Searchers find cold, lost hiker

With only a Snickers candy bar to eat and contact lens solution to drink for more than 26 hours, Jose "Joe" Galvan managed to stay in good spirits until he was rescued by searchers about 1:30 p.m. Sunday.

Melinda Headley, field coordinator for White Mountain Search and Rescue, said Galvan was found on the trail to the Great Western Mine in the Bonito area of the forest, about three miles from the unit's base camp.

According to Headley, Galvan and his wife, who are from Corpus Christi, Texas, attended the Sanchez family reunion Saturday morning. He decided to talk a walk with his brother-in-law and sister about 11 a.m., but they soon tired and returned to camp.

Galvan continued walking on his own. His family reported him missing by midafternoon, but search teams were not called until about 6 p.m.

White Mountain was on the scene within 30 minutes, establishing the base camp and fielding search teams, Headley said. She also called in the U.S. Border Patrol, the canine team B.A.R.K. from Tijeras, search and rescue from Alamogordo, Mountainair and Chaves County, for a total of about 60 searchers.

"What we discovered was that he must have crisscrossed the trails several times," Headley said. "He thought he had gone so far, but then he saw a footprint that looked like his own and it was."

"He climbed a cliff thinking he could see the camp, but he saw things that were totally unfamiliar. Through all of this, he said he never was particularly worried."

Galvan, 39, was wearing a T-shirt, lightweight sweatshirt, jeans, boots and a hat.

"He had no food or water and was happy to see the rain Sunday, except it didn't stop. He drank his lens solution and ate a Snickers bar. He hurt his knee, but he was suffering only slightly from hypothermia when he was found."

Corona center set for December opening

Corona senior citizens may be celebrating the Christmas holidays in a new building.

The architect working on the project through the firm of Architects West told Lincoln County Commissioners Tuesday that he hopes to have the donated building remodeled and ready by then.

Commissioners signed an agreement for a \$6,300 fee to handle the project, financed with money allocated through the State Legislature.

Architect Craig Gosling said compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act will include the installation of ramps and modifying restrooms. More restroom fixtures will have to be added in another phase, he said.

"We will have to phase because of budget limits, and go for a grant later from the Area Agency on Aging or the State Legislature," he said.

In the first phase, the kitchen will be moved and enlarged; foundation work will be needed for a beam underneath the building. Plumbing and electrical require-

ments for a commercial kitchen "are pretty heavy," he said.

He recommended the less expensive exterior that's durable and a metal roof. Gas fire space heaters will have to be eliminated and swamp coolers will be installed until air-conditioning can be purchased.

In another matter, Linda Wallace, property manager for the county's new rural events center in Glencoe, submitted a folder with proposed policies and rates, as well as other booking information.

One of the first projects she would like to initiate is construction of an indoor arena, Wallace said. She plans to put together a package for the commission to submit to the State Legislature before its next session.

Wallace said the center will be included on a map being assembled by the Rural Development through Tourism organization.

Her policy on liquor will be no "bring your own bottle" functions, no minors when liquor is served and no liquor when the indoor arena is being used, because it will be a family-oriented facility.

A picnic license will be obtained

to cover liquor served during special events.

Although she has put together a fee schedule, some figures may be changed as she tracks down better comparisons and has some experience from actual electric usage, Wallace said.

The initial breakdown showed \$350 per day using the exhibit hall for commercial events where admission is charged and \$250 for non-commercial, such as wedding receptions and banquets. Fees may be waived for qualifying organizations.

A lower figure of \$100 for commercial and \$50 for non-commercial will be charged for set-up and move-out days. A 10 percent discount will be offered to organizations using the center four times or more a year.

Use of the entire facility would cost \$500 for commercial and \$250 for non-commercial.

"I can't stress enough that this is not an attempt to make money at the gate, but to draw people to the community to generate spending locally," said Commission Chairman Monroy Montes.

Ruidoso's water gets clean bill

Water might not be plentiful in the Ruidoso area and may look discolored at times, but when treated water flows through a village tap, it's safe to drink, say village officials.

Village manager Gary Jackson said the extreme dryness experienced in New Mexico this year and the heavy use during holiday periods have created a stress factor on many of the old water lines and produced a number of leaks throughout the community.

Richard Sanchez, water superintendent for the village, said there are 35 different pressure zones, which equates to running 35 dif-

Cowboy Symposium board, told commissioners they're concerned that the fee for their event be reasonable.

"The initial presentation to the State Legislature (for the \$250,000 to buy the center and \$40,000 for initial costs) revolved around having a permanent home for the Symposium, so there should be no question," Montes said.

Goodloe said the event draws many people to the county in an effort to preserve the area's Western heritage.

"We're a not-for-profit organization," he said, asking if the \$250 a day fee would apply.

Wallace said the group is classified as commercial, because admission is charged to the event. The fee will be higher if electricity is used in the back barn area, she added.

"We're in a position that if we are charged too high a fee," Goodloe started, but he was interrupted by Montes, who told him it was Wallace's job to arrive at a fair figure.

"We're not here to conduct your board meeting or to negotiate a

P&Z reviews variance requests this afternoon

An amended commercial site development for the corner of Sudderth and Fifth Street is scheduled for review at 2 p.m. (today) Monday, July 18, at the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission regular meeting.

Applicant Mark Marquez is requesting approval to construct an additional 39-foot by 46-foot building adjoining an existing building located more on Fifth Street.

Marquez also proposes to grade the lot for parking to provide 22 to 26 parking spaces.

In other business, the commission will:

—act on a variance request by Michelle Howard of Ponderosa Heights.

Howard proposes to remove his existing mobile home and replace it with a 28- by 48-foot unit.

Variance is being requested for the front yard to allow an 11-foot-eight-inch setback tapering to 14 feet, six inches along the property line.

Village staff does not support a side yard variance, but recommends favorable consideration of

the variance allowing a front yard setback of 11.666 feet.

—act on a minor subdivision request by Ronald Andrews. On June 6, 1994, the commission approved a minor subdivision to divide a five-acre tract, known as the Nelson Tract, into two tracts. Andrews is now requesting approval to further subdivide the southerly tract into three tracts of about one acre each.

Village staff recommends approval on the proposed replat with the condition that all utilities be installed and accepted by the village prior to execution of plat and release for recording.

—review a request for a preliminary plat and final plat approval for the Middle Cedar Subdivision owned by Robert Kellerman.

Subject property is outside the village corporate limits, but within the three-mile planning and zoning jurisdiction. Property also is beyond the one-mile extraterritorial zoning district and has no zoning.

fee," he said.

Potter said he was glad a broad scope of fees was provided, because many variables crop up.

Barrow invited Wallace to the group's board meeting to discuss items such as trash collection.

"I think you'll find she's not unreasonable with the fees," said Commissioner Wilton Howell.

"We're talking about having fees comparable to other facilities, so I don't think we will be negotiating," Montes added.

"It's more a matter of what's included for the fee," Barrow said. "We need tables, chairs, a stage and electricity for the vendors."

"We don't have an established history," Montes said. "We'll be building it. The prices can change without notice for that reason."

In other business, county commissioners:

—approved \$2,500 for the Zia Handicap Therapy Center to provide respite care for families in Lincoln County.

The program provides care for a handicapped family member to allow the relative care-givers to go to doctor's appointments, grocery shopping or just to sleep.

Representative Barbara House said \$80,000 a year is saved by enabling a family to keep a person at home. The system also allows continued functioning as a family unit.

—approved two projects, a canopy over the bleachers for \$91,000 and a storeroom for \$19,000, of a four-project bid for improvements at the county fairground in Capitan. The Vantage Company of Roswell was low bidder out of four submitted.

Fair Association president Gordon Barham presented a financial statement to the board showing expenses from January 1, 1994, to after the July Fourth weekend.

The statement listed about

\$28,000 in expenses and more than \$50,000 in deposits, including the county commission's \$9,500 for March and June payments to cover management of the fairground.

—took no action on requests to purchase a lot in Deer Park Valley and 13 acres at the old Fort Stanton landfill site.

County attorney Alan Morel told commissioners they have no policy on handling such requests, but they must be sure they are getting fair value and the prospective buyer should pay for an appraisal.

"If it exceeds \$25,000, then you would need a public referendum and a lot more rules apply," Morel said.

"I don't think we have a 'for sale' sign on any county property," Howell said. "It's very important they obtain an appraisal. I don't think the county should have to go have all its property appraised."

"The 13 acres might bring more than \$25,000. We might want to hold onto it for the road department, if the Capitan school district someday wants the current department site."

"I feel the county should not sell to an individual," Commissioner L. Ray Nunley said. "All of our surplus property should go out for bids if we are going to sell."

Bob Walter, a real estate agent in the audience, said the 13-acre property carries several restrictions and would be difficult to use.

"All you can do is grow grass on it," he said.

Morel warned that when the county acquires property through liens and foreclosures, such as 20 parcels from a failed Hondo Valley subdivision, clear title will have to be obtained before they can be sold. That also could be costly.

—noted that Ruidoso Downs should have been included in the distribution of \$90,000 from Senate

Memorial 130 for street and sidewalk improvements. The town was the only settlement in the county omitted.

—reaffirmed a previous decision on variations in the design of a house in the historic settlement of Lincoln, in spite of objections from some former members of the Historic Preservation Board.

—attached a new cover letter to previously approved resolution calling on the federal government to prove its ownership of lands within the boundaries of the county. The new cover requests a response within 20 days from the U.S. Department of the Interior.

But commissioners took no action after listening to several opponents of Rangeland Reform '94, a set of rules and regulations put together by that department under Secretary Bruce Babbitt.

The opponents, including local Rex Wilson and Bob Jones and G.B. Oliver of Otero County, urged the county to assert its ownership of those lands by suing the federal government. They said an individual rights group would handle the case with no liability to the county.

"We need to let Babbitt know he's creating problems for the Administration in the West that may affect the next election," Jones said.

Oliver, who said he was in the banking business, warned that the reform plan would devalue land.

Nunley said several property owners had contacted him to see if they could get lower property taxes, because the land they leased from the Bureau of Land management would be valued at less if the improvements they have made were no longer owned by them. Reform would place ownership in the hands of the federal government.

"It's devastating what Rangeland Reform is going to do to our country," Spencer said.

ferent systems.

"What we did over the Fourth of July to try to meet demand is to increase some of the pressure zones by increasing some of the pump station pressures a bit. Some lines held as much as 310 pounds of pressure," Sanchez said.

"Then when everyone leaves the area, it puts a big stress on the system while you are backing off and affects some of the weak points. What we found, in some areas the pipe was corroded and in those spots the pipe just gave way," he said.

Sanchez said the village has about 25 miles of two-inch water line that's hitting 25 to 30 years old and will need to be replaced.

Jackson said under the capital improvement plan discussed during the last village council meeting, he is proposing, over a several year period, to upgrade the two-inch lines to minimum six-inch lines, a requirement for a fire hydrant.

Sanchez said depending on where you live in Ruidoso, you may have a different source of water.

"If you live in Cherokee Village in Pinediff, you're on Cherokee wells. That water supply stays the same year round," he said.

"For the rest of Ruidoso, we've got different wells, surface water, Alto Lake and Eagle Creek. We've got so many different sources of water, that the water quality is always going to change."

Sanchez said within a single residency, the source of water may change or be a blend of sources.

He said the Hollywood well continually clicks off and on, according to demand.

"Here at city hall, if Hollywood well is on, you are getting a blend of Hollywood well, a little bit from a well that is pretty hard with calcium at Plant Two, a little bit of

Alto Lake and a little bit of Eagle Creek," he said.

"Then we alternate Eagle Creek wells every other day at this time, so that water quality changes every other day. If Hollywood well goes down, then the water quality here at village hall changes again."

Sanchez said there is calcium in the well water.

"We don't have a lot of sulfides, which is the odors you get. Our biggest contributor to manganese is Alto Lake and Eagle Creek wells, which are not regulated for secondary standards," he said.

Jackson explained that only primary standards, relating to health and safety, are regulated by the State Environmental Department and the federal Environmental Protection Agency.

Secondary standards are taste and odor and are not regulated.

"As far as water being safe to drink, we're producing a good quality of water," Sanchez said. "We're in compliance with bacteria control and everything that we're regulated on," Sanchez said.

Jackson said one result that does occur with extremely hard water, cream does not always mix well with a cup of coffee. He said there might be a white film left over after you wash your car, and iced tea gets cloudy.

"You will see those results, which aren't health hazard results, but they can be annoying," Jackson said.

Sanchez said at this time of the year, Alto Lake is the primary water source.

"We try to fill the lake during spring runoff. If we have excess runoff, we go ahead and pump out of it. But we save Alto Lake for June and July, 'til the rainy season begins to relieve us. That hasn't happened this year and we didn't quite start off with a full lake. Alto

Lake is very soft water, but we're about nine to 10 feet down right now," he said.

Jackson said that repairs were completed before the Fourth of July on the two reserve tanks near Alto holding five million gallons of water each. He said an additional disinfection period of 10 to 12 days was required.

"The demand on the system is so great at this time that we are unable to fill the tanks. Everything is going into distribution, we don't have anything left over to go into the tanks. There is no extra water at this time," he said.

Sanchez said on heavy weekends, with all wells working, about four million gallons of water a day is produced over the weekend.

He said the average daily production for the entire year, including winter, is about 1.8 million per day.

Jackson said a possible step in the future is an ordinance mandating regulations to control water.

Sanchez said currently, the main supply of water comes through Plant No. Three, located between Gavilan Canyon Road and Alto Lake.

He said when Grindstone Plant goes on line, it will relieve about 40 percent of the demand from Plant No. Three and place it on Grindstone.

"This will relieve the pressure demands we have in some areas like Ponderosa Heights," he said.

Sanchez said with Grindstone, the village will be able to valve off 40 percent of the town to feed from that location.

Jackson said the design group hired at the last council meeting will fast track the new Grindstone plant to be completed by the end of May 1995.

According to village planner Cleatus Richards, the plat as presented is not acceptable and missing sufficient documents, such as site preparation and others.

Richards recommends that a hearing on the Preliminary and Final Plat submission be continued until the commission meeting of August 1. He said if Kellerman has not submitted additional documentation to allow compliance, that the village staff would recommend denial of the Preliminary and Final Plat.

The furthest away from camp Galvan traveled was about six miles, Headley said.

"He would have been in poor shape by Monday morning, because it turned cold over night and he had no way to get warm or dry," she added.

Police report on two weekend accidents

Two rear end collisions on Sudderth Drive over the weekend involved 11 persons, but no serious injuries.

John Everette, 65, of Sun Lake, Arizona, and driving a 1992 white Ford, told Ruidoso Police around noon Saturday that he and his wife, Dorothy, were stopped in traffic at the corner of Sudderth and Paradise Canyon Road.

Everette said another vehicle made a U-turn in front of him.

According to police reports, Charles Patterson, 41, was stopped behind Everette in his 1991 red Plymouth sedan. Other passengers in the car included Janette Waldy, 53; Debora Waldy, 42; Gary Waldy, 56; and KaCee Patterson, 10.

A third car, according to the report, driven by Kacey Hosek, 24, of Alamogordo was driving eastbound on Sudderth at the time and did not see the cars stopped in front of her. She struck the Patterson vehicle with enough force to shove it forward into the Everette vehicle.

The only injury in the three cars

was KaCee Patterson, who complained of a neck injury.

Reports noted that Hosek's intention contributed to the accident. She was cited for not having insurance.

The second accident on Sudderth Drive occurred around 11 a.m. Sunday in a driving rain.

Johnny Emberlin, 25, of Ruidoso Downs and driving a 1986 gray Blazer was stopped in preparation for a left hand turn.

According to police reports, Thomas Williams, 81, of Ruidoso was driving eastbound in a 1983 silver station wagon. Williams told police he did not see Emberlin stopped and rammed into him.

Both Emberlin and his passenger, 20-year-old Harper Lyndie of Ruidoso, complained of injuries, but none were visible.

Police did not issue any citations, but did note that contributing factors in the accident were Williams' driving too fast for the conditions, following too closely and inattention.

Zia Natural Gas embarks on major pipeline expansion project

Work begins on 43 miles of pipeline

Zia Natural Gas will begin construction this week on a 43-mile pipeline into the Ruidoso area, announced Zia president Dave Hamilton.

"Today we signed the contract for starting construction on our new pipeline feeding Ruidoso and the surrounding communities in Lincoln County," Hamilton told *The Ruidoso News* Friday.

"We are spending \$3 million on the project," he said.

Hamilton said the new pipeline installed will be an 8 5/8-inch steel pipe capable of handling upwards of 20,000 customers in the Lincoln County area.

"It will leave no questions on the part of the community as to the ability of us to serve," Hamilton said.

"We plan aggressively, as of this date, starting customer connections in this area and intend to connect between three and four thousand customers in the next five years."

Hamilton said he plans to connect to customers now existing either on propane or electricity. He said natural gas runs about half the cost of propane.

"Part of the expansion of our system is to reach now unserved areas," he said. "We plan on expanding into Hondo Valley, and we are looking at expanding over the mountain into Mescalero onto the reservation. This system will allow us to do that."

Hamilton said the initial pipeline construction is \$3 million dollars and connections to customers will cost the company another \$3 million.

"We're expecting to spend \$6 million dollars in the area in the next five years," he said.

Hamilton said the natural gas is piped in from El Paso Natural. The main pipe line runs approximately 50 miles north of Ruidoso.

Hamilton gave a brief work history of the company located in Ruidoso Downs. He said that Natural Gas Processing, the parent company of Zia Natural Gas, purchased Ruidoso Natural Gas and renamed it Zia Natural Gas about five years ago.

"First, we had to set up an organizational structure here which involved building a complex that we could operate out of."

"Then we had to develop a work force that was to our satisfaction."

We have tripled the work force of Zia Natural Gas since we purchased it.

"Then we had to finalize the negotiations with Capitan-Carrizozo Natural Gas Association to purchase their existing four-inch pipeline that feeds the area."

"It took us approximately a year and a half to gain all the right of way we needed on the 43 miles of pipeline to invade the area."

"After getting all of our ducks in a row, we are now ready for a major expansion of the area."

Hamilton said the moment the company was purchased, company officials set up a 10-year schedule.

"I'd say right now we are a year behind schedule, because of a breakdown in the initial negotiations with Capitan-Carrizozo Natural Gas Association," he said. "That is settled and we are back on schedule."

He said construction of the pipeline should be completed in about three months.

"We plan on having the pipeline in service by the first week in November. That will take us into our 1994-95 heating season," he said.

He said construction will begin at the El Paso Natural Gas tap, and work its way toward Ruidoso.

great lap companion.

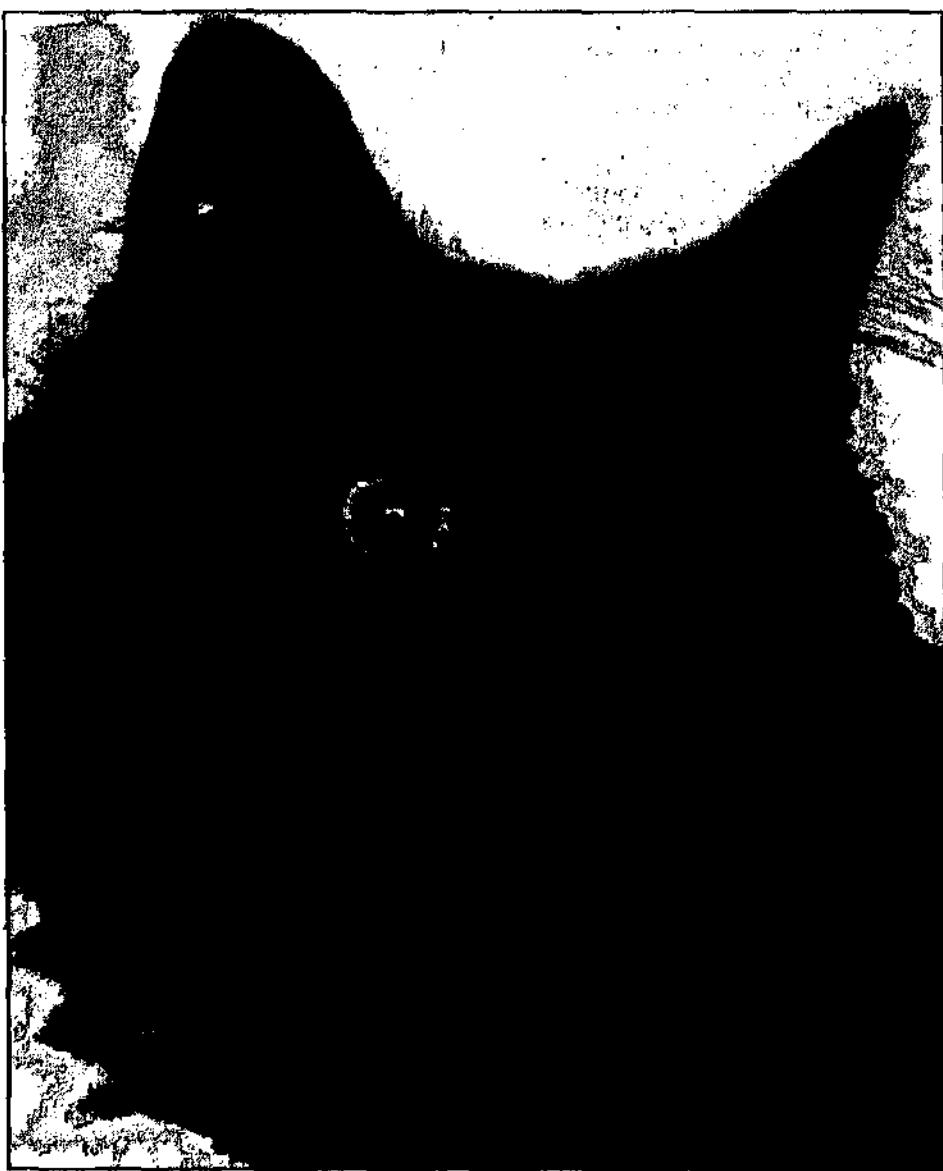

Severance bond sale benefits projects in Lincoln County

Several local communities will benefit from \$92 million in severance tax bonds sold by the New Mexico State Board of Finance to pay for 320 projects around the state.

Prudential Securities was the successful bidder among six companies competing to buy the bonds, by offering interest rates averaging 5.35 percent.

Projects in Lincoln County that will be financed with the proceeds include the Ruidoso Water Treatment Plant at Grindstone for \$570,000, Fort Stanton Hospital's conversion to a long-term nursing facility received allocations of \$268,000 and \$193,000, Glencoe's multipurpose center (Senior Citizens Center) for \$150,000, a sidewalk project in the settlement of Lincoln for \$5,000, compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act for the swimming pool in Carrizozo for \$5,000, the police/court complex in Carrizozo for \$3,500, and Ruidoso Downs Village Hall for \$20,000.

According to a news release, the service will be available to all customers in the Abiquiu, Alto, Cannon, Chimayo, Dixon, Espanola, Ojo Caliente, Ruidoso, Tierra Amarilla, Truchas and

Vallecitos exchanges by October 31, 1994.

Prior to the start of EAS service, each call between these areas was billed separately as a long-distance call and customers would see a long-distance charge per call on their monthly bills," said Tom Phelps, district manager-GTE New Mexico. "Now, these calls are equivalent to local calls."

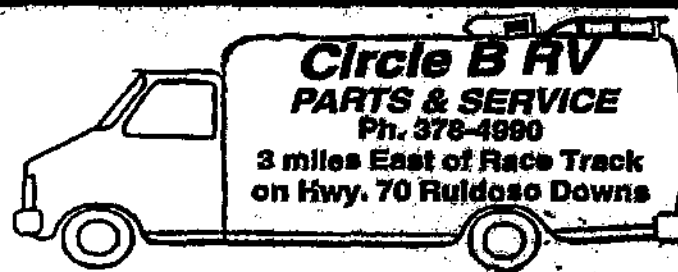

Weeds wreak havoc on other wild things

They look charming in sunlit bunches on the side of the road or blanketing a meadow, but they are deadly to grasses and other plants needed by wildlife.

Musk thistles are unrelenting in their advance across New Mexico, opportunistically taking advantage of disturbed ground, then crowding out all other plants.

Despite their deep purple flowers, they are noxious weeds, and foresters say they need the help of private land owners if the foreign invaders are to be kept at bay.

Unfortunately, in contrast to dwarf mistletoe, which has sparked concern in homeowners about the future of their Ponderosa pines, not many people call to ask about musk thistle, Canadian thistle, teasel or Dalmatian toadflax.

Yet they are more of a threat to native New Mexico plants and animals.

Musk thistle

Watch the roadside while driving through Ruidoso and the presence of musk thistle already is obvious.

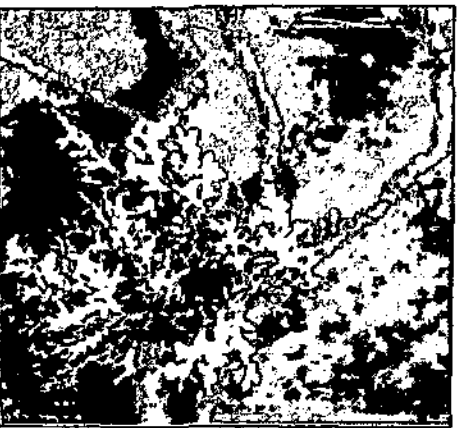
The sturdy weed with prickly thorns can grow to seven feet in height and gives off a pleasant aroma, but in a few seasons it can wipe out a pasture. Each plant produces more than 20,000 seeds and 90 percent germinate in the first two years.

"But they also can remain dormant for up to 10 years, even after being burned, and then sprout," said Greg Gray with the U.S. Forest Service, Smokey Bear District.

Plants are considered noxious, because they are harmful to other plants or animals and they replace native plants.

Generally, they were introduced by accident into the United States or were brought here as an ornamental plant and then spread into the forests and rangelands. They are prolific reproducers and spread rapidly, transported by vehicles, animals, wind or water.

Unsuspecting admirers who put them in floral arrangements also spread their seeds. Even livestock owners may contribute when seeds are mixed in with feed.

"Musk thistle takes over everything," Gray said. "It out-competes grass and crowds out even the good brush. It doesn't die out. It just keeps spreading, because of the number of seeds and its endurance."

"The problem here is our lack of ability on the forest to start managing the plant," Gray said. The service currently is conducting an environmental analysis on impacts from various methods of control, which range from digging up the plants, to turning herds of sheep or goats loose on a tract, to spraying with a plant-specific herbicide. Meanwhile, the State Legislature is expected to pass legislation this year to fund an eradication effort by its state forestry division.

"Certain bugs can kill them, but you have to be careful what you introduce or you can end up with a worse situation," he said.

"It's getting terrible on the roadways. There's been a tremendous increase since I first arrived in 1991 from Idaho."

The musk thistle was imported from Eurasia originally and has been in New Mexico about eight years. A member of the sunflower family, it does extremely well in cool areas, which described Ruidoso until this summer.

Time to control

"The best time to destroy them is when they're in rosette stage, the first year it appears," Gray said. The rosette stays low to the ground, has no flower and has wavy, hairy leaves with yellow spines along the leaf margins.

The thistle is biennial and flowers every two years.

"Just because it disappears after one year, don't think it's gone," Gray said.

The thistle's purplish-pink thick-headed flowers appear from May to June and are from one to two inches in diameter. Cutting off the heads won't kill the plant, but it will reduce the number of seeds distributed.

If ranchers fail to control the thistle, it could edge out edible grasses and diminish the value of the land, Gray said.

Some states require treatment by private land owners. A local effort will need coordination among

federal, state and private land managers, he said.

"If it's not a joint effort, the plant will spread right back to areas that we treat," he said. Effective control or eradication will include treatment for many consecutive years.

A 1990 survey on the Lincoln National Forest showed that 2,500 acres were infested with five different species of the list of potentially damaging weeds. Since then, more species have been reported and more area infested.

Teasel and musk thistle aggressively are invading the habitat of the Sacramento Mountain Thistle, which already is designated as threatened under the Endangered Species Act.

Other noxious weeds

The Canadian thistle is more delicate than the musk and doesn't colonize as thickly, but still is considered noxious.

It bears a smaller purple flower with a bulb-like bulge beneath the bloom.

"Horses love the heads of Canadian thistle, but they can be hard on the land," Gray said.

Dalmatian Toadflax, which bears a delicate yellow stalk flower, is moving down Nogal Canyon and flourishing along the roadside into the settlement.

"It's establishing there really bad," Gray said. "It's one of the worst to control. Cutting won't kill it. You have to treat it three or four years in a row, even when you appear to be controlling it."

The perennial grows to about three feet, its leaves are dense and the yellow flowers with orange bearded throat are found in the axils of the upper leaves. The plant was introduced from Southeast Europe as an ornamental.

Dwarf mistletoe

Definitely not so pretty, the dwarf mistletoe is just as deadly to its host tree, the Ponderosa Pine, as the weeds are to grasses and native vegetation. The process just takes a lot longer.

"Ruidoso is one of the most infested areas we have in the state," said Dale Bennett, with the U.S. Forest Service in Santa Fe.

The main reason for the proliferation is the lack of naturally-occurring fires in the forest, he said.

"It was held in check by fire prior to the 1900s," Bennett said. "Fire suppression altered the forest condition a lot. Previously, low intensity, cool fires burned through every two to five years."

Loggers also unintentionally may have given the parasitic plant a big boost.

"We have a history of 25 years or more of selective harvesting," he said. "The logging removed a lot of

Ponderosa pine. They took the healthy, non-infected trees and left those that were twisted and gnarled with mistletoe. Then smaller trees came up underneath and became infected. Suppressing fire just intensified the situation."

A 1986 survey of the Lincoln National Forest showed that 70 percent of the Ponderosa pines in commercial stands are infected, twice the average of the rest of the Southwest region.

"It's a pretty tough situation. Not much destroys it," Bennett said. "Some animals feed on it, but they only eat the exposed portion. There's a root-like structure that's embedded in the trunk of the tree."

"Pruning might prolong the life of a tree in some situations, but it's hard to recommend in general. If the infestation is on the lower branches, it sometimes help. A branch can be effectively pruned if the closest mistletoe shoots are at least six inches from the trunk."

Eventually, the infected trees die or must be cut out, but if you underplant with a non-affected types, you'll have other trees growing.

"A lightly infected tree can last decades. A heavily infected, in excess of 50 percent if branches throughout has some mistletoe infested in them, studies show about half die in 10 years once heavily infected. In Ruidoso and Mescalero, some trees have a heavy infection rate and probably will die within 10 years."

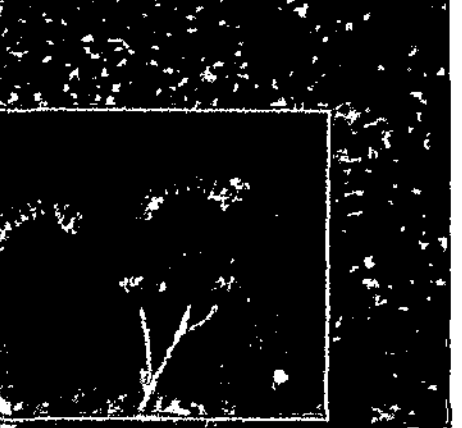
Bennett said mistletoe is part of the naturally occurring ecological system.

"It's hard to view it as good or bad," he said. "It has a role."

That role is to thin out forests and set the stage for fires. The large "brooms" of mistletoe on lower branches create a ladder effect for a cool fire low on the ground to climb the tree, accelerate to the crown and travel to other crowns to become a catastrophic burn, he said.

"They help clear an area through fire for the regeneration of plant species and the whole cycle starts over," Bennett said.

Related to the Christmas mistletoe, the leafless parasite attacks cone-bearing trees. The dwarf that attaches to Ponderosa pine is orange with thick shoots. The female growths bear the egg-shaped

seeds. Bob Cain in the Santa Fe office of the New Mexico Forestry Division, said the only way to totally remove an infestation is to clear cut the trees, but that's not an acceptable solution for more property owners.

"It takes a long time to kill a tree, even though there's a huge amount of infection," he said.

"To extend the lives of the infected plant, cut off the affected branches."

"When a branch is infected, it drains the nutrients and water from the rest of the tree. Once the brooms start forming, the tree starts fading. All the food created by the needles is intercepted by the brooms."

To prevent spreading to other Ponderosa, cut a buffer of 50 to 70 feet between the affected stand and others.

"The seeds can shoot 20 to 40 feet at about 60 mph," he said. "They actually pop out when the heat is sufficient, usually in mid to late July or August."

They are not edible or attractive to birds. After germinating and infecting a twig, it takes two years before a swelling will appear and another two years before the first shoot breaks through the bark. Fruits mature two years later.

Many of the sticky seeds will land on other areas of the same tree or on a new pine.

"The infested area grows at

about one foot a year through the forest, "slowly but steadily," Cain said. "It's the worst on rocky area, harsher sites. If there is good soil and the infection is low, a tree could outgrow it."

Underplanting infected trees with different types will ensure that a home owner won't lose a canopy. Try Douglas Fir, white fir, blue spruce, juniper or hardwood trees such as aspen, ash, elm, cottonwood and birch.

According to a booklet published by the Rocky Mountain Forest Range Experiment Station of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, an environmentally safe, growth regulating chemical called ethephon, is effective in preventing the spread of dwarf mistletoe.

"The chemical, when sprayed on mistletoe shoots during the summer before and after seed dispersal, causes shoots to dry up and fall to the ground, preventing spread," the writers state. "The trees will have to be sprayed thoroughly every three to five years since the chemical does not affect the root system inside the host branch."

The cost to adequately spray a tree is about \$3 to \$5.

Supplemental watering can increase tree growth and survival, particularly in times of subnormal rainfall.

By one o'clock the sky overhead was covered with clouds of all shades of gray and pure billowy white.

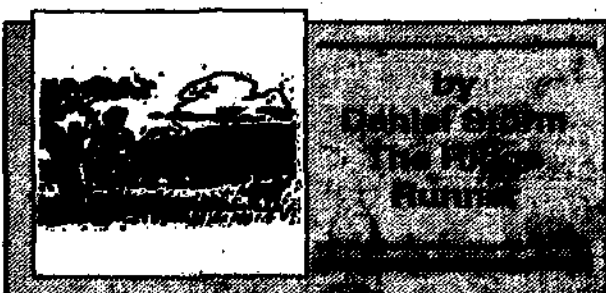
The temperature had been 92 degrees and dropped down to 85.

Taxes return to county

Taxpayers often feel that their hard earned dollars are being sucked into some deep dark hole never to be seen or heard from again.

The State Legislature has been generous with the Ruidoso area over the past three sessions, revitalizing Midtown through the Main Street project, funding the Ruidoso convention center and scheduling Highway 48 for a major reconstruction.

Ruidoso and the surrounding area will benefit from \$92 million in severance tax bonds sold last week by the New Mexico State Board of Finance to pay for 320 projects around the state.

Projects in Lincoln County that will be financed with the proceeds include the Ruidoso Water Treatment Plant at Grindstone for \$570,000, Fort Stanton Hospital's conversion to a long-term nursing facility was allocated \$268,000 and \$193,000, Glencoe's multi-purpose center (Senior Citizens Center) was funded for \$150,000, a sidewalk project in the settlement of Lincoln for \$5,000, compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act for the swimming pool in Carizozo for \$5,000, the police/court complex in Carizozo for \$3,500, and Ruidoso Downs Village Hall for \$20,000.

Funding for those needed projects adds up to \$1.2 million in state funds that will be spent in Lincoln County. The county benefits twice, first with the needed facilities and second as the money is spent for salaries and supplies boosting the area economy.

It's good news when those disappearing tax dollars are returned home and put to work.

Sure Laws was the man that

needed horse power to get around to his patients. Laws had his TB sanatorium a long time before Fort Stanton was treating TB. I have a sister older than I am that was a patient of Dr. Laws about 1915-1918.

Now as concerns the Ellis Mill. It was on the other side of the Bonito stream. The mill was an overshot wheel like the Old Mill in Ruidoso to begin with; but the mill pond was deepened in order to use all the water. It was changed to an undershot wheel. But undershot is not as efficient as overshot. Over-

shot fully loads each blade in turn but undershot does not use so many full loaded blades to turn it.

Once long ago there was an application in this county court concerning the building of a dam and a mill to be built in a specified amount of time. (Early Ruidoso or Rio Bonito). Lincoln County sent a jury to inspect at the end of the allotted time. The jury reported: "They found a dam by a mill site; but no mill by a dam site."

Missions to the Moon

Missions to the Moon tells the riveting story of the many United States space flights that culminated in the historic 1969 *Apollo 11* (launch shown) moon landing and the 1975 United States/Soviet handshake in space.

Narrated by Martin Sheen, *Missions to the Moon* begins the story of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration's Apollo program with the tragic 1967 launch pad fire that killed *Apollo 14* astronauts Roger B.
