## MainStreet sets annual meeting

Renewed interest in MainStreet helped postpone the annual meeting until April 7, according to that organization's president Tom Battin.

Battin, speaking to about 15 merchants at the Friday coffee, said four positions were coming up, and because of the renewed interest, candidate nominations for the board will be taken for the board that night at Cree Meadows Country Club.

"We want lots of participation," he said.  
D&S Construction superinten-

dent Bob Tackett talked about working two blocks at a time to save time. He said he would discuss the matter with village deputy manager Alan Briley.

Merchants were concerned about the speed of work approaching April and May when the horse owners start coming back to town.

Tackett said he couldn't break down for every holiday or event that comes to the village.

Bob Smith, owner of The Habitat, asked when the crew was going to return to his area to widen the sidewalks and how they were

going to widen the sidewalks. He also asked what was going to happen to the ash tray, referring to the dirt island where trees were to have been planted in front of his shop.

Tackett said that the island would be narrowed by the expanded sidewalk, but bushes could still be planted.

"Get a waiver," Smith told Tackett. "The government tumbled on waivers."

Merchants discussed liability and insurance for themselves and MainStreet for the rest of the meeting.

## Midtown merchants group adopts Riverwalk project

On June 8, 1993, MainStreet director Don Miller entered into a closed to the public session with the village council to discuss the River Trail right of way, now being called the Riverwalk.

In that meeting, it was discussed that Miller work on right of way acquisition for Riverwalk and the village pay MainStreet for Miller's time. MainStreet was operating in the red at this time and could use the money.

Miller, himself, had received a \$12,000 a year raise with the new budget, giving him about \$29,000 per year as a full-time director.

In addition, MainStreet received extra money from the village for Miller's work on the right of way.

MainStreet is a private corporation that has depended on the bulk of its money from memberships and about 80 percent coming from the village council.

On July 19, Miller unveiled plans for the Riverwalk that showed an artist rendering of walks, lighting, park benches, umbrellas and landscaping, not the gravel path first envisioned.

The make up of the council had changed. Jerry Shaw, Joe Gomez and Frank Potter replaced Victor Alonso and Ron Andrews. The MainStreet board also had undergone changes.

Miller's plan included using public art, such as sculptures, to depict

Lincoln County's heritage.

Miller said the Riverwalk would be fully handicapped accessible and will be a minimum of six feet in width or wider.

He said with public art, federal and state money would be available. For construction costs, grants will be available to the group.

"It's too early to estimate the costs, but there are many sources of funding out there," Miller said. After all, Mary Maul had done it.

During a closed to the public session, the MainStreet Board approved to take up a 120-day option on the Wilson property for the project. This was during a time when MainStreet was operating in the red and without any fund raising other than membership and the village, the big provider.

The property, located on Eagle Drive and River Road, was to be used to set up additional parking, public restrooms, and an overall entrance to the Riverwalk.

Miller's timetable for the project would have the design complete by the first of the year, funding requests by March 1, and construction to start by July of 1994.

"We are committed to the MainStreet streetscape program and we would not let the Riverwalk get in the way of that," said MainStreet board president Tom Battin.

In other business during that meeting, Councilor Frank Potter and chamber director Joan Bailey were added as new board members.

On Thursday, August 19, the

MainStreet board approved an audit by Ronnie Hemphill and a reforecast of the 1993-94 budget.

Miller said he revised the budget in different areas because funds were not spent on projects, funds shifted to different months based on rescheduling of events, accounts were deleted and funds were corrected based on new projections.

Miller told the board that streetscape would have to be put on hold temporarily. He said the bids came in too high, and since state and federal money was used, alternative bids couldn't be used without going back and changing plans.

The new construction start date was for mid to late September.

The board discussed talking to Bohannon-Huston about phase two plans. Miller said he felt the engineering firm had dropped the ball by over designing.

Potter said the firm had a lot of lobbying power.

Director Don Dutton suggested Miller talk to Bohannon-Huston to see if they were interested in pursuing Phase Two. He said they were probably aware that they had over designed the project.

In other business, Miller said streetscape qualified for the "Art in Public Places" program.

The board gave Miller approval to contract for the market surveys sent to a selected number of visitors, businesses and residents. Valerie Iverson was chosen to do the work for \$800.

## Hospital finances healthy

The Lincoln County Medical Center broke even this month, despite the slow ski season.

Activity was down, but the hospital is ahead of this time last year by \$7,000, according to hospital administrator Valerie Miller.

"This season two years ago would have put us in some difficulty," said Miller. "Cultivating and meeting the needs of residents is what is saving our souls now."

EMS also is doing well, and board president Dub Williams pointed out that in 1984 EMS requested \$183,000 in subsidies and last year needed only \$43,000.

"They were down \$21,000 last year from the previous year," said Williams. "They've come a long way."

Miller said the hospital has been very careful this month with money.

"Everybody's tightened their belts," she said. "We postponed some expenses we don't need to incur right now."

The LCMC Auxiliary reported that six volunteers attended the New Mexico Hospital and Health Services Auxiliary Mid-Year meeting in Las Cruces.

Al Guzeika gave a presentation on newsletters. Guzeika and Nellie Ruth Jones serve on the state board. Nell Trout received third place for the Honorable Volunteer Award.

The auxiliary also reported that the OB ward has received new

ler, a full-time employee of MainStreet, also was being paid as a marketing consultant for the Roswell Mall Reporter Chuck Stallings asked Miller if that mall contract constituted a conflict of interest. The concept of MainStreet is to revitalize areas drained by malls.

Battin again answered for Miller.

"When we interviewed Don, we knew he had a part-time consulting activity," Battin said. "I know he has done much of that on time that doesn't interfere with MainStreet."

Miller's interviews were closed to the public, as were other interviews. Alden Deyo, who was president when Miller was hired, refused to release the names of any of the 35 persons who applied.

In addition to The News article, editor Frankie Jarrell wrote an editorial that stated MainStreet must regain its focus.

Jarrell said MainStreet should remember its roots and get back on course.

In regard to spending money for land, Jarrell wrote, "the village council needs to declare a moratorium on spending any public money on land, land lease, options or right of way acquisition for a river walk until the streetscape and paving project, complete with enhancements, is completed."

"MainStreet needs to be grounded until it grows up a little and gets back to its focus," she wrote.

## Neighbors agree on sewer costs

The Regional Wastewater Treatment Plant Joint Use Board met Friday to re-evaluate the proportionate billing to the villages of Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs.

The board determined that there is no accurate way to measure each village's use of the plant because 1) backflow in the wastewater lines makes the influent meter readings inaccurate, and 2) an estimated 500,000 to 800,000 gallons of water infiltrates Ruidoso pipes daily.

Molzen-Corbin, the engineering firm hired to plan renovations to the plant, conducted a study of the distribution of wastewater flows. They estimated that when Ruidoso

repairs its pipes, the wastewater distribution would be 88.8 percent for Ruidoso and 11.2 percent for Ruidoso Downs.

Until these repairs can be made, however, the engineers' best guess at distribution came to 92.2 percent for Ruidoso and 7.8 percent for Ruidoso Downs.

Before accepting these figures, the board reviewed several possible ways to determine each village's share of plant costs. Downs Mayor Joe Hayhurst was in favor of percentages based on number of customers, which would have set Ruidoso's share at 94 percent and the Downs share at six percent.

However, village manager Gary Jackson said this formula was no more accurate than any other and really did not reflect actual wastewater production. Hayhurst was concerned that Ruidoso Downs was paying more than its share of the plant operating costs.

After lengthy discussion, including input from each village's attorney, the board voted to use the 92.2 to 7.8 ratio, making it retroactive to June and in effect for only one year at a time.

The ratio change raises Ruidoso user fees by \$16,496 and lowers Ruidoso Downs user fees by \$16,504.

## Skeen restates opposition to MRS in congressional oversight hearing

Congressman Joe Skeen (R-NM) urged his colleagues in Congress to amend the Monitored Retrievable Storage (MRS) program by requiring the consent of affected state governments and surrounding communities before the project is scheduled to proceed.

Skeen testified before a joint subcommittee hearing of the Oversight and Investigations Panels of the House Energy Commerce Committee and the House Natural Resources Committee last week.

The hearing, which came on the heels of a meeting in Mescalero which included nuclear power company officials, was co-chaired by Congressman George Miller (D-CA) and Congressman Richard Lehman (D-CA).

Mescalero officials have signed an agreement with Northern States Power to study and develop a private MRS, an above-ground storage facility to receive and temporarily store spent nuclear fuel for ultimate disposal in a permanent geologic repository.

Even though the plans have changed from public to private, any

MRS will be subject to licensing by the Nuclear Regulatory Commission and to applicable Federal and State environmental, safety and health regulations. The location of the MRS must be approved by Congress.

One of the major issues during the hearing was the issue of whether a sovereign Indian nation could unilaterally accept an MRS even though the state in which it resides, and surrounding communities, object and are steadfastly opposed.

Congress acted responsibly when it prohibited the Department of Energy from allocating funds in the 1994 fiscal year to applicants when it became clear that these tribes were not receiving support from state and local officials," said Skeen.

"This was clearly the case with the Mescalero's application. The Nuclear Waste Policy Act - which created this program - infers that neither the Mescalero tribe nor any applicant would be allowed to construct an MRS if they did not receive some form of consensus with state and local officials."

Skeen added, "Sovereignty is extremely important to Native Americans, and the federal government should continue to respect it, but not at the exclusive of state responsibilities. Clearly, communities surrounding an Indian nation would be affected by the operation of an interim storage site for high-level nuclear waste."

Skeen reaffirmed that the New Mexico Congressional Delegation, the New Mexico State government, and surrounding officials are still very much opposed to constructing an MRS on the Mescalero Reservation.

Skeen, whose 2nd Congressional District encompasses the designated MRS site on the Mescalero Indian Reservation in Otero County, stated earlier, "I have not been assured that this project will protect the health and safety of the public and the quality of our natural environment. I have not been assured that they can adequately train the needed personnel to provide emergency response, and I have not been assured that the waste will be retrieved."

## Welding torch sets off fire

Once again, sparks from a welding torch caused a fire in Alto.

Saturday afternoon, Bonito Fire Department (BFD) responded to a grass fire in a vacant lot adjacent to the Twisted Cedar Ranch on Old Fort Stanton Road.

Firefighters found approximately three acres of dry grass in flames fanned by wind gusts. Fortunately, roads surrounding three sides of the vacant lot created a firebreak that helped confine the blaze until the firefighters could contain the

other side.

Within minutes, firefighters had restricted the blaze before wind gusts that were estimated at 25 to 30 miles per hour could blow the fire across the roads and toward residences.

Firefighters then spent an hour and a half watering down burning trees, stumps and underbrush that continued to burn in the wind.

Carl Bartley of the Twisted Cedar Ranch said he had been welding a pipe fence when winds blew a spark into the vacant lot, causing the blaze.

At no time was Bartley's residence threatened due to the

direction of the winds.

The vacant lot may be owned by United New Mexico Bank, said Bartley, a bank official.

Saturday's fire represents the second such fire BFD has responded to in two months.

On January 18, sparks from a welding torch - not Bartley's - ignited dry grass in a vacant lot across from Twisted Cedar. That day also, high winds fanned flames, compounding firefighters' problems.

Firefighters strongly urge those who work outdoors with open flames or spark-producing tools to exercise caution during windy, dry conditions and to have a fire extinguisher handy.

# Under all that fluff beat four hearts of gold

Four fluffy balls with legs attached arrived at the Lincoln County Humane Society last week. Recently weaned from their Schnauzer-maltese mother, the adorable puppies have wiry curly hair. Two were adopted immediately, but two still are available. Bijou, a white female with light gray dots, and Beau, a male with fudge brown and gray coloring, were given an outing Saturday at Wal-Mart, to show shoppers the sweet dogs waiting for adoption at the shelter.

A volunteer team also handed out educational literature about the need for neutering of pets, how to handle behavioral problems and cautions against leaving dogs in cars while shopping or carrying them in the back of a pickup truck. (Someone recently dropped into the dumpster near the shelter the body of a dog that appeared to have suffered fatal injuries as a result of falling out of a pickup). The owners of Bijou's and Beau's mother agreed to spay her immediately before another unexpected litter arrives. They brought her to the shelter to show how cute the pup-

pies probably will be in a few months. A brother and sister Bernese mountain dog puppy duo also were released by their owner. "Chief is larger than his sister, Caramel," said shelter manager Esther Harper. "They're about 2 1/2 months old. The person who brought them didn't seem to have much background on them. They're both good-natured, but a little scared, because they've only been here a few days. Right now, they're lovable, huggable fluffy pups, but Chief probably will be big and will need lots of

room and exercise." All dogs and cats adopted from the shelter must be spayed or neutered by state law, Ruidoso village law and by terms contained in the legally-binding contract adopting owners sign. Failure to comply can result in a stiff fine. The law is aimed at reducing the number of unwanted dogs and cats born each year, only to end up being destroyed or being abused by negligent owners. A volunteer team checks on each adoption to make sure everything is going well. If a certificate verifying that the animal has been neutered is not sent back by a veterinarian within a month or two from the due date, additional telephone contact or letters will be sent. As a final resort, the village's impounding officer or a law enforcement officer in areas outside the village will contact the owner and cite them for failure to comply with the state law. A good way to avoid worrying about altering a pet is to adopt one already neutered. Five male cats are available for adoption in the cattery next to the mail shelter. Take your pick of color combinations, they're all loving and ready to go.

Vega found himself in the title business after 19 years with the railroad. He learned the business from the ground up.

"I got into it when the city was first growing," he said. "Things have really boomed in the last two and a half years."

Title and abstract companies live and die with the real estate market and the state of the economy in general.

"If the economy goes bad and building and sales stop, we're out of business," said Griffin. "But in this town nobody prognosticates or even puts into the formula a downturn. We expect to grow with Ruidoso."

Mike Seelbach heads up the closings department, where all the final details are agreed upon and the money changes hands.

"It's neat to see a deal start from scratch and to put it together," he said. "It all stops here."

According to Seelbach, his job has become much more complicated in the past few years with all the lenders' regulations, changes in laws, insurance and savings and

loans. A Ruidoso native, Seelbach's experience began in 1979 with Guaranty Title. Then he co-founded White Mountain Title and Abstract, which was sold to Territorial Abstract, which was sold to The Title Company. Seelbach stayed with his company throughout its incarnations.

He saw the partnership with Vega and Griffin as an opportunity for independence, as did they.

Experience is what makes the team powerful. Not only do Vega and Seelbach have 38 years of combined experience, but the company is staffed by people who really know their escrow.

Corinne Gonzales, the bilingual component of the team, and Jo Ann Barnett are the escrow officers. Gonzales started her career in 1986, Barnett in 1975.

According to Griffin, banks all over the state and out of state have worked with Gonzales and Barnett to make loans for people from every part of the area.

"The work is challenging, be-

cause you have to close on time, make sure it all goes right for the buyer, the seller, the Realtor," Gonzales said.

"And you're responsible for all the money — lender's fees, surveyor's fees."


Barnett said that because Ruidoso is a tourist town, there is plenty of property always changing hands.

"Ours is a vital business to the real estate industry," she said.

GSV's team is completed by legal assistant Sarah Prothro, comptroller Nadine Askew and receptionist Kelly Ortiz.

While many people may think of the title and abstract business as so much impersonal paperwork, Griffin said that it's the people who make GSV successful.

"We have the expertise in closing. We know what to withhold tax-wise, what questions to ask," he said. "But people look for personal service, and people stick with their title person like they do the family doctor."


The third and fourth promises, with the appropriate scripture readings, are the promise of a blessed resurrection at Christ's coming, and a promise of future glory with our Lord.

# RHS golfers start state title defense

The Ruidoso High School golf teams began the 1994 season this morning (Monday) in the Eastwood Invitational Golf Tournament in El Paso.

Both boys and girls teams played at Santa Teresa Country Club. Tuesday's action switches to Compestre Country Club in Juarez for the boys, while the girls will play at Fort Bliss.

The Eastwood Invitational is the first of 11 regular-season events for the Warriors, and of course is the first time out-of-the-shoot for the Boys team, who captured last year's Class A-AAA State Championship.

Last year the Warriors finished third among the boys teams, with the boys easily defeating most of the AAAAA boys teams in the El Paso area.

In fact, only the then-defending State Champion Coronado T-Birds and AAAAA District Champion Hanks defeated the Warriors out of the 18 teams.

That tournament was a tip-off of things to come as the Warriors, who played the season with out a senior on the team, showed rapid improvement — winning their own Leroy Gooch Invitational and of course the State Tournament.

No other Warrior team had even placed at the State Tournament.

The Warriors will again be led by senior Jeff Chapman.

Chapman, who just was named an Honorable Mention All District player in basketball, hasn't played much golf over the winter, but warmed up with a 3-under par 68 at Alto Lakes Country Club last week.

That score featured a 5-under 80 on the front nine.

Chapman finished fifth overall at the State Tournament last year at Farmington, with putting problems separating him from the top trophy.

But since that time, the lanky senior has added considerable tournament experience to his resume as he represented New Mexico in the Big I Junior National and he also played in two elite AJGA events.

Chapman, who is being heavily recruited by the college ranks, is scheduled for another AJGA tournament at the Woodlands, near Houston, in two weeks.

The Warriors also have another player with college aspirations. Ryan Wall, another senior, has also been in contact with several college golf coaches and will likely be playing on a college team somewhere next year.

While his skills are not as honed as Chapman's, Wall did beat Jeffrey in a couple of tournaments last year and is by far the most competitive of the Warrior golfers.

Wall is very straight and has good distance off the tee, but his short game will need to improve if he is to answer the collegiate call.

A solid six handicapper, Wall won his age division in last year's NMMI District qualifier with an excellent 73, sending him to the Sun Country Junior Championship.

Matt Cantu, another senior, will most likely play the No. 3 position for the Warriors this year. Cantu's 76 nailed the coffin shut on the other district opponents last year at

Deming — giving the Warriors their second straight District Championship.

Although slight in size, Cantu has good distance, especially with his irons and is the short-game "king" for the Warriors. Like Chapman and Wall, Cantu will finish the season as a five-year letterman for the Ruidoso, and like his teammates, is one of the top high school golfers that RHS has ever produced.

Senior Jimmy Varnadore has also played in almost every varsity tournament during the past two seasons. Varnadore, a key player on the Warrior football team, is the only senior on the team that didn't participate fully in the team's summer and fall off-season programs.

So far, that hasn't been a problem. A three-year football and two-year basketball letterman, Varnadore has obviously learned a lot of mental toughness from the other sports.

It seems each year his teammates (and sometimes coaches) think someone will pass him in ability and each year those people are mistaken.

In fact, while his scores aren't as low as perhaps Chapman's and Wall's, Varnadore may be the most consistent of the Warrior players.

His rounds were key for the team in qualifying for state last year and he had a personal tournament-low 76 in El Paso to start the season.

Junior Eric Stephens should return as the fifth man on the team this year as he was the catalyst in last year's State Championship. His scores of 82-83 over Farmington's

monster Pinon Hills was good for 11th place at State, which of course is remarkable for a sophomore.

Stephens, without question, is the workhorse on the team. His winter has been full of trips to the range and to Alamogordo on the weekends when the weather was bad.

An extensive junior tournament schedule last summer, coupled with his performance at state last year should catapult Stephens into the season this year.

When this youngster learns that a bad shot is not the end of the world, watch out.

Sophomore Byron Soules has also put in a lot of range time since last year, although not much since the summer. One of the best athletes at the school, Soules was a top performer on the football team and showed great improvement over the basketball season.

But golf may be his love. He shot rounds in the seventies last summer while "working" at the Links as a cart boy, and if he returns to that form, one of the afore mentioned players will be sitting at home a lot this season.

Other players to watch competing for varsity positions include junior Scott Christensen and sophomores Jackie Roe.

Christensen has missed most of the practices this season due to other activities and Roe just got off crutches due to a late-season basketball injury.

After Tuesday's action, the Warriors will hit the Links next Monday and Tuesday in Albuquerque in the 25-team Albuquerque Public Schools Invitational.

That lack of tournament experience has hurt, as well forcing young players with limited experience to face-off with older, more experienced opponents.


The fruit from this year's JV tournament experience will show up a couple of year's down the road, however as Christensen and the rest of the diaper gang are sophomores and juniors.

## Children need all their shots while they're tots

If someone told you that there was a product that you could buy for your baby that would help keep him free from terrible diseases for his whole life, wouldn't you stop whatever you were doing, and run out and get it? Whatever it took: money, time, energy — you'd give for your baby.

Such products are available right now, and they are not new — immunizations and vaccines can save your child's life. It wasn't so long ago that childhood diseases, such as measles, whooping cough and polio, caused widespread pain and suffering to children and their families because there were no effective weapons against them.

Today parents can protect their young children against eight common childhood diseases, as well as hepatitis B, a serious liver disease, by having them immunized and on schedule. Perhaps these lifesaving shots have been around so long that they're taken for granted, and that's why some families postpone or delay having their babies immunized.

But, neglecting a child's health is a serious form of child abuse. Children two years of age and under are most in need of the protection which immunizations provide, and it's up to their parents or guardians to see that they receive their vaccines according to a schedule.

Even though New Mexico law doesn't require children in this age group to be up-to-date on their shots, the state does offer them at no cost through its public health offices. Of course, babies and small children need regular medical checkups, too; and families may obtain immunizations from their family doctor during regular visits. If you've fallen behind on the vaccination series (which should be offered at two, four, six and 12 to 15 months of age, as well as at school age), it is never too late to get your children back on a safe track.


Don't forget, don't put it off, don't say "I'll do it when he goes to school," advises the state Department of Health in its literature. "Don't wait to vaccinate. There's simply no better baby care product on the market today."

## Reader offers warning to the unsuspecting

### TO THE EDITOR:

A mechanics lien could be in your life.

New Mexico law protects the supplier and it could be at your expense whether you like it or not.

Suppose you hire a contractor to build your summer home in Ruidoso, or a plumbing contractor to replumb your present Ruidoso house, or an electrical contractor to rewire your Ruidoso house, or any kind of a contract where materials or equipment are involved. You are happy when the job is done and you have paid the last of the contract price. You have lived up to your contractual obligation.

Suddenly you get a threatening letter from a bill collecting attorney. "If the materials that (supposedly) went into your house are

not paid for by this or that time a Lien will be placed on your house by such and such lumber company." (It could have been a plumbing supply house or electrical supply house or any other supplier, which your contractor used while doing your contract.)

What's going on? "My contract was with the contractor and I paid him in full." What you don't know was your contractor didn't take the money you gave him for your contract and apply it against the material bills for your house.

How is this possible? New Mexico Law states in so many words that all the people you contracted with are considered agents of the owner, and you are the owner. If your agent's don't pay their bills for

materials used in your home then you are liable and a "Mechanic's Lien" filed against your property in the county Courthouse, says so. The title to your property is impaired until the debt is paid or the limitations for a mechanic's lien expire. But that lien must be lifted before your property is clear again. Even worse, if the lumber company enforces the lien by taking it to court, you could also be liable for all the attorney fees paid by the lumber company plus your own attorney fees.

If you are naive, as I am, you would think laws are made to protect the innocent, but this law is just the opposite. Stick the innocent it seems to say.

The lumber company can be indifferent about contractors paying

their bills as long as they have an "innocent" they can put a mechanic's lien against. That could be you or me, if we don't do those things to protect ourselves. Incidentally, even if your contractor is bonded it means nothing because his bond does not cover debts he acquired for the public.

One lawyer in Ruidoso who is an expert "lien filer", when you ask how they can do this to me? says "ignorance of the law is no excuse," (that old stinky, punky cliché). I describe this high class bill collector as a @##\$%^&\*.

The New Mexico Statute is 48-2-2. The Ruidoso Library has the books.

Checks for the tickets should be made out to MainStreet Ruidoso, and \$2.50 of the \$12.50 price is tax-deductible.



## Sidewalks + lighting + parking = progress

When the people of Ruidoso talk about progress this year, the conversation quickly turns to MainStreet Ruidoso — progress is spelled S-I-D-E-W-A-L-K-S in this little village.

But, in just a few months, tourists and locals will be walking on smooth, safe sidewalks that will extend from Fern to Country Club Drive. And, if those walkers happen to be out at night, they'll feel a little more secure under the new street lights.

A series of MainStreet Ruidoso boards, presidents and project managers have led the way in planning and developing this new and improved Midtown, but the hardest part came when they put together a package of state and federal funds that will pay for those new sidewalks without any assessment or additional taxation on the business owners affected or the people of the village.

The legislature, just this past session, redirected \$150,000 to be used for parking. That money may be used to purchase private property for village parking, or to pave private lots in the event of an agreement between the owners and the village.

Parking rounds out the three-part package of sidewalks, lighting and parking.

As the orange bowls are moved from one phase of the project to the next, the progress is visible and usable with new

sidewalks.

This project is the result thus far of a public/private partnership undertaken when Ruidoso was approved to join the state Main Street program some six years ago. At that time MainStreet Ruidoso was funded by a combination of local, state and federal monies. The original plan was for the group to become private after completing its three-year funding cycle.

MainStreet's board, headed by Tom Battin, is working on a membership drive that could set the group in that very direction.


Project manager Don Miller is putting his energy into overseeing the construction project.


Maddox, as well as other MainStreet members and the director, is looking ahead into MainStreet's future.

## Under Construction




STREET INTERSECTION ELEVATIONS



Nine Grade I races including the Triple Crown for two-year-old quarter horses (Ruidoso Quarter Horse Futurity, Rainbow Futurity and All American Futurity); Triple Crown for three-year-old quarter horses (Ruidoso Quarter Horse Derby, Rainbow Derby and All American Derby); Rainbow Silver Cup for four-year-olds and older; World's Championship Quarter Horse Classic for three-year-olds and older; and the All American Gold Cup for four-year-olds and older are featured at Ruidoso Downs.

Several lucrative races for thoroughbreds will also be run at Ruidoso Downs this summer, including the \$50,000 est. Norgor Futurity; \$75,000 added Ruidoso Budweiser Breeders' Cup for three-year-olds and older; \$75,000 est. Kachina Stakes for two-year-old fillies; \$25,000 added Sweetheart Handicap for three-year-old and older fillies and mares; and the \$75,000 est. Ruidoso Thoroughbred Futurity.

Enjoy a delicious lunch in the Ruidoso Downs Turf Club and take advantage of their delicious special buffets on weekends.

Fans at Ruidoso Downs Race Track

have come to expect a lot from track management, and they won't be disappointed this racing season!

On display in the Turf Club during the entire 1994 racing season will be "Treasures of the Track: 200 Years of Racing Silver."

This exquisite display of 36 racing trophies is on loan from the National Museum of Racing and Hall of Fame in Saratoga Springs, New York.

The nationally-significant collection of racing silver will be shown for the first time outside its home in New York this summer. The 36 trophies that make up the exhibit span two centuries of silversmith's art, from an English salver made in 1744 to a George Jensen bowl approximately 30 years old.

A silver-gilt cup made in Moscow in 1795, awarded at one of Russia's earliest races, is a fascinating exception to the mostly English and American work in the show.

Also included in the exhibit is a silver punchbowl made by Tiffany around 1869. This exceptional piece is awarded each year to the winner of the Belmont Stakes, one of the country's most prestigious races for three-year-old thoroughbreds and part of that breed's Triple Crown.

On display for the first time in decades is another Belmont trophy, a 1902 sterling silver sculpture of a horse, jockey and guardian angel.

"Treasures of the Track" interprets the changes in trophy silver over two centuries, from useful table silver of the 18th century and the familiar "loving cups," Victorian tours-de-force, the later high quality "revival" copies from antiques, to the development of modern forms under the influence of Art Nouveau, Art Deco and Streamline Moderne movements.

Many important events of racing history are represented by the collection and will be highlighted in the exhibit.

The exhibit will be open to the public free of charge.

Also new at the Downs this summer is the "Starting Gate Kids Arcade."

This new area has been designed especially for kids. Featuring video arcade machines and table games, this special enclosed area makes going to the track even more of a family experience!

Located on the east end of the grandstand, the Starting Gate Kids Arcade takes the tedium out of taking the kids to the track.

Families can enjoy the "Sport of Kings" and in between races match wits with a video machine!

The kids arcade is sure to become one of the most popular areas in the grandstand.

Ruidoso Downs Race Track isn't the only place where the action is hot this summer. The Museum of the Horse will once again be a center of activity this year.

The fun starts with the 2nd Anniversary Gala on Saturday night, May 28. Once again it will be time to kick up your heels and enjoy an evening of great food and dancing.

"We've opened another new exhibit that we like to call the 'bedroom exhibit'," said acting director Jim Stoddard.

The "bedroom exhibit" features elegant Dutch marquetry furniture and accent pieces, and ties in nicely with the very popular Stradling room.

The Anniversary Gala will give everyone a chance to see these new pieces and to help us celebrate a very successful second year of operation.

During 1993, more than 27,000 patrons visited the Museum of the Horse.

The Anniversary Gala promises to be a rousing good time with the western swing sounds of Eloy Gonzalez and Chuck Cusimano ready to set the tone for the evening.

Tickets to the Anniversary Gala will be on sale soon.

The weekend following the Anniversary Gala heralds the opening of a new temporary exhibit at the Museum of the Horse. The works of renowned western artist Olaf Wieghorst will be featured in the grand opening of the Museum's new fine arts wing.

Wieghorst has been acclaimed by critics as the "outstanding contemporary Western artist." Olaf Wieghorst earned these accolades during a lifetime of observing, handling and painting horses and the West.

His paintings hang in the great private collections of Western art including those of the Eisenhower Library in Abilene, Kansas, the Whitney Gallery in Cody, Wyoming, the Cowboy Hall of Fame in Oklahoma City, and the Gilcrease Museum in Tulsa, Oklahoma.

Wieghorst once said of his paintings: "I've been observing horses for so many years that I guess I've begun to think like one. That's what I mean when I say that the horse has been my greatest teacher. Horses have been my companions under nearly all possible conditions."

The John Goodman family of Tucson, Arizona, has graciously agreed to display their extensive collection of

Wieghorst paintings and sketches from June 4 through the end of July.

Goodman, a long-time friend of Wieghorst, was delighted to show off the immense talent of his good friend.

"The Museum of the Horse is pleased to once again bring this caliber of art to the Ruidoso area," commented Stoddard. "We hope that all area residents will take the opportunity to explore our new fine arts wing and examine these exquisite paintings."

The Ruidoso Horse Sales Company has moved its annual horse sales to the Ruidoso Downs Racing Complex.


Dates for this year's Symposium are October 14, 15 and 16.





# L.C. Solid Waste Authority

## County takes creative approach to garbage

Lincoln County set the pace in New Mexico for innovative approaches to the field of garbage collection four years ago by forming "a" coalition of five municipalities and the county.

That coalition, the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority, put together a collection system that first targeted the village of Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs, then moved into Capitan and now covers a large segment of the unincorporated portions of the county.

In January, authority officials also saw the opening of the Otero-Lincoln Regional Landfill south of Alamogordo, a goal toward which they had worked for the past two years. Part of the impetus for forming the authority was the imposition of new state regulations that resulted in the closing of more than half of the landfills in New Mexico.

In addition to being a partner in the Otero-Lincoln landfill, the authority also operates a debris-only landfill in Capitan.

As contracts with commercial carriers in Carrizozo, Corona and other areas of the county expire, the authority will begin to collect garbage in those communities.

And in one of its most progressive steps, the authority operates a recycling program that has become a model for others in the state to follow. The program has been awarded four state grants, has set up drop off sites countywide, processes 30 tons of material per month, has 45 businesses paying for cardboard service and runs one of the best equipped processing centers in the state.

Curbside pickup, the authority's

brand new "Blue Bag Program," will be in full service starting April 4, in Ruidoso Downs, with Ruidoso and Capitan to follow.

All this activity has occurred while maintaining approximately the same collection fee schedule already existing in each town, and initiating a small \$5.25 a month fee in the unincorporated areas.

The authority is managed by Joe Lewandowski, who previously operated several private sector collection companies, and is supervised by an 11-member board comprised of representatives from each of the government entities.

Lewandowski's biggest headache from day one has been illegal dumping at collection bin sites, and at impromptu and unauthorized mini-landfills.

"A dumpster site is not a landfill," Lewandowski stressed during a recent interview. "Furniture, mattresses, carpet, water heaters, appliances and construction materials do not go into the dumpster."

"It is illegal to leave those items around the dumpster. Just call the authority to arrange a special pickup if you can't get them to the Capitan landfill. The transfer station on Gavilan Canyon Road and the recycling center on Second Street in Ruidoso Downs are accepting these items, too.

"Large items clog the dumpsters, damage our equipment and leave no room for regular garbage."

He's hoping that residents who see abusers will copy down their license plates and report them, because their

abuses end up costing the authority and could eventually lead to an increase in rates if not brought under control.

He offered a few words of advice for all customers.

"Please bag your garbage and keep the lids closed on the dumpsters," he said, "This will prevent the wind and the ravens from scattering litter everywhere, and will reduce the number of flies.

"Do not put ashes in a dumpster. It could cause a forest fire with everything in the area being so dry. You could be charged for any resulting damage.

"If a dumpster is full, use another. Don't leave your garbage on the ground or on top of the dumpster. It's illegal to leave trash anywhere except in a refuse container. Violators will be taken to court and fined. Call the authority at 378-4697 to report abuse and illegal dumpers, or if your dumpster isn't being emptied on time or you have a problem with debris and aren't sure what to do.

Lewandowski is proud of the authority's other accomplishments, which he listed as being given the Keep New Mexico Beautiful Special Award of Merit for 1993, in-house dumpster maintenance handling more than 1,000 units in eight months, custom curbside services available, route services greatly improved and still getting better, and a monthly drop off service for Hondo Valley.

The authority's transfer station on Gavilan Canyon has been improved with a new office, better parking, more sanitary controls and is used as a drop off point for residents for large items.

The operator at the debris landfill at Capitan has been certified, has a white goods recovery program, a recycling site, new wind fences and better litter control.

The main office at the Ruidoso Downs center has been painted, computerized, accounts have been updated and maintained, and is open for the public to drop off larger items and construction debris. Complaints are way down, Lewandowski said. And a portion of the center has been transformed into a dumpster repair area, increasing efficiency and reducing cost.

The goals for the future are to improve service, to stop illegal dumping, to double or triple the volume in recycling and to keep rates low.

"We've taken a different approach to government service — they're our customers," said Lewandowski.

Along that line, Lewandowski recently worked out an agreement with an Alamogordo entity that will allow the county's recycling program to take advantage of empty truck returning from Otero County after dropping off a load. From now on, they'll be bringing back paper for recycling, which will boost the volume and revenues at the authority.

"Most communities pay lots more for the same collection services," Lewandowski said.

"Local government can do it, with your help."

**GARBAGE MAKES HISTORY  
THE MAKING OF THE LINCOLN COUNTY SOLID  
WASTE AUTHORITY**

The Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority ("LCSWA") was formed in 1989 by the municipalities of Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs, Capitan, Carrizozo, Corona, and the County of Lincoln, in response to tough changes in state laws and regulations regarding the operation of solid waste landfills.

Because of the new regulations, over half of the states landfills closed, including the old Fort Stanton landfill, and suddenly solid waste disposal became a critical issue. LCSWA was the first organization in New Mexico formed to cope with the situation. What were we going to do with our garbage?

After three years of hard work, LCSWA is now hauling our garbage to New Mexico's first regional landfill, the Otero/Lincoln Landfill, south of Alamogordo. It opened January 15, 1994. It took the cooperation of ten local governments and a lot of patience to get there.

LCSWA picks up your garbage, operates the Capitan Landfill, is a full partner in the Otero/Lincoln Landfill, runs the transfer station, hauls the garbage in its own 18 wheelers, and has set up a recycling system that is becoming a model for others to follow.

**LCSWA GOALS FOR FUTURE**

**Improve service:** garbage is still a tough business to do well, we'll keep doing our part, please give us a hand by following the rules and using common sense.

**Stop illegal dumping:** illegal dumping costs a lot of money, we are serious about enforcement and violations carry stiff fines, a dumpster site is not a landfill!

**Recycling:** we want to double or triple our volume and show recycling makes economic as well as environmental sense! Curbside Service this spring!

**Keep rates low:** most places pay lots more for the same services, local government can do it, with your help.



## More numbers add up to more possibilities


GTE has announced a change effective June 19, when long-distance calls originating and completing in area code 505 should include the area code ("0" or "1" + the area code + the seven-digit directory number.)

From now until June 19, callers have the option of using the area code when dialing long-distance calls within the 505 area code. After June 19, only long-distance calls within the 505 area code using the ten-digit number (area code + the directory number) will be completed. After that date, customers will hear a recording if they dial "1" or "0" + the directory number. The recording will ask the customer to dial the number again using the 505 area code.

This dialing change allows telephone prefixes with three-digit numbers using the middle digit of "0" or "1". The result is many more telephone numbers being available to customers in the 505 area code. Without modification, telephone switching equipment would not be able to distinguish these numbers as prefixes or area codes.



This month, through April 29, McGary's bronzes, along with works by four other artists, will show at the United Nations in New York City as part of "Art and the Earth: A Dialogue with Nature."

Last year, McGary's work was exhibited in Tokyo, Japan. Next year a European is in the works.

Returning to Europe should bring back memories, since McGary first honed his skills in Italy at the age of 16, after being chosen by artist Harry Jackson to study at his foundry near Florence.

Quite a coup for a boy from Cody, Wyoming, who initially dreamed of pursuing a life in professional sports.

A required half-year class in art persuaded him to change directions.

"I became totally infatuated with the technical side of casting more than the creative side," McGary said. "That's why my art evolved as it did. I became so adept technically, I never think that something can't be cast."

McGary created his first foundry at his mother's home in Durango, Colorado, in a 10x10-foot tin shed on two rows of cinder blocks. It had to be raised to accommodate McGary, who already stood 6-feet, 4-inches.

His first figures depicted sports action. It wasn't until after his training in Italy and his return to the United States that McGary was introduced to the subject that came to dominate his work for the next decade and a half.

McGary's friendship with Kevin Yellow Mountain, after a meeting at the American Indian Art Institute in Santa Fe, opened up a new world for the young artist. And as his Native American friends revealed that new world to him, McGary thankfully immersed himself in their legends.

He used living models, often the descendants of the real person he was

recreating in bronze.

He broke new ground by adding color to the bronze.

"It was cast out of such a beautiful medium and then to cover it. I started playing around with patina, but was frustrated with the dark shoe polish brown that seemed to suck up all my detail," he said. "I wanted to bring out detail and to show how the Indians painted their faces and shields."

Although the new approach met with some initial resistance, today it is copied and by 1982, the awards started pouring into his studio, first located in Hondo, and later in Nogal.

His eight-foot high sculpture, "Long Soldier," depicting a warrior who acquired a cavalry jacket after defeating a lieutenant in battle, stood for three months in front of the New Mexico state capitol in Santa Fe.

"My work is to make a statement and I get to make it," McGary said.

The pride he conveys in his bronze portraits comes from the pride he sees in his Native American friends in South Dakota and Montana.

"They're so proud of their heritage. They pass stories down to me and I put this history in a media nothing can destroy, fire or anything," McGary said.

"Bronze is forever. That's why it's so important to portray their history correctly. When they talk, I follow closely what they say. That's why they are so supportive of me."

He's also received tremendous support from the people of Lincoln County, McGary said. He credits the Museum of the Horse for helping him to gain recognition for his work. The museum has displayed several life size McGary bronzes, and now has one that was just installed this month to remain on exhibit through September.

On his return to the United States in 1995 after his European tour, McGary's work will appear at the Eiteljorg Museum in Indianapolis, Indiana. Michael Duty, former director of the museum, will be writing a book on McGary.

The next two years, just as the two years past, illustrate that McGary lives by the statement that hangs in his studio, "There are no limits."

While he's away, his Gavilan studio staff will help keep his business going and growing.

When David purchased a small bronze foundry in Nogal 1981, he employed five people, and it grew to 15. In 1991, with Dave's sculpture selling briskly, he moved the operation to its

present location.

Just seven months ago, the studio employed about 30 persons. Today 45 artisans are busy. Dave has plans for further expansion soon.

McGary said the studio turns out up to 600 bronzes a year, working with eight outside foundries. Some of the foundries produce the body of a sculpture, other smaller parts such as the weaponry and feathers.

The pieces are shipped back to the studio. One production effort could produce 30 masterworks from 38 to 42 inches in size, 50 maquettes, two-thirds the size of a masterwork, 75 busts and seven to nine life-size pieces that average 6-feet, 5-inches without the base.

"All the work that comes into Gavilan is finishing work and is checked before going out to collectors throughout the world," McGary said.

His staff works as a unit and takes great pride in the final product, he said.

McGary's art is in such demand, that galleries are alerted when he starts a new piece, about three a year. The day the new sculpture goes on the market, it's likely to sell out. Then production begins. Buyers usually must wait four to six months.



Outdoor musicals on the veranda have drawn diners and music lovers from Roswell, Ruidoso and throughout the valley for the past four years. The performances begin in May and run through August.

Guests also can plan on Mother's Day and Father's Day specials.

The Fifth Annual Summer Concert Springfest will begin on Sunday, May 22, with a special guest performer on

the veranda from 2:30 to 6:30 p.m.

The Creole Jazz Band will perform on the Fourth of July. Two more concert dates also will be scheduled in August, one featuring the jazz of Ray Brown.


Visitors can listen and visualize a era gone by while enjoying the backdrop of the old mercantile store and the graciousness of the gazebo and fragrant gardens.

The store was started by Stephen Raymond, who traveled on the first run of the Phelps Dodge Company railroad from the coal camp in Coalora to the village of Gray, later called Capitan.

But his first venture into local business in Capitan faltered after a few years and Raymond looked around for a new location.

Isedro Analla, who lived in a village between La Hunta (Hondo) and Picacho, wanted to sell a house he used for a country store and post office. Raymond bought the complex in 1906 and a year later was in business and had started construction on a new store building.

The building was finished by 1908 and later was named after Raymond's daughter, Tinnie.

Credit and barter was the basis of much of Raymond's business, but the store owner and his wife, Oney Emillio Raymond of Lincoln, never sought to take advantage of those who couldn't pay their bills.

The store became the center of recreation for the community in the 1920s when Mrs. Raymond converted one of her storage rooms into a recreation room and brought in a player piano

for parties and dances.

In 1922, Raymond died. Mrs. Raymond retired for good in 1959, and sold the entire complex to Robert O. Anderson. The post office was moved and Mrs. Raymond resettled in Roswell where she remained until her death in 1979.

Anderson handed the job of restoring the store and creating a restaurant to artist and collector John Meigs, who scouted throughout the Southwest looking for antique cash registers, music boxes, coffee mills, merry-go-round horses, block type ice boxes, counters from ghost towns and anything else to recapture the original feeling.


When Meigs put it all together, an opening party was thrown, and despite apprehensions that business might be scarce, patrons from Roswell proved to be a strong source of early support. Young brides-to-be often chose Tinnie for lush outdoor weddings and it still is a favorite staging area today.

Thirty years later, the restaurant and gift shop is recognized as the signature of eastern valley and draws devoted customers from the towns along U.S. 70.

Tinnie Silver Dollar Restaurant is open year-round, serving dinner Wednesday through Sunday from 5 p.m. to 10 p.m. and lunch from 11:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Saturday and Sunday.

The restaurant and the picturesque veranda is available for weddings, private parties and for all occasions. Catering services also are available.

Rostro said the account was designed with the retired person in mind, someone whose social security check might be deposited directly.


Rostro said banking in Ruidoso is a positive experience. Mortgage rates are still the lowest they've been in almost 20 years, hovering in the seven to eight percent range.

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
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

# How are we doing?

## Change fuels area progress

The big story in Ruidoso is a series of small stories that project strong growth indicators in this popular mountain resort.

For the present, local government grabs the top headline.

MainStreet revitalization, water, a hotel, new planned communities, real estate sales and the municipal elections are all major players to set the stage for the top half of the 1990s.

Get ready! That's what the new mayor and council of Ruidoso are saying to merchants, businessmen and themselves.

"It's catch up time," newly elected Mayor Jerry Shaw told her council recently.

For many years Ruidoso thrived on horse racing, skiing and a single dirt street lined on either side with bars, pool halls and an occasional curio shop.

As a tourist town, some of the simpler amenities, such as sidewalks, had been neglected or missing from the popular downtown shopping district. Enough merchants banded together to stop any time consuming projects for the sake of curb appeal.

Residents remember years ago when an irate merchant threw rocks at highway machinery paving Sudderth Drive for the first time. Downtown charm has always been a tough sell to Ruidoso.

In 1989, a National MainStreet revitalization plan, fueled by Americans for Disability Act and an unkind shift to mall shopping, brought downtown mer-

chants kicking and screaming into compliance.

Now, six years later, MainStreet contractors are laying sidewalks and preparing strip islands for trees to front the highway.

Resistance is still there by some merchants, but this council will not buckle.

The village's new attitude began when Mayor Victor Alonso quit his post last May, Councilor Ron Andrews was soon to follow.

The village council voted to appoint Shaw, the first woman to sit on the council, to become the first woman mayor.


Shaw and appointed councilors Joe Gomez and Frank Potter, in the last seven months of a lame duck term, set a standard that residents liked so well, it helped carry her and the appointed councilors to a victory in the March municipal elections.

Listening to the demands for a new direction, the mayor and council embarked on a campaign of back to basics management of the village.

The street cleaner, a relic brought out occasionally, was scheduled to clean Sudderth Drive regularly. A sign ordinance banning banners and temporary signs was enforced, main roads were striped or restriped in the center and shoulders, while filling potholes.

This was particularly popular for older residents who drive at night.

Water, Ruidoso's number one con-

cern, was given a boost when the legislature awarded the village \$575,000 for capital improvements in improving the village's water sources. In the prior year, the village failed to submit a capital improvement plan to the legislature.

The village will construct a water plant at Grindstone Dam Lake, an \$11-million man-made lake designed as a water source, but has never produced a drop of drinkable water in its 10-year history.

An important issue in this year's campaign was a vacant hotel site located next to the Ruidoso Convention Civic Events Center.

Former Mayor Alonso and his council were chief obstacles in racetrack magnate R.D. Hubbard's attempt to build a hotel on that site.

Alonso won his term with a coalition angry over a village contract with Hubbard that allowed a golf course instead of an industrial park for the old airport ground. Furthermore, they felt the deal was overly generous in favor of Hubbard.

Other fears came from some of the area motel owners and their 3,000 rooms. They didn't want to give up a share of their market to a hotel.

Hubbard asked to build a small convention hotel next to the civic center. It was part of a village-Hubbard concept to have a convention center and hotel surrounded by a golf course.

Hubbard built the golf course, but everything collapsed when he asked for a year's extension on building the hotel. The Alonso council countered with several demands from Hubbard, including a percentage of receipts if gambling was ever legalized at the hotel. Hubbard then ended all negotiations.

Businessmen were outraged at the council.

Hubbard openly endorsed Shaw in March's municipal elections and with her victory, he is back in the picture. Plans for a new hotel within the year seem a likelihood.

Hubbard appears to be a big key to the immediate future of Ruidoso. Few, outside of Hubbard, have expressed a desire to build a hotel in this small mountain resort without regular air-flight service. He has already spent \$30-million in the community including a renovation of the Ruidoso Downs Race Track, the Links at Sierra Blanca golf course, the Museum of the Horse, the Sports Theater, the Hubbard Award for Excellence in Arts (richest art award in the United States) and many philanthropic ventures of the Hubbard Foundation.

Without a hotel, Ruidoso's modern 13,000-square foot convention center will be a perennial white elephant.

With a hotel, the village will receive revenues from small conventions that use the center's meeting rooms and banquet facilities. With a hotel, the Sierra Blanca Airport, owned by the village, would be in a better market posture for a regular flight schedule into the community.

Convention attendees should boost motel gross receipts on any return to the village.


The best little secret in Ruidoso continues to be the real estate market.

Projections out of the Board of Realtors reveal a strong impact for the future.

Real estate sales dropped to a low of \$37.9 million in 1988. Since then, the growth has been steady with 1989 sales

at \$42-million; 1990, \$48-million; 1991, \$44-million; 1992, \$52-million; and in 1993, \$80-million (over 13 months).

According to Al Lane, executive director for the Board of Realtors, the 1983 boom year of \$93-million in sales was misleading, due to a single sale of a \$10-million property located in Colorado.

Lane said inquiries from the Northeast and Midwest are two new areas adding to the mix of a strong California trade and the Texas staple.

"When shopping the southwest, people nearly have a heart attack when they stop at Santa Fe. Ruidoso sounds awfully inexpensive to those lookers," Lane said.

Lane said the Mexican market is back.

"We used to sell a lot of property to Mexican Nationals, then it stopped

completely. Now we are seeing a lot of inquiries by Mexican Nationals," Lane said.

The lack of snow hasn't hurt. Realtors report heavy traffic for the first three months of 1994.

Properties of the Southwest, a wholly owned subsidiary by Patten Corporation, a national land developer with a

home office in Boca Raton, Florida, is creating a 4,700-acre subdivision between Alto and the airport. The company operates 40 other sales offices across the country and a dozen other developments in the southwest.

A billboard leading into the village boasts, "Ruidoso Playground of the Southwest."

For years, the village has depended on the fortunes of horse racing, skiing and hot summers that drive Texans to their mountain retreat. Very little has been done to promote recreational facilities in the mountains by the local government.

In their first meeting after election, councilors authorized \$140,000 for refurbishing tennis courts, a foot bridge repair over the Rio Ruidoso, and Grindstone Dam Recreational Area improvements.

This clearly represents a new direction for the village with a high priority in tourism and recreation.

Ruidoso's fortunes also are tied tightly to the future success of the Inn of the Mountain Gods, owned and operated by the Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe, with president Wendell Chino at its head.

Although embroiled in a lawsuit with

Governor Bruce King over the right to build casino gambling facilities on the reservation, Chino continues to operate video gaming machines at the Inn with heavy attendance by both tourists and local residents.

Snow, the element so crucial to the economy of Ruidoso was nearly nonexistent this year.


How the low snowfall will affect the spring runoffs and summer water needs in Ruidoso is still an unknown. The village still is two years away from using Grindstone for drinking water.

For the past two years, Ski Apache has been a tourist dollar winner during winter. Ski Apache didn't close during this year, but a number of lifts never got off the ground.


Although the ski rental business in Ruidoso dropped off significantly, tourist motor traffic has been steady and heavy since the first of the year. It appears many merchants have gained by one of the wryest seasons on record.

Seeking a year around economy in a two-season town has always been the village's primary goal. In recent years, the shoulder seasons appear to be drawing a little closer.

The question remains, is Ruidoso prepared for a year around economy?



The Village of Ruidoso is experiencing a mini-building boom with remodeling and fix-up projects, as well as residential construction, on the increase over the last few years. ## The possibilities are endless

Exciting new courses and teachers, coupled with impressive growth seems to ensure the future of the Ruidoso center of Eastern New Mexico University.

Since the center opened in 1991, enrollment continues to set records each semester with a 40 percent jump last fall over the previous year and a nearly a matching amount in January of this year over the same period in 1993.

Currently, more than 550 students are attending classes, with 145 selecting community education classes. The figures show that the center is reaching all segments of the community.

"The unprecedented growth and response from the community tells us that Ruidoso is, in fact, a college town," said Cheryl LaCounte, director of student affairs. "The university is pleased to provide that type of support.

"The university this year will receive an increase in funding from Santa Fe, so the phenomenal growth now is benefiting us directly. We will begin to

fill in areas that we previously had to run on less than optimum level. Our growth is coming back to us in additional financial assistance."

This summer, the third summer session, also marks the beginning of the center's fourth academic year, LaCounte said.

"It will include classes that will serve well for general education and transfer to degree programs elsewhere," she said.

"We have a really interesting course this summer taught by two faculty members from New Mexico State University, 'The History of the Central Intelligence Agency,' which is especially timely. They have connections to the CIA and are both fascinating individuals."

Offered again this year will be a trail ride class.

"Typically, it's a three day, two night, or four day, three night ride," LaCounte said. "Everyone goes on their

own horses and it's done in conjunction with the US Department of Agriculture. They go into national forest land and do some trail clearing and trash collection in exchange. They camp out at night. It's fairly rugged."

Always a popular summer course, the gold class practically sells out the minute registration is open, she said.

A new summer orchestra camp for high school students also is scheduled from June 26 to July 1, directed by Dr. Rob Radmer of Eastern's music department. It will be centered at La Junta Guest Ranch in Alto.


"Summer also is a good time for people to learn computers and catch up on basic courses," LaCounte said. "We'll be offering social sciences and currently, have approval to offer archaeology classes involving interactive computers. We also may have an actual dig."

Computers also will be offered next fall as it continues to be one of the most popular areas of study. Paralegal studies, a the welding program and the People's Law School classes draw heavy enrollments.

Each year, the university gathers judges and attorneys willing to teach different segments of the People's Law School. The subjects covered include family and domestic relations, mediation and alternate dispute resolution, real estate contracts, landlord/tenant relations, elder law, personal injury and consumer law, in addition to a review of the entire court system.

The center also has attracted some talented instructors, one of the most recent, archaeologist Jodi Bennett, who teaches anthropology and archaeology. Dr. Jack Thrasher, a toxicologist who teaches chemistry, recently was named Editor in Chief of a new publication called "Informed Consent," which advises on health problems associated with indoor and outdoor environmental pollution.

Registration for the center's eight-week summer session will begin in mid-April. Inserts showing the class schedule will be distributed in *The Ruidoso News*. The session will run from June 6 through July 29, with a break for the July Fourth holiday.

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

## Center enhances

Ruidoso Convention Civic Events Center, with its 33,000 square feet of meeting rooms and exhibit halls, is the biggest facility this side of Albuquerque.

But that's not what Community Events Director Kathleen Michelena, who manages and promotes the center, brags about.

Michelena's brag point is that the multi-million dollar center is the best, not just the biggest.

Michelena has been on board since the center was in its early planning stages and the land where the big pink adobe building sits was just a piece of flat dirt in the middle of The Links at Sierra Blanca golf course.

Ruidoso Convention Civic Events Center is now a full-service convention center. The community utilizes it, as well, for everything from staff meetings to wedding receptions and community events, like the Salute to Working Women lunch and style show that was staged there on February 14.

This boost to the area economy didn't just happen overnight — it took a lot of work and planning from village leaders who lobbied the state for funds to build the center.

Michelena and Jeneane Taylor, office manager, oversees the center, and put together events to each planner's specifications. They're backed up by staff members Manny Cordova and Nelson Eldred, maintenance technicians, who are adept at putting together a stage, hooking up lights and sound systems and then dismantling a meeting room for center users.

New this year, the center has a professional full service kitchen which is used by anyone who rents the center. The new kitchen gets rave reviews from caterers, who have had plenty of chances to use it for luncheons and dinner meetings.

The center is busy enough that the full-time staff is assisted by a crew of part-timers made up of village employ-

ees who come in to work nights and weekends during big events, like the Governor's Conference on Tourism which had its meeting

at the center this year.

The big event, which included a trade show in the exhibit hall and small meetings throughout the center, was capped off with a formal red and gold banquet.

The Governor's Conference used every square inch of the center, but it wasn't the first event to use the entire facility.

For two years, the motorcycle rally, with about 9,000 participants, has had its headquarters at the center.

The annual Ruidoso Arts Festival, which draws thousands of people, will take place at the center this July, and reservations are already on file for the Oktoberfest and Christmas Jubilee.

Coming up soon at the busy center is a food service show, the Friends of Smokey barbecue and dance to celebrate the fire prevention bear's 50th anniversary.

"We're going after conventions and

conferences," stressed Taylor, who listed off many more upcoming events scheduled into meeting rooms.

And while many people would be daunted to try to promote and sell a convention center without a convention hotel, Michelena is not. She's busy selling Ruidoso and the convention center as the best place in the state or nation to conduct a meeting for as many as 2,000 people.

The exhibit hall is big enough for 130 exhibit spaces, and is functional for events like an upcoming gun and knife show, which will be back for the second year, and the yearly Christmas Jubilee shopping extravaganza.

But, the future is conventions for Ruidoso's investment in the future, and with or without a hotel, Michelena is tempting planners to take a second look at Ruidoso.


"A lot of the people in Santa Fe are getting wind of us and they really want to come down," said Taylor.







As usual, a grand parade, street vendors, arts and craft displays and a chili cookoff will liven things up for the locals and entice neighbors from near and far to join in the fun.





Stoddard said the bank is known for its helpful staff from the teller stations to the drive-up window, from new accounts to the safety deposit section.



The first meeting of the nine-member Board of Directors was October 18, 1939, in the old Texas Hotel located on Burro Avenue.


Otero County Electric, under the auspices of the newly-created REA, was incorporated in 1939, to serve approximately 50 people in the Cloudcroft area.





## State Rep. John Underwood

Being a Democrat in most parts of New Mexico would be a plus when running for office, but Lincoln County is a Republican stronghold.

Against those odds four years ago, H. John Underwood, a Ruidoso attorney, ran against a popular incumbent state representative and walked away with the prize.

Two years ago, he was unopposed for re-election, but this time around, two Republicans have entered the running field.

Underwood has proven in the past four years that he knows how to bring home tax dollars to help all parts of Lincoln County. He also can point with pride to a list of platform planks that he has fulfilled since he first ran for office.

"In 1990, I ran on a platform to promote economic development, to provide quality education, to preserve the environment, to protect our water resources and to combat alcohol and drug abuse," Underwood said.

Last year, he worked hard during the legislative session on stiffer laws for those guilty of driving while intoxicated and backed appropriations to increase per student reimbursements to school districts.

In cooperation with State Senator Pete Campos (D-Santa Rosa) this year, he brought back \$570,000 for a new \$1.3-million Ruidoso water supply project at Grindstone Canyon.

He also brought home \$290,000 for a new rural events center in Glencoe, an

enterprise he hopes to see bring more tourists and special activities to the area.

The settlement of Lincoln will benefit from \$50,000 toward new walkways and \$100,000 to turn the Montano Store into a museum with local artifacts.

Underwood won a delay on a movement to get rid of a tax credit that race tracks may receive for advertising. And he helped secure the right for voters to decide whether to institute a state lottery and video gambling.

"I always felt it shouldn't be a decision left up to a governor or some other entity," Underwood said. "It should be the decision of New Mexico voters."

Ruidoso Downs has received a total of \$400,000 toward the construction of its new town hall.

The fairground at Capitan will receive some major facelifting as a result of state money Underwood secured and has some coins to advertise the July Fourth celebration of Smokey Bear's Fiftieth Birthday.

Among other prizes brought home, Corona received \$90,000 for a new senior citizens center, plus \$20,000 for street work this year and \$100,000 to start a new water line project. Carriazo's swimming pool will be refurbished with \$50,000 from the legislature and \$35,000 will go toward renovation of the old city hall for a municipal police/court complex.
