

Voters select village leaders

Voters will head for the polls over and over in 1994, with municipal elections in March, party primaries in June and the general election in November.

The villages of Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs and Capitan will conduct regular elections on March 1, 1994.

Candidates running for election must declare on January 4 in order to have their name printed on the ballot.

According to Ruidoso village clerk Tammie Maddox, anyone interested in campaigning for a position on the village council must declare candidacy on January 4, 1994, in order for their name to be placed on the ballot.

That holds true in Capitan and Ruidoso Downs, too; and candidates must sign up to run in their own village hall.

State agency reforms lease bid procedures

State cabinet secretary Richard Heim of the Human Services Department released a preliminary draft of proposed rule changes that would affect leasing state property from the agency.

Human Services (HSD) along with the General Services Department (GSD) has been criticized by State Representative John Underwood (D-Ruidoso) in the handling of a lease proposal by Ruidoso resident Hazel Haynsworth.

Haynsworth submitted a request for proposal on a HSD lease that was \$100,000 lower than that of Roswell builder Don Elwell Jr.

Haynsworth was not notified of her low bid and was denied an appeal or the right to see the winning bid after it was made public by both the GSD and HSD.

Heim said he wanted to clarify some of the statements written in The Ruidoso News on November 15 that state agencies were dealing in a cloak of secrecy.

"The 'unwritten' practice in 88-501 concerned administrative appeals, not confidentiality," wrote Heim. "The policy did not include a process for administrative appeals and, as a result, excluded them. As you know, this policy has been revised."

"On the issue of confidentiality, we have explained to you that it would be impossible to release details of a selected lease without damaging lease negotiations.

"However, we are working with the General Services Department to clarify the protest rules to make them more realistic for the protester at the same time they protect the lease negotiation process," he said.

Heim said the news story confused the HSD internal process with the state process.

"Within our agency, we will now require review and approval of all leases by the General Counsel, the Administrative Services Division director and the Deputy Secretary of Finance. Previously, our Property Management section sent its recommendation directly to GSD for final review and approval," he said.

It was the lower level selection committee of the Property Management section that concerned State Representative John Underwood. He questioned the weighting system and lobbying practices of the HSD that appeared to damage Haynsworth's chances for a lease.

Although Heim has never been in Haynsworth's building, he is in disagreement with Haynsworth's assertion that the selection committee did not properly present her restroom options.

Heim said, "the blueprints of the Haynsworth building indicate the restrooms are not directly accessible from the front lobby. Because we require a locked door between the lobby and the hallways and offices, this lack of access would have required a staff escort for all client trips to the restrooms. This is an inappropriate use of staff time."

The Haynsworth building is an open structure where halls, offices and walls can be placed anywhere in relationship to the restrooms.

Although HSD had insisted on a 90-day move in, Elwell had not closed on the land where the building is now being constructed for over a year. HSD never considered a rebid.

"You suggest that your news stories provided adequate information to stop the lease with Elwell," Heim said. "In fact, your stories did raise concerns and we delayed final approval of the lease while execu-

one mayor position for a four-year term; three council positions for four-year terms; one council position for a two-year term; and one municipal judge for a four-year term.

Ruidoso Mayor Jerry Shaw and councilors Barbara Duff, Joe Gomez, Bill Karn and Frank Potter will fulfill their terms at the end of February.

Mayor Shaw and councilors Gomez and Potter have announced they'll run for re-election, but Duff and Karn told *The News* recently they haven't decided whether they'll seek another term.

Karn said Wednesday he is seriously considering another run for public office.

Planning and Zoning Commission Chairman Robert Donaldson has thrown his hat in the ring for the two-year term.

Municipal Judge Charles Hawthorne told *The News* Wednesday he'll run for another term. A former village firefighter, Danny Garcia, has announced he'll also be running for the job of municipal judge.

In Ruidoso Downs, two members of the board, Ray Hayhurst and Margie Morales, will complete their current terms.

Both Downs trustees Morales and Hayhurst said they'll seek re-election.

In Capitan, the mayor's slot, and the offices of municipal judge and two trustees will be on the ballot. Trustees Leroy Montes and Gilbert Montoya will complete their terms, as will Mayor Frank Warth, who has announced he'll seek re-election.

Maddox said a write-in candidate may file a declaration of candidacy on Tuesday, January 18, 1994, with the same requirements as a regular candidate.

Maddox explained procedures to file for candidates interested in registering on Tuesday, January 4.

To file, certain documents are required to certify a candidate, she said. Those documents include: a declaration of candidacy, (provided by Maddox); and, a certified copy of the candidate's current affidavit of voter registration on file with the County Clerk, which has been certified by that office on a date not

earlier than November 30, 1993, and not later than January 4, 1994; or the triplicate copy of the candidate's current affidavit of registration which has been stamped by the County Clerk within the dates described.

The affidavit of voter registration, for a write-in candidate, must be certified by the County Clerk not later than January 18, 1994.

"You can have someone else file your papers for you, but the candidate has to sign an affidavit authorizing someone else to file, and the candidate has to sign the declaration of candidacy," said Maddox.

She said anyone wanting to make such prior arrangements should stop by her office (or the office of their own village clerk) and pick up the necessary forms and confirm how it can be done.

Any questions concerning the declaration of candidacy or the election should be directed to the appropriate village clerk.

Disappointed vacationers say the reality doesn't match the promise

The colorful brochure and the friendly voice at the Ruidoso Chamber of Commerce sold a tourist on a five-day stay that turned into a disaster for one Texas family.

Mr. and Mrs. Sam Swearingin said when they arrived, they found their \$72 per night cabin was so flawed they feared for their safety to stay overnight. They asked for a refund on the five days they paid up front and their request was denied.

Asked to comment, the cabin owner said his units were built in the '40s, that he doesn't represent them as new motel units. He said he tells people that they are older cabins, but they are clean and well maintained for cabins built in the '40s.

Chamber director Joan Bailey said the chamber doesn't recommend lodging, but agrees that by

giving out numbers of lodgers on a rotation basis, some persons might construe this to be a recommendation.

Bailey said she intends to talk to her board during the next meeting regarding the prevention of ill will created while visiting Ruidoso that cuts into the good will created by the chamber's overall program.

The Texas couple drove to the police department to file a complaint. They talked to officer Randy Spear about faulty wiring, cracked sinks, weak decking and other complaints. Spear told them their problem required civil action, not criminal.

Another officer, Robert Achterberg, referred them to the village planning and zoning department for any code violations.

The cabin owner said the Texas couple did not mention specific problems, but he would not have given them a refund anyhow because of his strict policy during the

Christmas season.

He said several times of the year, lodgers are deluged with reservation requests, other times lodgers sit idle.

"You're either the devil or an angel," he said of working the busy holidays. "Sometimes you have to be tough if you want to survive up here."

The cabin owner said his policy insists on a five-day stay during the Christmas season, payment in advance and no refunds. He said other times of the year, he has a 15-day and a 30-day notice for refunds, but he said he received hundreds of calls during the Christmas season, and could not afford reservations that weren't firm.

Similar policies are not unusual in many tourist areas throughout the United States, according to the State Tourism Department.

Ruidoso schools reshuffle staff to fill open slots and save district money

Reshuffling of five Ruidoso School District employees without posting job openings was tied to the effort to save operational dollars, according to Superintendent Mike Gladden.

A \$300,000 budget shortfall due to lower than projected student enrollment has prompted a series of money-saving moves by the administration.

At a school board meeting earlier this month, a substitute teacher asked why five positions had not been posted to allow all employees a chance to apply.

He said those chosen for the jobs appeared to be qualified, but he questioned the fairness of the selection process.

The moves primarily involve Ruidoso High School.

Gladden told *The Ruidoso News* Monday that he had looked into the situation and determined that the substitute was referring to a series of shifts in assignments that will result in a net savings to the district.

"We wanted to have the least effect on other programs as possible," Gladden said. "I suppose we could have posted the jobs. I had asked Don (Weems, high school principal) to announce the openings to the staff and to my knowledge that was

done."

Job posting was started last year, he said.

"We used to not post any of the openings," Gladden said. "It's not a state law. The board has now adopted a policy for posting for bona fide vacancies, but this in my mind is a realignment."

If any new positions open up in the spring, they will be posted, he said.

The series of shifts started with the resignation of the high school registrar. That position was filled by high school secretary Shay Mobley.

Cheryl Elder, the secretary at White Mountain Elementary then was shuffled into Mobley's secretarial job at the high school.

Saundra Reynolds, a longtime substitute was moved into Elder's position, but as a substitute will not collect benefits.

"The net effect of moving the secretary from the elementary school to the high school and using Saundra will be a \$5,300 savings," said district business manager Caron Snow. "(Reynolds) is not eligible for benefits and will be paid only for actual services rendered."

The only new position was that of student assistant coordinator, something initiated partly in connection with the new emphasis on

resolving student disputes.

"We were looking at the student assistant coordinator and Bob Elder, who taught industrial arts, had expressed an interest," Gladden said. "We wanted someone at the high school who already knew the kids."

Mike Gieb, a certified teacher with industrial arts background then working as an instructional assistant, filled Elder's vacancy.

"But he still will be classified as an instructional assistant because he's not under a teacher's contract, although his pay may be higher because he is certified," Snow said.

James Gieb, a long-term substitute paid out of a federal project, took over as instructional assistant in a move that will supplement the district's operational budget.

"We will use about \$6,000 of drug assistance grant money in some application in the (Elder-Gieb-Gieb) assignments, but I'm not sure exactly where at this time," Snow said.

"The net effect of the whole movement will save the district dollars, although some individuals might make more in moving from one post to another."

"Everything we do now is tied to saving district money and utilizing every other funding avenue we can find."

Trash authority learns it's handling inmates payroll deductions correctly

Garbage officials are breathing easier now that they have received word that they've been correctly handling pay checks for inmate laborers.

"We called Bruce Bryan of the Labor Department in Alamogordo and our auditor Ron Hemphill," said Joe Lewandowski, general manager of the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority. "They both said the inmates (from Camp Sierra Blanca Adult Rehabilitation Center) are not considered employees of non-profit or government entities like the solid waste authority."

"The villages of Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs don't withhold either. The inmates work for the camp."

The inmates qualify for a work release program at the minimum

security camp. The authority currently only employs one inmate, who has worked at the recycling center since before Lewandowski was hired last June.

Lewandowski said that exemption to withholding covers state retirement, worker's compensation, taxes and all of the other normal withholding such as social security.

Earlier this month, authority board member Wilton Howell raised the possibility that the group should be withholding taxes and other items. He said he had been penalized and required to pay back withholding for inmates he uses in his businesses after an audit.

"If the entity using the inmates is private, for profit, the taxes and such have to be withheld. That's why Wilton had to pay," Lewandowski said.

Bryan said he could not comment on the situation to the newspaper and Hemphill was out of town Wednesday.

Assistant warden Tom Sullivan previously told *The Ruidoso News* that he routinely advises those persons, businesses or government entities using inmates to check with their own accountants on the proper handling of withholding.

He said when the camp receives a check for an inmate, it takes out 20 percent to use toward the cost of housing and feeding the felon, 16 percent goes to the victim restitution fund and 16 percent is put in a type of savings account for the inmate until \$300 is accumulated. After that, the inmate can use that portion of the check to send home or to buy items in the canteen.

tives with the Human Services and General Services departments investigated. Both agencies determined the lease procurement was legal and appropriate within existing regulations.

"Recognizing that those regulations are imperfect, we are revising the rules. However, the department could not have withdrawn from lease negotiations at such a late date without exacerbating the situation and exposing itself to a lawsuit we could not win."

Last week, the Attorney General's office declared one lease award by the GSD void. The circumstances surrounding that lease award were similar to Haynes-

worth's complaints.

Heim cautioned that the new rules proposed are subject to change.

HSD's General Counsel must review the policy and the department must conduct public hearings, a 60- to 90-day process, before the new rules become effective, he said.

The revisions include: the Office of the Secretary will exert greater control over costs through the establishment of a cost ceiling to be set by the Administrative Services Division director and approved by the Deputy Secretary for Finance.

The Office of the Secretary will assert greater control over the development of the Request for Proposals and the development of a

lease agreement through General Counsel, ASD director and deputy secretary review and approval.

And, the selection of leased space should reflect community concerns through the membership of a community representative on the Evaluation Committee.

Heim said the proposal to place greater weight on cost is being looked at by the General Services Department through its own policy-making authority.

He said GSD also is addressing the issue of lease length.

Heim said in the future, he would direct employees to limit comment in public meetings to factual information in an executive policy statement being drafted.

—Vehicle on Skylane hit Bernadette White and fled the scene about 4:45 p.m. A report was taken.


—Victor Aretice and friend at 6:50 p.m. reported a "dummy in the road" forced him into an accident on Tonto Drive.

Warriors get second win at Lovington Tourney; get set to tip off with St. Michaels at 3 p.m. today

The Ruidoso Warriors boys basketball team got its second win of the season in Wednesday's second round of the Lovington invitational tournament with a 61-60 heart-stopper over Denver City, Texas.

The win moved the Warriors to 2-4 on the season, while Denver City fell to 8-8.

The Warriors fell to Lovington in the opening round, 77-42, on Tuesday.

Propelled by a season-high 27-point effort by junior Raul Davis, the Warriors led Denver City virtually the whole game, trailing only at the end of the first quarter and late in the game.

The Warriors trailed by four, 18-14 after one quarter but took command by outscoring the Mustangs 21-10 in the second stanza and headed for the locker room with a 35-28 advantage.

Confident after perhaps their best quarter of play of the year, it appeared that Ruidoso would improve its position and draw away to an easy win with a similar performance in the third quarter, it

didn't happen that way. Denver City fought back — compliments of some good free throw shooting and numerous turnovers by the Warriors against an average press. In fact, Ruidoso turned the ball over 14 more times than Denver City for the game.

Taking a slim one-point advantage into the fourth quarter, Ruidoso held onto the lead until the two-minute mark, when Denver City took the lead with an easy bucket.

Cory Hood went to the free throw line and missed two opportunities to tie the game up with 1:30 left in the game, and the Warriors quickly found themselves playing defense again. At this point, Raul Davis came away with a big steal and passed the ball to Hood again, who was promptly fouled with a minute left in the game.

Trailing 60-59, Hood got his first free throw — knotting the game at 60. His second attempt sailed long, but the Warriors got the ball back when the Mustangs knocked it out of bounds. The inbounds play saw Casey Kearns get whistled for a

charge and Denver City had the ball again with 40 seconds left in the game.

After calling a timeout to set up a play, the Mustangs ran the clock down a few seconds before Corvin Lester came up with a huge steal and broke loose down the floor for what seemed to be a layup.

Again, it didn't happen that way. Lester was fouled and sent to the line to shoot two free shots. Either one would give the Warriors the lead and avert an overtime.

Lester missed his first free throw of the season on his first try and Denver City called a timeout to let the junior think it over.

The strategy didn't work, however, as Lester nailed the second attempt and gave the Warriors a slippery one-point lead.

With nine seconds left, the Mustangs got the ball down the court quickly and dished off to their big man, Greg Horton, who was promptly fouled by Daniel Espinosa to save the layup.

Horton, who had missed four earlier free throw attempts, held true to form and his game-tying attempt sailed left and despite miss-

ing the rebound and having to weather another short jumper, the Warriors had gained their second win for Kirkwood in four at bats as Raul Davis controlled the final board of the game.

"I was a little disappointed with the way we played in the third quarter ... but heck, these kids won the game and had a chance to lose it ... they just wouldn't give up," said Kirkwood after the game.

"These guys played hard and gave themselves a chance to win and came away with big plays when we had to have them, really I couldn't ask for anything more ... a lot of times their worst enemies have been themselves. Winning a close ball game should give them the confidence to win other ones ... I'm really happy for them," Kirkwood continued.

In addition to Davis' 27-point effort, other Warrior scorers included Corvin Lester, 9; Jeff Chapman, 7; Rex Comanche, 6; Cory Hood, 5; Daniel Espinosa, 4; and Casey Kearns, 4.

The opening round game against Lovington was, believe it or not, another good effort for the Warriors.

When you take into consideration that the last time these two teams met, the score was 130-47, this was a pretty good showing for Ruidoso.

The Warriors stayed within 12 to 14 points of Lovington throughout the game. It was not until Kearns fouled out midway through the fourth quarter that the score got truly out-of-whack.

All Lovington has is Taymon Domzalski, a 6-9 center who is being recruited by every major basketball power in the country. Needless to say, Domzalski is the best prep basketball player in the state, and totally dominated the game with 29 points and 29 rebounds — six more boards than the entire Warrior team.

Throw in a little home-court advantage (Domzalski and 6-5 post man Aaron Woods were whistled for a combined one foul) and you've got the makings of a good — make that a very good — basketball team.

Scoring for the Warriors against Lovington were Davis with 12; Kearns, 8; Lester and Comanche, 7; Chapman, 4; and Espinosa and Hood scored two points each.

Thursday's consolation game will bring Santa Fe St. Michaels into the Warriors line of fire. The Horsemen dismantled the Seminole Indians Wednesday after being down 14 points at halftime.

St. Mike's is the defending District District 2-AAA champion, and pressed its way back into the winner's circle Wednesday after a slow start.

That concerns Kirkwood, especially after the way the Warriors handled Denver City's fair-to-midland press.

Art and Artifact showcases folk art in a unique restored building

The owners of Art and Artifact have managed to create a business that caters to their personal interests and talents.

And it shows. Their new business across from Capitan village hall on Lincoln Avenue is a showcase for folk art gathered during years of collecting by Lonnie Lippmann, an archaeologist and commercial photographer.

His wife, Virginia Jones, adds her touches as sculptor, photographer and gallery operator.

"Our items are vintage, handmade and unique," Jones said. "They have a spiritual quality and have touched us and we hope will reach our customers."

"We have historic and prehistoric pieces, early and contemporary art, Mexican and Native America. We'll also show photographic work from history and subjects from today."

The eclectic outpouring includes exquisite jewelry, dolls, estate pieces, tribal art, antiques, furniture and indescribables.

Unique animal pottery by Heron Martinez, whose pieces have appeared in the Smithsonian, will fascinate visitors with his unusual interpretations.

Dishes by Roy Brown from Tularosa are mixed in with White Pottery of Oaxaca by Teadora Blanca, the daughter of Maria Blanca.

A selection of tapestries and textiles will be enlarged as more wall

space is developed.

A 1900 dogon granary door, a carved Mexican water trough and a Black Christ home shrine from Guatemala are three eye-catching pieces not to be found in other shops.

The building itself offers an intriguing history. Built in 1910 and reportedly once a brothel, it was ravaged by fire in 1986 and remodeled.

But Jones and Lippmann are creating a new look inside, opening up gallery space with high ceilings and a cat walk to complement the smaller entry area that now serves as the main display.

"We have so much inventory, we need a lot of space," Jones said. "The objects we carry are things we would want for ourselves and that we get to enjoy until they are sold."

When Lippmann finished his master's degree at the University of Texas, his first job was as an archaeologist with the Park Service in the Four Corners area of New Mexico. He stayed six years and developed a long standing affection for the state and its history.

"He always wanted to return," Jones said.

"I see in this area a quality of life and tranquility certainly lacking in many other places," she said. "This shop was a way to combine our interests in photography and archaeology, and my sculpture. A way to do creative work and have a business."

She credits Cleis and Jeremy Jordan, owners of Casa de Patron Bed and Breakfast in Lincoln with "luring" them to Capitan specifically.

"We also were won over by the wonderful cuisine of Jerrold Flores at Chango's," she said. "We feel with the artists in the area, this is going to be a very creative nucleus of the arts and what we are doing will tie into that."

We were attracted by the people who live here. We feel the business attitude is very conducive to what we are doing."

The couple plans an official opening celebration in May or June, but are ready for business now. They joined two other new businesses last month with an unofficial opening that gave shoppers a leisurely afternoon to explore new merchandise.




Carol singers bring a blessing to Storm Ranch

Better to be judged by 12 than carried by six

TO THE EDITOR:

Like Ms. Chiavario's letter to the editor "Appalled by Advice From Local Police on Handguns." I, too, am appalled, but for a completely different reason. Her letter is proof positive that the government's deliberate attempt to hide the real problem by obfuscating the facts has worked.

Consider this: almost 90 percent of all handgun killings are by and against blacks and/or Hispanics, so we don't have a handgun problem, we have race and ethnic problems.

But, to acknowledge the fact is to recognize that all of our far-reaching social programs have been expensive failures, something politicians are loath to do. They have no alternatives to those programs and fear being branded racist and ethnically non-sensitive, to say nothing of the political suicide such an admission would cause.

So, we have a "gun" problem instead.

I don't know where she moved here from, but it is apparent that she has never before been told the truth by her local police — that they can't protect anyone, the best they can do is to help one protect himself.

She should thank her lucky stars that "of all the small towns she could have picked to retire in, she chose Ruidoso" because here, she's not being lied to by her senior

law enforcement officers about their ability to protect her and her property.

If she doesn't want to have a gun in her house and "kill anyone who threatens her" that's her right and those same officers who advocate self reliance will protect her right to believe whatever she wants to.

I didn't read nor get the implication that either of the officers who were quoted advocated killing anyone. All they implied was that criminals might be deterred if they thought they themselves might be facing a gun — even criminals are usually cowards when it comes to getting shot!

They also saw through the hyperbole surrounding the Brady Law "waiting period" for a handgun purchase. Besides penalizing 98 percent of the population to try to control the lawless two percent who are the problem, all it does is restrict the rights of legitimate and honest gun dealers.

Consider this: two tables right next to each other at the next gun show, one a licensed firearms dealer, the other a private citizen with numerous guns to sell. The citizen doesn't have to wait five days before the sale, but the dealer does. The citizen doesn't have to check with the local authorities to get permission to sell to the prospective buyer, but the dealer does. The citizen can assume the responsibility to not collect and report

sales taxes, but the dealer can't. There is no requirement to fill out a firearms transfer form if one purchases a gun from a private citizen, but there is from a dealer. The dealer is forbidden to sell to a non-state-resident, but the citizen can. The dealer's license now costs him \$10 per year (soon to be \$200 per year), while the citizen doesn't need one and doesn't need to increase his selling price to recoup his costs.

Which one would you buy from? But those are moot points anyway since criminals don't buy the guns they use, they steal them.

Oh, by the way, I am neither a gun dealer nor collector.

Also consider: both local and national police files on individuals have the same limitation — arrests are recorded but most often, convictions are not. If a person's background is checked by the police and an arrest for a felony offense or violent behavior is noted, the police should deny that person the privilege of purchasing a gun. What if that person was never convicted or his conviction was overturned? That information would not be noted and the person would have every right to sue for discrimination and demand a quite lengthy and costly "correction" or expungement of his record.

A lot of our hard earned tax dollars are going to be given away

defending those quite justifiable lawsuits and judgments.

Ms. Chiavario, what we all really want is freedom from fear of those who would misuse power and harsh punishment for those who do. What you read was your local police officers telling it like it really is — not some political party line — but are honest enough to tell you that your first line of protection is yourself — please feel free to go live in Washington, DC, New York City, Detroit or Los Angeles where you will be told what you want to hear.

Or better still, you might try living in a sealed box somewhere, where the bad people can't get in — all you will have forfeited is your own freedom of choice. If you look closely, all those in positions of power who advocate severe restrictions on sales and use have security guards, live in a mini-fortress and have special permits for themselves to carry a gun.

Since I can't afford security guards and believe locks and keys should confine lawbreakers rather than me, I'll take my chances here where criminals know that I am also armed. I also don't want to shoot anyone, but if I have to, so be it.

I'll protect my own life and property, thank you. After all, it's better to be judged by 12 than carried by six.
