### Flu? cold? a sneeze is still a sneeze

Those suffering with the symptoms can't tell the difference, but the wrenching flu virus going around apparently isn't the strain covered by vaccine given out last fall. Valerie Miller, administrator of the Lincoln County Medical Center, said the hospital in Ruidoso is seeing many more cases of flu than usual in its emergency room. But county health Theresa Luna said only 24 cases of the flu for which inoculations were given have been reported statewide. The vaccine specifically was aimed at the Texas, Beijing and Panama strains of flu. "More than flu, we're seeing a lot of colds or at least not the virus we've given shots for," she said. Spokesmen for several local physicians reported either business as usual or a slight increase in the number of common colds.

### TV investigators interview locals

Karen McDaniels, investigative reporter for KOAT TV, interviewed Hazel Haynsworth and State Representative John Underwood (D) over the weekend regarding Haynsworth's failed bid for a Human Services contract to lease her building. ## Commish to select new chair

Selection of a new chairman and vice chairman for 1994 will be the first order of business for the Lincoln County Commission Tuesday. The meeting will begin at 9 a.m. in the commission room of the county courthouse in Carrizozo. Commissioner Stirling Spencer already has served for two years as chairman and is running for the state post of Public Lands Commissioner. Monroy Montes is finishing up his first time as chairman and has provided an organized and strong, but not too overly dominate hand at the gavel. The group could elect to go with a second term for Montes or turn to one of the three newer commissioners, Wilton Howell, Bill Schwettmann or L. Ray Nunley, the lone Democrat on the board. Once the head man for 1994 has been named, commissioners will attend to other business, which includes a request to approve the transfer of the Lincoln Cablevision Inc. cable television franchise from the Riskin Cable Income Partners, a Delaware corporation, to the Georgia-based Alert Cable T.V. doing business as Cablevision Industries.

A public hearing is scheduled to review proposals for a community development block grant application. Diana Sonnamaker, superintendent of the Capitan School District, is scheduled to update commissioners on bond issue referendum in February. The school board is asking voters in the Capitan district to continue a special two mill levy to pay for roofing repairs and replacements, as well as other items that cannot be squeezed out of the regular budget. The levy has been in effect since the mid-1970s. Current Chairman Montes will give an update on the condition and repair of State Road 214. State transportation crews have been working on the portion from Fort Stanton to the turnoff to Sierra Blanca Regional Airport. State highway officials would like the county to take over maintenance responsibilities on the road, but county officials say the long term costs would be too great. Montes also is scheduled to discuss the annual Lincoln County Cowboy Symposium and a proposal for a Cowgirl Hall of Fame. Gordon Barham, chairman of the county fair board, is on the agenda to discuss the fairground management agreement. Other items scheduled for action or discussion are:

- a joint powers agreement as part of the county's participation in the Coalition of Counties organization.
- a proposed ordinance opposing the release of wild animals, specifically aimed at a government proposal to release Mexican wolves in the White Sands area.
- approval of the holiday schedule for 1994 and the commission meeting schedules.
- scheduling a road review meeting date for three commissioners to inspect roads that residents have submitted for action.
- a resolution authorizing a transfer of money to the Lincoln Volunteer Fire Department.

## Cowgirls' museum pursued

Ruidoso could become the new home of the National Cowgirl Hall of Fame and Western Heritage if the State Legislature is willing to chip in some dollars and the museum founders are successfully wooed. Monroy Montes, chairman of the Lincoln County Commission, said he was contacted about the possibility by Harry McKee, who operates the Hondo Gallery. "The museum, which now is in Hereford, Texas, is looking for a new home," Montes said. "They sent me their magazine, I think it's called Sidesaddle, and New Mexico is well represented, as are Oklahoma, Texas, Montana, Wyoming and many other states."

One of the cowgirls featured in the Hall of Fame is the late Fern Sawyer, who had a ranch near Nogal. Montes said he sees the museum as a two-way win proposition. It would add another compatible attraction to Lincoln County and would save the Super Select Sales Barn for future staging of the annual Lincoln County Cowboy Symposium. The barn in Glencoe is for sale and previously was offered to the county for \$250,000. "So far there is nothing really organized about this," Montes said Monday. "Commissioner (L. Ray) Nunley spoke to (State Representative) John Underwood (D-Ruidoso) about it and he spoke to (Commissioner) Wilton Howell. I talked to (Ruidoso city councilor) Frank Potter. "We see it as a multiple purpose,

## Mescaleros encouraged to seek private partners in developing an MRS facility

Nuclear Waste Negotiator Richard H. Stallings has encouraged the Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe to pursue developing a private nuclear waste storage facility. Stallings, appointed by President Bill Clinton this year and confirmed by the Senate, is just getting his feet wet on the controversial issue he was appointed to oversee. He apparently sees a dim future for the federal development of an MRS. The Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe, for the past couple of years, has been working with the Department of Energy through the Office of the Nuclear Waste Negotiator in an effort to site high-level nuclear waste in a Monitored Retrievable Storage (MRS) facility. The federal government initiated this whole process by undertaking to identify volunteers to temporarily store the waste generated by nuclear power plants. The search was made more urgent by the government's promises to the nuclear industry that it would take on this waste. Nuclear plants have paid into a fund to pay for that storage, but so far they're also paying to store their own spent fuel rods. The Mescalero tribe has received two study grants from the DOE to determine if an MRS can and should be sited on its land, but the

process was stalled when the House and Senate cut off funding for further studies. Tired of the federal government's dragging its feet, the tribe reportedly is working on a plan to develop a private nuclear storage facility. Meanwhile, Peso is leading the tribe's efforts to continue the phased project that tribal leaders expect could bring jobs and economic development to Mescalero. Some tribal members have compared the government's vacillation on this issue to its past broken treaties with the Indian tribes. Peso met Stallings at a recent meeting in San Francisco, and wrote to him on December 13, regarding the discouraging message the funding delays send to applicants. "Nonetheless, we remain firmly committed to participation in the voluntary siting process administered by your office, which is by far the best way to resolve this intractable national problem," Peso wrote to Stallings. "I am confident that the application of your political skills can help to break the political logjam which has immobilized the Negotiator's Office for 18 months, ever since we notified the U.S. government in July of 1992 that the Mescalero

Tribal Council was ready to enter formal negotiations," wrote Peso. Peso told Stallings that the Mescaleros have received formal and informal communications about the possibility of constructing an MRS as part of a private sector, joint venture. "We are also aware that there are several other private groups aggressively pursuing just such a commercial opportunity," wrote Peso. "We cannot ignore these potential competitors despite our preference for the congressionally mandated voluntary siting process." Stallings, who has offered to visit Mescalero, encouraged Peso to work with those interested in a private sector, joint venture project. "The negotiated siting that I will begin pursuing will involve interactive coordination and cooperation with interested parties," wrote Stallings. "It will be open to, and encourage, new approaches for development and implementation. I do not believe that, given the need to move forward and make meaningful progress, I will be offering any prescriptive processes or timetables." Stallings went on to say that, given the requirement of the Mescalero Apache Tribe, the private opportunities seem to be more suited

to the tribe's needs. "The country needs an interim storage facility," wrote Stallings. "Your success with this private sector opportunity will be our success." Elsewhere, a group representing about 7,000 northern Saskatchewan native peoples has commissioned a study on the feasibility of building an international, high-level radioactive waste repository. "The Meadow Lake Tribal Council wants to know whether a spent fuel facility would be economic and feasible in their area of the Canadian Shield granite formation, 350 miles north of the U.S. border," according to a report in "Nucleonics Week." The feasibility study aims to determine the commercial opportunity associated with providing spent nuclear fuel storage and disposal services to domestic and international clients, according to a tribal council concept paper. Meanwhile, as these parallel efforts are undertaken to find a temporary resting place for a growing stockpile of highly-radioactive utility waste, the U.S. government is working on developing a permanent repository. Some opponents of the MRS process, want some assurance that a permanent site is in sight before developing a temporary facility.

a way to purchase the Super Select Sales Barn, save the Cowboy Symposium, bring in a permanent attraction and create a place for other cultural attractions," Montes said.

Potter, who is development director for the Museum of the Horse in Ruidoso Downs and is involved in the Cowboy Symposium, is scheduled to ask the commission Tuesday to take a serious look at the new option.

"I don't know where it's going," Montes said. "But John (Underwood) is enthusiastic about it and several directors of the EDC (Lincoln County Economic Development Corporation) are talking about how good it could be for the county."

"Kathleen Michelena was telling me that you don't measure the impact of something like that by what the attraction may bring in. You look at the money the families spend in the area."

Margaret Formby, executive director of the Hall of Fame, told **The Ruidoso News** Monday that her organization has received 15 proposals for relocation, including an inquiry from several persons in Ruidoso.

"At the last board of directors meeting in September, we decided to look for options and possible restructuring," Formby said. "We decided it was time to consider whether it is feasible to remain in Hereford or look for another location. We've outgrown our present 6,000 square-foot facility, the personnel available and really, the town."

Hereford, with a population of 18,000, is the largest beef producer in the world, generating 75 percent of the beef in Texas, she said.

It's just a very small farming, ranch town, very rural, Formby said.

That wasn't a problem in 1975 when the Hall of Fame was initiated. Since then, 120 women have been inducted.

"We don't have room to have a display on each, but we have many collections of their memorabilia," Formby said. "If we don't have a display, we still have photos and individual histories in our archives of well over 600 women of the West. We consider the Hall of Fame an excellent research center."

"We don't have the exposure here we need to have. Now may be the time. People want to see more on western women and more access for research projects."

The board recently sent letters to the 15 groups that had expressed an interest and asked for serious proposals by January 15.

"That will begin to let us start concentrating on those that are serious with on site visits," she said. "Already several delegations have come over to see our collections and art."

Fern Sawyer's association with Ruidoso and her strong rodeo background may give the community an edge, however.

## Holiday visitors boost ER business

Year-round residents are howling over long delays in the Lincoln County Medical Center emergency room and waiting for ambulances.

But hospital administrator Valerie Miller asked for a little understanding about the annual and temporary condition.

"Last year, we served a phenomenal number of people in the corresponding week, almost our monthly volume in the space of seven to nine days," she told **The Ruidoso News** Thursday. "We try our hardest to make it smooth. The rest of the winter isn't as intense as this week."

The hospital gears up for the onslaught of visitors injured on the ski slopes, in vehicle accidents on

icy roads or by over-exertion. Emergency room staff was doubled and extra on-call reserves scheduled, Miller said.

"Three crews are on call for the ambulance service," she said. "The county and village ambulances also support us. If the patients are coming from Alto, for instance, that's a county ambulance service, but that's not to say another company wouldn't go out if needed."

Delays also may occur because treatment must go first to the more severely injured or ill, she said.

"We have to take the people based on severity of illness," Miller said. "If someone comes in suffering with the flu, I know they feel awful, but in reality, if we don't do something for someone more in need, we'd be in trouble."

The busiest hours in the emergency room are from 2 p.m. to 7 p.m., she said, adding "Come Monday (today), it all will be gone."

The hospital depends on visitors to the town for a significant portion of its income, she said. Local residents help support the hospital through a special tax, but the summer and winter visitors contribute 45 percent or more of the hospital's income, Miller said.

"Without them, we would not be able to support the number of physician specialists we offer," she said.

"Let's face it. We live in a resort town. That's what pays all of our salaries, the hospital, merchants, restaurants, the supermarkets. As frustrating as it is at times, we have to live through it."

## Area firefighters battle two blazes

Bonito Fire Department (BFD) celebrated New Year's Eve with a blazing bonfire. But someone else lit the bonfire that BFD put out.

At approximately 11:45 p.m. on Friday, December 31, a patrolling Sheriff's deputy spotted flames in the upper Eagle Creek area near the Eagle Creek summer homes on Forest Road 127.

Upon arrival Bonito volunteers found an unattended campfire with three logs, each approximately 10 inches to 12 inches by two and a half feet, burning brightly.

Firefighters extinguished the blaze within minutes. They said, fortunately, the fire posed little danger of spreading since it was contained inside a large fire ring.

Except for tire tracks of one or two vehicles, firefighters could find no evidence of the fire starter's

identity.

The previous evening Bonito Fire Department responded to a report of a structure fire in west Cedar Creek.

Shortly after 6:30 p.m. Thursday, December 30, neighbors of the Boyd-Stillwell cabin spotted flames in the unoccupied two bedroom residence.

When firefighters arrived they found the houses' interior fully engulfed. They confined the blaze to the structure's interior, leaving the exterior walls intact.

Apparently the house is jointly owned by the Boyd family of Garland, Texas, and the Stillwell family of Butte, Montana.

A nephew of the Boyd co-owners from Carrollton, Texas, arrived to spend the weekend at the cabin just as firefighters were extinguishing the flames. He verified that the

cabin had been unoccupied except that other relatives had been using the cabin earlier in the week, but had left at noon.

Firefighters spent approximately 45 minutes knocking down flames but another three hours cooling hot spots.

"It was a real old wood cabin that burnt well and it had a metal roof planked with wood. It was a like lead on a kettle burning inside," described one firefighter.

The fire originated in the house's wall furnace.

"It either flashed back when it started, or else it was a faulty flue," theorized fire officials. "Those are the two most common causes of fire in that type of furnace."

The state's arson investigator had not been called at press time.

Ruidoso Fire Department assisted Bonito Fire Department with one engine and crew.

## HIV tests offered free

Living in a rural area of New Mexico offers no special protection against exposure to the HIV virus and the deadly acquired immunodeficiency syndrome (AIDS).

According to a news release from Tony Escudero of the State Department of Health, an increasing number of Human Immunodeficiency Virus (HIV) positive persons are being reported from smaller rural areas of New Mexico and not just the larger communities of Albuquerque and Santa Fe.

"Currently, reports indicate that the highest risk group are people within the 17-24 age group," he said.

"Increasing numbers of heterosexuals and women are also being reported as testing positive for HIV."

The test is administered free at all public health offices.

# Charmain deserves a break today...

Smart, obedient and playful, Charmain has turned into one of the standouts at the Lincoln County Humane Society animal shelter since she arrived in late October.

She resembles a black German shepherd, possibly crossed with an Australian cattle dog or some other smaller breed with shorter legs.

"She was found at McDonald's wearing a bright orange collar," said shelter manager Esther Harper. "Her face is mostly black, with tan markings on her body and white paws."

"She knows her sit and stay commands. In the morning when we're letting the dogs outside, she goes straight to the door and waits to be let out. She's well on her way to being housebroken, she's very

friendly, would be an excellent family dog and easy to maintain.

Another bright light waiting for adoption, Riley was given that special chance for survival by a foster family, willing to provide a temporary home.

"She came into the shelter about two months ago," said office manager Kathy Tetreault. "One of our foster families kept her for several weeks while we gave her the full round of immunizations. By the time she came back into the shelter, she had the best possible protection we could give her and she seems to have done fine for the last few weeks she's been here."

"She was so skinny when she came in, we thought she'd get sick. When the foster had her a few days, she puffed right up, because she was gobbling up food. Then she slimmed down to the right size."

A beautiful gray, Riley appears to be a husky/shepherd mix about four to five months old.

"She's very smart," Tetreault said. "If someone could pick up where the foster parent left off, it wouldn't take long to complete all of her training."

The foster parent in this situation was Donna Bassett of The Sky's the Limit shop in Ruidoso.

"She's a been wonderful and fostered a lot of our young animals," Tetreault said. "Ideally, the people bringing in the litters would either get their series of shots for them first or at least keep them while we give the shots. But unfortunately, most won't consider it, even though we explain their chances of survival without that

protection is very low. We just recently lost a wonderful litter of six black labradors, and even an older terri-poo, who apparently never had been given his shots."

"If we had enough foster families, when each new litter came in, they would go right out to a foster home. It's a good way for seasonal residents to enjoy being with animals when they are not able to adopt one and take it with them, or for someone who has a long summer vacation period, or the space."

To volunteer as a foster parent, call Tetreault at the shelter and leave your name, telephone number and other information about facilities for the puppies or kittens.

Adoptions still seem sluggish, Tetreault said.

"We've had a lot of lookers who seem very serious about a dog or cat," she said. "We get very optimistic, especially when it's one of our past featured pets who still is looking for a home, like Moe. But if they don't come back, we get so depressed. We have plenty of variety in breeds and different ages, including a spectacular male collie already neutered, a golden retriever adult and pup, several shepherd mixes, a chow, and two great Australian shepherd mixes."

Volunteers still are needed at the society's thrift shop next to Arby's on Sudderth Drive.

This enterprise is the major source of income for the shelter and for future expansions and improvements. Help is needed to mark items, display them and to staff the shop. Just a few hours a week, possibly working with a friend, could

mean a great deal to the abandoned animals.

Those who prefer to work directly with the pets are welcome to visit the shelter and walk the dogs and play with the cats. The interaction improves their chances for survival, as does sponsoring them for the cost of their spaying or neutering.

With each adoption, the new

# Boys take consolation with miracle comeback

## Down by 23 points in 4th quarter

The Ruidoso Warrior Boys Basketball team won its second Wildcat Invitational consolation trophy Thursday with a remarkable effort against Santa Fe St. Michaels, 80-78.

The Warriors staged an almost unbelievable comeback in the fourth quarter as the locals trailed the Horsemen by as many as 23 points with six minutes left in the fourth quarter.

For most of the game, Ruidoso played poorly — probably their worst three quarters of the season. But when things started going the Warriors way in the fourth quarter, they looked awesome.

Obviously in any great comeback, the opponent plays a big part

and St. Michaels obliged by fouling repeatedly and putting Ruidoso on the free throw line, allowing the Warriors to cut the Horsemen's lead, without the clock running down.

Suddenly, Ruidoso was within spitting distance and St. Mike's panicked — big time. A plethora (well four) 3-point baskets, nine free throws and an aggressive press brought the Warriors from almost certain defeat to actually taking a five-point lead with a minute left in regulation.

At that point, it was St. Mike's that gathered themselves and tied the game at 69, hitting a big 3-pointer and two free throws.

The overtime period saw Ruidoso make just one field goal, but go 10-13 from the free throw

line. During the same span, the Horsemen made three two-point field goals and one three — but they also went 0-2 from the charity stripe.

Crunch all the numbers you want, but watching Ruidoso play the last half of the final quarter had little to do with the score — the score was the end result. What you saw was sheer determination, a little good luck and a realization that anything is possible if you want it bad enough.

In the tournament, Ruidoso won two games that in years past would have been losses. Wednesday's barnburner with Denver City, Texas, saw Ruidoso in front virtually the whole way before giving the lead up in the last couple of minutes — but the Warriors fought

back and won.  
Thursday's game was just the opposite, Ruidoso was never in it, but never gave up. They won a game they shouldn't have.

A beaming head coach Paul Kirkwood saw the game the same way.

"This is what we've worked for since the summer. It's not that Ruidoso has had basketball players ... in fact we have some very good ones ... It's just that they haven't believed in themselves. I hope that these games can help them turn things around ... show them that they can win," said Kirkwood.

The win against St. Mike's was fueled by another All-World performance by junior Raul Davis. The 5-11 postman scored 26 points against the Horsemen. Add that to Davis' 27-point performance against Denver City and another 12 against Lovington, and you've got Ruidoso's only all-tournament team

selection.  
Other scoring for the Warriors against St. Michael's included: Daniel Espinosa, 5; J.R. Chino, 3; Corvin Lester, 6; Rex Comanche, 11; Cory Hood, 11; Casey Kearns, 16; and Todd Young scored a bucket.

While it was Davis' performance that was the flashiest, the dramatic win could not have been achieved without his teammates. There would be no win if Kearns didn't go 10-14 from the line. There would have been no win if Corv Hood didn't control the team on the offensive end and like Kearns, make big free throws at crunch time.

There would have been no win without Rex Comanche's and J.R. Chino's key 3-point baskets in the fourth quarter; or Corvin Lester's steals; or Daniel Espinosa's coolness under pressure; or Kirkwood's belief.

It was a team effort. A win that

these kids will always remember.

This will probably be the last time that Ruidoso will venture to the Lovington tournament. Not particularly because of the tough competition (although that has some bearing), but because Kirkwood wants the Warriors to see the inside of the Warrior gym in December.

This season the Warriors are scheduled for at least 23 games — eight of which are at home. That's not good enough.

At this time, Kirkwood is happy with the Moriarty tournament, because we match up well with the teams there and one tournament is enough to travel to.

If Ruidoso could host a tournament, that would be different, but right now look for the Warriors to look for some pre-district games that we have a chance to be competitive in and we don't have to travel ... much.

# Warriors get a second chance at Tulie

The Warrior boys won't get much time to reflect on their recent success in Lovington as they prepare for their home opener Tuesday night against the high-flying Tularosa Wildcats.

Tularosa, 7-1 on the season, defeated the Warriors on December 3 in Ruidoso's season opener, in Tulie. Since that time, the Wildcats have knocked off the defending State Champion Hot Springs Tigers who are led by blue chip recruit Royce Olney.

In their first meeting, Ruidoso

led the game most of the way, but fouled out five players, including four starters.

Tularosa took command in the closing minutes and won the game by 11 points. One other factor — and its a big one — Raul Davis didn't play.

Since that time, the Warriors haven't really had any foul problems to speak of and Davis has been terrific. He averaged 22 points per game at the Lovington tournament and 13 in Moriarty.

As the season has progressed, so has Raul's scoring. In Moriarty, Davis scored 8, 11 and 21 points respectively. At Lovington his totals were 12, 27 and 25 points.

More importantly, Davis' other skills have improved.

His defense is better than last year's, and he also has the ability to bring the ball down against the press — relieving a lot of pressure that has sat squarely on the shoulders of Cory Hood in the past.

The Warriors will play a good basketball team Tuesday, but it's a

team that Ruidoso can beat. If that happens, the Warriors would have won three consecutive basketball games.

When was the last time that happened? If it doesn't, they have a chance at another winning streak Saturday as the team travel to Moriarty for a game with the Pintos.

Game time is set for 5:30 p.m. for the Junior Varsity action, with the varsity tipping off about 7:15 p.m. The game will be carried live on KRUI radio.

# How To Age A New House Gracefully



Architectural refinements, special colors and gracious wallpapers can lend a traditional flavor to a new house with the charm of this hallway in Colonial Williamsburg's Grissell Hay House.

The more hectic our daily lives, the more we crave a sense of calm and charm in our homes. We admire the character and elegance of the houses we see in living museums such as Colonial Williamsburg, and wish we could bottle it all and take it home with us.

The good news is that it's almost that easy to invoke the spirit of the 18th century in your own home, even if it was built within the last few months.

According to Jackie Smith, senior designer at Colonial Williamsburg's Craft House, any new home can acquire the patina of age if you recognize some of the characteristics of an 18th-century house and learn how to adapt them to a newer house.

"Architectural refinements and special colors are among the features that set the homes of Colonial Williamsburg apart from today's houses," she explains.

"For example, colonial homes were more lavish in their use of moldings and trim, and to emphasize these refinements, they were sometimes painted a color that would contrast with the walls. Doors could also be painted a contrasting color, and wallpapers and borders were popular in affluent homes. Fireplaces were adorned with beautifully crafted mantels and ceramic tile, and wall sconces, chandeliers and door hardware were outstanding examples of the artistry

of the craftsmen of the day."

## Faithful Reproductions

Today, reproductions of these design elements are readily available through the efforts of the Colonial Williamsburg Foundation. Carefully selected manufacturers produce moldings, paints, wallpaper, decorative tile, lighting, hardware, fences and gates, and Smith says they can make all the difference in a new house.

She explains that licensees must have the ability to copy an antique exactly, even if it involves the use of handwork or techniques abandoned years ago for faster, less expensive methods. Sometimes, today's miracle materials and finishes replace the original ones, but Smith feels that the happy fact that these elements are available in newly carefree forms does not make the dentil cornice of a Focal Point cornice any less elegant or the Americana palette of Martin-Senour's paints any less triumphant.

How many design elements to adopt for a modern home is a matter of personal taste.

"You may just want to incorporate Virginia Metalcrafters' or Period Lighting's chandeliers and sconces for softer light sources," she says. "Or you may set the tone for the living room with Summitville's Delft-type tiles around the fireplace opening, wallpaper and window treatments by Schumacher, and woodwork paints

from Martin-Senour's Williamsburg collection."

"Remember that Williamsburg reproductions have proved endlessly versatile," continues Smith. "They mix effortlessly with design elements and furnishings from other eras and countries. They are absolutely timeless and timely."

## Personalize Style

Smith says there's no need to give up our 20th-century creature comforts even if we want to live with design elements from the past.

"The trick is to choose the best from both worlds," she notes. "Work with details—door knobs, hinges, chandeliers. Come to Colonial Williamsburg and see how moldings, wallpapers and colors are used. Take a good look at the curb appeal that can be achieved with fences and gates. Then do your own thing. By all means, mix contemporary furniture with historic colors. Don't be afraid to combine a cherished antique with a reproduction, modern lithographs with a time-honored wallpaper, intricate ceiling moldings with the snap and spark of chrome and glass tables... You are sure to find the end result warm and pleasing."

**Q.** I own a home that is about 40 years old and need to sand a wooden floor in my dining room. I recently removed an old carpet and discovered that the floor boards are far from a perfect finish. Can you explain in detail the procedure and method of sanding a bare wooden floor?

**A.** The benefit of renovating an old wood floor by yourself at practically no cost far outweighs the cost of replacing expensive carpeting. Also, you can't compare the exquisiteness of a gleaming finished wood floor to any rug, especially in a dining room.

Start out by going to a power-tool supply dealer and rent an electric power sander. You should give the entire area that needs to be prepared a good visual check for any loose boards or protruding nails. Repair anything on the floor that needs fixing before you even make contact with the wood. Also, ask the rental dealer if they have an edger. This handy item can be easily attached to the sander itself and can sand hard-to-reach places such as corners, stairs and the edges close to the wall.

An important matter to ask your dealer is what kind of floor and the type of finish you have. He will then be able to recommend the right kind of abrasives to use and whether you'll need two, three, or more sandings to complete the job.

There are several rules of thumb you'll need to remember and adhere to for a professional-looking job. When sanding, for instance, at the end of each pass, you must raise the sander from the floor before the machine comes to a standstill. The reason for this is that the sander will create out-of-course markings that vary from the proper way of handling the machine. Also, never let the drum or circumference of the sander touch the floor when the sander is not in use. This too will result in nicking the finish and possibly scorching the wood.

The operation of this machine is fairly easy to handle without having to exert any great force. These sanders work equally well whether used backward or forward. You will be delighted at the results of your labor after this job is done for many years to come.

**Q.** We have a stucco home and want to paint it as soon as weather permits. In preparation of outside cleaning, one of the walls has a problem where climbing ivy and honeysuckle vines were attached. In pulling these down to control at ground level, wherever the vines clung, there remain pieces embedded in the wall. We have experimented with a wire brush with absolutely no success, as well as overall deep steam cleaning.

Is there some other method you know of to remove this vegetation?

**A.** Despite your failed efforts, take heart. There are ways to combat your problem. However, you must use extreme caution so you won't disturb or damage your fine stucco finish.

You will need to purchase a commercial root killer product that can be found at your hardware store or major department store. This item is used primarily for killing deep roots, such as those that remain after cutting a tree down to its stump. The method employed is with a large, powerful drill. A very long drill bit is drilled through the top of the stump as far as possible and the chemical is then poured in the holes.

In your case, you will drill much smaller holes and carefully funnel the root killer into the openings. If at all possible, drill your holes at a slight angle (45 degrees) above the roots. Be careful when handling the product and always follow the manufacturer's instructions. You should have favorable results in a short time and will be able to paint over your stucco finish.







# Village building tops \$16 million so far this year

Village building was recorded at \$1,794,975 at the end of November, as the weather turned cold and the year wound down toward its final month.

Last year, in 1992, the village issued permits valued at just \$12,015,918, a big increase of 1991's \$8,940,247.

Village building permits hit \$40,412,970 in 1984, and continued a downward spiral to a low of \$5,133,663 in 1988, and have gone up and down since.

Year-to-date as of November 1993, is at a whopping \$16,764,558.50.

November's permits totaled 56, and 14 of those were for new single family homes.

No new commercial buildings were started during November.

The month's construction was dominated by reroofs, reshingles and other such repair work.

October saw 61 permits issued in the village for a total valuation of \$1,802,675.50, bringing the year-to-date to 507 permits at \$14,969,583.50.

In October 11 new single family dwelling permits were issued valued at \$1,461,235.

Homeowners did plenty of remodeling that month, though, with 42 permits issued for residential additions/alterations. Those 42 had a value of \$232,043.50.

One permit was issued for a new commercial building in October, and that was for a six-unit addition to a motel owned by Don Chubb at 620 Sudderth Drive.

Six permits were issued during October for commercial additions and alterations, and one \$8,000 permit was issued for a church addition/alteration at

Gateway Church of Christ.

In September, the village issued 55 building permits valued at \$1,713,561 for a year-to-date total of \$13,166,908.

Of those permits, eight were for new single family homes with a total value of \$1,315,939.

During September 42 permits were issued at \$360,314 for residential additions and alterations.

No new commercial permits were issued in September, but five commercial additions/alterations were undertaken that month.
