The Capitan Board of Trustees will meet at 7 p.m. Monday in village hall to select a new police officer. The village has been operating several months with a police chief, but no officer. The first proposed appointment was blocked by Trustees Gilbert Montoya and Leroy Montes, who complained they were not consulted by Mayor Frank Warth and Chief Tony Cano. The Capitan School Board has moved its regular meeting back one week to Thursday, November 18, to watch the girls' volleyball team in the state playoffs that starts this week in Roswell. The Capitan Tigers will be pitted against the team from Magdalena at 3:15 p.m. Thursday.

MainStreet turns dirt next week to start the streetscape

Groundbreaking ceremonies for MainStreet's long awaited sidewalk project, is scheduled for 10 a.m. Monday, November 15. What should be a joyous occasion also has village officials deeply concerned. Deputy manager Alan Briley said the 180-day projected time to complete the project is a best case scenario, discounting inclement weather or other unforeseen conditions.

An additional concern is an unsigned letter circulated by some down town business owners that asks, "Can you afford to lose 50 percent or possibly up to 90 percent of your holiday season sales," predicated on what they call massive sidewalk construction.

Briley met with MainStreet officials and contractors for a roundtable discussion Friday that was focused entirely on communication, access at all times and sensitivity to the downtown merchants.

Briley said the project is divided into eight independent phases, short completion steps over a long period of time.

Each step will be literally carpeted islands to facilitate shoppers around the work area. The first phase will run from Fern Street to Central Street on the southside only.

Thanksgiving and Christmas will be given special consideration in the way of down time, to alleviate any possible inconveniences.

Demolition and rubble control will be removed after stores are closed at night.

"Continuity in the work phases is of the utmost importance," said Briley. "The contractor can't change his plans, that is why MainStreet director Don Miller and myself will act as liaison to any complaints or questions. We want this project to proceed as quickly as possible in the best interest of the merchants."

Some business people have urged that the project not get underway until after Christmas, about six weeks.

"This was a three-year project, that already has gone five years," Briley said. "That should show you the unpredictability of setting any precise time."

"If we don't start until January, that puts 180 days at the end of June," Briley said. "If we think realistically, we know that there will be some bad weather that could push us into July or August. That's realistic."

Briley said the bottom line is that the work shouldn't stop any shopping.

"That's why the eight small phases," Briley said. "To prevent a serious foot traffic flow. That's what merchants have to keep in the back of their minds, there will be no shut down to the shopper trade at all."

Briley said any store owner, MainStreet or otherwise, may have special concerns regarding the project not previously answered. He said any such questions regarding the project or a specific store, should call MainStreet director Don Miller at 257-6346, or if they can't reach Miller, call Briley in village hall at 258-4014.

Capitan schools make all A's in state review

The Capitan teaching staff as a whole and superintendent Diana Sonnemaker, in particular, received plaudits last Thursday from a State Department of Education accreditation team.

Team leader Syd Gould told the staff assembled for the exit meeting that during four days of examining the district, team members had been impressed to find teachers with their lesson plan books on their desks.

"That's unusual and tells us the teachers are looking at them and following them," he said.

Although Capitan officials chose to be evaluated on the long standing option of compliance with state statutes, and Department of Education rules and regulations, Gould said the district is well on its way toward the student outcome based evaluation approach. That approach will be required in the future, he said.

"You're already preparing for Option B," he said. "It's clear that student outcome is addressed here and is related to required competencies."

He applauded the willingness of the staff to work with one another and share ideas, calling it "extraordinary."

The district's approach to inclusion of disabled children in the regular classroom is working throughout the school, Gould said.

"You cannot tell if a classroom has a child with a disability," he said.

The media center meets the existing needs of the district and in the future will link students with districts in other areas.

"The students display strong creativity" in their paintings and showcases throughout the school," Gould said, adding that they give students a chance to feel good about themselves.

Turning to Sonnemaker, Gould said that in the short span of time she has been with the district, about four months, "she has gained the respect of the staff to a person. "Clearly, she listens, is flexible

Council sets criteria for village manager

Priorities for a new village manager will be established Tuesday at the regular Ruidoso Village Council meeting.

Over the past few weeks, one open meeting and one closed meeting were conducted regarding the recently vacated village manager's position.

According to Municipal League Information Officer Bob Jerkins, the position of village manager was first established by ordinance when Jim Hine became village manager.

Jerkins said whether Mayor Jerry Shaw was elected or appointed to fill former Mayor Victor Alonso's seat has no significance in her duties now as mayor.

According to Jerkins, in a mayor-council municipality, the mayor has the authority to appoint, supervise and discharge employees, subject to the approval of a majority of all members of the governing body.

Jerkins said bids or requests for proposals (RFP) are not necessary in hiring a new village manager because the village is not purchasing an outside service, but actually

hiring an employee.

The mayor and governing body may or may not issue a contract for a new hire. Jerkins said it is not unusual at all for the manager to be under contract, because eventually, the governing body changes and the manager otherwise could be subject to removal with shifting politics.

Another point of view is that if the majority of the board is up for election, it may seem unfair to sign a contract and tie the new board to a village manager the members did not choose.

Last Friday, November 6, was former manager Ron Wicker's last official day in that position. He resigned effective that date, and that's when he went off the municipal payroll.

Meanwhile, the council has met in executive session once to interview a prospect for village manager, former deputy manager Gary Jackson.

Discussions over Jackson were conducted first in an open session and then he was contacted and invited to travel to Ruidoso for an interview.

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and involved. In my opinion, (with Sonnemaker at the helm) you will continue to have a school for others to emulate."

Explaining the procedure of accreditation, Gould said that within 40 days following the exit meeting, the accreditation report will be sent to the district for its review and response.

Based on the report and district response, the department will recommend accreditation status in the summer of 1994.

A school must be accredited to be eligible for federal grants, state financial support and for students' credit to be accepted at other accredited schools.

Evaluation of management may be covered at another time by other Education Department personnel. Chapter II, a source of about \$11,000 in federal money used in the library and for counseling services, was reviewed during a previous visit.

Besides Gould, members of the team last week were Tricia Penn, Vicki Breen and Rosco Vaughn.

The exit interview is a chance to share only the highlights of the visit, Gould emphasized.

Breen, who was assigned to look at the basic instructional programs within the district, said she had no citations, but did have some professional comments, which included a recommendation to update the curriculum to reflect the state-adopted standards for excellence.

"You already have started by revising the science and social studies curriculum," she said, but she would like to see elementary teachers take the lead.

She also would like to see the peer helping and peer teaching program extended.

Vaughn, who handles vocational education, said he enjoyed his two weeks in Lincoln County, first with the Ruidoso school district and now Capitan.

"It's not always a pleasant task (to evaluate districts), but this has been," he said. "You have two good districts." He mentioned only one citation,

the need to upgrade the equipment in vocational education.

"Home economics is in pretty good shape," he said. "The greatest equipment need is in agriculture and business to support the instruction."

"I also encourage the vocation people to revise their curriculum (to fit the new standards of excellence competencies framework). Todd Proctor already has done some and is right on track."

He urged district officials to take advantage of having an Eastern New Mexico University instruction center in nearby Ruidoso.

"They are looking at transfer credit in the area of vocational education and already have a welding class this year," he said.

He recommended that an auto lift be removed from the shop and that computer equipment be stored somewhere other than the paint room. A formal advisory committee also should be formed, Vaughn said.

He commended Proctor, saying he has worked with him since the start of the school year.

"I haven't suggested anything that he hasn't tried to do," he added.

Penn covered special education as backup to Gould, the team leader, because he is a district consultant.

"I'm pleased to say I have only two citations," she said. "When you have so many regulations, that's not hard to find."

Both related to the type of form used to document decisions.

"If a special education student is not in the general education environment, you must show why," she said. "Capitan has done an excellent job, so the citation reflects more a lack of documentation."

"Second, in the prior notice that must be filed whenever proposing (a different approach), the reasons options considered were rejected were not documented."

Breen said the size and proximity of the buildings in the Capitan complex "offers a unique possibility for team and cooperative

efforts." She urged more use of local and regional artists and commended the display of student work and themes throughout the school.

Good cooperation exists among the staff, administrators and school board members, she said.

Penn echoed support for the inclusion program, the flexibility of teachers in modifying programs to meet individual needs and combining older children with younger to provide peer models.

Vaughn specifically noted that a big stuffed gorilla in vocational education is used in a unique approach to easing student anxiety about speeches. They start off reacting to the gorilla, he said.

"That something I've never seen before," Vaughn said, noting that he was shy in school and had difficulty speaking in front of groups.

"It might have helped me I thought it was a real innovative approach."

He complimented the vocational staff for the multitude of hands-on activities open to students, such as handling the scoring on computers during a voc-ag competition.

"I gave several citations three years ago and everything the teachers could do has been corrected," Vaughn said. "They are only short on equipment. They're very prepared and professional."

"A joint advisory committee was formed after my suggestion and the minutes show they really are addressing some problems."

The students at Capitan were "super" and reminded him of the advantages of being from a small school, Vaughn said. Everyone seems to participate in a multitude of activities.

He told the staff not to worry about reports of the adjustment to college being traumatic.

"It's not just the small schools, I assure you," Vaughn said. He hears similar reports from students attending his school in Las Cruces, which has 2,000 students.

"You are doing as good a job as you can with limited resources to prepare them to enter the world."

In other business, the council will review a request for proposal for hangar lease at Sierra Blanca Regional Airport.

Jim Franklin of Franklin Aviation said he had not met the village requirement of submitting his written intention of renewal within 90 days of the lease expiration.

Franklin indicated to **The Ruidoso News** that he still is interested in leasing the property with some adjustments.

No selection committee for the RFP has been appointed publicly to date.

The scope of the work includes aircraft maintenance and overhaul, air charter, flight instruction or air taxi.

The selection committee will grade the proposals and the highest rated will be asked to interview and negotiate terms and lease options.

The council has scheduled a public hearing on the preliminary plan for the Glenn Neans 14-acre development across from the Cree Meadows Country Club.

Planning administrator Cleatus Richards recommended approval with conditions, previously discussed by the council in a workshop meeting.

One of those conditions was the construction of the club house to be concurrent with the construction of the first townhouse or apartment unit in the development.

The commission approved wrought iron fencing as proposed, not to exceed six feet in height.


The commission approved designation of interior streets as private roads and allowed a variance of 40-foot right of way widths, where 50 feet is required by subdivision regulations.

Some setback requirements were altered to protect trees in the area.

The council also will act to approve or deny a vacation of right of way on San Miguel Drive for Debra Gonzales and David Warner.

The right of way is recommended to cure encroachment of deck and steps into public right-of-way.

EDCLC tries, tries again to reach that ever elusive quorum

The Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County's board of directors' October meeting was moved to November 4, because of the Governor's Tourism Convention.

Then the November 4, October EDC meeting was canceled and moved to November 18.

The October meeting was canceled entirely for the fourth, and a decision to combine the October and November meetings was made.

The reasons behind combining the October and November meeting were lack of commitment on the part of the EDC board members to attend.

Not having enough members present to represent a quorum has been a problem the EDC has faced so, three new members were added in September.

The new members represented new blood that would take an active part on the EDC board. The hope was enough people would be present to make up a quorum.

During the September meeting, Commissioner Wilton Howell raised a question of missing a meeting in August.

His reasoning was, three new members were introduced without having been voted on by the entire EDC board.

Kopp told him there had not been an August meeting.

"We haven't had a meeting since July to vote; what I don't like is how they weeded out the people who were interested," Howell said during the September meeting.

The three new members were added to the board in the hopes of having enough people interested

enough to attend the board meetings thus allowing for enough to make up a quorum.

One of the new board members, Bob Boebinger who spends summers in Ruidoso but winters in Arizona, was absent from the September meeting that was to be his introduction as a board member.

Kopp explained during that meeting that Boebinger would return for the meetings.

Howell and existing EDC members checked the bylaws and determined that the new members could not be added without a vote of the entire board.

The formalities of the vote were then conducted and the new members were officially welcomed.

Another of the three new members, Sharon Wicker, is moving to Seabrook, Texas, where her husband has just accepted a job as city manager.

Karen Kopp, EDC Executive Director, called **The Ruidoso News** Thursday to report that the meeting had been canceled, as a courtesy to the reporter who had made plans to attend.

"I have six people who said 'yes,' and there are three that said they will try and make the meeting," said Kopp.

"Two were out and I left messages on their recorders and am waiting for them to return my call," she added.

"With the situation of people having to drive from long distances it is not fair to them to come without a confirmed quorum," Kopp said.

The **News** was told by Kopp that it would be a good idea to double check with the EDC office before attending the November 18 meeting to make sure it is still on.

Domestic violence: victims save lives by planning ahead

Home sweet home, the place where people should feel safe and secure, turns into a battleground for families caught in the vicious cycle of domestic violence.

In homes where one person is unable to handle or control anger, that person (99 percent of the time it's a male) takes out his frustration on the woman in his life. The abuse usually starts with a push or a shove, and then escalates.

Wife abuse - the physical or emotional mistreatment of a woman by her husband or male companion - is the most common unreported crime in America today.

Authorities estimate only one in 10 episodes of abuse is reported to police. They believe that it is so common that half of all marriages involve at least one episode of violence between spouses.

Abuse occurs in all segments of society, no matter what the education level, income level or religion of those involved. Law enforcement figures estimate as many as 28 million women are repeatedly abused.

"It's a vicious cycle of violence that can injure, cripple and sometimes kill ... and it will get worse unless those involved get help," according to a booklet on the subject.

There is help available, and the first step is admitting there's a problem. The second step is learning more about it. The third step is doing something about it.

Admitting it

If you or someone you know is



involved in a relationship where one person uses the other for a punching bag, it's time to call that behavior by its name - abuse.

It usually involves physical contact and even dangerous weapons, but, it can be in the form of mental abuse, where one partner is obsessively controlling. Even though the scars are internal, such abuse has lasting effects on a family.

Even though women are the primary victims of domestic violence, it's a crime that affects the whole family.

Learning about it

Domestic violence has a tendency to follow a predictable cycle, and victims who know what to look for might be able to see a violent episode coming and avoid it.

Dr. Lenore Walker described the pattern that includes a tension-building phase when tension is increasing, the woman senses this and attempts to calm the batterer by being nurturing and compliant.

But the tension continues to rise until an acute battering incident occurs.

Then following is the loving-contrite phase where the batterer knows that he's gone too far, begs for forgiveness and promises never

to do it again.

"Most women report that before they know it, the calm, loving behavior gives way to little abusive incidents and the tension building recurs," says Dr. Walker. "Thus, a new cycle of battering behavior begins."

Understanding these phases can help the victim predict the batterer's behavior and thus protect herself better.

Taking action

Nobody likes being hit, and victims of domestic violence don't like being humiliated and abused any more than anyone else.

But, sometimes they don't see any choices or options for themselves.

In Ruidoso, That's where Family Crisis Center comes in.

Talking about those options is what Family Crisis Center volunteers do most. Without passing judgment or making decisions for a woman in distress, crisis center volunteers are trained to listen and offer some options so a victim will have all the information she needs when she needs help.

An abused woman has three basic choices - one, to stay in the relationship or marriage while trying to remain safe and make basic improvements; two, to leave the relationship or marriage and start all over; and three, to let things continue as they are.

It's that person's choice, and while counselors and therapists can offer alternatives, only the abused can break the cycle of pain.

Experts offer these suggestions

for women who are still involved with a batterer:

1. Try to communicate with your mate; sharing expectations, ideas and fears. If the desire for change is there, the couple can work together to reshape their relationship.

2. Help the children in the home to understand, but not accept, the problem. It should be made clear to children that violence is wrong, and they should be encouraged to seek outside friends and support.

Children also should be taught to call for help when the batterer is abusing a family member. A call to 911 might save their mother's or father's life.

3. Get counseling. In Ruidoso, victims of domestic violence are invited to take part in a free women's support group at noon each Monday at Dr. Birgit LaMothe's office in Compound 1400 on Sudderth Drive.

The group is non-judgmental and non-threatening.

Help out by eating out

It's a good place to start if you or someone you know just wants to sort out the possibilities.

Plan ahead

Pre-planning might include completing education, checking out job training, and researching low income housing, food stamps and income support that might be needed if she leaves.

Planning ahead could include hiding an extra set of car keys, packing a bag of necessities for yourself and your children and stashing a little money for that rainy day.

It's important for victims to establish a record of abuse so they can file a written report with the police.

If your husband or mate threatens or beats you, you should keep a written record of bank accounts, yours and your children's social security numbers and any other information you might need if you have to leave home in a hurry.

Like scouts, victims of domestic violence should be prepared.

In an emergency

If an abused woman is in immediate danger, she should get away. That also requires some planning: have an escape route planned, and know of a place where you and your children will be safe.

In Ruidoso, call the Family Crisis Center (257-7365) to learn what kind of emergency help is available.

The crisis center, working with the police, can provide safe housing

In Lincoln County, emergency help is available for victims of domestic violence through the Family Crisis Center.

All calls are confidential and all services are free.

The Ruidoso Police answer that line, and then put callers in touch with trained Family Crisis Center volunteers.

for a short period of time.

A woman in danger should call the police or ask a neighbor to call for help, and if she's hurt, she should get medical attention immediately.

After a woman and her family are safe, she can obtain an Order of Protection through the district court which would allow her to stay in her home and force the batterer to leave that home until the two can meet in court.

There's always hope

Victims of domestic violence are as vulnerable to a loss of hope as they are to the loss of life that is the ultimate end to wife abuse.

Help is available. Call 257-7365, and ask to speak to a Family Crisis Center volunteer.

That person won't have the answers to your problems, but they'll have a ready ear to listen to those problems and offer some options for you to make informed choices.

A magnificent-looking cross between an Australian shepherd and cattle dog, Bravo is well-suited to life on a ranch.

But he also would be a great companion dog, because he is housebroken and responds well to commands.

Bravo was being trained to work cattle, when he began having confrontations with his owner's older lead dog. The two had to part ways and he was brought to the Lincoln County Humane Society shelter. But the owner said with some attention, picking up the training where it was discontinued, "he will

develop a good handle."

The owner left other bits of information about the one-year-old dog: he doesn't bother horses, he's easy to call off cattle, he's not good with cats, he loves to play catch with a tennis ball and he rides well in a pickup. However, the society strongly recommends against putting dogs in the back of pickups, where they could be thrown from the vehicle and killed or injured.

The society endorses allowing the dog to ride in the cab, or using a secured travel crate or harness arrangement, if they cannot be left at home.

Bravo, whose short-hair is brown with black splotches, will

need shots and to be neutered. One of his brown eyes is flecked with blue, adding to his overall attractiveness.

Two smaller, but equally as endearing residents of the shelter, also, are looking for owners who will love and care for them.

Cookie is a rare find, a calm-natured, scarce barking and no nipping apparent cross between a silky terrier and Yorkshire terrier.

About two years old, he was found in mid-October as a stray behind Cochera's Restaurant off Mechem Drive.

"He's so good, we bring him into the office during the day and he will just sit on the doorstep at the open door, occasionally going out to the lawn to take care of himself, and then coming right back," said shelter manager Esther Harper.

"But he wants a home, you can tell that," added secretary Kathy Tetreault. "You can tell he doesn't want to stay here. He gets along well with other dogs his size. Obviously, we haven't put him in with any large dogs."

"When we go outside and the door is shut, we can look back and see him up on the table looking out the window."

Cookie, so named, because he arrived rail thin and gobbled up biscuit treats, likes to ride in the back windows of cars.

His kennel mate, Tiny Tim, is a gray male poodle, who has been neutered and appears to be about two years old.

"He's housebroken and is good with children," Tetreault said.

The toy-sized poodle was found

as a stray about six months ago by a family that has too many other dogs to keep him.

"He gets along well with the other small dogs in the kennel, especially Dickens (a dachshund mix also up for adoption and sponsored for neutering)," she said.

A word of caution about giving pets as surprise Christmas gifts.

Don't do it.

A pet is a long-term commitment, as much as 16 years, and should be a decision by everyone who will be caring for and loving the animal.

Buy the accessories in advance

and announce the gift before or on Christmas Eve, then everyone can go down to the shelter on Christmas morning to select a new friend. Visit the shelter a few days early to make sure some likely candidates are in residence.

The shelter is open every day of the week, including holidays.

Risks are associated with any new pet and the shelter has a two-week get-acquainted period, in case problems arise.

That's not the case with large chain pet shops found in cities across the nation. Yet, there are no guarantees animals on sale at such shops are healthy, according to articles in Shelter Sense and other humane group publications.

Over the past few years, horrendous abuses have been discovered in the back rooms of some of the shops, where animals are a commodity to be disposed of inhumanely when they don't sell or become inconvenient.

These same shops foster the existence of puppy mills, where animals are bred over and over again in unhealthy and inhumane conditions.

At the society shelter, each animal is important and given the best chance possible at life.

"(I'm) proud to see the community reap the financial benefits and proud to see our community reap the respect from our peers in the state," Bailey said.

"We're in Santa Fe. They just don't know it yet. It is hard to turn down a community when you relate to people and to faces," Bailey said.

"I'm so excited about the community. We tried to involve all areas," Bailey said.

"One thing I did see was we had some suggestions from local officials who were obviously upset they had not received an invitation to the banquet. We sent invitations to members of the Tourism Associa-

"I'm thinking what we need to do is encourage membership of all local elected figures. So they have the right to be informed on what's happening in TANM," Bailey said.

"It was fantastic, all the restaurants. Everyone was so im-

pressed. It was great. Everyone enjoyed the Red and Gold Banquet too. Cliff Herring of K-Bob's did super work," Bailey said.

"Joan, the chamber members and everyone I have met here have been wonderful. I am impressed with the community and the people who live here," Cerletti said.

The village's top official, Mayor Jerry Shaw, added her own words of praise for the governor's conference, the facilities, the way it was organized and carried out and the banquet.

Shaw said she was really impressed with the way the chamber of commerce staff and the civic events center staff worked to make conference delegates feel welcome

and comfortable. She said the banquet was well planned and organized, with the decorations and entertainment outstanding.


Everyone is welcome to attend the ceremony which is in celebration of Veteran's Day, and also in commemoration with the Armistice which ended World War I.

Oktoberfest was a huge success according to Joan E. Bailey, head of the Ruidoso Chamber of Commerce.

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



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

Warriors lose squeaker

The Ruidoso Warrior football team lost its fourth-straight game and the season finale, 8-6, Friday night as the Cobre Indians played their best game of the year at W.D. Horton Stadium.

Ruidoso finished the season with a 4-7 record while Cobre improved to 3-7. The Warriors finished fifth in district 3-AAA with a 1-5 record while the Indians finished fourth at 2-3.

While the game showed little in the scoring department, it certainly offered the Warrior faithful an exciting contest. Ruidoso moved the ball up and down the field all night long, but when the locals got inside the Cobre 25, key penalties, missed assignments and turnovers took their toll.

Cobre got the opening kickoff and started a drive 60 yards from paydirt. The seven play drive was capped on 31-yard sweep to put the Indians on the scoreboard first. A two-point conversion gave the visitors a surprising 8-0 lead.

The Warriors' first possession saw them move the football into Cobre territory with relative ease. Fullback Rex Comanche continued his power running and tailback Raul Davis attacked the ends on the sweeps.

The coaching staff new the Warriors could get six to eight yards when they needed it by hitting wide receiver Brandon Eamello on quick passes because Cobre gave him a lot of room.

But after a key first down in Cobre territory, Ruidoso was flagged with yet another 15-yard

personal foul penalty and their opening drive stalled after facing first and 25.

This is a scenario it seems that the kids would figure out, especially after last week's fiasco at Socorro. That game also saw the locals pick up several drive-stopping, foolish penalties for fighting, pushing and talking.

But despite the Socorro game the Warriors could not keep their composure in the heat of battle, and saw the same thing happen to themselves again this week.

After their initial drive was stopped, the offensive group was fairly ineffective in the first half against a quick, well prepared and scrappy Cobre defense.

Only the speed, talent and desire of the Warriors best football player got them into the endzone. Mid-way through the second quarter, the Warrior defense stopped Cobre on a key third down. Facing a punting situation from their own territory, the Indians kicked the ball to a waiting Anthony Torres at the Warrior 30.

In a brilliant display of running, Torres found the correct running lane, got key blocks and broke tackles en route to a 70-yard punt return that would erase the goose egg on the Warrior side of the scoreboard.

But at the point, the Warriors lack of composure surfaced again. Unbelievably, Ruidoso was flagged for a personal foul after the touchdown, along with a Cobre player for a little pushing match. Because it was a dead-ball foul, both penalties

were assessed.

The Cobre player started the incident, so they were penalized first — half the distance to the goal.

Since extra-points come from the three yardline, the penalty put the ball at the one-and-a-half yardline. Then the Warriors were penalized 15 yards, leaving the ball just outside the 16 yardline.

A tying two-point conversion from 17 yards out does not lend itself to a high success rate, and the Warriors failed on the attempt, leaving themselves behind Cobre 8-6.

The Indians ran out the first half clock, content to head to the locker room with a two-point lead.


The second half saw the Warriors move the ball with some effectiveness, but two big holding penalties killed drives inside the Cobre 20. The result — no points.

Ruidoso also turned the ball over. Twice Cobre gave the Warriors the ball via the fumble in good field possession, and twice Ruidoso fumbled it back to the Indians.

The Warriors definitely had a chance — had many chances to win. The defense played very, very good football but the offense, like last week, didn't take advantage of the opportunities allowed them.

Head coach Mike Gaston saw the game the same way.

"The whole difference in the ball game was penalties and turnovers. The (personal foul) penalties were inexcusable. We try to teach the kids about class and composure and those are two things we tried to im-

prove on from last week ... and we did a little ... but those two penalties killed us," said Gaston.

Seniors Freddy Sanchez and Ricky Devara chose not to play in the last game leaving the Warrior offensive coaches scrambling to fill those positions. As a result, the offense missed key assignment on key plays and didn't convert as many third down situations as they should.

The defense, on the other hand, out-did themselves.

"Except for the first drive, the defense played very well. We felt that if we would have got the two-point conversion in the first half, that maybe Cobre would have been forced to do some things that they didn't do. We got a couple key interceptions when they threw the ball and if they didn't have that lead, they would have been forced to be a little more aggressive on offense. So

again, that penalty after our touchdown haunted us all night," said Gaston.

The game marked the end of high school football for just a few Warriors. The seniors that played their last game included Anthony Torres, Adam Chavez, David Eisenbrown, Billy Austin, Amador Martinez, Jimmy Varnadore, Matt Escalante and J.R. Chino.

When the Warriors return next summer for two-a-days, they will return numerous players to their starting position.

Offensively, the starting backfield of John Echols, Raul Davis, Rex Comanche and Jackie Roe returns at full strength.

Linemen Sergio Guerro, Zack Turner, Kevin Pellman and Richard Urban will be back with a considerable amount of varsity experience along with mega-talented receivers Byron Soules and

Brandon Eamello.

The defensive line will suffer the most from graduation, losing all of its starters except Jesse Fromknecht. But the Warriors talented linebacking corp of David LaMay, Soules, Erik Kakuska and Robert Guardiola will be back stronger and faster.

The secondary loses the team's leading tackler in Anthony Torres as well as the consistent Jimmy Varnadores.

Kyle Humphreys, Johnny Flores and Jose Prieto will return.

It's easy to see that the Warriors will return a boat-load of very good, young football players next year.

With a freshman team that just lost one game, it looks like playoff time again next year for the Warriors. The season is just over and already we're looking forward to next August.

Reffing: it's a thankless job, but somebody's gotta do it

Part of the fun of attending a basketball game is to yell at the referees.

But, has anyone ever stopped to consider what it takes to become an official?

One of the first things you will be told is that you will never get rich calling games. The incentive should come from interest in the game of basketball and working with young people.

There are four stages in becoming an official. Step one is to sign up and pay your dues. The state will send an apprentice card.

The time period for an apprentice official is no less than one year and maximum of two years.

The state gives new officials open book tests. An apprentice must pass the test with a score of at least 70 percent.

A minimum of 10 local group meetings must be attended during the beginning stage. Usually the group meetings are weekly.

The state gives an evaluation test and the official must score no less than 150 on this test.

During the apprentice stage officials are not eligible to call play-off games.

The next step up is a registered official. Dues must be paid and a score of 75 percent or better must be made on the official test.

On the state evaluation a score must not be less than 160. The evaluation is also open book.

Officials must attend eight local meetings. One state and three district clinics must be attended in a four year time period.

Points are awarded for calling games and for attending meetings and workshops.

A minimum of 35 points must be accrued before the official may move up to the next level.

Junior high games count for one point. Junior varsity games account for two points and varsity games count for five points.

The third stage of being an official is Approved. Once again dues must be paid. A score of 85 percent or better must be made on the written test. Eight local meetings must be attended and three state and/or district clinics.

The point system of Approved is 70 points or better. Usually the official stays at this level for two years.

Once an official has reached the third level they may call play-off games and regional tournaments.

The highest level an official can reach is Certified. A score of 85 percent or better is needed on the open book test. Eight local meetings must be attended during the season along with three state and/or three district meetings.

Officials at this level are eligible to call state and regional tournaments.

There is a sliding pay scale for calling basketball games. The size of the school determines the fee. For junior high 1A and 2A schools the pay is \$7 per game. 3A and 4A

schools the pay is \$12 per game.

High school 1A and 2A games pay \$20 for varsity and \$10 for JV.

High schools which are 3A and 4A pay \$30 for varsity and \$15 for JV.

There are several area officials in Ruidoso. Curt Temple is the organizer for the officials in the area.

"We have nine officials in this area. We are hoping to get more," Temple said.

"One of the bad things about officiating is when there is a game scheduled for Tuesday at 3 p.m., you have to take off early enough to get to the game. That is the tough part," Temple said.

"I enjoy doing this. It's fun to be out there. It's exciting when you are

the floor with the kids," Temple said.

There are two officials at each game.

"The one that tosses the game ball is called the referee. The second official is called the umpire. Each one has separate assignments," Temple said.

"Each official is watching a designated area of the court. On some of the calls you have to make split second decisions. You can't hesitate or you will get criticized," Temple said.

Contracts from the state are given on varsity games only.

Winter time, and trout fishing is easy

Winter trout season is about to start. The first part of November stocking trucks began stocking streams in the southeastern part of the state.

Conditions are right to stock trout November through March. The cold-water fish thrive during this time period.

The rainbow trout used to stock streams and lakes are between eight and 12 inches in length.

Stocking takes place every other week. The stocking schedule depends on the amount of production from the New Mexico Game and Fish hatchery system.

The number of fish stocked in each lake varies with the size of the lake. On the average 140,000 trout are used to stock lakes and streams during this time.

Fish are released for stocking in order to provide more opportunity for anglers in the state to enjoy the sport of fishing.

Trout stamps or validations are required before a fisherman may fish in one of the Rainbow stocked lakes.

Depending on the type of license, the average cost to fish in stocked lakes is an additional \$7 per license.

The cost to the state to raise the fish in the hatcheries is 80 cents per fish. No profit is made on the additional cost of the license.

The additional charge on the license is figured by the Park Service to be a break even cost. The theory used is if an angler goes fishing twice, catching the limit of six fish each time out, the cost of raising the 12 trout at 80 cents per fish is break even.

There are a few rules and regulations which anglers should remember. Fishermen are allowed to use only one pole. The bag limit on winter trout fishing is six trout per day and in possession.

Area waters which are being stocked are Carrizozo Lake, Bear Canyon, the Penasco River, Oasis Park Lake, Green Meadow Lake,

Jal Lake, Eunice Lake, Chaparral Park Lake, Sumner Stilling Basin, Bosque Redondo, Ned Houk Ponds, Green Acres Lake, Tularosa Creek, The Black River, Lake Van, Bottomless Lakes, Roswell Kid's Pond, Carlsbad Municipal Lake and Bataan Lake.

The winter stocking program is designed to help fishermen with more opportunity to fish without having to travel long distances.

Hunters should be prepared to take home a trophy

With the fall seasons approaching, hunters are starting to think about going after that trophy antelope, deer, elk or other big game animal. It is hoped, all will be successful in bagging a monster.


Of course, this will not be the case, but most of those who are lucky or skillful enough to get a trophy animal will want to get it mounted. If this is the case, remember, the animal must be properly taken care of in order to have a good mount.

The best course of action is to check with the taxidermist who is going to do the mount before going on the hunt. They will be able to give exact directions on how the animal and hide should be treated.

However, most of us hunters go out looking for a trophy, but don't expect to get one so we haven't taken the time to check with the taxidermist. Well, what do you do when all of a sudden that monster appears and you manage to get it?

One thing to remember is that any hole, cut or tear in the hide will have to be fixed and may lead to a poor mount. The first thing many hunters do after the animal is down is they cut the main artery in the throat to allow the animal to bleed out. Don't do this if you want a good mount.

Also, when field dressing the animal, don't

make the incision past the lower part of the rib cage. Stop at the sternum, which is the flat bone connecting the ribs together. This may make it a little more difficult to field dress the animal, but will leave plenty of hide for the taxidermist to work with. Then get the animal to the taxidermist as soon as possible.

It is important to remember that heat will ruin the meat and the hide as well. The animal should be cooled down as soon as possible to prevent the meat from spoiling and the hair from slipping out of the hide. If it is going to be a while before it can be taken to the taxidermist or the weather is too warm, the animal should be skinned. The meat and hide should then be cooled.

Skinning an animal for a mount requires a different technique than normal. Start at the end of the field dressing incision at the bottom of the rib cage and cut the hide towards the

backbone. Make sure you stay well behind the front legs and cut completely around the animal. Then make an incision along the backbone up to the base of the skull. Most animals have longer hair or a mane on the top of their neck. Try to stay in the middle of the mane and insert the knife under the hide and cut upward.

The next step is to remove the hide from the front legs. Cut around the leg at the knee and peel the hide downward until the leg can be pulled up through the hide. Do not cut the hide down the leg to the knee. Skin the chest and neck up to the throat. Cut the head off the carcass leaving about three inches of vertebrae and muscle below the skull. Then wipe off any blood and cool the head and hide.

Never cut the horns off the skull, leave that to the taxidermist. Also remember to be very careful not to cut through the hide when skinning.

For those that catch a big fish and wish to have it mounted the best way to care for it is to first of all not clean it. It should be wrapped in a wet terry cloth towel, laid on tin foil and frozen.

Proper care of the animal will leave it easier for the taxidermist and result in a better mount. This will leave you a trophy to remember that special hunting or fishing trip for a long time.

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


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

When we learned (months ago) that our village administrators were trading municipal property with village employees and failing to inventory many items of city property, we went to our state's top law official for help. We talked at length to Attorney General Tom Udall and his staff about suspected abuses involving property acquired with taxpayer money. They listened patiently, suggested that we talk to our District Attorney and politely showed us the door.

How embarrassing! Now we know that the AG and his staff think such questions aren't very important. As a matter of fact, the AG's staff hauled off used furniture recently and they're convinced it's not illegal. They say they were doing the state a favor by taking home desks, chairs and filing cabinets — otherwise the stuff would have had to be hauled off to a landfill. We all know how overcrowded are landfills are.

When caught giving away furniture from a state office that had closed, an AG spokesman said the media was making a mountain out of a molehill. Apparently, we were, too.

If it's not against the law for public employees to take home furniture and equipment purchased with public funds, it should be. If it's junk, then have it declared surplus and offer it at public auction.

And in the end, it's up to us taxpayers to scrutinize candidates and elect honest and ethical people to public office — people who UNDERSTAND what's wrong with public employees being given anything beyond fair pay and benefits for an honest day's work.

Then again, we could use some free filing cabinets for storing copies of our letters to the AG. Those letters really aren't worth much, so we wouldn't want to invest in an expensive filing system.

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Upon Reflection

Never underestimate Governor Bruce King

Once again Bruce King has confounded his doubters.

For the past three years, political wags around the state have wondered whether the governor had decided to sleepwalk his way through his present term.


Well, cynics, take note. With Mr. King's October 20 announcement that he will ask the Legislature for strengthened handgun controls, the governor has signaled that he is neither somnolent nor reluctant to tackle one of the state's most controversial issues.

Because much of King's emphasis has so far focused on the misuse of handguns by juveniles and gangs, speculation abounds that the impetus behind the governor's initiative can be traced to First Lady Alice King.

And that may well be the case. Mrs. King has made juvenile issues very much her domain in recent years and her influence upon her husband is undisputed.

But that matters not a whit. It is the governor who has created a special task force to come up with recommended handgun legislation. It is also the governor who must go to the mat with the powerful state gun lobby which opposes such legislation when the Legislature meets in January.

It is unclear what form the governor's gun control proposals will take. It may be significant, however, that among "possible models for New Mexico to consider," Mr. King has singled out legislation approved this past summer in Colorado. That legislation makes it a crime for minors in that state to possess guns, and was passed after a bruising battle which pitted Colorado Governor Buddy Romer against the National Rifle Association and others hostile to gun controls.



Ironically, just two days following Mr. King's call for something similar in New Mexico, a Denver magistrate judge declared the new Colorado law unconstitutional. That ruling is now on appeal, and officials in New Mexico Attorney General Tom Udall's office say they expect it to be overturned by a higher court.

Which only makes sense. The U.S. Supreme Court has long since made it clear that states have ample authority to regulate the use of handguns within their boundaries.

Nor can there be much doubt that Governor King's case for curbing the possession and use of handguns by New Mexico juveniles grows more compelling every day.

In a recently released study, the Washington-based Center for the Study of Social Policy reports, shockingly, that New Mexico ranks first among all 50 states in the number of violent teen deaths. The only political jurisdiction in the nation with a worst record is the District of Columbia where Mayor Sharon Pratt Kelly has requested authority to call in the National Guard to help stem the bloodshed.

None of which should come as much of a surprise to New Mexicans who have become

numbingly familiar with their nightly TV newscasts' parade of juvenile drive-by shootings, gang warfare and pistol-packing kids prowling the hallways of our schools.

Still, Governor King will have a selling job on his hands when he asks the Legislature to rein in this madness, as a recent conversation with state Senator Janice Paster (D-Bernalillo) makes clear.

Paster chairs the Senate Judiciary Committee to which, almost certainly, any proposed juvenile gun control legislation will be referred for hearings.

While acknowledging that she is "extremely concerned about escalating violence among our children and youth," Paster nevertheless says she doesn't "see juvenile gun legislation as solving that problem."

"By the time kids get to the point of (using) guns," she explains. "They have been around the (juvenile justice) system a long time, and it hasn't helped them."

Along with Alice King, Senator Paster is one of New Mexico's leading advocates of issues involving children and youth; and she is not doubt right when she says "the problems of our young people go much deeper than guns."

Paster is also probably right, however, when she concedes that in prohibiting the possession of handguns by New Mexico juveniles "you might stop some horrible crimes from happening."

And doubtless that is precisely what our newly-energized governor has in mind.

It isn't a cure-all for ending juvenile violence in New Mexico. But, if it stops just one of those "horrible crimes" of which Janice Paster speaks, it will be a step in the right direction.

The Museum of the Horse, a multi-million dollar collection of horse-related artifacts opened its doors to the public on May 24, 1992.



There's a reason that the Greeters has just 22 members, and it isn't because they intend to be some sort of "exclusive" club.


Burkstaller says the membership requirements are quite simple: energy and dedication to Ruidoso. In other words, any woman who joins the Greeters has to be prepared to work hard.
