## Arm yourselves, say area lawmen

The Brady Bill, a five-day waiting period to purchase a gun, will go into effect February 28, 1994.

A few of the local law officers were asked how effective this bill will be as a deterrent to crime.

"What I've seen our government do, every provision to control crime and weapons have been created, does not work," said Ruidoso assistant police chief Mike Lovelace.

"All it does is prevent honest citizens from arming and protecting themselves. A criminal can get a gun anytime he wants."

Lovelace said today's violence in the street is directly related to a moral decline in parental supervision for the past 30 years. And he thinks the Brady Bill does nothing toward reinstating family values.

Lovelace spoke of riot situations, similar to that of Los Angeles when hoodlums were burning the neighborhoods.

"You would want to make sure you protect your family in a riot situation and you may want to arm yourself. An honest citizen is expected to wait five days. That's stupid," Lovelace said.

"A crook doesn't have the conscience to go by the law. Whatever they want, they want it now. It's instant gratification. They'll steal it, or buy it from someone who stole it, or just take it from you. They don't care."

Lovelace said the man who recently killed six persons in New York purchased the gun legally in California and still committed a heinous crime.

"Even laws and provisions will not stop some people," Lovelace said.

Should the honest citizen arm himself?

"Yes," said Lovelace. "If everybody on that train in New York City had a gun, a lot of people would have lived. We might have had one or two dead, plus the violator, but not six, with all those others injured."

Ruidoso officer Truman McBride also thinks the Brady Bill is infringing on the constitutional right of every American to bear arms.

McBride was asked if Reginald Denny, the Los Angeles truck driver that was nearly killed after a brick caved in his head, could have legitimately shot someone entering his truck cab.

McBride said if he was being threatened, he could have shot the intruder and then driven to the nearest police station to report it to the authorities.

McBride said in the last 27 years, he has seen greater efforts to rehabilitate the criminal and put him back in society. At the same time, McBride said the government is trying to take the gun away from that society he has re-entered.

"That takes away the citizens right to defend himself," McBride said.

McBride said in New Mexico, residents can carry a gun as long as it's not concealed.

He said certain areas are forbidden to carry guns unless it's a law enforcement officer. Those areas include schools, village hall or other government buildings.

McBride said a gun in the car is considered the same as being in the home and can be concealed. He said that is a New Mexico law and different states have different gun laws.

"Texas allows you to have a gun in the car if you're traveling through; however, the gun and ammunition have to be separate," McBride said.

He said the chief purpose of a hand gun is for close range defense or offense, although he said many people just like to fire a gun, like in target practice. He said gun enthusiasts also admire the craftsmanship that goes into creating a hand gun.

McBride said that the security guard that shot the mugger in New York City over a year ago, made a bad error in judgment. The mugger was awarded more than four million dollars after he was paralyzed from the shooting.

McBride said when the mugger ran away from the scene, he no longer posed a threat of bodily harm, therefore, the security guard should not have used excessive force.

If he had possessed a weapon and was attempting to threaten that security guard, he would have been justified in shooting the mugger, not to kill him, but to stop him.

"If he happens to die in the process, I'm sorry, but shooting him to stop him from committing an act of violence would have been justified," McBride said.

He said if a burglar enters a resident's home, that resident is justified in shooting the burglar whether he has a gun or not, because the house is a private domain, and the intent of an intruder obviously would cause harm, according to McBride.

McBride said that owning a gun could backfire if the owner didn't have the temperament to use the weapon. He said there have been cases where weapons have been taken from owners and then the owner becomes a victim.

He said a person purchasing a gun, should learn how to load and shoot the gun safely. But, McBride cautions, if a person is not prepared to use the gun he shouldn't buy one.

## Thieves ransack animal shelter

Thieves broke into the Lincoln County Humane Society shelter Friday night, smashing windows in the office and bathroom, stealing more than a dozen bags of dog food and a petty cash box.

They also opened the doors to the animal cages and the outside gates. Fortunately, all but three of the adult dogs and puppies waited around outside the Gavilan Canyon shelter and were safely back inside within a few minutes after employees arrived.

However, three blue heeler puppies, barely eight weeks old, are missing.

Shelter manager Esther Harper said she hopes they were taken by the thieves and are not wandering without food or protection from the elements.

"That would be the cruelest act of all, if they just let them wander off," Harper said. "Stealing the food from these abandoned pets is bad enough."

Sheriff's deputy Frank Hooper dusted the office and windows for fingerprints and was able to find

## Nothing in life is free...

Free money, money, money and how to grab some from the state or federal government became the challenge Tuesday for Lincoln County Commissioners.

Only they quickly learned, most of the money comes with big strings attached.

In fact, a \$100,000 State Department of Transportation allocation to the county for a sidewalk project in the settlement of Lincoln carries rope size strings, said county man-

ager Andy Wynham.

The money comes from the Intermodal Surface Transportation Efficiency Act of 1991 (ISTEA).

But the state has imposed stricter guidelines and more requirements than the federal government. Those requirements nearly preclude small towns and counties from participating and allow the money to go, by default, to larger towns with bigger bucks, he found out at a recent briefing.

To secure the \$100,000, the county would be required to pay for


the engineering, archaeological, planning and right-of-way acquisition for any brick and mortar project; and to match the project amount with a 25 percent cash contribution.

"The feds allow a 20 percent match and for the studies to be paid from the grant," Wynham said. "It's the state that has set these requirements in an effort to spread out the money, but that's not what's happening."

When he heard about the steep requirements, Wynham said, "I knew at that point I needed to come home and see if the commissioners wanted me to pursue this. The money could be used for a study instead, but we would still need the cash match. We just don't have that money. If we have no contract by July, we'll lose the ISTEAF funding."

Wynham said he included the sidewalk construction on a list of proposed capital improvement projects sent to the State Legislature. Commissioner L. Ray Nunley said State Representative H. John Underwood (D-Ruidoso) will help push it through.

Commissioner Wilton Howell offered a motion to go to the legislature, but it died for lack of a second.

A motion by Nunley, which passed, stated that the ISTEAF application will be put to the side until after the commission sees what it can get from the legislature. Then commissioners can determine the best use, if any, of the ISTEAF allocation.

Unlike many of the other funding sources, the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program will accept "in-kind" services toward the match required.

Hubert Quintana, with the Southeast New Mexico Planning District, briefed commissioners on the new round of awards possible under the federal CDBG program.

Commissioners lost their bid earlier this year for a continuation of a housing rehabilitation program started two years ago.

Quintana said meetings will be scheduled in communities across the county for feedback on needs that might be eligible for funding.

Some new rules probably will be implemented after a December 16 meeting in Santa Fe in an effort to speed up the projects that are lagging behind. Some communities are stacking three and four projects and can't finish any of them on time, he said.

The deadline for applications will be April 1, and the money should be allocated in July, Quintana said.

Ralph Dunlap of Lincoln and Bob Hart of the Lincoln County Heritage Trust, put their bid in for three projects from any available source of money: the pedestrian paths (sidewalks), burying power lines and conducting an archaeological survey of the 10 miles down the main street of the settlement.

"Lincoln is a tourist attraction," Dunlap said. "There were 43,000 paid admissions to the museum last year."

Hart interjected that the state estimates \$100 a day is spent by a visiting family, which could translate to a \$1-million impact on the county, figuring that many people who spend time in the settlement, don't stop at the museum.

"But we have a lot of power lines and companies can't film historically significant movies with power

lines," Dunlap said.

"In 1973, the state put out a growth plan for the settlement and this was one of the features (burying power lines)."

"You're trying to get back to as historically-true a Lincoln as possible," Howell said. "What about sidewalks then?"

"We're not thinking concrete," Dunlap said.

Nunley said the design will be chip-seal with a natural sandy top to blend into the land.

Several years ago, the electric cooperative that serves the area estimated the cost of burying lines at \$230,000, Dunlap said.

"They'll last longer than the overheads the way they do them now," Commissioner Bill Schwettmann said.

Commissioner Stirling Spencer asked whether money might be available through state or federal historical preservation programs. Money from those sources possibly could be used as the county's match for allocations like the ISTEAF, he suggested.

The state highway department would be the beneficiary of any archaeological study along the road, why couldn't it kick in \$100,000, Spencer asked.

"It's a drop in the bucket for them," he said.

Dunlap said no matter what projects are pursued in the future, an archaeological survey will be needed.

"Why not use (the ISTEAF money) there," he suggested. "It won't cost more than \$100,000" and would not entail construction, which would eliminate the cost of the required studies."

When officials with the Museum of New Mexico attempted to improve drainage around the Montano Store in Lincoln, they uncovered an old loading dock that stopped the project.

"I asked what kind of archaeological information they had on Lincoln and they said nothing," Dunlap said. "I called a company that does that type of thing and asked what it might run for the full 10 mile stretch. It would only locate and predict the problem areas, not solve them, so that you are not overburdened by discovering something you didn't know was there."

"You could do this for your cost of \$25,000, a \$100,000 survey, and avoid a lot of future problems. We could do the whole 10 miles and it would never again have to be done."

In particular, the old road alignment may be a problem, because it varies from the existing highway route through the settlement.

Nunley said he prefers to pursue the money through the legislature and confine the scope to the sidewalks. If the old roadway crosses a person's property, it could impinge on their property rights.

Howell said the legislature also may require up front money. If the commission went with both the ISTEAF and state money, the cost could exceed \$60,000.

Chairman Monroy Montes said

the town of Lincoln should consider coming up with some of the money.

"It's in a unique situation," he said. "Lincoln doesn't have to provide services, yet 45,000 people visit and the residents are reaping that benefit. Maybe it's time for (businesses in) Lincoln to accept some of that responsibility, although there is no city government."

Maybe they could mount a "Save Lincoln" campaign aimed at history buffs and followers of the legend of Billy the Kid, Spencer said.

Terry Alanis, site manager for the Zia Senior Citizens Center at San Patricio, told the commissioners she would like to see some money used to buy a building for the program instead of leasing.

Nunley said he already is looking into that possibility.

In other business, the commission:

—appointed Flo Maul to the agricultural and rural affairs advisory committee on a motion by Nunley.

—heard Wynham announce that a lawsuit to quiet the title on the county fairground in Capitan has been filed.

More than 60 individuals are named as defendants, but less than five will be served in person. The rest will be notified through the newspapers.

"This should be cleared up in 60 to 90 days," Wynham said. "We've spent about \$1,500 to date, but will probably get by with about \$3,000 to complete the action."

The county needed to establish ownership of the fairground after a check of past records showed no chain of title on the land.

—authorized Wynham to negotiate with McCoy Miller Southwest of Alamogordo, the low bidder on two ambulances for the Fort Stanton and Carrizozo emergency services units.

Howell said he was concerned about the low number of companies responding to the request for proposals (RFP).

Montes said one company representative said he did not receive a packet of information. But Wynham said county records will show that the packet was mailed to the company and nine others. He added no one contacted him for information after speaking to Montes.

"The language was not restrictive, it was very general," Wynham said. "We advertised locally and in the Albuquerque Journal and we submitted to all known suppliers."

Although only three responded and one of those was a no bid, the low offer "was more than responsive," he said. "It was an excellent process. We could save \$10,000 on the two ambulances, which were budgeted for \$65,000 each."

Unlike opening bids, a process which is handled in public with the dollar amounts announced, the exact figures in responses to requests for proposals are not revealed until negotiations are either successfully completed with the low respondent or county officials move on to the next in line to negotiate.

## County commission compiles wish list

Expanding the Lincoln County courthouse in Carrizozo for \$750,000 accounted for the most expensive single project in a five-year, \$4.2-million capital improvement list assembled by county manager Andy Wynham.

Commissioners asked Wynham to put the list together to send to Santa Fe with State Representative H. John Underwood as the Ruidoso Democrat prepares for the January session of the State Legislature.

If Underwood manages to pry open the vault of the bountiful state coffers, three new ambulances would be acquired and the county's Zia Senior Citizens system could be a big winner.

The commission has listed its immediate needs for that department as \$150,000 for new senior citizens center in San Patricio; \$25,000 for new kitchen equipment and \$4,600 for other improvements at the senior citizens center in Corona; \$7,000 for improvements at the center in Capitan; \$5,000 for the center in Carrizozo and \$13,000 for a new vehicle there.

Other major items for 1994 included \$36,250 for the rural addressing project, which is needed for the E911 emergency system; \$15,000 for jail security surveil-

lance; \$100,000 for 24 cattleguards (the only priority four in the group); \$523,000 to chip seal D004 and State Road 214; \$130,000 for two new ambulances; and \$40,000 for two four wheel drive vehicles, one for the administration and one for the emergency services manager.

The total of requests for 1994 hit \$1.4-million.

For 1995, commissioners cut the total down to \$635,050. Another ambulance is listed at \$65,000; handicap access at the county annex for \$80,000; another 24 cattleguards for \$100,000; paving and repairing Gavilan Canyon Road for \$180,000; and chip sealing Palo Verde and Agua Fria roads for \$45,000. The other needs are \$15,000 or under and include items for all four senior citizens centers.

The courthouse project dominated the 1996 list, which totalled about \$1,246,000.

Other big dollar items included patching and repaving Gavilan Canyon Road for \$180,000; installing 24 cattle guards for \$100,000; another ambulance for \$65,000; installation of three concrete water crossings for \$45,000; and several new vehicles and vans for the seniors program and other departments.

In 1997, more cattle guards for

another \$100,000, chip sealing School Road and CO17 for \$180,000 and replacing three bridges with culverts for \$45,000 constitute the three largest projects. New vehicles for the assessor totalling \$32,000 and more equipment and improvements for the senior centers round out that year's requests, which totalled \$407,550.

Another half million for 1998 finishes out the pudgy capital improvement packet.

The big ticket items for that year include chip sealing Fawn Ridge and Sun Valley for \$180,000; installing 24 cattle guards for \$100,000; installing three low water crossings for \$45,000; new vehicles for the assessor at \$32,000; vehicles for the Carrizozo seniors center, at \$32,000; a four wheel drive vehicle for administration at \$25,000; three vans with lifts at \$17,000 each for the seniors centers at Capitan, Corona and San Patricio; and \$11,250 for rural addressing.

Wynham didn't need to remind commissioners, but made it clear to the audience at last week's board meeting that legislators look at county and city capital improvement packets when they are through with other budget demands.

some good examples.

The cattery was not disturbed, leading the authorities to believe the thief or thieves were after the cash box and knew where it was located.

Volunteer Josephine Strain, who donates her time to clean the cattery several times a week, said she arrived at 6:45 a.m. Saturday. While working in the cat building, she noticed the side door and gate to the main shelter were opened

and assumed someone had come in early to clean.

But after a few minutes, she saw some dogs milling around outside and realized something must be wrong. She put several animals inside the gate, closed it and headed to a nearby restaurant to call shelter officials.

Before they arrived, a Ruidoso police officer drove up and together they checked the front of the building, where they discovered the broken window.

Society officials said additional

security features will be added to the windows and doors this week. Luckily, the cash box never contains a large amount of money.

"It's hard to conceive what kind of a person would steal from abandoned animals and a group that's dedicated to helping them," Harper said.

But Strain said that as incredible as it seems, she has experienced some theft of Christmas toys, decorations and cans of food from the cattery over the last few weeks.

# Shelter gives abandoned pets a new leash on life

"I wanted to give him a chance, so I just pushed him out the car door and drove away. I just couldn't take him to the pound."

What a cop out for someone who won't accept responsibility.

They acquire a dog or cat, and then, for whatever reasons, decide they no longer want to keep their former companions. Under some strange rationale, they find it easier to abandon their loyal friends to an uncertain fate of possible starvation, abuse or death by attack from other animals, being shot or poisoned by humans. The dog doesn't know why the owner he loved abandoned him.

A far better and more humane option would be to bring the

animals to the Lincoln County Humane Society shelter, where they would be kept safe, warm and well-fed while the staff attempts to find them new homes.

By bringing them to the shelter, the dogs receive attention from the staff when their owner release them, instead of being dumped in the forest or on the side of the road. Information can be passed along to prospective new owners about special good qualities or things to watch in the pet. A donation toward food or its neutering also would help the pet's chances for a new home.

Fleetwood isn't one of the lucky ones, but the shelter staff hopes to see that change. He wasn't wearing tags and his owners haven't called to find him since he was rescued

from traffic and brought to the shelter by a stranger about one month ago.

White with light brown spots and a bobbed tail, Fleetwood's medium build and short coat make him a low-maintenance, but very attractive companion dog.

He appears to be part Basenji, possibly with red heeler. About one year old, Fleetwood would be a great friend to share the holidays.

Glider, a calm, quiet and sweet resident at the shelter, also is up for adoption. Her name comes from her large ears, that seem capable of carrying her on the air currents.

Along with her sister, who is more energetic and has more white in her coat, Glider was brought to the shelter last month by an owner, who no longer wanted the young dogs.

About six months old, the girls are supposed to be Rottweiler mixes, but their markings, medium hair length and small size are different than that breed. Glider has a thick white undercoat on her hips and back legs.

They're both good-looking animals and eager to please. Like many others in the shelter, their soulful eyes just tear at society workers' hearts.

These two would be terrific Christmas gifts, but let the recipient choose the pet. The special connection of lifelong friends is something that can't be picked out for someone else.

The shelter is loaded with puppies from six beautiful new black labradors just brought in, to three

sharpei, several shepherds and some chow mixes.

Be ready to take home two. Just like potato chips, you can't stop with one.

If feline fancy is more appealing, many adult cats and kittens are up for adoption in the cattery, including a female Siamese mix with long hair and very unusual markings.

Miss Whisk looks like someone took white paint and drew a moustache on her face. Sweet and affectionate, she'd be a superb and devoted indoor pet.

## Dog houses

The animals who must stay outside because of their size or when the shelter becomes crowded, badly need new dog houses to protect them from the sun, biting wind, sudden rain or snow.

Several years ago, someone donated their time to construct a group dog house and some smaller structures, but they have deteriorated.

A few good carpenters who appreciate dogs and can muster up some building materials, perhaps discards from projects, could put together some structures in an afternoon. Insulation in the walls, but protected from moisture, would be especially welcome on the nights in Ruidoso that can drop below zero. Raised floors, removable or easily opened roofs for cleaning would be great.

But simple structures will serve the need.

# Council closes out year Tuesday

The Ruidoso Village Council will meet in regular session Tuesday for the last time this year.

Deputy manager Alan Briley will discuss a change order request and final payment for wastewater infiltration repairs by Ward Construction.

The original bid price was for \$17,923.99. The new contract price, including change order is to be \$18,808.93.

Briley noted an outstanding claim for payment by a subcontractor. He discussed the situation with the bonding company and the village attorney, and will report on his findings at the meeting.

Rudy Lugo, field inspector for the village, said that some of the additional expense to Ward is not justified.

Lugo said all precast material was inspected thoroughly upon arrival from the plant and unloaded cautiously at the village yard.

Lugo said he had no objections on another manhole item for compensation.

Two public hearings are on the agenda: an application for a new beer and wine only liquor license for Victoria's Restaurant, 2103 Sudderth Drive; and an amendment to the Uniform Traffic Ordinance.

In other action the council will hear an appeal on the planning commission's approval of a variance in the White Fir Subdivision by Dorothy Holt Kinsey.

Marjorie Loisell, appellant, wrote a letter to the planning commission in protest to the side yard variance.

Loisell wrote the commissioners that the Upper Canyon is unique, and the village has protected the open space between the homes so

that homeowners and others could see and hear the river.

"The Upper Canyon is one of the tourist attractions of Ruidoso," she wrote.

"To allow this variance would be to treat the river as though it were a fairway with condominiums standing wall to wall along the fairway."

"The openness and naturalness of the Upper Canyon will be taken away by houses built with zero or next to zero lot lines."

"The Upper Canyon is not a gated community and zero lot lines are not appropriate."

Loisell pointed out that Richards had shown that plans can be built within her lot without the variance.

In other business, the council will hear updates on Chamber of Commerce advertising and MainStreet development.



# Warriors get first in tourney

The Ruidoso Warrior Boys Basketball team logged its first win of the season Friday with a 79-48 thrashing of the Las Vegas Robertson Cardinals in the second round of the Bruce King Invitational tournament in Moriarty.

The Warriors dropped their first and third games of the tournament, 75-55 to NMMI 102-84 to West Las Vegas.

While Ruidoso left Moriarty with the same 1-3 season record as last year's 1-22 squad, there are some noticeable differences in the teams.

The Warriors opened the tournament with the Institute and actually led the game at the half 37-36. But as in years past, Ruidoso did not play well in the second half and the Colts ran away with game after outscoring the Warriors in the fourth quarter 20-8.

The Warriors tend to display balanced scoring and Thursday's game was no exception. Senior Casey Kearns led the way for the Warriors with 11 points followed by Rex Comanche, 9; Raul Davis, 8; Daniel Espinosa, 7; Corvin Lester, 7; Cory Hood, 7, and J.R. Chino added six points.

Going into the game, first-year head coach Paul Kirkwood had dubbed 6'-7" sophomore Freddy Gonzales as the man to stop, and the Warriors were successful in doing that, holding Gonzales to just two points through the third quarter.

In fact, the Warriors "diamond-

and-one" defense did such a good job in frustrating Gonzales, he got into foul trouble and sat down most of the game.

That's the good news. The bad news was that while the Warriors stopped Gonzales, they couldn't stop Jesus Mendoza, Martin Ramos, and Art Garcia who burned Ruidoso for 18, 16 and 13 points respectively.

Kirkwood and the Warriors will get one more chance at the Colts when they come to Ruidoso for a January 15 rematch.

Game two saw Ruidoso take their most impressive victory in many, many years with a 31-point smashing of Las Vegas Robertson.

Ruidoso controlled the pace and the scoring from the outset, although the Warriors appeared a little lackadaisical in the first half ... leading by only 12 points at the intermission.

Fortunately, Kirkwood was able to light a fire under his team in the locker room and the Warriors responded with a 31-point third period and a 20-point score-fest in the final quarter.

All nine of the Warriors got into the scoring act as Casey Kearns again led the way with 14 points, followed by Jeff Chapman's 12; Rex Comanche, 11; Raul Davis, 11; Daniel Espinosa, 7; Cory Hood, 7; Todd Young, 7; and Corvin Lester, 6. Byron Soules and J.R. Chino added two points each.

"That (Las Vegas Robertson) was a game we needed. It's hard to keep playing so hard and end up

losing. At least the kids know we can win — if they play hard for 32 minutes," said Kirkwood.

The final game of the tournament brought in the tournament's second-and-maybe-best team, West Las Vegas. The Dons, who were playing their first game of the year, unfortunately met eventual winner Tucumcari in the first round, losing a 9-point decision.

West Las Vegas has one strategy only. Outrun the opponent — and shoot as quickly as possible. It worked and worked well against the Warriors, who turned the ball over 36 times to Las Vegas.

Las Vegas' press was very effective and Ruidoso's was — not. The Dons' backcourt strategy was simple. Let the other guy believe a man was open, and use its quickness to steal the ball. It worked — a lot.

Vegas suited up 12 players and 11 of them scored — four in double figures.

Ruidoso was led by Raul Davis who scored 21 points followed by Rex Comanche's 20. Jeff Chapman scored 12 off the bench followed by Daniel Espinosa's and Cory Hood's third-straight 7-point effort. Casey Kearns (9), Corvin Lester (4), and Todd Young (4) rounded out the Warrior scoring.

The tournament was probably not the success that Kirkwood had hoped for when the left last Wednesday. After all, Ruidoso left Moriarty with the same 1-3 season record as last year's team — but consider this:

Last year, Ruidoso was being outscored at a 72-54 pace through its first four games. This year, that margin is 74-70.

Last year, two players, Casey Kearns and Raul Davis accounted for fifty percent of the Warrior offense.

This year, the scoring is spread out so that defenses have to guard all of the Warriors. So far the scoring averages look like this: Rex Comanche, 13; Davis and Kearns, 10; Jeff Chapman, 9; Cory Hood, 8; Daniel Espinosa, 7; J.R. Chino, 5; Todd Young, 3 and Byron Soules, 1.

Those averages at this time last year were: Kearns, 15; Davis, 14; Chapman, 10; Chino, 3; Comanche, 4; Hood, 3; and Espinosa 3.

Interestingly enough, the current year's scoring averages include at least one-third less playing time for each player, because Kirkwood constantly substitutes. It was a rare occasion for Kearns, Chapman, and Davis to be out of the game last year, and yet their average points are similar.

The Warriors will get a couple of weeks off from games and will concentrate on improving their press rotation, poor rebounding and most importantly, final exams.

The Warriors hit the hardwood again after Christmas at Lovington in the Wildcat Invitational on December 28.

If it's possible to compare 1-3 records, this year's 1-3 squad heads to Lovington a lot better than last year's. The kids just have to keep the faith.



## Trio of top RMS students tapped for "Creativity in Engineering"

Ruidoso Middle School's Carla Burns, Jamie Estes and Katie Lukens took part in "Creativity in Engineering," a NASA outreach workshop October 29 and 30, at New Mexico Highlands University.

The workshop, run by NMHU engineering professors Kenneth Jensen, Dale Ross and Nick Sanchez, demonstrated applications of creative problem-solving techniques, critical thinking skills and team building in the school curriculum.

Among the seminar's goals is the assistance of science and math

teachers and students, particularly minorities, in terms of retention, curriculum development and college preparation.

Workshop activities included team projects and assignments using computers.

"We recognize that large numbers of talented Hispanic students

from this region are lost early along the educational pipeline," Jensen said in describing the impetus for the program.

"Even if they retain an interest in science, they are not competitive with graduates from other secondary schools from other parts of the state. We propose to intervene in the educational process at the high school and mid-school levels. Early intervention boosts retention of Hispanic and Native American youngsters in math and science."

# Talks turn to private development of MRS

Congress has cut off funding for the next study phase leading to the development of a monitored retrievable storage (MRS) system to temporarily house high level nuclear waste generated at nuclear power plants.

But that hasn't stopped talks, plans and speculation about the future of nuclear waste disposal in the United States, and closer to home, in Mescalero.

It's been reported recently in separate publications that the proposed Mescalero sites passed muster with the Department of Energy (DOE), and that the Mescaleros are considering a private spent fuel storage operation.

According to "Nuclear Fuel," a biweekly report from the editors of Nuclear Week, the Mescalero Apaches are frustrated by the government's failure to move forward on the tribe's application to study hosting an MRS.

That has led them to explore negotiations with utilities, according to the story.

"We've had three utilities come to us asking whether we've considered a private storage facility," Mil-

ler Hudson, MRS project manager for the tribe, is quoted as saying.

"The law is more favorable if we do it privately than through the government," he reportedly said. "There's all kinds of legal precedent for doing a private facility."

John Riggs, DOE deputy assistant secretary for policy planning and program evaluation, reportedly told an industry forum that there is a question in the administration about the wisdom of an MRS. He is quoted as saying Congress is skeptical of MRS on political grounds and because of the fear that an MRS will become permanent.

MRS proponents hope that newly-confirmed Nuclear Waste Negotiator Richard Stallings will jump start the stalled project, but nobody knows what his approach will be.

Stallings reportedly told the Nuclear Energy Forum in San Francisco that he intends to be proactive in dealing with the MRS issue.

Meanwhile, the DOE reportedly completed its preliminary assess-

ment of the Mescalero and the Goshute proposed MRS sites, and declared both meet the criteria to host an MRS.

The DOE concluded that all proffered sites are suitable for moving forward in the voluntary siting process, according to a report in the MRS Newsletter.

Results of the assessment are included in a DOE report.

The federal government has made a commitment to the nuclear power industry to take responsibility for storage of its spent fuel, and the deadline on that commitment is looming while the amount of spent fuel is growing.

Reports this month in The Dallas Morning News that the DOE's storage pools are breaking down and leaking radioactivity, may prompt that federal agency to push for a quick solution.

According to a New York Times Service report, millions of pounds of highly radioactive reactor fuel have been sitting in Energy Department storage pools for so long that they are breaking down and spreading radioactivity.

The DOE has 29 pools or clusters of pools in South Carolina, Washington and Idaho — all three in rural areas, "limiting the danger that the public will be exposed."

"But deterioration has already exposed dozens of workers to sharply higher radiation levels."

"Any radioactive material that escapes could spread for many years."

Officials reportedly displayed "underwater photos of metal parts that are now so deformed that they look as if they might have been taken off the Titanic."

That breakdown in pool storage might make the development of a Monitored Retrievable Storage facility — dry storage — even more attractive to the DOE.

Thomas P. Grumbly, assistant secretary of energy for environmental restoration and waste management, reportedly said that the department has only one solution to the problem: storing the fuel in concrete and steel casks.

"Here we are at the edge of a spent-fuel crisis and all we have is dry casking technology," he is quoted as saying.

### Discipline update tops the Ruidoso school board agenda

Ruidoso school district administration officials will report to school board members Tuesday about the progress of a community committee on a secondary discipline policy, a student sexual harassment policy and on priorities for Native American students set during an annual meeting with Mescalero representatives.

The meeting will begin at 7 p.m. in the board room of the administration offices.

The need for a revamped policy that teachers, students, parents and administrators understand and that can be enforced equitably became clear last month when a parent complained that her daughter had been sexually harassed by another student.

Other items on the agenda include the central office holiday schedule, a report on the annual convention of the New Mexico School Board Association, a Head Start student transportation agreement, setting a procedure to select a name for the new primary school at White Mountain and acceptance of the resignation of Marilyn Trotter as instructional assistant at Nob Hill Elementary.

### Water tests begin in January

Beginning in January, personnel from the State Engineer District Office in Roswell and personnel from the United States Geological Survey-Water Resources Division, will begin their cooperative water level measuring program in the Hondo Basin, Penasco Basin, Roswell Basin and the newly declared underground water basin extensions.

It is anticipated that personnel will be working in this area from January through most of April.

For more information or details concerning measurements on specific wells, contact the State Engineer Office in Roswell, or the U.S.G.S. office in Albuquerque.


### December cloud pageant

## Editorial

### What you don't know can hurt you

Holidays are happy times for many families as they gather to celebrate the season. For too many women, however, that togetherness is not only unhappy, it may be life-threatening.

In the United States, a woman is battered every 15 seconds by her husband or boyfriend. Battering causes more injuries to women than auto accidents, rapes and muggings combined.

Domestic violence crosses all boundaries — age, race, religion and socioeconomic level. It is not a private problem or simply an issue to be addressed through social service channels. Rather, people everywhere — homes, schools, the workplace, religious institutions, the media — need to learn more about domestic violence.

Misconceptions about domestic violence help perpetuate the problem. For example, as with rape, often the victim of abuse is held responsible. "Why did she stay?" people ask. A woman may be trapped in an abusive relationship in a number of ways. She may not have economic independence — the house and credit are in his name, he might prevent her from having a job or force her to give him her paycheck if she is employed.

The batterer may insist she not talk with friends and family, isolating her from the people who would support her. Many women have nowhere to go. Some battered women's shelters aren't able to take children, and women may be understandably reluctant to leave their children with the abuser. Most shelters are underfunded and short on space, thus requiring them to turn away women who seek their services.

In addition, leaving an abusive partner doesn't necessarily mean a woman is safe. In fact, her life may be most at risk as she is in the process of ending the relationship. Thousands of women are killed each year as a result of domestic violence.

Focusing on why women stay takes attention away from the source of the problem: men who batter. Battering is about power and control. Traditionally, it has been acceptable for men to maintain control over women using whatever means necessary, including violence.

Men who batter have not been held accountable by the definitions of courts and not by society as a whole. Misconceptions stating that stress or drugs and alcohol cause domestic violence have served to keep men from taking responsibility for their actions.

Society contributes to the problem through its definitions of what it means to be a man. The behaviors that comprise a healthy, caring relationship — i.e., shared decisionmaking, mutual nurturing and support — are viewed as unmasculine because they represent a giving up of man's control.

Despite the prevalence of domestic violence, it is not receiving the attention it deserves. As communities and the nation focus on crime and violence, they ignore the fact that for millions of women, the most dangerous place to be is their own living room.

Education can inform people about the services available but more importantly, it can provide the link to ending abuse by changing attitudes. If ignorance and misinformation perpetuate domestic violence, then education can help end it.

This holiday season, make the world a safer place by educating people about domestic violence. Contact a battered women's program in your area and ask for a speaker to come to your workplace, school, place of worship or community group.

## Successful retailer raises hackles of competitors

A cautionary tale wafted out of Arkansas last month, one that affects New Mexico no less than any other state. The nation's largest retailer, the multibillion-dollar Wal-Mart Stores, Inc., was found guilty in a state courtroom of deliberately trying to drive small competitors out of business through "predatory pricing."

This colorful term is defined in the nation's antitrust laws, which seek to assure some sense of fairness in the marketplace. It refers to prices that are set so low by huge, rich companies that there is no way for independent competitors to match those prices and make the profit they need to survive.


And this court ruling puts a new and darker face on Wal-Mart's familiar promise: "Always the lowest price. Always."

For years the meteoric rise of Wal-Mart has been lauded as the quintessential American success story: How the chain's plain-spoken, pickup-driving founder, "Mr. Sam" Walton, built one small dry-goods store in Arkansas into a mega-mega-merchandise by servicing his customers, taking care of his employees and, of course, always giving the lowest price.

The legend was enhanced by a highly touted policy of "buying American" whenever possible.

Along the way, Wal-Mart shot past such long-established empires as Sears, K-Mart and Montgomery Ward to achieve the pinnacle in retail sales. In thousands of large, midsize and small communities, including many in New Mexico, big Wal-Mart outlets appeared. And Mr. Sam, who died last year, became the country's richest man, a billionaire several times over.

In recent times, however, cracks in the Wal-Mart facade began to appear. There was, for example, the town on the Texas plains that



watched its formerly thriving business district shrivel and die when Wal-Mart came. And then, after the locals had gone out of business, the chain decided that its store was not making enough money and closed it, forcing residents to drive long distances to other towns to do their basic shopping.

That was the Massachusetts community that mobilized to keep out the store that Wal-Mart announced it planned to open there. Knowing what would happen to the local way of life if the big discounter came in, merchants, government officials and residents united in opposition and turned the chain away.

And then there was the recently reported discovery that much of the "made-in-America" merchandise that Wal-Mart bragged about selling was not manufactured here at all, but was produced on the cheap in countries fiercely challenging the United States.

In last month's predatory-pricing case in Arkansas, Judge David Reynolds found that Wal-Mart had violated state anti-trust law by selling drugs and health and beauty aids below costs in the town of Conway. Three independent pharmacies fled the lawsuit.

In his ruling the judge noted that Wal-Mart maintained an in-store list of the prices charged by the three plaintiffs and other local competitors. He noted also that Wal-Mart's prices varied widely in markets with more or less competition.

In its defense, Wal-Mart admitted to selling some items below cost, but said it was just to attract customers, not run anyone out of business. But to the judge, the evidence spelled out an intentional campaign by Wal-Mart to squeeze out its competitors. He ordered an end to the predatory practices, and awarded the plaintiffs \$300,000 in damages.

Cheered by the verdict, other small retailers nationwide started thinking about bringing their own antitrust lawsuits against Wal-Mart and other ruthless merchandising giants. But first they must await the final outcome of the Arkansas test.

The case is now headed to the state's Supreme Court and, if need be, the U.S. Supreme Court. Despite the "predatory" label, some well-placed observers predict a reversal, on the ground that curtailing Wal-Mart's pricing policies would be a "restraint of trade," and therefore even more unlawful.

But whichever legalism prevails, one thing remains clear. Whether intentional or unintentional, whether legal or illegal, the growth of chain operations is steadily eliminating local enterprises all across the country.

Whatever the business — groceries, clothing, drugstores, newspapers, entertainment, hardware, all sorts of services, whatever — small entrepreneurs are finding it increasingly difficult to hang in there with the big guys. And each time one goes under, a town loses another piece of its individuality.

However this matter turns out, these scrappers have earned the thanks of everyone who believes that the truest value in our national life are not always reflected by the lowest prices.


