Council offers help to schools

A proposal to follow the lead of Governor Bruce King and create a local version of the Mentor Program was discussed Tuesday during a joint meeting of the Ruidoso Village Council and School Board.

But school officials appeared to favor continuing with a program they started 14 months ago called Youth Empowered for Success (YES), or at least blending the two approaches to providing young people with more positive direction and adult interaction.

Ruidoso Mayor Jerry Shaw and councilors agreed to combine the mentor project's next session and to meet at the same time as the YES group at 7 p.m. March 10.

But she emphasized that she

thought the mentor project presented a different approach with less paperwork and more action, because it does not depend on any money from taxpayers.

The idea for a mentor program came from the local government division of the State Department of Finance and Administration. King asked that the idea be passed along to all mayors in New Mexico.

Shaw said she was contacted by resident Bill Chance two months ago, asking what the council was going to do to get involved with the problems occurring in the school systems and with gangs.

"I said I'd be willing to do anything to help as a joint effort," Shaw said. "When this came along,

EDCLC discusses ads, funds, members, prospects

It was a good meeting for the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County (EDCLC) last Thursday, in so far as they had enough members for a quorum to meet.

Board discussion highlighted advertising, fund raising, targeting prospects and the upcoming Smokey Bear's 50th anniversary.

Outgoing president Scott Schafer said five candidates were chosen for three positions to be filled at the next board election in February.

Several board members noted that most of the candidates were unknown, and suggested a small biography credentialing the people.

Director Karen Kopp said a biography had never been done before, but that she would work toward gathering such information.

The board approved a proposal by The Ruidoso News for an EDCLC 12-page special edition to be inserted in the regular paper.

Several members were concerned about the informational copy to be submitted and noted that The News often has been critical of the EDCLC.

Shafer told the group that editor Frankie Jarrell had promised that any information printed in the special edition could be controlled by the board.

Members agreed that if they wrote and controlled the copy, they could bring the true EDCLC story to the public.

The EDCLC is a private corporation first formed in 1988 to assist local companies and to bring new industries to Lincoln County.

Although EDCLC receives tax subsidy from the county and the village, it does not make public its negotiations, if any, with prospective clients.

An example on how the board operates occurred last Thursday when director Kopp said she had a "hot" prospect to move to Lincoln County. Kopp told the board several times she was "excited" with the prospect (prospects are given numbers to protect their identity).

One member asked how many employees could be expected for that prospect.

Kopp said she didn't know. "We haven't got that far in our talks yet," she said. With that general information disseminated, the

conversation petered out.

Kopp said since the first of the year, the phones have been ringing constantly and that the office was very busy.

The board seemed pleased with that announcement, although no one asked any questions about the source or content of the phone calls.

This type of approach, lacking in specificity, has drawn criticism from some village and county officials who want accountability.

Another problem for the EDCLC is where to locate industries if one of the area wants to relocate to the Ruidoso area.

The village has an industrial park at the airport, but no infrastructure has been laid to accommodate a new industry of any size.

Another criticism of the EDCLC is the lack of focus on tourism for an area that lives and dies with tourists.

Many residents believe that the corporation should work toward expanding growth for current businesses or soliciting tourist related industries. They argue that the life blood of the community comes from vacationers from larger cities who visit Ruidoso because of its clean air and mountain resort atmosphere.

Others have said that too much emphasis has been placed in locating industries for the Ruidoso area, and not enough on the rest of the county.

Since prospects are kept secret, EDCLC meetings take on the atmosphere of a closed meeting.

Former director George Puckett once explained to The News that prospects are not identified to keep other towns like Houston or Dallas from stealing them away.

But by keeping talks secret, some argue that direction, productivity and value also are secret, promoting unaccountability and not a good practice with taxpayers dollars.

Since its inception, EDCLC officials have come before the council at budget time to ask for more money, to tell the council they have improved their position, and, more recently, that the lack of quorums are a thing of the past.

The council has given financial support since 1988 when the EDCLC was first formed with a board headed by Buddy Bundick, then manager of the Texas New Mexico Power.

Bundick was followed by Don

Shaw, former general manager of Pioneer Savings. The third president, preceding Shafer, was Ronnie Paulger, president of the First National Bank.

Early in its history, the EDCLC pushed to convince the county commission that it should be permanently funded by the county.

County commissioners responded by earmarking a quarter mill tax for EDCLC use and allocated another quarter mill if EDCLC could match that amount from other sources, with that support to be re-enacted each year.

Then the village budgeted \$37,500 for EDCLC to provide matching funds.

The combined revenues plus commitments from the private sector provided about \$180,000 for operations under Puckett.

Paulger, who was a board member at the time, criticized the EDCLC for spending too much time on seeking funds and not enough time on soliciting industry and new businesses for the county.

The EDCLC's accomplishments to date have been debatable. Some believe they have taken credit for companies already bent on coming to the area. Most of those companies are either no longer in business or are in some type of financial trouble.

In a column Puckett wrote for The News, he told taxpayers, county and village officials not to expect too much for their money.

"Economic development can be a trying and elusive endeavor," he wrote. "There are communities which have been working at creating jobs for 20 years without landing a single new industry."

Yet, Puckett worked hard attending conventions, reporting on trips he, assistant director Anita Sanders and sometimes former Mayor Victor Alonso made for the EDCLC.

The EDCLC has backed some ideas that could be characterized as grandiose for a community with a small population base.

In 1991, the EDCLC loaned resident Dick Weber \$8,000 for a \$50,000 feasibility study to put in a \$200-million steam powered Ironhorse Railroad that contained a plan for a tunnel through a portion of Alto. Paulger, then president of the EDCLC assured directors that the \$8,000 would be returned by the railroad promoters.

The drafters of the study took

the money, wrote that the railroad wasn't feasible, and nearly a year later, after criticism by The News, the \$8,000 was said to have been returned.

During budget time last year, the village once again awarded the EDCLC \$20,000, of a \$40,000 request they brought before the council.

Members told the council things would be different. Meetings would be held. EDCLC would be more aggressive. They had received money from the county.

The council at first talked about budgeting \$20,000 with another \$20,000 held in a contingency fund until they saw some measure of success and a change of meeting habits. But then the council voted to budget only \$20,000, and left nothing in the budget as a contingency for EDCLC.

Yet, Kopp told the board last Thursday, if they could raise another \$5,000 to add to the money on hand, she would go before the village council and ask for the other \$20,000 in contingency.

The News confirmed with village officials Friday, that there is no \$20,000 in contingency for EDCLC and none was placed in the budget at the beginning of the current fiscal year.

Also during the budget's preparation, Kopp was told by former mayor Victor Alonso that the EDCLC was to make finding a hotel the number one priority.

No reference of a hotel search was discussed at Thursday's meeting. Goals mentioned included micro-chip and tele-communication companies.

In other business, the board approved a request to renew the \$2,000 fee to belong to the Business Quarter of New Mexico.

The Quarter is a six-year-old marketing program, first adopted in this area by Puckett. A temporary assistant under Puckett according to a news release, said the Quarter was invaluable to her work with the EDCLC. The program offers trade shows, direct mail and a dairy recruitment package.

Kopp said she intends to attend Nepean West, a computer show outlined in the Quarter brochure and scheduled for March 1-3 in Anaheim California.

Board member Robert Boebinger noted that the Quarter only dealt with the communities of Carlsbad,

Clovis, Hobbs, Lovington, Roswell, Ruidoso and Tucumcari.

Kopp said she didn't know why counties weren't included in the brochure, but that counties have been active in the program.

The brochure Kopp handed out read that eligibility was based on any community that is located in the New Mexico service territory of the Southwestern Public Service Company or the service territory of the Gas Company of New Mexico.

Ruidoso is in neither service area, nor is the rest of Lincoln County. The community's electricity is provided by Texas New Mexico Power and gas by Zia Natural Gas.

Apparently, the Quarter, which at one time also covered Portales and Artesia, made an exception for Ruidoso and will accept the \$2,000.

Kopp notified the board that she will be placing four ads in a California quarterly out of Anaheim for about \$7,400. She said the county wanted her to spend their money on advertising and that the state would match half the cost.

No advertising copy was submitted for board review, however Kopp said she had secured an artist for the graphic design.

Enough money in reserve to operate until May. The board expressed disappointment in a fund drive that Shafer said, in his opinion, lacked organization.

Kopp explained some board members were better at asking for money than others.

Board member Glenn Crane said people were tired of asking for money and not getting anything in return. Kopp was told to contact a person who was an expert on fund raising events.

Board member Gordon Ross of Capitan noted that a small mention of the upcoming 50th celebration of Smokey Bear in a Modern Maturity issue drew more than 400 responses for persons wanting to know more about Capitan.

Ross said a large number of tourists are expected this year in Capitan to celebrate the event, and that the enormous hot air balloon created in the likeness of Smokey will make an appearance.

Members noted that the super select barn has gained acceptance by the county commission and that State Representative John Underwood (D) will ask the legislature for financial help in the purchase.

Council considers biking/jogging trail regs

Sewer line standby charges and the village jogging trail head a light agenda Tuesday at the regular Ruidoso Village Council meeting.

New signs prohibiting biking on the jogging trail surrounding The Links golf course brought a few calls from irate bikers to village hall last week.

According to a memo to village planner Cleatus Richards from street department head Charlie Armstrong, the signs were ordered prior to August 26, 1993, by former village manager Ron Wicker and installed last week by the parks and recreation department.

Richards wrote the council that final work on the jogging trail was completed on September 17, 1992, and that staff discussions regarding trail use and posting were instituted prior to the trail being completed. He said some 15 loca-

tions were recommended for posting that would limit the trail to its designated use.

According to Richards, the conceptual master plan called for a fitness course with a 50-foot buffer from the golf course to include jogging and biking exercise areas. But following the construction of the golf course, placement and design of the fitness trail became limited to an eight-foot width.

Richards said designation of the path as a jogging trail by village council action did not require design consideration for other than joggers.

Some council members have said the current light use of the track by walkers, joggers and bikers poses no constrictive problem at this time and see no reason to prohibit use of the trail to bikers.

Council will consider allowing or prohibiting bike use on the trail during Tuesday's meeting.

In other business, the council will discuss sewer line standby charges and extension fees.

The village received a letter from J.W. McDonald who has been paying a sewer standby fee to the village because he has not hooked up to an available sewer line.

McDonald argues that he has been paying this fee for some time, wants to hook up with the line, but doesn't think it's his responsibility to dig through private property or rights of way to make the line available to him.

He has asked for the village to bring the sewer line up to his property line so he can reasonably have it installed.

"For me to have to lay a sewer line 150 feet on another's property is unreasonable," he wrote the council.

Deputy manager Alan Briley will recommend that the council authorize staff to establish a policy

defining "capable of being served" or "available." Briley said the policy should cover distance availability, cost feasible availability, and possible fees for line extensions relating to the sewer availability clause of the ordinance.

The proposed fiscal year 1994-1995 budget schedule will be submitted to the council by village manager Gary Jackson.

Jackson said he and finance director LeeAnn Nichols have developed a schedule to provide ample time for staff preparation, council consideration and public input.


Consent agenda items, approved collectively are:

Planners peruse Country Club Village proposal

The final plat for Country Club Village, a 14-acre townhome project being developed across from Cree Meadows Country Club will be submitted at 2 p.m. Monday to the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission.

The project, developed by Glenn Neans of Austin, Texas, consists of 77 townhome lots, a high density apartment lot, a community center and a common area lot.

According to Neans, homes will be constructed on site. Each home will have a garage and certain homes will be handicapped accessible. Only those plans approved by the developer will be constructed. An individual will not be allowed to buy a lot and design and build his own home.

Neans said exteriors will vary. Some will be wood, other stuccoed. Roofs also will vary from composition shingles, approved manufactured shake shingles, to metal.

All roads, water, sewer, gas electric, telephone and television service will be constructed as one project at one time and not be phased.

The proposed schedule for the project includes road construction and utility construction to begin on February 1; model home construction, March 1; Roads and utilities completed by June 1; and the community building construction to start by March 1.

Unit sales will begin on filing the final plat.

Other planning action includes requests for:

- a replat of Lots 28 and 29 of Mountain View Estates by Steven P. Roman.
- a front and side yard variance of Lot 10, Block B in Ruidoso Springs Subdivision by William Karn.
- a preapplication-sketch plan review of sites 1 through 29 of White Mountain Meadows, Unit 1 by White Mountain Development Company Inc.

National Education Association endorses Bingaman

U.S. Senator Jeff Bingaman, a New Mexican Democrat, has been endorsed for a third six-year term by the National Education Association of New Mexico, which represents 8,500 education employees across the state.

Association president Charles Bowyer of Santa Fe said the endorsement is based on Bingaman's past record of "working tirelessly to improve education opportunities for New Mexico's students."

Bingaman is the first U.S.

senator to be endorsed by the parent National Education Association in the 1994 election year and was recommended for endorsement previously by the state association.

Bowyer said, "Senator

Bingaman's initiatives, such as establishing national education goals and standards and bringing computers into the classrooms will help to enhance the academic performance of students in New Mexico and across the nation."

I called him and said this may be the answer, something positive.

"I think it would work in our community, because there is a lot of volunteer spirit and this program depends on volunteers. Even a partial success would be worthwhile. It will be time consuming at the beginning to get people involved, but we have a wonderful resource in our retirees and business people."

The thrust of the program is to provide positive experiences with adult supervision after school hours until parents return home from work to continue their roles as mentors.

The wording from the governor's office said the hope is that the direction of the state and country would be changed from heading toward barbarism to a more civilized society.

Before two incomes became necessary for economic survival, before divorce claimed half of the marriages in the nation and before single parenting flourished, most children used to have two parents as mentors, Shaw said, reading from a summary of the mentor program.

"They had constant supervision, with teachers during the school day, with their mother after school and their parents in the evening," she read.

"They were under some type of adult supervision 24 hours a day."

The time between breakfast and when children return home for dinner is the problem time, according to the state release. Some teachers have taken the position that they are educators alone, not babysitters. Along with an erosion of respect for teachers and both parents being away at work, children have been left without mentors. They have become latchkey kids and some have turned to gangs for acceptance, role models and companionship.

"Parents must be brought back into the picture as mentors," Shaw read from the release. "Teachers must be returned to a respected position, as an agent of the parent." Parents must carry full responsibility for everything their child does and supervision must be provided,

even if it must be legislated, according to state officials.

"During that period between teachers and parents, we need replacement mentors, and someone who will push the program," she said. The state recommended as a first step, a joint meeting between the school board and city council.

The school district's expanded day program for kindergarten and first grade students is a step, but the mentor project envisions interaction involving higher grades with specific child mentors who can work with a group or individual, Shaw said.

After school athletics could be one of the activities, but a student would need to enroll in some other activity between seasons, she said. The majority of the activities probably would occur on church or school property with public mentors in music, dance and woodcarving, for example.

If a child decided to continue with private lessons, then the parents would have to pay, according to the guidelines proposed by state officials. But the program would have to be flexible, Shaw said. Transportation probably would fall on the host entity, possibly a church or a group of ministers.

"I know not all of this is obtainable, but I wanted to open discussion between us," Shaw told school board members.

Paul Wirth, director of support services for the school district and a "facilitator" for the YES program, said school officials are excited about the plan.

"The concept of mentors is very positive and I think it's a way of getting quality time (between adults and children)," Wirth said.

He pointed out some of the programs the district staff already has initiated or is trying to organize. They include a tutor mentor program and a parent-school partnership in which employers agree to give a parent one hour off each month per child to attend an assembly or go to class to read and work with the students. Coincidentally, the campaign on the latter program kicked off this week, he said.

In the YES program, district staff and other participants decided

to narrow in on fewer, but quality, goals, Wirth said. About 50 people are involved in YES and they are trying to develop alternative school programs for students, to encourage parent-friendly schools with projects such as the tutor-mentor, to increase the support of the Renaissance Program (rewards for excellence) for high school students and to ensure coordination between courts, service providers, community and parent skills training programs.

Roger Sowder, principal of Nob Hill Elementary, said senior citizens were approached last year about getting involved, but he didn't get much response.

"We're talking about approaching all service clubs," he said. The idea would be for a club to adopt a school and for members to come in and work with individual students or groups on reading or in their specific area of talent.

"But we haven't got that going," he said.

Wirth said the YES group currently is focusing most of its energy on the one-hour off from work per month for parents.

"We're spotlighting through radio with kids expressing appreciation to the business," he said. "We'll build on it. Maybe with the council's encouragement, we could strengthen the tutor-mentor program. We want to solicit your support of YES."

Responding to a question from Councilor J.D. James, Hemphill said the YES group is not a replacement for a parent-teacher association (a PTA, which does not exist in the district), but is in addition to a parent advisory association.

"This (the mentor project) in no way takes away from the YES program," Shaw said. "We only hope to add to what you're already doing."

Hemphill said the YES group should be a good stepping stone for the mentor project.

"We want to do it right," he said. "These are lofty goals and far reaching. They will be hard to obtain."

"Maybe this program will bring forth more volunteers than YES has been able to generate; people who are energetic and will bring good things forward for the children," Shaw said.

Gladden suggested combining the programs.

"It took a year-long effort for Paul Wirth to get to this point," he said. "Rather than two separate programs, I think they should be tied together and we'll be a year ahead of others."

"I hate to see another initiative begin because we're talking about the same things. We're adding members all the time and I feel we're going in the right direction."

Shaw again emphasized that she didn't see the mentor program as taking anything away from YES.

"I came to some initial meetings (of YES) and kept up with it through Ruidoso Police Chief (Dick) Swenor," she said. "I'm willing to step down and let YES take over, although that's not the governor's direction. I think it's good to get new ideas and new people involved."

"The state information says an executive committee should have representatives from the council as well as churches, social clubs and other groups. That should be a great help to YES."

Councilor Joe Gomez asked how teachers have responded to the YES program.

"They're the ones with the kids day in and day out and many may feel they are doing the job by simply teaching," he said.

Several teachers contacted by The Ruidoso News in the days following the joint meeting said they either were unaware of the YES program or had heard about it, but did not know of any concrete impacts to date.

Sowder said a strong program that was initiated by teachers last year, but had been allowed to slip a bit this year, is the Care Bears, in which a person outside the system comes in at least one hour a week to work with at risk children to promote self-esteem.

"All the teachers thought it was a good program," he said. "They welcome someone coming in to talk about business or a particular talent or strength. (White Mountain Elementary principal Frank Cannella) had grandparents come in and help."

Councilor Frank Potter said last year he worked with Eddie Parker's business students on a marketing program.

"I was happy to be there and the kids seemed happy to see me," Potter said. "I think the mentor relationship, even for one hour a month, getting a person with the kids, is positive."

"YES seems more simplified and does follow the direction of the governor. I guess it's up to the mayor to coordinate."

Robert Donaldson, a member of the village's planning and zoning board and a candidate for a seat on the council, said some of the language in the governor's summary about the program sounded like students could be required to participate.

"I'm a little uncomfortable with the strong wording," he said.

"Especially where it said that it may have to 'legislate'," added village manager Gary Jackson.

"Enforcement would be left to the parents and encouragement by the schools," Shaw said. "The parents would be the key element. They would have to want a mentor for their children until they got home."

Wirth added that he sees the mentor letter as a framework, leaving it up to each community on how it should be implemented.

"I don't think it's mandated," he said.

Jamie Mulholland, vice president of the Ruidoso High School student council, suggested establishing nurseries at the high school to allow young parents to stay in classes and not have to drop out to care for their children during the day.

She also proposed using higher grade students to help man after school care programs for elementary age children, noting that she routinely helps in her mother's third grade class after she finishes her own courses.

"It would be kids helping kids," she said.

"It could be that kids who are in the court system could be made to go and their parents could be required to be more involved, too," said school board member Jim Varnadore.

"The younger children really look up to the older ones," Swenor said. "It's a good idea to have young people come over to the middle and elementary level schools. They can

answer questions and help the younger ones through life."

"We have an existing program where eighth graders spend time with kindergarten and special education students and it's a tremendous success," Hemphill said. "You're taking care of two sides at once, the younger and the older."

"That's a wonderful mentor situation," Shaw said.

Charles "Chay" Rennie, who also is seeking a seat on the council, said he had heard many excellent comments during the meeting, but primarily from the adults.

Turning to a dozen students at the back of the room, he asked how many were involved in some type of regularly scheduled and structured activity after school such as athletics, clubs or jobs.

About half raised their hands. He asked how many thought more structured activities are needed after school. Again about half responded.

"The hours from 3 p.m. to 6 p.m. seemed to be the workable time period," Rennie said. "Is that too long?"

Mulholland said it would depend on the type of activity.

Turning back to the council and school board, Rennie said, "To make the program workable, it will require some input from students, not just adults."

James said he would like to see a representative from the student council at the joint meeting of the YES and mentor groups.

"That representative could bring back recommendations from the high school, middle school and elementary schools," Swenor said.

Shaw said she would let Swenor coordinate with the students and invited their participation.

Anticipating a large crowd of local business people, politicians, club representatives, school officials and law enforcement officers, Shaw suggested they meet next March in the council chambers at village hall. The first order of business will be to discuss the appointment of an executive committee for the mentor program.

Hemphill pointed out that the mentor committee members then can be active participants in the YES meeting.

Pups saved from cruel death in Rio Ruidoso

Her daughter heard their pitiful yelps about 5 a.m. the previous morning, but couldn't spot the source among the boulders lying at the edge of the Rio Ruidoso in back of her home.

But when Hazel Haynsworth went outside to check her raccoon feeder, she spotted one of the eight week old pups sitting on a slab of ice in the rushing water.

"I tried to get it to come to me, but it immediately scooted under a boulder," she said. "I think someone just threw them into the water and they managed to crawl out and take

refuge in the rocks."

The two sisters may have been living on the scraps that fell from the feeder. Their stomachs were distended from starvation and their bones stuck out from their taut skin.

"They were so terrified of humans, someone must have abused them before leaving them to die," Haynsworth said.

She called her son-in-law, Frank Cowan, for help.

"It was getting dark and I couldn't see well, and I kept slipping on the rocks," Haynsworth said. "I didn't want them to have to spend another night hungry and

cold." Cowan successfully coaxed them close enough to scoop them into his arms and into Haynsworth's warm house, which became their haven for the next two weeks.

"Their stomachs were so distended, we had to give them just a little food at a time," she said. "Their hair was filthy, matted and full of spurs and seeds."

She took the pups to Dr. Lynn Willard, who said they were free of parasites and appeared to have survived their ordeal with no long term side effects.

Now 10 weeks old, chubby and friendly, the two pups have collie

markings, but with more shepherd-like faces and the thick undercoat associated with huskies or malamutes.

Buttercup, the larger of the two, is tuffy and white. Dixiepup is brown, black and white with darkly outlined eyes. She especially loves to snuggle and to tuck her head into someone's neck.

"They have doubled their size and weight in the last two weeks," Haynsworth said. "They trust people now and come right up to you. They're pretty much broken to using paper when inside."

Haynsworth was preparing to take the pups to the Lincoln County Humane Society shelter to put up for adoption, but she was worried, because they had not completed their full series of three shots to protect against Parvo, Corona and distemper. Those diseases kill many puppies left at the shelter by people who have not first given them the inoculation series or who refuse to keep them a few extra weeks until the shelter can administer the series.

Enter a volunteer foster parent, who has agreed to take the two pups for the next six to eight weeks until the full series is given and has time to take effect. The pups may be adopted before that time and can be seen by calling the shelter and arranging an appointment.

The foster parent said both pups like cats and get along well with other dogs.

"They have great temperaments and love to sleep in bed with me," she said. "If possible, it would be great to see them both go to the

same home and stay together."

The pups' situation illustrates the need for foster homes, that can offer safe refuges for new pups brought to the shelter until they can be returned after a full series of shots.

For those who prefer felines to canine, in the cattery next to the main shelter, Sunshine is ready for adoption.

The year-old orange tabby Persian male is a bit shy and has dramatic gold eyes that match his coat. With a laid-back personality, Sunshine would make a great companion for someone who wants a low maintenance, but affectionate pet.

County Solid Waste Authority board baffled by budget differences

The manager of the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority and one of its board members scuffled over a proposed budget revision Monday.

An increase in wages for the transfer station portion of the operation baffled member Wilton Howell, a county commissioner, because the number of employees has dropped since the budget was prepared in June. One of those positions eliminated was an operations manager, who was paid a hefty \$30,000 salary.

"We're no longer working with a bunch of temporaries at minimum wage," general manager Joe Lewandowski said. "We had 20 employees plus three (prison) workers and some temporaries. Right now we have 23 employees."

"We approved a five percent salary increase and I said go for it, if it did not mean a mid-year budget increase," Howell said. "It seems \$44,936 is a significant increase."

The revised \$252,660 figure for salaries at the transfer station is \$207,714 more than the December projection. Lewandowski explained that part of the money is the salary of Kerry Krumsiek, who was moved from the recycling portion of the budget to the transfer station.

He said the staff's pay raise of five percent cost about \$18,000.

"It was my understanding that through attrition, fewer were doing more work," Howell said. "The loss of employees was going to make up the five percent."

"You're looking at real figures and that's the way it came out," Lewandowski responded.

"The budget figures were wrong, even at 26 employees," member Bill Schwettmann, a county commissioner said. "We had no experience (when the initial budget was put together). It was a horror story (last May and June). Now we have some real figures, some experience."

"We should have known what we were paying," Howell said. "I'm not saying it's wrong. It's just that I would like to know how it happened."

pened. Authority member J.D. James said he could go along with Lewandowski's proposed revised budget because it's the first time the coalition of Lincoln County and its five municipalities had real experience on which to base the figures.

The difference in transfer station's personnel services totaled \$103,852 when overtime, benefits and a \$25,000 debt from workman's compensation not paid last year were added in, Lewandowski pointed out.

"We as a board came up with it (the original budget) with some help from (former manager) Gene Green," Schwettmann said.

"Now we have real numbers from the last six months," Lewandowski said. "What's so hard making a budget here is that many are not full-time residents like Alamogordo. It's a roller coaster riding the budget from season to season."

The cash balance at the end of the year will be \$125,000, about \$40,457 less than the originally budgeted \$165,000. Several carry-over debts not paid by Green last year must be handled this year, even though they have nothing to do with the current operation. They include \$130,000 owed from last year's state retirement and workers compensation contributions not paid.

On top of that, the cost of dumping at the Roswell landfill, budgeted unrealistically at \$50,000, will go over that amount next month, in part because the fees at that landfill doubled.

"I told you to expect that," Lewandowski told the board.

"The other budget was put together with Gene Green and did not reflect actual expense history," Warth said. "The revised budget is more realistic."

"I'm paying a lot of last year's items that even though they were budgeted, Gene Green never paid them," Lewandowski said.

"But we didn't purchase some equipment," Howell said.

"If I had bought it, the difference would be higher," Lewandowski said.

"It looks like we've been penalized for some things that happened last year," James said.

"I think we need to approve the revised budget and Joe will be reporting on it from now on with actual expenses and revenues," said chairman Frank Warth, mayor of Capitan. "We can't hold Joe responsible. The board was remiss for not firing Gene Green sooner."

Howell also questioned why Lewandowski spent \$3,200 for a roll off transfer station. He said the board only authorized revamping an old trailer.

Lewandowski said that would have cost \$6,800 more.

"I'm new at this government thing," he said. "I didn't realize I had to come back for an operational decision."

"These things affect the budget," Howell said. "I asked for real figures before the meeting."

"I gave them to you," Lewandowski said. "That's the actual column."

He added that computer budget printouts are available to any members to inspect between meetings.

"We hired a manager with no background working with a public government entity," said member Jerry Shaw, mayor of Ruidoso. "I feel Joe's getting unnecessary heat trying to do it in an efficient manner and in an innocent way."

"I was a budget coordinator for 30 years," James said. "You've got to have experience to come up with an educated budget. This was a new company and it was loosely controlled (by the former manager)."

"I'm not putting it on Joe," Howell said. "I'm just trying to figure out why the salaries are higher. We'll give him help with the budget if he needs it."

"If you wish to continue service at current level, this is what it will cost you," Lewandowski said.

"I've seen a decided difference in service and if this is what it takes, I as one board member am ready to continue," Shaw said. "Before, I received calls regarding the lack of

cleanliness, not anymore. It takes some background to handle seasonal trends."

Howell also questioned why \$8,000 had been added to legal fees, since most of the work of board attorney J. Robert Beauvais is finished with the completion of the bond issue to construct the new Otero-Lincoln Regional Landfill south of Alamogordo.

Beauvais said he had to take on several pieces of work that the bond counsel had not completed on time and that accounted for additional hours. He added that he was never consulted on the amount to add.

Total legal fees were listed as \$18,000 for the year, with \$3,055 carried over from last year.

"Legal fees should have been budgeted for \$13,000, because Gene knew \$3,000 would be carried over," Lewandowski said. "Instead he budgeted \$10,000."

The revised budget passed with Howell casting the lone nay vote.

After the dust settled, member Bill Allen said he wanted to congratulate Lewandowski for the "magnificent" job he has done turning around the operation.

Several members requested a different budget presentation at future meetings. Shaw said she would like to see a year-to-date actual expense comparison to the July budget, even if that budget was unrealistic.

"We want to see where we are to date, not what we're going to plug in," Howell agreed.

In another matter, board members heard complaints from John Wilson about nails spilled from construction debris trucks on their way to and from the authority landfill in Capitan.

Wilson said 20 other residents who live on the road and school bus route operator Frank Silva signed a petition calling for the landfill to be closed or other measures to be taken to relieve the problem with flat and damaged tires.

"You purchased a magnet (to pick up nails as it is dragged down the road) and there's still a problem," Wilson said.

"We should have had a place to dispose of it

and dangerous when you meet the big trucks. I have a tire outside with five patches. Each tire gets between five to 10 when they finally are ruined. I had a blow out on the way to Roswell. That's a constant danger our families live with. I bought new tires December 6, and they have four nails and one staple in them now."

Board members tossed around several ideas including constructing another parallel road for the trucks, but said they could not consider closing the landfill at this time.

Lewandowski said previously the road department had been running the magnet about once a month. When the authority recently took over, he set up a schedule starting February 1, for once a week (each Monday), which should help, he said. The process of dragging the 2 1/2 mile road takes about two to three hours, he said. Members told him to drag it more often if necessary.

They also said to encourage Sheriff James McSwane to stake out the area and cite truck drivers who do not secure their loads. Lewandowski said if the county would designate him as a code enforcement officer, he or a designee could handle that job.

By requiring on-site dumpsters for builders and possibly a tub grinder at a site in town, the number of trips to the landfill also will be reduced, Lewandowski said.

"I'm looking at a new system with a tub grinder that has a magnet," he said. "It draws out nails and then grinds up wood and shingles. You can't use it for furniture."

"I don't think closing the landfill is an option unless you want to see the rates skyrocket. We can control who goes out there and get contractors to use a tub."

The cost of a new tub system is about \$70,000, he said. He also intends to crack down on builders, requiring them to show proof of how and where they dispose of their debris.

"This would not be a variance, it would be a reclassification," Lewandowski said.

But Schwettmann warned that the board would be deluged with complaints from residents of Alto Village, if it approved the Eagle Creek request.

res, so they should have receipts," he said.

"It's a county road, but the landfill activity creates a nuisance and both must act reasonably to keep it safe," said Beauvais. "What the courts decide (as reasonable) may not be to Mr. Wilson's satisfaction."

"I told John that if he wants to file a claim with our insurance carrier for the county and the authority, then decide if he wants to sue. We'll take the position we're acting reasonably."

Lewandowski said the problem should be reduced by increasing the number of magnet runs and looking at ways to reduce the volume of traffic.

"If we close the landfill, we will see all the arroyos fill up around Lincoln County with illegal debris," he said.

"I don't think there ever will be another landfill in Lincoln County," Warth said. "When this one is full, we will have to find something else."

Following the lead of Schwettmann, a county commissioner, the board voted unanimously to deny a reclassification of the Eagle Creek Summer Home Owners Association from individual accounts to one commercial account.

The reclassification would have made association officials responsible for collecting \$33.06 for each of the 23 customers annually. The residents use cabins on national forest land and only are allowed to occupy them for up to six months a year. A representative argued that since the land is not owned by the cabin occupants, the authority could not file liens if a family refused to pay. He also pointed out that the area cannot be reached during some times of the year after heavy snow fall.

"This would not be a variance, it would be a reclassification," Lewandowski said.

But Schwettmann warned that the board would be deluged with complaints from residents of Alto Village, if it approved the Eagle Creek request.



The Braves A team walloped the Bears 52-17, the widest margin of victory for the year.


Bailey Bishop stepped up her game to lead the Lady Braves scoring with 12 points.

State Game and Fish offers an additional deer hunt this year

Big game seasons for 1994 will include another deer entry permit hunt — this one in Region C of northern New Mexico — and a five percent increase in nonresident fees.

The 1992 legislature approved the five percent per year increase in nonresident fees for five years, through 1997-98.

Deer entry permits are for areas where the Department of Game and Fish is limiting the numbers of hunters and special permission is required for access. Permits are

issued by public drawing.

Seasons, bag limits, and application procedures will be detailed in the 1994-95 big game, turkey and furbearer proclamation, which will be available from 225 vendors statewide by mid-to-late March.

Application deadline for all limited-license hunts, including public-land hunts for elk and antelope; bighorn sheep, javelina, ibex and oryx; deer entry permits; and hunts for the handicapped is May 1.

Application deadline for

degradation and Valle Vidal turkey hunts is February 6. Hunters who apply for unlimited deprecation licenses and permits may not apply for the species for public-draw hunts.

Deer, bear, turkey, and cougar licenses are available over the counter from license vendors, with no advance application and no deadline for purchase. Barbary sheep licenses are unlimited, but can be purchased only through Department of Game and Fish offices.

There is no application deadline for private-land elk and antelope licenses, and authorization forms will be available from landowners.

All deer licenses must be validated, when issued, for a sporting arms type (bow, muzzle-loader, or rifle) and for a deer entry permit and hunt region.

Hunters selecting rifle hunts must also choose one of the seven hunt periods; these validations can be changed before the opening day of the season for which the license is valid.

Two men jailed after early morning shooting

Two Ruidoso area men are in Lincoln County Jail after being arrested in the early morning shooting of a car and home in Hollywood Trailer Park Saturday, January 15. Jose Pedro Bonilla-Morales, 28, was arrested after an eyewitness identified him as the shooter. Nos Morales Fernandez, 20, passenger with Bonilla-Morales, also was arrested as an accessory to the crime. The eyewitness said he saw Bonilla-Morales shoot a rifle from a black Ford Escort he was driving toward a blue car parked on the roadway behind the Hollywood Food Mart. Police later discovered a bullet hole in the driver's door of the blue car, and an exit hole on the passenger side.

The bullet then apparently struck the west wall of a nearby mobile home occupied by Carlos and Patricia Anchondo, and came to rest in the east wall of a bedroom. No one was hit by the bullet. The eyewitness to the event notified Officer Gilbert Sambrano of the Ruidoso Police Department. Ruidoso detective Pete Esquibel, Sambrano and other officers later located the Ford Escort at Bonilla-Morales' home near White Mountain Drive and Mustang Road in Ruidoso. Olga Gabaldon, who identified Bonilla-Morales as her husband, said he had parked the car at the house about 30 minutes before officers arrived and left in another vehicle. Officers also learned that Bonilla-Morales owned a rifle, and that the rifle was not in the home. Magistrate Judge William Butts found probable cause and signed the warrant for the arrest of the two men. In an unrelated incident on that same Saturday, Joseph James Castillo, 26, was arrested after he unlawfully entered a pickup parked at K-Bob's restaurant. According to a criminal complaint signed by Esquibel, Castillo was first approached after he was caught unlawfully carrying a concealed loaded .22 caliber derringer in the parking lot of Furrs Super-

market on Highway 70. Officer Sambrano was called to the area after receiving a report that a man was trying to sell a handgun and was disturbing customers. The manager of Wal-Mart identified Castillo. Sambrano discovered the gun in a cigarette case hidden underneath Castillo's shirt in his waistband. During the investigation, Castillo allegedly admitted to entering a pickup owned by Kelly Walker and taking a small cassette recorder. It was then discovered that the .22 caliber derringer also was stolen from Walker's pickup. Castillo is in Lincoln County Jail.

Known as the "singing plowboy" he lived the life of rustic toil. Although having little education, he inspired the world with his poems. Every New Year's Eve we sing some of his famous lines:


"Should auld acquaintances be forgot and never brought to mind. Should auld acquaintances be forgot, and days of auld lang syne."

"Auld Lang Syne" is Scottish dialect for good old days for happy remembrance. He was a man of great compassion with a reverence for all life.

One of his most famous poems is: "To a Field Mouse" in which he apologizes to a field mouse for turning him out of his winter home with his plow.

"I'm truly sorry man's domain has broken natures' social union and justifies that ill opinion which makes thee startle at me, thy poor earth-born companion and fellow mortal."

He was called the singing plowboy because often times he could be heard singing out the songs and poems that he was composing while

following the plow. "In a cotter's Saturday night" Burns describes the happiness and fond devotion and religious faith of the Scots rural family. He writes the last verse of this poem in the form of a prayer for his native Scotland.

"Long may thy hearty sons of rustic toil be blessed with health and peace and sweet content."

"And O, may heaven their simple lives prevent from luxuries contagion, weak and vile."

"And then though crowns and coronets be rent a virtuous populous may rise awhile and stand a wall of fire around their much loved isle."

The 25th of January is also the birthday of Ms. Tommi Sue Dunnahoo of Roswell. She is a singer and poet. A true birthday mate of the immortal Burns.

Church celebrates 35th anniversary

The Reverend Wayne Joyce, in December 1958, rented and renovated a building, transforming the former Borrum Hardware building into a church.

The first service was Sunday morning, February 1, 1959.

Ruidoso Baptist Church was organized with eight charter members: Joyce and his wife, Dearl Wayne Joyce, Mrs. Melton Farus, Troy Farus, Red Farus, Mrs. R.C. Taylor and Mrs. Theo Wagner.

The church met in the old hardware building until July 4, 1962, when they moved into a new building in Palmer Gateway.

According to a news release provided by Joyce, the Ruidoso Baptist Church preaches and teaches the Bible as the verbally inspired and infallible word of God, the Virgin birth, and Deity of our Lord Jesus Christ, literal atonement for our sins, the actual physical bodily resurrection of Christ, his ascension into Heaven and His Second Coming.

Joyce was born in Longworth, Texas, on March 2, 1927, and moved to Ruidoso when he was six months old. He attended Ruidoso

grade school and Capitan Union High School.

He left high school to join the Navy during World War II, where he served two years. After being discharged, Joyce came back to Ruidoso and obtained his eligibility certificate to enter college.

Joyce married Ruidoso resident Louise Marie Kirby on January 20, 1948, in Randlett, Oklahoma.

Joyce completed a business course and an agriculture course, both under the GI bill. He was licensed to preach by the First Baptist Church in Devol, Oklahoma, on September 28, 1952.

In early 1953, he was called to serve full-time at the Bible Baptist Church, Apeatone, Oklahoma, where he was ordained on December 17, 1953. He left there to enroll in the Bible Baptist Seminary in Fort Worth, Texas.

Joyce was associate pastor of Victory Baptist Church in Kennedale, Texas, while he completed his schooling. He graduated in May 1957, as class salutatorian, receiving a Bachelor of Divinity degree, he then served as pastor of Mount Pleasant in Mount Pleasant, Texas, where he stayed until October 1958, when he and his family moved to Ruidoso.

Joyce and his wife have two children, Dearl Wayne and Darlene Marie. Darlene Marie died in Au-

gust 1988.

Ruidoso Baptist is also served by the Reverend Randel C. Widener who accepted the position of associate pastor in August of 1988.

Widener has a Doctor of Philosophy from Roosevelt University, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. He attended the Trinity Valley Seminary in Dallas, Texas. He was youth director for eight and a half years at North Side Baptist in Abilene, Texas, and a full-time evangelist for four years in Texas.

Widener married Vickie Lynn White, November 17, 1966, in Hutchinson, Kansas. They have four children, Michael, Casey, Wendy, Sheila and son-in-law, John Martin.

The Reverend Widener was associate pastor at Liberty Baptist Church in Abilene, Texas, before coming to Ruidoso.

The Ruidoso Baptist Church is an Independent Missionary Church supporting the following missionaries: James and Madge Brown, Mexico; Mark and Dana McCuthens, Brazil; Boris and Judy Materno, England; Charlie and Karla Ross, Korea; Terry and Myra Unruh, Sri Lanka; Abdou and Siham Issa, Arabic speaking people in Australia.

The church also supports Arlington Baptist College, formerly Bible Baptist Seminary, of Arlington, Texas.

"Bernie Reimann did it all and he wouldn't accept any payment for it," said Joe Lewandowski, general manager of the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority.

He was referring to a closure site review of a previous garbage landfill in Capitan prepared by Dr. Bernhard Reimann for the State Department of Environment.

"He definitely impressed the authorities. The state officials were

amazed at all the information he included and, thanks to (recycling coordinator) Kerry Krumsiek, it was organized with a special cover."

"We should write a letter of thanks or give him a certificate of appreciation," said authority board member Jerry Shaw, who is mayor of Ruidoso. The authority is comprised of representatives from the county and its five municipalities as a coalition for the collection and disposal of garbage.

Authority Chairman Frank Warth, mayor of Capitan, said a certificate will be prepared.

"He has made a significant con-

tribution to the quality of life in Capitan and the county as a whole," Warth said.

He listed some of Reimann's other projects as conceiving the wetlands sewage treatment canal approach and guiding the project to completion in Capitan; acting as chairman of the county E911 board and coordinating with five telephone companies to ensure it was installed; and serving as chairman of the Capitan planning and zoning board.

"He's an extraordinary person," Lewandowski said.

Let bicyclers ride on the biking trail

If you think the people you elect to public office are running things, think again.

Ruidoso's mayor and council were as shocked as the rest of the village when "No Biking" signs went up along the biking and jogging trail around The Links Golf Course.


The idea for the trails, designed for multi-use recreation, was originated during the previous, previous administration (Mayor Lloyd L. Davis), and it was agreed by the planners that recreational walkers, joggers and even bicyclers could safely share a path — even a narrow path. The trails were not designed for racers, but recreational users have had no problems over right of way.

But, all of a sudden, bikers (mainly small children who ride along with their parents) were informed by signs that they had been booted off the trails.

What happened? Apparently, this decision was made by a former village manager, perhaps with the advice of a former mayor. Signs, apparently, were ordered a year ago, and without taking this issue before the Ruidoso Village Council, an employee followed the directions of his former bosses and placed the signs on the trail.

Kicking bikers off a bicycle trail is beyond operations and into policy, and voters expect such decisions to be made by elected officials, not by hired hands.

Whoever made the decision, it was a bad one, and bicycles should be allowed on the trails — perhaps the "No Biking" signs could be replaced with "yield right of way," "slow" or speed limit signs.
