One man dies in bar shootout

One man was killed and another wounded in a shoot-out outside The Rodeo Bar near Capitan late Sunday.

Lincoln County Sheriff James McSwane said William J. Arnett, 30, turned himself in to State Police in Roswell about 9:30 a.m. Monday and will be brought back to Lincoln County.

Arnett is charged with an open count of murder and with aggravated battery with a deadly weapon, McSwane told **The Ruidoso News**.

The sheriff said the Capitan Police Department and his deputies responded to a call about shots fired outside the bar east of Capitan at 9:16 p.m. Sunday.

They found two gunshot victims. Roland Zamora, 48, of Capitan had been shot in the chest and was dead on arrival at Lincoln County Medical Center.

Carl Glass, 39, also of Capitan, was shot under the arm. He was treated at the hospital and released.

"We haven't talked to him (Arnett) yet, so we still don't know his side of the story," McSwane said. "All we have come from witnesses at the bar."

"I don't know the conversation that took place outside, but they had been in the bar together at one point. I don't think they arrived together and I don't think they were friends. They were just drinking. They didn't know enough about each other to know their addresses."

I can't say for sure at this time what occurred in the bar before they went outside.

The two victims were shot with a .45 revolver, which was not found at the scene, McSwane said. Witnesses reported hearing from two to six shots. No other gun was involved.

About 10 people were in the bar at the time of the incident.

Salomon Trujillo, the owner of The Rodeo Bar on U.S. 380, was not there at the time of the shooting, according to a family member.

Glass told **The News** that he didn't want to make a statement and referred all questions to the sheriff's department.

McSwane said the search for Arnett extended to Roswell, as well as local towns, because Arnett reportedly was from that area, although he was living and working on a ranch north of Capitan.

"We had no knowledge of exactly where the subject was traveling," McSwane said. "We sent out a general (alert) to Roswell, Carrizosa and Ruidoso and surrounding communities. We concentrated on information we received at the hospital."

According to Ruidoso Police Chief Richard Swenor, Thanksgiving weekend was relatively free of crime and serious accidents in the Ruidoso area.

Swenor said even the weather cooperated to keep the streets safe. He said a road block set up over the weekend to check drivers netted only one DWI arrest.

Head Start veteran shares experiences with local educators

With nearly 30 years of experience in Head Start, Winona Sample delivers a reservoir of information and guidance for the programs she visits.

Although in her eighties and walking with a cane, her mind is sharp and quickly detects problems and assets of the programs she examines as an early education and American Indian programs consultant.

"I helped plan the first Head Start in Santa Clara County, California in 1964," Sample told *The Ruidoso News* during a brief interview on her tour of Head Start at Nob Hill.

"There were two years of an eight week summer session of Head Start that went into the schools," she said.

"Talk about panic, the superintendents and principals didn't know what to do with all these little kids in their schools.

"The low point of my life was trying to juggle 1,000 Head Start kids over 10 weeks one summer and 1,000 migrant children for eight weeks. At the same time, I had 10 nurses for each group.

"I used to order by saying about that much" she said, indicating a pile of material shoulder high from the floor.

When Head Start became a full year program, Sample became su-

perintendent and ran all the programs for pre-schoolers in her area.

"It's always been such a successful program and the volunteers have accounted for a great part of that success," she said.

From California, Sample moved to Washington D.C., where she was an education specialist for the 124 Indian tribes with Head Start programs and for migrants.

After that job, she headed back to California, first to become chief of Indian health services and later to join the Department of Education.

"I retired from there seven years ago and have been doing consulting and training," Sample said.

When Head Start began in the 1960s, it took several years to see any measurable results in the children who later attended regular school, Sample said.

"The people weren't trained, although it was one of the best planned programs the federal government has ever had," she said. The states of California and New York were the leaders.

"In 1971, Sample helped write the developmental standards mandated by the federal government.

"It's still the Bible of Head Start today," said Margaret Mascarenaz, who supervises the Head Start program at Nob Hill. "That's what a program is evaluated on by the accreditation team, the 222 standards, some little and some big ones."

"So it took about six years to see results," Sample said. "But then there was a real difference. Up to then, it was all trial and error and doing things their own way.

"Now it's settled down and people know what to expect."

The standards are written care-

School board restructures discipline policy

Revamping of the Ruidoso school district's disciplinary policy is under way, following a directive from members of the school board.

Superintendent Mike Gladden said he provided copies of high school and middle school policies and procedures, and information on

sexual harassment policies to committee members in mid-November.

He met with secondary teacher discipline committee members November 17, with secondary student discipline committee members November 19 and with secondary parent discipline committee mem-

bers November 22.

Next Tuesday, student, teacher and parent representatives will meet at 6:30 p.m. in the central office to summarize their thoughts and to draft tentative directions with secondary principals.

For the next week, the policies

and procedures will be reviewed with principals, the coordinating council and school board members.

The final draft will be presented to the board by committee representatives at the 7 p.m. regular board meeting December 14 in the central office.

Drug Free program issues warning on Fetal Alcohol Syndrome

While the efforts of the local Drug Free Schools are aimed at preventing the devastating effects on babies of alcohol consumed by pregnant women, part of the thrust is to provide services for the babies born with defects.

The Drug Free Schools' coordinator, Katy Echols developed a program to present to schools about Fetal Alcohol Syndrome (FAS).

Echols made more than 75 presentations throughout the seven school districts in Region IX Cooperative Centers and staff in the southeastern New Mexico area, she told *The Ruidoso News*.

A statewide grant from the Centers for Disease Control in Atlanta supplied funds for prevention strategies and surveillance of FAS in New Mexico, she said.

The prevention committee meets once a month in Albuquerque and Echols serves on that board.

"We have been working on a prevention strategy for the state for more than one year and we now are working on implementing that plan," she said.

Children born with FAS may suffer from as many as 38 defects such as a smaller than normal head, constrained brain development, small eye opening, slow motor development and lower than normal intelligence.

As few as two drinks a week by a pregnant woman may produce some negative effects in her baby.

After a child is diagnosed, they are referred to service agencies.

Region IX serves children from birth to five years. The early childhood coordinator is Lakis Castañon and Donna Parker acts as early childhood service coordinator.

"Children diagnosed from birth to two years as FAS are offered early intervention services," Echols said. "Language/cognitive, adaptive behavior and motor skills are evaluated.

"Physical therapists, early interventionists, speech therapists, audiologists or other specialists then are contacted to work with the children and their families."

For children three to four years old, developmentally disabled pre-school services are offered. Pre-school teacher Cathy Overdorf may be reached at 257-2346.

The functioning level of the child determines which services are needed. Service providers include the staff of the pre-school and therapists.

Children's Medical Services serve children from birth to 21 years of age. For more information, contact Barbara Bellas in

Alamogordo at 437-9899.

"This agency is contacted by hospitals and doctors about possible FAS children," Echols said. "An appointment set up with a genetic clinic in Albuquerque or the Indian Child Program. In turn, they alert the program closest to the affected families and provide medical reports to those service providers.

Echols said a billboard on U.S. Highway 70 that warns of the effects of alcohol on the unborn, was purchased from the Association for Retarded Citizens. The space fee was donated by Neuman Outdoor Advertising Agency of Roswell. The posting fee was paid from proceeds of the Rotary Red Ribbon Raffle Fund.

Wrinkles wrap up lots of love in homeless pets

Wrinkles can be a plus. The folds of skin that ripple along Heber's body, tail and face are considered marks of beauty.

But her owners weren't interested in reclaiming Heber and her two pups when they were picked running loose in Brady Canyon.

The three were impounded, but when the owners called they said there had been another pup when they left town. No one knew what had happened to the third pup until two weeks later when someone brought in a look-alike from a site

across town.

"Now all three are back with their mother," said shelter secretary Kathy Tetreault. The pups are being treated for cherry eye, an inflammatory infection that seems to be responding to the medication.

Heber is a deep reddish brown brindle. Her pups are black and they are ready for adoption.

"They're supposed to be purebred," Tetreault said. "The owners said they paid several hundred dollars for the mother."

Magnum

Quite a contrast to Heber, Mag-

num's coat of white and buff is thick and medium length.

"When we first saw him, we figured he was chov, but he doesn't have a blue tongue and the color isn't right, so we think he may be a Samoyed mix," Tetreault said.

"He was brought in as a stray in early October from the Waco Drive area. At first he was restless and frightened, but now he seems docile and well behaved. A shelter is such an artificial environment, it's hard to see the real personality.

"However, because of his power, we'd recommend Magnum as a companion for an adult."

Both Heber and Magnum would need to be altered to prevent any future litters and in compliance with state law. The society is dedicated to reducing pet overpopulation through restriction of births instead of having to destroy unwanted offspring and abandoned adults.

Information please

Tetreault asks pet owners who no longer want or are unable to keep their animals, not to leave them outside the shelter after closing hours with no information.

"Don't be worried that we'll fine you or say something," Tetreault said. "There is no charge for bringing in an animal. We may ask for a donation, but that's entirely voluntary."

"It's so important that we know something about the animal to ensure they are matched well with the next owner and don't end up

being returned. It also can be dangerous for the animal to be left tied to a post or for litters that are put into boxes. Some have made their way down to busy Gavilan Canyon Road and been killed."

You can help

The society is looking for volunteers to help in many different ways.

The news that Jerry Oswalt, long time manager of the thrift shop, will be leaving, saddened members. The thrift shop next to Arby's on Sudderth Drive has been one of the shelter's major sources of support for the abandoned animals and Oswalt has created a following of donors and shoppers with her attractive displays and congenial personality.

Although a new volunteer has stepped forward, Rita Webb, she will need help. Donating just a few hours a week to help at the thrift shop can mean a great deal for the shelter animals, especially if the volunteer has some retail background.

If you enjoy a more hands-on participation, the dogs enjoy walking even after a snow. And the cattery has toys and platforms where visitors can play with the felines.

Help always is appreciated for cleaning in the cattery or main shelter. Again, just a few hours a week makes a difference.

And foster homes still are needed for new litters that are brought to the shelter. Too many puppies and kittens are lost to dis-

eases because of exposure to viruses. The society has ordered a new vaccine, which members hope will improve the survival chances of the young pups and kittens, but shots take about two weeks to become effective. During that period, they need a disease-free environment, but one that is warm for the winter. A playpen does well for pups.



Story Book Cabins is new chapter in couple's dream

New owners come in for happy landing

For Kaye Kernodle, Story Book Cabins was a case of love at first sight.

After a long career as a registered nurse, she was ready for a new challenge, and her husband, Bruce, who had worked as an electronics engineer for 25 years, was ready to help, to repay her for serving as deck hand and gallery slave for two years aboard his favorite toy, their sailboat Antigua.

The Kernodles are the new owners of Story Book Cabins in the

Upper Canyon. They couldn't be happier to be living their dream in Ruidoso.

Three years ago, the Kernodles had set out to fulfill a lifelong dream. They moved out of their hillside San Diego, California, home and aboard their 38-foot sailboat in preparation for "sailing off over the horizon" on an extended cruise.

A year later, the dream came true as they set sail out of San Diego Bay, down the Pacific coast of

Baja California, around Cabo San Lucas, and up into the Seal of Cortez.

"It took us a month to sail to Cabo San Lucas," said Bruce Kernodle. "We hadn't really expected to stay in Mexico very long. We were headed to Costa Rica.

"But Mexico turned out to be such a wonderful country with such warm and happy people that we never got any further.

"For two years, we never had to lock our boat, we had an endless supply of seafood from the warm water, we learned to be fair sailors, and worked on our Spanish.

"We visited remote fishing villages, centuries-old colonial towns, and the European flavor of Guadalajara with its cathedrals, museums, and the Ballet Folklórico.

"And everywhere were the wonderful people. One could spend 10 years touring Mexico and not see it all."

But the Kernodles had children and grandchildren living in New Mexico, and so they were making regular trips to visit them. A favorite was to "kidnap" the grandchildren and rent a cabin in Ruidoso for a quiet stay.

"Both summer and winter, Ruidoso was a nice change from our life in the sun aboard Antigua," said Kernodle.

"I think once you have visited Ruidoso, it's like a rubber band that draws you back. So last Christmas, we bought our own little cabin in the Upper Canyon."

And then Kaye Kernodle saw Story Book Cabins for sale, and that was it. Now these sailors are innkeepers.

"We don't actually know what we are doing, but we are fortunate to have an experienced staff, and we are ready to work hard," explained the couple.

"Story Book Cabins has had a successful history, and we want to build on that."

That history parallels the history of the Village of Ruidoso, for Story Book Cabins is among the oldest resorts in the Upper Canyon area of Ruidoso.

During the twenties and thirties, cabins began to appear along the Ruidoso River in the canyon. Families made a tradition of escaping the heat of West Texas and staying the summer in these rustic homes away from home.

In a less sophisticated time, the river and woods made summer a wonderful time for several generations of Ruidoso visitors.

Cabin resorts grew up along the river over the years, and attracted guests from the surrounding area — many of them returned year after year.

Story Book Cabins has been a part of this area, now known as the Upper Canyon, for many years.

Story Book Cabins began operations with six units known as Dunn's Cabins in the early 1950s. A change of ownership in the mid '50s produced a change in name to Story Book Cabins.

The cabins were in the family of Joan Bailey from 1975 until she sold to the Kernodles just this month.

During the past several years, the resort has seen major renovation, with the remodeling of the existing cabins and the construction of new units and an office/residence

is maintained in a natural-wood finish.

The grounds are wooded and landscaped, with blooming flowers during the spring and summer seasons.

The location of Story Book Cabins provides easy access to the varied activities that Ruidoso has to offer — shopping areas, art galleries, golf courses, racetrack and Ski Apache.


"But Story Book Cabins, is, above all else, a retreat," stressed Kernodle. It is located in the quiet Upper Canyon away from all of the activity of town.



The Dreamer Thankful month departs amid weather changes


Thanksgiving surprise

LCMC's parent, Presbyterian Healthcare, reorganizes

Presbyterian Healthcare Services' (PHS) board of directors approved a plan that will continue Presbyterian's transition to become an integrated, accountable health plan.

PHS is the non-profit healthcare system in Albuquerque which owns Presbyterian Hospital and owns, leases or manages 13 other hospitals throughout New Mexico and southern Colorado, including Lincoln County Medical Center in Ruidoso.

According to a news release, all actions approved by the PHS board have been developed over the past several months.

Presbyterian Northside Hospital in Albuquerque's northeast heights

will close its emergency room and cease inpatient admissions on December 31. The campus will retain many outpatient services.

PHS is intensely evaluating service and facility consolidation in Albuquerque in order to prepare the organization to respond to reductions in federal and state government reimbursement for services, continued evolution of managed care and the transition to become an accountable health plan.

The changes affecting the Presbyterian system in Albuquerque are affecting hospital throughout the nation.

These include no increase in Medicare and Medicaid reimbursement this year, a decline in in-

patient utilization and the uncertainty of impending state and national healthcare reform, continues the release provided by PHS. The high penetration of HMOs (health maintenance organizations) in the Albuquerque market has led to lower healthcare costs than available in many other parts of the country.

Mike Funk, vice president of regional operations for PHS, explained that many rural hospitals have been dealing with the same factors over the past few years.

"The local governing board of Lincoln County Medical Center and each of Presbyterian's other regional hospitals will evaluate opportunities to restructure services

to the community in such a way to deliver maximum value within resources available," said Funk.

"Specific decisions and timelines about restructuring of hospitals and healthcare services in our rural communities will be up to those local boards with technical assistance provided from Presbyterian," Funk said.

Although PHS plans to reduce its Albuquerque expense budget by nearly \$14 million to include reductions in overhead costs and in the Albuquerque work force, Funk has stated that Presbyterian has no current plans to alter or end its relationship with any of its affiliated rural communities.

In fact, the board's recently revised Vision, Values and

Strategies, which guides responses to changes in healthcare delivery trends, makes a clear statement that PHS continues to support rural healthcare.

The Albuquerque workforce reduction of nearly 325 positions is being accomplished primarily through offering early retirement options and voluntary separation packages.

"We are repositioning ourselves so we remain a strong and viable organization," said PHS board chairman Larry Stroup.

"Every day you read about companies reorganizing to adjust to market conditions, and that is what we're doing. Healthcare is not immune to change."



Council considers capital improvements

Capital improvements worthy of funding by the State Legislature will be considered by the Ruidoso Village Council Tuesday.

The Department of Finance and Administration for the state requires municipalities each year to submit a Capital Improvement Program (CIP) for funding consideration.

The village councilors at a previous work shop on October 19, set the top four priorities for Ruidoso this year as:

1. Water treatment plant at Grindstone.

2. Americans with Disabilities Act compliance for municipal buildings.

3. 911 street signage program. 4. Parks/recreation/senior citizens. For years, previous councils have set high budgets for parks and recreation, only to wind up spending very little by the year's end.

At the current council, acknowledging the lack of money spent in the past in this tourist area, has indicated a willingness to concentrate more on parks and other tourist-related activities.

Deputy manager Alan Briley told the council that the remaining priorities will stay in the same order as they appeared in last year's CIP.

- They are:
- wastewater collection
 - regional wastewater treatment plant
 - streets
 - convention center
 - airport
 - planning
 - Main Street
 - city hall
 - fire department
 - library
 - vehicle maintenance

The council officially will appoint Gary M. Jackson as village manager and approve his contract.

Jackson's starting salary will equal that of former village manager, who resigned for a similar position in Seabrook, Texas.

The council will vote on two resolutions regarding elections and the expenditures for the lodgers tax.

The Lodgers Tax Advisory Board (LTAB), monitored by village clerk Tammie Maddox, has asked for radical changes in spending lodgers tax money.

The board has asked to increase money requests from organizations or events from \$1,500 to \$5,000 per year.

They want a three-year limit on allocations to any one event or group to be eliminated to allow for unlimited applications for money.

These changes would appear to assist heavy hitters of the program like the not-for-profit Museum of the Horse and Cowboy Symposium and the for profit Golden Aspen Motorcycle Rally.

Maddox said she didn't believe the village could differentiate between profit and non-profit status.

She said there was nothing in the state statutes regarding profit versus non profit.

Maddox agreed that the council could prioritize non-profit from profit.

With the completion of the Civic Events Center, it is expected that several relatively new organizations will be asking for money. About \$30,000 was awarded last year for new events. The award money was split, \$15,000 for summer and \$15,000 for winter.

The board has a history of awarding the maximum to whomever requests funds. If three events are given \$15,000 for the summer, that would eliminate any new event receiving lodgers money

to help advertise their event.

The funds are called lodgers tax because owners of lodging businesses are designated as collectors of the tax by the state. The money is collected to assist the entire village in promoting tourism to the area.

In its early stages, the lodgers tax was used as seed money for new events that would bring people into the area. After an event with merit proved successful, the idea was that it eventually could operate without seed money. The seed money for that event would then be awarded to a new event.

That philosophy has changed in recent years, and the money has been spent in a variety of new areas, allowing the process to become highly political.

LTAB also approved motions to:

-limit funds of up to \$5,000 per organization per fiscal year.
-change an item to read that applications for reoccurring events requesting over \$1,500 in matching funds must be submitted no later than June 1 and recommended by June 30.

Other applications must be submitted no less than 60 days prior to the event.

-change an item to read that submission for payment will not be accepted until after the event.

Submission for payment must be accompanied by a profit and loss statement from the event and made within 60 days after the event and all invoices and billings must be submitted at one time.

Tear sheets, posters, or samples of the advertisement must be submitted with the payment application.

-allow posters to be a part of speciality advertising.

The second resolution will set March 1, 1994, as the regular

municipal election.

The council also will hear a request by Franklin Aviation for a 30-day extension on the current Sierra Blanca Airport hangar lease, or a portion of the hangar for 30 days.

Jim Franklin said the request is to reassemble and complete the modifications to the Polish jet trainer so that this aircraft can be removed from the facility.

Airport manager Lloyd Wayne recommended the remaining hangar space be rented monthly for aircraft storage, starting at \$150 to \$250 depending on the size of aircraft and any other space be used for over night rentals.

Wayne noted that overnight rates for the hangar start at \$40.

Under Franklin's current agreement, the village is to split over night aircraft rentals. But under Wayne as overseer of the hangar, the village has collected no money for rent since April of 1992.

Other council agenda items include:

-Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County update.

-a Main Street update by deputy manager Briley.

-airport projects update by Briley.

Consent agenda items, which are approved collectively include:

-a grant agreement with the state for improvements at the Senior Citizens building.

-a bid award for a portable indoor/outdoor dance floor.

-cancellation of the December 28 regular meeting.

-scheduling of a public hearing for an ordinance amending the Uniform Traffic Ordinance.

The council has scheduled a closed session at the end of the regular meeting Tuesday.

Any action taken as a result of the closed session will be brought back into open session.

New Mexicans more likely to die from injuries

Although New Mexico is one of the states with the highest rates of injuries in the nation, Lincoln County generally falls in the lower end of the injury range.

Information about the state and its counties was contained in a report compiled from 1991 by the New Mexico Department of Health's Injury Prevention and Control Section.

Identified as the three leading causes of deaths in New Mexico were diseases of the heart, malignant neoplasms and unintentional injuries.

Injuries are the leading cause of death and disability for all New Mexicans under the age of 44.

The purpose of the report was to document the magnitude of New Mexico's injury problem, but it identified serious lapses and fragmentation of injury death and disability data.

The lack of data on non-fatal injuries prevented New Mexico from receiving a multi-million dollar federal grant, according to Carolyn Hutchinson, spokesman for the department.

"Injury fatalities are well documented in New Mexico," she said. "However, fatalities are just the tip of the iceberg."

"It is estimated that there are 16

injury-caused hospitalizations for every injury-related death, resulting in a cost to society of more than \$100-billion annually. The number of non-fatal injuries and resulting permanent disabilities is not well-documented in the state. Until data on nonfatal injuries is available, the full extent of New Mexico's injury problem remains unknown."

According to charts contained in the report, New Mexico, Alaska and Georgia are the only three states in the nation that fall into the high category of 76 to 97 injury deaths per 100,000 population.

The states with the lowest incidence, 35 to 45.9 per 100,000, were clustered in the northeast, around the Great Lakes region and North Dakota.

In New Mexico, Lincoln County fared poorly in deaths from motor vehicle crashes, falling into the second highest category of 40-59 deaths per 100,000 population, along with the counties of San Juan, Rio Arriba, McKinley, Sandoval, Quay, Torrance, Socorro and Luna.

Those counties registered more deaths by vehicle accidents per 100,000 than the high traffic counties of Bernalillo and Santa Fe, which fell in the 20-39 per 100,000 range. The three worst counties, with 60-199 per 100,000, were Cibola, Catron and Sierra.

But two years ago, Lincoln County reported no homicides, as did the eight other counties of Union, Harding, Mora, Torrance, DeBaca, Eddy, Hidalgo and Catron.

Santa Fe and Bernalillo were included in the 1-19 homicides per 100,000. The counties with the highest rate of more than 29 were Rio Arriba and Sierra.

In suicides, Lincoln fell into the same category as Santa Fe, Bernalillo and 10 other counties with 1-19 deaths per 100,000. The two counties with the highest rate of more than 39 were Sierra and Catron.


Lincoln shifted into the higher classification of 40-79 deaths per 100,000 under the "other injury" comparison. That was higher than Santa Fe and Bernalillo, which were in the 20-39 range, but in the same grouping as the counties of McKinley, Colfax, Mora, San Miguel, Torrance, Quay and Sierra.

The only data available in non-fatal injuries concerned motor vehicle accidents.

In that comparison, Lincoln County fell into the highest grouping with 1,231 to 2,222 injuries per 100,000 population, along with Hidalgo, Torrance, Guadalupe and Union.

The counties of Santa Fe and Bernalillo were significantly lower in the 531-870 per 100,000 range.



Look for experienced candidates who care about the community

'Who will run for village offices next March?' is the question being bandied about in coffee rooms all over the village these days. It's good that voters and prospective candidates are putting some thought into a serious question.

In Ruidoso, the mayor, municipal judge and four council slots will be on the ballot next March, but candidates will sign up in early January. The council positions that will be up for grabs are currently filled by Barbara Duff, Bill Karn, Joe Gomez and Frank Potter. Three of the terms will be for four years and one for two years.

Village, as well as county, residents have learned from experience that electing (or appointing) an inexperienced newcomer to a position of leadership is very dangerous. It's been shown that the most effective elected officials are the ones who already demonstrated their civic and community spirit by fulfilling appointed and/or volunteer positions.

So, when looking for candidates for mayor, council and municipal judge, we'd suggest looking first to people who already have served: were they honest and reliable? did they do a good job?

Next, we'll be turning our attention to people who have served on P&Z, the Lodgers Tax Advisory Board, the school board, county commission and other groups that deliberate and make decisions: were they dependable and fair? did they understand the scope of their responsibilities?

The candidates we won't be supporting, and the ones we hope won't even toss their hats in the ring, are the "one-issue" or "vendetta" candidates who tear down rather than build up and seek public office to fulfill some personal agenda.

Let's find people to lead our town who put the interests of the community first.

Upon Reflection

Don't count on relief from 6-cent gas tax

Along with the weather, the prospects of a rollback of that six-cent-a-gallon gasoline tax passed at the last Legislature have chilled in recent weeks. At least that would seem to be the case if the sentiments of key legislators responsible for developing state tax policy are any barometer.


Just three months ago the drumbeat for repeal was loud enough to disturb the political peace in every corner of the state. Some top state Republicans, sensing an opportunity to capitalize anew on their familiar anti-tax dogma, even demanded that the governor call a special session of the Legislature for that purpose.

Governor Bruce King prudently rejected that idea. Nevertheless, always sensitive to the roiling winds of tax politics, King promised relief when the Legislature meets in January. After all, he pointed out, the gas levy was approved by lawmakers to cover a budget shortfall which never materialized and something should be done to rectify the situation.

More than likely something will be done. But, according to state Representative Jerry Sandel (D-San Juan) relief may not mean axing the gas tax.

Sandel is chairman of the Legislature's awkwardly-named Interim Joint Revenue Stabilization and Tax Policy Committee which is studying ways to reduce state taxes by as much as \$60 million next year. That's roughly what the six-cent gas tax brings in, he notes.

The problem with "just cutting the (gas) tax," Sandel contends, "is there's no way to make certain it will ever get back to the taxpayers ... Even petroleum markets have told



the committee that they won't guarantee that the price (of gas) at the pump will go down if we eliminate the tax."

That news, alone, ought to be unsettling to a lot of New Mexicans. Petroleum marketers were quick enough to pass the six-cent tax increase last to consumers when it went into effect last summer. Yet, when the question is put to them today, they apparently won't promise to let us return the favor by passing it back to them if the tax is cut.

Even Solomon would have difficulty detecting the elements of justice in that equation.

Thus, Sandel says his committee is currently trying to find other ways "to make it right with the taxpayers ... We're looking at all kinds of proposals ... reductions in personal income taxes, food and medical taxes, perhaps prescription drugs, or maybe a one-time across-the-board (tax) rebate."

Nor is it only Democrats like Jerry Sandel who are beginning to question the wisdom of abolishing the six-cent gas tax hike. In what could be welcome evidence of a bipartisan search for alternative approaches, the Tax Policy Committee's ranking Republican, state Representative Ryan of Silver City, also ad-

mits to reservations. "I doubt very seriously that the (gas tax) cut would have the predicted outcome because I don't think the money will be returned to where we want it — the taxpaying consumers."

Ryan says he personally favors a one-time personal income tax rebate.

"To do much more at this time might not be wise in view of the uncertainty of the economy," he insists.

Given the responsibilities vested by the Legislature in its Revenue Stabilization and Tax Policy Committee, the sentiments of ranking committee members like Sandel and Ryan should carry more than a little weight when lawmakers meet in January.

Which is not to say there won't be efforts by individual legislators to cut the unpopular gas tax. There almost certainly will be. The opportunities for political grandstanding on an issue as tempting as this are simply too attractive to be ignored by your run-of-the-mill legislative politico.

Nevertheless, when a pair of lawmakers as savvy on the issue of tax policy as Democrat Jerry Sandel and Republican Murray Ryan say cutting the gas tax will almost certainly not add up to relief for the taxpayer, it behooves the rest of us to pay some heed.

State gas taxes should be designed to pay the costs of public services, not windfall profits for petroleum marketers.
