



Residents complain about rocky road

More rocks than usual are cluttering State Road 214 from Fort Stanton to its intersection with the road to Sierra Blanca Regional Airport.

Tony Laro, State Highway Department maintenance engineer for the Roswell district that includes Lincoln County, told *The Ruidoso News* that residents who have been complaining about the rocks are right.

The state bladed the road about a week ago, unearthing a bunch of sizable rocks previously partly covered by dirt. The area then was hit by a hard rain that really tumbled and exposed the rocks.

"We plan to get a blade out there again within a week to improve the condition," Laro said.

Several workers at Fort Stanton had called *The News* to complain about the large rocks, which they said could damage their cars and presented more of a threat than the usual poor condition of the road.

Quarrel ends in stabbing

Evangelina Davila, 26, of Ruidoso was charged with aggravated battery Wednesday after she was accused of stabbing her roommate, Lara Hobbs, 24.

According to Ruidoso police reports, the victim's mother, LaDean Gale Ahhaity, arrived at her daughter's residence in Gavilan Trailer Park about 10 p.m. Wednesday.

Ahhaity said she entered the trailer and saw her daughter in the bathroom, suffering from a stab wound to the stomach.

According to Ahhaity, Davila appeared extremely nervous and told her the two women had a quarrel and that Davila had stabbed her daughter.

Hobbs was taken to the Lincoln County Medical Center where Dr. Jurgen Rebstock performed emergency surgery on the four-inch wound.

After the successful operation, Ruidoso Police detective Lanny Maddox interviewed the victim. Hobbs said she had lived with Davila for the past three years and that the two began to argue around 9:45 p.m. Wednesday night.

Hobbs said the argument continued until Davila walked into the kitchen and returned to the bedroom area with a knife.

According to police reports, after another confrontation, Hobbs told Maddox that Davila deliberately plunged the knife into the left side of her abdomen.

Hobbs was at the medical clinic Thursday.

According to police scanners, Davila was taken to the veterans hospital by her father.

Nuclear waste debate waged before council

An update of the proposed Monitored Retrievable Storage (MRS) site in Mescalero drew a small crowd to the Ruidoso Village Council meeting Tuesday.

Miller Hudson, MRS coordinator for the tribe, spoke in place of Fred Peso, MRS project manager, who was unable to attend due to an illness in his family.

Hudson presented a 15-minute film on the construction of an MRS facility, with testimonials by residents living around active nuclear power plants.

After the video, Hudson read from Peso's prepared text. Peso wrote the council that Mayor Jerry Shaw's intergovernmental coordinating committee was an "excellent suggestion."

"The Mescalero Tribal Council does not want to appear to be telling you what to do," Peso wrote. "We need your involvement. We will have to submit a benefits agreement on behalf of our neighbors, if we ever reach agreement with the U.S. government. That agreement must address your interests and concerns. I don't want to have to guess at those interests and concerns."

"I believe we need to sit down together and figure out what our common interests are."

Peso said he envisions a benefits package in three parts: immediate,

upfront funding for infrastructure, schools and other improvements; an inflation adjusted revenue stream fairly distributed to all communities in the region; and specific non-financial conditions as riders, such as safety, community control, emergency response, and the collocation of other federal programs.

Hudson answered several unusual questions from the audience.

He admitted he had assisted in crafting some of letters sent from Mescalero regarding the MRS. He is the MRS coordinator.

He also admitted that there is no prototype MRS canister available for anyone to touch.

Councilor Bill Karn, again absent from the council meeting, asked for a conference call from Los Angeles, California, where he is staying, so that he could listen to the MRS discussion.

Mayor Jerry Shaw said, although legal, she objected to taxpayers paying for long distance telephone calls to hear a report.

Shaw said she suggested to village clerk Tammie Maddox that Karn could listen to the tape of the meeting. She said Maddox had made that suggestion to Karn, but he did not think a tape was satisfactory.

Village manager Ron Wicker told Maddox that the village telephone system could not accom-



Ruidoso State Bank drive through teller Debbie Shafer spoke for herself and her co-worker Denise Saiz.


"We're Capitan fans, but we hope Ruidoso does well. We hope they have a great homecoming."

Planners review planned unit development by Cree Meadows

Country Club Village, an upscale development proposed on the property across from Cree Meadows Golf Course, met with some opposition during the Tuesday, September 20, Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Board meeting.

Applicant Glenn Neans submitted planned unit development (PUD) plans and a preliminary subdivision plat for commission action.

According to village planner Cleatus Richards, a number of issues not submitted need reviewing, including grading, drainage, open space, traffic impact and methods used for setting up a homeowners association.

Richards said there were four letters of protest dealing with the density of housing, traffic and water runoff.

Richards said that a zoning change is not required for the development.

Broker Barbara Willard said the unit price in the development begins at \$125,000.

Resident Michael Smeltzer told the board he was concerned about the high density of the project. He

quoted from a code enforcement book on hillside protection, 10-5-2. He suggested the property may be exceeding density requirements.

The board tabled further discussion on the development until the next planning and zoning meeting at 2 p.m. Monday, October 4, in village hall.

The board is expected to continue its review of the plan showing surrounding land use and traffic patterns; plan showing circulation elements, pedestrian and vehicular, open space, recreational space, proposed grading and proposed landscaping; plans indicating proposed drainage pattern, and plans pertaining to hillside and forest protection.

The board approved:

—a replat for Lots 21 and 22, Block 20, Forest Heights Subdivision by Neal J. and Geraldine Coyle, to allow construction of a garage.

—a replat of Lots 30 and 31, Block 14, in Paradise Canyon Subdivision for John Calverley, to convert two lots into one.

—a variance for side and rear

yard of a commercial site development for Lots 7 and 8, Block 2, Wingfield Subdivision. Applicant Victor Alonso is constructing a garage for storage of recreational vehicles.

—an amended commercial site development of Lots 23 and Lot 27A, Block L, Ruidoso Springs Subdivision for Danny and Peggy Fenton. Completion date is 45 days.

—an extension of 9.1 acre tract of land known as the Old KOR Campground, by Ruidoso State Bank for one year, with the provision that the building be brought back to a safe condition.

According to records, the village council wrote Mel Adams of the Ruidoso State Bank that it acted at its regular meeting of July 14, 1992, to approve the amended site development and that a hydrant be installed at or near the Glade Drive entrance to the RV park and that cost be shared by the village.

Ruidoso State Bank is to pay the cost of the hydrant, valve and tapping saddle and the village to supply piping, fittings, and labor for installation.

Village of Ruidoso Downs trustees invest in promoting their town

Ruidoso Downs trustees met Monday and spent most of the regular meeting allocating lodgers tax funds to promote their village.

Trustees voted to print a new and improved special section all about the Village of Ruidoso Downs and to purchase 1,000 village pins. The board tabled action on changing the use of lodgers tax funds already earmarked for Friends of Smokey advertising.

The Ruidoso Downs promotional piece, which is being distributed through a contract with the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, has been a big success, and board members are ready for a second printing.

On a recommendation from the Lodgers Tax Advisory Board, the trustees approved printing more copies of the tabloid-sized guide and adding a four-color cover.

Tami Montes, media consultant with The Ruidoso News, was on hand for the board's regular meeting to answer questions about the proposal she'd already made to the lodgers tax group.

Montes gave a brief description of the new guide beginning with the bright new four-color cover, and including an overall history of the community followed by a breakdown of community information such as churches, employment and

medical resources.

Stories and photographs of the village's attractions and a breakdown of annual events, including a calendar, will be of interest to visitors, said Montes.

The guide will give readers an overall picture of what Ruidoso Downs has to offer.

Listings for lodging, dining and entertainment will comprise the last part of the guide.

Trustee Charlotte Craig said she likes the idea of changing copy and adding attractions and activities since many of the same people who received the guide last year will still be on the mailing list.

The new look will give a fresh outlook, she said.

Trustees unanimously approved the lodgers tax board's recommendation for the guide, and for advertisements in The Ruidoso News summer and winter visitors guides.

The board also OK'd the lodgers tax board's recommendation to spend \$900 to order 1,000 additional village pins. The small lapel type pins are red, white and blue enamel on metal in the shape of the oval racetrack. They're passed out at meetings and special events to promote the village.

The board was all set to hear from Friends of Smokey President Rick Riddle, who was on the agenda to ask for a change in the

use of \$5,000 previously approved for advertising. However, Riddle was not present for the meeting.

Friends of Smokey is a non-profit group whose members are organizing and coordinating events to celebrate Smokey Bear's 50th birthday celebration next year.

Riddle reportedly had been placed on the agenda to ask permission to use the lodgers tax grant to pay the salary for a coordinator instead of for advertising.

Friends of Smokey has received a state grant for \$10,000 which must be used exclusively for advertising.

State statutes are clear in the use of lodgers tax funds, since they are collected by lodging establishments specifically to advertise and promote the municipality where they are collected.

Trustees questioned Tami Montes, who has worked with the Friends of Smokey for the past year, asking her to explain Riddle's request.

Montes, who said she couldn't speak for Riddle or for the group, did say that Friends of Smokey is a worthwhile project. Montes said her understanding was that Riddle, who had made a presentation at the same lodgers board meeting that she attended, wanted to ask the board for a change in use of the \$5,000 to pay the salary for a coordinator and not for advertising as

was specified.

Last year Friends of Smokey worked closely with coordinator Kathleen Hellman of Capitan who prepared agendas for meetings, put out a newsletter, placed advertising in various media, wrote and distributed many news releases and public service announcements, answered inquiries about Smokey celebrations and organized and coordinated various events.

For this year, the possibility of Ruidoso Civic Events Center director Kathleen Michelena taking on the project was discussed. The point was made that no decision had been made as to the coordinator and that several other people are under consideration for the job.

Trustee Craig questioned how one person could handle both jobs at the same time.

Village clerk Leann Weibrecht said the Friends of Smokey position is for nine months with pay of about \$360 to \$365 per month. She said the position might work well for a retired person who has more time to dedicate to the job.

Trustee Ray Hayhurst made a motion to table the issue without prejudice, and his motion passed with all "ayes."

The motion is with the stipulation that when the Friends of Smokey get the program in order, then, they bring it before us again,"

Hayhurst said.

Also Monday, Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority (LCSWA) director Joe Lewandowski introduced himself "officially" to the members of the board.

Lewandowski, who has been on the job for just three months, reported on LCSWA progress and answered questions posed by trustees.

Asked about the policy for piling limbs and branches around the trash containers, Lewandowski told the trustees his department will pick them up when called.

As far as special pickups, problems and complaints, he said a new report sheet is being used by drivers which is turned in daily to identify problem areas.

"Part of the problem before was a management problem," said Lewandowski. "Drivers would grab a handful of complaints and take off," he added.

He went on to explain how the village is now sectioned off so the drivers can concentrate on everything in one area and not get bogged down in the hit-and-miss way pickups had been handled.

A transfer station has been set up on Gavilan Canyon Road where residents can dispose of trash.

"Residents can use the container with no charge," said Lewandowski. "Contractors and commercial accounts will be charged the same

rate as the land fill."

The authority is saving funds by doing most of the needed maintenance and repair work on dumpsters in-house. Work has been done on 350 of the 2,500 dumpsters in the county.

Asked about illegal dumping which has been a recurring problem, Lewandowski said he is taking steps to correct the problem.

"I think people will help us," Lewandowski said. "I have enough power through the ordinances to do something about illegal dumping. People are helping us by taking down license plates of illegal dumpers."


The trustees commended Lewandowski for the work he is doing.

In other regular business Monday, the board:

—approved minutes of the September 13 meeting after correcting a notation that village attorney Robert Beauvais was present. Beauvais was absent from that meeting. Beauvais, as a matter of practice to help the village keep legal expenses down, attends meetings only when there are legal issues to be discussed.

—approved the financial statements for August and accounts payable for August and September.

—Mayor Joe Hayhurst was absent from Monday's meeting.

moderate such calls.

The Ruidoso News contacted Karn in Los Angeles.

Karn, who claims to be under subpoena testifying in a criminal complaint, said he had been threatened several times not to testify in an assault and battery case.

"They keep asking for continuances trying to let it fall through the system, but I won't let it happen," Karn said.

The News asked Karn for a name so a reporter could check the authenticity of the battery case.

"Gee, Chuck (the reporter), sorry. Believe me. Trust me," Karn said.

Karn was asked why he wouldn't give a name that was entered into the court system.

"Why should I?" Karn asked. "Because you want to check on it? I'm sorry."

Karn was asked if the case was in Los Angeles County.

"I'm not going to tell you anything," Karn said. He complained that past headlines in The News about him were incorrect.

Karn said he regretted that he was unable to set up the conference call.

"It would have been a good picture, you have to admit, my little name tag there and right behind it a vacant chair," he said.

The News asked the mayor if she knew of the absent councilor's subpoena. Shaw said that she didn't know the circumstances.

"If Karn becomes a witness for every crime he sees in Los Angeles, he may never come back to Ruidoso," said Mayor Shaw.

In other business, the council chose not to discuss authorization to apply for certification to regulate rates for cable TV basic tier service and equipment.

Village attorney John Underwood said he reviewed some of the actions of several communities regarding cable certification and now thought it in the best interest of the community to wait and see what happens elsewhere.

Underwood said the council could apply for certification at any time and that any change now might not merit the costs involved. He said the community could watch costs and benefits of other communities first to determine the best route for Ruidoso.

Paul Crown, manager of the cable system assured the council that they still held the hammer over him and that if they were displeased with his work, they could apply for certification at any time.

The council also approved Ordinance 93-19, regarding village personnel rules and regulations. The village changed the status of a temporary employee from four months to nine months.

Deputy manager Alan Briley told the council the highway department has verbally approved the additional funding necessary to meet D & S Contracting's low bid of \$1,335,072.59 for the MainStreet project.

The council, on Briley's recommendation, awarded the Santa Teresa, firm the contract, contingent on the village getting approved for the additional funding, and contingent upon State and FHWA final approval to award bid.

Briley said he was hopeful that construction on the project would start by late October.

As consent agenda items gaining approval in a collective vote, the council approved:

—the Parks and Recreation concept for a Master Plan.

—authorization to send out bids for engineers for the design construction of the Wastewater Treatment Plant improvements; and authorization to advertise for engineers phases 2 and 3 of the MainStreet redevelopment project.

—the Special Events/Dispensers permit for Miss New Mexico Pageant to be at the Civic Events Center, November 1.

In reports from municipal officials, the mayor asked the status of the Stroud Building.

The village clerk said the Stroud Building was never officially annexed. She said it was voted on by a council in 1978, but after the in-

formation was forwarded to the planning and zoning department at that time, the action stopped.

Deputy manager Briley said that windows like the Stroud Building along Mechem are a top priority to correct.

Mayor Shaw told the council the Stroud Building should be brought into compliance now to be fair to the other businesses.

The Stroud Building does not pay village taxes, but is privileged with paying lower village utility rates.

Before the council meeting, The Ruidoso News confirmed that the village was still charging the Stroud Building owners normal water rates instead of double rates for county property users. Village officials learned months ago that the Stroud Building was not within village limits.

After the council meeting, village manager Wicker was questioned as to why the Stroud Building was not paying the higher county rates. He said he thought he had informed the water department to change the billing, and would do so again.

Under manager reports, Wicker said a public auction is set for October 18, for excess merchandise purchased at surplus auctions. Wicker said a professional auctioneer is being brought in and it will be advertised to the public.

Alto political action group formed to influence Ruidoso government faces criminal investigation

A group called Responsible Government for Ruidoso, may have committed an irresponsible act, a fourth degree felony.

If convicted, the officers of the group seeking votes, could be stripped of their right to vote by the courts.

A mailer entitled "Missing Facts" was sent to Ruidoso residents soliciting money, "... to help defray costs of mailing or to help in the campaign in the upcoming village election in March, 1994 ..."

However, no official name was linked as the law demands in such campaign solicitations.

According to State Statute 1-19-16 dealing with campaign practices, "It is unlawful for any person, organization or political committee to publish or print any campaign advertising or communication which does not specify the name of the

sponsor or the name of a responsible officer who authorized the printing or publication of such material ..."

Printing establishments also have to identify themselves as the printers of the campaign material.

If guilty, the law provides that the fourth degree felony shall be punished as provided in the criminal code, which states a maximum year and a half in the state penitentiary, or a \$5,000 fine or both.

The mailer generally decried the writing of **The Ruidoso News** calling the reporting "yellow journalism ... writing biased, inaccurate, and often untrue editorials."

It touted what they perceived as accomplishments by the 1990 village council under former mayor Victor Alonso, former councilor Ron Andrews, councilors Barbara Duff and Bill Karn.

Although no officer names were listed from the political organization, money was to be sent to the treasurer with a post office box in Alto.

According to a petition solicited last year calling for a change in the views of **The Ruidoso News**, that same Alto post office box number was given on a petition signed by Rusty Hastings.

The News called the Hastings residence and Warren Hastings answered. He said he was the treasurer of the group and that he had made a mistake by not putting his name on the mailer. He said he voted in Ruidoso.

Asked who the other officers of the group were, Hastings indicated there was no specific organization.

David Harrell, ethics administrator for the secretary of state, called the mailer a curious type of document.

Harrell said on review of the

mailer he was turning the matter over to the district attorney, with a copy to the Attorney General.

"Except for the last paragraph, (the mailer) had no connection to an election, just information, editorials, whatever you want to call it, nothing that would have involved us," Harrell said. "The final paragraph refers to helping the campaign, this is what attracted our interest. This is the reason we are sending it over to the DA."

Harrell said, although the secretary of state is chief elections officer for the state, enforcement is referred to the district attorney and attorney general.

Harrell said the DA could bring charges for a fourth degree felony or a misdemeanor, depending upon the finding.

"A fourth degree felony also takes away someone's right to vote," Harrell said. "That's a fairly serious matter."



How many hours will I have to work to pay that back?

Joe Martin thought his credit was fine until a local bank rejected his loan application.

Bank officials said he was \$109,139.00 in arrears.

Martin, a press man with **The Ruidoso News**, said he was sure that was more money than he earned in a year, and he knew something was wrong. He asked to see verification of this whopping amount.

It took about a month, but the Alamogordo credit bureau that checked out Martin finally sent him the information he requested.

The hand written message was simple, "Report on credit file in error, should be \$65.97 and not \$109,139.00."

Martin said he was relieved by the good news and the word "sorry" would have been a nice addition to the letter.

Bonita Volunteer Fire Department contains late night Alto blaze

Fire totally destroyed an unoccupied Alto residence early Wednesday morning.

Sometime around midnight a frame house estimated at \$76,000 that belongs to Louis Tognaci, address unknown, apparently caught fire, possibly from electrical causes.

Shortly before 1 a.m., an individual saw flames as he drove past the residence on State Highway 48 at approximately mile marker 10 and

a half and pulled into the driveway of John and Diane Ward to report it.

Bonita Fire Department (BFD) responded with assistance from Capitan, Nogal, and Ruidoso Downs fire departments.

Upon arrival firefighters found the structure apparently unoccupied and totally involved.

Another neighbor, Nino Desnoyers, said flames "were shooting up 50 feet" when the Wards alerted him.

"Since the Tognaci house was already gone, our primary objective became to contain the fire to that house, and not allow it to spread to neighbors' houses," said a BFD officer.

Prompt action by Bonita firefighters, plus water shuttle from Capitan, Nogal and Ruidoso Downs contained the blaze within a short time. It did not spread to other residences.

"The fire was already in the trees and in the woods behind the

house but because of the continuous water supply, we knocked it down relatively fast," he said.

Fire crews were able to leave at 5:30 a.m., turning the scene over to investigators from the State Fire Marshal's office in Santa Fe and Lincoln County Sheriff's office.

Preliminary investigation led officials to believe that the fire may have started in the houses junction box. Investigation continues.

At press time Tognaci was unavailable for comment.

MRS opponents call on state leaders to stop nuclear waste studies

Opponents of placing high level nuclear waste in or near the Mescalero Reservation got a chance to share their concerns with some state lawmakers Friday.

Members of the Radioactive and Hazardous Materials Committee aren't sure how they'll be involved in studies by the Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe to store spent fuel rods, but they included that issue on their agenda and provided time to hear from concerned citizens.

After listening to experts from the federal government, asking questions and making comments, lawmakers were ready to hear "a different view," announced committee Chairman Tom Rutherford.

Rufina Laws, a member of the Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe and an announced candidate for tribal president, spoke first in opposition, saying Native American lands were targeted for a nuclear waste site (the MRS) partly because of the absence of EPA regulations.

She told the audience what Sierra Blanca means to her, saying the beautiful mountain is very much alive and changes with the sun and the season.

"That mountain and this reservation are sacred," said Laws, asking state lawmakers to request congressional hearings on the MRS project.

Joseph Geronimo, also a member of the Mescalero tribe and a candidate for tribal president, shouted his opposition, not only to the MRS, but also to the tribal leadership.

Both Geronimo and Laws will be on the ballot opposing tribal President Wendell Chino, who has led the Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe for more than 35 years.

Geronimo made loud accusations against the tribal president and other tribal leaders. Geronimo held up a vest he said had been damaged by gunfire and told the audience that he intended to bring a gun that had been used to threaten him into the meeting. He said someone persuaded him against brandishing the 357 mag-

num as he spoke.

He said many tribal members are afraid to speak out against the leadership and the MRS; he said they fear for their lives. He also said millions of dollars are gone.

"What about the poor people here?" he asked. "I have a degree; my kids are on reduced cost meals. How much am I making? \$10.50 an hour."

"Who is going to get these MRS jobs?" asked Geronimo, saying his tribe doesn't have the people with the degrees and training for those technical jobs.

"We have people on the reservation with degrees and they get crushed," he added, in a booming tirade that turned personal as he called names and added lying to his list of accusations.

Geronimo and his brother Harlyn Geronimo are long-time opponents of President Chino and his administration. The two were formerly known as Joseph and Harlyn Via, but changed their name to Geronimo apparently in honor of their ancestor.

Next, Bob Walters of Ruidoso submitted a statement of opposition for the record, and went on to disagree with claims by the nuclear industry that a storage site will be built with money paid in by nuclear power company customers.

Walters said the one mill per kwh mandated in the Nuclear Waste Policy Act of 1982, has never been paid by some 17 utilities.

"They will never be able to pay," he added.

"DOE insists there is \$3.8 billion in the fund," said Walters.

But in 1985, DOE reported the cost to construct an MRS would be more than \$3 billion. At an inflation rate of 2 and a half percent, that same MRS could cost more than \$3.7 billion in 1993.

With Yucca Mountain, the proposed permanent repository, drawing on the fund at a rate of from \$300 to \$400 million a year, Walters predicted the nuclear waste fund account will be bankrupt if an MRS is built.

He said this high level program also can be expected to begin com-

peting for funds with WIPP.

Walters said Edison Electric, a public relations arm of the nuclear industry, is the best funded lobbying group in the nation. He said the nuclear industry is the only industry that has been able to induce Congress to take responsibility for its waste.

"Other manufacturing industries don't have the government pick up their waste," said Walters. "The nuclear industry has convinced the Congress that it is John Q. Taxpayers' responsibility."

Walters disagreed with claims that nuclear energy benefits a portion of this area because of the regional distribution grid system.

"We get 1/10 of one percent or less from nuclear, probably out of Palo Verde," he said.

Walters said nuclear generated electricity is the most expensive way in the world to boil water.

"And that's all it does," he added.

He asked state lawmakers to consider the affect of an MRS on WIPP.

The News asked for a copy of Walters' written statement, but he didn't provide the reporter with a copy.

Although Walters as the only member of the Village of Ruidoso's MRS Advisory Committee to speak, he was not alone at the meeting. Connie Kumler of that committee was given an opportunity to speak, and called on audience members to use the time allotted.

That Ruidoso group, which has been vocal in its fight to stop the Mescaleros from studying the MRS, had circulated a flier inviting people to the meeting.

A woman who declined to give her name claimed that the waste to be stored in an MRS is actually from nuclear missiles, not from nuclear industry.

"I just want to know if the truth has been told to the Indians," she said.

"If you know the truth, tell us," inserted Senator Rutherford.

"What they're storing in Carlsbad is baby stuff compared to this," said the woman.

Donalyn Torres, a Mescalero Apache Indian and a candidate opposing Frederick Peso for vice president in the upcoming tribal elections, told the guests from Washington D.C. that she hesitated to welcome them.

"You might go too far with it," she added.

Torres said the MRS study has sparked a lot of hostility on the reservation turning family members against one another.

"At one time we lived in almost like a tranquil state — there was peace — you could feel it," said Torres.

"I don't want an MRS on my reservation," she said. "Miller Hudson (MRS coordinator) and his group came with a very nice package. I dug deeper. I didn't like what I discovered."

Torres asked the state lawmakers to make sure the cultural impact is studied, as well as the economic and environmental.

"We have been promised millions and millions of dollars. Am I going to get a dividend?"

"David Leroy (former Nuclear Negotiator) told me 'no, you people aren't going to see one damn penny.' These were his words to me," said Torres.

"Since 1942, I have seen the government go back on its word. We might be stuck with these casks for another 40,000 years."

"You can't trust the government ... it's time for action," she concluded.

Another unidentified speaker, a non-Indian, took the microphone to voice concerns over the impact of nuclear waste storage on a tourist town.

"What bugs me is, y'all have the ski area; who's going to come up here and ski? You're cutting off your nose to spite your face. All we're going to have is this dump site," she said.

President Chino responds to critics

President Wendell Chino came out of the audience and asked for a moment to respond to the string of

critics.

"I'm not here to argue and quibble with my tribal people or non-Indian people," said President Chino.

"The MRS project on the reservation is not Wendell Chino's project. You have been misinformed. Facts have been distorted."

Chino said the Tribal Council met three weeks ago and he intentionally stayed away, giving other tribal leaders the chance to make the decision of whether to pursue the MRS project, and they voted to go forward.

"Wendell Chino didn't prod them. They're mature men and women entrusted with the welfare of the Mescalero people. We have no intention of defaulting on that responsibility," said Chino.

Chino also said he doesn't go around asking for votes, and yet he has consistently been re-elected as president of the Mescalero tribe.

He also wondered why there is no outcry against the millions being spent to build missiles to destroy people.

"The Tribal Council isn't out to destroy anyone or their families. We also are concerned about our families," he said.

"Lands have been stolen from us; we have been cheated out of our resources; we want to protect what we have left...."

"Even my name has been distorted...."

"We don't expect non-Indians to decide tribal issues," said Chino. "We have been subjected to the military power of the United States."

"As long as people on the reservation put their faith and trust in me, I will continue to stand up to the tyranny of the majority," he said.

"We have provided information to our people. The Tribal Council has no intention of shoving this down the throats of our people...."

"At the opportune time when facts have been gathered, we will give you the facts and you will vote — not the people of New York, El Paso, Tularosa and Ruidoso — the people of Mescalero...."

"All of this is for the benefit of

the tribal people," said Chino.

"I stand here knowing I can stand the scrutiny of the Mescalero people who all these years have kept me in office...."

"Every time a tribal leader gets in trouble, they say go look at Wendell Chino. Yes, they came, they looked, they investigated me, and here I am — not in prison — continuing to provide leadership for the Mescalero people."

"I'm glad for what I have been able to accomplish for my people."

Fred Peso speaks

Peso said the issue of nuclear waste storage is threatening to become a confrontation over tribal sovereignty.

"It is becoming evident that some elected officials are willing to put their own short-term political interest ahead of the long-term interests of the nation," said Peso.

"But the issues at stake in the continuation of the Mescalero's MRS studies are larger than waste or sovereignty," Peso continued.

"They strike to the heart of tribal survival. Non-Indian elected officials often claim they support economic self-sufficiency for Indian tribes — that they support expanded economic development on Indian reservations."

"Too often, their support exists in theory and not in practice," said Peso. "In the same way that every-one supports responsible management of nuclear wastes, but not in their own backyard, New Mexico politicians have supported economic development for Indian tribes — but not if it's gaming and not if it's nuclear waste."

Last words

After hearing from the people gathered and from President Chino, Senator Rutherford turned the focus back to the issue of who will have a say in what happens on the reservation.

"We respect the sovereignty of the tribe and we also are interested in protecting the sovereignty of local governments and the state governments," said Rutherford.

Members of a pioneer family remember their father on the 100th anniversary of his birth

It was 100 years ago today, September 30, that Lincoln County pioneer Rolla Roberts Hinkle was born at the Old Mill in Ruidoso.

Hinkle made a name for himself as a businessman and rancher in the Roswell area before he died in 1969.

But, as the eldest son of Governor James F. Hinkle, Rolla R. Hinkle had some big shoes to fill during his lifetime.

The Hinkle name is woven in and out of most history stories about New Mexico, especially those that center on Lincoln and Chaves counties.

Rolla R. Hinkle's father, James Hinkle, followed Lincoln County War participant Billy Matthews as ranch manager for the Casey Cattle Co. on the Penasco.

Hinkle was the one who beautified the property by fixing up the original CA Bar headquarters setting out trees and fencing the yard.

In 1886, he constructed a large modern home near the historic site of Captain Henry W. Stanton's ambush by Apache Indians on May 5, 1855.

He also donated land for a building that later served as a school and church for families living along the Upper and Lower Penasco.

Then in 1890, Hinkle met Lillian Roberts, niece of Dan Roberts, the first captain of the famed Texas

Rangers D Company and soon-to-be sheriff of Lincoln County.

After a series of family visits, community dances, whist parties and rides in a flashy Miller buggy, Jim and Lillie were married in the annex of the Lincoln County Courthouse on December 14, 1892.

Their first child, Rolla, was born at the Dowlin Mill on the Upper Ruidoso; and the Hinkle family will be remembering the 100th anniversary of that birth today.

The Hinkle family, with young Rolla and his baby sister, Vera, settled in Roswell in 1901, where two more children were born, Clarence and Lillian.

Roswell was the fourth largest town in New Mexico when the Hinkles moved there, but it wasn't until 1903, that the settlement was incorporated.

In 1904, James F. Hinkle was elected as Roswell's first mayor and he filled that slot until 1906.

Rolla Hinkle followed the family tradition of service and throughout his life he stayed active in community and state affairs.

He was graduated from New Mexico Military Institute in the famous class of 1914 — that entire class went to World War I, and about a third didn't return. Then Hinkle attended Washington and Lee University where he was a member of Phi Kappa Psi Frater-

nity. Hinkle was a veteran of World War I, commissioned as a lieutenant in the U.S. Marine Corps in 1917.

After completing his service, he returned to Roswell where he organized Hinkle Motor Co., a business he sold before establishing the Hinkle Motor Supply Co.

But, Hinkle was called back into the service of his country during World War II when he worked as a dollar-a-year representative of the United States Treasury Department in the promotion of the sale of defense bonds in the 10 southeastern counties of the state.

Through the years, Rolla R. Hinkle was involved in the Roswell Old Timers Association, the Chaves County Historical Society, president of the Roswell Country Club, founding member of the Roswell Kiwanis Club and a member of the board of directors of The First National Bank.

He and his wife, Marian Framp-ton Fell Hinkle, had two children, Rolla Roberts Hinkle II and Aleen McQuiddy.

Rolla the second, has a ranch in Bingham and a cabin in Ruidoso, and he can be seen flying his hot air balloon over the village early some mornings.

A 1951 graduate of New Mexico Military Institute, Hinkle followed

in his dad's footsteps of responding to a community need.

Hinkle II and a group of friends got together in 1973, to help out their alma mater. After the Vietnam war, NMMI's enrollment dropped, and this group of institute grads came to the rescue by buying a hot-air balloon to use as a promotional tool.

Hinkle, Dick Wagner, Penrod Toles, Jerry Smith, Charlie Joplin, Ted Scrimshire, Buzz Johnson and Jack McClellan chipped in to buy the Institute balloon and took it around to state to recruit students for NMMI.

Wagner and Hinkle logged the first 1,000 hours on Institute One, and when that red and black balloon died of old-age, the group replaced it with Institute Two.

Somewhere along the line, Hinkle became the proud sole owner of the Institute Two when he paid to have it repaired.

That balloon, two bit the dust recently in San Angelo, Texas, after Hinkle recorded 900 hours.

But the Hinkles are of sturdy stock, so Rolla II is not grounded.

He's the longest continuous pilot in the Kodak International Balloon Fiesta, celebrating his 21st year this October, and he'll be back this year flying his rainbow colored balloon.

Homecoming brings Fabens & ghosts of seasons past to town

Friday night will bring back faces from many eras in Warrior football lore when the lights are turned on at W.D. Horton stadium.

The present-day Ruidoso Warriors will meet the Fabens Wildcats and the Warriors of the past will be playing whomever was involved on that special night when they made the big tackle or scored the winning touchdown or blocked or kicked or whatever.

Homecoming 1993 should be a great night for football.

The Fabens, Texas, Wildcats come to Ruidoso for the first time in recent memory. Located on the outskirts of El Paso, Fabens competes in district 5-AAA in Texas.

Their district opponents include Alpine, El Paso Mountain View, Clint and San Elizario.

Currently 3-1 on the season, Fabens has played well most of the time and returns to the win column after a 3-6 season last year — their first losing season in 15 years.

This year Fabens owns wins over Gadsden, Santa Teresa and Deming. The loss came at the hands of Silver City.

The Wildcats return seven starters on offense and six on defense, with five players playing both ways including shifty running back Rene Alvarado and quarterback Stacy Nunez.

Warrior head coach Mike Gaston

sees Fabens as another tough test for the Warriors, as again his team will face a bigger, more physical group.

"They're a real strong defensive team, I'd compare them to a Tularosa or NMMI as far as a football club goes. They are very aggressive and really scrappy ... they've only had 18 points scored on them all year long ... they're just very solid," Gaston said.

In the size department the Warriors and the Wildcats seem to be close, although we're not sure since Fabens does not include that information in their program.

Fabens' tenacity on defense was apparent last week against Deming. Deming was inside the 20 yard line five times during the game and only scored three points. Fabens scored two touchdowns.

In comparing the Warriors and the Wildcats, they could pretty much look in the mirror and see each other.

Both teams are young. Perhaps Ruidoso is a bit more youthful, but not a lot.

Both teams run the same offense and the same defense, with subtle variations. Fabens runs the Wing-T, like Ruidoso, but also likes to run plays out of a Wing-I formation, to facilitate their power sweeps and increasing desire to throw the football.

Like Gaston, Fabens' coach Ted Graham expects to see a good

game.

"We're awful young, we're going through a rebuilding year. We went to the Texas playoffs two years ago ... last year we were very young and we're still young this year. We've been playing some sophomores, a sprinkling of seniors and a few juniors ... we're having a pretty good year for early in the season, but it's a lot of hard work, not a lot of talent," said Graham.

"We really appreciate people that play sound offense and sound defense. Ruidoso runs a lot of basic plays out of the Wing-T and plays good fundamental football and that's where we hang our hat," said Graham.

After last week's shellacking at the hands of Portales, the Warriors have some definite questions in the injury department. Coach Gaston is concerned.

"We just hope we can put a team out there. Ricky Devara was going to play tailback (for the injured Raul Davis) but he hurt his shoulder last week and he's got some swelling, so we don't know how much he'll get to play," said Gaston.

"Raul Davis practiced today (Wednesday), but he's questionable," said Gaston.

If Davis and Devara are out of commission, Anthony Torres and Jackie Roe will move into the offense. Roe was supposed to be the Wingback coming into the season,

but an early injury sidelined him until two weeks ago.

Torres, the fastest man on the team, can play anywhere, although he prefers no to play center.

The punter is another concern for the Warriors. At the start of the season, it looked like David LaMay was going to be All-World ... injured.

Then J.R. Chino punted for a couple of games ... he left the team (and has since returned). Ricky Devara punted during the last two games and doesn't have the power of Chino or LaMay but he also has no return yardage charged against him. Now he's injured.

What does all of that mean? Chino's back in, although he sprained an ankle this week. Well, maybe he's back in. Or maybe Devara can punt — or LaMay. Or maybe we'll just go for it on fourth down.

The game boils down to how injured the Warriors are and how good Fabens is. On paper Fabens is pretty good, and yet Silver beat them and then got smashed by a very good Kirtland Central team.

One thing is for sure, Fabens is not a Portales or a Lovington. They won't be explosive like those two.

Ruidoso's offense can score against a lot of teams, but our defense — well they need to look a little better to give all the former Warriors in the crowd something to talk about next year.


Matt Harshey is listed as 10th in AAA Keeper stats, but should move up this week following last week's game, according to Hood.

Ups and downs evident at homecoming

Friday's homecoming game brings a lot of letter jackets back to the old stomping ground. A lot of success stories and a lot of emotional let-downs.

The Warriors have won the state championship four times. Twice in the fifties, once in the seventies and once in the eighties.

There have been three second-place finishes in the past 25 years.

As a class "C" school in the 1950s Ruidoso was pretty dominating. As a class A school in the sixties, Ruidoso was also good, although not reaching the plateau that preceded those years or would follow.

My first recollection of a good football team was in 1971. We didn't win State, but as a seventh-grader, just getting to go to the game was important. We lost to Jal in the AA State Championship game something like 14-6.

Our offense that game was a 90-yard kickoff return by a speedy junior named Reeves McGuire.

The game was played at the Bulldog Bowl in Artesia and if I'm not mistaken, we did smash up the locker room and freely admitted it — and gladly paid for it.

The next year presented a rematch. This time we got those Panthers, and didn't feel a need to tear the locker room up. Our All-American quarterback Blane Miller was on the money and headed for a college scholarship.

The middle seventies gave the Warriors a couple of playoff appearances but not too much. Always a winning season, but no championships.

Colly Parks, Josh Ensor and Borde Williams were the field generals for Coach Howell.

The eighties brought new life to the Warriors.

Darrell Stierwalt moved up to the head position after serving as Howell's right-hand man for several years.

Stierwalt's first good team came along in 1980. Scott Neal was the quarterback. Lon and Don Nunley among others were also there.

They were good the next year too. They had to be.

Ruidoso had moved into class AAA.

A couple of bad years and Stierwalt had enough of a small school of 450 competing against Silver City and Deming with well over a thousand and he got out.

Enter Cooper Henderson.

A man, who upon a brief physical inspection, could not possibly know a thing about football. The school board has hired us an accountant as a football coach, the town cried.

Hal Henderson was the son of L.G. Henderson, a legendary coach in Artesia. The "Coop" understood the value of hard work and dedication. He promised a winning football team if we would give him what he needed.

We went 6-5. Ragsdale was one of the few, if not the only, coach alive that was fired after one year, after winning the district championship and having a winning season.

Why? We missed Henderson. How did we let him get away? This will go down in Ruidoso Warrior history as one of the great goof-ups.

The next year we moved closer to getting Henderson back. We hired Mike Speck, Henderson's right-hand man. With most of the talent lost to graduation, Speck made due. His team finished 5-6 and actually won the district, but had an ineligible player on a kickoff in a game we won 55-12. We had to forfeit that game and the District championship.

The next year Speck won only one game. Time for a new coach (We still miss Henderson).

This brings us to the present. Second-year coach Mike Gaston, a product of big-league Texas AAAAA football, is at the controls. Last year the Warriors won one game. This year we've won two.

Gaston has done everything possible to get the program back on its feet. We haven't lost any games that we shouldn't have, and we've nearly won a couple that we couldn't have.

Coach Henderson is gone, and we miss him. But this is now. We are definitely on our way back.

It'll be slow, probably next year before we start talking playoffs again. But at least we can see it down the road.

Coach Gaston and his staff have put in thousands of hours into turning this thing around. And it will turn around, with time.

Let's just make sure that all of those former Warriors in their blue letter jackets at the homecoming game who talk about how good we used to be, remember where we came from and remember that all of that is still possible, with hard work and dedication. After all, we've done it before...

State leaders seek answers on MRS

State legislators, federal employees, members of the Mescalero Apache tribe and concerned citizens exchanged views Friday on nuclear waste storage.

Lawmakers aren't sure what part they'll play in the federal government's search for a home for nuclear waste, but they aren't impressed with the way federal officials are handling the issue.

Confusion is at the heart of a controversy over who will have a say when and if the Mescalero tribe goes forward with a nuclear waste storage facility.

Does the state have standing when the tribe enters into negotiations with the federal government?

Will neighboring communities be involved in studying the impact on their economies and the environment?

Those questions were raised, but not fully answered during the mid-morning meeting.

Mescalero Tribal Councilor Fred Peso, who is managing the tribe's studies that could lead to a nuclear waste storage site on the reservation, welcomed state legislators and dozens of visitors to the Inn of the Mountain Gods.

Peso was reporting for the second time in two weeks to members of the New Mexico State Legislature, this time to the Radioactive and Hazardous Materials Committee.

Some members of the public were on hand to hear more about a study of a Monitored Retrievable Storage (MRS) system to house spent fuel from nuclear utility companies.

Most listened to a series of reports provided in the information-gathering format used by legislative committees.

A few expected more, and

protested loudly and spoke out during the series of presentations. Some accusations were shouted out against Peso and Mescalero Apache Tribal President Wendell Chino.

State Senator Tom Rutherford, chairman of the legislative committee, said he and his colleagues are used to letting people have meaningful dialogue and led the legislators and other speakers through a series of speeches.

"Nobody's clear as to what the legislature's role will be ... if we have one," said Rutherford, apparently in response to comments on Indian sovereignty.

"We don't want to get in the middle of a war," he added.

State Representative John Underwood, who represents Lincoln County and the Mescalero reservation, introduced local elected officials at the meeting and then asked the nuclear negotiator representative when local communities will have a say in this study over placing nuclear waste in the area.

"The law says upon entering into negotiations we are to consult with communities," said Robert Mussler, counsel for the Office of the Nuclear Waste Negotiator, in Washington

D.C.

"My understanding is there is not a veto for state and local people," said Mussler. The process could include forming a citizens advisory group, but the details are not lined out in the law.

The negotiator is to consult with state and local governments, added Mussler.

"That's double talk," said an audience member.

"The idea that the DOE can come in here and just sort of make things vague and not worry about details is at best offensive," commented Senator Rutherford after legislators had a chance to speak and ask questions.

"If you want to go through our ports of entry you need to start working with the state," he warned.

Rutherford blamed obfuscation by DOE for the delays in opening WIPP site near Carlsbad.

"That thing is just a mess because you didn't take care of details."

Asked if there is funding for neighbors of a possible MRS site, Victor Trebules of the Department of Energy described the phased funding process that includes the \$100,000 and \$200,000 grants already given to the Mescaleros.

The next step, the \$2.8 million grant, is the time when the host will participate in inter-governmental exchange.

"We haven't gotten into that stage yet," said Trebules, stressing that the final determination on any MRS will be with the U.S. Congress.

"We only make a recommendation," said Trebules.

He did admit that there is no separate grant program for affected communities.

"We want to minimize conflict," said Trebules, adding that the DOE believes inter-governmental coordination is important.

"We didn't want this to appear as if the federal government was coming in and saying this is what you have to do," he said.

Members of the legislative committee added their questions and comments, with Representative Ramon Huerta wondering why tribes were invited into this process separately from states.

"Was it because they have lands?" asked Huerta.

"Somewhere else is going to be somebody else's back yard ... it has to be done ... Congress promised ... it has to be done somewhere," he said.

"We don't use it," yelled audience members.

Huerta disagreed, reminding the audience of New Mexico's years in uranium mining.

"We were part of the problem; we have to be part of the solution," he said.

Audience members shouted out comments on the WIPP site, indicating that's "our part."

Advisory member Representative Thomas E. Atcitty, a Democrat from Shiprock, commented on the 40 years that his people lived with radioactive uranium tailings.

"Nobody said 'boo,' not even the

Sierra Club," said Atcitty.

"As patriotic Americans we (Navajos) allowed the uranium mining and milling within our communities ... we needed to help our country," he said.

He went on to talk of the history of conflict between the U.S. government and the Indian tribes, describing how conflicts were ended and tribes subdued through treaties.

"These treaties remain in effect today, and the tribe's expect interaction with the tribe be on a government to government basis," said Atcitty. He said the relationship with states and municipalities is different — municipalities derive their authority from the state and tribes from federal legislation.

"The state has no authority over a tribe unless it is specifically granted by Congress through legislation...."

"A state can put pressure on a tribe to change its course, but the ultimate decision will be between the federal government and the tribe."

Atcitty said he has faith in the Mescalero Apache people and leadership that they will not endanger the people or their land, which they view as sacred.

"It's going to be a long drawn-out affair — just as WIPP," added Atcitty, recalling a comment made by Mescalero President Wendell Chino: "Let's not sell American technology short. I'm sure they'll come up with another way of disposing of nuclear waste."

At this point Joseph Geronimo shouted from the back of the room, "Powers of the tribe are sovereign; these are not inherited — not derived from any government."

Later in the meeting Senator Rutherford had this to say to members of the Mescalero tribe who spoke: "Sometimes you're sovereign and sometimes you're citizens."

Representative Albert Gurule (Democrat) reminded the audience that the legislative committee is a statutory committee. He said its members were studying what was going on in the Mescalero nation as it relates to the MRS.

"Fuel rods are being stored in pools of water ... (we) have to find a place to shift them or they're going to have to build more (pools)," noted Gurule.

Before going into what he called "a different view," Rutherford lined out the DOE.

"We don't need this kind of tension among our communities — it's like when all the dogs have to eat out of one dog dish."

"You're causing a lot of problems — a great deal of expense."

Rutherford said all the time spent reading long reports could be better spent looking for solutions to gangs and such.

"You made a horrible mistake; we don't need to be divided ... we're a poor state and we need your help."

The audience applauded and Rutherford concluded:

"I don't know if this is a good project or a bad project and I don't think anyone else does either."



Federal reorganization reaches out and touches Lincoln County

Earlier this month, U.S. Department of Agriculture Secretary Mike Espy unveiled his \$2.3-million savings reorganization plan and challenged employees to help reduce the bureaucracy and eliminate waste and duplication.

The reorganization will cut the number of agencies from 43 to 30 and eliminate 7,500 employees over five years, resulting in a savings through staff reductions of \$1.3-billion. Another related \$1-billion will be saved through cuts in travel, office space and supplies.

The reorganization plan includes creating a Farm Service Agency

that will cut red tape for the farmer, consolidating into one office the field programs now divided among four different agencies. The number of field offices will be cut from 3,700 to 2,485.

In Lincoln County, the Soil Conservation office in Capitan probably will be consolidated with the office in Carrizozo. Most counties will only be allowed one office, local officials said.

The plan calls for the creation of three new rural development agencies to eliminate duplication and overlapping functions.

NEW MEXICO CHILD NEEDS A HOME

Eight year old Frank is still waiting for a family to call his own. Born on February 2, 1984, he is now a third grader. Frank loves big machinery such as tractors, road graders and cranes. He likes animals and has had a special interest in dinosaurs.

The abuse, neglect and instability in Frank's life have resulted in difficult emotional and behavior problems for him. It is also suspected that he may suffer from some serious mental health problems which also interfere with his success in school and in family settings. Frank has moved out of the residential treatment program he was in last year. He then spent some time in a foster home and, due to behavior problems, was moved to the children's psychiatric hospital for thirty day evaluation in December 1992.

Special education classes are needed due to Frank's short attention span and emotional problems. He is an intelligent and curious boy who is usually well-behaved in social situations. However, he still hasn't learned to fully trust others and isn't appropriately concerned about his own safety. Frank has a mild hearing loss and is color blind.

When Frank's 13 year old brother, George, who is visually impaired, was placed in the same foster home with him last fall, Frank's behavior deteriorated dramatically.

Frank's social worker hopes to find an adoptive family who can provide him with the structure, constant limits and consequences he needs to succeed. A family who will share interests and encourage him to pursue activities will probably have the most success. He's likely to do best as the youngest or only child. Frank needs to stay in touch with his brother who will be placed separately. Financial assistance is available. NM Rev. 1653

After school program offers kids lots of fun, parents peace of mind

In one corner, two blond heads bobbed up and down in unison with paint brushes that splattered red across a paper surface resting on a bright blue plastic easel.

A few feet away, some would-be chefs prepared an imaginary dinner at a pint-sized play stove.

Other enthusiastic groups indulged their imaginations at a Lego table, on a miniature racetrack and in a small tub with water toys.

The group of kindergartners and first grade children are spending their afternoon at Nob Hill Elementary instead of returning home, possibly to empty houses.

Their parents, most of whom work, can relax, secure in the knowledge that their children are safe and enjoying themselves with friends until the session ends at 5:30 p.m.

The Extended Day program at Nob Hill, now in its second year, is open first to families that qualify under federal income guidelines. But with 80 available spaces, other families usually can take advantage of the opportunity at an incredibly low charge of \$2 a day to cover snacks and materials.

Roger Sowder (principal of Nob Hill) and I discussed it and decided

this year to focus on getting as many kids as we can, because we know there are more going home to empty houses," said program director Lee Ann Carner during an interview at the school earlier this week. "We want to give them a safe place and interaction with adults they can trust."

Currently, 38 children are enrolled in the program, which is financed through a \$65,000 grant from the State Children, Youth and Families Department.

"We're real pleased that we were funded again this year," Carner said. "Many other grants were cut."

"By the end of last year, about 60 children were enrolled, but not all were here every day. We've been adding three of four new children every day."

Five teachers supervise the young charges, but Carner said they try to be as unobtrusive as possible.

"After all, they've been with teachers all day long," she said. "We set up the stations and then leave them alone so they can choose among the five or six things to do. We expect a sand table to arrive soon. We also have a quiet place for those who may be tired. They can sit or lie down while watching a Disney movie. When they first ar-

rive, they go outside to the playground.

"Toward the end of the day here, they usually get the balls out and finish up that way."

Caron Snow, financial officer for the Ruidoso School District, said the program is designed to be fun, but educational with exposure to literacy materials, agriculture, music, dancers, cooking and cross-cultural experiences with story tellers, puppet shows and dancers.


"It's a popular program with the community and I hope we can continue it," she said.

Cooking serves several purposes. Not only does it keep the children tuned in on one task, it also sends them home with new recipes that they can prepare themselves.

"The recipes are simple and they might be able to show their parents," Carner said.

Last Wednesday, cooking also became a cross-cultural experience as chef Josephine Sanchez showed the children how to make tortillas. They kneaded and rolled their treats and then Sanchez quickly fried them.

Helping Carner with the children in the school gymnasium are Kathy Rhoten, Iva Gurule, Emmalene Botella, Judy Justus, Mandy Spurlin and Collette Yuzos.

The children spend the afternoon after school reading, cooking, painting and playing outside while their parents are confident that they are safe and well supervised. The program started last year and is financed by a grant from the State Department of Children, Youth and Families. Designed to meet the needs of low income families and ensure that children do not go home to empty houses, when there is space, other families can apply for a charge of \$2 a day to cover snacks and other materials.

Bowlin to be honored at Fiesta

Joe Bowlin, the one man who has done more than anyone besides Billy himself to make The Kid a household word, will be honored during the Third Annual Billy the Kid Fiesta Saturday in Santa Rosa.

The Alexander Grzelachowski Territorial House in Santa Rosa, where Billy ate his last Christmas dinner, will host the fiesta.

Bowlin and his wife, Maryln, are founders of the Taiban-based Billy the Kid Outlaw Gang Historical Society.

The Bowlins are longtime cultural tourism promoters.

Bowlin, who is in poor health, is not expected to attend the event. He is staying at the home of his daughter in Ruidoso.

The Billy the Kid Society has been instrumental in attracting visitors from all over the world to

Puerto de Luna and other "Billy the Kid Country" communities through its substantial newsletter circulation.

More than 3,000 members, their spouses, extended families, friends, neighbors, and pass-along readers visit or inquire about the annual fiesta in Santa Rosa and the 1875 landmark where William H. Bonney, alias Bill the kid ate his last Christmas dinner after being captured by Sheriff Pat Garrett near Taiban on Christmas eve, 1880.

Also this weekend, the Billy the Kid Outlaw Gang plans to rededicate what it believes is the missing sandstone marker from the grave of outlaw Charlie Bowdre, at 2 p.m. Saturday, October 2, in the Old Fort Sumner cemetery, seven miles southeast of the community of Fort

Sumner. Bowdre, a pal of Billy the Kid, lies buried alongside the Kid and Bowdre's and the Kid's pal Tom O'Folliard.

Bowdre and O'Folliard were killed by Lincoln County Sheriff Pat Garrett and his posse in December 1880. The Kid was killed by Garrett in July 1881.

The tiny, adobe-walled cemetery is located behind the Old Fort Sumner Museum, near the entrance to Fort Sumner State Monument.

Admission to the public cemetery is free during daylight hours year-round.

Following the rededication ceremony, the Billy the Kid Outlaw Gang will conduct a board of directors meeting in the adjacent Fort Sumner Community House, where it will elect its officers for 1994.



AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE ADOPTING AND EXECUTION OF A JOINT POWERS AGREEMENT, THE RATIFICATION OF AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF ALAMOGORDO, NEW MEXICO, AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF THE CITY OF ALAMOGORDO OTERO/LINCOLN COUNTY JPA ENVIRONMENTAL SERVICES GROSS RECEIPTS TAX REVENUE BONDS, SERIES 1993 B, IN THE PRINCIPAL AMOUNT OF \$_____ FOR THE PURPOSE OF ACQUIRING, CONSTRUCTING, EXTENDING, ENLARGING, BETTERING, REPAIRING OR OTHERWISE IMPROVING OR MAINTAINING SOLID WASTE DISPOSAL EQUIPMENT, EQUIPMENT FOR OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE OF SANITARY LANDFILLS, SOLID WASTE FACILITIES OR ANY COMBINATION OF THE FOREGOING, ALL AT THE OTERO/LINCOLN COUNTY REGIONAL LANDFILL LOCATED NEAR ORO GRANDE IN OTERO COUNTY, NEW MEXICO, PLEDGING THE MUNICIPAL ENVIRONMENTAL SERVICES GROSS RECEIPTS TAX DISTRIBUTED TO THE VILLAGE OF RUIDOSO DOWNS AS AUTHORIZED BY (SECTIONS 7-19B-1 THROUGH 7-19B-7 NMSA 1978), PROVIDING FOR THE REVENUES DERIVED FROM SAID TAXES PRESCRIBING OTHER DETAILS CONCERNING

The preambles recite that the Village of Ruidoso Downs (the "Village") is a municipal corporation of the State of New Mexico; that the Village, along with the City of Alamogordo, the Village of Tularosa, the Town of Carrizozo, the Village of Capitan, the Village of Corona, the Village of Ruidoso, and the Village of Cloudcroft, (collectively, the "Municipalities") currently impose an environmental gross receipts tax of 1/16th of 1%; that Lincoln County and Otero County (the Counties") currently impose an environmental gross receipts tax of 1/8th of 1%; and that such environmental gross receipts tax has been dedicated to the acquisition, construction, operation and maintenance of solid waste facilities and related facilities; that the Municipalities and the Counties (together, the Participants") will enter into a "Joint Powers Agreement for the Financing and Establishment of the Otero/Lincoln County Regional Landfill" to exercise common solid waste disposal powers pursuant to Sections 11-1-1 through 11-1-7, NMSA 1878; that the City of Alamogordo, New Mexico ("Alamogordo") will acquire a solid waste facility (including facilities already acquired by Alamogordo) to be known as the Otero/Lincoln County Regional Landfill (the "Facility") on behalf of the Participants by issuing the "City of Alamogordo Otero/Lincoln County JPA Environmental Services Gross Receipts Tax Revenue Bonds, Series 1993B (the "Bonds"); that each Participant will pledge the revenues received from its environmental gross receipts tax (the "Pledged Tax Revenues") to the payment of the Bonds; that Alamogordo also will pledge the Net Revenues from operation of the Facility to payment of the Bonds; that the Bonds constitute a first lien on the Pledge Tax Revenues and the Net Revenues; that the Participants, acting through the existing Otero or Lincoln County Solid Waste Authorities, will have joint ownership of the Facility; and declares an emergency.

Sections 1 through 4 ratify previous action by the Board and officers of the Village; authorize the Facility; ratify the Joint Powers Agreement previously approved and executed by the Village and ratify the Bond Ordinance previously adopted by Alamogordo to authorize issuance of the Bonds.

Sections 5 sets forth the pledge by the Village of its 1/16th of 1% environmental services gross receipts tax (the "GRT Tax"), requires that the Village make monthly deposits of the GRT Tax immediately upon receipt, into a separate fund of the Village designated as the "City of Alamogordo

Otero/Lincoln County JPA Environmental Services Gross Receipts Tax, Village of Ruidoso Downs Income Fund," and requires the Village to transfer all amounts in such fund monthly to Alamogordo for deposit into a separate fund to be used as described in the Bond Ordinance.

Sections 6 and 7 ratify Alamogordo's pledge of the Net Revenues of the Facility to the payment of the bonds and acknowledge that the Bonds constitute an irrevocable and first lien (but not necessarily an exclusively first lien) on the Village's Pledge Tax Revenues.

Section 8 and 9 acknowledge that the term of the Joint Powers Agreement is perpetual and that any withdrawal from the Joint Powers Agreement by the Village does not affect the Village's obligations, financial or otherwise, under the Joint Powers Agreement and provide for the exclusion of the Village from participation and ownership of the Facility if the Village fails to approve the Ordinance by the majority required for adoption of emergency ordinances.

Section 10 through 15 delegate certain powers to Village officers, provide separability and repealer clauses, provide an irrevocability clause, provide for an effective date and provide a summary for publication.

Judges will be Teri Sodd, Candyce Garrett, Roger Sowder and Jean Rhoten.


Location of the judges is being kept in strict confidence.


Post time changes to 1 p.m. beginning February 18, through closing day.



Winners will receive gift certificates from Wal-Mart from \$20 to \$10.



Water for the pets will be available at the parking lot and on a golf cart that will move with the animals to ensure that they do not overheat.


Parents are invited to make it a family affair and march with their children, Morris said.



Showmanship winner, which is open to all, will also get a coveted spot at the famous cookoff. Points will be awarded to teams who place in the top places.



Judging is based on aroma, red color, taste, after-taste and consistency.



Both regional rod clubs are a part of the parent organization, National Street Rod Association.



The fair benefits the gymnastics association's building fund, and past events helped raised enough money to build a brand new gym in Ruidoso Downs.




