The Greeters had neglected to include the Jubilee in the applica-

tion submitted earlier in the spring. Because of that oversight, the board could only fund a lower amount.

A total projected advertising budget for this year was submitted that brought the budget in excess of \$4,000. The Greeters, therefore, asked the Lodgers board to restore the original amount requested this spring of \$1,500.

The sixth annual event is sponsored by the Greeters as a

showcase for locally licensed merchants.

Merchants pay a fee averaging \$150 for booth space. Panels for the booth, display table and chairs are provided by the Greeters.

Rental fee, according to Greeter promoter Bonnie Mattox, covers upkeep of the booths and the rent for the building. Rent to the Greeters for 1993 is \$2,000. Mattox wrote that the charges also help pay for some advertising and decorations.

According to Mattox, last year's

Jubilee brought in about 4,000 visitors from at least 112 towns.

Expenses covered for the 1993 event include 25 video copies for distribution to regional television stations, \$900; and 450 posters and 20,000 flyers for a total of \$1,750.

Other costs include television, newspaper and other print support.

LTAB treasurer Tammie Maddox reported a 12.3 percent increase over July's income and a 12.4 increase over last year to date.

Adobe daubers restore Lincoln building

Slapping a hand full of mud onto a wall may look like child's play, but when the slappers are archaeologists, chances are the explanation for the activity in Lincoln is much more complicated.

Crew members mixing and mashing the muddy mess are part of a training restoration and preservation project financed by the Museum of New Mexico Foundation.

Tom Caperton, director of State Monuments division of the Museum of New Mexico, put together the program to repair the adobe and restore the earthen plaster exterior cover of the old Montano Store.

Located in the small historic settlement of Lincoln, which gained much of its fame from the infamous Billy the Kid, the store was a prime candidate to benefit from years of research.

"We started in 1985 to experiment with different mixtures to extend the life of adobe," Caperton said. "The state provided the money to test material on different wall panels at Fort Selden State Monument near Radium Springs. One mixture consisted of an acrylic emulsion."

The Getty Conservationist, a worldwide organization based in Marina Delray, California, with plenty of financial backing, became interested in the work being done in New Mexico.

Meanwhile, archaeologists in Israel had unearthed some adobe arches that predated by at least 1,000 years the Romans, previously thought to be the inventors of arches, Caperton said.

They asked for help in finding a way to protect the arches and sent their scientists to the United States, where a collaborative effort to discover an answer was formed in 1987. More work was focused at Fort Selden, which became the largest adobe experiment in the world, Caperton said.

He subsequently attended a conference on adobe preservation in

Rome. In 1990, for the first time since the conferences were initiated, the meeting was conducted in the United States. Several hundred people from 47 different countries came to Las Cruces.

The particular chemical mixture being added to the mud at Lincoln first was tested at the Old Spanish Mission at the Jemez State Monument at Jemez Springs.

The National Park Service conducted a workshop in conjunction with the project.

"They trained my staff and other agencies, both private and public," Caperton said. "It was so successful, that this time we decided to train others and to do it at Lincoln."

The training is free and has attracted archaeologists from Colorado, Nevada, California and Arizona, as well as from around New Mexico.

Pat Olson from the Nevada Department of Museum and History, was among the 16 trainees who started the store project Monday and will wind it up by Friday.

"I've really enjoyed it," Olson said as she slopped some of the mixture on the store's outer wall and smoothed it. She, too, had attended the 1990 Las Cruces conference and was contacted when this project was opened.

"The most difficult aspect may be that there are a lot of strong-minded and talented people here, so we tend to end up with a lot of bosses," she said.

While one crew works behind the building mixing the ingredients for the earth plaster and forming the adobe bricks, about a half dozen volunteers stay in front to apply the cover material, using their hands and trowels, climbing on scaffolds and pushing wheelbarrows.

The free hands-on training was enhanced by bringing in experts to speak on different preservation techniques, Caperton said.

"After we get the building plastered and this group trained, then they can go out and train others," he said.

Meanwhile, his staff will be transforming itself into "a crack adobe team," he said. "We're going to call the group the Southwest Adobe Team or SWAT."

How many years the chemical mixture will extend the life of the adobe, nobody knows for sure, Caperton said. The results at Fort Selden have been impressive.

"That wall had no roof, so the top eroded, but the wall is holding up well," Caperton said. "And

where it is eroding, it's eroding the way we want it to. It looks like adobe.

"It's essential that the mixture keep the moisture out, but that it not trap the moisture inside. If it's trapped behind the outer layer, it will chip off in big chunks."


After the trainees are finished with the Montano Store, it will sit for a few weeks and dry before a waterproofing material is applied by spraying, he said.

"It all will greatly extend the life of the plaster, but it won't stop erosion," he said. He hopes to see the techniques tried on adobe in the Eastern United States, he said.

"Well over half of the people in the world live in earthen houses," he said.

Caperton would like to see other structures in Lincoln receive the special treatment. His next choice would be the Tunstall Store, which with 9,000 square feet is about two to three times as large as the Montano Store.

"We'd have to bring in a large crew," he said. "We'll have to think this over."

Public safety is sometimes costly

The good news is that we had a safe and fairly uneventful weekend in Ruidoso in spite of the Golden Aspen (motorcycle) Rally last weekend. Ruidoso Police, the Lincoln County Sheriff's officers and their enforcements with the State Police did a fine job of keeping the peace, and bikers and locals had a great weekend together.

The bad news is that keeping that peace cost the taxpayers some \$4,000 in overtime compensation and an additional \$1,560 in per diem pay to state officers. Those were costs specifically related to law enforcement all over town during the rally.

Spending an additional \$5,560 for the health and safety of the citizens isn't too bad, really.

On the other hand, police estimate that only 3,700 to 4,000 motorcycles were in town on Saturday, and that means taxpayers paid \$1.39 per biker for law enforcement. That's money well spent if this community intends to host an event that poses a greater than normal public safety risk. It's too bad the cost has to be absorbed by the taxpayers.

"Overall, from a public safety view, the Golden Aspen Rally period was essentially quiet and without major incident/crime," said Ruidoso Police Chief Richard Swenor.

And so, we had a great weekend, but we paid for it.



The years passed, as years tend to do, and Ruidoso grew under the auspices of the mountain to be the thriving "noisy river" of tourist traffic it is today. And the Ruidoso Public Library grew with it.

Mary Lou never gave up hope that those few original patrons would soon geometrically increase to the vast amount of registrations that today no member of the staff can keep track of. And she was correct. She stayed with it, she nurtured it, she saw that it grew and prospered, and now she is looking at doing what she really wanted to do during all these years — retiring.

What is she going to do with her million hours of free time per month? Well, her husband, Leroy, avid golfer that he is, tried to hire her as his caddy, but she told him

in her sweet Texas style that she really had other plans for her time, such as joining the PGA Women's Senior Golf Tour.

She also has plans to do some sewing and some arts and crafts which she plans to display at one of the thousand or so local arts and crafts shows.

She also has been and will continue to be a member of the New Mexico Library Association, to

which she has generously volunteered her services on any and all committees, boards and roundtables that need members. Her motto in regard to attending all these meetings: "No place too far, no time too late."

And with all the time that remains after the meetings and tours? Well, since she will miss the

library beyond comprehension of non-librarians, she has volunteered to continue to operate BAT Link and order all the books for the next 10 years, printing all orders in triplicate if necessary.

She will also be bringing donuts to the Friday morning staff meetings once a month.

So the time has come for Mary Lou to bid farewell to a job more than well done and go on to doing something she wants to do even better. As she turns in her library card, sets the security alarm for the last time, and village hall retires her paycheck stub number, we wish her the best of everything and as much more as she can tolerate in the next 25 years until she retires again, and we can do this all over.

Reader calls on village to read the fine print

TO THE EDITOR:

It is real news to learn that there might be someone interested in building a hotel on a part of the old airport land that was set aside for such purpose.

After reading the lease that was designed for the last "potential" hotel builder, may I ask that you use your influence to urge our appointed, as well as elected, village government to start over and design one that considers the taxpayers more and the tenant less.

How about one that is simple, that any one could understand, and that has been used successfully by thousands of business people? A net

lease payment of one percent each month of the professionally appraised value of the land.

If the appraised value of the land were to be a million dollars. Then the tenant would pay one percent a month, or \$10,000 a month for the use of our land. As I write this, I imagine I hear the squeals of some of our more vocal leading citizens, who think we have to give special incentives to attract private enterprises. Incentives that fall on the shoulders of the taxpayers. "Yes that would do it." A subsidy from the taxpayers who would benefit the least, and are forced to pay for the shortfalls of the political process anyway.

That is the true situation with the Links golf course, many think. In the year 1991-92, the village budget, shows that the taxpayers paid \$237,912 in interest alone, on the money it borrowed to pay off FAA in order to have no liens on the land. The golf course paid nothing. Isn't this a subsidy by the taxpayers in your book? Free land to a private enterprise is a subsidy whether it is intentional or otherwise, in mine.

It has been suggested that we (the village) are reaping our reward from the gross receipts tax generated by the golf course. Somebody is trying to pull our leg. We haven't

subsidized Furrs or Bennetts or Walmart, or others who collect gross receipts tax.

We (the village) borrowed \$3,040,000 to pay off the FAA for the airport land with no payment on the lease of the land yet! The taxpayers don't need another lease like that one. Get one and read it.

RHS senior earns national merit honor

Melissa Currin, the daughter of Mike and Linda Currin of Ruidoso, has been named a semifinalist by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation.

Currin, who is 17 and a senior at Ruidoso High School, is among some 15,000 semifinalists in the 1994 National Merit Scholarship Program.

"These academically talented secondary school seniors have an opportunity to continue in the competition for more than 6,500 merit scholarships, worth more than \$25 million, to be awarded next spring," according to information provided by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation (NMSC).

The nationwide semifinalist pool includes about half of one percent of each state's high school graduating class.

Semifinalists are the top scorers in each state and now advance to the finalist level to be considered for merit scholarships.

Currin has been very active in student council at both the middle school and the high school. She has been a class officer and is a member of the National Honor Society.

She is president of the local DECA (business education) chapter, state secretary for DECA, and has won state competition in DECA. Currin placed in the top 16 in the nation in DECA competition last year at Orlando, Florida.

Currin graduated from the national leadership academy in Los Angeles, California.

She attended Girls' State this past summer, was keynote speaker for her party and an alternate for Girls' Nation in Washington, D.C. She was asked to return next summer as a junior counselor.

In drama, Melissa received awards for best actress, best overall performer and the Tom Hansen Achievement Award (the highest award given to a drama student at RHS).

She also received honorable mention and superior ratings at the drama festival in Portales.

The National Merit achievement is based mainly on academics, and Currin has been at the top of class for the past three years. She currently has a 4.2 grade point average. She also has received awards for biology, chemistry, algebra, geometry and English.

Currin has performed in the children's and youth choirs at First Christian Church, worked with the Vacation Bible School and is currently a substitute teacher for the kindergarten Sunday School class.

She works part-time for Dr. Paul Wirth, Director of Special Services for the Ruidoso School District.

Currin is receiving information from schools all over the nation, but is currently most interested in Trinity, Vanderbilt, Duke and the University of Puget Sound.

She plans to major in mathematics and science with an emphasis on the environment. She would like to take a year to study abroad.
