Village officials to be sworn in tonight

A special meeting of the newly elected officials of the governing body of Ruidoso is scheduled for 7 p.m. today (Monday), March 7, at Ruidoso Village Hall.

The purpose of the meeting is to administer the oath of office to the newly elect officials and to conduct certain items of business which will provide for the continuity of government for the village.

According to village clerk Tammie Maddox, she will administer the oath of office to the newly elected officials, after which they shall take their seats of office.

The mayor may wish to make some remarks regarding her office and ask other elected officials for remarks.

Pursuant to New Mexico State Statutes 1-12-3A, the governing body shall elect one of its members to act as mayor pro tem in the absence of the mayor.

In accordance with law, Mayor Jerry Shaw shall submit, for confirmation by the board, the names of persons who shall be employed to fill the appointive office of Manager-Treasurer.

The council will act on Resolution 94-9, "A resolution setting forth notice provisions for notices of public meetings of the council."

Pedestrian killed

A 40-year-old Mescalero resident was killed Saturday when he was struck by a vehicle while walking on U.S. Highway 70.

Pronounced dead at the scene was Clifford Kaydahzinne.

According to Lieutenant Alfred LaPaz of Mescalero law enforcement, the accident occurred at 6:50 p.m. near mileage marker 243.

He said the accident still is under investigation and would not release the name of the driver or more details.

Mentor execs meet

Mayor Jerry Shaw has called a meeting of the executive committee for the Mentor Program at 6:30 p.m. Thursday, March 10, in council chambers of Ruidoso Municipal Administrative Center.

Public briefed on water rights suit

Recent developments in a court case that will determine all water rights in the Hondo River stream will be discussed during a town meeting with officials from the State Engineer's Office at 7 p.m. today (Monday), March 7, in the Ruidoso Civic Events Center.

The case hinges on claims to water rights by the Mescalero Apache Tribe. The Water Defense Association was formed by affected landowners along the stream system to fight portions of the claims.

County renews boards

Several different faces will appear on county boards at upcoming meetings as a result of Lincoln County Commissioners appointing new members last week.

Commissioners L. Ray Nunley and Wilton Howell exchanged two of their board assignments. Howell moved over from the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County to the Lincoln County Medical Center and Nunley shifted from the center to the corporation.

Robert Walters resigned from the seven-member Extraterritorial Zoning Commission, as did Gordon Barham. In response to a request by Walters, commissioners appointed him to fill a vacancy on the Agriculture and Rural Affairs Committee in District Two (Nunley's district) left by the resignation of Flo Maul.

Barham's vacancy on the extraterritorial board must be advertised for possible candidates.

More moving around occurred when Commissioner Stirling Spencer did not reappoint Nancy Dooley to the District One seat on the county Planning and Zoning Board. Instead, he placed her on the extraterritorial zoning commission (in Walters' vacant post). The extraterritorial commission reviews proposed development within a one-mile radius around Ruidoso to ensure compatibility in that transition area between the county and village.

With the concurrence of other county commissioners, in Dooley's place on the planning and zoning board, Spencer appointed Rex Wilson. Kathy Osborne was reappointed in District Two, David Cummins was reappointed in District Four (Commissioner Bill Schwetmann's district) and Wayne Negley was reappointed as member at large.

MainStreet moves ahead despite money woes

Part 4 of a series on MainStreet Ruidoso

On July 1, 1992, MainStreet officials were looking for ways to make money last for the fiscal year 1992-93 after getting about \$10,000 less than they asked for in the village budget.

MainStreet director Mary Maul submitted a proposed expense total of \$50,700. The village council decided to give the group \$37,500, the same amount as the previous year.

President Alden Deyo managed to squeeze another \$3,500 to \$41,000 after he spoke at a village council meeting.

Maul said the executive committee would have to rearrange the budget, especially after the group had decided to hire an assistant director.

Maul's husband, Jeff, accepted a job in Santa Fe and she informed the board she would be moving to Santa Fe.

The board reviewed the job description for project manager and agreed that the person hired as office administrator would be expected to advance to the position of manager in about six months.

The board had discussed having Maul remain as executive director to continue contacts with the legislature, state agencies and the village.

An assistant would then be hired with secretarial and book-keeping skills to be trained as a program manager.

Maul said the change would require redefining her job description. She said the position would not be advertised because the board had already been contacted by several highly qualified people.

Deyo said the assistant also would help carry on with new projects in design, promotion and economic restructuring for the downtown revitalization.

He said the assistant and the board especially would want to work on plans to improve the sidewalks in the downtown area, to be completed within the next two years.

In July, a consultant committee of Mike Line, Bill Carrigan and Tom Rigsby met with Maul to negotiate her salary so the group would know what was available to offer the office administrator.

Directors Madeline Shackelford and Jacqueline Bentley were concerned that an advertisement for the position hadn't been placed.

Shackelford said since the group receives taxpayers money, they should at least run an ad for a week. She said the ad would prevent thoughts of unfairness in the hiring practice.

Bentley said the ad may also bring in more applicants with good

qualifications. The plan was to have Maul do initial interviews and narrow the field for the executive committee to choose.

The MainStreet group advertised Maul's position in The Ruidoso News and set August 1 as the deadline for people to send in resumes.

The advertisement stated they were looking for someone with education or skills in public relations, community planning, business administration, architecture and historic preservation.

A selection committee of Carrigan, Audean Franklin, Herb Brunell and J.D. James was to review applicants to make a selection.

President Deyo also had his membership drive to think of that June.

Deyo encouraged directors to meet with other businesses and individuals who would benefit from being a member of MainStreet.

He said more volunteers to meet businesses would take less time for the drive. He said in 1991, it took a major portion of the day for the membership drive.

The 1992 dues were \$1,000 for a financial institution, \$200 for a business or professional firm, \$200 for property owners of less than half an acre, \$300 for owners of

Billing errors cost the Downs

The Regional Wastewater Treatment Plant Joint Use Board discovered a few weeks ago that since about February of 1992, they have been undercharging the Village of Ruidoso Downs and overcharging the Village of Ruidoso for their proportionate shares of plant usage.

Leann Weibrecht, Downs village clerk, brought it to the attention of LeeAnn Nichols, Ruidoso finance supervisor, that the Downs' sewage bill for this year is already at a balance of about \$36,000, while the total bill for last year was only about \$23,000.

When Nichols and Weibrecht examined the treatment plant billing system, which is based on a convoluted formula filled with irrelevant calculations, they found that two key figures in the formula had been habitually transposed for almost two years.

The formula calls for the subtraction of Ruidoso's metered wastewater from the total amount of treated water that leaves the plant. The difference is used to calculate the wastewater flow of Ruidoso Downs. Correction for the clerical error puts Ruidoso Downs more than \$17,000 in debt to the treatment plant due to undercharging, and it leaves Ruidoso with a credit of over \$11,000 due to overcharging.

Nichols, who has corrected the mistake, said that although the Downs has been undercharged for this year as well as last, their bill is significantly higher due to an increase in operational costs and water usage. The Downs had not been informed of an overall operating budget increase from \$394,224 to \$469,442 and the Downs water usage has increased 13 percent.

Village manager Gary Jackson

said the Downs was not involved in approving the wastewater budget because the Ruidoso Village Council was treating the account as a municipal department account.

"From now on, the joint board will approve the budget and everyone concerned will be involved," he said.

The complications involved in determining the appropriate percentage each village pays for sewage prompted board members to re-evaluate the billing formula.

According to the minutes of a February 10, 1988, meeting, the current formula was adopted by former Downs mayor Jake Harris, Bill Smith, former Ruidoso mayor Lloyd Davis, Dorothy Pope and Bill Karn.

It is based mainly on water meter readings and requires subtracting Ruidoso's influent (used water) from the plant's total effluent (treated water), then running through a series of mathematical acrobatics to figure in infiltration and a five percent credit to the Downs.

Jackson suggested that using metered water to figure wastewater flow was probably very fallible. He explained that in winter months, more than 90 percent of the water used in the home flows back into the wastewater lines. However, many Ruidoso area residents are on a septic system, which means that none of their water returns to wastewater lines.

Ruidoso Councilor J.D. James took pains to clarify the location of two wastewater flow meters, one at the plant entrance and one right before the main line merges with the Downs. According to Jackson, these meters measure each town's wastewater flow more accurately

Tempers flare at MainStreet coffee

The MainStreet coffee Friday morning began as usual, with merchants starting in bewilderment at the design plans, asking Gary Jackson or Alan Briley, "Is that a parking space? Does there have to be a tree there?"

One merchant, Pat Adkins, shook her head in disgust.

"We don't need all this foolishness," she said. She added, bemoaning the fact that she is committed to allowing construction in front of her store, "Don Miller (MainStreet project manager) had me sign something, and I wouldn't do it until he assured me they wouldn't touch my parking or put in trees. Now I have no parking and two trees."

Deputy village manager Alan Briley, liaison between MainStreet and the village, and construction superintendent Bob Tackett presented their MainStreet update calmly and efficiently. Tackett reported that one-third of phase five was now completed, and that he is pursuing permission to use a soil stabilization technique rather than excavation to make work go even faster.

"It's going superbly well," he said.

Tackett expects crews to be at Eagle street sometime this week. Tackett is finding many ways to compromise with shop owners and to get crews out of the way quickly. He estimates it will take three days to go from the Covered Wagon to

Win, Place and Show.

Briley reported that Tuesday the village council will review options for solving the parking problem.

"They should announce the time for a public meeting," he said.

Some merchants brought up concerns over Spring Break shoppers. Briley shrugged helplessly. "We'll provide access," he said.

Others asked farsighted questions about the maintenance of trash cans and planters.

In typical "not I" fashion, some merchants wanted assurance that they are not expected to contribute anything to the maintenance of the new sidewalk and landscaping. They also have not been asked to contribute anything to the construction of the new sidewalks in front of their businesses since the money was allocated through the state and federal government.

"Who will empty the trash cans when they're overflowing on days the city doesn't pick up?" one woman asked. Bonnie Mattox, a MainStreet board member, suggested that in such cases, the merchants themselves should remove the overflow.

"It's not so hard to put it in a bag and take it behind the building," she said.

"Who is taking care of the planters?" another merchant asked. Briley said the project provides for planting and irrigation systems and that the beds will be covered in bark.

J.O. Ross said laughingly, "And

after the first good rain all that bark will be in front of WPS (Win, Place and Show). Bark floats!"

"I am aware that bark floats," said Briley. He said the board might consider using another material in the planter beds.

Ross and others further complained that they were unaware of many changes MainStreet had made, and Ross said he didn't even know when the coffees were scheduled. The announcement of Friday's coffee was on the front page of The Ruidoso News. MainStreet coffees have been a tradition almost from the beginning of the organization. At some point they were cut back from weekly to monthly, but now they're being conducted once a week to give merchants a chance to discuss their new sidewalks and Midtown improvements.

Apparently frustrated with the attitude of some merchants, MainStreet board member Audean Franklin stepped forward and told them to quit relying on others to tell them what was going on.

"Don't expect someone to take your hand," she said. "Get out and find out."

The meeting immediately dissolved into private but loud conversations.

Pat Adkins told The Ruidoso News that she would like to see enough people get together to file a class action suit.

Bob Smith, a phase one merchant who was extremely disappointed with MainStreet, said,

"Let's get the project done, then come back later and find out if the people responsible for this fiasco owe the taxpayers for misappropriation of funds. That's the way it appears because of all the mistakes."

Eddie Fowler, who has also been displeased with MainStreet, said he was feeling better about their operation.

"I think three months is pretty fast," he said. "And they came down like they said, gave back parking where possible, and they're doing it in sections, which I like."

"They are working with us now 100 percent, like we asked at the beginning. Alan (Briley), Bob (Tackett) and Gary (Jackson), are all bending over backwards, keeping the line of communications open. I just wish that had been done from the start."

Don Miller was not in attendance again. Bonnie Mattox reported that he was in Las Cruces for a MainStreet economic development workshop. Two other sources, Gary Jackson and Jeneane Taylor said they thought the workshop was Ag Fest, which included promotion of agricultural tourism and attendance of a New Mexico State basketball game. "I can't really see how that relates to MainStreet," said Jackson. Miller could not be reached for comment.

MainStreet gives project updates at 9 a.m. every Friday morning at the MainStreet Office, which is next door to J. Roberts.

School Board reviews new legislative impact on district

An update on legislation passed last month that could impact the Ruidoso School District will be discussed during the School Board meeting at 7 p.m. Tuesday in the administration office.

Board members also will receive a report on construction and start-up time lines for Sierra Vista Primary, the new elementary school in the White Mountain complex.

The board is expected to take action on a proposed adolescent day treatment center, budget adjustments, a call for bids on ground maintenance and a management/responsibility plan.

They will be asked to approve a schedule for visiting district schools at 11 a.m. on a series of Wednesdays as follows: March 9 at Ruidoso Middle School, March 30 at White Mountain Intermediate, April 6 at White Mountain Elementary and April 30 at Nob Hill Elementary.

P&Z to review replat requests

Zone Text Amendments regarding Conditional Use, Development Standards (parking), Flood Hazard Regulations, and Subdivision Regulations will be the main topic of discussion at the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission meeting at 2 p.m. today (Monday), March 7, at village hall.

The council will also hear:

- a replat request by Donald and Paula Phillips of Black Forest;
- a replat request from Frank Roberts of Holiday Acres;
- a replat request from William Ivey of Shady Oak;
- an amendment for commercial site development for lots 13, 14, 15, 16 and 17 of Block 1, Ruidoso Springs subdivision by Harry Sappington.

Merchants fear arts and crafts festivals are stealing business

A murmur of dismay circulated among some Ruidoso merchants when the Ruidoso Convention and Civic Events Center released its schedule of coming events.

According to Teri Sodd of Mountain Arts Gallery, the city council agreed last year to ban all retail arts and crafts fairs at the civic center, but Mel Prather's shows are tentatively scheduled for two weekends a year for the next three years.

At a July 1993 village council meeting, merchants made a show of force to present their grievances: a) that events at the center took business from local merchants, and b) that there were not enough conventions and conferences at the center.

The council subsequently appointed a committee which included merchant and now councilor Robert Donaldson, attorney Don Dutton, and civic center director Kathleen Michelena to present their recommendations to the council.

Councilor Donaldson recently explained to Sodd that, although he was in favor of ruling out any kind of retail or wholesale sales at the civic center, the majority of the committee was not.

These local business people pay their bills and taxes all year, said Donaldson. "If someone wants to come in and compete with them, let him rent a building (instead of the convention center)."

In September, at an open council meeting, the council adopted a

resolution to protect the interests of local businesses and non-profit organizations. The resolution places arts and crafts shows in the lowest priority for events booking the center, and it restricts them from scheduling shows during peak tourism seasons, "from and including Memorial Weekend through Labor Day Weekend, the weekend of the Aspenfest Parade, and two weekends prior to and including the weekend of the Greeters' Christmas Jubilee."

Don Dutton, who authored much of the committee's recommendations, said the restrictions are reasonable.

"We cannot prohibit arts and crafts fairs 12 months out of the year," he said.

According to Sodd, however, councilors told the merchants that shows would be limited to four per year, sponsored by local non-profit organizations.

While The Ruidoso News found nothing in the minutes of August and September 1993 meetings to indicate that such an agreement had been made, the minutes of the September 14 council meeting do quote Councilor James as recalling that the intent of changing booking rules was "to eliminate all arts and craft type shows from booking into the Civic Events Center."

James also stated that he was against any organization or business in competition with local businesses booking the Civic Events Center. James's position

was disputed by Councilor Barbara Duff, who said that the people complaining about how the center is booked are a small minority.

Mel Prather, whose arts and crafts festival was at the civic center this past weekend, said all the publicity that minority received hurt his show. He said this show only had 60 booths, while he usually has between 140 and 150.

Prather complied with all the new regulations of the village and the center, including renting the whole center and paying \$1,700 in advance. Prather believes the regulations are fair.

"We're not here to target their (local business) customers," he said. Prather spent over \$4,000 to advertise the Ruidoso festival in El Paso, Alamogordo and other surrounding areas.

"This is a good town and a good show, and we try hard to bring in tourists," he said.

His fairs travel southwest Texas and southeast New Mexico, including stops in Roswell, Hobbs and Alamogordo. He said it is not unusual for someone to attend a show in one town, then another show in the next town.

"The reason I came to Ruidoso in the first place was because I have friends who own homes here and vacation here, and they asked me to bring a festival here," he said.

Prather said he has never dealt with a greeting as hostile as the one he received here last year.

"People have the idea that we're pulling in millions of dollars," he

said. "But we spend more money here than we make. These exhibitors do it more for the fun of it because they don't make much money."

Doug and Carmen Rosson of the Rocky Mountain Christmas store confirmed Prather's statement.

"The booth merchants are lucky to break even," said Doug Rosson. The Rossons participated in Prather's show last year to promote their new store on Sudderth.

Prather encouraged local arts and crafts people to participate in his festival. His booths rent for \$85 for the whole weekend, plus exhibitors get free tables and chairs and refreshments. The Rossons said Prather is known for respecting communities and for contributing to charity groups.

At a show in Odessa, Texas, Prather raised more than \$80,000 for the local food bank.

"I was planning to join the chamber here and participate in the community," said Prather.

Since last summer, he has taken care not to book against a Ruidoso event, and last year he bought advertising for the gymnastics association's fair because the shows were scheduled for the same weekend.

The Rossons said many merchants in Ruidoso don't understand the benefits of being renowned for arts and crafts shows. They pointed to communities in Arkansas where the War Eagle Fair and the Bella Vista Fair bring hundreds of people to town.

"They fill all the hotels," said

Doug Rosson. "The restaurants are crowded; and it doesn't keep people from coming downtown."

Prather said his shows typically attract at least 3,000 people per day, and that 4/5 of the sales are to non-locals. There were 112 people involved with this year's show, and they rented hotel rooms or RV spaces (no one is allowed to sleep in their cars and Prather lists lodgings), ate in restaurants (Prather gives them a list of places to try), and some patronize the casino.

The Rossons said it is not uncommon for exhibitors to stay in town an extra day so they can shop downtown.

Sodd said it is not just art shows that hurt the Ruidoso economy, but anything that draws customers away from local stores.

"The convention center is supposed to bring conventions to town, people who eat and sleep here," she said. "This lady (Kathleen Michelena) brings competitors who sell to our customers."

Michelena was out of town and has not had the opportunity to respond to renewed merchant complaints.

Civic center office manager Jeneane Taylor said, "The coming events are tentative. The idea (of restrictions) was to keep them out of the busiest times of year."

In a separate interview, Don Dutton said, "If we restrict them (sales shows) to non-busy times, then they have to attract their own customers, which brings people to

town. What's wrong with that?"

Donaldson pointed out that because retail/wholesale fairs have the lowest booking priority and because all shows are only tentatively scheduled, almost any other event could bump the sales shows.

"Weddings take priority over sales shows," he said. "If a convention wants to book that weekend, it can."

Councilor Frank Porter agreed that the council's intention was to bring conventions to town. By looking over the center's schedule of coming events, it is unclear how many qualify as conventions under the village's definition, meaning that the group has secured a block of hotel/motel rooms.

Booking conventions could be complicated by the fact that Ruidoso has no convention-type resort hotel to work in partnership with the center.

The majority of events, however, do fall within the center's top priorities, qualifying as conferences, trade shows (no sales), or special events.

"I think Kathleen (Michelena) is doing a wonderful job," said Doug Rosson.

"We have to look farther than this year or the next year. Once the word gets out, these shows (such as Mel Prather's) will be very good for the tourism industry here," he added.

Carmen Rosson pointed out that tourists and locals enjoy the shows.

"People will miss them if they're banned."

than water meters.

James suggested that the billing formula be based on readings from the two sewage meters, simply subtracting Ruidoso's wastewater from the total amount of sewage entering the plant. In this way, Ruidoso Downs' share of the plant's operating costs can be determined in one equation.

Mayor Joe Hayhurst said the Downs would be happy with this formula. The board plans to acquire a list of influent meter readings for the last two years, then convenes at 11 a.m. Friday, March 11, to decide if the simplified formula serves their needs.

The effects of changing the formula are not yet known. Hayhurst noted that it could wind up costing the Downs more money.

Ruidoso village attorney John Underwood said jokingly, "Isn't there a lot more sewage in the Downs?"

"Yes," Hayhurst replied. "That's why everybody down there wears boots."

More than 900 miles of roads keep county road manager busy

The Lincoln County Road Department is responsible for maintaining nearly 988 miles of roads, according to a recent report put together by road manager Bill Cupit.

Forest service roads account for about 71 miles of that total and subdivisions for another 282 miles. The remaining miles are divided into districts.

Section "A" as designated by Cupit takes in Oscura, Carrizozo, Ancho to the Torrance County line

and includes 231 miles of roads.

Section "B" with 232 miles covers the Weddige Ranch area, the Transwestern airstrip, the Townsend Ranch over to the Farnsworth Ranch, southeast to the Chaves County line, the Bird, Porter and Cap Kelly ranches area and north of Ramon to DeBaca County.

Section "C" with 48 miles includes the McDaniels Ranch, Tucson Canyon Ranch and Peralta House areas, Nogal Canyon Road,

Cora Dutton Road and the Pfingston Ranch area to Church Camp intersection.

Section "D" covers 24 miles around Ruidoso, including Gavilan Canyon, the New Airport Road, Eagle Creek Road and Cedar Creek Road.

Section "E" with 100 miles, encompasses Glencoe, San Patricio, Hondo, Alamo Canyon, the Sam Donaldson Ranch to the Chaves County line and the Blue Water Ranch area.

"Because of her power and girth, they suggested children over six, but we've seen her here with very young kids and she's good," said shelter manager Esther Harper. "She's housebroken and waits until she's let out of her cage. She's a very neat dog and knows her sit and come commands."

The former owners said she's not that comfortable in a car, but she hasn't traveled much and probably would adjust with a little training. She's very family oriented.

Kayla has shorter legs than a classic Shiba Inu, but the typical facial structure. She has a lush reddish gold coat.

For those seeking a small pet, BamBam, a terrier/Chihuahua mix is looking for a new home.

With short hair, the Chihuahua-size dog is tan and about one year old. He likes to ride in cars and is very affectionate.

"But he doesn't like it here," Tetreault said. "He's used to a home and yearns for human affection."

BamBam was released by his owners because they work and are away from home a great deal. When BamBam is left alone, his high energy can lead to chewing problems. He also expects to be able to lie on the couch or sit on a chair with his owner.

"He loves children, but would do best with someone who is home most of the time and likes to take a companion dog with them when they drive," Harper said.

Adoptions sadly slow

Although Harper holds abandon-

ed animals, that she thinks are adoptable for as long as possible, the statistics for dogs and cats destroyed the past month were the highest for any month in the 1993-94 year.

Adoptions still are slow, but animals keep coming into the shelter. Most of the dogs featured in The Ruidoso News, usually a sure bet for adoption, still are waiting. A few have been sacrificed to make room for newcomers. Harper only resorts to euthanasia when the shelter becomes too crowded to maintain its population in a healthy condition.

Five females and their litters have been dumped at the shelter by their owners, despite local laws requiring spaying and neutering for all animals over six months of age. Foster homes and immunizations provide some protection from diseases that kill many puppies.

Sponsorships help a cat's or dog's chances for adoption. Sponsors pay the cost of spaying or neutering. They can designate a particular animal or allow Harper to decide when to offer financial help to a prospective owner.

With warmer weather, the dogs would appreciate volunteers who will walk them on pleasant afternoons. It makes the dogs feel special, keeps them socialized and more adoptable. Volunteers come away with the knowledge they have helped while enjoying moments with a loving companion.

But warmer weather also means it may be best not to take dogs in the car, if owners expect to be inside a store more than one or two minutes. Cars can turn into ovens in just a few moments, causing great harm or even death for a pet.

Tracy and Wanda live in El Paso, Texas, where Tracy runs his auto repair shop. His parents, though, are full-time Ruidoso residents. They bought a home here about a year ago when Roland was the food and beverage director at the Enchantment Inn.

Originally from Oklahoma, then El Paso, Roland discovered Ruidoso when he was travelling with Olan Mills, and he immediately wanted to live here. He and Nyla have 22 years of experience in the restaurant business. They have owned Sonic restaurants in Oklahoma and Missouri, managed the restaurants of the Executive Inn hotel chain, and kept college students in Texas and Oklahoma well fed.

then business partners when Texas Connections was put up for sale by Raymond Rice.

"We must have spent two or three months discussing it over coffee," said Roland. One of the cafe's selling points was its location near two hotels and the race track. On Highway 70 next to the Budget Motel, Texas Connections is visible to tourists and convenient for locals.

After deciding to buy, the new owners had plenty of work ahead of them.

"We completely remodeled," said Roland. They did away with all the clothing and other items for sale, cleared out the back, put up a wall between the kitchen and dining room, and generally cleaned up. They also replaced the carpeting.

The transformation is so dramatic that Wiley said, "Old customers came in after we opened and they thought they were in the wrong place."

Having been a building contractor for 15 years, Wiley has plenty of experience in transforming a space.

Wiley said he has been in and out of Ruidoso since the 1950s, and he went into the restaurant business for stability. Some people would hardly call owning a restaurant in Ruidoso stable, but the Munseys and the Karns know their customers and are building a

strong local following who will see them through the slow times.

Like all successful restaurateurs, they treat their customers like family.

"We cater to the locals," said Wiley. Community minded, the owners are in the process of negotiating contracts with Meals on Wheels and the fire fighters to provide low-cost meals.

Proposal to utility commission includes electric rate changes

An Integrated Resource Plan Rule (IRP) has been proposed by the New Mexico Public Utility Commission in regulating electric utilities. Everyone in the State of New Mexico who pays an electric bill will be affected by the IRP rule, regardless of the electricity provider.

According to a news release, the IRP rule was written in response to the Clean Air Act of 1990 by a working group of representatives. These included ratepayer, community and environmental organizations, as well as the New Mexico Public Utility Commission staff, public utilities and the New Mexico Attorney General.

A local man, Robert K. Rowe of Alto, was a member of the 60-person working group. The members of the group met regularly for more than a year in either Santa Fe or Albuquerque to write the proposed IRP rule.

The proposed rule is the result of a great deal of time and work by the members of three groups involved in the IRP process in New

Mexico—Electric Resources Working Group, Cost-Benefit Analysis Working Group and Incentives Working Group.

Rowe was a member of the Electric Resources Working Group.

Unlike most Notices of Proposed Rulemaking, the proposed IRP has not been rewritten or edited in any way by the Public Utility Commission.

On the contrary, because of the extensive amount of work done by the Working Group, the PUC seeks comments on the Working Group product exactly as it was presented.

The proposed IRP rule establishes the regulatory framework under which electric utilities in New Mexico would prepare and file their Integrated Resource Plan. The Rule sets out various criteria and procedures to be followed in the development of an electric utility's Integrated Resource Plan.

As quoted from the proposed IRP rule, "the process is intended to benefit the people and the State of New Mexico in meeting electric-energy service needs, by recognizing the need to preserve reliable

electric service, maintain reasonable electricity prices, manage risks, increase efficient use of resources and promote environmental quality."

Topics included in the proposed IRP Rule for electric utilities are Definitions, Filing Requirements, Electric Energy and Demand Forecasts, Assessment of Resources, Development of IRP, Public Participation, Filing Procedures and PUC Review, Demand Side Management and Incentives and Waivers.

The New Mexico Public Utility Commission invites and will accept written comments on the proposed IRP rule until 5 p.m. March 28.

Village seeks proposals on water plant

Village manager Gary Jackson will ask the board Tuesday for authorization to solicit proposals for engineering services for the Grindstone Water Treatment Plant project.

In a memo to the council in preparation for the first meeting with the newly elected board, Jackson wrote that in order to have a water treatment plant in operation by the summer of 1995, it was necessary to take immediate steps.

The council received \$570,000 from the legislature this year to push the project forward.

In a new direction toward promoting parks and recreation for the tourist village, Jackson has initiated use of \$110,000 committed, but not used, to parks.

In several campaign speeches, Mayor Jerry Shaw has emphasized the need to spend more money for parks and recreation. She has said a substantial amount of money had been budgeted for the village in parks and recreation in the past, but little has found its way into actual improvements.

Some of these projects Jackson will recommend include:

- \$12,000 - Grindstone Dam: Recreational Area (Wingfield Park) Clear pond and stream for landscaping, remove storage shed

behind office and brace fencing along property lines of pond for safety of citizens.

\$9,000 - Two Rivers Park: Replace walking bridge and erosion control.

\$34,000 - Wingfield Park: Hook up to city water and natural gas, remodel garage to use as activity space, purchase playground set, picnic tables, barbecue grills and portable volleyball and basketball goals.

\$15,000 - School House Park: Complete trail head and fitness trail (includes planning and engineering fees).

\$25,000 - Wingfield Park: Pave road and parking lot at Parks and Recreation office.

\$15,000 - Purchase 40 by 40 storage facility to store tools, equipment, mowers, etc.

Two public hearings will start the council agenda. They are:

—a zone map amendment requested by Jenna and Gary Sims for a change from C-2 commercial to R-1 residential for Lot 10A, Block 7, of Buckner Resubdivision.

The Sims asked for rezoning to single-family residential, corresponding with the adjoining properties, because they are having difficulty with mortgage financing under the commercial zoning.

There has been no objections from surrounding property owners.

Ordinance 94-4, amending the municipal code concerning boards and commissions eliminates the section that reads: "Not less than two members of the Parks and Recreation Commission shall be 55 or more years of age."

The change would not prevent anyone 55 years or older from being on the board, but would eliminate the mandatory requirement.

Under regular items, the council will:

- schedule a public hearing on Zone Text Amendments to the Ruidoso Municipal Code. Amendments would regard changes for Conditional Use, Development Standards (parking), Flood Hazard Regulations and Subdivision Regulations.

As an example, one of the changes under parking will recommend deleting "suitable to control dust and drainage," and replace it with "shall be paved with asphalt, concrete or other surface of a permanent dustfree nature," which will be determined by planning and zoning.

—schedule a workshop to discuss public parking and restrooms in the MainStreet redevelopment area.

—consider authorizing management to approve change orders on the interior cleaning and repainting of the 5-million gallon steel reser-

voir project.

—consider establishment of a policy for the development of the industrial park at Sierra Blanca Regional Airport.

—consider re-bidding computerized circulation/file server for the Ruidoso Library.

—use park improvement funds

—schedule workshops for the fiscal 1994-95 budget.

—bid award to resurface two tennis courts.

—board and commission appointments

—Franklin Aviation request to extend lease agreement.

Consent regular items that will be approved collectively are:

—adoption of Resolution 94-8 approving the MainStreet Supplemental Agreement for additional funding from the New Mexico State Highway and Transportation Department.

—approval of a special dispensers permit for the Southwest Section of AAPG (Geological Convention) at the Ruidoso Convention Civic Events Center, using Win, Place and Show dispensers license.

The council will hear a MainStreet Redevelopment Update before entering a closed to the public session to discuss pending litigation and the purchase of real property.

Lubke holds a bachelor of arts degree from Angelo State University in San Angelo, Texas. She has taught many workshops and classes throughout the Southwest.

Since 1982, her work has been included in many juried exhibitions in the United States, and she has won many awards.

Lubke is an active member of several art organizations, including the San Antonio Watercolor Group, the Southwestern Watercolor Society and West Texas Watercolor Society.

Dorothy Scheldknecht
While watercolorists are honing their skills, Dorothy Scheldknecht will be working with students who work in oil, that same week, June 6-10. Tuition for the oil workshop is \$325.

Scheldknecht's workshops are directed to the beginning and intermediate students who have some experience in oil painting but limited painting outdoor experience.

Each morning a new problem is demonstrated and discussed and the afternoon session is devoted to the student working on their own painting with the information from the morning session. Individual attention is given and each student progresses at their own speed.

On the first morning, Scheldknecht said she'll demonstrate how to begin a painting with a simple block — in using line and mass. That afternoon she'll lead discussions on the morning's hands-on session.

The second day the veteran teacher's demonstration and les-

son will continue with a study of the light patterns with emphasis on subject and color.

The third morning Scheldknecht will lead her students in developing a more complete painting using the previous lessons, and on the fourth day the students will work in the morning and afternoon light with individual help.

Scheldknecht winds up the week with a demonstration, discussions and help for students' individual paintings.

Painting should be fun, and what could be more fun than painting in the clean, clear air at Carrizo Lodge, says Scheldknecht, who stresses the joy of working with oils in the outdoors.

Carole Myers
This trio of art class opportunities offered June 6 through 10, is rounded out with Carole Myers' mixed media and collage seminar. Tuition is \$300.

Myers helps students develop their individual creativity and find new approaches to creating in her mixed media and collage workshop.

"We will explore the use of a different paper each day and discover how to choose various techniques to achieve a unique way of expression," says Myers.

An assortment of collage materials will be integrated into the demonstrations. The use of values, textures, form and line will be explored. Study of color will include basic palettes, color relationships, mixing of colors, the use of transparent and opaque colors.

A demonstration emphasizing strong design and individual concept will begin each session, lasting approximately one hour. Individual assistance will be given to each participant.

The demonstration painting will be refined with attention given to solving problems, adjusting values and such, with the remaining time given for individual assistance and critiques.

A slide program of Myers' collection of other artists' work and/or slides of her work may be shown during class time.

These three artists will be teaching the same week that Dan Burt, Kim English and Steve Grey present workshops at the busy Carrizo Lodge Art School.

Then there is an old saying handed down to us that if March comes in like a lamb, it will go out like a lion.


Today in midmorning the vale is quiet and still with the hillsides looking like a vast painting by Mother Nature, the master artist.

Warrior track team workouts under way

The 1994 version of the RHS Track team is in full swing as the squad got its final injection of players from the basketball and track programs last week.

More than 70 participants are out for track this season for the boys and girls teams.

The Warriors have a good mix of talent with an exceptional group of underclassmen in the ranks. While those youngsters are good athletes, they are still in the learning ranks as far as track and field events go.

The Warriors appear to head into the season without anyone with blazing sprint speed, but the team should be solid in most of the relay events.

The field events that look strong for the Warriors are long-jump, shot-put and discus. The javelin, high-jump and pole-vault are areas that need some more experience.

The picture for the Lady Warriors looks similar to the boys — that is adequate speed for relays but not sprints.

The team had a practice meet in Lubbock, Texas, in February where most of the kids that had been in the off-season program partici-

According to head track coach Ronny Maskew, the Warriors were impressive.

"That was the week before most Texas schools started their outdoor season, so they should have been farther along than we were and we did very well against them with just 18 kids," said Maskew.

The Warriors head to Texas' largest track meet, the West Texas Relays, Friday and Saturday. This year's renewal of the Relays will mark the golden anniversary of the Meet, and several out of the ordinary things are scheduled to celebrate its longevity.

"We have some people that are ready for some competition, and we need to go over there and see where we stand and find out what we need to work on," said Maskew.

After the West Texas Relays, the

coaching staff will have the Spring Break to iron out the kinks, perhaps moving some kids around to strengthen the team.

The Warriors get a quick test as two track meets are scheduled for the week after spring break — Tularosa and Oñate.

The Warriors head into the year with some proven performers that should have a good year.

Stephanie Haas has been very strong in the mile and two-mile runs and could be a force by the time District rolls around.

Sarah Dix, one of the top athletes in the District, is looking for a good year in the hurdles and will be force on the Lady Warriors relay teams.

Jody Randle is the two-time defending district champion in the high-jump and is back, as strong as ever as well adding the relay and 800 to her repertoire.

Kristie Ryan has been a stellar performer in years past in relays and will try some open events this year.

On the boys side, always dependable Anthony Torres returns for a fourth year and will again be a force on the relay team.

And because of some new-found depth on the team, Maskew will

Inside The Outdoors

A pig by any other name is still a pig...

Jabali, a Spanish word, means wild boar. An old Spanish dictionary (1780-83) refers to "Jabalina" as a female wild boar. Some researchers speculate this is where the word javelina may have first originated. Regardless of the word's origin, javelina are an interesting animal.


Javelina also known as collared peccary, have a whitish collar. The collar on adults, approximately three quarters of an inch wide, begins about nine inches behind the base of the brisket. Although young are born reddish in color, adults appear salt-pepper gray, and the hair is coarse.

They are found in greater abundance south of the border. However, populations also exist in Arizona, New Mexico and Texas. New Mexico javelina are found in the greatest abundance in the "boothill" country. Experts believe that javelina have expanded their range. Scattered herds can be seen in Catron, Dona Ana, Sierra, and Socorro Counties.

Javelina occupy a variety of habitats. In the southwest, they are most abundant in the desert. Herds can also be found in chaparral, oak-woodlands, and even fringes of pine forests.

Breeding occurs throughout the year. The peak breeding season appears to be in the winter and spring time. Females may have several litters, and no definite male-female bonds exist. Yet dominant males have greater success in mating due to their aggressive nature.

Gestation averages 145 days and births occur any month of the year. Newborns weigh about one pound at birth and at 12 months of

age average 30-40 pounds.

Javelina have poor eye sight; but their hearing and sense of smell are keen. A person can walk, cautiously, into a feeding herd of javelina unseen. However, if a person kicks a rock, snaps a twig or has the wind to his back upon approach, the herd may take flight at a distance of 100 yards or greater.

They are primarily herbivores (vegetarians), but javelina will occasionally eat insects and animal matter. Succulent plants, especially cacti, comprise a lot of their diet. Most researchers agree that prickly pear cactus are the main staple food for peccaries when other forage plants are not available. Cholla and hedgehog cactus are also readily consumed. It seems that most plants are foraged when available. The animals usually leave saucer-shaped excavations where tubers or bulbs are rooted out. Javelina also eat acorns, manzanita berries, pine nuts and grasses when in season. Mesquite beans, catclaw and juniper are frequently consumed.

In New Mexico javelina received protected status in February 1937. Legal hunting was

not allowed until 1968, giving the animal big game status. Only 100 licenses were issued for the first hunt. Since then yearly license numbers have varied from several hundred to thousands.

It is too late to obtain a javelina license this season. Anyone interested in pursuing a javelina in the February 1995 season should fill out a special hunt application next year prior to the May deadline.

Anyone can go afield and watch javelina even if they are not hunting them. I consider peccaries to be a great "watchable wildlife" species. Although most people of nongame animals as such; the javelina provides ample opportunities for someone interested in observing them in the wild.

Here's how experts find and observe javelina in the wild. First go to javelina country. Next, try to locate fresh peccary sign. Javelina have split hooves similar to deer, yet tracks are much smaller and round in shape. They often leave tall tale signs of small excavations where they have rooted for plants. Now that sign is located, find an elevated observation point. A hilltop that provides a panoramic view of the country works well. Using binoculars, scrutinize all possible areas. Experts note that people often overlook javelina because they readily blend into their surroundings. Once javelina are located, look for others because herds are often strung out over an area.

Using persistence and common sense a person can have a rewarding time. You might even learn a thing or two about the unique critter known in times past as "Jabali".

Skiing changed youngster's life

Hillary McKenna is a dark-haired rascal who loves to ski. Every Thursday she and her special education classmates from Capitan Elementary School enjoy a day of fun with the Ski Apache Handicapped Skiers Association (SAHSA).

But it's more than fun. Skiing with SAHSA has dramatically improved Hillary's young life.

"There's no comparison. The difference is amazing. She's a different child," proclaims her proud adoptive mother Paula McKenna. She credits many of Hillary's physical and mental changes to skiing with SAHSA.

A rough start

Twelve-year-old Hillary's life did not begin well. Her birth parents beat the little baby severely, resulting in a permanent traumatic brain injury when Hillary was only six months old.

Things looked up, however, when Paula adopted the brown-eyed charmer when Hillary was two years old.

Because of her child abuse injuries, Hillary has grown up with diminished function on her right side and is legally blind in both eyes. This means, says Paula, that Hillary's right arm, leg and eye are weaker than her left ones, and although she sees acutely in her left eye, her field of vision remains narrow. She speaks with difficulty and resists change, actions typical of those with brain injury, says Paula.

That was then, this is now

Paula and Hillary, along with Hillary's godmother Mary Jo Stedry, relocated to Capitan almost

two years ago, a move that would prove fortunate for both mother and daughter.

"When I enrolled Hillary in school, the special ed teacher told me about the ski program," remembers Paula. "It sounded good for Hillary so I said yes. Then the teacher asked, 'By the way, do you ski?' and recruited me as a volunteer."

So last ski season, mother and daughter began spending a day a week with SAHSA. Hillary as a student, Paula as a "ski buddy" to novices — unaware of the bright changes in store for both.

"After only a few weeks of skiing, I saw dramatic changes in Hillary. She found a sense of freedom and her self-confidence soared," recalls a proud Paula.

"In the past, she's always had a family member to help her, but now she does many things for herself. Simple things like picking out her own clothes to wear to school. Before, I used to lay them out for her, but now she does for herself."

"And she talks more. Where before she'd just point, now she tries to express herself. Skiing boosted her self-confidence."

Skiing improved Hillary physically also, giving her strength, mobility and agility.

"She's taking PE for the first time this year!" Paula says happily.

And, more importantly for a pre-teen, Hillary's found common ground with her mainstream classmates — she skis too.

Progress continues

Ask Hillary if she likes to ski and she enthusiastically answers, "Yes!" Her favorite part? "Lisa!"

Lisa Maue, SAHSA's new executive director, remains Hillary's instructor, role model and ski mate. She, too, recalls her student's prog-

ress. "Last year, Hillary started skiing in a walker for support and in skis with a ski bra (a device to keep skis from crossing). I skied behind her holding onto the walker to steer and stop. After she became more stable, she skied alone and I skied farther back using a tether line attached to the walker."

"Hillary loved it! She was having so much fun, she'd forget to hold on to the walker and would wave to everybody!"

By the end of her first season, Hillary's balance had improved to the point where she could stand in her walker and ski and glide down Sierra Blanca Trail, a 2.7-mile trail from the top of the mountain.

Lisa continues, "This year, Hillary's out of the walker and skis alone, without a tether. She still uses the ski bra to keep her tips from crossing. She stands well, uses both feet and does a wedge turn really well."

Being forced to work both legs became important, explains Paula, because Hillary favors her stronger left side.

Fun with a purpose

Obviously, Hillary derives more from her skiing than just fun. It's a valuable therapy for both body and mind. And it wouldn't happen if SAHSA didn't exist.

Every year for the past eighteen years, SAHSA has performed literally hundreds of miracles such as Hillary's. This week SAHSA activities take center stage in the community in two days of fund raisers and fun.

Tomorrow night's fund raiser, a silent auction, offers a wide variety of goods and services at the Ruidoso Civic Center beginning at 6 p.m. At the conclusion of the auction at 9 p.m. a lucky someone will win the



grand prize, a season pass to Ski Apache for next year.

Fun continues Wednesday morning at the annual Businessperson's Handicapped Ski Championships at Ski Apache. Here, local businesspeople team with SAHSA students to raise money.

One of those student racers will be Hillary McKenna in her purple ski pants and pink jacket.



Altrusa presents health update

The Altrusa Club gathered at the Museum of the Horse Thursday evening to hear a panel of health care professionals give updates on the health care provisions and needs of the community.

Dr. Arlene Brown led off the presentations by talking briefly about what to look for in upcoming national health care proposals. She listed four priorities: 1) universal access, 2) affordable, comprehensive benefits with an emphasis on prevention, 3) choice of physicians, and 4) cost controls.

Katherine Cooper of the Ruidoso Counseling Center gave an overview of the myriad services she and her staff provide.

"Our center is like a microcosm of all the services in Otero County," she said. The center treats the seriously mentally ill, victims of sexual assault, and alcohol/drug abusers, in addition to providing crisis intervention for the entire

area and counseling to help people adjust to life changes.

Doris Roth of Home Health Services (HHS) explained how a person could receive free in-home care and what the benefits are. HHS volunteers can assist people in their homes with post-operative recovery, therapeutic blood drawing, wound care, ostomy care, hospice care — just to name a few.

Theresa Luna of the Public Health office reported on her activities immunizing children and setting up a breast and cervical examination clinic for women. The clinic is designed for women who have no insurance or who have neglected to keep up with their regular exams.

Though not technically a health professional, Jim Miller, director of Eastern New Mexico University-Ruidoso Instructional Center, was on the panel as a representative of the Maternal Health Council. He

spoke of New Mexico's shocking lack of prenatal care and the high rate of teenage pregnancies.

Maternal health councils across the state receive funds for research and projects. Lincoln County's council was among the last to be organized.

Finally Ruidoso public school nurse Terry Gillespie talked about children's health matters. She spoke of the enormous scope of her work. As the sole nurse for about 2,200 students, Gillespie deals with everything from routine cut knees and sports physicals to prenatal care and emotional counseling.

Each of these programs plays an important role in community health, and each faces its own challenges.

The Ruidoso News will present the details of each panelist's community health update in an upcoming series.

Hondo staff builds teamwork

Staff members of the Hondo Valley Public Schools participated in a team building workshop Friday at Bonita Park Nazarene Campgrounds. Park directors offer the workshops as a community service, free of charge.

Gilbert Candelaria, superintendent of Hondo Valley Public Schools, gathered 26 members of his staff to participate in exercises that build harmony and cohesiveness in the team. His goal was to encourage teamwork among staff members, students and the community.

Led by the park's recreational directors Walter and Cathy Durfey, participants had a powerful experience in the importance of trust and communication. Small groups of participants were blindfolded and instructed by their sighted leader to make their way through rocky terrain to the outdoor obstacle course.

Communication was a key element in the "trust" walk and other activities. At the obstacle course, one of the partners was "blind" and depended upon the other for instructions to cross a series of logs above the ground. Walter and Cathy processed the reactions and feelings of the group after each event.

After lunch, Walter and Cathy demonstrated rock climbing on belay. Three teams of four people were selected and the climbers were dressed in harnesses, helmets and carabiners. The role of the other team members was to assist the "blind" anchor holding the rope

and to direct the climbers as needed.

"This was an exercise in stretching yourself," said Cathy Durfey. Participants were asked to imagine how students feel when they try something new and challenging. The role of encourager was especially important.

"Students need to be supported and guided in learning and taking on new challenges, as you did today," said Durfey.

Sneaky tactics are wrong

It takes a lot of courage to stand up for your beliefs, especially when those heartfelt beliefs could clash with friends, colleagues or the "powers that be."

Two pieces of paper came across the editor's desk last week — both purporting to be someone's personal beliefs and both unsigned. The people who drafted and circulated these two papers may hold passionate beliefs, but it would be foolhardy for anyone to adopt the ideas when the writers weren't brave enough to sign their names.

One of these two secretly drafted flyers is purported to be a "letter to the editor" regarding the Ruidoso schools, and the other is a flyer that reportedly first showed up at the fair board meeting in Capitan. Nobody has taken credit for drafting either of these unsigned documents — one recommending that a man be fired and the other that the county be shortchanged in its efforts to gain state funds.

The "letter to the editor" on the schools is particularly suspect in that it contains one statement that this newspaper knows for a fact to be totally untrue: "Letter to the editor of The Ruidoso News February 14, 1994," states the letter. "A letter you won't see in the paper because of political pull of the administration," continues the letter. The writers DID NOT mail or deliver their letter to the editor of The News, but an interested parent was given the letter by a teacher and that person brought the letter to The News. By that time the unsigned "letter" had been circulated for a couple of weeks at the high school and the mid-school.

It's shameful to make such untrue statements, and that false claim makes the body of the letter suspect, too. One claim in particular — that the district is operating in "serious financial red ink" — is absolutely untrue. The writer states truthfully that operating in the red would be illegal. It's been reported that the school district actually is fighting budget woes caused by sluggish growth, but it does not have a deficit.

In the other flyer, another group not bold enough to take credit for their writings, is asking the governor NOT to give Lincoln County about \$300,000 in funds approved to purchase and operate the Super Select Safe Barn. This group may have a point, but its members don't have the courage of their convictions. "It looks like Lincoln County will be saddled with the Glencoe Sales Barn, whether we want it or not," begins the flyer. This flyer seems bent on starting a war between the various villages in this county, and the writer is too shortsighted to see any possible value in a facility ideal for the Lincoln County Cowboy Symposium, horse shows and sales and perhaps even the Cowgirl Hall of Fame Museum.

The issues in those two secret papers are subjects for open debate, not surreptitious underground campaigns. It's easy to attack someone, something or an idea when that assault is cloaked in secrecy, but it takes a brave person to stand up and be counted on any controversial issue.
