### Accused murderer remains in LC jail

William L. Arnett, 30, will sit in Lincoln County jail while he waits for his preliminary hearing December 6 in Carrizozo.

She invited anyone who would like to work with skiers and ski students who are developmentally disabled or blind to call her at 336-4416 or 354-3191.


### Join the Hanging of the Greens Sunday

## Council looks for some pork

State Representative H. John Underwood (D-Ruidoso) put his political clout on the line Tuesday when he told the Ruidoso Village Council their Capital Improvement Program (CIP) packet was the best he had ever seen.

Last year the village was shut out of legislative money when former village manager Ron Wicker failed to submit a packet outlining any specifics of what the village needed.

Democrat Underwood praised deputy manager Alan Briley's carefully prepared packet and said this year it will be a pleasure to carry the village hopes to the Legislature.

The four top priorities the village council selected were: Water

Distribution; ADA Compliance; E-911/Street Sign Program; and Parks and Recreation.

Water Distribution (Grindstone), according to Briley, carries a lofty request of \$1.2 million. But considering Ruidoso residents have spent \$10,626,248 without legislative dollars, some help should be expected.

The Water Distribution System was started in 1948. Today it consists of 33 pressure zones, 12 wells, 17 steel reservoirs, two miles and approximately 340 miles of water lines.

With growth came problems of too small transmission lines, 25 miles of galvanized lines over 25 years old, and not enough water treatment capacity.

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## Two teens accused of driveby shooting here

Two Ruidoso High School teenagers were arrested Tuesday after two middle school children implicated them in a drive by shooting.

Robert Surguy, 16, and David William Pfeffer Jr., 15, were arrested in connection with the shooting near Country Club Drive and North Street.

According to Ruidoso detective Wolfgang Born, about 3:50 p.m., the school bus stopped to drop off the two victims.

Two cars were following the bus. The second car was driven by Surguy with Pfeffer in the passenger seat, Born said.

He said the victims, two boys ages 11 and 12, apparently left the school bus and crossed the street when one of the boys saw a gun.

According to testimony of the

victims, Pfeffer was sitting in the open window of the door, with a rifle leaning over the roof pointing at the victims from inside the car.

One of the victims yelled to the other to run, and when they ran, both boys heard a rifle fire, Born said.

Born said that Pfeffer admitted pointing the gun, but not firing at the two youths. He did admit firing at a sign by North Street and Eagle Drive.

Born said Wednesday morning, bus driver Leila Ordonez said she wanted to press charges on the incident, claiming that the gun also had been pointed at her.

Born said the odor of alcohol was present on both Pfeffer and Surguy. When they stopped the two youths on Sudderth Drive, a bottle of Canadian whiskey was found in the back seat of the 1988 Plymouth Colt station wagon, along with nine other guns. All the firearms were

either rifles or shotguns.

Officers also found a .22-caliber spent shell on the passenger side floor board. A small wooden box with two boxes of 4/10 shot gun shells and two boxes of .22-caliber bullets were found in the back seat of the station wagon.

According to Born, Surguy and Pfeffer said they were going to pick up a couple of more guys and go hunting.

Born said shooting from a vehicle with reckless disregard that does not result in bodily harm is a fourth degree felony.

Pfeffer and Surguy were both charged with allowing self to be served (alcohol); aggravated assault with a firearm, three counts; and with shooting from a vehicle.

Surguy is the son of Robin Surguy and Pfeffer is the son of Dave Pfeffer, both of Ruidoso. The guns were owned by both families.

## Family celebrates child's recovery from deadly disease

It was a mother's nightmare. Delfina Johnson's three-year-old son was lying in a hospital bed with an oxygen tube in his nose, another tube in his mouth, a dialysis line in his side, intravenous feeders attached to his leg and other monitoring devices clustered on his chest.

"The first time I walked in and saw him, it knocked me over," Mrs. Johnson said. "The doctors tried to comfort me. They said they would do the best they can."

The "best," the parents later were told, was a 60 percent chance of survival.

### First symptoms

Physicians at New Mexico University Hospital had run dozens of tests and came back with a diagnosis of E. coli bacteria, most commonly found in undercooked meat. The bacteria can cause hemolytic uremic syndrome (HUS), a disease that can lead to kidney failure and death.

"First he was sick with the

stomach flu for three days before he got worse and couldn't hold anything down." R.J.'s father Ricky Johnson Sr. told **The Ruidoso News**. "Then he started passing blood and we took him to (Dr. Arlene Brown) and she admitted him into the hospital."

"The next day, Dr. Brown said we needed to take him to Albuquerque. We saw a bunch of different doctors when we got to University (of New Mexico) Hospital."

"They told us he had it, HUS. We weren't even aware of it."

At first R.J. didn't respond well. "They told us it was good that we had brought him there, but it had to run its course," Johnson said.

About 24 hours after the doctors started R.J. on dialysis to remove toxins from his blood, he looked a bit better. In three days, he was doing well, Johnson said. But it was three weeks before he recovered.

"We tried to figure out where he got it, but nobody else got sick and

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# New rules open Camp Sierra Blanca to inmates convicted of murder and other violent crimes

Minimum custody inmates serving sentences for violent crimes, including murder, are now being placed at Camp Sierra Blanca for rehabilitation.

While many defend the goal of reintegrating inmates into society, two relatively recent sexual assault charges against inmates on work release programs have prompted state officials to take another look.

Prior to October, Camp Sierra Blanca had been reserved primarily for older inmates who were not serving a sentence for first or second degree murder.

But state corrections officials said they wanted greater flexibility in the placement of minimum custody inmates and so they outlined new steps that included:

—age will no longer be a factor in considering the assignment of minimum custody inmates to Camp Sierra Blanca.

—beginning October 1, minimum custody inmates serving sentences for violent crimes, including murder, will be eligible for placement at Camp Sierra Blanca.

Recently, The Ruidoso News

wrote about a Sierra Blanca Motor company's wrecker dispatched by the state police office in Alamogordo to an accident on Angus Hill, September 27.

The wrecker was driven by a Sierra Blanca Camp inmate who had another inmate accompany him.

According to Carlos Jaramillo, state director of transportation, an inmate driving a wrecker is not covered in the requirements of the Motor Carrier Act and is therefore legal.

"If he's a convicted felon or whatever, that does not apply to the Motor Carrier Act," Jaramillo said. "But he has to meet the requirements of the act."

For a licensed wrecker in New Mexico, that means the driver has to have a driver's license.

Terence Martinez, investigator for the State Transportation Division, said he has concluded his investigation of the Angus Hill case, but that the division's attorney must review his findings before any information can be released.

The Ruidoso News wrote in its story regarding inmates driving wreckers that "in an isolated area during the cold winter months, if a

wrecker is dispatched through the police department, does that stranded motorist not have the right to feel secure when the wrecker arrives?"

The News received several letters answering that question.

One local resident wrote that Camp Sierra Blanca is a minimum security facility.

"That means these prisoners have already demonstrated a deep desire to be reintegrated back into society as soon as possible. That fact alone should ease any motorist's minds," he wrote.

A Camp Sierra Blanca inmate wrote, "If I was wrecked or broken down, I would be happy that help had arrived and not be concerned with what color a person is, what their religion is, where they came from, what sex they were, if their politics were different or if at that time they were still in debt and working to pay it off. I would be thankful that someone cared enough to help."

A former employee of the camp wrote, "the work release program is a benefit to the state, corrections, the inmates and the community, if it is properly coordinated and supervised. Let's not punish the in-

mate, but let's do look at the people administering the program."

The administration of the program is exactly what several state officials are examining now.

Last summer the warden at Camp Sierra Blanca resigned and his deputy warden was reprimanded for actions concerning work programs.

According to police reports, failing to properly administer the program may have led to two sexual assault charges against inmates from another state prison who were on work release programs at state parks.

On March 31, Donald K. Hoover, Classification Bureau Chief for the State Corrections Department, wrote wardens that "because of our obligation to the public, and in light of a recent incident at the Rio Grande Nature Center, we are requiring a more stringent screening process."

Police reports concerning the Rio Grande incident stated that a woman who had spent the afternoon visiting the center was settling her children into her parked car when a man entered the car and sexually assaulted her.

That man turned out to be an inmate on a work release program working at the center. The inmate admitted the crime.

That assault prompted Hoover to effect changes regarding inmates working in state parks. He wrote that:

—minimum restrict custody inmates who have been convicted of a crime involving assaultive sexual conduct shall no longer be approved.

—minimum restrict inmates with prior convictions for violence or who are currently serving a sentence involving violence will be carefully screened. Special attention needs to be given to inmates who have established a pattern of violence and who currently exhibit impulsivity.

—minimum restrict inmates with a history of escape within the last 10 years shall no longer be approved.

Most of the general public might have thought those rules would already have been in place. Minimum restrict inmates are a step above minimum custody inmates. Now those rules are in effect for state parks.

Another more recent police

report was filed by a woman who said she was raped at The Living Desert by an inmate from the Roswell correctional facility.

According to that police report, the inmates assigned to work in the park were split into two groups, with the corrections supervisor at the animal pen. The alleged rape occurred at another area in a fertilizer shack.

In both reports, the women described the terror they felt at being abused.

It would appear that a law against inmates driving wreckers would reduce the probability of that type of terror for any stranded motorist.

Lou Armijo, spokesman for the State Correctional Department, said there is no written policy by the Corrections Department that prevents inmates, even murderers, from driving wreckers.

In Lincoln County's case, only four wreckers are listed on call with the Ruidoso Police Department and three of those wreckers are listed with the State Police in Alamogordo. If a stranded motorist calls one of those places for help in a snowstorm, they could be sent a wrecker driven by a murderer.

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it seems at least one other person would have gotten ill," Johnson said. "You can get it from a water supply, unpasteurized milk products, undercooked beef and vegetables that are fertilized with cow manure and not washed thoroughly."

### Public unaware

"Since we first heard about HUS, we've found out that a lot of people don't know anything about E. coli bacteria, but there are a lot of cases around," Johnson said.

While he and his wife were sitting by R.J.'s bedside and praying for his recovery, a series of E. coli cases were reported in Texas and two young boys died.

"My brother kept track and out of 12 cases, four died. Older people and young children are the most at risk," Johnson said.

"I'm concerned now with the passage of NAFTA (North American Free Trade Agreement) that large amounts of unclean lettuce will be shipped from Mexico into the United States and we'll see the number of cases go up. Right now, there are more cases in most other countries."

"We wanted to let people know, because so many don't know about it," Mrs. Johnson said. "We had never heard of it until it happened to R.J."

"We were told they have studied it for 10 years, but there still is no cure."

Dr. Brown told The News that although she ran tests for E. coli, she couldn't render a positive diagnosis. When she sent the Johnsons

to Albuquerque, she also thought the child might be suffering from leukemoid, which produces similar symptoms to leukemia and could cause the kidneys to shut down.

"His kidneys shut down for a week and they were really worried," Mrs. Johnson said. "There was another two-year-old girl there with the same thing. She still was on dialysis when we left (and remained so at press time). We were real lucky."

"The oxygen was needed to keep him breathing, because the toxin level was so high, his brain wasn't telling his lungs to breathe," Johnson said.

Dr. Jim Cappon, with the pediatric critical care division of the hospital, worked on R.J.'s case from the moment he arrived in intensive care.

While E. coli was identified as the cause of his illness, the staff never was able to pinpoint the source of R.J.'s particular case.

"Certainly, we never knew the cause of R.J.'s case. It just wasn't clear to us after talking to the parents why this would occur in Ruidoso," Cappon said during a telephone interview.

He explained that E. coli is a very common bacteria found in the gastro-intestinal tract.

"We confirmed that it was the E. coli and the subtype O157:H7, which is a particularly aggressive form that can cause very bad diarrhea, bloody, and then tends to go on where the victims develop HUS," Cappon said.

"When all the cases of E. coli were reported in the Pacific Northwest last year, HUS was the problem."

The Johnsons praised the performance and attention of the staff at University Hospital.

"The pediatric ward was excellent in Albuquerque," Johnson said. "They cared a lot more than usual. They were spectacular people."

"The social worker there helped us out with a place to stay. We were lucky we had Medicaid or we would be paying for the rest of our lives."

Johnson was employed at the Ruidoso Care Center until R.J.'s illness. Mrs. Johnson works at Pappy's Diner. She said the owners and other employees were supportive during the entire ordeal.

"My boss helped us out a lot, too," she said. "They're wonderful people."

The physicians told the parents that R.J. probably won't remember much of his time in the hospital, because he often was sedated.

"We were afraid he'd have nightmares, the toxins were so high in his body and he had so many tubes," Johnson said. "But they said the only side effect would be that he would be more subject to colds and flu for a while, because his immune system wouldn't be quite the same. They gave us antibiotics."

Meanwhile, R.J. has celebrated his fourth birthday and spends much of his time playing video games.

"For maybe the next six months to a year, he will experience abnormal kidney function, but there should be no long term problems," Cappon said.

"We were pleased with his recovery. He did very well."

## State Police warn motorists of holiday roadblocks, DUI checks

Thanksgiving has the reputation of being the busiest and most heavily traveled holidays of the year, and our activity seems to support that reputation. It also proved to be a sad holiday for a lot of motorists," said State Police Chief John Denko.

"We issued over 5,000 traffic tickets for everything from drunk driving to occupant restraint violations, and despite this enforcement effort, State Police officers still had to investigate 55 traffic accidents."

"Last year, we experienced a

decrease in the number killed during Thanksgiving, but not this year.

"Four died on our highways last year but a total of six people were killed in traffic accidents in New Mexico this year."

Chief Denko continued, "Of the 5,337 total tickets issued, 3,666 were given to speeders, 496 were for safety belt violations and the remaining 1,175 tickets were for various other traffic offenses."

"State Police also arrested 77 persons for drunk driving."

"The State Police also conducted saturation patrols and sobriety checkpoints at several trouble spots throughout the state. These operations accounted for the arrest of eight drunk drivers and 646 traffic tickets were issued."

In Ruidoso, just one person was arrested for DWI as a result of State Police sobriety checks.

The State Police will also continue to set up sobriety checkpoints through the month of December.

## Sunday a.m. fire destroys woodshop

A fire swept through a wood-working shop at Camp Sierra Blanca early Sunday, leaving an estimated \$25,000 to \$30,000 damage in its wake.

Fort Stanton fire chief Barney Mancha said his department received a fire call from the minimum security prison at 1:06 a.m. Sunday. About 10 firemen arrived on scene at 1:26 a.m.

With assistant chief Roy Baca directing the firefighting effort, the flames were extinguished and the

crew was ready to leave by 4:12 a.m.

"When they arrived, the inmates already were trying to put out the fire with a hydrant hose," Mancha told The Ruidoso News Monday.

"All the functions, the housing area, maintenance and the cafeteria are in separate buildings and the fire never spread from the maintenance area. It's a very large building with auto maintenance on one side and a woodworking shop and storage on the other side. The

fire was contained on that side."

The cause of the fire is undetermined, Mancha said.

Whether an investigation into the cause will be launched is up to authorities at the camp, Mancha said.

"It could be as simple as some combustible rags," he said.

Some staff members at the camp said that there have been problems with electrical wiring installed by the inmates in that building.

The project consists of constructing a one million gallon steel reservoir, and install 5,200 feet of new pipe.

Second on the priority list, is a request for \$391,260 for ADA (American with Disability Act) Compliance. Since the federal government mandates the change, the Legislature is expected to approve a good portion of this tab.

Third on the priority list is a relatively small request of \$76,542 to correct the 892 locations for the Emergency 911 and street sign program. It is expected the Legislature will fund this safety program.

According to Mayor Jerry Shaw, Parks and Recreation is the foundation of this state's tourism and vital to a tourist town. Shaw told the council that village parks have been the most neglected financially of all village departments.

The current village council has shown a concern for growth in parks and recreation and has elevated parks this year to the village's fourth priority for capital improvement.

"Every time we reached budget hearings, parks is one of the first to get cut," Shaw later told The Ruidoso News.

Parks money is requested for safety projects, renovations, equipment, irrigation, landscaping, parking lots and new projects.

Underwood told the council he is aware that 1994 is an election year for him.

If, in the upcoming election year, Underwood can bring home the \$254,000 needed to improve the neglected village parks that are visited regularly by tourists and all New Mexico residents, he would gain wide support from his constituency. If he brings home nothing from the Legislature, voters might start looking around for another ambassador.

In other council business, Resolution 93-23 amended lodgers tax procedures was approved.

Changes to the lodgers policy includes increasing allocations allowed from \$1,500 to \$5,000 per year.

Lodgers Tax Advisory Board chairman Bob Carey said the board

intends to look closely at each applicant and will not automatically grant the full amount, as often was the case in previous years.

Carey said the board is aware that seed money has to be set aside for new ventures. He said the board wanted to make sure that the big events that brought in large amounts of tourist dollars in the shoulder seasons are protected.

Mayor Shaw said she doesn't think it is right for some organization profiting by \$50,000 to ask for lodgers tax money.

Councilor Frank Potter said that if there is some question amount the profit and loss statement of any organization asking for money, the board could request a CPA report.

Shaw said with the new changes, some of the new events would have a better chance for success.

"The way this read, was a little too stringent for new events to get started, meeting all of the criteria," Shaw said. "The new events, they're the ones that really need the help."

Carey said there is more money for other events because the village has collected more lodgers tax.

Councilor Frank Cummins wanted to be sure that the matching funds, dollar for dollar, remained in tact.

If \$5,000 is allocated by LTAB for advertising to an event, that event must spend \$5,000 of its own money, or at least \$10,000 for advertising. The village council has final approval on allocations.

The council also cut the three-year limit provision in asking for money, to allow for unlimited applications for funds.

The official Ruidoso pin, an expenditure previously ruled as an unacceptable use of lodgers tax money, was reinstated by the council.

The village will purchase a number of the pins, with the cost not to exceed \$5,000.

In another agenda item, the council approved a request by Jim Franklin of Franklin Aviation to extend his hangar lease at the Sierra Blanca Airport for 30 days.

Airport manager Lloyd Wayne said the request for proposals deadline for the new lease is not until

mid December.

Franklin asked to rent only one quarter of the hangar for \$125. The council agreed to the extension, but on the condition that the 30 day's rent be \$500, the amount Franklin had been paying.

In other action, the council: —officially appointed Gary Jackson as village manager and approved his contract.

—heard an Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County update by director Karen Kopp.

—approved authorization to hire temporary employees to clean the gallery floor at the Grindstone Dam.

—approved Resolution 93-22 setting March 1, 1994, as the regular election date. The election polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. for the election of mayor for a four-year term, three councilors for four-year terms, one councilor for a two-year term, and one municipal judge for a four-year term.

The resolution consolidates polling places at the Ruidoso Convention Civic Events Center. The absent voter precinct will be in the clerk's office.

Declaration of Candidacy must be filed on Tuesday, January 4, 1994 between the hours of 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. in the clerk's office. Candidates must obtain a certified copy of their voters registration from the County Clerk's office dated after November 30, 1993 and before January 4, 1994.

Consent agenda items approved collectively were:

—a grant agreement with the state for improvements at the senior citizens building.

—a bid award for a portable indoor/outdoor dance floor.

—cancellation of the December 28 regular meeting.

Under reports from municipal officials, the mayor reminded citizens that the Parks and Recreation Department has scheduled a Christmas Tree lighting Thursday, December 2, at 6 p.m. in Schoolhouse Park.

The parks department has arranged for early bird visits with Santa from 4 to 5 p.m.

The mayor said five trees will be lit for the ceremony.

But now they've settled into their new home and their children enjoy coming to see them in New Mexico.

Webb stopped at the thrift shop to take a look around and volunteer her time before she knew that Oswalt was leaving. She decided running the shop was something she would like and that humane work for animals was a really worthy cause.

"I just thought they needed volunteers," she said. "That's why I wanted to do this shop, because I think it's such a good cause and I wanted to volunteer my time."

their pet Doberman with family members, the Webbs have acquired a cat called Socks since moving to Mescalero.

"We're going to try to mark everything for easier shopping," she said. "There may be a few little changes, but I think Gerri has done an excellent job and I admire her so much and hear so many compliments especially about the changes she has made since last summer."

"All I want to do is get bigger and better for the benefit of the animals and for the people who shop here. I just hope people con-

tinue to donate the wonderful types of articles that I see here now.

"Donations are our lifeline and keep us going."

"I hope for a big Christmas season as more people learn about us. I still talk to customers who didn't know we were here."

"Here" is next to Arby's restaurant on Sudderth Drive.

Webb said she just received a donation of new, never worn, western shirts from a shop that closed. Some of her jewelry is very intriguing. Shoppers also will find wrapping paper and tree decorations, as well as ski equipment and kitchen and bedroom staples.

## Alto man wins Santa Barbara News Press Lifetime Achievement Award

Leo Martinez, who has gradually moved his home base from California to Lincoln County was honored recently with by the Santa Barbara News-Press.

Martinez, who lives nearly full-time in Alto, was one of five Californians honored with the News-Press Lifetime Achievement Award during an awards dinner at the Four Seasons Biltmore Hotel.

Martinez, 51, has been a tenacious community leader for more than two decades.

"When Leo Martinez sees social injustice, he maps out a fix-it plan, revs up his engines and keeps them

going until the job is finished," reads a story in the News-Press.

"That guy has so much energy, and he doesn't take 'no' for an answer. A lot of people will give up when Leo's just starting to warm up," his friend, Ben Cheverez, was quoted as saying.

Martinez, a plastering contractor with businesses in New Mexico and California, is a former member of the Santa Barbara City Council.

He first gained the attention of the community at large when he led his friends — many of them Latino fathers like himself — in collecting about \$200,000 to direct their Chicano pride into a lasting contribution to the entire community by developing a non-profit community center.

That center, La Casa de la Raza, opened in a renovated warehouse in Santa Barbara in 1970, and con-

tinues today to offer social and cultural programs including tutoring, concerts, plays, recreation and other activities.

Martinez has been a guiding force among Santa Barbara's Latinos, according to the News-Press story.

Martinez said the award meant a great deal because it honors not only his service on behalf of the whole community, but Latinos in particular.

He said he has devoted much of his effort at helping Latinos help themselves and feel proud about who they are.

"This for me is the pinnacle because I'm being recognized not just by Latinos, but a mixed group of business and socially committed people," he said.

"It means that I'm being recognized for doing something right."

# Warriors face Tulie in opener

The Ruidoso Warriors boys basketball team begins the season Friday night under first-year head coach Paul Kirkwood as the squad travels to Tularosa for a meeting with the rival Wildcats.

The JV game is scheduled for a 5:30 p.m. tip-off with the Varsity teams going at it about 7:15 p.m.

Kirkwood is inheriting a team that won just one game last year and hasn't won a district contest in two seasons.

In fact, since moving to the AAA division in 1981, Ruidoso has won the district basketball title just once (1981) and hasn't made a playoff appearance since that same year — despite being very successful in other sports.

Last year, Tularosa beat Ruidoso in both meetings and was very competitive in class AA. The Wildcats were successful in pressing the Warriors, and turnovers were the key in both games.

That strategy should not be as successful against Ruidoso this year as the Warriors have an abundance of guards and a new press offense simplifies the back-court play.

The Warriors return several starters from last year's team.

Seniors Casey Kearns and Jeff Chapman, along with junior Raul Davis will provide the inside punch, while Cory Hood, Rex Comanche, J.R. Chino and Daniel Espinosa will handle the ball.

All of the above players have considerable varsity experience and should not suffer much from the usual pre-season jitters.

Chapman led his gold team with a stellar 32-point effort against his teammates in the annual Blue-Gold game Tuesday night, while Comanche turned in a good effort for the favored Blue squad.

In the pre-season scrimmage against NMMI two weeks ago, the Warriors' running and pressing game looked pretty good, but their shooting and rebounding looked pretty bad, at least initially.

Once the scrimmage got going the Warriors warmed up a little.

Kearns will be the key player for the Warriors. Last season as a junior, he started out in very impressive fashion, with a great knack for "playing big" inside, despite being only six feet tall.

But like most of the team, as the losses mounted, Kearns' enthusiasm waned.

This season, however, has seen a resurgence of Kearns' love for the game and that exuberance has caused him to develop into a real leader, something the Warriors have been without for a while.

While sometimes volatile, Kearns' emotionalism surfaces for just one reason — he hates to lose.

Sophomore Cory Hood will also play a leading role if the Warriors are to make something of yet another "rebuilding year." At 5'11", Hood is the best fundamental basketball player on the team. He plays good, solid defense and as the team's point guard he also is the "headiest" member of the squad.

Last year as a freshman, Hood took a beating as a starter on the Varsity and sat out virtually all of February's district schedule with injuries. But the new-improved year model boasts a bigger, more powerful engine that is less susceptible to the hazards of the road.

With a little more use of his soft shot from outside, District 3-AAA opponents should see a complete basketball player when February rolls around this year.

Rex Comanche also started as a freshman last year and got good experience from the Warriors' toils and troubles. As the team's best

three-point shooter, Comanche's role this year shifts a little more to the outside, although his inside play is much taller than his 5'10" height would indicate.

The best way to sum Comanche up? He's just tough. A kid that any coach, anywhere, anytime would love to have.

Pure athleticism describes junior post-man Raul Davis. At only 5'10", Davis plays much bigger inside because of great jumping ability and a shooting touch that always gives the ball a chance to go in the basket.

No other Warrior player has Davis' combined inside-outside game. Match those attributes along with amazing quickness, and you'll find a lot of jocks that opponents have been faked out of as the Warriors travel around.

If Davis were 6'2" or so, college coaches would be a constant bother next year during his senior year. Judging from what we saw last year, they still might be.

Senior Jeff Chapman's best game is golf, but if you didn't know it and saw Tuesday's Blue-Gold game, you wouldn't believe it. Chapman scored, passed and stole the ball with reckless abandon.

Easily turning the best individual performance of the night from both teams.

Like Kearns, Chapman's interest in basketball drifted in the latter part of last year's season. But also like Kearns, Chapman has come back strong this season, seemingly refreshed by a break from the game and new coaching philosophy.

As attributes, Chapman is the team's tallest player. But his 6'3" size is not as impressive as his ice-cold nerves under the gun, something he probably learned from golf.

In the Warriors' only win last season, it was Chapman who sunk

two free throws at the end of the game to give the Warriors their lone victory of the season.

Junior Daniel Espinosa also returns as a varsity player from last season. Espinosa is another player who is not particularly tall, but takes advantage of an above-average ability to blockout opponents on the boards.

That knack makes him the team's most consistent rebounder.

Espinosa also handles the ball pretty well, which makes him a threat on both ends of the floor.

Only a suspect shooting touch kept Espinosa out of a full-time starting role last year, but Coach Kirkwood spotted that problem early and the improvement in Espinosa's shot is already noticeable.

With these attributes, it will be hard to keep Espinosa from playing a lot of minutes every week.

J.R. Chino is another returner from last year's wars. A point guard that is not afraid to put the ball up from 3-point range, Chino will be the man his teammates will look to when those occasional skirmishes break out.

Like Comanche, Chino is tough. His experience and respect from other team members make him an added asset to the team.

Newcomers this year include Corvin Lester and Todd Young.

Lester is another talented athlete with good all-around skills that include a nice outside shot and good speed.

Young will back up Kearns inside but should see considerable playing time as he is probably the team's best all-around shooter.

For a team that just won one game last year, it's difficult to set a realistic goal of what a good season would be. If the Warriors win two games, that would be a 100 percent improvement.

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# Lincoln National Forest names new top cop

Charles "Hoot" Murray has been named the chief law enforcement officer for the Lincoln National Forest.

He'll be stationed in Alamogordo.

Murray previously worked in the El Paso District of the Carson National Forest.

Officers for other districts in the forest are John "Pancho" Smith stationed in Smokey Bear Ranger District, and Edison Ashley at Mayhill and Clouderoft. A vacancy exists on the Guadalupe Ranger District headquarters in Carlsbad.

One of Murray's first duties has been to conduct spontaneous check points at various sites within the Lincoln National Forest to check fuelwood permits, Christmas tree tags and violations of wildlife protection laws.

(The check point may occur at any time of the day, or any day of

the week.

Other law enforcement personnel from the sheriff's departments, the New Mexico Department of Game and Fish, the State Police and the State Forestry and Resource Conservation Division, cooperate with the forest service at

the check points to enforce the laws and regulations of their agencies.

Illegal activities that Murray and other forest service law enforcement officers must watch for are timber theft, arson, vandalism, property theft, dumping of toxic waste, contract fraud, illicit drug activity and unruly behavior in recreation areas.

Crime activity continues to increase on national forests. In 1972, 112,000 incidents of federal law violations were reported on national forest system land, Murray noted in a report on the enforcement program. One thousand drug-related arrests occurred.

Unfortunately, only one law enforcement officer is on staff for every 250,000 acres of national forest, trying to oversee the activities of 700 million visitors each year, he said.

Fortunately, the law enforce-


ment budget has increase nearly 50 percent since 1987.

In 1987, illegal growing of cannabis in national forests reached such proportions that more money was allocated for eradication.

In fiscal year 1993, the service made 3,000 arrests, confiscated 575,000 plants from more than 8,500 sites on forests, seized several million dollars worth of assets and destroyed more than a billion dollars worth of drugs, according to Murray.

Law enforcement officers participate in public programs through the forest's speakers exhibit bureau.

"Our goal is to increase the basic understanding of the scope of authority, level of training, duties and mission of the law enforcement officers and how they differ from park rangers and game and fish officers," Murray said.

# Rural water group disagrees with report

Officials with the New Mexico Rural Water Association Inc. dispute a recent bleak report on the condition of drinking water in the nation issued by the National Resources Defense Council.

The report estimated that almost half the American population may be drinking unsafe water and called for tougher enforcement and more prominent public notification of violations.

Association president Pat Banegas in a news release called the conclusions "irresponsible and based on smoke and mirror statistical methods."

Specifically, association members noted that while the report author stated that 43 percent of all water suppliers violated federal health standards affecting more than 120 million people, a 1992 compliance report shows that 72 percent of community systems, 82 percent of non-transient community water systems, and 88 percent of transient non-community water systems were in full compliance with regulations.

The association disputes the council's bleak assessment of the

current quality of American's drinking water, but does agree with Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) Chief Carol Browner that the current regulatory system is broken and needs to be fixed," Banegas said.

Association members noted that the report author contended state and federal regulators acted on just 3,900 of the 250,000 violations. "The number 3,900 refers to formal enforcement actions," association members responded. "There is a complete array of state actions that are not tracked by the EPA because they are of no interest to the lawyers. These other compliance activities are the ones that are the most effective in bringing systems into compliance, and include phone calls, technical assistance visits to systems, sanitary surveys and training.

"As for 250,000 violations, community water systems had 63,000 violations and transient community and non-transient non-community systems only accounted for 4,528 violations (last year). Furthermore, the vast majority of these violations

are in monitoring and reporting, which are essentially technical violations that have nothing to do with the quality of water people are drinking."

They also insisted that estimates in the report that 900,000 people last year became ill and possibly 900 died from contaminated water supplies are vastly exaggerated.

"The problem with current regulations is that they are designed for the 13 largest water systems in the country and are not based on public health protection, but on affordability," Banegas said in the release. "The 57,000 water systems in the U.S. must meet standards that are technologically feasible and affordable for those 13 systems."

The system is another example of an unfunded federal mandate, he pointed out.

The association and coalition of local governments promote changing the regulatory agency system so that the limited resources available can be directed to the most critical health risks, such as cryptosporidium, which now is not regulated.

Current standards are based on

1970s technology and should be updated, association officials contend.

"We believe that drinking water standards need to be based on good science and risk assessment, not bureaucratic criteria," they stated. "The amount of time spent addressing regulatory issues detracts from water systems' ability to provide quality water and the expense of those regulations can be devastating to small communities, which make up more than 30 percent of all American water systems."

The council's report suggests that the public find out where their drinking water comes from and ask for copies of watershed and well head protection plans; find out what contaminants are in their drinking water from the local supplier and then call their congressman.

Association officials suggested that before they make that call, they find out from their local water professionals about the cost of providing safe water and complying with the standards, and then report those findings to their congressmen.

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

Volunteering time to work with Capitan elementary school children can be as rewarding to the volunteer as to the students.

Since joining the program, she has worked primarily with the second grade class of Mary Shanks.

"It isn't for a long period of time, one hour or whatever time they need me. I loved teaching and would be willing to spend more time if they needed me."

Gertrude Huey also was as-

signed to the second grade, although she hasn't spent as much time at the school.

She concentrated more on presenting programs to the class about growing up in the Southwest and the skills needed to survive.

"I never was one for reading a lot, but I enjoy telling the children about going to school and quilting," she said.

Ruidoso will be included in that celebration when the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce lights the tree at the "V."



Another chapter in this history: the National Living Christmas Tree was planted in the National Arboretum in February 1992.



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

### Safe driving saves lives at any age

With the winter months upon us, 55 ALIVE/MATURE DRIVING, a classroom refresher course of the American Association of Retired Persons (AARP), offers suggestions for driving in poor weather. The suggestions are just as good for new drivers at 15 as they are for the more seasoned drivers, 55 and older. Here they are:

If driving in snow or ice conditions, reduce speed and increase distance between cars.

Keep ALL windows and lights free of ice and snow. Be especially careful driving on bridges and overpasses. These areas freeze first and retain ice longer.

An icy or snow packed road is more slippery at 32 degrees than at lower temperatures.

In fog, turn on low beams for greater visibility.

Chain reactions are common in fog. Pull off in a safe area and wait for conditions to improve. Do not creep along at five or ten miles an hour.

Make sure wiper blades are in good shape. It's not a bad habit to replace them once a year.

According to the local 55 ALIVE instructors, Mollie and Wayne Mason, the best advice for motorists is to avoid driving during adverse weather conditions.

The AARP 55 ALIVE course, which helps older drivers sharpen their driving skills and avoid accidents, is offered to motorists age 50 and older throughout the country. The course is offered in four half-day sessions.

New Mexico law requires all auto insurance carriers to offer a discount on premiums to qualified graduates aged 55 and older of approved courses such as 55 ALIVE. Policyholders should contact their insurance carriers for more information about such discounts.

## Upon Reflection

### Legislature plays shell game with voters

Some legislators like to say that voters would have more respect for the Legislature if they had a better idea of what the Legislature does. But if lawmakers truly want their work known, they sure have a funny way of showing it.

Take the current flap over \$3.5 million in contracts steered to IBM without competitive bidding.

The money was appropriated by the 1993 Legislature for computerized school reading programs. The appropriations bill earmarked the money for what it called "writing-to-read" equipment.

It happens that IBM produces a software package called Writing to Read. The state school superintendent, Alan Morgan, subsequently decided that the bill required schools to buy only the IBM equipment.

Who put the words "writing-to-read" in the bill? Well, that seems to be one of those legislative secrets.

The sponsor of the bill was Raymond Sanchez, an Albuquerque-area Democrat and the Speaker of the House. Sanchez, however, has said he didn't intend to require schools to buy the IBM equipment. His original bill didn't contain the words "writing-to-read."

These words, now so sweet to the ears of IBM, were inserted during a meeting of the Senate Finance Committee, and according to news reports, no one has taken credit for the language.

You might think it would be easy to find out who added the words. Just look up the minutes.

Unfortunately, there aren't any minutes taken during legislative sessions, although minutes are taken by so-called interim committees that meet during the rest of the year.

The Legislature keeps its record-keep con-

veniently sketchy.

Senate committees, for example, report their actions to the full Senate only in the broadest terms. Committees inform the full Senate of their recommendations on bills, but they don't give the total votes for and against, much less the names of the senators for or against.

House committees do better. They record who voted for and against bills and list the names of representatives absent or excused.


They do not, however, record who sponsored what amendments to bills.

If a bill makes it to the floor of the House or Senate, votes are recorded by name. The State Constitution requires both the House and Senate to meet in public when they meet on the floor and to keep records of what they do.

The upshot of all this is that you can track a bill through committee, see what amendments were made where, catch the final vote, and pick up certain other information along the way.

But, unless you are at the Legislature you won't be able to find out much else. If you miss some action, it's gone—unless it happens to be reported in the news media. With so many things going on, only a small percentage is reported in the media.

Even worse, much of the key work of the

Legislature is carried on behind closed doors. The final work on the state budget, for example, is done by a group of lawmakers meeting by themselves.

These closed meetings are perfectly legal. The Legislature itself has said so by exempting itself from the state open meetings law.

That law is good enough for local officials in Santa Rosa, apparently, but just too cumbersome for lawmakers in Santa Fe.

Openness, of course, doesn't guarantee good legislation.

Watchers of C-Span, the cable TV network that broadcasts some Congressional action live, have been jolted into reality by seeing lone legislators on the floor of the Congress giving speeches to an empty chamber.

These politicians presumably can go back home to their districts and tell voters, "As I was saying just the other day on the floor of the House..."

Even so, the scarcity of minutes and other records of action in the New Mexico Legislature makes it clear that the lawmakers in charge of the Roundhouse figure it's better to keep record-keeping to a minimum.

The fewer the records, the more room there is to maneuver. And maneuvering is how the game is played.

The Legislature has been able to find money for pensions for itself and, if the voters approve, for increased expense money while they're in the Legislature.

Maybe the Legislature could also find some money for some minute-takers, and then let them into all legislative meetings. We know the Legislature could do it, since committees that meet when the Legislature isn't in session do keep minutes.

Why, then, when it's decision-time for lawmakers, do they keep the voters in the dark?

### Money for nothing, get your kicks for free

I told my son, Aaron, you don't get something for nothing, anybody knows that.

He and some friends are traveling to Crested Butte, Colorado, to snow board for a week. He said the ski lift tickets are free.

I asked him if free tickets came with the lodge where he was staying and he said, "No, we're staying at a friend's cabin."

Well, the kid is not that savvy. I figured he would have to stay in one of the lodges to get any kind of package deal, so I called the Crested Butte Chamber of Commerce to find out what he was getting into.

Chamber officials told me that the ski area is owned by Crested Butte Mountain Resort. Lift tickets go for \$41 per day.

I told them my son told me lift tickets are free until December 26.

"Wrong," she said. "They're free until December 18."

"Do you have to stay at a certain lodge?" I asked.

"No," the chamber rep said. "You can stay anywhere you want."

"Can he ski all day long for free?"

"Yes," she said.

"How much does he have to pay if he wants to ski a second day?" I asked.

"Nothing," she said. "He can get a free lift ticket for a week if he wants. It's free."

This was just too hard to believe. Someone had to foot the bill for electricity to run the lifts.

"How does Crested Butte Mountain Resort make any money if they give away their lift tickets to everyone in town?" I asked.

"It works through our pillow cost program," she said.

"Is that like lodgers tax?" I asked.

"No, she said. "We also have a lodgers tax.

But during this slow season, every lodger in town kicks in \$10 per pillow used for the night and gives it to Crested Butte Mountain Resort. If a lodge has 200 people, the resort would be given \$2,000. If a lodge has 20 people, the resort would get \$200. This program has run for three years, and we found that the accommodations that were running 18 percent are now packed completely. It more than makes up for empty beds in the slow season. The rest of the town has prospered unbelievably during a time that used to be dead."

This was all too good. I asked if my son had to pay for skis or snowboards.

She said that rentals were available in the area if skiers didn't bring their own equipment.

"See," I told Aaron. "You don't get something for nothing in this world. Ever!"

He's going anyway. Staying at a friend's cabin.

Who'd want to be around all those tourists anyhow? Chamber officials said Crested Butte gets so busy during the free lift days, a person has difficulty crossing the street.

Can't teach these kids anything anymore.
