Ruidoso Police reported no major accidents or incidents to slow tourists and skiers over the holiday weekend. Lieutenant Michael Lovelace credited ideal weather for motorists for the safe travel. "The majority of stores were closed Saturday, so it was real quiet in the downtown area," Lovelace said. The MainStreet construction project was shut down during last week to facilitate merchants for Christmas shopping. The orange barrels and wooden walkways created for the project have provided easier access to Midtown stores. Lovelace said downtown traffic Sunday was a steady stream lot, but not much foot traffic other than Wal-mart, which was packed. Ski shops are geared up for a busy week with holiday visitors heading to Ski Apache. Minor incidents kept Bonito Fire Department (BFD) and Lincoln County Emergency Medical Services (LCEMS) Alto busy over Christmas weekend. Sunday afternoon both services responded to a golf cart rollover on the sixth fairway of Alto Lakes Golf and Country Club. Katherine Payne and her eight year-old-son, Ryan, of Edmond, Oklahoma, were passengers riding in

a golf cart driven by an Alto Village resident who asked not to be identified.

The driver said the cart hit a patch of ice and spun out of control, hitting a tree and rolling over.

"I've driven that spot 100 times, but when I hit that ice I just lost it," said the embarrassed driver. He said his shoulder was hurt in the incident.

Mrs. Payne said she might have been knocked unconscious, but refused treatment.

Her son, Ryan, who had numerous cuts and bruises, was transported to Lincoln County Medical Center by LCEMS-Alto.

The driver was not cited at the scene.

Earlier on Sunday morning, LCEMS-Alto responded to Gady's Pick and Pack convenience store in Alto where a man claimed to have been injured when his leg became trapped between the bumpers of two cars while he was pumping gas. He later refused transport.

On Christmas Day, BFD responded to a dumpster fire on NM 48 at the top of Angus Hill. Fire officials confirmed someone had illegally discarded hot fireplace ashes into the dumpster. Firefighters contained the blaze within minutes.

They cautioned residents as well as visitors not to dispose of fireplace ashes that way.

Instead, they said to place them in a metal container, not a dumpster owned by the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority, drown them, and cover the container.

Auditor criticizes garbage authority for past policies

Six criticisms focusing on violations of procurement regulations, lack of inventory control, inadequate security for public deposits and failure to withhold state retirement money were cited in the 1991-93 audit of the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority.

General manager Joe Lewandowski pointed out that most of the conditions cited have been corrected since he was hired last June. The period of the audit primarily covers the previous management over the 24 months ending June 30, 1992 and June 30, 1993.

"The reportable conditions noted were violations of procurement regulations, incomplete records of official board minutes, lack of physical fixed asset inventory control, inadequate security for public deposits and violation of PERA (Public Employees Retirement Act) statutory requirements," auditor Ron Hemphill of Ruidoso wrote in his summary to the State Auditor. "However, we believe none of the reportable conditions described above is a material weakness."

A material weakness is a reportable condition that occurs when a specific internal control element doesn't reduce to a low level the risk that significant errors or irregularities may occur and not be detected within a timely period.

Hemphill cited the authority for violating state law as well as the financial liability of being responsible for the employee and employer portions and penalty and interest under the PERA.

He wrote that the authority adopted the retirement program effective March 1, 1993, but the management failed to report all covered wages for the period from March to June 30.

Under cause for the condition, Hemphill stated that initially, the prior management was unaware of the PERA requirements.

"However, after being made aware of the regulation, the prior management disregarded the requirements," he wrote.

Lewandowski responded that he has identified the deficiencies and has met with PERA officials to determine the amount owed, which came to \$7,800.

Dealing with security for public deposits, Hemphill noted that neither of the two institutions where deposits were held on June 30 was underpledged.

"However, during the year, one institution held balances in excess of the FDIC (Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation) insured amount without pledged security. Deposits from operations resulted in bank balances greater than FDIC insurance during seven monthly periods," he wrote. "In addition to being a possible statutory violation, there could be a loss of public funds if the bank was to fail. (State statutes require) that all public funds be secured at 50-cents on each \$1 above the \$100,000 FDIC insured amount for each depositor for each public body."

Hemphill recommended that pledging requirements be closely

Quake shakes county

Tremors from a minor earthquake were felt in Ruidoso about 12:25 p.m. Wednesday.

Bob Redden, earthquake preparedness manager for the State Department of Public Safety in Santa Fe, confirmed late Thursday that a quake of 3.4 magnitude occurred east of Ruidoso.

The National Earthquake Information Center in Denver previously reported that no quake registered on their instruments. A sonic boom was suggested as the cause.

But seismic instruments in Carlsbad and Socorro both picked up the activity and pinpointed the epicenter at Glencoe at a depth of four kilometers below the surface.

"The faults in that area show no evidence of activity in thousands of years," Redden said. "Most of the action takes place along the Rio Grande rift (which extends from the Colorado border to the Mexico border along the path of the river), but no area of the state is immune."

Redden said no surface damage or ruptures were reported.

"It takes a quake of the magnitude of 2.5, depending on the depth, for people on the surface to feel it," he said. "Otherwise, only the instruments pick them up."

Officials with New Mexico Tech's seismic laboratory analyzed the incident and conveyed their findings to Redden.

U.S. Geological Survey instruments also recorded the quake, however Redden said that agency is more a part of a worldwide network and doesn't concentrate on New Mexico.

Quick access to the information about the earthquake was possible because of the new program Redden heads in the state.

New Mexico is designated as a moderate risk state for earthquakes by the Federal Emergency Management Agency, but its neighbors are not as lucky. Arizona is noted as a high risk state and California as very high risk state, according to information provided by Redden.

New Mexico's seismic vulnerability was determined from three criteria: historic large earthquakes of a magnitude of seven or greater that have occurred inside the state; moderate earthquakes (magnitude 5-6) that have occurred in New Mexico, but are unrelated to surface fault movement (such as those random earthquakes that occurred in 1906 near Socorro, 1935 in Belen, 1965 in Dulce and 1992 in Rattlesnake Canyon near Carlsbad) and surface faults that have been active in the geologically recent past (within the last 250,000 years) and that could generate a large earthquake (magnitude 7-7.5) in the future.

In 1992, New Mexico joined 31 other states as part of the National Earthquake Hazards Reduction Program, originally directed by the Earthquake Hazards Reduction Acts of 1977. That membership plus the moderate risk designation made the state eligible for Federal Emergency Management Agency money, more than \$50,000 for 1993.

The goal of the New Mexico pro-

Questions surface over inmates' pay

Vague guidelines that appear to provide wide latitude in the handling of paychecks for prison inmate employees are worrying local garbage collection officials.

Joe Lewandowski, general manager of the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority, told *The Ruidoso News* last week that until he receives some definitive answers, regular taxes and benefits will be withheld from the checks of inmates employed at the recycling center starting today.

"I asked about it when I first came on (in June), but I'll start withholding with the next check until we get some answers," he said.

Questions about what the authority should be withholding from checks of inmates on work release programs from Camp Sierra Blanca Adult Rehabilitation Center surfaced last week.

Authority board members were discussing a midyear revised budget when member Wilton Howell came across \$16,000 in contract labor.

Lewandowski explained that the money covered two inmates from the minimum security prison. Inmate labor is exempt from some withholding requirements, he said.

But Howell disagreed.

"When I got audited last time, I was assessed (withholding and a penalty for inmates used in his business)," Howell said. "Get a professional opinion on that. I guarantee you the (prison camp or inmates) don't pay it."

Attorney J. Robert Beauvais, who represents the authority, said he also has used inmates.

"I called the camp and was told no workman's compensation or retirement benefits had to be withheld," he said.

Assistant warden Tom Sullivan told *The News* that his standard advice is for the person, business or government entity employing an inmate to check with their own accountants.

"They're the ones who will have to answer to the IRS," Sullivan said.

"Every situation is different. There are a lot who use part-time people, others call them in for one particular job for one or two days. That could be called contract labor. But a lot send regular payroll checks with all of the deductions."

Lewandowski said he considered the inmates being provided by the camp in much the same way a temporary employment service would send a typist or secretary.

"The temp service actually employs them and is responsible for any withholding. The inmates don't

see 40 hours worth of pay," he said. "We just call and say we need someone for a certain period of time. The checks are made out to the camp and the inmate and they are mailed directly to the camp. I know the camp withholds some money. What do they do with it?"

Both of the inmates now working at the center put in 40 hours a week. One has been there since before Lewandowski was hired last June. Neither one drives vehicles as part of their jobs and they always are under supervision, he said.

"It's definitely not contract labor. That's what I got rid of when I came in," Lewandowski said. "The previous manager was using temporary employees trying to avoid paying PERA (Public Employees Retirement Act) and some other costs, but that doesn't work anymore because the federal rules have changed. Even if (non-inmate employees) make only \$10 on a job, you have to withhold."

Sullivan said when the camp receives an inmate's check, officials withhold 20 percent to be used to offset some of the cost of housing and feeding the inmate; 15 percent goes to the crime victim restitution fund; and 15 percent is set aside until \$300 has been accumulated. At that point, the inmate can send the money he receives back to his

family or can use it to buy items at the canteen.

Lewandowski said he'll check with auditor Ron Hemphill to ensure the paychecks are handled correctly by the authority. Meanwhile, he also intends to check on the authority's liability in using inmates.

"It seems like a loose operation and I need to know exactly where we stand on that," he said.

Robert Gieseke of the State Labor Department said the only exemption that specifically applies to inmates working for public or non-profit entities is unemployment insurance. The employer is not required to withhold for state unemployment compensation.

Lewandowski said in reading information on PERA, no exemption is listed for inmates, only for temporary seasonal workers with under four months of employment a year or for elected officials.

Officials with the Department of Corrections in Santa Fe referred calls from *The Ruidoso News* back to Sullivan, apparently because the department's public information officer was on vacation.

Officials with the State Department of Taxation and Revenue referred calls back to the labor department. Gieseke said the only definite answer would have to come from the Internal Revenue Service.

monitored. Institutions should be rated to determine if 50 percent pledging is adequate on any given institution.

Lewandowski responded that pledged collateral from each bank will be required if cash balances exceed FDIC insurance levels.

Hemphill criticized the authority for failing to establish a list of fixed assets owned by the agency.

Lewandowski responded that a fixed asset list is being compiled and that he recently initiated a tagging process.

Hemphill noted that procurement regulations adopted on June 15, 1992, which are stricter than the state procurement code, had been violated.

"Previous authority management complied with procurement regulations on material purchases, but apparently disregarded regulations on smaller purchase amounts," he wrote. "Current management was unaware of the regulations adopted (in 1992) and was attempting to comply with the less restrictive state regulations."

He recommended that Lewandowski become familiar with all adopted policies and regulations. If the local purchasing policy is too restrictive, the board should reconsider and take appropriate action to change it.

Lewandowski said he is reviewing the procurement regulations and will submit recommendations for changes to the board.

He said that the violations were small items, nothing more than \$500.

Hemphill wrote that he also found several minutes of board meetings that had not been signed after approval. Adjournments into executive sessions as recorded in the minutes also did not comply with the required procedures of the Open Meetings Act.

"This condition was noted in the prior audit, yet management did not complete the minutes noted as incomplete," Hemphill stated.

Lewandowski said the current management is obtaining the signatures needed and has corrected references to the executive sessions.

"However, minimal effort has been expended to complete those

minutes noted as deficient," he wrote.

Like many other small government entities, the authority also was cited for failing to prepare its own financial statements.

Hemphill noted that financial statements are the responsibility of management. The auditor is to examine them and express an opinion on them.

But he acknowledged that authority employees do not have the necessary expertise to prepare financial statements. Without an increase in financial department staff, the agency will not be able to prepare the statements and no changes are anticipated for the period ending June 30, 1994.

Local woman's dispute with state mirrors similar incident leading to lawsuit involving state agency

Cabinet Secretary Laura Threet of the State General Services Department (GSD) has withdrawn an architectural contract award to a Roswell firm amid allegations that her agency rigged the contract award process.

The proposed Farm and Ranch Heritage Museum will be located in Las Cruces and is a \$10-million project with architect fees of about \$500,000.

Ruidoso resident Hazel Haynsworth voiced some of the same complaints to Threet about the state agency in her bid to get a Human Services Department (HSD) contract worth about \$500,000.

Both contracts were awarded from questionable requests for proposals (RFP).

In defiance of state statutes, the public was prohibited from viewing both contracts even after the bids were awarded. Both complaints were submitted to the Attorney General's office.

Officials from that office decided

to move against Threet and the GSD after the architectural firm of McHugh, Lloyd and Tryk sued the state agency.

Threet invited the nine other architectural firms that submitted RFPs on the museum to attend interviews with a new selection committee next month.

"That was direction from the Attorney General's Office," Threet said last Friday. "Basically, the original award was declared void."

But Steve French, lawyer for architects McHugh, Lloyd, Tryk, said her proposal for a new round of interviews is unlawful. He reminded Threet that only the top three firms would be interviewed, according to the RFP specifications. French represents all three.

"Further," said French, "your actions of awarding the bid to Architecture Plus, a non-responsive bidder, are already the subject of a suit filed in the First Judicial District."

Dan Yohalem, lawyer with the AG's office, has declined comment on the matter.

The Santa Fe firm sued the GSD last month, charging the state rigged the process for choosing Architecture Plus, headed by Steve Strain of Roswell.

The lawsuit alleges Architecture Plus never should have made it to the final interview round and charges that documents used by a selection committee to evaluate firms were later erased and changed.

Threet, in a story written by Ben Neary of the Albuquerque Journal, wouldn't comment on French's allegations because of the pending litigation. She also said she has no comment on the AG's actions in voiding the original award.

Haynsworth has never received a reply on her problems with the HSD lease from the AG's office.

Last year, the local HSD lease in the Stroud building was about \$13,000. The new contract was budgeted for \$37,000, but the award to Roswell builder Don Elwell Jr. was over \$61,000 with an escalating clause at 3.5 percent a year that eventually will drive the

cost to \$77,609 per year. HSD officials have said that cost is for the first phase only.

Not only was Haynsworth's bid \$100,000 less than Elwell's, but several areas of the RFP were either wrong or not properly presented by the selection committee, just as the architectural firms alleged in its suit.

Furthermore, residents of the neighborhood where the building is being constructed say Human Services (HSD) officials wrote letters and testified in favor of Elwell's proposal and against one submitted by Haynsworth.

Both Threet and HSD cabinet secretary Dick Heim were aware of the lobbying for Elwell and still allowed the contract to go forth. They said those officials were told not to do it again.

Calls by *The Ruidoso News* to neighboring towns regarding other requests for proposals for other Human Services lease contracts turned up similar circumstances where bidders said Threet is allowing special treatment.

BLM provides two cattle guards in Lincoln County

Lincoln County received two cattle guards from the federal Bureau of Land Management in Roswell recently.

In exchange, the county allowed the agency (BLM) to use a county gravel pit for road work at Fort Stanton, according to a news release from BLM officials.

"These kinds of trades go on all the time," said Roswell District spokesman Howard Parman. "Last year, the BLM gave Lincoln County about 2,100 cubic yards of caliche (rough gravel material) worth \$2,415 to use on county roads.

The total value of the latest trade is \$3,050. County road department employees will install the cattle guards near Corona.

Agency officials currently are reviewing roads that serve BLM land to determine whether they can provide other cattle guards for the county to install.

County commissioners say federal agencies such as BLM and the U.S. Forest Service should participate more actively in road maintenance costs when those roads provide access to their land.

Area man accused of rape

A Hondo Valley man was arrested Christmas Day after a Ruidoso woman accused him of rape and unlawful confinement.

Bobby Baker, about 39, was arrested by Lincoln County Sheriff's deputies at his motel room after a woman he met in a Ruidoso Downs bar Christmas Eve said he raped her and kept her captive for about 12 hours.

According to police reports, the woman, also about 39, had walked to the Hollywood Bar Christmas Eve where she met Baker.

The woman said the two played pool together, and when she decided to walk home, Baker offered her a ride. They then left for his apartment about 9 p.m.

According to the woman, the two drank all night, sang Christmas carols and then about 6 a.m., the woman said Baker forced himself

on her. She said a second rape occurred about 3 p.m. when they awoke to someone knocking on the door. She said when she tried to respond, Baker allegedly put a belt around her neck and beat her about the face. Sheriff's officers said she had bruises about the face and a black eye.

Sometime shortly after 5 p.m., the woman said Baker stood over her with a rope and a knife in a threatening manner in which she said she feared for her life. She said a third rape occurred.

The woman said after the third rape, Baker made her take a shower before he drove her back to her motel apartment in Ruidoso. From there she walked to Lincoln County Medical Center where she was treated and released.

After his arrest Saturday, Baker was taken to the Lincoln County jail. Magistrate Judge William Butts set bail at \$100,000.

Sis is waiting for a new family

They called her Sis and she was a member of their family. But now Sis has been abandoned to an uncertain fate at the Lincoln County Humane Society animal shelter.

The blue heeler is spayed, housebroken and absolutely loves children, according to a questionnaire filled out by the former owner, who only noted that he couldn't keep her. She's about four years old.

Shelter manager Esther Harper said Sis would do well primarily as a house dog and should be kept in a secure area when outside, because she may try to jump fences.

The owners noted that Sis knows the "sit" command and rides well in a car, Harper said.

"She's friendly, but shy at times. She's very family oriented, moderately active and is not a barker or noisy dog."

Sis is a medium size animal.

Her kennel companion is a 12-week old female blue heeler brought in as a stray.

"She's real loving and sweet, just a little shy and also not a barker," Harper said. Shelter workers are calling her Ditto, because she stays close to Sis and follows the older dog's lead.

Two male Rottweiler pups, Macho and Machismo, remain at the shelter out of a litter of four reportedly purebred offspring brought in by the owner.

They have long tails and very large paws. They arrived without their shots, but appear to be robust and healthy, and are very affectionate.

"If people who intend to bring us their pups would just get their shots first, it could save their lives," said office manager Kathy Tetreault. It takes two weeks for the first shot to take effect. Even then, it's not a guarantee. Pups need their whole series of shots to have the best chance at survival.

It is an absolute necessity that new owners take animals they have adopted to a veterinarian within the first week for their free examination, their rabies shot or for their Parvo-Corona-distemper immunization series. Without the full series, animals are not protected.

Because shelter workers don't know whether strays are carrying diseases or have been given shots, they do their best to keep pups isolated. But until the shelter is expanded next spring and more space is available, the task is difficult.

Foster homes can help by providing a disease free environment for the first few weeks.

But the only real answer is owner responsibility, through spaying and neutering to eliminate unwanted litters, by not allowing animals to run loose, and through proper medical care and immunizations.

It's taxpayers and humane supporters who bear the financial burden for pet owners who fail to neuter their animals and then refuse to care for the resulting litters of pups and kittens.

Ruidoso's mandatory spay and neuter law and leash ordinance allow village officials to levy heavy fines on offenders who fail to properly restrain their animals or allow them to reproduce and then do not

provide a home for the offspring.

State law now also requires all animals adopted from shelters to be spayed or neutered.

More than 8-million pets a year are killed in shelters and municipal pounds across the nation. The only humane solution is to limit reproduction, not to destroy millions of wonderful companions.

Lonesome Pine Angus has been added to the Angus Association

Lonesome Pine Angus, Picacho, is a new member of the American Angus Association, reports Dick Spader, executive vice president of the national organization with headquarters in St. Joseph, Missouri.

The American Angus Association with more than 24,000 active adult and junior members, is the largest beef cattle registry association in the world. Its computerized records include detailed information on nearly 11 million registered Angus.

The association records ancestral information and keeps records of production on individual animals for its members. These permanent records help members select and mate the best animals in their herds to produce high quality, efficient breeding cattle which are then recorded with the American Angus Association.

Most of these registered Angus are used the U.S. farmers and ranchers who raise high quality beef for U.S. consumption.

The Arbor Day Foundation offers free tree booklet

A free booklet is available from the National Arbor Day Foundation to assist homeowners, farmers and others to plan for spring tree planting.

Called "Conservation Trees for Your Farm, Family and Future," the booklet uses colorful photos and illustrations and easy to understand descriptions to guide tree planting and care.

"This new booklet is part of a multi-organization effort to help farmers and ranchers make trees an integral part of sustainable agriculture," said John Rosenow, the foundation's executive director.

They are: riparian filter strips, alley cropping, tree plantations, wildlife habitat, living snow fences, trees for livestock, farmstead windbreaks, woodlot management, field windbreaks, specialty crops, trees for recreation areas and multi-purpose plantings.

Skeen objects to inequities

The federal government appears to favor other regions of the national forest system over the Southwest and U.S. Representative Joe Skeen wants to stop the inequity.

The Republican from New Mexico has written U.S. Comptroller General Charles A. Bowsher to ask for a thorough review of Forest Service funding allocations.

"Federal funding for the Southwest Region, when compared to funds allocated to other Forest Service Regions, is grossly inequitable," Skeen wrote, noting that the Southwest Region, which includes New Mexico, contains 21 million acres compared to 24 million acres in the service's Northwest Region. Yet the Northwest Region has almost twice the funds (\$95.2-million) to manage non-timber related resources than does the Southwest Region (\$56.3-million) in fiscal year 1993.

"We would like to make the point that the methods used to evaluate the funding needs of one region should apply to all of the regions," Skeen said in the letter, which was co-signed by U. S. Representative Jim Kolbe, (R-Arizona), a member of the House Appropriations subcommittee on Interior.

The judges will walk session participants through the system, explaining the different jurisdictions of municipal, magistrate, district, appeals and supreme courts.

"Family and Domestic Relations," one of the major areas of activity for law enforcement agencies and the courts, will be reviewed by attorneys Karen Parsons and Richard Hawthorne on January 27.

Parsons will be back on February 3 with one of her partners, Dan Bryant, to teach "Mediation and Alternate Dispute Resolution," an alternative to tying up your effort


and the court's times.

On March 30, attorney Gary Mitchell and assistant district attorney Viola Rhodes will handle the last session, "Criminal Law."




Holiday lights





Warrior boys begin Wildcats Classic Tourney

The Ruidoso Warrior boys basketball team will begin play in the Wildcat Invitational Tuesday with an 8 p.m. meeting against host Lovington.

Live coverage will be provided by KRUI Radio.

Ruidoso hasn't played a game since December 11, an 18-point loss at the Bruce King Classic, in Moriarty. The Warriors went one-and-two in that tournament and lost to Tularosa in the season opener.

Lovington is probably in the top five teams in the state in class AAA — mainly due to the talents of 6-9 post-man Taymon Domzolski, a blue-chip basketball player who is being recruited by the likes of North Carolina and Indiana, as well as New Mexico and New Mexico State.

The Wildcats are streaking in the early season, posting a perfect 5-0 mark, with AAAA Carlsbad serving as the latest victims.

Lovington won its first tournament of the year at the Seminole Invitational.

Traditionally, Ruidoso has offered little competition to Lovington in the basketball arena.

In fact, the Warriors' record book in the Wildcats' record book. Lovington has scored more points against Ruidoso than any other team; and the Warriors were the victims of Lovington's largest-ever margin of victory (82 points).

While it is apparent that Lovington has the most talent of the two teams, the Wildcats will be playing a different game than their usual running, fast-breaking style of play. With Domzolski, Lovington has been forced to limit their pressure to the half court area — and sit back in a zone.

While different, Lovington has been very effective in making opponents inside game almost impossible with the Wildcats' two Sequoias clogging up the middle.

For the Warriors to compete, they must be able to hit the three-pointer, and they must take care of the ball against the Wildcats' half-court trap.

It's likely that head coach Paul Kirkwood will start out in the "diamond-and-one" defense, which will put senior Casey Kearns man-to-man against Domzolski.

The other four Warrior defenders will play a zone.

Without backcourt pressure, Ruidoso will have a much easier

time against Lovington. The records mentioned above were caused mostly by the Warriors' long-time difficulty in handling pressing teams.

Other teams in the Warriors bracket in the Wildcat Invitational include a couple Texas teams — Plains and Denver City.

The top bracket teams are AAAA power Goddard, Seminole, EAAA Santa Fe St. Michaels and probable Class A State Champions Grady.

If the Warriors upset Lovington, Wednesday's game will be at 8 p.m.

If the Warriors fall to the Wildcats, their Wednesday consolation bracket game is scheduled for 3 p.m.

Results from Tuesday and Wednesday's games will be included in Thursday's edition of The Ruidoso News.

The top bracket will most likely feature a situation similar to the one in the hit movie "Hoosiers."

In that 1988 classic, tiny Hickory, Indiana, faced South Bend Washington, a large school with a rich basketball tradition in the State Finals.

Well, you can guess who won the game.

Lovington's answer to the Hickory-South Bend clash will be

Grady, an immensely talented small school, matched up against Roswell Goddard, who has already accounted for the Pos Corn Invitational this year in Roswell.

Both teams are favored in their respected districts, and on paper Goddard should win ... but wouldn't it be something if ... Goddard plays Seminole in the first round while Grady meets St. Michaels.

The other game has Plains, who boasts a perfect 11-0 mark so far this season, against Denver City.

Ruidoso will play either the winner or the loser of that game, based on what they do against Lovington.

Seemingly, it will take a miracle to beat Lovington, but the other teams that Ruidoso would face in the tournament are not that different in ability. Denver City and Seminole are roughly .500 so far in the season and St. Michaels is a middle-of-the-road team in northern New Mexico's District 5-AAA.

Last year in this tournament, the Warriors met Goddard in the opening round and lost badly. The second game was a similar story against Seminole and the seventh-place game was a 20-point loss to Monahans, Texas.

If the Warriors are at least competitive, it will be a moral victory for Kirkwood, who will most likely drop this tournament from the schedule — so the Warriors have a chance to play some home games in December next year.

This year, Ruidoso will play at least 23 games, with only eight played in the Warrior gym, something that worries Kirkwood.

In addition, the two-and-a-half week span between games doesn't do much to prepare Ruidoso for district play, which begins in mid-January.

While the Lovington tournament offers tough competition, it also offers a gauge to the progress that the Warriors have made under Kirkwood.

While Ruidoso's 1-3 record is exactly the same as last year's mark at this juncture, Ruidoso seems more complete as a basketball team.

The Warriors have had the lead at some point in the third quarter in all of their games, but they haven't been able to hold their advantage in the closing minutes.

If there aren't blowouts in Lovington, Ruidoso's progress will be noticeable with the district games starting in a couple of weeks.



Hard work and new leadership are expected to lead the fighting Warriors into a whole new chapter of basketball success. The Warriors face the Lovington Wildcats at 8 p.m. Tuesday to determine if they compete for the tournament championship or fall into the consolation bracket.

Start the year safely

Santa has come and gone, the gifts are all opened, Christmas dinner is over, but the festivities and travel continue. Everyone is driving to and from New Year's parties, or returning from the homes of friends and relatives. This is the time of year that we must be especially careful while in our motor vehicles.


Everyone on the highways must be on the lookout for those who ignore all warnings and common sense, and insist on driving while under the influence of drugs — mainly alcohol. Each year thousands of people are killed or maimed in traffic accidents, many of which involve drugs — mainly alcohol.

In 1991, 261 people died in alcohol-related traffic crashes in New Mexico. An alcohol involved crash occurred every 106 minutes. One person was injured in an alcohol-involved crash every two hours.

There are several things we can do to reduce the carnage on the highways. You've heard them all but it doesn't hurt to remind ourselves during the holiday season. If you are hosting a party be especially careful not to let your guests imbibe to extreme. Have non-alcoholic beverages and plenty of food available. If someone seems too intoxicated to drive, offer to drive them home. If your guests do not want a ride — insist! It's better to make them mad for a while than to allow them to drive and possibly get killed or kill someone else. Don't just think this advice is for others — you are a human being, too, and are not immune to the effects of alcohol.

This takes care of looking out for ourselves and our friends who drink, but how can we protect ourselves from others who for whatever reasons will not heed the warnings? The number one way we can protect ourselves is to remember to buckle our safety belts and put our kids in child restraint devices. Then if we do happen to "meet" one of those intoxicated drivers via an accident, we will have a better chance to come out alive and uninjured. We owe it to ourselves and our loved ones to do everything possible to make traveling safe.

Will McKean try for another term?

The governor's office hasn't officially announced if the chief executive will run again, but chances are that he will. So we have to start asking ourselves: Do we want John McKean in office for another term or not?

McKean isn't really the governor, of course, but sometimes it seems as though he is. More and more, newspaper readers see the name of Bruce King's press secretary in stories that say that "McKean commented..." or "McKean said the governor..."


Clearly, King has found a way of communicating with the media without actually talking all that much to its members.

To be fair, if a reporter wants to talk to Bruce King he or she can. The media is being kept at arm's length, but it isn't being stifled.

Still, when King was governor from 1971 to 1974, and again from 1979 to 1982, he was more accessible to the media than he is today. He is more isolated now than he was then. He had press secretaries, but none had quite the authority to speak for King that McKean does.

Early this month, for example, a newspaper story about taxes noted that "The governor's spokesman, John McKean, said that in addition to the gas tax appeal, the governor also would like to see low income tax rebates cut back by the legislature last year restored."

"McKean said the governor is most concerned about extending tax relief to the working poor — those with incomes who do not qualify for food stamps, Medicaid, or other state or federal assistance. 'The poor were hit

twice — once with the end to the rebates and the second time with the gas tax," McKean said. "The governor thinks that whenever we do, we ought to target these people."

A recent story on the governor's pardon of John Bishop, the former Ross Perot campaign official who had an old drug conviction on his record, had this quote from McKean: "It seems it would have been questionable if we hadn't pardoned him, McKean said. We don't see it as a political advantage or disadvantage."

McKean's face — not his boss's — even made it into a political cartoon about the problem of finding a place for the homeless in Albuquerque.

Chances are that reporters who quoted McKean didn't have to wait for him to ask his boss what to say. McKean is so in tune with King's thinking that more often than not, he can answer questions right off the bat.

Who is this high-profile press secretary? For 20 years McKean, now 46, was in the news

business himself, and he has been the news director for both KOAT and the old KGGM television stations.

When he began working on King's campaign for a third term, McKean figured he'd probably stop working for King when the election was over. But, he recalled, "I had a lot better time than I thought I would."

Now he talks about next year's campaign, when King plans to try for another term in office.

Sometimes, McKean can act as a lightning rod for the governor. At other times, McKean can send a message — to the Legislature, say — on behalf of his boss, without his boss having his name attached personally to the message. An able New Mexico press secretary is worth his weight in water.

McKean's background in news also gives him an instinct for the peculiar needs of news people. One of these needs is for something to say on any public issue.

No excuses are accepted by the media, which generally believes that the state constitution created the governor's office primarily for the benefit of the media.

King understands the media's needs, according to McKean. The governor hates to see a story saying "No one from the governor's office was available for comment," McKean remarked.

With McKean in office, King doesn't have to worry much that a sentence like that will find its way into the papers.

Reader says a handgun is a tool

TO THE EDITOR:

In response to Ms. Chiavario's letter — her prayer that God have mercy on our souls is very appropriate.

It is a certainty that any criminal bent on rape, robbery, pillage, plunder, mayhem and/or murder will be thrilled that she is helpless and naive and they will offer anything but mercy.

To complicate matters, we seem to have state correction officials willing to subject our community to convicts who have already committed violent crimes — a stone's throw away with seemingly little or no restrictions in their camp environment.

I for one am very appreciative of the candor expressed by assistant police chief Mike Lovelace and officer Truman McBride. I am not a gun crazed fanatic who attends survival schools and subscribes to Soldiers of Fortune.

I do realize that ultimately the personal protection and security for ourselves and family rests squarely on our own shoulders. "To protect and serve" only goes so far, usually after the fact of a crime — not in actual prevention.

A gun should be considered a tool, not much different from the alarm system on your car or the security lights on your home. They are implemented to provide per-

sonal protection and deter crime.

The gun would obviously be used only as a last resort. Why is this so appalling? Is it wrong to be determined and prepared to protect yourself and your loved ones from those who would willingly and intentionally do harm?

I am not opposed, however, to a five day waiting period. I can't believe there would be such a grave urgency to make a purchase that should normally require much forethought.

Will a waiting period deter crime? I seriously doubt it. Will it be an inconvenience? Probably, but not an unreasonable one.
