Planners OK lot variance for a second time

The Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission, hearing a request for the second time, again allowed Dorothy Holt Kimsey a variance over the protests of her neighbors.

The variance was brought before the Ruidoso Village Council for final approval on December 14, but a question as to timing of notification to adjoining owners prompted the council to kick it back to planning and zoning for another hearing last Monday.

Village planner Cleatus Richards told the commission that his position is unchanged. He is against creating a five-foot variance, noting that deed restrictions in White Fir Subdivision (Upper Canyon) appear to limit construction to not less than 10 feet.

Kimsey wanted to put a carport and guest house within a foot of the lot line, the commission allowed five feet.

Ben Mason of Upper Canyon spoke on behalf of Margery Loisel, a neighbor of Kimsey's.

Mason said that Loisel didn't want encroachment to her house nearer than what was allowed. He said he and Loisel were long time residents of Upper Canyon, and enjoyed the aesthetic space between the dwellings there. He said Loisel and residents of Upper Canyon had a right not to have construction nearer to their homes than the law allowed.

Mason said that Kimsey showed she didn't care about the aesthetics of the area when she placed a chain link fence on her property.

The commission said the variance saved a few trees that would have to be cut if placement of the carport and guest house was within the 10 foot side lot line. However, the variance doesn't prevent Kimsey from cutting her trees if she decides to construct another addition.

The commission allowed the five-foot variance to stand.

Parking is no problem in Midtown

Parking and traffic experts spent two days putting the MainStreet project under a microscope before outlining their findings before a sparse crowd at an Enchantment Inn luncheon.

Marty Wells of Wells and Associates, Inc., spoke with the mayor and council early Thursday. He told the governing body, that the village didn't have a parking problem at this time. But they did have a space management and communication problem.

Later at the luncheon, Wells first defined Ruidoso's downtown as primarily a retail center. Almost all of downtown businesses front on Ruidoso's main street, Sudderth Drive, he said.

Parking is a problem for retail customers, shop owners, and employees; particularly during summer weekend days, he said.

Wells said there is a general perception that there are not enough parking spaces provided where they are needed. Moreover, steep grade differences make it difficult to walk between Sudderth Drive and Rio-El Paso and Texas Street that are located to the north and south, respectively, he said.

Opinion ranges widely about the extent to which employees park in the choice customer spaces on Sudderth Drive and the real value of the municipal lot, Wells told the small assembly.

He said existing parking problems will become more pronounced with the Sudderth Drive sidewalk widening project, but the number of curb spaces will be reduced from 119 to 42 spaces for a negative impact.

Wells said based on his field reconnaissance, focus group interviews and experience elsewhere, he recommended the following:

1. Communication. Develop a forum within which merchants can communicate a month themselves, the village, and others about common issues affecting downtown businesses, including traffic and

parking issues. MainStreet Ruidoso was formed for this purpose.

2. Information. Conduct a detailed, objective parking study to accurately assess current parking behavior and identify peak season parking needs. Such a study would, for example, identify how many shop owners and employees park on Sudderth Drive, how long customers park, parking demand, and the current parking surplus (or deficit).

3. Reserve Sudderth Drive curb parking spaces for short-term customer parking. This is probably best accomplished by posting two-to-four-hour time limits on these spaces. With proper enforcement, this will encourage high turnover customer parking and prevent shop owners and employees from parking on Sudderth Drive all day.

4. Provide more side street spaces. Parking is prohibited on certain side streets. Reassess curb parking on these streets in light of available street width, sight distances, and other parameters. Next to Sudderth Drive, curb parking on Fern Street, Center Street and Eagle Drive are the most important curb parking spaces in downtown Ruidoso.

5. Reserve Sudderth off-street parking lots for customers and handicapped parking. Since they are located adjacent to stores, these are the most attractive off-street lots for short-term customer parking, they are also most appropriate for handicapped parking since they are at the same elevation as Sudderth Drive.

6. Provide long-term employee and customer parking behind stores. Combine the small unimproved lots behind Sudderth Drive into larger, more efficient, more attract asphalt lots to be used by shop owners, employees and retail customers who may stay downtown for more than two to four hours. Connections between these lots and Sudderth Drive can be pro-

vided by adjacent side streets, walkways between stores, or through the stores themselves.

Improvements can be undertaken entirely by private property owners or through a private-public partnership among the property owners and the village.

The village could lease the property and construct an improved parking lot. In return, these lots would be operated as public facilities.

7. Improve parking lot physical conditions. Many of the existing gravel lots on and behind Sudderth Drive are unattractive and inefficiently used since the spaces are not marked. Improving the surface, drainage, and lighting would improve Ruidoso's appearance and make these lots much more attractive to all users.

8. Operate parking resources as a unified system. Many of the private lots are signed for customers of a single business only.

9. Improve signage. A uniform signing program should be implemented to direct visitors to parking behind the stores. This is particularly important for the first time visitor.

10. Parking brochure. Promote parking resources by preparing a brochure that would show where parking is available to the public and how to get there. These brochures can be distributed by the merchants to their customers.

11. In lieu parking fees. The Village routinely grants variances from the zoning ordinance to businesses that find it difficult or impossible to provide the appropriate number of parking spaces. A common reason for granting such variances is tree removal.

The village should consider a \$2,000 to \$6,000 in lieu fee for each required parking space a developer does not provide. These funds could be used to lease ground for new municipal lots or to combine and upgrade existing small lots.

School clinics need nurses

More nurses should be hired in the Ruidoso school system to deliver services needed by its 2,000 students, the results of a local survey indicate.

Ruidoso District superintendent Mike Gladden told members of the school board Tuesday that school nurse Terry Gillespie put together a committee to conduct a health services needs assessment.

The state wants each school district to develop a document that allows assessment of the adequacy of services and to set priorities for services needed, Gillespie said.

Surveys were sent to randomly selected students, parents and staff to evaluate 21 tasks being performed by the school nurse, and five being provided by the staff of the high school/middle school health center.

The results clearly showed that more nursing personnel is the number one priority, she told board members.

The district now has one nurse for 2,000 students. She visits each school one day a week, leaving time for immediate health needs, tracking immunization and health records and little else. Emergencies call her away from school assignments several times a week, she said.

She recommended hiring one more nurse immediately and two para-professional nursing assistants.

The student health center, now open three hours a week each at the high school and the middle school, offers free services, but is limited because of a small staff and tight space, she said.

"There is a great need for more services from the health center," Gillespie said. "Three hours each week at the two schools is good for the first year, but it requires more staff and space to expand."

The high number of responses from people who were not aware of certain services indicates that either they are the type that are confined to just a few people each year and that more staff, visibility and public information is needed.

Gladden said the State Board of Education calls for one nurse for every 55 certified staff members, but doesn't provide the money to hire them. Federal guidelines list one nurse for every 750 students.

"It may be addressed in the new session of the State Legislature, but the district also is looking into other avenues of funding," he said.

Dr. Arlene Brown, coordinator of the student health center, said she's been impressed by the increase in students using the center this year compared to the same period last year.

From September 1992 to January 1993, the health center staff saw 128 students. This school year during that period, 218 students received services.

"We're a little unusual from other areas with student health centers," Brown said. "We're seeing

ENMU-Ruidoso prof digs bones and pottery

Exhibiting an excitement that hasn't dimmed during the 30 years she has taught and practiced archaeology, Jodi Bennett previewed her cultural anthropology course, which begins tonight at Eastern New Mexico University-Ruidoso.

Bennett, retired curator of archaeology of Arizona State University, stopped by the **The Ruidoso News** office to talk about the class and plans for an archaeology course in the future.

Originally from a ranch in Otero County, Bennett has moved back to Alamogordo after traveling the world and living in Colorado, Arizona and California.

"I found projectile points and rock art in my back yard while I was growing up," Bennett said. "All my life I've been interested in studying Native Americans, but then World War II came along, so I worked at Holloman Army Air Base (there was no air force yet) on the B27 that flew to Japan."

She enlisted in the Women's Army Corps to gain an education and ended up staying in the corps 10 years. She took advantage of the opportunity to travel and to indulge her interest in archaeology by stopping in Egypt, Greece, Africa, Turkey and Vienna; and indulged her athletic inclinations by skiing the Alps.

She missed her early association with horses, however. In Europe, most of the horses had been eaten

during the German occupation. But with the liberation, people started bringing their horses out of hiding and she was able to saddle up again.

When she returned to the United States, she used the G.I. Bill to earn a series of degrees and became a Campbell Scholar.

Bennett said she has an associate degree of arts in anthropology and art history; a bachelor's degree in anthropology and zoology; a master's degree in science education and a Ph.D. in archaeology.

She taught for 30 years between her time at Arizona State University and the University of California at Santa Barbara.

"I probably have 10,000 hours in the field in 20 different countries and the islands off the coast of California," Bennett said.

"I've done contract archaeology all over the United States."

She's part of the team that rushes in when a tractor clearing a lot uncovers bones or pottery. The clearing work stops while the team quickly excavates to find out what type of site lies below and its potential archaeological value.

She currently acts as a consultant for the Museum of the Horse. She has plenty of background with equines too. Her horses were four time High Point Horses of the Year for the State of Arizona in Antique Carriage Driving.

"I've raised horses 52 years and won more than 200 championships," she said, adding

that they also come in handy for her work. "The best way to spot archaeological sites is to get on horseback and look down," Bennett said. "And you don't get hot doing it."

She later devised a system using an old fashion buddy with canopy. She would mark a possible spot and come back in a jeep with her equipment.

In her cultural anthropology class, Bennett said she will cover prehistoric civilizations and some ancient cultures in the major areas of the world.

"The book isn't that expensive and we will do a field trip," she said. "I promise to make it interest-

ing, something fascinating to learn and then go on with. I have thousands of photographs and all kinds of things to do."

The archaeology class she has in mind for a future semester is computer assisted with programs to study all types of civilizations.

"Unfortunately, all of the major sites in New Mexico were excavated from 1912-1920 by the University of Chicago and Harvard University and they have our artifacts," Bennett said.

The class will meet at 7 p.m. in Room S203 at Ruidoso High School. Call the university office at 257-2120 for more information.

almost as many males as females and we have been used by nearly as many Hispanics and Native American as Anglo. In a number of schools, it takes years before Hispanics and Native Americans are willing to come in.

"We're turning away a number of students each week, because they have no signed consents from their parents. Last year, we had the time to try to track down the parents by phone. This year, we're sending forms home with the students asking them to sign."

"At the high school, there is such a need, we have to schedule appointments for the following week. We can either keep them after school or reschedule them the following week. There is definitely a need for expanded services and hours. Staff and space limitations prevent it."

Brown said she can secure more staff going through the state health office as contract work.

"My supervisor on this, Karen Gaylord with the Division of Adolescent Health of the Public Health Office, assured me I could hire on contract."

Space needs possibly could be met using a Community Development Block Grant application by the school board or village and coordinating it with the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development for a temporary building.

Currently, the health center staff operates out of the nurse's office when it is not being used by other services or the nurse.

Gladden said a great deal of money is available on the state and national levels in recognition of the problems with adolescents receiv-

ing proper health care.

"We will be requesting more in our grant and we already have discussed with (principal Paula) Papponi having a separate room at Ruidoso Middle School, possibly moving a portable to the site, so we can encourage students to use the service and maintain their anonymity."

Board President Ron Hemphill asked about the types of services provided through the student health center.

Brown said diagnosis or treatment of sexually transmitted diseases is one of the functions that by law can be administered without parental consent.

Board member James Paxton noticed that no substance abuse services had been used to date this year, but there were many last year.

"We've had no requests for it this year," Brown said.

Hemphill asked about what is involved in the family planning service.

"We diagnose, explain the options and give referrals," Brown said. "We do not provide treatments, only the initial examination."

Looking at the report, board member Sue Lutterman noted that 29 prenatal services had been given just from September to January.

The tests connected to that diagnosis and others are one of the reasons the health center must be in a place with running water and a telephone line.

"A portable with those would be sufficient," she said.

Brown said the health center staff has found that fewer than one third of the students they have seen have access to private

physicians, because of a lack of insurance and private coverage.

In a related matter, Brown also reported on the formation and progress of the Lincoln County Maternal and Child Health Council. The commission agreed to sponsor the group, but it operates solely from a state grant.

The council will be looking at the individual needs of the county for prenatal and newborn care.

"It's still in the formative stages," Brown said. "We have representatives from each school district and village."

The goal is to bring adequate care to women and teenagers in need, she said. They have until February 1 to apply for money for a needs assessment to help design specific programs for this county.

"New Mexico is in the bottom one-third of the nation in providing prenatal services," Brown said. "We track that by the number of women who come in to deliver with no prenatal services."

It's much less expensive to provide the services before the baby is born than to have to deal with the potential chronic health problems of low weight and premature babies, or those born with birth defects from the use of alcohol, cigarettes or drugs during pregnancy, she pointed out.

Sandy Gladden, director of Region IX Cooperative Education center, said becoming a Medicaid health care provider is one way schools can receive additional money for health services.

"The Region IX board voted unanimously to pursue this initiative," Mrs. Gladden said. "They feel it might be a solution to past obstacles. Bottom line, we're looking at how we can increase services to

the kids in the seven school districts (within the center's coverage). Only Ruidoso and Tularosa have full time nurses."

The change in federal law that would allow public schools to be Medicaid providers was passed in 1989. The state now must amend its plan to allow the procedure. The necessary interagency agreements are just about ready, she said.

In 1993, the State Legislature passed a memorial for the money to study Medicaid reimbursements to schools.

"The three areas where we can be reimbursed are administration, which is a huge factor in Medicaid, because it is so complex and clerically intensive; therapy services to Medicaid eligible students; and the Tots to Teens screening."

The latter has so low a reimbursement that the medical community is not interested, "but it's big money for public schools," Mrs. Gladden said. "It would benefit the districts and provide and improve screening services."

Reservations are associated with the screening, however.

"If we got Medicaid reimbursement for services now funded by the state, we're concerned the state would cut us in a like amount from our operating fund and yet, we would be taking on a huge clerical obligation," Mrs. Gladden said. "The state has made a commitment it won't take that credit as long as it is used for health related services."

Eventually, the state may put a cap on the money that could be used. That's one of the reasons Region IX wants to move now, before that occurs, she said. New Mexico is one of the first states to become involved because of the complexity and lack of previous history to follow.

"The Region IX board directed me to write a letter of intent on becoming a Medicaid service provider," Mrs. Gladden said. "The second step is to develop a community or regional plan and priorities for health related services and the third is to secure a provider number."

The center already is a service provider for children ages birth to two years.

"It took a few months to get the kinks out, but now it's going smoothly and we are getting what we filed for," she said. "The tentative plan is for Region IX to be the clearing house, hire the clerical-administrative person to keep our eligibility every six months and to keep the money coming in smoothly."

As an aside Mrs. Gladden added that initially her staff thought they would get about 20 percent of the children from birth to two years eligible for Medicaid reimburse-

ment, but it turned out to be 85 percent.

"If that translates to anything you find in public schools' the approach should be a success for recipients and for the district, she said. Eligibility is based on income level and disability.

The Tots to Teens program provides annual screening to diagnose and treat with early intervention difficulties, such as hearing and sight defects.

"If we can keep the screening current and the reimbursement coming, we may have enough to hire a nurse and nursing assistants," she said.

"Like other programs, Region IX helps get the money and sends it to the schools, which hire the personnel to provide the services. We're hoping one administrative person can handle the paperwork for all of the school districts. That may be unrealistic."

In other business, the school board:

—heard a glowing report from Nob Hill principal Roger Sowder on a recent state inspection of the full day kindergarten program and the extended day program (providing supervised activity after school) at his school.

"It was quite extensive," he said. "I feel good about the final results. The greatest weakness of the all day kindergarten program was record keeping, particularly in the area of determining the eligibility of the children and parents. It was cited just as needs improvement."

"We really shine in the delivery of services aspect. Their evaluation was that the program was exceptional. We need to perform evaluations on the children at the end of the school year."

Of the extended day program, Sowder said the evaluation team "was most complimentary of the program. They are citing it throughout the state as a model program."

Gladden said the paperwork connected to the two programs may discourage many districts, but not Ruidoso's staff. Out of a possible 100 points on physical records, district business manager Caron Snow received 100, he said.

"The auditor couldn't believe the documentation and paper trail. Everything was done according to requirements," Gladden said. "He walked out saying he would be sending people to see how it could be done so efficiently and effectively."

Sowder said the emphasis for grant money next year will be on the extended day program. "I'm betting on the State Legislature for all day kindergarten," he said.

—congratulated the sponsors and staff of the Ruidoso yearbook for the three national awards

received by the Tomahawk. The book received an honor rating of First Class with three marks of distinction from the National Scholastic Press Association, a first place award from the American Scholastic Press Association and a first place certificate from the Columbia Scholastic Press Association.

—recognized Jim Dickinson who has retired as a computer/math teacher at Ruidoso High School.

Gladden, on behalf of the district, gave Dickinson a black leather briefcase.

—told Gladden that additional security lights are needed at the back of the school where many students attending Eastern New Mexico University-Ruidoso classes, leave at night.

—heard from White Mountain Elementary principal Frank Cannella on efforts to provide better continuity from grade to grade on mathematics instruction, to include parent participation and an enrichment component to allow students to go beyond what is being done in the classrooms.

—accepted the resignation of Mike Gaines as vocational teacher with regret. Gaines will be joining the Carrizozo school system, where he previously taught.

"I'd like to say this is one of the finest individuals I have met in my life and this district will suffer tremendously with his loss," said Mike Randle, who substitutes at the high school. "This will be a very large hole at the high school. I have seen him take borderline students and pull them up and keep them interested. With limited resources, he put that shop back on track. He got them interested in Future Farmers of American. He won numerous awards at the state fair."

Assistant principal Danny Flores said a recognition banquet is scheduled for Gaines at 6:30 p.m. January 27 in the high school dining hall.

Board member James Varnadore directed Gladden to send a letter expressing the board's regret that he is leaving.

"I hate to see him go, but I understand opportunities for personal advancement," Hemphill said.

—told employee Sue Randle that the district has no policy dealing with spouses working at the same school site.

"I was advised by the board's attorney that it would be discriminatory," Gladden said.

"Would that apply to a management position?" Randle asked. "So your manager could be your spouse."

"We have no policy," Gladden repeated.

But Hemphill added, "I don't think the board would look favorable on that (situation)."

Dot is ready, waiting for a new family to love

A small bundle of affection abandoned by her owner, Dot, the long-haired dachshund was brought to the Lincoln County Humane Society shelter three weeks ago.

About nine months old with black hair, Dot has a lot going for her, according to the information left by her owner, who said she couldn't keep a dog.

Dot is housebroken, rides well in a car, is family oriented, active, likes chew bones and her rabies tag is current.

"She's a sweet dog, a good size for an apartment, for someone who travels or who just prefers small dogs," said shelter manager Esther

Harper.

A larger, but equally as endearing dog is Taylor, a shepherd mix, who possibly has Rottweiler blood.

He was brought into the shelter as a stray last September with his sister, Angel, who has shorter hair and is more aggressive.

Taylor's personality is calm and he gets along well with other dogs, except at feeding time, which is a common reaction for shelter animals until they are settled in a new home and feel secure, Harper said.

"He's been here since he was a pup and will need some adjustment to real life, but for being here so long, he's a great dog."

Taylor has a soft coat of black

and brown hair and a thick undercoat. His paws are white with brown spots. He is capable of jumping a four foot high fence, but he is intelligent and obedient and could be trained easily, she said.

New members are welcome. The annual election of officers is scheduled for the meeting and board members hope to see new people attend, who are willing to help with the humane work, with projects, and committee assignments.

Behavior tips

Adopting a puppy or young dog requires some training for both the owner and the new pet.

Frequently, chewing becomes a problem as favorite shoes and furniture receive the animal's unwanted attention.

Experts recommend buying a medium-size nylon bone. Rawhide can splinter and injure a young dog. Don't buy several toys, because that can confuse the puppy.

When he/she begins chewing on something inappropriate, take the object away or put the pup in your lap and give him the nylon bone.

To encourage his interest, play a gentle game of tug of war, allowing him to chew the bone when he wants. When his interest is engaged, put the pup and the bone

on the floor.

Repeat the process whenever the pup starts to chew on something other than the bone.

Be sure to unplug or put out of the way any electrical wires. They tend to be favorite chewing objects and can be dangerous for the puppy and the household.

Unnecessary barking also can be an annoying habit. Dogs often seem to bark at nothing instead for specific reasons of defining territory or finding a mate.

Bonnie V. Beaver, chief of small animal medicine and surgery at Texas A&M University, theorizes that many dogs bark out of boredom. She notes that dogs are social creatures. Keeping them locked in a back yard with no human interaction and expecting them to behave isn't realistic, she said. They will dig, bark, run in circles or jump over the fence.

Stanley Coren, a psychologist at the University of British Columbia who has studied canine intelligence, said the secret of dogs' communication lies in the pitch and frequency of their barking.


A higher pitch can mean fear and a lower may be a threat. A quick burst of four or five barks is to alert owners that someone is invading the dog's territory and he wants the owner's attention. A bark with a stutter to it is an invitation to play, Coren said.

When a dog starts howling in the back yard at night, yelling at him to be quiet actually is a reward, Coren said. The dog has received a voice response.

If possible, it's always better to

bring a dog inside at night to rejoin his pack (the human family). Keeping him isolated outside when the rest of the pack (family) is home, is viewed as a punishment for something he must have done wrong.

Unfortunately, laws against barking usually only push an owner to look for a quick fix instead of dealing with the underlying problem, Coren said.

Electric shock devices, ones that give off offensive sounds or odors instead of work, he contends, especially with small terriers who are convinced every leaf dropping at 3 a.m.

is a burglar. He urges owners to realize that a dog's penchant for barking has saved many lives and the only real way to stop the barking is to give a dog positive attention.

Don't say anything. Just rub the dog's head, chest and along the back. The dog will interpret that reassuring affection as meaning that there isn't any reason for him to be barking.

Two unions disappointed with legislative committee's school funding proposal

The presidents of two unions representing 15,000 of New Mexico's public school employees called a budget proposal adopted last week by the State Legislative Education Study Committee for public schools inadequate and disappointing.

Charles Bowyer of the National Education Association of New Mexico (NEA-NM) and John Mitchell of the New Mexico Federation of Teachers (NMFT) expressed con-

cerns that last year's revenue increase, including the controversial six cents gasoline tax, were generated based on a promise that they would be committed to increase state public education spending.

The study committee's budget doesn't reflect this, they noted.

According to a news release from the two unions, the men indicated that this year's legislature will have about \$600 million to spend

and that about half of the money is recurring general fund revenues. Yet, the committee has recommended only about one-sixth of this amount (\$108 million) be spent on public schools.

The union leaders say the result of the recommendation would be the continued loss of school programs, continued decline in regional and national salary comparisons and continued decline of education as a state spending

priority. "In a year when available revenues are great, public schools deserve to have some of their real needs addressed," Bowyer said. "We appreciate the efforts of last year's legislature to raise revenues. It was a start, but funding cannot be played like a yo-yo."

Mitchell said, "School employees continue to be one of the few groups supporting the six cent gas tax. However, the committee's proposal

raises concerns that the gas tax revenues are not being devoted to the public schools as promised."

The union leaders said that public schools expect to receive about one-half of the state's recurring expenditures. However, last year's appropriations, even with the six cent gas tax, showed another decline in the position of the state budget devoted to public education. Under the committee's proposal, this decline would continue.

Mitchell and Bowyer said their organizations are calling on lawmakers and the governor to build a budget that adequately addresses the resources needed for educational excellence and the future of New Mexico's students.

The local NEA representative in the Ruidoso school system is Dean Hood, although no union has yet been recognized as a collective bargaining unit for teachers.

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County firefighters battle two separate blazes Sunday afternoon

Back-to-back fires kept Bonito Volunteer Fire Department (BVFD) busy Sunday afternoon. The first was a structure fire in Alto village; the second, a brush fire in Angus. Neither fire resulted in injury.

At approximately 1:30 p.m. Sunday a chimney fire spoiled the holiday weekend for out-of-town visitors.

Julie Dillman and Kevin Hopper of El Paso, Texas, and Keith Johnson and Gloria Blea of Albuquerque were spending the weekend at 324 El Camino Trail in Alto Village. The two-story home belongs to Julie's parents, Everett and Connie Dillman, also of El Paso.

The young people said they were relaxing in front of the fireplace when they heard a loud noise in the chimney.

"It was a bang, like something hitting the chimney or something falling in to the chimney," Johnson went outside to investigate the noise and found the top of the tall chimney and wooden chase in flames. He ran to a neighbor's house to call the fire department. The others attempted to douse the flames with water and fire extinguisher.

Upon arrival, Bonito firefighters found the two-story zero-clearance chimney fully engulfed, and part of the second story and west roof in flames.

In addition, flames had already started a spot fire of less than one-tenth of an acre in the dry brush near the house.

"Twenty-mile per hour winds were blowing flames over the roof toward the forest which had dense fuel accumulation," reported a senior BVFD officer.

"We had a good initial attack and knocked the flames down within minutes," said another officer. Firefighters confined damage

to only the chimney and fireplace, part of the attic, the west roof and part of the living room.

On scene, BVFD's four trucks and one rescue unit were joined by one truck each from Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs fire departments which supplied water. Nogal and Capitan fire departments stood by with water at their stations, but were not needed.

Lincoln County Emergency Services-Alto and Otero County Electric Cooperative also responded to the scene.

Exact cause of the chimney fire had not been determined at press time. When contacted in El Paso by

his daughter, Mr. Dillman speculated "carbon in the chimney might have started the fire."

Firefighters had begun returning to their stations at about 3:30 p.m. when the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office summoned them to a grass fire near former Judge James Wheeler's store in Angus.

They found the brush pile on fire on New Mexico 37 approximately seven-tenths of a mile west of New Mexico 48.

Within 30 minutes, three BVFD units had quelled the small fire that was within 200 feet of the residence of Leslie Earwood.

Earwood told firefighters that at

approximately 1:30 p.m. he dumped hot fireplace ashes outside, then left for Capitan. The same winds that fanned the Dillman's chimney fire wiped the glowing ashes into a dry brush pile, causing a fire of approximately a tenth of an acre.

An observer from the nearby Nazarene District Center saw smoke and reported the fire.

When firefighters arrived, Earwood had returned from Capitan, surprised to find his property on fire.


No citations were issued.

He married Christine Speed on April 3, 1931. She died on April 24, 1988.



Warrior wrestlers impressive in El Paso tourney

The Warrior Wrestling team clawed its way into a 12th-place tie in the 28-team Bowie Invitational wrestling tournament Friday and Saturday in El Paso, Texas.

The tournament, generally regarded as the most competitive in the southwest United States, boasted attendance from virtually all of El Paso's schools plus Dallas St. Marks, which was the Texas State Champions last year.

In addition, two teams from Mt. Horeb, Wisconsin, jetted in to join the field which also included schools from southern New Mexico.

It was a big, big deal. Ruidoso was again led by 103-pound Julian Flores. The wiry Flores dominated his competition until the finals, where he lost 9-7 to a competitor from St. Mark's. Flores led most of the way in the match but was unfortunately pinned in the final seconds.

Beau Jarvis, who wrestled at 130 pounds, started slowly with a loss to Parkland's German Cisneros. But despite fighting the flu, Jarvis then won four straight matches to qualify for the medal round.

After suffering a 4-3 loss to Mayfield, Jarvis avenged his loss to

Parkland, winning 7-5. His 5-2 record placed him in fifth place in the elite field.

Johnny Flores had a great opening round Friday to move into the medal competition, but ran into a buzzsaw in St. Mark's Scott Gottlich — who just happens to be last year's Texas State Champion at 119 pounds.

Flores then lost the consolation to Omar Loya from Hanks in overtime and Tony Sevilla (5-3) of Gadsden for a sixth-place finish.

Matt Bates finished only a victory away from the medal round with a very good 3-2 record in the tourney.

Gunner Johnson (125 pounds) heavyweight Eustace Gallerito also added to the Ruidoso tally. Both wrestlers gained confidence with 2-2 days — eventually losing tight matches to tough wrestlers.

Jose Prieto was the only other Warrior to get a victory, going 1-2.

Other wrestlers included Shaun Cobb and Bill Cash, who despite their hard work, lack the experience for an event like this; and Billy Austin, who was unfortunate enough to draw the tournament's winner in the first round, and the fourth-place finisher in the consolation round.

The Warriors rose to as high as

tenth place in the tournament, but slipped to 12th, just points behind district foes Deming and Oñate.

The Warriors' performance at Bowie is definitely a continuation of the steps they have made this season. Now heading toward district and state matches, seemingly the Warriors are on a roll.

The Warriors face NMMI at home (6 p.m.) in a dual match Wednesday, before traveling to Roswell for a match with the Coyotes on Thursday.

Saturday brings the Ruidoso Invitational to the spotlight, where the Warriors will again face tough competition.

Largest ever antelope trapping is scheduled

A Department of Game and Fish antelope trapping project scheduled to begin January 18 will be the largest antelope transplant operation in game department history, said Bill Montoya, department director.

Between 1,200 and 1,500 antelope will be trapped at sites in game management units 55 and 56 southeast and southwest of Raton. The antelope are to be released at a number of sites around the state, primarily to supplement existing populations, Montoya said.

Trap headquarters for the month-long project will be the National Rifle Association Whittington Center south of Raton. Up to 30

persons per day are expected to assist as ground crews, including staff of the Bureau of Land Management.

The majority of the release sites are on BLM land, though some antelope will be released on private land where owners have agreed to allow hunting.

To capture the antelope, aircraft will be used to haze the animals into a wing trap, a method first developed by the New Mexico Department of Game and Fish and now used by other states for trapping and moving species of big game.

"The exact number of antelope to be trapped is still uncertain," Montoya said.







However, the Commission also recognizes the GTE West has requested these rate reductions on a permanent basis, and present and future parties to this docket may have different positions on such issues as return on equity, rate design, projected impact of rate changes and consequences on the merged operation of GTE-SW and GTE West.

IT IS THEREFORE ORDERED:

1. The Application off GTE West shall be considered in two phases: interim relief and permanent rates.

2. The hearing on interim rate relief shall be held on February 15, 1994 at 9:30 a.m. in the Commission Hearing Room, Fourth Floor, PERA Building, Corner of Paseo de Peralta and Old Santa Fe Trail, Santa Fe, New Mexico.

3. On or before January 11, 1994, the Company shall file additional direct testimony which contains the following:

(1) justification of the proposed rate design including reasons why other configurations were rejected;
(2) detailed back-up papers for the projected overearnings for 1993 utilized nine months of actual data and and three months projected; and
(3) justification and elasticity studies regarding projected stimulation or repression under the Company's proposed rates.

4. On or before February 8, 1994, Staff and other intervenors shall file testimony on the interim rate design.

5. Those persons who are not currently parties may file a motion to intervene on or before February 1, 1994.

6. A hearing on permanent rates will be held on April 20, 21 and 22, 1994, at 9:30 a.m., in the Commission Hearing Room, Fourth Floor, PERA Building, Corner of Paseo de Peralta and Old Santa Fe Trail, Santa Fe, New Mexico.

7. Intervenor shall file direct testimony on permanent rates on or before March 9, 1994.

8. Staff shall file direct testimony on permanent rates on or before March 25, 1994.

9. GTE West shall file rebuttal on or before April 11, 1994.

10. The Commission Staff shall mail this Notice of Hearing and Procedural Order to the Commission's telecommunications mailing list.

11. GTE West shall arrange for publication in the Albuquerque Journal on the notice of the interim hearing and the notice of the hearing on the permanent rates no later than 20 days before each hearing. GTE West shall also separately notice the interim hearing and the permanent hearing in the non-classified section of each newspaper service the GTE West operating territory.

12.
