State scrambles county tax records

Think you've got your property taxes figured out? Better hold off writing that check.

The state goofed on four school districts and Lincoln County Assessor Patsy Serna is trying to get officials to correct the errors immediately. Otherwise, two school districts will collect more money than they should this year and two will get less. The Ruidoso school district will be on the losing end, she said.

"I submitted my values to the State Property Tax Department. They certified them to the Department of Finance and Administration," Serna told **The Ruidoso News**. "That department made an error somewhere and the figures that came back to me weren't the same. The totals on four districts were incorrect, although the net total taxable value was the same."

The difference in totals was discovered during an interview with **The News** last week.

County commissioners certified the tax levy at their special meeting September 23 and Serna is asking for their support in demanding a correction.

To buy or not to buy

An explosive exercise of politics should keep Tuesday's Lincoln County Commission meeting lively.

The all-day agenda is packed with controversial items from the proposed purchase of land at Glencoe to negotiation on a first-ever contract for a county manager and a proposal for a change in the salary schedule of the Sheriff's Department.

The meeting will begin at 9 a.m. in the commission room of the county courthouse in Carrizozo.

The hotly debated purchase of the Super Select Sales Barn and 11 acres of property at Glencoe has split the commission. Although they voted three-to-two to buy the land last month, the motion carried a 60-day escape clause rider.

Commissioners Wilton Howell and Monday Montes say the move would be progressive and result in a better county fair, more interaction with Roswell and would bring more special events to the county, as well as more countywide participation.


Commissioners Bill Schwettmann and Stirling Spencer opt for keeping the fair in Capitan and enlarging at that site, where mostly volunteer labor has created a complex for rodeos, community dances, meetings and agricultural/livestock activities. They question whether the \$250,000 invest-

Police take a bite out of crime spree

A Ruidoso fireman, charged with burglary last week, was given administrative leave with pay, while he waits to go through the court system.

Village manager Ron Wicker said, although Ruidoso fireman Jerry Piaz admitted guilt, he still has to be tried in a court.

However, it was Piaz's decision to allow Piaz to continue getting paid by the village until after the trial, a period that could take years.

Wicker, who heads all village departments, said he met with the fire chief, police chief and personnel director regarding the matter. He

said in his opinion, they operated by the personnel code. Personnel director Deborah Rogge said the personnel code allows for an option of pay or not to pay.

Fire chief Virgil Reynolds said Piaz was scheduled to be one of the next code enforcement officers for the village.

Piaz, 21, was one of seven people arrested last week when the Ruidoso Police Department cleared five commercial burglaries, three residential burglaries and one auto burglary. Piaz bonded out.

Ruidoso police recovered an estimated \$18,200 in stolen property.

Four men and three women were charged last Friday with seven fel-

ony arrests. Ruidoso police also charged a juvenile with aggravated battery and sent another Ruidoso resident to jail on a stabbing incident.

Charged with felony arrest for burglary were: Israel Rodriguez, 18, of Ruidoso, sent for a 30-day diagnostic in Las Vegas; James Chavez, 19, a California resident now in the Lincoln County Jail; and Jerry Romero, 20, Piñon Park, released on bond.

The four men were charged in five commercial burglaries that included Rich Gas, Diamond Shamrock, Gaddy's, Fun Trackers and Sonic Drive-In. Some were also accused of being involved in an auto

burglary of Rick and Kathy Osborne.

The Gaddy's case was a joint investigation with the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department.

Amy Offutt, 19; Shyra Kelly, 25, and Cheri Williams, 43, were arrested at a house behind the Budget Motel in Ruidoso Downs for receiving stolen property over \$2,500, but under \$20,000.

High schooler Wesley Billups was referred to juvenile probation after an altercation in which he was involved, sent a student to the emergency room of the Lincoln County Medical Center.

Billups was charged with aggravated battery.

Evangelina Davila turned herself into the court system after stabbing her roommate last week at Gavilan Trailer Park.

Davila was charged with a third degree felony and was in the Ruidoso jail as of last Friday.

Detective Lanny Maddox said Crimestoppers tips initiated investigation on the commercial burglaries.

In addition to the burglary spree, a gun shooting incident last Saturday brought additional felony charges to two area residents.

According to police reports, about 11 p.m. last Saturday, Adolph "Fito" Herrera, 24, of Hollywood Trailer Park was engaged in a fight with Jose Marquez, 21, of Ruidoso Downs.

Faustino Miranda, 18, and

Senate stops MRS funds

 It's over.

In one quick vote Thursday, the United States Senate moved the controversy over siting a nuclear waste facility in Mescalero out of the arena of local politics and placed it squarely in the hands of the federal government.

The Senate accomplished that by cutting off the flow of federal funds.

Senator Jeff Bingaman (D-NM) introduced an amendment that would pave the way for greater input by state and local officials in negotiations for a Monitored Retrievable Storage (MRS) facility for nuclear waste.

Senator Bingaman's measure, co-sponsored by Senator Pete Domenici (R-NM) would bar funding from the Nuclear Waste Fund for Phase II, Part B site investigation grants, pending agreement among relevant governmental officials in the vicinity of any proposed site.

In the case of the Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe, which has made application for a \$2.8 million Phase II-B grant, that would require a consensus among state, county and local officials in New Mexico, Lincoln and Otero counties and in Ruidoso and other area towns.

"We need to keep from putting more money into this program until we have asked and answered some important questions," said Senator Bingaman.

In a telephone interview Thursday, Bingaman predicted the amendment will be kept in the house version of the Fiscal Year 1994 Energy and Water Development Appropriations Act. He expected the Senate to complete work on the bill by Friday.

"We need to siting whether it makes sense to site an MRS facility a great distance from where the waste is produced," said Bingaman.

"It's risky to be proceeding to develop an MRS before we have a final decision on a permanent site," Bingaman told **The News**.

While his amendment doesn't include details on the local involvement, Bingaman said it will at least slow down the process.

"I believe there are some significant issues surrounding the MRS process and the Office of Nuclear Waste Negotiator that we need to address," said Bingaman.

"The intention of this amendment is to address these issues in a limited way by slowing down the funding process."

The Nuclear Waste Policy Act of 1982 and subsequent amendments have led to a Department of Energy (DOE) plan for an MRS facility to be used as a temporary emplacement for nuclear waste until a permanent repository is constructed.

The Office of the Nuclear Waste Negotiator is empowered to find a state or Indian tribe willing to host a repository or MRS facility.

"This amendment ensures that money is not wasted on pursuing

Lincoln County artists honored

Two Lincoln County artists are among the winners of the 1993 Governor's Awards for Excellence and Achievement in the Arts.

Luis Jimenez of Visual Arts/Sculpture and John Liggett Meigs of San Patricio for major contributions to the arts.

Governor Bruce King, First Lady Alice King, and members of the New Mexico Arts Commission announced the recipients who will be recognized in a special 20th anniversary luncheon ceremony on Monday, November 8, at Santa Fe's La Fonda Hotel.

Reservations may be made for the arts awards celebration by calling 827-6490.

An exhibition opening and public reception for the artists will be conducted following the luncheon, from 3 to 5 p.m. in the Governor's Gallery, 4th floor, State Capital Building.

"For each generation of New Mexicans the arts have held a special place in defining quality of life," said Governor King.

"In New Mexico, more so than in other states, the arts represent a vitality and perhaps even the identity of the state itself."

The Governor's Arts Awards were established by Governor and Mrs. King in 1974 as a way of paying tribute to the crucial role

played by artists and craftspeople in the life of the state, both culturally and economically.

Nominations for the awards are invited each spring from arts groups and interested New Mexicans. All nominations are reviewed by a selection committee which sends its recommendations to the Governor for approval.

The 1993 Arts Commission Awards Committee consisted of Chairman Gary Morton of Ruidoso, Ramona Sakiestewa of Santa Fe, Bergit Balazter of Santa Fe, Ximenes of Albuquerque and Evy Diamond of Carlsbad.

Luis Jimenez's monumental—and often startling—sculptures stand prominently in public places throughout American — stylized figures of cowboys and Indians, high-plains sodbusters and bordertown Hispanics, drawn from the popular mythology of the West.

Jimenez, who was born in El Paso, Texas, and studied art in Texas, Mexico City and New York, uses the uniquely American medium of fiberglass, spray-painted in vibrant, high-gloss colors and often accented with charges of neon or electric light.

His instantly recognized figures range from a sodbuster-farmer dutifully plowing his land to a muscular, balded Mexican man, car-

rying a woman across the Rio Grande.

The 54 year-old Jimenez grew up working in his father's El Paso sign shop. There he learned the skills that would eventually tone his art—spray painting, working with metal and neon. He holds a bachelor's degree in architecture and art from the University of Texas. Living in New York in the mid-1960s, he studied with Seymour Lipton and was influenced by artists Thomas Hart Benson and Mexican muralist Orozco.

Jimenez now lives in Hondo, where his home and studio are located in a renovated W.P.A. school building. He has received numerous honors including two fellowships from the National Endowment for the Arts, as well as a steady stream of commissions for public sculptures.

John Liggett Meigs operates a gallery in San Patricio.

"New Mexico is my home, my heart, and my inspirations," Meigs likes to say.

The 77-year-old Meigs was born in Chicago, and lived and worked in San Francisco, New Orleans, San Antonio, South America, Hawaii, and Paris before settling permanently in New Mexico.

He is a collector, interior designer, painter, photographer, writer, and architectural preservationist.

these studies if those who live in the vicinity of a proposed MRS site are opposed to it. I believe this is a fair and reasonable requirement," Senator Domenici said.

"Many New Mexicans have expressed their opposition to the Mescalero Tribe continuing its study of this issue. Clearly, this is a project with ramifications for all New Mexicans, and it is important that New Mexico's interests be considered during the study process."

Senator Bingaman said the MRS program is not developing as it was envisioned and that an MRS facility may no longer be any safer or less expensive than storage at reactor sites.

He stated DOE timetables are not being met and the DOE has not indicated it has any contingency plans.

Senator Bingaman added that he believes the MRS is diverting attention from the real problem of permanent disposal.

Since the passage of the 1987 amendments for MRS negotiation, DOE's target deadline for development of a permanent repository slipped from 2003 to 2010, and now to 2013, Senator Bingaman said.

What real guarantees do we have that a temporary MRS might not turn into a permanent facility?

"This amendment will allow us to take a step back and scrutinize where this program is going," said Bingaman.

The entire New Mexico congressional delegation has opposed plans

by the Mescalero Apache tribe to act as the volunteer host for an MRS, which houses high-level nuclear waste generated at nuclear power plants.

State officials, including the Governor, have indicated they oppose the plan; but the process has continued on with the tribe using a \$100,000 and then a \$200,000 federal grant to study the MRS and educate tribal members.

The \$2.8 million next step has been halted by this amendment to a Senate Bill.

Domenici said this language is directed at the Office of the Nuclear Waste Negotiator, and would require the negotiator to ensure that a good faith effort had been made to reach a consensus with state officials on an MRS site. It would also require the negotiator to comply with appropriate provisions of law regarding MRS facilities before any Phase II-B funding could be released to applicants.

"This is an attempt to make the Department of Energy accountable for its actions as it searches for an MRS host site," Domenici said. "I believe this language becomes more important as the Department of Energy increasingly searches to find a spot for the waste."

Domenici, who has been an outspoken opponent of the Mescalero Apache Tribe applications for funding to study its suitability to host the MRS, said the Mescalero proposal should not be allowed to go forward at all since it is doomed without the support of the residents of the area, the congressional

delegation and state leaders.

"In this case, the Mescalero Reservation is not an island unto itself," said Domenici. "The state and the areas directly surrounding it are interdependent on each other for this issue. Without support from the residents or state leaders, I fail to see how this project can go forward and be successful. To carry it forward would be a waste of government money," Domenici said.

Local controversy has simmered over the Mescalero's even studying acting as host for a nuclear waste site. Any debate on that issue always ends up in a discussion over Indian sovereignty — if the reservation is a sovereign nation, can its neighbors have any influence, much less control, over what the tribe does?

But the Senate, by placing constraints on a federal agency, can exercise control.

Just last week state leaders met in Mescalero and heard from officials with the DOE, the Nuclear Regulatory Commission and the Nuclear Waste Negotiator's Office.

A great number of area citizens attended a state legislative committee meeting to hear from the federal officials. Many of the people at that meeting voiced concern over the MRS study, and disagreed with statements made by the men from Washington D.C.

The group, which sometimes spoke out loudly for or against various points made by speakers, seemed to agree on just one thing — their distrust of the federal government.

Ordorica tried to assist Miranda and was struck with the chain on the left wrist, causing a minor cut by his watch.


The Herreras then left in a blue Chevrolet pickup. Witnesses gave police the license tag number.

Adolfo Herrera was charged with two counts of aggravated assault and negligent use of a deadly weapon.

ment at Glencoe would be wise.

Commissioner L. Ray Nunley, although he voted for the purchase, attached the rider and asked for some specific additional information.

No matter which way the commission finally decides to move, commissioners have assured **The Ruidoso News** that the 1994 Smokey Bear Fiftieth Anniversary celebration as a symbol for fire prevention will stay in Capitan, where Smokey was rescued as a cub and was buried after he died of old age.

The celebration includes a parade down the main street and a rodeo. The Glencoe property does not have a rodeo arena.

In another matter, county manager Andy Wynham is asking the commission to approve a two-year contract for his services. He currently serves "at will" and could be dismissed at any time by a majority vote.

Most county and village managers work on contract, because the job often is perilous when politics get in the way. The contracts usually feature a buy-out clause if an

entity wants out of an agreement early.

Discussions to date have been conducted behind closed doors in executive sessions on personnel. Another session is scheduled just before the public portion of the commission meeting dealing with the contract near the end of the agenda.

"The previous board was dead set against it," Wynham said Sunday. "Two months ago I told commissioners that I really wanted to negotiate a contract and to discuss it in executive session."

"I'm not asking for a long-term contract, just two years. I think that would get some of the politics out of the county manager's job. I'm the fiscal manager of a large operation here. I spend my days handling personnel and money."

Wynham was hired about two years ago and commissioners generally seem pleased with his performance.

Orlando Montes, vice president of the County Sheriff's Department Association, is scheduled to propose changes in the salary pay structure for deputies.

Another interesting situation to be discussed by County Assessor Patsy Serna is the discrepancy in taxable property value figures she sent to the state and the state sent back to her.

"I submitted my values to the State Property Tax Department. They certified them to the Department of Finance and Administration," Serna told **The Ruidoso News**. "That department made an error somewhere and the figures that came back to me weren't the same. The totals on four districts were incorrect, although the total taxable value was the same."

"Now I am asking the property tax department to intervene on my behalf with the finance and administration department to correct it for 1993."

"If they won't correct, two school districts would collect more money and two school districts would not collect enough, and it would directly affect the Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs area."

The difference in totals was discovered during an interview with **The Ruidoso News** last week.

"I never had anything like that

to happen to me in the 22 to 23 years I've been associated with this office," Serna said.

She is on the agenda to brief commissioners, because they certified the tax levy at their special meeting September 23 and she wants their support in calling for the state to correct its error immediately and not wait until the next tax year.

Breaking more new ground, commissioners are scheduled to vote on two ordinances dealing with the establishment of the county's first official indigent medical care fund.

The first ordinance will set up the financial mechanism and the second the administration, Wynham said.

"A state mandate calls for each county to set up a Medicaid fund," Wynham said. "For the last three years, the State Legislature has been trying to impose a tax on counties to get a theoretical three to one match from the federal government."

"This is the mechanism by which we technically satisfy those requirements. The concept of an in-

digent board and indigent funds are nothing new, but usually they are associated with an indigent tax on the county level. We've opted to use the hospital (tax millage) fund already in place to satisfy those requirements. We then will send the money to Santa Fe."

Once the Lincoln County Medical Center is recognized as a sole community provider hospital, the county should see the money it sent and more come back as a match to the original amount, he explained.

"We have to administer the fund, look at claims, approve those that qualify and then submit the number approved to the state," Wynham said.

The board rendering the determination will be comprised of the county commissioners, he said. That will be a change from the existing system under which hospital administrator Valerie Miller determines what bills to write off as indigent.

"We're cutting new territory here," he said.

"The claims we approve will be written off by the hospital, which should be good for the hospital, be-

cause they will receive a three to one match," Wynham said.

The county submitted its first quarterly payment toward indigent care last month. The annual hit will be \$300,000, which is about what the staff estimates the hospital has been averaging in write offs, Wynham said. The hospital receives more than \$950,000 from the special tax levy dedicated to its operation. A portion, about \$200,000, of that total goes to the Carrizo Health Clinic.

"The hospital staff will do a lot of the legwork, but the county will need some sort of administration, so undoubtedly, we're talking about a new position," Wynham said. "We're not sure how we're going to fund that."

Other items on the agenda include a policy for snow removal to which commissioners can refer if they receive calls from individuals wanting special attention; a request from Sheriff James McSwans for a clothing and equipment allowance for drug enforcement officers; and a resolution creating the Lincoln County Maternal and Child Health Planning Council.

Abandoned animals make great family pets

Her kind eyes and gentle nature soon make visitors forget that Ember walks on only three legs.

The black chow was brought to the Lincoln County Humane Society shelter a few weeks ago with two puppies.

"The man said she belonged to his son and had been hit by a car,"

said shelter manager Father Harper. "He was going to put her down, but his girl friend paid for the veterinarian to amputate the back left leg. But then they broke up and the dog ended up at the father's house and had pups. He said he couldn't take care of it."

Harper said Ember is a real joy to be around.

"She's two to three years old and

has the sweetest disposition," Harper said. "She gets along well on three legs and has learned the routine here very quickly. She's eager to please."

Ember already is a favorite of the workers at the shelter and they want to be sure she goes to a good home with someone who will show her lots of attention and kindness. She is sponsored for her spaying cost.

Another good looking abandoned pet at the shelter is Hooser, a male cocker spaniel mix whose hairdo fascinates the shelter staff.

"It appears like he has a blonde wig on top of his head," said shelter secretary Kathy Tetreault.

Hooser was found wandering in the Upper Canyon area of Ruidoso on September 6. He was wearing 1992 El Paso tags, but no veterinarian's name was listed where records could be checked for the owner's name.

He's leaner and longer than the traditional cocker, but has a good-looking coat and does well with all visitors. However, he can be aggressive with other male dogs. Hooser would do best as the only pet in a family.

Volunteers with the humane society recently participated in the annual Aspenfest Parade. They carried water in golf carts for the pets walking the shorter route designated for animals and bike riding children.

Even four dogs from the shelter walked the route, decorated with big crepe paper badges with the words "Adopt Me!" One got its mes-

sage across and was adopted.

At the end of the route, the children and pet owners received bags of goodies, including some great candy donated for the day by Furr's on U.S. 70. The management gave enough for volunteers also to hand out pieces along the parade route, helping to bring attention to the shelter and the plight of its four-legged residents.

Such unselfish support from a business like Furr's encourages the society board members and volunteers to continue to improve conditions for the animals.

Board members still are looking for a saint to take the place of Jerry Oswalt, the current resident saint at the society's thrift shop next to Arbys on Sudderth Drive.

The thrift shop is a major source of support not only for the daily shelter needs, but for the expansion of the facility to care for more animals. Someone who wants to fill their days with a worthwhile project, where the results can be seen immediately, please contact acting president Earline Phillips at 257-4547. Another possibility is that the job could be shared by two friends interested in the humane movement.

Don't forget the free dog training workshop, especially for owners of dogs adopted from the shelter. It's set for 2 p.m. the first Saturday of each month starting in November at School House Park by the library.

Trainers Randy Basch (of the Educated Owner) and Linda Turck are donating their time to en-





Warriors declaw 'Cats

The Ruidoso Warrior football team turned in their most impressive effort in almost three years when they totally dominated the visiting Fabens Wildcats, 35-6, before a large homecoming crowd Friday night at W.D. Horton Stadium.

The Warriors move to 3-3 on the season while Fabens fell to 3-2.

Ruidoso took control of the game from the start as they kicked off to the Wildcats who promptly muffed the kick and the Warriors recovered the football at the Wildcat one yard line.

The Wildcat defense held on the first play, but junior John Echols crossed the goal line on the quarter-

back sneak on second down. With Byron Soules' extra point, Ruidoso led 7-0 with less than a minute elapsed from the clock.

The Warriors kicked off to Fabens again and this time the Wildcats got control of the ball. The Wildcats Wing-T offense moved the football well on their first three plays, getting an easy first down.

Just for a moment it appeared that the Warrior defense was in for a long night — like last week's effort against Portales. But digging deep, Ruidoso forced a punt after just one first down.

Quarterback John Echols and the rest of the pumped-up Warriors returned to the field to add to their

early lead.

It didn't take long. Ruidoso marched down the field and scored their second touchdown of the quarter with another John Echols run. Soules PAT gave the Warriors a quick 14-0 lead.

Clearly shocked at the early goings on, Fabens again could not get past a suddenly stingy Warrior defense. Impressive play by defensive tackle David Eisenbrown and linebackers Soules and David LaMay gave the Wildcats fits as they had no luck in moving the down makers.

The second quarter brought two more touchdowns to the Warrior side with Ricky Devara and Rex Comanche hitting paydirt.

Soules remained perfect with his extra points and the Warriors took 28-0 lead to locker room for halftime.

After the homecoming festivities at the half, the Warriors received the kickoff and scored their final touchdown of the game in another grinding, time consuming drive. Echols capped off the drive with his third touchdown of the night, and Soules leg remained perfect.

The Warriors had scored an unheard of 35 points in just over two quarters of football in text book fashion. Out running, out-passing and out-kicking a team that, on paper, should be giving the Warriors all they want.

Fabens lone score came long after they abandoned the running game. The Wildcats crossed the endzone late in the third quarter on a halfback option pass from 25 yards out on fourth and sixteen.

The score was much too little, much too late.

Perhaps for the first time in his year-and-a-half tenure as the Warriors' head coach Mike Gaston was totally pleased with his team's effort on Friday night.

"We had a big turnover to start the game and we scored early ... that just set the stage for us. We just played really well against a team that was big and strong. It was a nice win for us heading into Deming," said Gaston.

"The kids kind of made up their minds that they're not going to take the losses, the punishment and the embarrassment that the past couple of football teams here have had to endure. They're tired of getting beat and they showed it," said Gaston.

"They've got a little theme song that they've adopted this year called 'We're Not Going To Take It' (by Motley Crue) and they did a great job of showing that ... I just couldn't be more proud of them," said Gaston.

The Warriors 35-point effort was easily their best since the 1990 season. Coach Gaston was quick to hand out accolades to his offensive group.

"We had kids like Jackie Roe, who did a great job blocking at Wingback ... Ricky (Devara) and Anthony (Torres) did a great job giving Raul (Davis) some time off at tailback to kind of help his injury ... we challenged Freddy Sanchez in the line and he responded so well, he had a great week of practice last week and then really had a good game," said Gaston.

Those outstanding offensive efforts did something else for the





first production of the season, the group is faced with the major task of building a theater.


Danielson said RLT hopes to have the renovations done by Thanksgiving.

Celebrates its 20th anniversary season
Nova celebrates its 20th anniversary season with a visit to Jurassic Park this fall to determine whether the movie and book's premise is a genuine possibility. Other programs follow the search for the bones of Butch Cassidy and Sundance, investigate the secrets of the psychics, and profile the late physicist Richard Feynman. Nova also sits at the bedside of a cystic fibrosis patient, rides a roller coaster, flies with the condor, and studies visual agnosia (a rare neurological disorder in which a person may not recognize what he sees).
The opening program in the October, "The Nova Quiz," tests the scientific literacy of a cross-section of Nova viewers from around the country, including a graphic artist, a high school principal, an event planner, and a cattle rancher. The eight contestants ponder fast-paced questions on a wide variety of science topics. They even perform hands-on experiments.
Next, Nova follows cowboy and forensic anthropologist Clyde Snow to Bolivia in "Wanted: Butch and Sundance" to determine if the two outlaws were killed in a shootout in a small Bolivian town.
Legend has it that the train-robbing duo split for South America around the turn of the century when Pinkerton detectives made the bandits' life too risky. There, they resumed their outlaw ways, but allegedly met their end in a shootout with Bolivian troops in 1908.
Then on Nova, magician James "The Amazing" Randi challenges claims of paranormal phenomena — from knifeless surgery in the Philippines to faith healers in the United States — in "Secrets of the Psychics."
Trained as a professional magician, Randi believes that the tricks of his trade are often misrepresented as supernatural powers. Randi was awarded a MacArthur "genius" grant to pursue his research into the eerie world of ESP, fortune tellers, faith healers, mediums, dowers, and others who claim paranormal talents.
Nova follows Randi as he puts world renowned psychics to the test . . . and comes up with some very interesting results.
Finally in October, Nova covers the tense, dramatic vigil of three people with terminal lung disease as they await the most complex of all organ transplants, on "Dying to Breathe."
Linda Summerhill, Bob Friesen, and Lisa Carpenter have come to Toronto fully prepared to die. Yet their hope against hope is that the skill of the lung transplant team at Toronto General Hospital, combined with the gift from a chance donor, will give them each a new lung, and a new breath of life.
The Nova crew was on 24-hour call for five months as they awaited word that donor lungs were available and an operation was available. "Dying to Breathe" captures scenes of couriers arriving in the middle of the night, patients being prepared, surgeons conferring, and the perilous journey itself.

Get out, stay out

When any home or building is struck by fire, it's a devastating experience for the people who live and work there. The loss of property is traumatic enough, but such disasters need not be magnified with bodily injuries and/or the loss of life.

National Fire Prevention Week (NFPW) will be observed this week, October 3 through 9, with an emphasis on increasing public awareness of the importance of fire escape planning. The theme is "Get out, stay out: your fire safe response." NFPW decided to focus on the importance of fire escape because it is clear that people still don't recognize how quickly a fire can become deadly.

Fire Prevention Week is observed each year in North American and several European countries in remembrance of the Great Chicago Fire of 1871, in which 250 people died. It is scheduled every October, the full week — Sunday through Saturday — that includes October 9, the anniversary of the fire.

The week encourages fire escape planning for the workplace, school and home. At work, planners should develop a plan that includes primary and secondary exits and provide each employee with a copy of the plan. It should be posted in public areas.

When drafting such a plan, be sure to include a strong instruction to employees that they must resist any temptation to go back into a burning building once they are safely out. If someone is trapped inside, the firefighters are equipped and trained for rescues and they have the best chance of helping the trapped person.

At home, make sure you have smoke detectors, and perform regular checks to see that they are working properly. Develop an escape plan for your home, and be sure that all family members know the plan. A home fire escape test will help in your planning, and we're publishing here as a public service.

Work with the local fire department to keep your workplace and home fire emergency plan up to date. In Ruidoso, call fire safety officer Linda Richards at 257-4116.

PROTECT YOUR HOME FROM WILDFIRE!

If you live in a wooded neighborhood, or if your home is in the wildland/urban interface, such as a forested area, then you are among the millions of people who are at special risk of wildfire. And, not surprisingly, the wildland area in which you live is at a higher risk of fire because of you.

Dwellings in these areas are susceptible to fire spreading from the wildlands. And residents create non-natural fire dangers in these areas, such as chimneys and barbecue grills, trash-burning, and other similar hazards.

Here is a checklist to keep on hand to help you make your home safer from wildfire:

Vegetation

- Look around your home and determine where you can eliminate "fire ladder" growth: brush, shrubs and limbs that create a ladder effect for fire allowing it to spread quickly.
- Make sure tree limbs do not hang over your roof and keep vegetation growing next to your house under 1 1/2 feet tall. Low growing shrubs and ground covers are less hazardous than trees.
- Keep all vegetation within 30 feet of your house well maintained, thoroughly watered and widely spaced.
- Select plants that are less likely to be flammable. Plants that are high in oil or resin or that have a low natural moisture content, such as cedar, cypress, eucalyptus, pine, manzanita, and pampas grass are highly flammable. If you already have this type of vegetation and you can't replant, keep it well-pruned, thoroughly watered and widely spaced.

Maintenance

- Remove weeds and keep leaves and other plant litter picked up, keep grass mowed.
- Check roof and eaves frequently and remove dried vegetation and other debris that could be ignited.
- Install a fire screen on your chimney and store fire wood well away from any structures.
- Post your address clearly. Make access for fire trucks, and your own evacuation easy.
- Work with neighbors to keep common areas clear of debris and fire hazards.





During the demonstrations on Friday, Saturday and Sunday, Cameron will exhibit the methods of developing an unbroken colt's confidence and trust so that the animal will accept a rider on its back with little apprehension.

Patience and understanding of horse psychology are the basis of Cameron's training program. Using these proven methods, he has started colts for a number of the top cutting horse establishments in the Southwest, including such notables as

Bum Phillips (head coach for the Houston Oilers and New Orleans Saints), Red Adair (world famous oil well fire-fighter), Greg Welch (NCHA Futurity Champion), and top designer Ralph Lauren.

A former rodeo cowboy, Cameron works with both untrained colts and problem horses during these seminars, presenting the basics of round pen training, overcoming spookiness and scary objects, leading and reining as well as trailer loading.

His techniques can work for any horse-lover and bring a new dimension to the meaning of "horseman."

Cameron's methods and philosophies of gentle horse training were featured in the January '90 issue of "Horseman Magazine," and on both the "Eyes of Texas" and "Eight Country Reporter" television shows.



Leon Flick grew up on working cattle ranches in Oregon. At the age of 17 he "left the nest" and went to work for neighboring ranchers. Since that time, his cowboying has taken him to outfits in Oregon, Idaho and California.

He has worked on yearling outfits as well as feedlots, pasture operations and in the mountains, but he still prefers the cow-calf outfits in the high desert country of southeastern Oregon.

**R.W. HAMPTON
SEDAN, NEW MEXICO**

As R.W. Hampton puts it, "Punchin' cows and music always did seem to go together for me. I started beating around on the guitar as a teen growin' up in north east Texas just about the same time I was learning to sit a horse and swing a rope. When high school let out, me and my guitar and a second hand saddle headed west for bigger country and the dream of makin' a cowboy."

I never was much hand at playin' cards, so in the evenin' around the wagon or bunkhouse I'd play and sing while the others played poker or pitch. I'd play all the old ballads about bucking horses, stampedes or lost love and every now and then I'd throw in one of my own about somethin' I'd seen or done while punchin' cows. Before long folks started referring to me as a 'Cowboy Balladeer.'

Back then I figured all I'd ever do was punch cows and that is all I did for about ten years. Since then my music has taken me from the cow outfits to rodeos, concerts, conventions, TV shows, other countries, the silver screen and back again. Now don't get me wrong, I feel mighty fortunate for I am a many truly blessed by God, but of all the places I've been my music always fit best around the fire at the wagon or in the bunkhouse.

Yep, music and punchin' cows always did seem to go together for me."

**FRAN HEDRICK
KNICKERBOCKER, TEXAS**

Fran is an accomplished songwriter and poet, writing from the heart with feeling gained only through lifes various experiences. She's a member of ASCAP association, a former disc jockey and spends much of her time singing and reciting poetry around the camp fire. She and her husband Bob spend some of their time cooking for cow works as well as selling Wilson cowboy boots and cowboy gear. Fran has appeared at Alpine, Lubbock and Stamford, Texas, the Lincoln County Cowboy Symposium and many other poetry gatherings.

**BOBBY KOEFER
BEND, OREGON**

Bobby Koefler, steel guitarist, has played with some of the biggest names around. He was the steel guitarist with Bob Wills' Texas Playboys in the early 1950's and he later joined Pee Wee King's Band, recording and guesting on many national T.V. shows of that period, including the Milton Berle and Perry Como shows. He was also with the Billy Gray Band and had his own group for several years. He has a unique style of playing steel, and the way he holds his steel bar and plays with just a thumb pick, no foot pedals, and standing up, sets him apart in today's music world.

Besides still working with the Texas Playboys, adventure travel plays a big part in Bobby's lifestyle today.


**WALT LA RUE



**BUCK REAMS AND RICH O'BRIEN
FORT WORTH, TEXAS**

Buck Reams started his singing career like so many others — in the church choir. He also competed in open rodeo in the rough stock events. In 1977 he organized his first band and continued to play throughout the Fort Worth area.

In 1983 he moved to Shreveport, Louisiana and became a regular on The Louisiana Hayride. In between the Hayride and playing 6 nights a week in Bossier City, he was foreman for the Diamond S Rodeo Company. Upon returning to Fort Worth, Buck hooked up with Red Steagall, and they played a number of venues together.

Buck Reams is currently working with Rich O'Brien on an acoustical cowboy album to be released this year.

Rich O'Brien was born in Missouri and his earliest influences were his mother, Gracie, who plays and sings the old folk songs she learned from her mother in the Ozarks and his brother, Paul, who is a fine western swing guitar player and singer. Rich has played in a variety of groups gaining experience in many different styles and genres of music.

His experience as a guitar player have included stints with Ray Price, Red Steagall, Don Edwards, Jody Nix, Tommy Morrell and Leon Rausch. Rich has appeared on over 20 albums and is currently working his own project which will include some of his original songs as well as songs written by others about Rich's favorite subject — the American West.

**PETE LAUMBACH
HOPE, NEW MEXICO**

A native of Roy, New Mexico, Pete is a composer and performer of upbeat, easy-listening country music. He and his wife, Joyce, own and operate Latigo Land and Livestock at Hope, New Mexico. Limousin cross cattle and alfalfa hay keep them busy most of the year.

In 1992, the New Mexico Cowbellees honored Pete as "Cowbelle Man of the Year." He is a volunteer fireman, Mayor of the Village of Hope, member of the New Mexico Cattlemen and New Mexico Hay Association and a father and grandfather.

"Two Wraps and a Hooley" was the 1991 album released under his recording label, Latigo of New Mexico. "Burning My Own Brand" is scheduled for release in September of 1993.

**CLAY LINDLEY
MARFA, TEXAS**

Clay Lindley was born in Del Rio, Texas, in 1959, but moved to Silver City in 1970, where he attended high school. He later attended Sul Ross University in Alpine, Texas, and received a Range Management degree.

After graduation he spent time working on several different ranches in many states. He final settled down in Spur, Texas, where he works as a Range Conservationist for the Department of Agriculture.

**OWEN LIENHARD
RENO, NEVADA**

Owen Lienhard started his professional music career in California in 1943 with Ray Reed and his Western Swing Band playing trumpet and trombone. He toured with Ray and the Cross B Boys in 1947. When Ray returned to New Mexico several years later, Owen's career took him to New York City. While there with the Johnny Hamlin Quintet, he won the Arthur Godfrey Show in 1952. In May of 1963 he joined the Mickey Finn Show. In the summer of 1966 the Mickey Finn Show was aired on NBC Television. Owen continued his musical career with Mickey Finn until August of 1986 when he moved to Reno, Nevada to make his home.

**GUY LOGSDON
TULSA, OKLAHOMA**

Guy Logsdon is a native Oklahoman who for 30 years has been entertaining audiences with songs, poems and stories about the American West, its culture and its heroes. He is an internationally recognized authority on western and cowboy music, poetry, and musicians.

Logsdon is a writer, publisher, and entertainer; he has performed for a wide variety of audiences throughout the nation including featured appearances at the Smithsonian Institution's Annual Festival of American Folklife and the National Museum of American Art, Washington, D.C.; the annual Cowboy Poetry Gathering and the Cowboy Music Gathering; Elko, Nevada; the National Cowboy Hall of Fame, Oklahoma City, the Lincoln County cowboy symposium, the "Tribute to the Singing Cowboys," Gene Autry Western Heritage Museum in Los Angeles, California, and the stage show "Revels on the Range," in Hanover, New Hampshire.

**DON ROLLACK
HEREFORD, ARIZONA**

Reverend Don Rollack has been putting some beautiful things into poetic form, and he's very aware that God plays a big part in the lives of most cowboys. He finds beauty in every day existence, and the hand of God in each chore, each vision, and each quest.

LARRY SCOTT
SHREVEPORT, LOUISIANA

Larry Scott was born in Modesto, California, a genuine product of the prune picker era. His family migrated west from Oklahoma and Missouri looking for work. His first recollection of radio was listening to the cattle and hog markets and thus began a long romance with radio, television, country, western and gospel music, emceeing and cowboys — anything concerning entertainment.

Larry is a member of the Texas Western Swing Hall of Fame and has been honored as a major market Disc Jockey of the Year by the Country Music Hall of Fame; Disc Jockey of the Year 4 times by the Academy of Country Music and Country Music Disc Jockey by Billboard Magazine. In addition to his radio duties, Larry, wife Gail and son Kelly, also operate a cow-calf operation in Kaufman County, Texas.



LARRY SCOTT

HANK REAL BIRD
GARRYOWEN, MONTANA

Hank Real Bird is a Crow Indian, a member of the Big Lodge Clan, a bronc rider and a teacher. He has lived around cattle and horses all of his life — but approaches things from the Indian's perspective. Real Bird started writing poems in school but never wanted to be anything except a cowboy. He worked out in the hills at camps. He considers himself lucky to have stood around a rope corral and to know his way around a chuckwagon.

Hank has written children's books and a book of poetry entitled "Where Shadows Are Born." He now spends his time showing his boys how to break horses and ride broncs on his own O-W Ranch nestled in the Wolf Teeth Mountains on the east side of the Crow Indian Reservation.

During the summer he puts on trail rides and a re-enactment of the Battle of the Little Big Horn.

TOMMY DEE THATCHER
GRAND SALINE, TEXAS

"Tommy D" as he is known professionally, is not only one of the great drummers and musicians of the western swing world, but he is also a genuine cowboy and roper raised by the great Jess Goodspeed. Tommy has played with such talented musicians as Bob Wills, Ray Price and Hank Thompson, Lefty Frizzell, Roy Clark and Hoyle Nix. He is not only an excellent drummer, he is also a good singer.

Tommy Dee Thatcher is a musician as well as a horseman and raises champion paint roping horses.

LARRY MCWHORTER
GRAND CANYON, ARIZONA

Larry McWhorter was born in Waco, Texas, and raised near Higgins where he learned the cowboy trade from his father during the week and then went with him to his dances on Saturday nights where he started singing when he was just six years old. At the age of 19 he purchased a saxophone and continued to practice and play dances while working for various ranches including the Swenson and Pitchfork spreads. He moved to Stillwater, Oklahoma, in 1981 where he got his first steady playing job with "The New Cimarron Swingsters" whose speciality was western swing.

Larry is currently wrangling dudes on mules in the Grand Canyon.

JOHN AND SHERRY UNDERWOOD
CAPITAN, NEW MEXICO

John and Sherry Underwood are a husband and wife team who cowboy together and share their favorite hobbies of poetry and music. The Underwoods make all the poet gatherings they can where John quotes and writes some good poems and Sherry plays and sings the old cowboy favorites.

John also does a bit of work in the movie industry. The couple helped a bunch in putting on the very, very successful Ranch Rodeo at Capitan recently.

JIM SHELTON
GLENWOOD, NEW MEXICO

Jim Shelton is a cowboy, a trapper, a philosopher, and a mountain man — also a poet of sorts. Shelton has been described as "a fiddler, a fighter, a wild horse rider, and a wood-choppin' son-of-a-buck." He has worked cattle in four states — New Mexico, Arizona, Chihuahua and Sonora.

It has been said, "When all the cowboys went north, Jim fell out the tailgate of the wagon, and went the other way — Mexico and the Sierra Madres." *Aqui lo vengo con burro* (he comes here by burro). *Tiempos son pobre* (times are bad). Jim Shelton writes everything from the heart. "That's the only place I can write 'em from. Everything else I got is either broken-up, wrecked, wore-out, or stolen."

PEE WEE LYNN
DALLAS, TEXAS

Pee Wee Lynn, the son of a Methodist missionary, after several attempts in other fields, found his "niche in life" when he started playing with the Brook Haven Trio at Ma Goodwin's Tavern in San Angelo, Texas in 1942. From those inauspicious beginnings, he graduated to playing with some of the top jazz and swing groups in the nation.

In 1950 and 1951 he was a Texas Playboy with Bob Wills. Pee Wee will happily recount how he played for three summers in Ruidoso at the Mint Bar and Ruidoso Bar. A talented drummer, jazz organ and piano player, for the past 20 years Pee Wee Lynn has been playing in the top night clubs in Dallas. Of his long career, Pee Wee has this to say "damn near fifty years playing and still broke but slap happy."

FRANKIE MCWHORTER
HIGGINS, TEXAS

Frankie McWhorter was born in Memphis Hall County, Texas and started playing the fiddle at the JA Ranch Chuck Wagon in November 1949. He started his fiddle playing career for Jay Roberts in Kennit, Texas.

In 1960 he became a member of the famous Bob Wills and the Texas Playboys band. He has lived in Higgins, Texas, since 1963. John Erickson, creator of the "Hank The Cowdog" series writes of Frankie, "There may be better cowboys around than Frankie."

There may be better horse breakers and horse trainers, and there may be better fiddle players, although I wouldn't want to bet my own money on it. But I would bet my own money that there is no one alive today who is better at all three and can tell about them better than Frankie McWhorter."

McWhorter wrote the song "Between the Rivers" as a tribute to the great Bob Wills. He was inducted into the Nebraska Country Music Hall of Fame in 1984 and Western Swing Society Hall of Fame, Sacramento, California in 1988.



FRANKIE MCWHORTER

ELDON SHAMBLIN
CLAREMORE, OKLAHOMA

Eldon Shamblin is considered the finest rhythm guitar player in the world by the likes of Barney Kessel, Tommy Allsup, Merle Haggard and a lot of others who all strive for the "Shamblin" sound. In 1937 he went to work for Bob Wills and his band and stayed until he was drafted into the army in 1942. He was discharged in 1946. After a short stint with Leon McAuliffe, he again joined the ranks of Bob Wills and the Texas Playboys where he arranged most of the band's music and acted as their manager. If you ask him about Bob he would tell you that he had more feelings for him than he's ever had for anybody. He is a big Bob Wills fan, and "it don't have nothing to do with working for him. I loved what the old man represented, he represented something good to me."

Today Eldon is enjoying life more than ever. He and his wife, Lucy, live on a lake outside of Claremore, Oklahoma.

He's retired from teaching music and guitar and now has time to answer the call when people like Johnny Gimble or Merle Haggard call him for a recording session.

JOHNNY AND LUTHER WHELAN
AND ANDREA MAESTOS
LAS CRUCES, NEW MEXICO

Johnny Whelan was born in Wilcox, Arizona and was raised on the Sierra Bonita Ranch. His dad started him on the violin around the age of 8, but the young boy's interest soon turned to playing guitar. He plays "Corridos" the story songs that he heard from his parents and uncles while growing up.

These songs were passed down to him and he in turn passes them on to his own son, Luther. Johnny plays guitar along with a rack mounted harmonica. He has performed throughout the United States including the Hawaiian Islands, Barns of Wolftrap in Virginia, and the Museum of American History in Washington D.C.

Luther Whelan playing the drums at the age of 6 but now prefers the guitar. Luther performs with his

dad at fiestas and at a variety of occasions in the Mesilla Valley. The pair have performed at poetry gatherings in Silver City, New Mexico, and at Buffalo Bill Days in Cody, Wyoming as well as their more recent venues.

Andrea Maestos started singing with Johnny and Luther Whelan when she was eight years old. She plays the drums and bass guitar. She has accompanied the Whelan's at a number of different gatherings including their recent trip back east.

She is married to Brian Maestos and has two small daughters. The first time Luther and Andrea performed was at Salt Lake City for the Folklife Center Salt Palace along with their sister Johnnie Ray. The children were six, eight and nine at the time.

TOMMY MORRELL
LITTLE ELM, TEXAS

Tommy Morrell was born in Dallas on Halloween, 1938. He grew up in Oak Cliff and his family was an especially musical one, though his mother played some piano. An early '50's visit to Dallas' Bob Wills Ranchhouse (now the Longhorn Ballroom) sealed Tommy's fate. Although Wills had left the ballroom by that time, the house band, led by Dewey Groom and featuring the young Johnny Gimble, Curly Hollingsworth and others knocked Tommy out.

He was hooked on western swing. Although he has played professionally for nearly forty years and despite such honors as his 1988 induction into the Texas Steel Guitar Hall of Fame, Tom Morrell has remained relatively obscure.

Certainly he isn't as well known as his talents merit. Tommy Morrell has toured with many of the great musicians of our time.

GIL PRATHER
ABILENE, TEXAS

Gil Prather was born in Abilene, Texas, a fifth generation Texas whose ancestors followed the open range. Family ranching interests and rodeo led Prather to Alpine, Texas, where he attended Sul Ross State University. Prather was involved for several years cowboying and operating ranches in the Big Bend region. The years spent in the Rio Grande Country were a major influence on Prather's unique style of singing and songwriting.

Prather presently resides in Abilene, Texas and is active as "Joi B" in the Jose Brothers Comedy Act while he continues writing and performing western music.

LEON RAUSCH
FORT WORTH, TEXAS

Leon Rausch is probably one of the last western swing singers left of the old western swing era. Leon comes from a musical family, and learned the bass and guitar from his father and mandolin from his mother. The Rausch family sang for church and gatherings throughout Missouri area when he was growing up.

In his mid-twenties, Leon was singing on television in Oklahoma when Johnnie Lee Wills, Bob Wills' brother, spotted him and invited him to join his band. He later joined Bob Wills and the Texas Playboys as their lead vocalist.

Having worked with the legends of our time in country music, Leon Rausch is a first class, strictly country artist.

His smooth, solid voice and a western swing delivery make him one of the more popular artists in the country.

TATER PASCHAL
WEATHERFORD, TEXAS

Tater Paschal was born on the Brazos River south of Weatherford in 1953 to a ranching/farming family. He grew up learning to cowboy on local ranches and now continues to ranch on a place in southern Parker County called the "Windriver Ranch."

In addition to ranching, he breaks horses and writes cowboy poetry. He also cooks on Red Steagall's chuckwagon. Paschal's poetry consists of funny, sad, exciting and humbling experiences from his life. He says his inspiration also comes from his family consisting of "one good wife and four kids."

Poetry has taken him around the country to gatherings in Red River, New Mexico, Copper Mountain, Colorado, Alpine, Texas, Fort Worth, Texas, and Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. Tater Paschal has also performed at the Poetry Gathering in Elko, Nevada.

BUCK RAMSEY
AMARILLO, TEXAS

Buck Ramsey has been described as a Robert Burns in boots, the Samuel Taylor Coleridge of cowboy poets, and the voice and spirit of a cowboy. As a poet and a singer, Buck is dedicated to preserving the cowboy tradition in word and song. Buck believes that cowboy poems should be simple and clean.

"They are the story and song of the one real mythology that Americans gave the world," he said.

Ramsey did the best part of his growing up north of the Canadian River in the Panhandle of Texas. After his school days he wandered around the country for awhile then returned to the Canadian River Breaks and drew wages on some of the big outfits there breaking horses and punching cattle.

While working as rough stock rider and regular cowhand on the Alibates Division of the Coldwater Cattle Company, he got in a tangle with a horse, was hurt and now gets around in a wheelchair. But he still hangs around the ranches during branding or round-up time, plays hoodlum helper to the cook, gives guff from the opra seats and plays and sings the old songs. Mostly they let him hang around because he can braid tack.

LES MORROW
CLOVIS, NEW MEXICO

Les Morrow grew up in Nebraska. He attended the University of Nebraska and received degrees in Agriculture, Animal Nutrition, and Veterinary Medicine. Morrow and his wife, Jean, have lived in Clovis since 1974.

Dr. Morrow and his partner operate a mixed veterinary practice, serving feedlot cowboys, ranching cowboys, dairymen, and horse people. Morrow says the only difference between his practice and the typical rodeo is that "we don't have a band playing during our events."

He is into classic old-time poetry as well as writing an occasional tall tale. His most recent collection of poems, "When Pigs Fly" was published by The Prairie Dog Publishing Company of Clovis.

HOWARD PARKER
GORDON, NEBRASKA

Howard Parker grew up on the family ranch south of Gordon, Nebraska, and began his riding career at the age of two when his dad set him astride a spotted pony D a mare his granddad won in a raffle.

As a fourth generation cowboy, he did the ranch chores, trained the horses and helped with the cattle drives.

After graduating from high school, Parker cowboied on the famous old Spade Ranch near Ellsworth, Nebraska, and then spent the next 20 years working for various cow outfits, playing in country bands and rodeoing.

Howard's family has produced everything from preachers to bank robbers and hopes that he falls somewhere in between.

When the three-time Nebraska State Rodeo champ hung up his bronc spurs 10 years ago, he picked up his guitar and started blending his sounds and images of the Old West with the new. For the past several years Howard has traveled throughout the west reciting his poetry and singing his songs; preserving the legacy of the old-fashioned cowboy, while capturing the joys and struggles of the modern day one.

Parker's relaxed style and lighthearted approach captivates and fascinates audiences.

Ed Stabler grew up on a small ranch near Colorado Springs, Colorado. He and his wife, Mary, now live near Craig, Colorado.
