## Schools hit a homerun!

The praise was lavish and the criticism brief Thursday as members of the state accreditation team reviewed their findings with school board officials and the administration staff of the Ruidoso school district.

The team sent by the State Department of Education for an in-depth evaluation that occurs every three years, spent four days visiting classrooms, pouring over records, talking to staff, students and parents.

Team leader Bill Trant especially noted the high degree of cooperation and the collaborative spirit exhibited by everyone in the district.

He explained that Ruidoso officials had chosen to be evaluated under a new approach that looks at compliance with state regulations, formerly the main focus, as additional data in accomplishing the implementation of a plan of success for students based more on local goals.

Chris Trujillo led off the individual summaries, saying the Chapter I program, which covers services for disadvantaged children, was well-administered in all areas, including follow-up on children who didn't meet their goals.

Besides a minor record-keeping deficiency, his only area of concern was the need to develop an evaluation to measure the effectiveness of

last year's parent involvement in the program.

Victoria Duran said she found only one problem in her review of documentation and facilities. A drop off at the front door of the home economics building at Ruidoso Middle School could be difficult for disabled children to negotiate.

She later noted that she was impressed with the well-stocked supply cabinets and the clean and attractive school sites.

"I would have liked to work at your school with the multitude of supplies in the storage closets," Duran said. "Everyone is working for the children. That's refreshing and validates what you're saying."

Nancy Alonso, who covered Indian education, said she spoke with Native American parents, the Mesquero Tribal Council and the program staff.

She said she was happy to confirm that the involvement reported in the district's self-study does exist and constitutes a significant strength of the program.

There's overwhelming evidence of the district responding to previous needs brought to the district's attention, she said. "And it appears to be a quick response. That also is a big strength."

She also applauded the program design and emphasis, saying she

## All for wrecker controls prompts scrutiny

When the members of the Ruidoso Village Council said they wanted maximum security from a wrecker service, they didn't mean using a driver from maximum security.

Although Camp Sierra Blanca is not a maximum security prison, some criminals who have committed violent crimes are housed there, according to deputy warden Tom Sullivan.

And at least one inmate, on work release, was used recently as a driver for a local wrecker service. That, in itself, is not against the law, unless he had no valid driver's license with him.

Who that driver was and what he did to be sentenced to Camp Sierra Blanca was privileged information, according to Sullivan. He's not talking.

The transportation division of the State Corporation Commission is conducting an investigation.

Four licensed wrecker services represented by attorney Alan Morel approached the village council recently to recommend that all wrecker services in Ruidoso be licensed.

Some smaller towing service representatives said the request also was designed to weed out any competition. State certification costs big dollars, they said.

Wrecker companies have the ability to make huge profits through towing, storage and body repair.

Morel said the main benefit of using only licensed wreckers is for the added protection of citizens.

In addition to the million dollar insurance policy of a licensed wrecker, he also was speaking of the rigid credentials required of the driver.

After all, if a car becomes snow-bound in an isolated area during the cold winter months and a wrecker is dispatched through the police department, does that stranded motorist not have the right to feel secure when the wrecker arrives?

Would that motorist feel as secure if he or she knew the wrecker driver was an inmate from a prison?

That question was asked of Sullivan by **The Ruidoso News**.

"Why does she want to know?" Sullivan responded.

"If an inmate broke the law once, how does a person know he's not going to break the law again?"

"We don't know that," said Sullivan. "We have a work release program all over the state."

How judiciously that work program is governed while the inmate is incarcerated appears to be a top secret.

On Monday, September 27, the county dispatcher received a call about 4 p.m. regarding a car rollover on Angus Hill.

The county dispatcher called the state police, an ambulance, a

## Feds steamroll county on Rio Bonito land swap; commissioners astonished by BLM's "end run"

Furious over their treatment at the hands of federal officials, Lincoln County Commissioners sent word Friday that they plan to protest proposed changes in a land swap along the Rio Bonito.

They also will ask for an extension of the public comment period, since no one knew locally about the new proposal until last week even though it was published last month in the Federal Register.

The commission several months ago, in a 3-2 vote, agreed to back away from a lawsuit against the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) over the Rio Bonito project that surfaced more than two years ago.

However, commissioners said Friday that a part of a settlement of that suit specified that the exchange of private for public land would cover only four parcels totalling 1,114 acres. A fifth parcel owned by Lincoln Valley Land Company principals, who initiated the swap proposal for 32,000 acres of land elsewhere in the state, specifically was to be excluded.

"We consider tract five a separate issue and now you come in and substitute it," Chairman Monroy Montes said. "We feel you're circumventing your own procedures."

John Rakowski, representing the BLM, said, "Our intent is to pick up

the rest of the Rio Bonito and tract five. It's not a substitution. But if the land on the Rio Bonito (tracts 1-3) is not ready when the rest of the arrangements are in place, we will pick up tract five."

The deal could be ready to move in March if everything goes smoothly, he said.

"If you have objections, write (BLM Roswell District manager) Leslie Cone," he added.

County manager Andy Wynham said commissioners were astounded to pick up **The Ruidoso News** last week and read in a legal advertisement that while tract four was acquired in December 1992, a cloud on the title to tracts one, two and three have delayed acquisition. Therefore, the BLM plans to proceed with the acquiring tract five. A certified letter containing the notice was sent to the commission by BLM area manager Sandra Allen.

"Part of the settlement of litigation centered on tract five," Wynham said. "We negotiated out tract five."

The negotiation was not spelled out in the agreement, but Cone and Allen certainly were part of that negotiation and knew the conditions."

Wynham said the commission

has no sympathy on the clouded title situation, because that was one of the basis for protest submitted to BLM and U.S. Department of the Interior, but subsequently was rejected.

"You went ahead and exchanged tract four prior to clearing up one through three," Wynham said. "You're creating fragmented pieces along the Rio Bonito. Now you're trading fragmented parcels for fragmented parcels."

Part of the argument used by BLM officials for trading public land in some other counties for the privately owned Rio Bonito property in Lincoln County was that those other fragmented pieces were hard to manage and served no useful purpose. However, a chunk along a stream would preserve a disappearing habitat and provide recreation opportunities, they said.

"When (Commissioner) Stirling (Spencer) and I visited with (former state BLM director Larry) Woodard, it was clear that tract five was not to be considered," said Commissioner Wilton Howell, who favored dropping the suit and letting the BLM proceed with the swap after several concessions had been secured.

"I don't call this coordinating, I call it coercion."

# LCMC board admits three new docs to practice here

Medical staff credentials for three doctors were approved in the Lincoln County Medical Center board meeting on Thursday, October 21.

Dr. Jim Reed, from Lubbock, Texas, will act as a relief radiologist. Dr. Mark Bleyberg will work emergency room on weekends and Dr. Douglas McPherson received a change of privileges which will allow him to treat

patients from Mescalero.

A change of status was noted for Dr. Gary Jackson, whose practice has been closed.

Valerie Miller, LCMC administrator, spoke to the board members updating them on President Clinton's health plan.

Miller did not go into detail on the plan except to say the plan was made with urban areas in mind and does not take in to consideration problems concerning rural areas.

"No where is there a good plan of

how rural areas will be handled. The plan gives a background on thinking as it relates to metro health care," Miller said.

The rural areas will more than likely be addressed on a state by state level Miller told the board.

Updating the mission, vision, values and strategies statements were discussed. Miller asked each board member to take a close look at the existing static plan copies and to think of the plan in the long run, with details on values.

Discussion concerning bylaw revisions took place during the meeting. Any changes must be approved by the board once the draft has been done according to Miller.

A proposed slate of officers for the next year was discussed. A list of names was not available at this time.

"We will release the names of the slate once we have contacted the proposed officers and know they are will to serve," Miller said.

Monday, November 1-2, the

Joint Commission on the Accreditation of Health Care Services (JCAHO) will meet at LCMC.

The accreditation meetings take place once every three years according to Miller. The last one was in October of 1990.

In other regular business, the board reviewed financial statements for September and October.

The next scheduled board meeting of LCMC will be 6 p.m. Thursday, November 18, in the hospital conference room.

had no areas of concern.

"The most outstanding strength I found was the quality of education parents perceive the district delivers to their children," she said. "The way the district responds to the ethnicity of kids."

Syd Gould said in evaluating the special education program of the district, he had been impressed with the cooperation of teachers with the inclusion of students in the regular classroom programs.

"Work was displayed on the boards of both regular and special ed students," he said, calling the program exemplary. "There was opportunity for growth of all students and no labels as to who in the room might be with special ed."

He noted that prior notice of parent consent needs to be documented.

Roscoe Vaughn said he was pleased by the growth of vocational agriculture program in the past three years and that new opportunities for students continue to be opened.

He said Ruidoso's agriculture program is used as a model in the state and congratulated the district's business teacher for being recognized by Disney for marketing.

"I have a couple areas of concern, although this citation is on me as well, because I worked closely with the administration," Roscoe said. "I know it's difficult with a tight budget, but there is a problem at the high school getting all the instructional materials needed to teach the state competencies (in vocational education)."

The business program has a good computer program, but other parts of the lab need to be brought up to the standards in the business

community, he said.

Bill Blair, who examined the overall instructional program and support services, went over a long list of strengths that included the involvement of a coordinating council in decisions, continuing concern about upgrading facilities, the eighth grade family concept at Ruidoso Middle School, the teaming and collaboration of staff at all schools, but especially Nob Hill, the new Image Processing in Education program, the focus on bilingual education from kindergarten through twelfth grade and a real attempt by teachers for individual instruction.

He was impressed by the health center at the high school and middle school, but would like to see it expanded in time and sites. Blair also noted the growth in the counseling staff and modernization of the library.

Out of his broad coverage area, Blair said he found three areas of non-compliance: health education, physical education at the high school and paperwork changes required because education standards have changed in the way the state looks at physical conditioning programs.

In discussing the future direction of the district, Alonso said while parents of Native American students see computer literacy as an important opportunity to prepare for the real world, they also see a need for additional vocational programs, more alternatives.

They would like to see counseling and nursing services expanded and would like alternative programs outside the district for at risk students.

Trujillo agreed, saying the community should concentrate on developing a halfway house for young people.

Blair said the students he talked to were open and not shy about expressing their opinions.

They would like more personal and career-vocation counseling; continued emphasis on art, music and drama; a more precise communication process with the administration; more community support for the troubled students in town so they have more than a choice between home and a detention center.

Roscoe said he was impressed with the students, the number of hands-on activities such as printing booklets, and the team effort in the district.

He sees a need to expand vocational education to reduce the size of the classes and ensure students a chance to get into the courses that interest them.

Trant said the district needs to focus on developing quantitative data and analysis to support its contentions and decisions.

"The next challenge for you is take what you have put in your self study, now stated as behavior adults were involved in such as more cultural activities and meetings, and move them to student performance, what the students know and can do. The evidence lies there," he said.

"Student performance statements need to be across the entire curriculum whether pre-school or high school. That's the key for continuity in curriculum. You need to get everyone in the community involved, including businesses."

Superintendent Mike Gladden said he felt more trust developing between the state and local level of education, with the shift in evaluation emphasis.

"The message I'd like you to take back to Santa Fe is, there are great things going on and let us fly."

## Suspect accused in beating

Shots fired early Monday morning resulted in the arrest of a Ruidoso man on aggravated battery of his girlfriend.

Corporal B.J. Biggs said when he arrived at the scene on Tanager Street about 6 a.m., resident Michael Richards gave him a double barrel shotgun that he had fired into the side of the house in an attempt to break up the fight between Derek Bowen, 28, and his girlfriend, Tina Smith, 20.

According to Richards, who also was staying at the house, Bowen had been drinking for several days and started to beat up his

girlfriend. Richards said the shotgun blast had no effect on Bowen and he rushed to a neighbor's house to call police.

According to police reports, Smith's right eye was swollen and closed, purple and red, with blood dripping out from both sides.

Officer Roxann Pfeffer called for an ambulance.

Police chief Richard Swenor and detective Wolfgang Born arrived at the scene and, along with officer Bill Heiniken and Biggs, entered the house to find Bowen asleep face down in the hallway.

Bowen was placed under arrest

and transported to the police department for booking, where, according to police reports, he became uncooperative, refusing to complete the booking process or give a telephone number to a dispatcher for his own use.

Police were called to Bowen's call 20 minutes after the booking and found he had kicked the food door off his cell.

Bowen was charged with two counts of aggravated battery and one of criminal damage to property. Magistrate Judge Bill Butts set bond at \$20,000 cash, no 10 percent.

Rakowski, the man receiving all of the fire Friday is coordinator of technical procedures for BLM. Rakowski said he was unaware of the details of the commission's settlement with the BLM or the past trouble between the two entities.

"Your manager put you in a difficult situation to come here without the background on the situation," Montes said. "Clearly, you were sent into this situation without all the information and that reflects on your boss."

Rakowski said if none of the remaining Rio Bonito tracts were ready when the deal was set to go through, the BLM instead, would acquire land along the Delaware River in Eddy County. That land also is owned by the principals of the Lincoln Valley Land Company and fits into the riparian (water

side) preservation plan.

"I understand that, but I don't understand circumventing the process to coordinate with local government," Montes said. "I don't call this coordinating, I call it coercion."

To emphasize his point that tract five (the piece further east on the river) was never to be traded, Montes said, "At one time, tract five was used as a carrot (by BLM) to settle this thing early."

Rakowski said about 25,000 acres of BLM will be traded in this second phase.

He added that about 19,000 acres have been identified in Lincoln County to be moved into private hands in the future, but Montes said the figure commissioners want to see is 35,000 acres.

Back to the subject of notification, Wynham said, "We have an agreement that we are to be con-

tacted first. Before you published (the notice), there must have been a lot of discussion. It's certainly hard to believe this (ignoring the commission) was done without thought. How could Lincoln County be forgotten after two years of litigation and then three months later they forgot us."

When BLM officials began discussing the option of acquiring tract five last July, the commission should have been notified, he said.

"Someone should have called and said we're going to ignore our agreement," Wynham said.

"Send this message to your director," Nunley said. "The good faith negotiation between the BLM and the commission seems very one-sided."

Montes added, "I'm very disappointed and we're putting together a strongly worded protest."

The comment period will run through November 14.

wrecker and a sheriff's deputy to control traffic.

About a week later, The News was contacted about the wrecker driver. According to the source, an inmate from Camp Sierra Blanca was driving the wrecker and he didn't have a license. The source saw Lincoln County Sheriff's Deputy Bobby Angermiller directing traffic at the accident.

Angermiller confirmed that state trooper Rickey Virdon told him the wrecker driver was an inmate. He said he didn't talk to the inmate, so he couldn't verify that he didn't have a driver's license or that a citation was issued by Virdon.

Angermiller said he couldn't remember details other than the wreck involved a Volkswagen and two persons. He said Lincoln County Wrecker Service had been called.

When contacted by The News in early October, officials at the state police office in Alamogordo said Virdon was on vacation. They said the 1974 two-door Volkswagen belonged to Albert Moya of Los Lunas. Moya and his passenger Janice Nelchior were treated and released from the Lincoln County Medical Center.

According to Ruidoso police dispatchers, Sierra Blanca Motors, Downs Wrecker, Lincoln County Wrecker and Dale's Wrecker are rotated for calls weekly.

State police officials said they have a different rotation, utilizing three wrecker services from the Ruidoso area; Lincoln, Downs and Dale's.

Ruidoso dispatchers, and others, say Sierra Blanca Motors and Lincoln use the same wrecker vehicle.

The clerk at Judge Gerald Dean's court said she could not give

information on any driver's license citation without a name.

Sullivan was contacted at Camp Sierra Blanca and asked for the name of the inmate driving that day.

"I was asked for an inmate ... to let him have his driver's license. If an employer asks for an inmate to drive, then we'll give him his license to carry on his person, which is required. Whether he has the proper license ... I'm not even sure who was driving," Sullivan said.

What was the name of the inmate?

"I have no idea. We have several at Sierra Blanca Motors. I don't know for a fact that he didn't have one (a license). We've had inmates that were working there, that have been released since then," he said.

Sullivan was asked if he would supply the name.

"You'd have to ask Sierra Blanca Motors. He's working for them. If they want to give you that information, fine. Or, I'd have to ask the inmate if he wanted to release the information. No, I wouldn't tell you that name."

"We're not allowed to give information out on the inmates regarding their activities while they're in the institution, unless a crime is committed," he said.

A spokesman for Sierra Blanca Motors said the inmate's name was not available.

According to state director of transportation Carlos Jaramillo in the State Corporation Commission's office, an inmate driving is not covered in the requirements of the Motor Carrier Act and is therefore not illegal.

"If the vehicle weighs more than 26,000 pounds, he (the wrecker driver) has to have a C.D.L. (commercial drivers license) with him, and he's got to have a medical cer-

tificate that shows he meets the requirements of the Motor Carrier Act," Jaramillo said.

"If he's a convicted felon or whatever, that does not apply to the Motor Carrier Act, but he has to meet the requirements of the act."

He said the wrecker owner would be in violation if he allowed a driver without a proper license. He said the state police would send him a copy of any citation.

"We'll bring in the certified carrier for a hearing to see if he violated the Motor Carriers Act or not," he said. "What was he convicted of?"

Jaramillo was told that the institution wouldn't release that information.

"That's public record, they can't deny you that. If he's out in the public, the public has a right to know," said Jaramillo.

Lou Armijo, head of state corrections department, said he called Sullivan to tell him that such information is public record and that he will have to comply in the future.

Armijo identified the inmate and said he was a truck driver serving time for trafficking in a controlled substance. Circumstances of the arrest were not discussed.

According to State Statute 66-5-68, a person is disqualified from driving a commercial motor vehicle for life who uses a commercial motor vehicle in the commission of any felony involving the manufacture, distribution or dispensing of a controlled substance, or possession with intent to manufacture, distribute or dispense a controlled substance or who is convicted of any violation of the Controlled Substances Act.

In the Ruidoso area, four wreckers are certified. Downs Towing is

owned by Floyd Ganaway. Dale's Wrecker is owned by Dale Naron, Ganaway's brother-in-law.

According to Jaramillo, Lincoln County Wrecker has two certificates both owned by Dan and Nancy Lee Shaver.

"I don't have anything for Sierra Blanca Motors, but I do have two for Lincoln County Wrecker," he said.

Jaramillo said the certificates are current and in good standing.

Certificate 909's agent is Johnny D. Durham, doing business as Lincoln County Wrecker Service," he said. "Certificate 1174 is still Lincoln County Wrecker Service, located at P. O. Box 3180, Hollywood Station. That agent is Gary Mitchell."

Wrecker 909 located at Sierra Blanca Motors Company has the name Lincoln County Wrecker Service on its side, but the other wrecker, 1174, is called Sierra Blanca Motors.

Jaramillo said many certificates were grandfathered under the old rules prior to February 15, 1993.

"Now, if you buy a certificate, and you already hold one, we merge it into one," he said.

Jaramillo said that certificate 909 cannot be used for activity of any other wrecker.

"It's dedicated equipment only to one wrecker," he said.

Owners with certificates are rigorously regulated. How large a vehicle that can be towed, exactly where they can tow are all careful considerations for that one certificate. Owners are only licensed to haul within certain parameters and the amount charged is set by state statutes.

"I don't know what happened, I'll find out," said Jaramillo. "I can see where there could be a problem."

Johnny Durham, owner of Sierra

Blanca Motors, called The News regarding the inmate.

"He had a valid driver's license, but he left it in camp," Durham said.

Durham said that the inmate was released and not in the camp anymore.

Durham was quick to point out that a man from the dealership accompanied the driver. It was later learned from state police that man also was an inmate.

"This guy (inmate) was a truck driver. For long hours he drove a truck across the country. What he was in there for, I guess he hauled cocaine in the trucks, that's the story I got," Durham said.

He said he now has a wrecker driver, but was without one for a few days.

Durham was asked if he thought the state or Camp Sierra Blanca had operated in a responsible way.

Durham said the state could not be blamed, that they often checked his records and that all of his drivers had to be registered.

"I'm wrong," Durham said. "It's not what the state did, it's what I did that's wrong. I'm saying that I did it."

Virdon was contacted by The News when he returned from his vacation.

He said he never checked the operator's license and didn't issue a citation. He said the wrecker service towed the car away.

Virdon said that both men in the wrecker were inmates.

In New Mexico, there are no special driving requirements to operate a wrecker.

A CDL license is required for a vehicle with a gross weight of more than 26,000 pounds; a trailer and vehicle that weighs more than 26,000 pounds; a vehicle designed

to transport more than 15 persons; and any size vehicle which requires hazardous materials placards.

The News called state taxation and revenue authority Bill Darmitzel to ask if drivers of wreckers would need special operator's licenses. He said that they wouldn't unless the vehicle weighed 26,000 pounds.

Darmitzel said he wasn't sure why the federally mandated Commercial Vehicle Safety Act of 1986 set 26,000 pounds as the threshold.

Eugene Calt of the federal taxation and revenue department said the CDL program was imposed to create national uniformity.

Calt said it was entirely possible that there is a loophole. He said the legislature could determine to crowd in the CDL legislation that some vehicles under 26,000 pounds should have an operator with a CDL.

"I don't see why not, as long as it promotes good safety," Calt said.

All states are connected to one computerized system to share information about CDL drivers.

Darmitzel said the Federal Highway Administration authorized four exemptions according to the safety act.

He said those four exemptions are recreational vehicles, farm or ranch vehicles, emergency fire fighting vehicles and military vehicles.

He said the ambulance is exempt only because it doesn't meet the 26,000 pound weight requirements.

"The problem is none of these things are clear cut," Darmitzel said. "The whole concept was for a commercial drivers license and then they immediately established guidelines that ignore a commercial activity. It's a screwy setup."

# Clock runs out on unadopted shelter dogs

Groomed and ready to join a new family, Lager the Schnauzer is waiting at the Lincoln County Humane Society animal shelter. "This one is hard to figure, because he's such a beautiful dog," said shelter manager Esther Harper. "His ears haven't been clipped,

but otherwise, he looks like a perfect Schnauzer and his coloring is a gorgeous silver gray." Lager was found wandering without rabies or license tags at Buddy's Stables on Gavilan Canyon Road. He is about three years old. "A woman who lives nearby kept him for about six days hoping to find the owners, but brought him

here when no one asked about him," Harper said. "He will need to be neutered, is very energetic and would make a good alarm dog for a household." "We put him with other medium to small dogs and he gets along well with them."

Lager was groomed without charge for his feature photograph by Laura Schlegel at Mountain View Animal Clinic, who also has helped with some of the other dogs.

One of Lager's neighbors is Brandy, a striking chow/shepherd mix with a short, but thick red coat with brindle accents and a small white patch on her chest.

"She's so eager to please that she falls all over herself," said shelter secretary Kathy Tetreault, who thinks Brandy is special. "She's a really good dog and gets along beautifully with all the other dogs. She has bronze eyes that really set off her coloring."

About 10 months old, Brandy came in as a stray with a green nylon collar with no tags after tenants noticed her hanging around Lobkout Estates.

She would need to be spayed in line with state law that requires all animals adopted from shelters to be sterilized to prevent more unwanted litters that end up abandoned or destroyed.

Good news. Little Dickens, the dachshund mix featured a few weeks ago, has been sponsored by someone who liked his photograph but could not adopt him. The sponsor will pay the cost of his neutering.

Several other small dogs are in

residence at the shelter, including a toy-size, gray, neutered male poodle found on Sudderth Drive; Max, a black miniature-size terrier-poodle mix who is well-groomed and has been neutered; Dosy, a female toy gray and white poodle; and a silky terrier mix called Cookie, who was found on Mechem Drive near Cochera. He is calm, not an excessive barker, and gentle even with children.

Bad news. Harper recently had to make the difficult choice and euthanize Adobe and Stripe, two longtime shelter residents featured in previous articles, but never successfully adopted. Three others who also have been at the shelter a long time and need to find a home soon are Sugar, a golden Labrador with cropped ears who's a fast learner; Panda, an adorable border collie/shepherd mix on the small side of a medium build with a dark face and brown eyebrows, who has been in the shelter since she was a pup; and Madre, the good-natured mother dog who nursed other litters after her pups were weaned. Her body is back to normal and her eyes literally twinkle with excitement when visitors come through the shelter.

Tetreault and Harper would like to see these three given a chance at life.

Don't forget that a free dog training workshop will be offered by former shelter manager Randy Basch and volunteer Linda Turck, who trains champion Golden Retrievers, at 2 p.m. the first Saturday of each month. They will be in School House

# MainStreet plans groundbreaking festivities

MainStreet Ruidoso directors heard Thursday the words they've been waiting years to hear: everything's on line to start the streetscape project in Midtown.

Alan Briley told the members of the board the streetscape project has all approvals needed and everything is signed to start construction.

That means by this time next year, Midtown should have the paving, sidewalks and lighting that have been in the hoping and dreaming stages for so long.

"We would like to outline all the details in a meeting Friday, November 5, with the contractors," said Briley, Ruidoso's deputy village manager and designated liaison with the MainStreet program.

"D&S Contracting from Santa Teresa is the contractor. A notice to proceed will be issued at a pre-construction meeting where we will invite all the dignitaries in the world, the FHWA people, all the state highway department people, the press will be invited; probably one or two council members," Briley said.

"I conduct my pre-construction meetings in a very outlying way and I don't like to have a lot of dis-

cussion; I just like to have everyone there so they can hear what we are doing. Pre-construction is just that we talk about what we are doing the village has elected to do all the inspections in house. I've hired an inspector. Between the inspector, Don and I, we will inspect the whole project as it goes through," Briley said.

"It is almost a done deal," Briley said. The board discussed an official groundbreaking ceremony with a scheduled breakfast for everybody in the MainStreet project area to be served at the same time. A tentative time of 8 a.m. November 8, was set by the members.

Actual groundbreaking will probably take place the week of November 12, according to Briley.

The board of directors discussed the need to have an official groundbreaking.

"Because the project has lost a little credibility. For five years we have talked about it. The groundbreaking is important. It will be a good time to get people to join, when they see that something is going to happen," Miller said.

"As it stands now, we have plenty of money," said Briley. "Everything's approved as plans specified, including colored concrete

and paving bricks."

Miller asked if there were any intentions of changing the plans from the way they were approved.

"We talked about it a little bit, but we don't want to take away any of the enhancements or the goodies or the good looking things. It is a little over designed," Briley said.

"As it stands now we have plenty of money. If things start getting out of hand where it looks like we are going to have a few problems where it looks like we aren't going to have enough money then, there are a few things we can delete," Briley said.

"We have a commitment from the highway department if we need more money to come and ask," he added.

The board spent time on the discussion on the problems of the colored concrete fading.

Briley told members that a spray coating will cover colored and non-colored concrete and that the substance is not slick.

"This means all money made available by the legislature will be used, except the latest \$150,000," Briley said.

"One thing we have been criticized for is the enhancement. The colored concrete will make things look pretty. If we take it out we're going to save \$100,000, but if we

take it out, we're taking out the enhancement that helped us get the money," Briley said.

"All of the money that has been made available to us from the legislature has been used. We still have money left to take care of the detours," Miller said.

"Right now, as it stands, the contract, with tax, itself comes to about \$1.335 million. There is \$1.45 million in funding. We've used about \$60,000 on designs, plans and advertising. That gives us \$67,000 left for contingencies, inspection and testing," Briley said.

"We have \$150,000 in pocket for phase two. We have the joint powers of agreement," Briley said.

A meeting with the contractors will take place before the actual construction takes place, according to Briley.

"We need to have the meeting with the contractor first so we can be sure everyone understands the timetable," Briley said.

"We have submitted a capital improvements program for projects going and for plans for the future," Don Miller said.

Miller spoke about the Americans With Disabilities Act. He said that Mayor Jerry Shaw suggested the public restrooms downtown be renovated to comply.

The council agreed that it would

be nice to bring the public restrooms into a high priority.

MainStreet Ruidoso, through the state Main Street program, has access to the services of a state design team.

"They will be here in November to work with us on promotional advertising," Miller said.

Don Dutton, MainStreet attorney, reminded the members that the 501 C3 (non-profit) standing could be in danger if brochures are used to promote businesses.

"You can have the brochures for people to pick up, but you cannot take a position. The material must be non-biased," Dutton said.

In an extended discussion over the problems of MainStreet parking, board members spoke of a meeting of the downtown merchants to help make them aware there will be a parking problem.

"We need to get the facts out to the people and get their input. Santa Fe is making money on parking lots," Dutton said.

There was some discussion of putting parking meters in vacant lots. Members of the board looked at the pros and cons of paid parking.

A discussion over the possibility of El Paso Street being used as possible parking took place.

Board member Audean Franklin brought up the problem of the lack of parking space now.

"Employees of stores in downtown park their cars on the street in front of the stores. They are taking up space that customers would use. I think we are losing business because the shopper decides to forget shopping and go eat," Franklin said.

"I asked a shop owner, whose employee was parked in front of my shop to please ask if the car could be moved so my customers could park, and I was told 'It's a public space,'" Franklin said.

The possibility of using a trolley car was discussed.

"We need to start with informal meetings and ask for input. It is a two-way street. We need to get a consultant from the highway department to talk to us. There is our job to go to P&Z (planning and zoning) with recommendations," Dutton said.

In other business, the board approved the minutes and financial statement for September.

In attendance for the meeting were Don Miller, Alden Deyo, Tom Battin, Audean Franklin, Rally Burkstaller, Don Dutton, Mike Radziewicz, Margaret Lahey, and Alan Briley.

# Cavers volunteer to build gate to protect Fort Stanton Cave

It sounds simple enough. Install a gate to stop vandals from gaining access to a pristine area of Fort Stanton Cave.

But then start factoring in that about 800 pounds of concrete and a 150-pound iron fence had to be carried back to the point of installation over rough terrain inside a cave, up 20 steps and through Crystal Crawl; and that most of the work had to be accomplished on uneven ground with workers on their knees because of the low ceiling.

The project would have been monumentally expensive if not for the participation of scores of volunteers, said Mike Bilbo from the Bureau of Land Management, (BLM) which supervises the cave.

They were all there Saturday and Sunday, 32 of them helping, hauling and happy.

Members of White Mountain

Search and Rescue showed up. Cavers from the Southwest Region of the National Speleological Association came from grottoes (chapters) in Carlsbad, White Sands, Chaves County, Las Cruces, Lincoln County, Albuquerque, and one each from Texas and Minnesota. Members of a Sierra Club chapter drove up from El Paso.

"We couldn't have done it without them," Bilbo said from his office in Roswell. "I figured the man hours and to contract this out would have cost \$10,000. But this way, the BLM only paid my wages and gas."

The Southwest Region paid for any other costs, he said.

Bilbo said with the effort by Sierra Club members and others who carried the material back into the cave, more than 855 hours were invested into the project.

"It's overwhelming," he said. The incident that prompted the

decision to move ahead with the gate involved someone who took a pistol and beer back in the most pristine portion of the explored cave and shot some formations, Bilbo said. Prior to that, nine people from Roswell had been caught with drugs and formations that had been broken from the cave walls.

"It's those kinds of things that made us decide," he said. "A gate first was proposed nine years ago and was written into a plan for the cave."

But nothing happened. Enter Calvin Courier and his friend Jim Cox, owner of Artistry of Iron in Albuquerque.

"Calvin decided it was time to move ahead and I did an environmental analysis," Bilbo said.

During an interview with Cox from his home in Albuquerque, he said this is the third gate he has created for caves in New Mexico,

two in Fort Stanton and one at Torgac Cave.

"This is what I do, rod iron security, but usually I'm doing it for houses," Cox said.

This project demanded some special features since vandals have broken the outer gate lock to gain entry to the main cave many times.

"We poured a two-foot deep foundation to keep them from digging under the gate," he said. "Cavers like to dig" as part of the exploration process. A concrete support rod was sunk five feet and erosion prevention devices were installed.

The gate is five-foot long and two and a half feet high.

"The opening is not square," Cox explained.

Before the two days of installation, Cox and his friend Jeff Phayre visited the cave twice to measure. Building the gate took two days with the help of Phayre and Cox's 14-year-old son, Jason.

Cox, a member of the Hondo Grotto with Bilbo, has been caving for about three years and used his own experience to try to cover all possibilities of force entry.

"Tell (vandals) to forget it," he said. "There's hard surface rock on the outside and no hacksaw will work on the gate. The lock is totally protected with a box."

The area blocked off by the iron gate is the lower breakdown and the new section of the cave.

They are accessed through the aptly-named Hellhole, a 3,000-foot long, breath-grabbingly narrow passage. Encased in chambers beyond the gate are Fort Stanton's rare velvet formations, which make the cave a favorite.

Because of its proximity to the Rio Bonito, the formations in the cave continue to grow in their wet environment, itself a rarity in Western caves.

"A lot of people don't realize the

foundations won't come back," Cox said. "And others don't value the bats that hibernates there. Yet bats can eat their weight in insects every night. You get rid of them and then we have to use more pesticides on our crops."

During the winter months, if the bats are disturbed, it can doom them to starvation. During hibernation, they slow their metabolism and live off their stored fat. Once awake, the metabolism speeds up, but no food source is available to replenish their fat store.

Cox hopes his iron gate will provide an undisturbed sanctuary for the bats, whose numbers have dropped from 12,000 to 200.

# Warrior mistakes give Socorro the win

The loss took away the chance for a winning season for Ruidoso, moving their record to 4-6 for the season. Socorro is 6-3. Ruidoso is 1-3 in district 3-A-A play, while Socorro will advance to the playoffs with an unlikely win next week over Silver.

Kevin Pellman, Adam Chavez, Freddy Sanchez and Sergio Guerrero.

Socorro put the squeeze again on the Warriors inside the five yardline when the Warriors had to make a decision on fourth and goal from the four. The smart play was to take the field goal with sure-footed Byron Soules attempting what would be no more than an extra point.

The Warriors gambled however and went for the touchdown.

Head coach Mike Gaston called a quick pass to Soules and quarterback John Echols delivered a perfect pass and the dependable Soules made the catch and added the PAT, giving Ruidoso a 7-0 lead.

At that point, the ghosts, gremlins and zebras went to work.

Ruidoso had control of the football for all but a minute and a half during the first quarter. The Warriors totally dominated the line of scrimmage and the game.

Suddenly, Socorro started getting every conceivable break possible. The second quarter saw the hosts tie the game up and Ruidoso got flagged for 85 yards in penalties that gave Socorro first down after first down.

The Socorro scoring drive of 65 yards was mostly off strange Warrior penalties. Still, Ruidoso had control of the game so convincingly that it was inconceivable that Socorro would seize such control in

the second half.

That half began just like the first quarter. Ruidoso's defense came out and forced a Socorro punt. Ruidoso got the ball and moved it but we clipped and held and false-started and illegal motioned and ultimately had to kick the ball away.

Again the defense held Socorro and facing fourth and 25, the hosts had to punt. Ah, the turning point in the game. Ruidoso roughed the punter and instead of getting the ball back at the 35, Socorro had a first down.

Traditionally, the officiating is terrible, and Friday's game was no exception. At one point, Ruidoso had over 100 yards in penalties and Socorro had 10. But we knew that going into the game.

In their game with Oñate, the Knights had 185 yards in penalties, and Socorro had 30. Oñate had 385 yards in offense and Socorro had 65. The score — 14-0 Oñate.

We didn't lose the game because of the hometown officiating, but it sure looked like the officials kept Socorro in the game until they didn't need any more help.

Even the Socorro coaches in the press box were amazed by the series of events during the game.

Oñate had the experience and confidence to overcome what were probably some of the Socorro moms out there in referee suits, but our kids are too young and haven't won enough to keep coming back and coming back after getting busted in the nose time after time by weird, late, strange calls.

Next year Socorro will be pretty good again. But when they play at W.D. Horton stadium, mama won't be there to referee for them and they'll get their jaws jacked. Count on it.

Next week the Warriors face Cobre in the final game of the season at home. The Indians have just one win for the season and have a long road trip ahead of them. Game time is 7:30 p.m.

# Use it or lose it! Commish calls for county tax cut

Lincoln County Commissioners are not going to use a \$800,000 surplus for some progressive project, then cut taxes, because they're collecting too much, Commissioner Wilton Howell said Friday.

Lower property taxes might attract new businesses. Setting up strict criteria for maintenance of private rural roads could be one way to save money, he said.

Chairman Monroy Montes offered a suggestion of his own. Increasing the 10-cents per front foot maintenance assessment on subdivision roads may replace revenue lost by a tax cut, he said.

Irritated by a decision earlier this month not to spend \$250,000 of that surplus to buy property in Glencoe to stage large events, Howell said if the money isn't going to be used productively, reduce taxes and leave the money at home.

"I know we can't offer incentives to bring people to the county, but a tax cut would be attractive," he said. "I know that's one of the things people look at."

"At budget time (in December), I'd like to pursue a tax cut. It's something new. It might take 60 days to figure out how to do it, because don't think done before."

"The fact is that we do have a surplus and it has cost us when we've gone to Santa Fe to get capital improvement money. They cut us back, because we haven't use our full taxing ability and have a surplus."

The state requires counties to maintain a five percent surplus, about \$1.2 million locally, but Lincoln has \$800,000 more than necessary, Howell said.

"I'm not proud that we're taking this money and not doing anything progressive with it," he said. "It's sitting in the bank earning two to three percent interest. It would be better if it stayed at home and let the people use it."

But Wynham offered a dose of reality, noting that the current county budget sits at \$300,000 more than expected revenues. Two more years with such a deficit and the surplus will be used up, he said.

"We probably need to talk about getting more efficient use out of the money spent," Howell said.

"There's a ranch in the northern part of Lincoln County. The manager wrote a letter to the editor (in The Ruidoso News) urging the commission to bring meetings to Yesso and Raton and not to cut back on the road department because that's about the only services they receive."

"I need to thank him for calling my attention to the area. We maintain 28.9 miles of road on that ranch. My impression is that no school children live on them."

The county needs a point-type policy to determine what private roads should receive maintenance to eliminate politics.

While it maintains the roads on one ranch, other roads around Corona are in terrible shape to the point that school children are being bused into Vaughn for classes.

Howell said, according to school officials in Corona, the loss of those students drastically reduced the school population in the tiny community and will force them to use emergency money to survive the year.

"I'd like Andy to investigate," he said. "Maybe some roads are being maintained that are not serving the needs and other are not, that would. We could save money and provide for Corona students to attend school in Lincoln County."

Howell said he'd also like to increase productivity for the dollar spent.

"When an employee leaves, if the others are willing to take up the slack, I'd like to see each receive more money. We'd have fewer, but higher paid employees," Howell said.

Noting that Lincoln County posted the highest tax rate in the state, he said, "I don't take much pride that we are taxed so high. I know there are several reasons and the majority are not the county's fault. Different entities influence the tax rate."

Wynham said statistics branding Lincoln County as having the highest tax rate in the state are unfair to county government.

It's the village of Ruidoso's 44 mill tax rate that pushed the county over the top. On its own, the county's sitting at 8.4 mills (it could tax up to 10 mills). Lincoln County is only one of a few in the state that does not tax the maximum, he said.

While commending Howell's interest, Commissioner Bill Schwettmann questioned whether a cut would result in enough impact on anyone to warrant the sacrifices it might entail.

"How much reduction per household are you figuring?" he asked Howell.

"I don't want to put out a figure too quickly," Howell said. "It can't be just one commissioner's idea. It has to be a joint effort and not hamper the operation of the county. I don't have the expertise."

"I sure don't like taxes at all, but it's a complex problem. A lot of tax is needed to pay things off, but I see

nothing wrong with you pursuing it," Schwettmann said.

"I expect help from you, wild Bill," Howell said.

"Cutting taxes is real easy," Wynham said. "Can put it on the agenda. The hard part is where you cut. This year, Lincoln County spent \$300,000 more than in the budget than we have coming in."

"Monroy and I sat down and came up with \$100,000 in cuts quickly."

To cut one mill would require \$240,000 in cuts, and \$500,000 to get rid of this year's deficit.

That would amount to about \$33 a year on a \$100,000 house.

Schwettmann said high rollers in his area of Alto wouldn't notice \$20 to \$40 a year. He wouldn't want to hurt the county and possibly throw it into fiscal hole for that amount.

"Everyone would have to do a lot better job on the budget, if there was no surplus," Howell said.

"You're saying balancing the budget might be considered a tax cut," Nunley said.

"Possibly," Howell replied.

"I'd be for that," Nunley said.

Howell said when the previous commission was elected, the road department was badly in need of upgrading and commissioners and road manager Bill Cupit did a good job. But now it may be time to

tighten.

Montes challenged employees to continue to provide service over the next three years without having to increase taxes.

County Treasurer Janice Ware, in a rare rebuttal, told commissioners her office employees and other elected officials have already cut and sacrificed.

She kept quiet last year when asked to squeeze her budget and cut last minute spending, but are commissioners telling her she's not going to receive some badly needed items that she previously has postponed, Ware asked.

"If you're really interested in reducing taxes, you need to attend village council and school board meetings and see what they're spending taxes on," she told the commissioners.

"That's a good idea," Howell said.

Decreasing Payments in Lieu of Taxes (PILT) also negatively impacted the county, Howell and Montes said. The money, which the federal government pays on land it owns in counties, dropped from \$370,000 four years ago to \$319,000 last year in Lincoln County.

"They have never adjusted that figure for inflation," Montes said. "If it was, it would be twice as much and could be a big boost to the county operation."

## Guv appoints Campos to Task Force on Crime

Senator Pete Campos (D-District 8) has been appointed by Governor Bruce King to a Task Force on Crime to propose solutions to New Mexico's growing crime problem to the 1994 legislature.

"It's important to study all aspects of crime in New Mexico, but I hope the task force will focus on younger victims and offenders," Campos said.

"We've made progress in the last few years, and particularly in 1993 with an overhaul of the Children's Code and of our DWI laws, but there's still room for improvement."

Campos, who represents Lincoln County, is the Senate majority caucus chairman.

He said he expects anti-crime proposals to be a major topic of the 1994 sessions.

It's important to balance tougher penalties with better gang and family intervention programs, he added.

"Singular solutions proposed on their own won't solve the broader problems. We need to take a comprehensive approach that addresses the prevention of crime as well as the prosecution of it," Campos said.

**NEW MEXICO CHILD NEEDS A HOME**

John was born on December 17, 1983. Joshua was born on March 28, 1985. After years of abuse, neglect and many moves in foster care, they need the security of a permanent family. At this time, their social worker would like to place them together, though separate placements may be necessary.

The boys are in weekly therapy and John has made a lot of progress in learning to express his needs and feelings verbally. Joshua, who has experienced more moves and less stability, still has a ways to go.

John, 9, is a talkative and active boy who enjoys swimming, camping and playing baseball. He likes small cars and other toys children his age are likely to have. He is still slow to trust adults and keeps his distance from people until he knows them well. His foster mother likes him and says that he's generally well-behaved and seems to be doing better than his brother.

As a 4th grader, John is doing fairly well academically. He needs more individual attention than the teacher can give him so his behavior could be a problem. He's in a regular classroom with special education support.

Josh, 8, enjoys swimming, toy cars, and video games. His behavior reflects the lack of stability and security in his life. He can be defiant, manipulative and impulsive.

He's a second grader in a regular classroom, but is struggling academically. Some support from the special education teacher is needed to help him with his school work and his classroom behavior. It is hoped that once he's in a stable family situation, he'll catch up academically.

Josh missed out on a lot of nurturing that most young children get, so he often acts like a much younger child. He would benefit from the kind of closeness and cuddling you'd expect to give a preschooler. John, however, is likely to resist this kind of "mothering" and prefers to do "guy" things with a dad.

John and Josh need a stable, secure family that can set clear expectations and limits. Their family will need to have realistic expectations of themselves and of the boys. Although a two parent family is preferred, particularly if the boys can be placed together, and experienced single dad might be considered. John and Josh should be the youngest or only children in the family, though siblings at least three years old might work. Financial assistance is available.

# House passes legislation limiting MRS funds

When the House of Representatives passed the 1994 Energy and Water Appropriations Conference Report, it effectively cut off hopes by the Mescalero tribe to obtain federal funds to study hosting a Monitored Retrievable Storage (MRS) facility on the reservation.

According to Congressman Joe Skeen, R-NM, the legislation prohibits any additional spending for one year for ongoing studies by the Mescalero Apache Indians on the issue of siting an MRS facility on the Mescaleros' New Mexico properties.

Skeen, who was successful in adding similar language to the House version of the bill earlier this year, personally lobbied House members of the conference committee to assure that the language would be included in the final version of the

bill, according to a release from his office.

Skeen has, since the idea was first proposed, objected to the Mescalero Apache tribe's application for an MRS, which is an above ground storage facility to receive and temporarily store high level spent nuclear fuel for ultimate disposal in a permanent geologic repository.

The Mescaleros have received a total of \$300,000 from the Department of Energy (DOE) to study the feasibility of establishing an MRS on the reservation.

But Skeen had previously been

assured by DOE's Nuclear Waste Negotiator that the Mescaleros cannot receive the final \$2.8 million study grant unless they receive a consensus from the Governor's office and the Congressional Delegation in favor of the MRS.

The Congressman initiated this effort earlier this year by adding report language to the House version of the Energy and Water Appropriation bill, which directed the U.S. Nuclear Waste Negotiator to comply with current law regarding the development of a consensus proper to the release of any Part B

Phase II funds.

Similar language, referred to as the Bingaman Amendment, was added to the bill in the Senate by senators Pete Domenici (R-NM) and Jeff Bingaman (D-NM).

And the conference committee want an extra step by cutting off all Phase 2, Part B funds during the 1994 fiscal year.

"I have tried to refrain from interfering with the Mescaleros' right to study the issue," Skeen observed.

"However, since the Mescaleros received their first federal payment two years ago, they have not received any support from the Congressional Delegation, the Governor, and city and county officials for this contentious program.

"This language is important to prevent any further waste of taxpayer money."



### NAFTA spells good news for New Mexico

Free trade is a concept that New Mexico can't afford to ignore or reject. The North American Free Trade Agreement is a good deal for this state, and the sooner it is adopted the sooner New Mexico can begin to reap the benefits.

New Mexico, perhaps this nation's most beautiful state, is certainly among the poorest states. That's why New Mexicans should welcome with open arms any viable and environmentally sound economic boost.

More people spells more jobs for New Mexico.

And, over the years, the entire United States will benefit, too. The manufacturing jobs that move south, soon will be replaced with high-tech jobs as Yankee ingenuity goes to work to revolutionize the work world. As New Mexico revises its dependence on the feds and weapons research and development, this whole nation will be revising its place in the world market.

### Former village attorney disagrees with ADA; offers his own opinions

#### TO THE EDITOR:

Deputy District Attorney William Kinsella misreads the law and makes judgments on factors outside the law in his letter of October 12, 1993, to the Ruidoso Village Council. It was reported in The Ruidoso News October 18.

I know of no violations of the New Mexico Procurement Code by the Village of Ruidoso when I served as its attorney. The section of law Mr. Kinsella refers to in his letter is not part of the Procurement Code. More important, it does not apply to municipalities. It could not have been violated by Ruidoso village officials in their official capacities.

Kinsella makes his motives clear when he bases his conclusions on

things like "may have indicated," on what is "bad for employee moral," and what "inventory control policy ... should be." The importance of morale and inventory control do not change the fact that they are political, not legal concerns.

For Mr. Stallings to turn "may have indicated" (as in Mr. Kinsella's letter) into "specifically pointed a finger" (the October 17 story) shows how completely politics controls his thinking and writing as well.

I am disappointed by both the District Attorney's Office and The Ruidoso News.

ADA William M. Kinsella Jr. wrote: "It is clear, that under the Procurement Code, village employees should not be trading village property for other village employees personal property. It is simply against the law and further it is bad for employee morale. In this case, the village employees obtained 'legal' approval for the trade and so the District Attorney's Office will not proceed with any criminal charges or civil actions against these village employees ... It must also be stressed that such trades will not be condoned in the future by our office." The ADA, according to his letter, was told that village attorney Thomsen "didn't see a problem with department heads trading small items that didn't have a lot of value."


