Candidates speak out at forum Thursday

Candidates running for municipal elections March 4 will be open game for tough questions at the Candidates Forum February 17 at the Civic Events Center.

Ruidoso attorney Don Dutton will be the moderator during this free community event, profiling 19 candidates for village municipal judge, mayor and councilors.

Residents seeking perception on how a candidate would act on issues, have a chance to avoid the generalities found on business cards and ask for a little depth in the answers.

Index cards will be provided at the forum for residents to write each question. The cards will be gathered and sorted into categories to prevent duplication.

Dutton will briefly introduce all candidates beginning promptly at 6:30 p.m. Each Candidate will be allowed three-minutes to speak.

The three-minute allotments will be by office, with the two-year council candidates first, and the four-year council candidates second, followed by a half-hour question/answer period. That segment should be completed by 7:45 p.m.

Coffee and cookies will be served during a break from 7:45 p.m. to about 8 p.m. when the forum will resume with three-minute speeches by the two mayoral candidates and the candidates for municipal judge.

A half hour question and answer period will follow, and the forum will be over by 9:15 p.m.

Frankie Jarrell of the sponsoring Ruidoso News, said questions submitted in writing would avoid long speeches from the audience, and Dutton will have an assistant to review the questions for duplicates.

Jarrell said Dutton will ask the questions, with answers limited to a minute or less. A timekeeper at

School board adopts new sexual harassment policy

To eliminate further delays, the Ruidoso School Board Tuesday waived the usual second reading and adopted a recommended sexual harassment policy.

District superintendent Mike Gladden said the policy was assembled from samples from several other districts. A committee of parents and staff came up with the proposal.

"It's the policy of the '90s," Gladden told board members. "When we first began working on one in November, the attorney had received no contact from other districts. Now it's the hot issue, one of those areas we need to bear down on and enforce the proper behavior from student to student."

"We need to regain respect from gender to gender, age group to age group. I recommend you waive the second reading and adopt it as a policy tonight."

A second reading is conducted to give ample time for public input, but Gladden pointed out that the issue has been given public scrutiny for months.

The Ruidoso district sought input for a policy after a parent complained that her daughter had been sexually harassed by another student and it appeared that no punishment occurred.

"This will be covered extensively at the middle and high school so the kids understand what happened here tonight," Gladden said.

"The intent of this policy regarding conduct between employees and students is clear and straightforward: No employee of the school district may engage in any conduct of a sexual nature with any student, regardless of the student's age, ability to consent, or actual consent," drafters of the policy wrote.

"Between an employee and a student, sexual harassment is any conduct of a sexual nature. Between students, sexual harassment is unwelcome conduct of a sexual nature," specifically, but not limited to:

- verbal or physical sexual advances, including subtle pressure for sexual activity.
- sexually oriented touching, pinching, patting, staring, pulling

at clothing or intentionally brushing against another.

-showing or giving sexual pictures, photographs, illustrations, messages or notes.

-writing graffiti of a sexual nature on school property.

-comments or name calling to or about a student regarding alleged physical or personal characteristics of a sexual nature.

-sexually-oriented "kidding, teasing," double entendres, and jokes.

-any harassing conduct to which a student is subjected because of or regarding the student's sex.

The policy includes a section encouraging students who think they have been sexually harassed by a school employee or by another student or students to report such claims.

Methods for students to report possible sexual harassment also are covered.

Any employee who receives a report of sexual harassment of a student, whether the report is given by a student, a parent or another employee, must notify his or

her immediate supervisor or the superintendent of the report, regardless of whether the employee receiving the report considers the report credible or significant.

With the concurrence of the parents of the student, the principal and/or superintendent will report the harassment to the appropriate law enforcement agency.

All reports will be investigated by the superintendent or a designee.

Employees found to have engaged in sexual harassment of a student will be subject to sanctions including, but not limited to, warning or reprimand, suspension or termination.

Students found to have engaged in sexual harassment will be subject to discipline, including but not limited to suspension or expulsion.

Concerning the projected \$295,000 budget shortfall due to lower than estimated enrollment, business manager Caron Snow said through belt tightening and other changes, the amount has been cut to \$140,825.

Underwood stands firm on barring kids in bars

Representative H. John Underwood (D-Lincoln County) told the House Friday that allowing minors in bars "basically puts us back into the Dark Ages from which we were trying to come."

The controversial question of whether minors should be allowed in bars sparked emotional debate in the House, which finally concluded it would rather have the buck stop at the desk of the state liquor director.

The House appeared poised to approve a measure allowing those under 21 to enter a bar if accompanied by a parent, guardian or spouse.

But House Speaker Raymond Sanchez intervened after Underwood warned that approving the measure would send the hard work of reform backwards.

In an emotional appeal echoed by numerous House Republicans, Underwood said the bill was "a throwback to the old days of 'let's make it easy for children (of alcoholics) to be included in the cycle of alcoholism.'"

Underwood added, "I don't think it does a darn thing for child delinquency."

Sanchez's amendment, which was approved on a voice vote, changed the word "shall" to "may."

As amended, the bill passed out of the House on a 45-20 vote. It goes to the Senate.

After the Senate, state liquor director Mary Ann Hughes said she interpreted the amendment to mean she may permit minors in bars, but doesn't have to.

Hughes still would have to hold public hearings on any regulation she proposes.

Until Underwood voiced his concerns, the measure seemed likely to pass.

Minutes earlier, the House on a 44-19 vote killed a proposed amendment to prohibit minors from bars, even if accompanied by a parent, guardian or spouse.

The proposed measure would allow even small children to accompany their parents into a bar, where Representative Blake Curtis (R-Clavis) said "there is little question, if any, as to what the individual (parent is doing there)."

The bill, HB519 surfaced in this year's legislative session to clean up technical problems in a liquor law enacted last year as part of the DWI reform package.

Last year's law barred minors from licensed premises where liquor was sold and served unless they had a lawful purpose there. Several examples of a lawful purpose were delineated.

But Hughes, as well as citizens and the liquor industry, wanted clarification of the law this year.

Last year's DWI reforms also included repeal of a law that allowed minors to drink alcohol in bars, as long as they were accompanied by parents or guardians.

Afterward, DWI activist Linda Atkinson accused the House of "skirting the issue."

Atkinson said the question shouldn't be left up to a liquor director, who serves at the pleasure of the governor.

Liquor industry representatives agreed.

"We wanted it to be in the legislation," said Betty Carlson, president of the New Mexico Hospitality Retailers Association.

Ruidoso Downs trustees take care of business

Members of the Ruidoso Downs Board of Trustees was pleased to hear from village attorney Robert Beauvais that two lawsuits against the village were resolved in their favor last week.

The suits were filed against previous administrations for wrongful terminations.

Robert Zamora was an employee of the water department who sued for wrongful termination when he was injured and could not return to work. According to Beauvais, the village held Zamora's job for six months, then terminated him when he could not or would not return.

Beauvais said the court decided against Zamora on February 2, because his injury occurred off the job.

"I was told that he broke his leg over a weekend," said Beauvais.

Zamora also failed to make his appeal properly, and he waited 28

months to file.

Had Zamora won his lawsuit, the village of Ruidoso Downs would have been required to pay him a salary through retirement.

Beauvais' second victory was in the case of Wilma Webb, who was the village clerk, then a trustee, then clerk again during a period of revolving mayors in the Downs.

When Jake Harris took office as mayor in 1986, he fired Webb and she filed suit in 1987.

Webb originally won a decision to award her \$25,676, but the village appealed in 1992, and the decision was reversed February 7, 1993, by the New Mexico Court of Appeals.

"The court decided Webb was an official, not an employee, so she was not covered by the personnel ordinance and was not wrongfully terminated," said Beauvais.

The resolution of these two cases comes as a victory in many ways for

the board. Lingering lawsuits are all that remain of a tumultuous time in the Downs history, when angry resignations and bitter disappointments were the order of the day.

"Joe [Mayor Hayhurst] and Leann [clerk Weibrecht] have worked hard to clear up these legal problems," said Beauvais. "This administration has been very aggressive in taking care of things."

According to Margie Morales's account of the board's trip to Santa Fe, this administration has none of the strife that plagued past boards. Up at dawn to make the drive, the trustees laughed the whole way, said Morales.

"It was a fun trip," she said.

The village requested \$200,500 to complete construction of the new municipal building. The village was previously awarded \$200,000 for phase one. Construction is proceeding as planned, and the building frame is already up.

Mayor Joe Hayhurst expects it to be ready for move-in by May.

"I've already walked through my office," said Leann Weibrecht, village clerk. So far there are no complaints.

Said Mayor Hayhurst about their presentation to the legislature, "We weren't in there very long, but we think it went well."

The board members returned home the same day.

"We never stay overnight," said Morales. On the way home, the crew swung through Albuquerque and picked up the new van for the Senior Citizens' Center. The State Agency on Aging granted the village \$15,500 for the purchase of the van.

"We try to move as one force," said Morales, expressing regret that Trustee Judy Miller could not make the trip to Santa Fe.

"This council is a united group, and all members are involved and very active."

Surplus food to be distributed

USDA Commodities will be distributed to eligible Lincoln County residents next week.

Food will be distributed from 1 to 3 p.m. Monday, February 14 and from 8:30 a.m. to noon Tuesday, February 15, at St. Eleanor Church, 140 Junction Road, in Ruidoso.

Zia Senior Center in Carrizozo will be the site for distribution from 9 a.m. to noon Wednesday, February 16.

Commodities will be distributed to qualified recipients without regard to race, color, creed, national origin, age, sex or handicap.

To qualify a person must give their name, date of birth and show income verification in one of the following forms: check stubs, food stamp verification, unemployment verification, public assistance, VA, Social Security or retirement.

Two forms of address verification must also be presented such as a driver's license with current address and a utility bill. Social Security number is voluntary.

Guv asks for more names

Although Governor Bruce King has named Metropolitan Judge William F. Lang to serve the Bernalillo County, second judicial district, he has asked the judicial selection commission in Otero and Lincoln counties to provide him with additional names to consider.

The 12th judicial district has sent the names of two qualified applicants for the position, but the governor would like a longer list.

Lang will occupy a new position created by the 1993 Legislature and will serve while seeking election to the post. Lang, 38, was a child support hearing officer in the second district court before becoming a metropolitan judge. He also has worked as an attorney in private practice and as a staff attorney for the New Mexico Corporation Commission. He is a 1982 graduate of the University of New Mexico School of Law.

An amateur actor, the judge is president of Theatre-in-the-Making, an Albuquerque non-profit theater troupe. His wife, Margie is a legal secretary and they live in Albuquerque.

Nuclear negotiator names a public relations director

Nuclear Waste Negotiator Richard Stallings has appointed Maureen Conley to serve as his public affairs director.

In that capacity, she will act as principal liaison with the media and will develop and implement a public information program on the negotiator's mission of finding a volunteer host for a temporary spent nuclear fuel storage facility, according to a news release.

Before accepting the appointment, which began January 4, Conley was managing editor of "The Radioactive Exchange," a national biweekly newsletter on radioactive waste management. She had been with the newsletter since June 1990.

Candidate for governor campaigns in Ruidoso

Gary Johnson wants to put his extensive business experience to work for the State of New Mexico.

Johnson, a candidate for the Republican nomination for New Mexico's governor, was in Ruidoso last week to campaign for that office.

Johnson, who was born in North Dakota but moved to Albuquerque as a small child, started his business career while still at the University of New Mexico.

That start — handing out leaflets door-to-door — is just one sign of his energy, drive and determination. As a college student, Johnson was willing to do any jobs necessary to earn the money to complete his education, and that early marketing project was a forerunner of his successful Big J Enterprises which now employs 500 people.

Johnson, who was named one of the 50 leading remodeling contractors in the United States by Re-

Modeling Magazine, and he gives a lot of the credit for his company's good reputation to the good people he hires.

He thinks that ability to select and hire good people would translate well to making good appointments to run state agencies.

"It is my conviction that the needs of most New Mexicans are being ignored by a state government that is unresponsive, overstaffed and inefficient," said Johnson in announcing his candidacy. "Worse, while the quality of government is going down, taxes continue to go up."

"The way things are now, it doesn't seem to make much difference whether a particular program or piece of legislation is good or bad, they all end up wasting money and failing to achieve what is promised.

"I believe this will continue to be

the case until we develop an effective government. I'm running for governor because I honestly believe I know how to make that happen," said Johnson.

Johnson graduated from UNM in 1975 with a B.S. degree in political sciences.

He is a member of the board of directors to the South Region Alternative High School Parent, Teacher and Student Association Group and was named to the Advisory Board for the Anderson School of Management's Center for Entrepreneurship and Economic Development of the University of New Mexico.

He is active in the Albuquerque athletic community, having competed in hundreds of athletic events from 1980 to the present, and is nationally ranked as an age group triathlete. In June 1993, Johnson successfully climbed Mt. McKinley.

Domenici, Reno meet to discuss border issues

In an apparent reversal of priorities, the U.S. Border Patrol has informed Senator Pete Domenici (R-NM) that it is now considering assigning up to 50 full-time, permanent border patrol agents to Santa Teresa.

Domenici, who complained that the administration's border initiative neglected New Mexico and failed to include the full number of border patrol agents approved by Congress, met one-on-one with Attorney General Janet Reno at her request.

Domenici said in a news release

that he was very pleased by this recent, although not final, turn of events. He said New Mexico has its share of illegal immigration and crime along the border and we are entitled to additional federal help. Especially for the growing port of Santa Teresa, these agents will fulfill an important need.

In a letter sent to Reno thanking her for the meeting and for attention to New Mexico's needs, Domenici stated that he was aware that the Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS) was considering establishing a Border

Patrol station in Santa Teresa. That station would be responsible for monitoring the border from the Sunland Park area west to the Arizona line. It would also handle the increase in border activity that has resulted from the increase in border activity that has resulted from the establishment of the international port-of-entry at Santa Teresa.

More than 24,950 illegal aliens were arrested by the Border Patrol in southern New Mexico in 1993 in Alamogordo, Carlsbad, Deming, Las Cruces, Lordsburg and Truth or Consequences.

Polite dog would make a good pet

She walks on a leash with an elegant air, her sleek conformation indicating some blood more exotic than the "shepherd mix" marked on her kennel card.

Ivory, so named by workers at the Lincoln County Humane

Society shelter for her attractive white coat, was brought in as a stray after she was found running loose on Sudderth Drive.

She's about one year old and has gold accents on her back and the tips of her ears, shelter manager Esther Harper said.

"She's really sweet and gets

along well with all of the other dogs," Harper said.

Adds shelter office secretary Kathy Tetreault, "She's thin, but we're working on it. She doesn't act like she's been mistreated. She has an open personality and pays attention to what she's told."

"I think someone may have given her some training."

It's hard to judge in a shelter environment, but Ivory appears to be housebroken, Harper said.

Another sweet-natured female abandoned on the streets of Ruidoso, Cinnamon was brought in by animal control.

She appears to be a sheltie-red heeler mix with a soft spotted rust coat, but the narrow face and smaller body of a sheltie.

Harper estimated Cinnamon's age at two years.

"She's docile and tends to be a little more timid than Ivory, but very friendly and gets along well with the larger dogs," she said.

"All it takes is some human contact and attention and these dogs would be wonderful additions to a family," Tetreault said. "Cinnamon also is either close to or housebroken."

Injured dog

In another heart tugging incident, a man who lives on Gavilan Canyon Road saw a dog lying in the road, apparently hit by a car.

He set the leg as best he could, but after three days, the little female black Labrador pup wasn't getting any better. He brought her

to the shelter, but told workers he would come back and check on her.

"We kept her in the office that day on a rug under the desk, trying to figure out what we could do when a woman walked in possibly to sponsor another dog," Tetreault said.

"The lab tried to stand up and fell. The woman began to cry and said she couldn't stand to see that. She took the dog to a local veterinarian. It has cost her almost \$300 already and she can't even keep the dog."

The woman has named the lab Mercedes or Mercy for short.

"We need a foster home with special requirements, someone who

can be there most of the time, because she will need to be picked up to go outside," Tetreault said. "The femur was fractured and she can't jump or run."

"But she's small enough to keep in a playpen, if the foster parent had to be gone for a short period."

Mercy has a cute face and is very docile. I think she knows people are trying to help her."

Harper also is trying to find a new home for a six-year-old, neutered male Great Pyrenees, who needs a larger secured area to roam. Paddy, short for Patrick Paddington Bear, currently is confined to a fenced yard in town and is restless.

Cat antics

Some advice is offered by experts to owners of a queen or king house cat who bullies newcomers.

They warn not to attribute human qualities to cats. The bullying does not mean either cat is unhappy and probably is completely natural to both cats.

The dominant female or male is only exercising her authority. Both cats probably are fine with the situation, they say.

Julian Flores takes district wrestling championship

The Ruidoso Warrior Wrestling team turned in its finest performance in district competition since the 1987 season as 103-pound junior Julian Flores took the individual title in his weight class.

Flores, who was the top seed going into the district championship, beat Silver's Adam Borrego 14-10 in the final — but it wasn't easy.

Borrego got a quick start and jumped to a surprising 7-2 early lead before Flores got into gear. But when Julian found that gear, it was overdrive.

The wiry Flores put Borrego on his back twice in the second period

and outscored his opponent 12-3 in the final two stanzas to earn Ruidoso its first individual title since 1991.

Flores' win over the traditional wrestling powers 103-pounders will assure him of a very high seed in this week's State Championship in Aztec. The tournament is set for Thursday and Friday, and should be interesting as all of New Mexico's varsity wrestlers are scheduled to compete, no matter what their win-loss record was this year.

Six Warriors finished third in district, capping off a remarkable seven-match win streak at the tournament.

Jose Prieto was one of the third-place finishers at 112 pounds. Prieto, who also plays in the

defensive backfield on the football team, defeated Oñate's Sergio Estrada in his final match.

Johnny Flores smashed NMMI's Burton Brown 24-6 in his third-place match but Flores, another defensive back, should have been in the finals. The hard-luck sophomore was involved in a very controversial match in the semi-finals.

Apparently, Flores was not credited with two points early in the match, which the official later admitted. Flores could not overcome the mistake and was dropped 2-1 by Silver's Ronnie Rodriguez.

Beau Jarvis, one of the pre-tournament favorites, also finished third but was upset by Rick Turrietta of Silver City, 6-3. Ironically,

Oñate's monster David Tines to finish third. Gallerito, was near perfect with his two-win, one-loss day.

Gerald Ames, the Warriors' Head Wrestling Coach, was pleased with his team's performance.

It was the same song for the Ruidoso High School Basketball teams Friday as the Socorro Warriors beat both the boys and teams.

The boys lost 82-64 at home while the girls dropped a 49-43 decision on the road.

On the boys side, Socorro is currently second in the district, with 6-1 mark — losing only to Silver through the first half (plus two games) of the district campaign. Socorro handed Deming a 20-point loss Saturday night in Socorro.

Against the Warriors, Socorro used size, speed and an impressive outside shooting touch to give Ruidoso its 33rd-straight District 3-AAA loss.

Ruidoso closed to within five points in the third quarter and Socorro's Head Coach Gilbert Peralta called time out. After that short break, Socorro went on a 16-1 run to end the third period, and retake control of the game.

The Warriors trailed by five points at the end of one quarter and by 15 at the half.

With the help of a spectacular 30-point effort by Raul Davis, Ruidoso's run at the top of the third quarter was truly impressive — although short lived.

The Warriors enjoyed another good night shooting the ball making nearly half of their baskets. In

recent week's the only teams with a field goal percentage like that has been the Warrior's opponents.

Other scoring was provided by Rex Comanche with 19 points, Cory Hood, 7; Jeff Chapman, 4; Todd Young, 2; and Daniel Espinosa, 2.

Warrior coach Paul Kirkwood again found something positive about his team's performance.

"We played hard. Our kids fought to the very end, but we just didn't have the horses tonight. Socorro is improving with every game and they are just a very, very good basketball team.

"They have good size and speed and they can go deep on the bench, which is something I wish we could do ... but we can't so we're not going to worry about it.

"Raul and Rex had a great game for us and they kept us in it, which is all we can ask ... but (Socorro) scored three of four on all-opp plays, obviously they are at a different level than we are ... but we'll get there," said Kirkwood.

The Lady Warriors also played well against league-leading Socorro.

The girls were deadlocked at 13-13 after the first quarter, despite Socorro opening up an 11-2 lead early in the in the period. But as the opening quarter transpired, the Lady Warriors began handling Socorro's backcourt pressure better and Ruidoso got into its own half court game.

But old habits are hard to break and the Lady Warriors propensity to turn the ball surfaced again in the second quarter and Socorro too a 30-19 lead into the halftime intermission.

The second half saw Ruidoso outscore Socorro in both quarters, but not by a high enough margin to overcome their sleepy second quarter performance.

Brandy Pfeffer and Sarah Dix again led the way for the girls with 15 and 14 points respectively. Other scorers included: Ramona Bell, 6; Danielle Morris, 4; Monique Ramos, 2; Cindy Richardson, 1; and Kristie Ryan, 1.

Strangely enough, it has been sixth-place Ruidoso that has given first-place Socorro the most trouble of all of their District 3-AAA opponents. Both games have seen Ruidoso with a chance to win in the fourth quarter.

Head coach Dennis Davis was pleased with his team's performance.

"We really played well for most of the game, but we lost so much ground in the second quarter, we just couldn't make it up.

"We came out and got behind 11-2 lead but we broke their press and started hitting our posts and caught up again. In the second quarter, we just couldn't put pressure on them defensively and they shot the ball real well.

"Sometimes we just let things get away from us a little. They would score two or three baskets in a row maybe off our turnovers or our bad shots and that's just hard to make up for us because we're not explosive, like some teams.

"We can't press that effectively, but our halfcourt defense is really coming along. I promise, if we do the things we do well, we can play with any team in our district, and the games we've played prove that," said Davis.

The Lady Warriors wrap up the season Saturday against Deming on the road.

The New Mexico State Racing Commission, in a regular meeting Thursday, approved the stakes and condition book for Ruidoso Downs.

Stall applications will be due March 21 and the barn area will open April 18.

Once again quarter horses take the spotlight with some of the richest and most prestigious quarter horse races in the country being run at Ruidoso Downs.

Nine are Grade I races including the Triple Crown for two-year-old quarter horses (Ruidoso Quarter Horse Futurity, Rainbow Futurity and All American Futurity); Triple Crown for three-year-old quarter horses (Ruidoso Quarter Horse Derby, Rainbow Derby and All American Derby); Rainbow Silver Cup for four-year-olds and older; World's Championship

Quarter Horse Classic for three-year-olds and older; and the All American Gold Cup for four-year-olds and older.

Five Grade III \$14,000 added events will run including the Mr Jet Moore Allowance Stakes for three-year-olds and older; Go Together Handicap for three-year-olds and older fillies and mares; Jet Deck Handicap for three-year-olds and older; Higheaster-jet Handicap three-year-olds and older; and the Ruidoso 550 Championship for three-year-olds and older.

One new race for quarter horses has been added for New Mexico-bred two-year-olds. That race is the Zia Futurity and it will have a \$50,000 estimated purse.

Several lucrative races for thoroughbreds will also be run at Ruidoso Downs this summer including the \$50,000 est. Norgor Futurity; \$75,000 added Ruidoso Budweiser Breeders' Cup for three-year-olds and older; \$75,000 est. Kachina Stakes for two-year-old fillies; \$25,000 added Sweetheart Handicap for three-year-old and older fillies and mares; and the \$75,000 est. Ruidoso Thoroughbred Futurity.

There are also many rich races for New Mexico-breds this year.

Then we would make Valentines for the neighbor children and carry them from house to house. I remember my mother's tears of joy as she read a Valentine's Day poem written by our father and sent by telegram. Here in the house is a Valentine's day telegram sent to our mother from our brother, Joe saying, "Thanks for the privilege of being your son."

Today I read a Valentine card given to me years ago by our mother that says:

Teens help teach younger students

Fourth and fifth graders at White Mountain Intermediate School got a lesson on the evils of shoplifting and vandalism Thursday.

High school seniors Sarah Dix, Stephanie Haas and Anthony Torres gave presentations last week to raise elementary and intermediate students' awareness of these crimes. The seniors are members of Distributive Education Clubs of America (DECA).

"This is our Creative Marketing project," said Dix. "We're trying to make kids realize that shoplifting and vandalism costs us all."

Dix and her partners have

studied the effects of these crimes on business, and for prevention they recommend educating the young.

Fourth grade teacher Kathy Crane said it was great that the DECA students came to her class. "They really look up to the older kids and relate to them," she said.

The fourth grade students demonstrated a sophisticated understanding of the consequences for shoplifting and vandalism. One student asked if vandalism was like what the kid did in Free Willy.

This movie is about a juvenile delinquent who is sentenced to community service for spray-

painting an aquarium and ends up with a really cool job training a killer whale. Dix emphasized, however, that vandalism is costly and simply wrong.

Several kids offered examples of people they knew who got away with shoplifting, and others speculated on how one might get by alarms in stores. Again Dix warned that stealing is a serious offense and that it is very costly to the community.

A game of hangman revealed awareness slogans such as "Lift a Finger Against Shoplifting." The DECA students felt their mini-campaign against vandalism and shoplifting was successful.

A Tradition of Trust

Middle School teacher Steve Havill publishes his seventh novel

By his own admission, Steve Havill's life has turned out to be the best of many worlds.

He lives in the small historic settlement of Lincoln with his family, far away from major highways. He enjoys teaching eighth graders at Ruidoso Middle School. He continues to be able to write successful books, novels bought by a growing audience of readers.

Havill's seventh offering, "Twice Buried," recently published by St. Martin's Press in New York, provided the author with an avenue of development and progression for characters he introduced in two earlier mystery novels.

Inspiration

Growing up in the rural Finger Lakes area and grape growing country of Upstate New York, Havill found plenty of opportunity to experiment with short stories. His father, a novelist and editor of a local weekly, presented the perfect role model.

"I always liked to write, but I never seriously thought about it professionally," at least, as a novelist.

He did put in several years writing for newspapers before moving to Grants, New Mexico, where he taught for 12 years.

"I went to college, but I never really studied anything," Havill said. "I spent a lot of time hunting and enjoying New Mexico."

He started at Cornell University in 1966. A short stint with Eastman Kodak convinced him that industrial work was not his future.

"Then I applied out here and stayed, except for the years I taught at a Catholic school," Havill said. "I was working for a daily newspaper at the time and was assigned to do a story on the school."

By 1973, he was back with a newspaper and hanging out with local sheriff's department, riding with the deputies and taking photographs for them.

His first attempt at writing a novel outgrew itself. The plot never connected and it was just too long, Havill said.

"Then the idea came for 'The Killer' and it wrote itself," he said. Published in 1981, and incorporating his fascination with medicine on the Western frontier from 1870-1900, the novel deals with an outbreak of typhoid fever.

"I had textbooks on internal medicine published in 1887, found the books were great for research and collected them," he said. For instance, with typhoid fever, warm milk with whiskey was one of the

most effective treatments because between spikes in the fever, the whiskey quickly added calories to the ailing patient and the milk coated the stomach.

"I was teaching at Grants when my first book was published," Havill said. "My superintendent told me I was allowed to walk on air for just three days."

"The Killer" focused on three young people who had been working their way across country posing as two doctors and a nurse. They are unmasked by a marshal during an outbreak of typhoid fever in a small town. He makes them a deal and they stay to help.

"I fell in love with making sort of off-center characters," Havill said. "They're real people, who make lots of mistakes."

While some of the characters are based on particular people he has known or met, others are composites of different traits.

Medicine focus

Two more novels, "The Worst Enemy" and "Leadfire," dealing with medicine in the old west, followed his first.

The plot of "The Worst Enemy" spins from the theft of beef contaminated with deadly anthrax that is sold to a hotel. The wife of one of the main characters, an honest banker, eats one of the steaks at their wedding anniversary dinner.

"I really liked the character, a plain, honest man with no hidden motive," Havill said, noting that was an unusual approach to a character who is a banker.

Again the human side comes into play when the distracted town doctor fails to recognize the first few cases he sees as being anthrax. The situation escalates through mistakes.

"That's one of my favorite themes," Havill said.

His next three novels moved away from the western setting and into the mystery genre, but set in New Mexico.

"Timber Blood" centers on a logger who uses a narrow gauge railroad. When rustlers take over the train cars to transport stolen cattle, they frame him.

On his agent's advice, Havill continued to move more into mysteries, this time using his background with the police in small rural towns "where nothing happens for years on end," he said.

"The chief's job is to try not to get complacent, so he's on his toes when something big happens."

In "Heartshot" and later "Bitter Recoil," Havill introduced an older hero in his veteran police chief, Bill

Gastner, and a young heroine, Estelle, who works as an officer in his department.

"I'm very pleased with the reviews," Havill said. "I haven't had a bad one yet."

For instance, a Publishers Weekly reviewer wrote that while "definitely avoiding tourist traps as he steers his plot to its unpredictable resolution, Havill delivers an evocative tale of hard lives on the edge of society. His portly detective is a genuine low-key pleasure."

"Heartshot" was called a winner all the way, enlivened as it is by the lively writing and the very liberated relationship between Gastner and this woman he not only likes as a person, but respects as an officer of the law," by a Washington Times reviewer.

Havill said he doesn't write for any particular age bracket.

"They're not kids' books, but they also aren't filled with blood and gore or with gratuitous sex scenes," he said. "It's what they do in relation to the character that fascinates me."

"It's really fun playing with the relationship between these people, to watch it developing."

In addition to writing novels, teaching and occasional guest speaker spots for college and high school classes, or other conferences, Havill also works for Writer's Digest, where he guides about 100 students in mystery workshops and as part of a writer's advisory council.

"The hardest thing to get through to them is that coming up with the plot is easy, it's harder to create characters who are interesting and create events that are interesting," Havill said.

Then they have to sit down and write, he said.

"For that, there is no better training than newspaper work."

His writing students don't always want to hear what Havill has to say, the author said.

"They want to send a proposal to an editor and they're shocked when I tell them that the editor could care less about them wanting to write this book," Havill said. "I tell them to write it first, to study the market and to peddle it."

"Ninety-nine percent don't study the market and the publishing industry is notoriously fickle."

Writers also need to read a lot, he said, "Fifty-two novels a year would be good."

Advice offered

Some interesting advice Havill offers would-be mystery writers is

to read the last chapter of a good mystery first, then go back to see how the author got there, where he sprinkles the clues.

Personally, Havill doesn't write on any schedule or goal of a certain number of words a day.

"There comes a point for me when the novel has to come out," Havill said. "They come out unrequested, a compulsion. I really like writing novels and then get caught up in the pleasure of creating the scene."

The time it takes to deliver a novel varies. "Worst Enemy" took six weeks, "Heartshot," required one and a half years.

While Havill says a good novel will sell with or without an agent, he recommends using a professional for that job.

When "The Killer" was published by Doubleday, the editor advised him to hire an agent, if he intended to continue writing, because he lives in New Mexico and an agent lives in New York where the market can be observed. An agent looks for the best deal and can be cold-blooded.

"My agent can talk about selling my books in Japan as easily as I can take roll call," Havill said. He wasn't even aware that "Timber Blood" was coming out in soft cover until it arrived in the mail, he noted.

Paperback and movie rights is where most authors earn the bigger dollars, not in hardback sales.

"You don't get rich writing books in hardback," Havill said. "Movie rights and paperback are a whole different ball game."

"Of course, there are exceptions," such as a four-novel deal Stephen King reportedly signed for \$32-million.

One disappointment in teaching is that many students view writing as work.

"Once in a while, you see one who understands the pleasure of creating their own people and situations," he said.

Covers displayed

To show students that writing can be a career, Havill has displayed his book covers on a back bulletin board in his classroom.

"I think that's important for them to know the teacher does something," he said. "I've had a pretty happy, productive job to date. I like the job and teaching is a ball."

His wife has been incredibly helpful in reviewing his manuscripts, Havill said. She reads books and prepares indexes (cross references) at home for the University of New Mexico Press, the park service and other clients.

The couple moved to Lincoln

County, in part, because Havill already knew Paula Papponi, principal of Ruidoso Middle School, and she recruited him.

"We had never visited Lincoln or Ruidoso," he said. "I drove down to visit Paula and, as I sat in the front lobby, all these people were walking around smiling. I was impressed by their attitude. Things were not happy in the Grants district then."

"Next we took a fateful drive to Lincoln and it was love at first sight. We even liked Carrizozo, where twice before I'd had car trouble."

"When I signed the teaching contract, at the same time, a sign had just gone up on an old adobe we bought. We have lived close to Interstate 40 before and an absolute priority was that we not live near a major highway. It's quiet in Lincoln. You can hear the coyotes."

His newest novel, "Twice Buried," deals with parents who care nothing for the welfare of their children, and is based on a real murder case Havill worked while writing for a newspaper. He's already started on the fourth novel in the Gastner-Estelle series and this one will be more school related, he said.

"Bitter Recoil" and "Twice Buried" are both available at The Aspen Tree book store on Sudderth.

State Game Commission management practices are questioned

TO THE EDITOR:

Hope you people publish this editorial.

Our New Mexico State Game Commission or New Mexico State Game Department is trying to deliberately and maliciously destroy the game in New Mexico.

Thirty years ago this country, among a lot of other countries, had a hunttable amount of deer, bear, turkey and some areas, elk. Our New Mexico State Game Commission decided to have a state wide doe or mother deer hunt. They destroyed about one-half of the deer population. Since then the deer population has been diminishing rapidly. As of this date, 1994, there is about one-third of the amount of deer there was in 1963.

But, our New Mexico State Game Commission continue to have more and more hunts for deer. In 1993 our New Mexico State Game Commission hunted deer 46 days. That being bow, muzzle loader, and center-fire rifle seasons. The seasons started in September and ended January 15.

In 1963, our New Mexico State Game Commission had only one

season lasting only seven days for hunting with bow, muzzle loader, and center-fire rifle. Now, tell me why!

Now, in 1993, there are more than twice as many hunters than in 1963, but are allowed to hunt 46 days. I say the New Mexico State Game Commission is a very poorly managed organization.

About eight years ago, New Mexico Game Commission came up with an extra charge for hunting and fishing. That being called a "habitat stamp" costing \$5.25 which is added on to all licenses that use state land or water.

Supposedly, this money is to help wild life habitat. Our New Mexico State Game Commission doesn't even know what a habitat is. The spring turkey hunt is during turkey mating season. The September and October elk hunt is during the elk mating season. The December and January deer season is during the deer mating season.

This completely defeats the purpose of game management or habitat. And, where does all the money go that the New Mexico

Game Commission collects on hundreds of thousands of hunting and fishing licenses at an average of \$20.00, a license? Surely, every hunter is also a fisherman.

Just figure it out by reading the current Hunting and Fishing Proclamation. Poor, poor management by New Mexico State Game Commission.

Now in 1994, the New Mexico State Game Department is having a cow elk hunt on the I-X and the Three Rivers ranches. These ranches border the Lincoln National Forest south of Carrizozo. This hunt is for 21 cow elk on each ranch. These permits are being given to the ranches to kill cow elk that are now getting on the ranches in the winter time.

The elk population does not even number enough elk for the 35 days that 1,505 hunters that are already allowed to hunt. The number of elk in the counties of both Lincoln and Otero is about 1,200 elk on state land. Yet 1,505 licenses are sold to hunt 1,200 elk. The biggest majority being out-of-state hunters at

\$356.00 a license. About 800 out-of-state licenses means \$284,800, just of elk. This is not counting the deer, bear and turkey licenses which total much more money than this.

Our New Mexico State Game Department is trying to kill out the elk before they have a chance to get started.

Our New Mexico State Game Commission has nearly killed out all the barbary sheep in Lincoln County. They have had a year-in and year-out hunt for barbary sheep for the past five years. The sheep were very scarce now, but open season on the sheep? Poor, poor management by our New Mexico State Game Commission.

There should be year-in and year-out bounties on mountain lions and coyotes. One lion may kill as many as six to eight deer a month. Two or more coyotes together kill about five deer a month.

Lions, coyotes and the New Mexico State Game Commission hunting pressure is taking a toll on game in New Mexico.

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Sally Avery

Sally Avery's energetic commitment to her community epitomizes what volunteerism and public service are all about.

Sally's nomination for Woman of the Year will be added to a long list of achievements she has gathered over the years. She was named Altrusan of the Year in 1991, and has been recognized many times by the Lincoln County Medical Center Auxiliary for her continuing contributions at the hospital.

She has volunteered almost 7,000 to the hospital, and still spends three or four days a week there, where she is chairman of the volunteers and heads the auxiliary's publicity committee.

While serving as auxiliary president in 1986 and 1987, Sally was installed on the hospital board, and she still serves on that board.

Sally, who moved to Ruidoso in 1974, after living in El Paso, Texas, for 18

years, combines her love of art with her caring for people, and was instrumental in getting art added to the walls of the rooms and hallways at LCMC. Another contribution that soothes and entertains patients, is the large fish tank in the lobby that was acquired partly through Sally's efforts.

Sally joined Altrusa, a service organization, in 1981, and has helped out wherever there was a job to be done — baking and selling brownies, planning a project or cleaning up after it's over.

But, the one big project that owes its success to almost entirely to Sally, is the low cost-mammogram screening program that Altrusa and LCMC co-sponsor each year. The health screenings, that includes hours and hours of planning, scheduling and in implementation, started as a one-day project for Altrusa, and has grown into a month-long program that helps hundreds of

area women.

Sally is at the hospital full-time during the mammogram project juggling schedules, filling appointment times and greeting patients who benefit from the low-cost health screenings.

Avery paints and gardens in her spare time. She's also a member of the

First Baptist Church of Ruidoso and is vice president of Ruidoso Community Concerts. She is on the Welcome Back Horsemen committee, has served on the American Heart Association board and is past president of the Ruidoso Garden Club.

Avery, who grew up in Tennessee, was married for 44 years before her husband died. She and her husband had four children, three daughters and a son, who is now deceased.

Sally is tireless in her efforts to help others.

Joan Bailey is what some people call a dreamer and what others call a visionary. At bottom, though, she is someone who believes in self-empowerment. For her, the strength of the individual is the strength of the community.

As director of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, Joan puts a tremendous value on community.

"I'm in love with this area," she said. "I have never lived in a community that I cared for as I do for people in my life. I miss it when I'm not there, and I want to defend it, take care of it."

Joan is working toward a legacy as a person who could be trusted, who had no hidden agendas, and who could be counted on.

"I've been accused of being a Polly Anna," Joan said, "but I'm very practical. I told the board it's all about making money, and it is. The crux is what you choose to do with the money."

Joan is a firm believer in the power of choice.

"If you want to have something happen — to be happy, to have friends — it has to be your choice, and then you have to put things into action."

In terms of empowerment, Joan has found her forties to be more fulfilling than her thirties.

"I have always been a late bloomer, so it gives me pause to think what in the world is in front of me," she said. Joan isn't looking for bigger and better career opportunities, but enriching experiences.

"My work has led me to wonderful

friends of all different shapes and colors, educational backgrounds and work backgrounds," she said.

Joan's personal philosophy of empowerment and appreciation of diversity carries over into her campaign for community. She said her greatest accomplishment is getting groups of people and organizations together to discuss common goals.

"No matter how many wonderful attractions we have, if we don't feel good, look right, act right, visitors won't want to come back," she said. "So we have to have a sense of community before anything else, then I think everything will systematically fall into place."

Joan is proud to call herself a public servant.

"I believe in this community," she said.

When she came here from Las Cruces in 1980, fleeing a career teaching third and fourth grade, Ann taught skiing. Not much later, she bought a store that sold interior accessories and gourmet coffee.

"I guess I got bored with that," she said. That's when she opened J. Roberts.

"I like clothes better, and I like going to market. People say I go to market as often as I remodel, which is pretty often."

"I bought this store when a lot of people here were going broke," she said. "The oil market had nose-dived and this town was really suffering." Ann sur-

vived by running the whole store alone.

As a business woman, Ann strongly believes in doing her part to make Ruidoso attractive to visitors.

"I try to offer something special," she said. "I've had customers come to Ruidoso specifically to visit this store."

Ann is a member of the MainStreet board, a position she takes seriously even though she hates meetings.

"We do need to improve downtown," she said. "What's frustrating is that everyone agrees there are problems with this project, but then they leave the meeting without resolving anything."

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

Born in Mineral Wells, Texas,

Fredda moved to the San Patricio area when she was two years old.

Some of her happiest thoughts are of living in the Hondo Valley in the Peter Hurd home that he purchased from Fredda's grandmother Helena Coe.

"I rode my first horse when I was four years old," she said. "I lived for Sundays to cool down the horses after the polo games on the property."

With her love for horses, it should have come as little surprise that she married a race horse trainer named Carl Draper.

"I work to the best of my ability," she says matter-of-factly. "And I won't settle for less."

That quiet confidence undoubtedly helped her when she left the area to become personnel director of a large construction firm in the famous trout fishing town of Gunnison, Colorado, where

Last year she gathered 175 volunteers of all ages to present the spectacular for more than 800 people. There are a lot of reasons why Janet spends so much time putting together an annual show.



Darlene said Paul is a terrific partner who helps with the kids and cooks dinner. As a fireman, Paul's schedule enables him to balance home duties with Darlene. Last year was particularly trying for them.

"It was tough with my new promotion, and we built a new house, and my husband started a new career," said Darlene.

Darlene believes that her work affords her the best opportunity to participate in the community.

"I'm helping people get home loans and consumer loans, helping them get what they need," she said. "Also, I'm able to donate to different organizations, so I don't need a whole lot of extra time to help out. I can do it through my career, which is really great."

"I'm not a horse person," she said. "I was a city girl. But I think even Ruidoso doesn't realize what a treasure this museum is."

Mary knows the whole story about Anne Stradling and her estate. Mary also knows the story about Ruidoso's growth over the past 30 years. She started out here as a nurse in a hospital where she says the emergency room then was no bigger than an apartment-sized living room.

"The ski slopes had just opened back

then," she said, "and there were no great skiers. They'd come falling off that mountain and we'd have them lined up."

The prescription then, after all the medical work was done, said Mary, was to give the patient plenty of TLC. She's glad to know that even with technological advances that could make medicine cold and impersonal, the staff at Ruidoso's hospital still believe in offering personalized care.

"When I got sick," she said, "they were all so nice. I couldn't have gotten better care."

Mary left the nursing profession in 1976 to open a re-sale clothing store.

"Second-hand clothing wasn't as popular then as it is now," she said. "Now even Barbra Streisand thinks second-

hand is wonderful." Unusual Fashions, as her store was called, survived until 1989, when she changed the name to Bargains Galore. That store closed in 1991, when Mary joined the ranks of the retired senior citizens who call Ruidoso home.

Mary thinks Ruidoso is a great place to retire.

"For a while the village council didn't want to promote a retirement community here," she said. "But now this council realizes it's a good idea."

With people living longer these days, Mary points out with a grin, they have time to spend more money in Ruidoso.

Mary remembers when it was difficult to spend money in Ruidoso. A fine dinner required a drive out to Tinnie, and most people drove to Alamogordo

just for groceries. Even with that inconvenience, though, Mary felt a special connection to this area.

Joan Dale Hubbard

Many of her impacts are obvious, others more subtle, but Joan Dale Hubbard has left her imprint on Ruidoso, a community she chose as a favorite retreat from the hectic pace of the rest of her life.

In partnership with her husband, multi-millionaire racetrack owner and former industrial glass corporate head R.D. Hubbard, she has concentrated on improving the educational, social and cultural side of the community.

In May 1990, the couple built a luxurious home with a spectacular view of Sierra Blanca, designed for non-stop entertaining where her hearty laugh and unflinching personal observations put guests and business associates at ease.

Born in Oklahoma, Joan Dale McLain's dedication to education came from her father's strong desire to be a teacher coupled with her admiration for her third grade instructor.

While teaching in Wichita, Kansas, she met her husband, who also had been a teacher, but already had moved into sales and then took over as president of a glass company.

"But I couldn't be married to a man like Mr. Hubbard and teach," she said. "His interests and the demands on his time and those around him are so over-

whelming, they leave little time for anything else."

With Mrs. Hubbard as a working partner, Hubbard went on to take control of two money-losing companies, merged them into AFG Industries based in Fort Worth, Texas, which generated \$650-million in industrial glass sales at its peak.

"Being part of company that's losing money, turning it around and developing a market was exciting," Mrs. Hubbard said.

After the company was sold, the Hubbards, who have been married 22 years, concentrated on racetracks and other pursuits. While vacationing in Ruidoso, they saw the plight of the Ruidoso Downs Race Track and took the plunge, as well as developing The Links municipal golf course.

Mrs. Hubbard handled the refurbishing of the racetrack decor. Then in December of 1988, the couple emerged as significant collectors of realistic art when they purchase the Doheny Collection, which included original Russells

and Remingtons not seen by the public since 1926.

In addition to the opening of the Hubbard Museum in 1989 to house the collection, the couple initiated the annual Hubbard Art Award for Excellence in 1990. Mrs. Hubbard also guided the \$20-million Anne C. Stradling Museum of the Horse to completion in Ruidoso Downs, where more than 10,000 horse-related items are featured and dozens of special shows and events are staged each year.

Through the R.D. and Joan Dale Hubbard Foundation, formed in 1986, projects have been initiated throughout the country. They include scholarships and hefty financial gifts to several schools in Kansas and New Mexico, the Hubbard Space Science Education Building at the International Space Hall of Fame in Alamogordo and the Joan Dale Hubbard Academic Scholarship at Ruidoso High School.

Catherine-Frank "Frankie" Jarrell, editor of the Ruidoso News, earns her community respect the old fashioned way, she simply works harder than anyone else.

Her tireless energy and work ethic has left a mark on nearly every community volunteer service in Ruidoso, often as a chair or a charter member, always as a leader.

Frankie has been a member of The Ruidoso News staff since 1984, starting as a people beat reporter, moving onto government reporting and taking the reins as editor in 1988.

Valentine's Day — How Sweet It Is!

(NU) - Ever notice that expressions of affection often relate to something sweet? For example, "You're my sweetheart," "Hi, sweetie pie," "Bye, honeybunch." However syrupy the language of love might be, there's no denying the fact that humans have always had a love affair with sweets.

Whether you're talking about honey used by ancient Egyptians or today's sweetening alternatives like NutraSweet® brand sweetener, it seems we just can't get enough.

In fact, our desire for sweets is innate and is present even at birth. Our love of sweets might even have started as a survival tool: The first humans preferred the sweet taste of edible foods over the bitter taste of foods that were poisonous.

Here are a few other morsels of information about our sweet history:
• Ancient Egyptians mixed honey with nuts and fruits to make the first candies.



She has a style and flair more reflective of her years in New York than her last 15 in New Mexico.

But Paula Papponi is far from aloof. As principal at Ruidoso Middle School, she has shown an ability to work with students, staff and parents to tackle problems and come up with creative solutions.

Laura has visions of chartered flights delivering "pre-sold" tourists who've come specifically to vacation in our fair village.



Ruidoso's first woman councilor, Jerry Shaw, about six months ago also became Ruidoso's first woman mayor.

In the decade of the woman, Mayor Shaw is a front runner. Known for her boundless energy, political savvy and a great memory, Jerry has risen to the top as a community leader and consumer advocate.

Her dogged pursuit for justice and a willingness to fight to preserve it has gained her a village full of admirers. Sometimes that fight can be lonely, but Jerry has never steered away from her principles.

In the small amount of time Mayor Shaw has headed the council, she has accelerated the street cleaning program, pushed the striping of Paradise Canyon road, led the movement for raises for village employees, brought the popular village manager Gary Jackson back into

the community, promoted more open government, established a workshop program that prioritized infrastructure needs and taken a back to basics approach to local government.

Jerry earned her stripes as a former business owner for 10 years in Ruidoso, publishing a monthly magazine called Best Bet, a tourist-oriented publication that was placed with all the motels, including the Inn of the Mountain Gods.

For a portion of those 10 years, she also owned an optical shop.

Not everything turned up roses. Shaw also published a magazine called Vida in Ruidoso, sold on the newsstands.

"That magazine only lasted for three or four issues because of its expensive production charges," she said.

Shaw is sold on Ruidoso.

"It's the perfect place to live," she

said. "We need to carry a sparkling image through the village, up and down all of Sudderth and Mechem, as clean as our air."

Shaw appears to have a grasp on what makes a tourist town sell.

"I want to see more emphasis put on recreation for the community. We have one thing to sell, besides beauty and cleanliness, and that is recreation.

Those things that not only first meet the tourist eye, but the tourist can use as well."

When Shaw is not conducting village business, she chooses more sedentary recreation to relax her.

"I like to read in my spare time," Jerry said. "I also don't mind people knowing I like to play Bingo."

"I can play Bingo and forget about everything else for the moment," she said.
