It's OK to wear a hat; but behave

Behavior, not the type of clothing worn, will be the key to whether students or adults are allowed to stay at Ruidoso sporting events.

In an attempt to clarify exactly what approach will be followed for the rest of the school year, **The Ruidoso News** contacted district superintendent Mike Gladden. The newspaper had received several telephone calls from parents confused about the final verdict.

Two weeks ago, school board members had reversed a decision to prohibit hats and caps of any type at sporting events in the school gymnasium in an effort to keep gang-related activities out of school connected functions.

The policy was to extend to parents and to visitors or athletes from other districts. The approach was in keeping with an already existing rule that prohibited hats and caps, as well as any gang-related clothing inside school buildings during regular school hours.

Some school officials and parents contended that asking local students not to wear hats in school from 8 a.m. to 3:30 p.m., but allowing them to walk inside a gym an hour later for a sporting event wearing a cap was confusing. They also noted asking local students to conform to the no hat rule, while allowing people from outside the school body to wear hats, wasn't consistent or fair.

But apparently, many people in the community disagreed with that interpretation.

In large numbers, they telephoned and stopped board members on the street to tell them, not always in polite terms, that they didn't believe the fairness principal cited by school officials outweighed their right to wear a hat in support of a sporting team.

Board members decided it wasn't their job to enforce good manners or to try to regulate the dress of people who were not part of the Ruidoso school body, even if they were inside district buildings.


They said that a more appropriate approach would be to let behavior dictate treatment.

Gladden explained last week that the no hat/cap rule still applies to Ruidoso students in school buildings during school hours. But at indoor sporting events, head wear, even those with known gang association, will not automatically bar a person from entering.

However, Gladden said if the person's behavior inside during the game is disruptive, he/she will be removed.

Board member Susan Lutterman, the only board member not present at the special meeting when the hat ban was lifted, told **The News** later that when the board agreed to the cap ban initially, it had been trying to ensure a safe environment for students.

The current approach also relieves ticket takers at the gate from bring thrust into the position of trying to enforce a no cap or gang clothing rule. Gladden pointed out that it also doesn't lock the district into banning any particular type of clothing, since gangs often change their dress codes and signals.

Ruidoso DECA marks Free Enterprise Week

Ruidoso Mayor Jerry Shaw, in partnership with the Ruidoso High School chapter of Distributive Education Clubs of America (DECA), has declared this week, January 30 through February 5, as Free Enterprise Week in Ruidoso.

High school students Kristie Ryan, Melissa Currin and Shirley Chavez are chairing the Free Enterprise project for their DECA chapter.

"We thought it would help our group and the community appreciate the benefits of a free enterprise system," said Currin.

Currin and her partners have arranged for public service announcements to be made on the radio and on television, reminding people of the project's theme, "Sometimes We Forget How Well It Works."

The students also will appear Thursday on Lincoln County Conversations, the local talk-show sponsored by the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce and hosted by chamber executive director Joan Bailey.

Currin said the group is sponsoring an essay contest at the high school, and involving the community in several awareness-raising campaigns.

"We're asking some local restaurants to put 'Celebrate Free Enterprise Week' on their marquees," said Currin.

"And we're making announcements at the schools," she added.

"We want to encourage the community to appreciate the free enterprise system," Kristie Ryan said.

Municipal Judge Mansell said the officer was now on night shift and that he was showing compassion by granting the lengthy extension.

Merchants mad about MainStreet

Thursday morning a large group of worried and disgruntled business owners demanded straight answers and immediate action from MainStreet Ruidoso.

Project engineer and deputy village manager Alan Briley fielded questions and complaints and tried to restore merchants' faith in the project handlers.

The streetscape project is off to a rough start. Shop owners in phase one of the project suffered a serious loss of business as construction crews deterred customers for two months.

"Business hasn't been that great anyway because of the weather," said Bob Smith, owner of Habitat.

"But we watch the few people who are in town walk right by our stores because they don't want to deal with the construction."

Pat and Bob Smith moved to Ruidoso in October, and they were caught by surprise when construction crews set up shop in front of Habitat.

"No one told us what was going on," said Pat Smith. Many business owners in that area said they had never seen the plans for what is materializing outside their windows.

"They [MainStreet] tried to communicate with us, but we kept getting different stories," said Ann Bolton, who owns J. Roberts. Her store went two days without a ramp to the doorway.

Merchants were expecting six-foot sidewalks and perhaps a few trees; some, however, are getting four-foot sidewalks and five-foot planter boxes.

Shop owners, who believed that only 27 percent of parking on Sudderth would be lost, were outraged to learn that 70 percent of street parking will be lost.

"We lose parking, but we've got some damn pretty planters," said

Bob Smith. Audean Franklin of MainStreet said that the state highway department requires nine-foot parking spaces, and that in some areas a four-foot sidewalk does not leave enough room for parking, anyway.

Mayor Jerry Shaw suggested that the sidewalk simply be extended in those areas, rather than wasting valuable space on landscaping.

Alan Briley said that later in the project they might be able to extend all four-foot sidewalks to six feet, disposing of the planters, but it would require more money.

"There are very few instances where the sidewalk is four feet," he said.

Don Miller, executive director of MainStreet Ruidoso, said he was not aware of the parking problem until construction began. He said the design engineers, Bohannon Huston, Inc., told him that only 27 percent of parking would be lost.

"Really, what's lost in phase one alone is 27 percent of street parking in the project," he said.

Despite delays and errors in phase one, Miller entreated store owners to "look forward and not look backward and see what we can get done."

Briley told the merchants that construction crews would move down the street by the middle of next week.

"We've encountered a few problems here and there, but we've got them ironed out," he said.

Miller said the next phase of construction should be completed in three weeks, but most shop owners expressed disbelief in that.

One of the holdups in phase one, according to Briley, was the need to excavate an extra two to three feet of "bad soil." The high clay content

Resistance stalls efforts to clean up the Downs

After a 30-day notice and citation for violating an unsanitary premises ordinance, a Ruidoso Downs employee was given an additional four and one half months by Judge Harrold Mansell to clean the trash off his property.

Ruidoso Downs Mayor Joe Hayhurst said last week that to give police officer Ray Montes four and half months to clean a weekend's worth of work was outrageous.

"I was dismayed as much as anybody else to (see him given) four and one half months," he said.

Downs Code Enforcement Officer Tom Armstrong agreed.

In a letter to the town board of trustees last April, Armstrong wrote that, "It seems little is being done in several violators' cases, when they have been given more time."

The board agreed with Armstrong at the time, and trustees said he should crack down on these people and other violators as quickly as possible to get the village shaped up.

Last April, Hayhurst issued a memo to all employees that the village would be citing persons in violation of ordinances regarding unsightly debris.

"Please set an example as a village employee and support all or-

dinances of the village," Hayhurst wrote.

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The complaints against Montes were brought by Ken Allgood, his next door neighbor.

Allgood said the permit is for an unattached building on skids and that the Montes' shed is connected to the mobile home.

Armstrong said the shed appears to be connected to the mobile home, but is not.

Montes said the building is connected to the mobile home.

"Is it connected to my trailer house? Yes, it is," Montes told **The Ruidoso News** last week.

"According to code, it follows the code as far as mobile homes"

Allgood questions why Downs employees are not held to the same laws as other residents; why Montes is being allowed to ignore ordinances, while being paid by tax paying residents; and why a judge, who fines people brought before him by Montes, does not apply the law to Montes?

"The whole thing is a joke to me," Montes told **The News**. "It amazes me the length people will go to use all the outlets to cover the problem, instead of coming directly to me."

Montes said Allgood never has talked to him about anything.

Allgood disagrees, saying he offered to help Montes carry away the junk.

"He once wanted to pay me for throwing his burnt stumps down on my property," Montes said.

Montes said the judge and the

code enforcement officer have allowed extensions to other citizens.

"When does Mr. Allgood think police officers get to be citizens?" he asked.

When asked who else received extensions, Montes said he could say, but would not, because he didn't want other people getting involved in something he considered "petty."

"Had he (Allgood) been civil, it (the clean up) probably would have been done," Montes said.

Downs' residents say that no mayor has previously tried to clean up Ruidoso Downs like Mayor Hayhurst. And he has been met with resistance all along the way.

"You can't clean up a mess overnight that was allowed for the last 40 years," Armstrong said. "So far I've issued 72 citations."

Last April, Mayor Hayhurst told **The News** that the Downs had a new Code Enforcement Officer, Tom Armstrong, and that all ordinance violators would be notified, cited and fined \$300 per day for non-compliance.

In the same article, it stated that police dispatcher Ray Montes had been promoted to the Downs Police Force.

"I've gone through the procedures, the ordinance. I've met with the mayor and on numerous occasions

Tough love

Municipal Judge William Butts wants area residents to know that New Mexico's new drunk driving laws (DWI) offer tough penalties with mandatory jail time; and that aggravated DWI carries an additional 48 hours in jail. Butts said aggravated DWI is .16 or more in blood alcohol

level; or injuries; or refusal to take a blood alcohol test. Butts said that the new laws push more case loads into his court, already running a week behind with a heavy case load, because of the criminal action involving jail time. He said another part-time clerk is not enough.

Area business owners welcome major snowstorm

Ruidoso's second major snow storm of the entire winter started last Friday with flurries in some area lasting through Sunday.

Predictions of six-inch depths in the valleys never materialized, but Ski Apache received seven inches last Friday and more than double that amount last Sunday.

Still, the snows have come too late for the ski business to have a great season. Many tourists from Texas and Mexico have canceled their trips to Ruidoso.

Older residents of Ruidoso say that the area has not seen this dry a winter since 1972.

The first big snow storm of the

season didn't hit Ruidoso until late Tuesday night, December 21, before Christmas. Residents say the last time the Ruidoso area was without a major snow storm before Christmas occurred eight years ago.

Ruidoso police reported no major accidents other than the normal amount of fender benders and cars

stuck in ditches.

Local businesses, particularly motel owners and ski shop owners, are hoping the word spreads to the tourist communities. Officials of the chamber of commerce have been assisting the motel owners with referrals to offset a number of cancellations caused by the lack of snow.

sions with the code enforcement officer, and my basic complaint is that this junk pile brings down the price of our property. Allgood said.

You can see what we're doing here. We've got quite a bit of money invested here. And I guess what really brought it to a head, I had to go down and take out building permits, paid for them. I had progressive inspections on this property from the foundation up when I bought the place.

"On that house (Montes' home), you can see a lean-to built out of hazardous materials. And after I complained about it, Ray Montes

went down and secured a permit. They gave him a permit on December 2.

The code enforcement officer admits that the structure is not up to code. There is no deposited set of plans, no specs, nothing, but they did give him a permit on the lean-to that is already in violation of the code and already in existence.

"But everything we're doing here today ... We've got a good set of ordinances in Ruidoso Downs. Everything that you have just photographed on that property over there is spelled out in detail in the ordinances. The house with the bad underpinning and the lean-to, all that is spelled out in the or-

dinances," Allgood said.

One man shouldn't have to operate by one set of laws, rules and regulations, while the other side uses another set of rules, particularly when the violator is an employee of Ruidoso Downs, he emphasized.

"I will say for Armstrong, he has followed his procedure as far as possible," Allgood said. "He served this man all the notices he was supposed to serve him, and then he took him to court.

"The court, Harold Mansell, gave him four and one half months."

Mayor Hayhurst said a number

of people in Ruidoso Downs oppose enforcement of the codes.

"Every time the Downs hires a dog catcher or code enforcement officer, the people down here have threatened their lives and run them off," he said.

"Tom said when he started he was going to stay," the mayor said. "And when we took the oath of office to enforce the ordinances, that's what we started to do.

"A group of people met with me shortly after I became mayor and asked that we start cleaning up the town. I told them that we would and we started that very day."

According to past News articles

published last April, Armstrong had worked with four residents who had been out of compliance for almost a year.

"How far can we go? How much time do you get? We have bent over backward to let you get it done," Armstrong told residents wanting extensions at a trustee meeting.

Hayhurst told offenders at that meeting that no properties are exempt and that the village would enforce the law with everyone.

Village attorney J. Robert Beauvais has said that code enforcement and police officers enforce the codes uniformly and fairly, and he sees no problem. If someone

thinks they are being treated unfairly, they can file a complaint, he said.

Individuals questioned at the time asked board members if the trustees were trying to make Ruidoso Downs into Ruidoso. Board members assured them they were not, that they are just following the ordinance now in place.

Although the board has tried to hang tough, one cited resident said Mansell advised him to go back to the council and ask for more leniency.

"We are just trying to enforce an ordinance a majority of the people want enforced," the mayor said.

Body found in the Downs

An excavation company employee found a dead body Thursday morning in Ruidoso Downs.

As he prepared to dump a load of dirt across Highway 70 from the Sertoma Bingo Club, the worker discovered an inert form that turned out to be the body of an Indian man.

The Ruidoso Downs Police Department responded to the report that a man was "sleeping or dead" at 2139 Highway 70 around 11:30 a.m., and at 11:52 a.m. Danny Sis-

son from the Office of the Medical Investigator pronounced Joe Paul Monte dead.

As of yet, the cause of death is unknown.

Police found Monte, 46, lying on his back beside an old couch in an area used for dumping. Chief Will Hoggard suspected no foul play, but has turned over investigations to the state police.

Because it was an "unattended death," Monte's body has been sent to Albuquerque for an autopsy.

would have caused the sidewalk to move and crack.

The main cause of delay in phase one, though, appears to be incompetent work crews, according to some Midtown merchants who have been keeping an eye on the project.

Sally Sandora's shop Candle Power is across the street from phase-one construction.

"I watched nine people stand around while one person worked," she said. "Then they'd get in a curb and tear it out, and put it back in."

Briley said he demanded quality work from the crews, and D&S Construction has replaced 10 semi- and unskilled workers with two local, highly skilled curb and gutter crews. Briley anticipates few or no problems with phase two.

Store owners in phase two of the project see disaster approaching.

Shirley Kostka, owner of three shops in phase two, said that if her stores suffer the way phase one businesses have, she will have to close.

Briley tried to assure store owners that the rest of the project would go smoothly and quickly.

"The design problems are already being worked out," he said. Briley said demolition in phase two will be done at night, and owners will be told when to expect crews at their doorsteps.

Another concern of business owners is handicapped parking. Part of MainStreet's goal was to make all the shops accessible to disabled patrons. When pressed, however, Briley said each merchant was responsible for providing handicapped parking.

In constructing the sidewalk, the attempt to make stores wheelchair accessible has resulted in roller-coaster inclines. This was criticized by shop owners.

"Without this project you would

have had to make your own buildings accessible," said Briley.

In general, shop owners said they would have preferred it that way.

When asked who in the village approved the project with so many design flaws, Councilor J.D. James said it was the state highway department.

"The village was out of it all together," he said.

MainStreet claims to be doing all it can to involve merchants in problem-solving decisions and to keep them informed. Merchants are invited to attend Friday morning coffees, where they can talk with the project engineer and the contractor.

Attendance at these coffees has been low, and Mayor Jerry Shaw said that, although the village council and MainStreet have had at least six meetings regarding parking, no one came. Some merchants said they couldn't attend those meetings because they were busy running their shops.

Don Miller said that in two weeks he will call another meeting on the parking issue and he will ask merchants with private lots to open those spaces for public parking.

"The parking is there," he said. "It's just that since it's not municipal property, we can't consider it public parking."

Audean Franklin encouraged merchants to attend as many meetings as possible and renew their enthusiasm for the project.

"This is going to be good business for everyone," she said.

Most merchants in phase-two share Shirley Kostka's sentiment: "Just get it done."

Briley said they will do just that. "Everything is going as planned. We're a little behind schedule, but we hope we can catch up. We're going forward with the project."

BooBoo hangs in while waiting for a new home

She's a survivor. While other pups died from distemper or Parvo, BooBoo's strong constitution brought her through in good shape. A shepherd mix, she was brought to the Lincoln County Humane Society Animal Shelter in early November when it was about eight to 10 weeks old. "A woman came in with her crying child and pulled the puppy out of his arms," said shelter manager Esther Harper. "She said someone at a local motel gave them the puppy free, but they don't have a yard and couldn't keep it."

"That's a common fate for puppies, dogs and cats that are just given away. Follow-up studies have shown that six months later very few are still in the homes. Unless it's a family member or close neighbor where the owner feels confident the animal will be all right, giving away a dog is a poor practice. "Often the new owner places no value on the animal, because it apparently had no value for the original owners. They don't follow through with protective shots, neutering or take precaution to ensure their safety."

BooBoo now has her complete series of shots against Parvo and distemper, but will need annual boosters like all canines. A first free grooming at one of the local services will take care of her nails, which now need some attention. "It's kind of odd, but from the start, BooBoo just stood out from the other pups," Harper said. "It was as if she had made up her mind to survive."

Another favorite of the shelter staff, Trudette, is a black chow mix. Her face is more narrow than a purebred and her disposition is docile and obedient. "I just love her," said shelter secretary Kathy Tetreault. "She goes out with the other girls just fine and is not aggressive. If some of the dogs start fighting, she stays out of it. She's not excitable. When we bring them back in, I tell her to sit and she will just wait for her turn."

"She also grabs your arm and holds it. She loves to have her stomach scratched and she definitely is housebroken."

The former owners, who said they could no longer afford to care for a pet, said she is timid with adults and other animals, but she seems comfortable with people at the shelter.

Trudette recently was groomed by Kim Mills of Pampered Pets and looks great.

"You know how girls feel after they have their hair done," Tetreault said. "She feels better and is so light on her feet."

Harper also wanted to call attention to two pure-blooded dogs now in residence.

Buck the collie is a gorgeous male who's about a year old and will need a home with a large yard.

DaBoy, a cocker, presents a special case. He would be good for an elderly couple, because he is trained, a good watchdog and about 10 years old. DaBoy is in excellent health and quite lively, Tetreault said.

A happy ending was in store for Black Dog, a black chow that showed up at the shelter as a stray with her hair matted, sores and wounds on her body.

"She growled at everyone, but we felt so sorry for her, we just kept working with her and now, although she still can be wary at

first, she is so much better and that tail will wag even when she doesn't look so friendly," Tetreault said.

She featured Black Dog during last week's adoption program on K-BUY radio with announcer D. Maury Brown.

"A man heard the information on the radio and called and said he was sure the dog used to be his," Tetreault said. He had given the dog to some friends in El Paso, but she passed through at least two more hands before being picked up as a stray in Ruidoso.

"The owner said he's on disability, but is set up now where he can keep her," Tetreault said. "Ironically, he said he called her Black Dog, too. He said he would

come down the next day to see her, but showed up an hour later. He just couldn't wait.

"It was so tender, she came out of the cage, walked into the office, saw him, went over immediately and nuzzled his leg and put her paw on his knee, as if she was so relieved to see him again at last."

"I didn't tell him then, but we nearly put her down a few weeks ago, because she wasn't highly adoptable. But we held off, because she seemed to be coming around."

"I brushed her before she left and then she went right with him. It was obvious she is devoted to him."

All three restaurant owners — Mike Haskins, Kevin Hanrahan and Steve Colman — recently moved to Ruidoso from California. Hanrahan owned a bed and breakfast in Raton, and Colman has come to Ruidoso to semi-retire.

The chefs, Felicia and Marc McNair are a husband and wife team, both of whom graduated from the Western Culinary Institute in Portland and are members of the American Culinary Federation.

Felicia McNair said all meals at Frontiers are prepared with fresh ingredients, and she makes all her stocks and her salsa from scratch. Even the whipped cream is made by hand.

"We use a lot of fresh, New Mexican herbs," said Mrs. McNair. "We give everything a southwestern flare, especially on the buffet."

Prices at Frontiers hover in the five to seven dollar range, and McNair said all servings are gener-

Upper Hondo Soil and Water group uses \$25,000 state grant to upgrade, repair Bonito Lake banks

A \$25,000 grant was used this past summer to reduce bank erosion adjacent to Bonito Lake and to improve water quality by reducing sedimentation.

The money was awarded to the Upper Hondo Soil and Water Conservation District by the New Mexico Department of Energy, Minerals and Natural Resources.

According to the conservation district's newsletter, other benefits derived from the project include improved fish habitat, safety and aesthetic qualities.

The area treated, one of the most critically eroded and heavily used,

is on the east side of the lake. The slope was extremely steep with no vegetation, no topsoil and with Ponderosa pine root crowns exposed, posing a danger for recreationists.

Ward Construction Company of Ruidoso was low bidder on the project, installing about 940 linear feet of bank stabilization revetments constructed of treated wooden railroad ties. The company's work included excavation and backfill for later seeding of the area with grass and forbs.

The soil service, with assistance from Tom Roybal of Capitan and

Bill Van Pelt of Roswell, provided the design. Conservation Bureau representative Jeff Lewis periodically checked the work. Greg Haussler and Howard Shanks wrote the grant proposal.

The service has provided an additional \$11,250 in Resource Conservation and Development money for steps, handicap access and storm water drainage control.

That project, as well as future work is being coordinated with the City of Alamogordo, which owns the lake and lands adjacent to it. Keith Kessler, manager of the lands, has coordinated the project, as well as supervised the city's enlargement of

the parking lot in Kraut Canyon and handicap access path to the lake.

District officials think the project benefits thousands of people and they plan to continue financial assistance for completion of additional erosion control measures on other parts of the shore to provide safe access to the lake shore.

Current access is steep and uncontrolled and has resulted in severe erosion and undercutting of the road shoulders. Access will be provided at certain points with steps, stairways and revegetation of areas.

Ruidoso High's basketball teams continue slide

The Ruidoso High School basketball teams continued to have difficulties against District 3-AAA opponents Saturday as both the boys and girls dropped games against Deming.

The boys fell 84-66 on the road while the girls dropped a 34-point decision at home, 58-24.

The boys are 4-11 overall and 0-3 in district, while the girls fall to 5-15 overall and 0-5 in district play.

In Deming, Coach Paul Kirkwood's boys team suffered through a miserable shooting night. The Warriors shot only 25 percent from the field in the first half, and headed to the locker room 20 points down at the half.

The boys were able to improve to a 39 percent overall shooting performance for game in the second half, but Deming shot well, making more than 60 percent of their baskets for on their home floor.

For the Lady Warriors, the night was worse. Playing against a team that has suffered just two losses this season and returns four of five

players from a State Tournament team last year, the locals were out-matched.

The result was a very slow start for the Lady Warriors, as only a free throw separated them from a complete shutout in the first quarter.

That's the bad news. The good news was that the Lady Warriors held Deming to just seven points in the opening period.

But as the game went on so did the Lady Wildcats.

Deming improved its margin to 18-7 at the half before exploding to 40 second-half points.

Head Coach Dennis Davis was obviously impressed with the Lady Cats performance.

"We came out and only scored one point in the first quarter. We just didn't get many good opportunities and the ones we did get ... we didn't make the shots. We didn't do a bad job defensively in first half, but our offense was frustrated all night by their defense.

"They're just a real good team, to be honest. They don't get out of position, so we didn't get many good opportunities on offense. And on offense they've just got a lot more weapons. They came out in the second half shot the ball well and just took us out of it," said Davis.

Kristie Ryan led the way for the Lady Warriors with 12 points on the night, a season high for the senior. Brandy Pfeffer and Sarah Dix scored 4 points each. Danielle Morris and Bernadine Mote scored 2 points each.

The Lady Wildcats defensive talent is obvious when looking at the scoring. Pfeffer and Dix, who were held to four points by Deming, have average double figures with an occasional 20-point night.

Ice-cold shooting showed up with boys team again. Ruidoso shot itself out of the game in the first half at Deming and while scoring improved in the second half, the Warrior defense could not stop Deming, who was on fire — especially in the

first half. The Warriors made a brief run in the third quarter, closing the gap to 10 points, but the Wildcats hit three-straight outside buckets to steal the momentum of the game back. After that, it was all Wildcats.

The cold shooting night comes on the heels of the Warriors' best shooting performance of the year last Saturday, against powerful Las Cruces Ojate. In that game, Ruidoso canned a record 12 three-point baskets.

But if you saw both games, you wouldn't believe that this was the same team.

Ruidoso couldn't hit the threes, the twos or the ones. It was reminiscent of the Warriors shooting against lowly Moriarty. The Warriors made the Pintos look like world beaters in that game, mainly because Ruidoso couldn't hit the broad side of a barn.

At Deming, the Warriors trailed 17-9 at the end of the first quarter

and 38-19 at the half. The third quarter saw Deming expand their lead to a 63-39 bulge before putting the Warriors out of their misery 84-66 at the end of the game.

"I don't know we can do about the shooting. Fundamentally, we're not very good shooting the ball, but the season is not the time to fix that. I wasn't here last spring for off-season, so I'm sure we'll get some of those problems ironed out," said head coach Paul Kirkwood.

"It's just going to take time. I saw Ruidoso play last year, and I know we're better. The kids believe they can win every game ... but to win games, we've got to shoot the ball very, very well because we're so small. We don't get many rebounds, so we don't get many easy shots," said Kirkwood.

"I just feel bad for the seniors ... they haven't won a district game in two and half years and I want 'em to win one. I don't know when that will happen ... and if we play like we did tonight, we won't ... But

somewhere out there is the team that played Ojate, and if we play like that, we'll win a lot of district games.

"I guess it just depends on which team shows up on which night," said Kirkwood.

Raul Davis and Rex Comanche led the way for the Warriors in the scoring department with 14 points. Daniel Espinosa and Corvin Lester scored 11, followed by Jeff Chapman 7; J.R. Chino 6; and Cory Hood 4.

To win that elusive district game, the Warriors have Cobre and Silver next weekend at home. Silver doesn't look too promising, as they man-handled Ojate Saturday night with a 12-point win, but Cobre, last year's State runner-up, looks vulnerable.

The Warriors will face Silver Friday night and Cobre Saturday night in games that will feature both the boys and girls varsity teams playing at home on the same night.

Share that state tax refund with a wild friend

Have you received it in the mail yet? You know — your income tax forms.

Most people who have, will already be trying to figure out if they are going to be lucky this year and receive a refund. When you are working on your taxes, I would like to remind you about the Share With Wildlife program.

Near the bottom of your state income tax form (line 41 on the long form and line 18 on the short form) you'll see a box for voluntary contributions. Share with Wildlife is the first fund listed. You'll need to fill out an additional form this year if you wish to make a contribution — it is the Pit D refund donation form. Share with Wildlife is line 2 on this form.

Share with Wildlife is a non-profit fund dedicated to the conservation of all wildlife in New Mexico. Although it is part of the New Mexico Department of Game and Fish, the program is supported entirely by voluntary contributions.

Share with Wildlife funds research, habitat protection, wildlife rehabilitation and public education with a focus on projects benefiting wildlife which do not receive funding from any

other source, mostly threatened and endangered species. This is what makes the program so important.

Since 1981, Share with Wildlife has funded such diverse projects as studying the rare and mysterious gila monster; Taling Talons, a youth leadership program which combines education and conservation; HawkWatch International, a raptor migrations study taking place in the Sandia and Manzano Mountains; along with helping to start a Watchable Wildlife program, which will bring people and wildlife closer together.

Your contribution is more important than ever due to a decline in our donations. A change in the state withholding tax last year

resulted in fewer people receiving a refund. Share with Wildlife donations dropped from \$106,000 in 1990, to \$73,000 in 1992, and this last year the lowest total ever, only about \$35,000.

In addition, new check-offs have been added to the tax form, competing with Share with Wildlife.

You can make a difference, now more than ever! If you receive a refund, please donate whatever you can to Share with Wildlife. If you have an accountant prepare your income taxes, please tell him or her you want to "check it off" for Share with Wildlife.

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



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Happy Ground Hog Day

Scant snowfall in county could lead to a dry summer, high fire danger

The winter of 1994 may be remembered for what didn't happen, officials with the State Forestry and Resources Conservation Division say.

The lack of substantial precipitation in the form of rain or snow has been good for mountain homeowners with steep driveways, but bad for the ski industry and for firefighters throughout the state.

Although its only mid-January, fire dangers on the rise, said Bill Duemling, service forester in the Capitan District.

High elevation areas normally covered with snow are bare and dry and ready to burn, he said. Lower elevation grass and brush areas already have experienced large fires. A New Year's Day fire on the Reynolds Ranch near Ramon in Lincoln County consumed 1,500 acres of grassland. Another fire west of Corona in Guadalupe County affected 540 acres of piñon/juniper and brush.

Fortunately, short winter days reduce the amount of time available for high-intensity wildfire behavior. However, a fire that starts in tinder dry fuels during strong winds in the middle of the day is a recipe for disaster, anytime.

Long time fire fighters in the Sacramento Mountains are comparing this year's lack of moisture with conditions that preceded the massive fire seasons of 1971 and 1974. Barring significant late winter or spring precipitation, we could be in for an interesting year, Duemling said.

Although no campfire restrictions are in effect, forestry officials are asking campers to confine their fires to developed camp sites or in well built campfire rings with ample clearance of bare mineral soil separating the fire from surrounding vegetation.

Never leave a fire unattended. Keep ample water available near the fire to protect against escape and be sure the fire is dead before crawling into a sleeping bag for the night or leaving the camping area. Douse the campfire with water or smother it with real dirt, not dirt mixed with pine needles and twigs, and stir thoroughly, Duemling said.

He offers these other safety suggestions:

—avoid parking your car in areas with tall grass, because hot catalytic converters can ignite grass fires.

—smoking should be restricted only to developed areas or clear a space down to bare mineral soil and crush out the cigarette when finished.

—practice extreme caution to avoid igniting grass if using welding equipment in grassy areas.

—if burning trash, use a metal burn barrel with extremely heavy mesh cover that has holes no greater than a half-inch thick. Avoid burning on windy days and monitor the fire until it is out cold. Open burning is prohibited in Ruidoso.

—if controlled burning in fields, irrigation ditches or rangeland is planned, contact officials with the state forestry division, the U.S. Forest Service, local fire departments, the county sheriff and the Bureau of Land Management. Give directions to the burn area and advise them about how long the burn should last. This prevents false alarm calls and gives fire response units a head start in finding the fire source, if it should get out of control. Check local weather forecasts before igniting a fire. Avoid burning on windy days.

—fireplaces and wood stoves are popular sources of heat in many homes. In cleaning them, proper

disposal of ashes is essential. They should be placed in a bucket, soaked with water and be allowed to sit for 24 hours before being deposited in a landfill or in a cleared space. A chimney should have a spark arrester and all chimneys within 15 feet of chimneys should be removed.

Although fire dangers fluctuate during the years, homeowners in the wildland/urban interface should develop a long term attitude toward fire protection and fire hazard reduction, Duemling said. The interface area is where native vegetation occurs in and around developments and that nearly covers all of Lincoln County.

Such areas have built-in potential for destructive fires. Areas where grassy vegetation is dominant tend to spawn fast-moving fires with short duration, he said. Such fuels dry out quickly after precipitation, especially if they already are cured as they are now. At the end of the day when humidity increases, grass fuels recover moisture quickly and become less flammable.

Structures located in grassy areas need adequate defense zones around them to prevent a grass fire from spreading to buildings. Clear grass around such property to bare mineral soil or keep grass well trimmed and green.

Heavier fuels such as brush and timber often don't burn as quickly as grass fires, but do burn longer and more intensely. They also don't respond as quickly to increases in humidity during late evening and night time, and are harder to control, Duemling said.

Much of Ruidoso is situated in the Ponderosa pine/grassland fuel type, he said. Historically, this habitat was adapted to frequent, low intensity ground fires that help

to reduce fuel loadings and competition for limited soil resources.

Because forest agencies been very good at suppressing those low-intensity fires, forest litter and stocking levels have accumulated in pine forests. Areas with 10,000 trees per acre are common.

"This overstocked condition creates stress for many trees, making them susceptible to disease and insect attack," Duemling said. "Dead and dying trees add fuel to potential fires. Ponderosa pine forests are highly flammable during high intensity fires, because of the nature of pine needles and the high degree of resin (pitch) found in this species. Grass can act as an accelerant, moving ground fires quickly into heavier fuels."

Coniferous trees provide fuel ladders, which act as pathways for ground fires to spread up into the crowns of trees, especially in high wind, Duemling said.

"Crown fires are fast-spreading, devastating, virtually impossible to stop and terrifying," he said.

Firefighters generally are at the mercy of nature in controlling such blazes. The Burgett Fire near Mayhill in April 1993 developed into a running crown fire pushed by high winds. The fire consumed more than 8,000 acres, he said. Fire fighters were able to contain the blaze only after the winds subsided. The Dude Fire of 1990 near Payson, Arizona, destroyed more than 18,000 acres in the Ponderosa pine fuel type, leveling complete subdivisions. Payson's situation was very similar to Ruidoso.

"Another major fuel component in the wildland/urban interface is the home itself," Duemling said. "Many structures are constructed out of combustible materials, but even noncombustible materials can ignite, if enough wildland fuels are

located on or near them.

"A large wildfire threatening multiple homes is beyond the scope of local agencies to combat. By the time reinforcements arrive, or fire behavior subsides, losses are a foregone conclusion. Landowners in the interface area need to take responsibility to minimize the risk to their property."

Here are a few tips from Duemling:

—adequate water resources are crucial to fighting fire and protecting structures. Keep in mind that even with hydrants, reservoirs often are at low levels at the same time of high-fire danger.

—determine several different routes of escape.

—the roof is the most vulnerable part of a structure. The best deterrents are clay or concrete tiles, mineral-surfaced asphalt, mineral aggregate overlays or metallic tiles.

Tin has been used for a long time to protect cabin roofs from fire and recent technological advances have made certain tin products more aesthetically pleasing. When roofs on existing homes are replaced, use fire resistant material. In the meantime, roofing materials with fire retardant substances also are effective, but must be retreated periodically to compensate for weathering.

A low cost method involves spraying a liquid solution of high phosphate fertilizer on exposures. At all costs, untreated shake roofs should be avoided.

—defensible space should be created between any structure and the surrounding forest, preferably firebreaks of at least 30 feet around each structure. If complete removal of vegetation is not possible, at least thin out the plants and trees to break continuity of canopy (aerial fuels) and reduce the threat

of crown fires near a house. Remove the lower branches on uncut trees near structures to eliminate ladder-type fuels. Remove all branches from ground level to 15-20 feet up the tree, reducing the ability for ground fires to spread to the crowns of trees.

—slash created by thinning or pruning should be removed. Debris from removing forest litter or cutting grass should be hauled away. Within the firebreak, the amount of combustible materials near the house should be drastically reduced to inhibit the spread of fire. Remove leaves, needles, twigs and branches on the ground around the homes and keep decks clear of that natural material.

—the size of firebreaks on any hills near a home should be increased, since fire behavior increases as the slope increases. Fires love to run uphill.

—replace highly combustible plants like pine with a tree such as the aspen, which is less likely to ignite and burn.

—grass growing near a structure should be kept short and green.

—areas when cars are parked should be kept clear of weeds and tall grass so that fires don't start by hot catalytic converters.

—besides water, have other tools available to combat wildfires such as shovels, rakes and other hand tools to clear firebreaks. It's also wise to have at least one five pound fire extinguisher available in a house, because many activities could cause a fire. Check it periodically to ensure that it functions properly.

—firewood should not be stored against a dwelling.

—keep any power lines on the property clear of branches. Local electrical companies should be notified when trees threaten.

Bremer, executive director of the New Mexico Wool Growers, Inc., hopes to be her party's choice to run for the seat currently held by State Representative H. John Underwood, a Ruidoso attorney.

Bremer said she has devoted a great deal of time and energy to work on grazing reform, private property rights, and endangered species. This past fall, she added two successful drives in Congress to

assist livestock producers in maintaining viability for the short term, to her list of credits.

In addition to her work for sheepmen, Bremer has assisted the Dairy Producers of New Mexico this past year, and has published the American Red Brangus Journal for the past nine years.

On a volunteer level, she has supervised more than 25 youngsters on the Mescalero Apache Reservation as 4-H livestock leader. In 1993 the group boasted the New Mexico State Fair Champion and Reserve Shorthorns and the Shorthorns and the Arizona Na-

tional Livestock Show Brahman/Brahman Cross Champion and Reserve.

At the Otero Fair she supervised some 26 youngsters and their livestock projects in three species.

Bremer serves on the American Sheep Industry Association's Public Lands Committee and has made two trips to Washington, D.C. on behalf of the national organization.

Bremer will face off in the June Republican primary with Ruidoso resident Dub Williams.

Representative Underwood is expected to run unopposed in the Democratic primary.

Professor celebrates diversity

When David Johnson's baby daughter was crying in a restaurant in Mexico, his wife took the infant outside. A passing campesino stopped, and tying rattles to his ankles, danced until the baby laughed.

"Then he touched her head and disappeared into the night," said Johnson. Such a scene is unlikely in the United States, but Mexico is another world.

Tolerance and celebration of cultural differences was the theme of Dr. David Johnson's presentation Saturday night at the Museum of the Horse.

He called Mexico "America's greatest secret," because so many people are unfamiliar with Mexico's history and beauty.

Johnson gave a slide show, leading his audience in a tour of Mexico from the southern Gulf Coast near Chiapas to just north of Nogales. Along the way he shared history lessons and family anecdotes.

Johnson said he believed that the greatest source of "culture

clash" between Americans and Mexicans are stereotypes. He said the first picture of a Mexican he'd ever seen was of a man in a sombrero, sleeping under a tree. This is the stereotypical "lazy Mexican."

Some people think Mexicans don't like to work, but Johnson said, "Have you seen them in the fields? They work very hard." Johnson said stereotypes bend good sense.

Commenting on NAFTA, Johnson said we should balance Mexico's needs with what we want from them. He pointed out that Mexico is a nation of children, the population's median age being under 20.

To dispel a few more myths about Mexico — Dr. Johnson estimates that in terms of bodily harm, you are probably safer in a Mexican city than in most American cities.

It's OK to visit Mexican doctors. "They have highly skilled physicians," said Johnson. "If I've got a gut ache, I might as well go to

a doctor who's treated lots of it."

If you are planning to tour Mexico, Johnson recommends starting in Nogales, then heading south through Hermosillo, then to San Carlos. He also encouraged visitors to take the train through Copper Canyon in Chihuahua. This canyon is one and a half times deeper and six times larger than the Grand Canyon.

Register by Tuesday to vote on March 1

If you plan to vote in the municipal elections March 1, you'd better be sure you're registered to vote by 5 p.m. Tuesday February 1. That's the last day to register for that election.

On Wednesday, February 2, County Clerk Martha Procter will close the books on Lincoln County's voting rolls, and if your name's not in those books, then you can't vote on March 1. It's the law, and there are no exceptions.

To be eligible to vote in the municipal elections, you have to live within the corporate limits of that town, and you have to be registered.

Voters will be selecting a mayor in both Ruidoso and Capitan, as well as municipal judges and councilors. In Ruidoso Downs, voters will be casting ballots on two board positions. That election is a little unusual in that both incumbent candidates are unopposed. But, in Ruidoso and Capitan, leaders will be chosen who will set the course for those two villages.

The people elected will make decisions that could affect taxes, spending, municipal services, tourism, economic development and the overall progress of this entire area. But, if you aren't registered, you can't vote. So, if you're interested in the future of your village, register to vote.

Where to register...

Anyone who needs to register to vote, or to change any information on their voting registration certificate, may find help at the Lincoln County Courthouse, at any village hall or at any bank. If you have questions of your voter registration, call the municipal clerk in your village or call the County Clerk's office in Carrizozo at 648-2394.

Construction totals nearly \$18 million in '93

December's \$809,713 building permit total boosted the yearend total to a respectable \$17,574,271 — up nearly \$5,000 from 1992's \$12,015,918.

In December, the Village of Ruidoso's planning department issued five permits for new single family homes, up 37 percent over last December when just three permits worth \$349,800 were issued.

A dozen residential remodeling permits, with a total value of \$117,925, were issued in December 1993, down by almost half from last year, when 22 villagers spent \$225,374 on additions and alterations.

One new commercial building permit was issued in December. Owner Frank Potter and contractor All American Building estimated the cost at \$51,680.16 for a new commercial building with retaining wall and deck in Midtown.

Six permits were issued for commercial additions/alterations, and the value on those six projects was listed at \$83,858; up from last year when just one permit was issued for commercial remodeling in December. That project was valued at \$10,000.

In all, 24 permits were issued in December; down from last year's 28

permits. But, the value of the projects was up by 13 percent.

During 1993, permits were issued to construct 102 single family homes valued at \$13,027,849. Last year, in 1992, 69 residences were built valued at \$7,457,692.

The yearend total for home remodeling projects was 527 permits worth \$3,010,668.50. That category included 301 permits in 1992, with a value of \$3,714,658 — 19 percent over this year's total.

Commercial building took off in 1993, with 10 permits issued valued at \$767,697, for a 280 percent increase over 1992 when just seven permits were issued valued at \$201,843.

Commercial additions and alterations were up this year, with 50 permits worth \$499,917 issued. In 1992, commercial remodeling projects number 45 with a dollar value of \$361,725.

In the "other" category, one permit was issued in 1993 with a value of \$268,140; and two were issued in 1992 with a value of \$20,000.

The village issued 690 permits in 1993 and 661 in 1992.





Lincoln Cablevision has changed owners, but no immediate changes are expected in local operations.

Rifkin Cable Income Partners sold Lincoln Cablevision to Cablevision Industries Corporation of Liberty, New York.

Rifkin, together with its affiliated partners, serves 350,000 cable consumers in 12 states. In addition to Rifkin's Ruidoso area system, Cablevision Industries also acquired Rifkin systems in Florida and Missouri.

The total value of the transaction has not been disclosed.

Paul Crown, general manager of Lincoln Cablevision, does not yet know how the change in ownership will affect his employees.

Lincoln Cablevision employs nine people and serves about 6,400 accounts across Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs, Capitan, Alto, Lincoln County and on the Mescalero Apache Reservation.

According to Crown, no rate increase is possible until September because rates can be changed only once a year. Right now basic cable for all areas but Capitan costs \$21.99, while the rate in Capitan, which has fewer channels, is \$16.70.

When Rifkin and Associates bought Lincoln from Bill Schloss in 1984, rates went up along with the number of channels offered.

"All the changes they (Rifkin) made were for the better and we hope this will be the same. We've heard that they (Cablevision Industries) are a great company and that they're very customer oriented."

Cablevision Industries was founded in 1956, and today is the nation's ninth largest cable multiple system operator, serving 1.3 million customers in 18 states.

Although the deal has been closed, Cablevision Industries does not take over operations at Lincoln Cablevision until April 1.

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
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Survey compares home prices throughout U.S.

A 2,200 square-foot home could be bought in the U.S. for as little as \$89,258 in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, or as much as \$920,000 in Beverly Hills, California, according to an annual Coldwell Banker survey, the "Home Price Comparison Index."

Coldwell Banker surveys more than 250 of its own offices during the last quarter of each year to determine the average sales price of a 2,200 square foot home in each market. The "Home Price Comparison Index" studies a single-family dwelling with four bedrooms, two and one-half baths, family room and two-car garage.

There are six markets in this year's study where a 2,200 square-foot home costs under \$100,000, including Kansas City (Wyandotte County), Kansas; Oklahoma City, Oklahoma; Corpus Christi and Fort Worth, Texas in the United States and Montreal, Quebec, and Halifax, Nova Scotia in Canada.

There are five markets in which the subject home costs more than \$500,000, including Beverly Hills, La Jolla, San Francisco and San Mateo, California, and Honolulu, Hawaii.

The highest-priced market, Beverly Hills, California, dropped to \$920,000 this year, compared with an over \$1 million sales price since 1991.

The median price of all homes surveyed is \$197,617 for 1993, compared with \$199,993 for 1992.

In New Mexico, the survey includes Albuquerque with a price of \$148,233; and Santa Fe at \$200,850.

In El Paso, Texas, a 2,200 square foot home comparable to others in the survey would cost \$129,333; and in Austin, Texas, it would be \$144,125. A comparable home in Dallas, Texas was listed at \$227,075.

International home prices featured in the study include a list of five markets in Canada and Puerto Rico. The cost of a 2,200 square foot home in San Juan, Puerto Rico, was \$198,750, while a similar home in Vancouver, British Columbia, sells for approximately \$292,300.

The survey gives an index number for each market, so homeowners can calculate the cost to replace their home in another location. Using the formula provided in the study, a 2,200 square foot home in Chicago (Lincoln Park), Illinois, with a market value of \$350,000 would cost approximately \$165,591 in Scottsdale, Arizona.

Chandler Barton, president and chief executive officer of Coldwell Banker Corporation says, "This annual study gives relocating homeowners an idea of



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HOUSEHOLD HELPS

Q. It seems that whenever I have to sand a painted surface, I have problems with paint buildup on the sandpaper. What can I do about this?

A. It's an unfortunate fact of life that paint buildup occurs when you sand. It's a result of the friction of sanding which heats up the paint, making it soft and sticky, so instead of coming off as dust, it gums up. To avoid some of this, at least, don't apply too much pressure, particularly if you're power sanding. Also, be sure to use the correct sandpaper.

To sand paint, you need an "open-coat" garnet sandpaper (reddish brown), or a "close-coat" silicon carbide paper with a stearate coating (usually a grayish color). The paper should be marked on the back of the sheets or on the package.

Both-garnet and silicon carbide are sharp, so they cut rapidly, thus reducing friction. Open-coat means only 50 to 70 percent of the surface is gritty. The spaces in between the grains help stop clogging. With this type of paper, you'll be able to see the backing between the grains of abrasive.

Close-coat's entire surface is covered with grit. This makes the paper cut

more quickly, but it also clogs quickly. To reduce this, a soft, slippery substance, zinc stearate, is applied around the grains.

Both of these types of sandpaper will work well, but I think the garnet is best for rough, exterior paint removal. Carbide should be used for fine, smooth sanding. Keep in mind that while garnet paper is less expensive, it doesn't last as long.

Caution: If you're thinking of sanding old, lead-base paint, stop right there! Lead dust is very dangerous, and it's so fine, you won't be able to protect yourself with a dust mask. Of course, you won't be able to tell by looking at paint if it contains lead, but, chances are, if it's more than 12 years old, it's likely it does. Lead-based paint was made until 1978, but it was still being sold in the early 1980s. To ensure safety, contact the local health or housing department in your area to help you test the paint in your house.

Filtering Indoor Air

(NU) - When it comes to a clean, healthy indoor environment, more homeowners are focusing attention on air filters. Combined with a forced-air heating system or central air conditioning, high-performance filters can help improve air quality.

Homes buttoned up too tightly for energy efficiency fail to allow air to circulate and prevent the escape of pollutants. Recent statistics indicate: indoor air can be 10 times more polluted than outdoor air; allergy sufferers (20 billion Americans and increasing) look to high-efficiency air filters for relief; some doctors recommend the new electrostatic filters.

Filters, according to the air quality experts, are designed to catch particulates, which is another word for household dust. The dust consists of soil particles, lint, airborne cooking grease, tobacco smoke, pet hairs, pollen, mold spores, bacteria, viruses, skin flakes, carbon particles, dust mites (and dust mite feces) and insect scales.

"About 99 percent of the particles circulating in indoor air are one micron or smaller," said Gary Smith of 3M, manufacturer of the Filtrete electrostatic micro particle air filter. These particles can aggravate allergies and irritate the respiratory system."

The degree of improvement of indoor air with a filter depends on

the kind of filter that is purchased.

Here's a performance comparison:

• **Filtrete micro particle air filter.** Electrostatically permanently charged fibers attract and retain more micro particles. They trap most larger particles effectively. A pleated design increases surface area to capture more particles. Provides three months of filtering performance.

• **Permanent, washable electrostatic filter.** A flat construction provides less surface area for attracting and retaining large and small particles. Must be cleaned frequently. Fibers are not permanently charged. The open weave is less efficient at trapping small and large particles. Six times less efficient than Filtrete.

• **Ordinary pleated filter.** The design creates increased surface area to capture more particles. Traps larger particles but media is not electrostatically charged to capture small and micro particles. Filters with charcoal layers quickly lose odor-absorbing ability. Many recommend replacement every 30 days. Seven times less efficient than Filtrete.

• **Ordinary fiberglass filter.** Traps some of the larger particles but not electrostatically charged to capture small and micro particles. Flat construction gives less surface area for attracting and retaining large particles. Many recommend replacement every 30 days. Twenty times less efficient than Filtrete.

Kitchen Creativity On a Budget

(NU) - American consumers spent \$20 billion on kitchen remodeling in 1992. "But regardless of the amount budgeted, creative planning can eliminate unnecessary remodeling costs," says Jim Kregel, design director of the Maytag Kitchen Idea Center.

According to Kregel, the money you save on a well-thought-out kitchen design can be applied to other important items, such as upgraded appliances. To begin, he points out that cabinetry is the most expensive component in a kitchen and should be the first place to look for savings.

There is a host of choices. You don't have to go for broke. For example, stock cabinetry can be used in innovative ways to provide a customized look at a fraction of the cost. Stacking two base cabinets to produce a tall cabinet is just one cost-effective way to increase storage capacity.

Innovation and practicality can go hand in hand. Consider raising the dishwasher six to 16 inches off the floor to make loading and unloading easier. A drawer beneath adds useful storage. If the dishwasher is raised

just six inches, a microwave can be installed over it.

Be flexible when working within a budget, Kregel advises. Consider vinyl flooring, even if you'd prefer tile. If your sights are set on a solid surface counter, use one of the newer color-through laminates to create the same effect. Or use varying materials for an interesting look — laminate in the work area, tile on the backsplash and solid surface on an island.

Speaking of islands — if you fit one with recessed wheels, it becomes a moveable feast and can serve as a baking center or extra work surface wherever it's needed.

"It's the details that can make the difference," says Kregel. Combine two inexpensive moldings or add a light valance for a more expensive look. Careful selection of hardware, light fixtures and other elements will also help create the appearance you desire.

New Lighting Systems Aid Heating, Cooling Efficiency

(NU) - In these energy-conscious times, home builders are finding a way to save on heating and cooling bills that is as surprising as it is effective.

They're making changes in lighting.

Recessed lighting has become more and more popular, but homeowners have learned that in the winter months homes lose heated air through recessed lighting fixtures, just as they do through areas around windows, vent openings and chimneys.

More than 20 percent of a home's heated air can escape through openings in and around recessed fixtures. Even insulation does not stop this air flow.

In summer, hot, moist air is drawn down into the home through these "leak paths," making the air conditioner work harder.


The best way to stop this costly energy loss is through a new type of housing for recessed downlights, one that stops air from escaping or entering through a fixture. Setting the industry standard in this area is the "Air-Loc IC" by Juno Lighting. This completely



sealed housing with a specially designed foil gasket completely eliminates the "leak paths" associated with recessed lighting.

Many states have begun mandating the use of such energy-efficient recessed lighting fixtures.

Environmental consultancy firms have determined that the amount saved by switching to these housings can be substantial. Studies have

shown that savings from replacing a standard IC housing with the Air-Loc housing can exceed \$5 per light fixture per year.

In addition to saving energy, however, a completely sealed system reduces moisture buildup under the roof and destructive condensation that may collect on structural beams. This is because moisture contained in warm air is carried through "leak paths" in standard recessed fixtures and can condense in colder areas of a home, such as the attic. Resulting problems can range from peeling paint and mildew-related odors to rotting structural materials and ice damage, leading to costly repairs.

With the new, completely sealed lighting fixture, rooms become more comfortable, drafts are eliminated and there is reduced sound transmission between floors. Housings such as Juno's Air-Loc IC can be covered with insulation.

SAFETY TIPS FOR RURAL HOMEOWNERS

If you're a rural homeowner who maintains a few acres beyond city limits, there are important safety tips that can make your use of electricity safer and more efficient. While electricity is one of the safest forms of energy, the absence of electrical codes and inspections in rural areas means that homeowners must take greater responsibility for recognizing unsafe wiring and other hazardous conditions. Here are a few guidelines that can save lives, property and money:

Use Ground-Fault Circuit Interrupters (GFCI)

Use wherever electricity, water, and you come together. GFCI's are electrical protection devices that sense a ground-fault or short, and instantly disconnect the circuit. Unlike fuses and circuit breakers that depend on heavy overloads or shorts to function, GFCI's sense even small electrical faults and disconnect the circuit before anyone is injured. This is particu-

larly important for outdoor and farmstead electric use in operating power tools, lawn trimmers, hedge clippers, power spray washers, and all electric use around swimming pools and hot tubs. Some GFCI's are designed to replace standard outlets; other portable units simply plug into existing outlets and can be moved from one location to another. For new homes and additions, the National Electrical Code requires the use of GFCI's in garages, bathrooms, and on outdoor receptacles. Around pools, use GFCI's on lighting fixtures, recirculating pumps and on all receptacles within 20 feet of the pool.

Ground-Fault Circuit Interrupters can be purchased at any major hardware and electric supply store.

Check Wiring In Barns and Outbuildings

If you have a detached shop, storage building, or even a barn for horses or other livestock, specific wiring materi-


als and methods must be used, especially where dusty or moist conditions exist, or where heat lamps will be used. Typical hazards include improper grounding, residential-type fixtures that are not designed for use in barns, and undersized heat lamp circuits.

To learn more about proper wiring around rural homes and farmsteads, check with your electric power supplier or obtain a copy of the Agricultural Wiring Handbook. This 88-page illustrated handbook contains wiring plans for 14 types of farm structures, along with specifications for lighting and motor use. The handbook is updated every three years to conform to the latest National Electrical Code.

A Kitchen Recycling Center With Pizzazz!



Recycling is fast becoming a way of life for families concerned about the environment. And to help the process, Whirlpool home economists suggest installing a simple home recycling center. Since most household trash is generated in the kitchen, this is probably the most logical and convenient location for separation and storage of recyclables. Including a trash compactor to compress and store both recyclable and non-recyclable household waste is another good idea. It saves space and time, hides unsightly stored trash, and makes transporting trash—to the curb or the local collection site—a whole lot easier and cleaner.

Do you remember when the 3-Rs stood for reading, riting and rith-metic? Not anymore. In the 1990s, they refer to reduce, reuse and recycle. Waste reduction, planned reuse of items and recycling have become a way of life for many families who are concerned about the environment.

"But, today, few homes have a planned space for recycling, so it requires some creativity to install the needed storage bins," comment home economists from Whirlpool Corporation. They point out that most household trash is generated in the kitchen, making it the most logical and convenient spot for separation and storage of recyclables.

Here are their suggestions for finding kitchen space to add a recycling center: extend an existing counter and cabinet area; remove a little-used cabinet; if the kitchen is wide enough, add a peninsula or install an island.

Once you've made space, decide what should be in your recycling center—and how to incorporate it with style and pizzazz.

Whirlpool home economists suggest using a bin that has three or four separate compartments (such as the Rev-A-Shelf Company design shown in the photo) and fit it into a base cabinet. Use the bin compartments for sorting materials—typically glass, plastics, paper or aluminum—being recycled in your local area.


Because most storage bins have limited capacity, Whirlpool home economists suggest including a trash compactor in the recycling center.

Throughout the week, the compactor compresses and stores household waste that is not recyclable, resulting in only one disposable bag of trash for a typical family of four. Also, use the compactor to reduce the bulk of cans, food cartons and plastic jugs, before storing them, to increase bin capacity.

Whirlpool trash compactors also offer optional reusable bins that can be used to sort and compact recyclables. These are especially handy for materials such as glass, which can't be handled easily after compacting. After removing the compactor bag that collects non-recyclable trash, put the reusable bin into the compactor drawer. Run the appliance to crush the container's contents, then return the bin to the storage center to collect additional material. When the container is full, transfer compacted recyclables into a bag or empty the reusable bin at the recycling center.

"There's little question that a family is more motivated to separate trash for recycling when it's made convenient for them. In addition, having a recycling center right where trash is generated is a reminder not to throw away items that can be recovered and recycled," conclude Whirlpool home economists.

Unlike skylights, the SunPipe virtually eliminates radiant heat gain in the summer. While, in the winter, it minimizes conductive heat loss for additional fuel bill savings.


The SunPipe is made of non-corrosive aluminum, with a super-reflective lining inside the pipe. Originally developed for use in the solar energy field, the film is more reflective than a glass mirror. This special lining maximizes the amount of lightstriking the diffuser dome on the ceiling below.

The SunPipe kit includes a four-foot pipe. Extensions can be added for the exact length required. A standard flashing and storm collar eliminates leaks when properly installed. An optional aluminum SunScoop attaches to the rooftop dome, facing south, for increased lighting output in winter.
