## Council reviews options for Midtown amenities

Merchants and city leaders gathered Tuesday evening to solve problems with parking and public restrooms along the MainStreet project.

With about 30 members of the community in attendance, mostly Midtown merchants, village manager Gary Jackson and deputy village manager Alan Briley reported on the status of the project and proposed several options for improving the parking and restroom situation.


Jackson said that \$150,000 in severance tax had been reallocated to pay for parking, restrooms and other change orders. He said that village property next to The Ruidoso Store at the intersection of

Eagle and Sudderth was a good central location for public restrooms. His goal is to have the restrooms in place by Memorial Day.

The village is negotiating a deal with the owners of property behind the Covered Wagon and Mountain Arts. If the lot is purchased, the village will pave, stripe and light it, providing about 30 additional spaces to Midtown.

Briley also has the unofficial go ahead from the council to pursue improvement of the municipal lot located at Center and Wingfield streets. That lot has room for about 55 cars, and Briley suggested making changes to Center street to

## Getting there! MainStreet reaches its goal with sidewalk project

After weeks of charges that communication was weak between MainStreet, business owners and the village, good news came out of the October 28, 1993, meeting.

Deputy manager Alan Briley said everything was on line to start the streetscape project.

Although Briley's past projected start and finish dates often went awry, it didn't dissuade him from setting another date for groundbreaking. Board members talked of November 8, Briley said the event would take place during the week of November 12.

On the morning of Monday, November 15, groundbreaking ceremonies took place in the driveway of Fenton's Gallery.

D&S Construction from Santa Teresa was the chosen contractor.

Briley talked of his pre-construction meeting.

"I don't like to have a lot of discussion," Briley said. "I just like to have everyone there so they can hear what we are doing. The village has elected to do all the inspections in house. I've hired an inspector. Between the inspector, Don (Miller) and me, we will inspect the whole project as it goes through."

"As it stands now, we have plenty of money," Briley said. "If

things start getting out of hand where it looks like we are going to have a few problems, where it looks like we aren't going to have enough money, there are a few things we can delete."

"We have a commitment from the highway department if we need more money to come and ask," Briley said.

He suggested a meeting with the contractor to be sure everyone understands the timetable.

Project director Don Miller spoke of other plans.

"We have submitted a capital improvement program for projects ongoing and for plans for the future," Miller said.

He said a state MainStreet promotional team was due in November to help with advertising.

Attorney and member Don Dutton cautioned that the 501-C3 (non-profit) standing could be in jeopardy if brochures are used to promote businesses. He said brochures had to be non-biased, without taking a position.

The board discussed parking. Dutton said Santa Fe is making money on parking lots.

The board discussed El Paso Street as a possible parking area.

Board member Auden Franklin said parking space was a current problem.

"Employees of stores in downtown, park their cars on the

street in front of the stores. They are taking up space that customers would use. I think we are losing business because the shopper decides to forget shopping and go eat," Franklin said.

"I asked a shop owner, whose employee was parked in front of my shop, to please ask if the car could be moved so my customers could park, and I was told 'It's a public space,'" she said.

The possibility of using a trolley car was discussed.

The week before groundbreaking, an unsigned letter was being circulated by some downtown business owners that asked, "Can you afford to lose 50 percent or possibly up to 90 percent of your holiday season sales," predicated on what they called massive sidewalk construction.

Briley told merchants that the project would be divided into eight independent phases, short completion steps over a long period of time.

Each step will be literally carpeted islands to facilitate shoppers around the work area.

Thanksgiving and Christmas will be given special consideration in the way of down time, to alleviate any possible inconveniences.

Demolition and rubble will be removed after stores are closed at night.

"Continuity in the work phases

is of the utmost importance," said Briley. "The contractor can't change his plans. That is why MainStreet director Don Miller and myself will act as liaison to any complaints or questions. We want this project to proceed as quickly as possible in the best interest of the merchants."

Briley probably believed that.

Some merchants urged the project not get under way until after Christmas, about six weeks away.

Briley said the three-year project had already gone five years.

"That should show you the unpredictability of setting any precise time," he said. Briley said in any event, the work shouldn't stop any shopping.

"That's what merchants have to keep in the back of their minds, there will be no shut down to the shopper trade at all," he said.

Briley said if there were any special concerns regarding any unanswered questions, to call him or Miller.

On November 11, 1993, MainStreet president Tom Battin wrote a column for The Ruidoso News opinion page headlined, "Streetscape is a dream come true for Ruidoso."

The article was designed to inform the reader how the project would proceed and its ultimate impact.

## Commish heads up garbage authority

By acclamation of the members, County Commissioner Wilton Howell was elected the new chairman of the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority Monday.

He will finish out the term of former Capitan mayor Frank Warth, who resigned when he was defeated for re-election. Warth was replaced on the board by Dr. Bernhard Reimann. Howell's term as chairman ends in May.

"Do you all dislike me that

much," Howell jokingly asked after being nominated by member Joe Hayhurst, mayor of Ruidoso Downs.

"The last two chairmen were run out of town," County Commissioner Bill Schwettmann chimed in, referring to Warth and Victor Alonso, who resigned as mayor of Ruidoso before the end of his term, sold his business and moved away.

"You were quick to pick up on that," Howell said to Schwettmann, his fellow county representative on the authority board.

"My philosophy as chairman is to set the agenda and run the meeting, period," he told board members. "I want a whole lot of input. I don't believe in one person knowing more than everyone else or an executive committee making decisions."

The authority, a coalition of the county and its five municipalities, provides and regulates solid waste collection countywide and also is a partner with a similar Otero County coalition in a regional landfill south of Alamogordo.

Reporting on delinquent accounts in the unincorporated portions of the county, general manager Joe Lewandowski said only 26 out of 350 who received certified letters had to be turned over to board attorney J. Robert Beauvais for legal action and filing of liens.

"That doesn't mean all of the rest paid," he said. "Some paid and some shouldn't have been on there. Several trailers had been removed or burned, but we can't take their word for it. We have to have the assessor verify. Part of this is that they kept getting the (billing) post card and just threw it away. Now they've responded."

Of the \$25,000 in accounts more than 30 days overdue, the authority probably will receive half, when the nonapplicable bills are subtracted, he said.

"Some just have to go back and file a name change (because the property was sold) and then the bill will be sent to that new name," Lewandowski said. All the bills would be retroactive to the start of service.

Schwettmann asked what kind of legal fees are connected to filing the liens.

"I know we're paying for \$50 just for title search," he said. "And I don't think Beauvais is doing it free."

"The thing is, when you file suit or a lien for \$93, they also pay all other associated costs like the attorney's fee and court costs," Lewandowski said.

"We set up two separate accounts under Bob Beauvais' name now. One is his regular legal fees and one is for collection. Anything

that has to do with filing the liens is under this and that way we can keep track of what it's costing us. We can't just totally ignore it if it costs us \$100 to collect on one."

"In other words, that's reimbursable," Schwettmann said.

Howell said he would like to see a report at the next meeting.

In other budget items, member Frank Cummins, a Ruidoso village councilor, questioned why commercial revenues are only at 42 percent when 67 percent of the year has elapsed. Overall revenues and expenses are holding about even at 63 percent.

"We started separating the commercial about four or five months into the year, so for the first four or five months, we didn't show any revenue for commercial," Lewandowski said.

"The average for that is to take \$110,000 over a 12 month period. We're collecting more at the end here now, up to \$10,000-\$11,000 a month now because of shifting some of Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs and Capitan revenue (for commercial) previously lumped with residential into that area. But we didn't start billing some of those commercials until September and October. It will catch up in the next four months."

"When I took over, there wasn't even a commercial billing account. I don't know where they put their commercial revenue. Now we have taken over all of the commercial billing in Capitan, Ruidoso Downs and half of Ruidoso. It shows up better where the money is coming from."

Cummins then turned his attention to overtime, noting that the category already is over spent at 103 percent. The fiscal year won't end until June 30.

"If this continues, where will we get the money?" he asked.

"In some of these other areas, we're staying under budget," Lewandowski responded.

"We're trying to avoid overtime and use some (compensatory) time."

"There are certain times you just can't, because of weather, holidays or emergency, you just can't avoid it."

Member J.D. James, a Ruidoso councilor, asked who keeps track of the overtime.

"Our supervisor is the one who keeps the log," Lewandowski said. "The time sheets you saw, they actually record that daily. He sees the time sheets each morning."

The supervisor also receives overtime, but Lewandowski said he keeps up with all of the hours submitted.

"(The supervisor) has been keeping it on line, but if for some reason he has to go over it, he gets ap-

proval from me," Lewandowski said.

"What's (the supervisor's) average overtime per pay period?" James asked.

"Anywhere from five to 10 hours per week, 10 to 20 per pay period," Lewandowski said. "The route supervisor just can't run these trucks and these guys and do what has to be done in a 40 hour week."

"He's a backup driver and he also does a lot of the (collection) estimates, brings in the receipts, takes care of the sheets."

Howell revisited the legal fees.

"On that 92 percent for attorney's fees, that was after we'd had considerable adjustment mid-year," he noted.

Lewandowski explained that for billing purposes, all of the legal charges are lumped together, although some are for liens and will be reimbursed.

"We've had three of the 26 already try to pay and they have to go down to the attorney's office and settle their bills," he said. "There's just not a separate category under the financials."

Schwettmann pointed out that when the authority's \$19,000 final loan repayment to the county commission (out of \$50,000) is to be mailed in June, the cash balance of the organization will be bleak.

Cummins said he's worried, because transfer station expenses already are at 75 percent and recycling sits at 71 percent.

"Are we going to have a problem by the end of the year?" he asked. "Some of these things are essential and continuing."

"A lot of this stuff was big dollar items that you won't have recurring," Lewandowski said. "There was a lot of money spent in maintenance. Dumpster maintenance is slowing down, because we're through with most of the lids, which cost \$45 a set and the bottoms cost \$45. We're down to now where we're just painting and small repairs."

"Next year, we'll be able to work on the budget with some actual experience figures in each category," Lewandowski said. Recent citations against illegal dumpers are starting to have a positive effect.

"We have more people now calling up and asking us for special pickups. The only thing different is that we are charging for commercial type pickups and are generating some revenue there," Lewandowski said.

"The sheriff's department a few weeks ago started citing a few people and, boy, it made a difference. We've had more people at the transfer station and more people at the landfill. From what I understand is that they cited a

couple of people on the (Capitan debris) landfill road for unsecured loads, a roofing company.

"(Sheriff's deputy) Charlie LaBelle cited a contractor at Palo Verde who had filled up five dumpsters and told him to get it cleaned up and to get it out of there and he probably would drop the citation. I went back at noon and it was all cleaned up."

"That's what it takes to get them started doing it. We're going to keep on with that."

He reported that revenues at the new regional landfill are coming in at a brisk rate. It won't be long until the environmental gross receipt taxes collected by the different entities and pledged to the repayment of the bond issue sold to finance the landfill's construction and early operation won't be needed for that purpose.

At that point, the board will have to put aside enough money to guarantee annual payments for collection equipment initially purchased from the members when they formed the coalition. Once that amount is secured, then the tax flowing in can be used for other purchases and projects.

More good news is that the amount of sales tax being genera-

ted by the different communities is higher than last year, he said.

Officials at the regional landfill being operated by the city of Alamogordo have told Lewandowski that as much as 60 to 80 percent of the next payment the authority sends for bond repayment, probably will be returned. When the operation in Otero is earning enough to cover the bond payments in total, then the authority will receive refunds on the \$32,679 it already has paid.

A financial recap of the landfill operation will be presented during a joint meeting of the Otero and Lincoln authorities to be scheduled in April, he said.

Under recycling, coordinator Kerry Krumsiak reported a fourth grant has been received, which will implement curbside recycling in Ruidoso Downs with the use of blue bags.

The grant also paid for advertising in the Progress Edition '94 of The Ruidoso News, which contained a full page story on the authority, as well as the ad.

Additional newspapers for recycling will be hauled to the center in Ruidoso Downs for processing whenever an authority truck is

headed back empty after delivering in Otero County, he said. It gives that county an outlet for the newspapers it collects.

Reimann, who before his appointment to the board had acted as a volunteer consultant on several environmental issues, encouraged members to get involved in upcoming deliberations on new proposed State Environmental Department regulations.

"We ought to have input in that," he said.

The board authorized Reimann to speak on behalf of the authority and approved other members to attend the hearings in Santa Fe from April 5-7 in the Runnels Building at 1990 St. Francis Dr.

After a half-hour session on pre-termination of personnel, which was closed to the public, the board re-entered its regular session.

Members told Kathy Eisen that the authority management had not followed proper procedures when she was terminated last Wednesday.

She has protested the firing. She was put on administrative leave with pay and a hearing was set for 9 a.m. Wednesday. A notice of possible action was to be given to her after 3 p.m. Monday.

improve the lot's accessibility.

He recommended expanding Center's eastern sidewalk, adapting it to proper ADA widths and slopes, and making Center one-way leading to the parking lot. This plan received general support from the council and the audience.

While this plan provides for a total of 85 parking spaces (72 spaces are eliminated by MainStreet construction), J. Ross of the Covered Wagon argued that since the municipal lot is already available, Midtown is still short 42 spaces.

"That extra 30 (behind Covered Wagon) will help, but we need more," he said.

Doug Rosson from Rocky Mountain Christmas disagreed, saying that people don't use the municipal lot because it is unattractive and not well lit.

"I think we have a really good asset just sitting there, and if we make it attractive, people will use it," he said.

J. Roberts owner Ann Bolton reiterated the position of many merchants, including Pat Smith, who owns Habitat.

"Please give us as many parking spaces on Sudderth as possible," Bolton said.

Mayor Shaw sympathized with the feelings of merchants like Bolton and Smith, who said she had become very attached to the two spaces in front of Habitat, but Shaw reminded the audience that the parking on Sudderth was a concession of the state highway department.

"You must remember that the state could take away that parking at any time," she said. "It never was yours."

Although Briley has been working with merchants to return parking spaces where possible, he and the council are concerned that returning too much parking will jeopardize the project's streetscape funding.

"We have worked with people in cases where we can save parking without harming the project," said Jackson.

"We're trying to be reasonable, but this is a streetscape."

Briley said that returning parking where landscaping is planned saves money but endangers the streetscape.

"When we save parking we're not enhancing or improving anything, we're just replacing sidewalk," he said.

Councilor Robert Donaldson said returning parking defeats the purpose of the project, which is to create a scenic, safe path for pedestrians. He pointed out that the expected increase in pedestrian traffic could prompt the state highway department to ban parking on Sudderth sooner than later.

Briley confirmed that the traffic manager at the state highway department does not want parking on Sudderth.

Donaldson said he is opposed to any kind of parking on Sudderth.

"It is imperative that sidewalks take priority over parking and landscaping," he said. "It's critical

to not add parking just for the sake of parking."

He said he is in favor of laying as much sidewalk as possible right now, while the funding is in hand, rather than waiting until the state disallows parking.

Donaldson and Councilor J.D. James noted that parking in front of Midtown stores is often taken up by owners and employees.

MainStreet board member Margaret Lahey said MainStreet is hoping to conduct parking duration studies to see if this is really a problem.

Mike Radziewicz, owner of Mitchell's, said the community should support off-street parking.

"Business was good when there were more pedestrians," he said. "When we got more cars, people went to malls where they could park and walk through the stores. Once we improve the lots, we can have a mall concept and business will be good again."

Marion Treat, owner of Covered Wagon, said she is delighted that the city is planning to buy the lot behind her store. She said that if her neighbor Teri Sodd agreed, the village could use the space between their buildings for lot access from Sudderth. Treat said she would take down her fence if the village would put in gradually sloping steps to the lot.

Donaldson applauded Treat's offer, saying, "When this project is done, I think all the merchants will see opportunities for more of this kind of thing."

Mayor Shaw said she hopes mer-

chants will add rear entrances to their stores, so people who park in the lots can walk through them to get to Sudderth.

"Impulse buying is a powerful thing," she said.

Several people emphasized that good signage is vital to the success of off-street parking. Radziewicz recommended that all street signs be replaced with international signs.

"In less than two years we're going to have to replace the signs anyway for metric conversion," he said.

Radziewicz was referring to a 1988 Congressional mandate that the United States convert to the metric system. According to a February 24 press release from the New Mexico State Highway and Transportation Department, the deadline for conversion is September 30, 1996.

Margaret Lahey said that MainStreet should be able to help with signage.

"MainStreet is supposed to be of the merchants, by the merchants and for the merchants, and the city is here to assist us," she said. "I think if people would join and get involved and get busy working with it, we could do something above and beyond what the city can do alone, and it's more cost effective. For example, we could have fund raisers and make really good, distinctive signs."

Turning to the issue of landscaping, Briley said he is getting many complaints about the planters and type of trees planned. The plans

call for 87 blooming trees in bark-covered beds, and some merchants worry that the trees will block windows and signs.

Briley said a local plant supplier recommended short evergreens in ivy-covered beds. Councilor Frank Potter offered his expertise on the subject and said he believes the blooming trees would be attractive and functional. Lahey said the trees are not obstructive because they are very open and airy.

Mayor Shaw was in favor of the blooming trees. She and the council supported the suggestion of J. Ross and Margaret Lahey that the beds should be paved and grates be put around the trees.

Briley said the design plans did not provide for an irrigation system, and the mayor directed him to do some comparison shopping for someone to lay the irrigation as soon as possible.

Briley also brought up the issue of the Americans with Disabilities Act requirements.

"The construction project is only required to make the sidewalks comply with ADA," said Briley. "Many people have been misled to think all the storefronts will be made accessible, but we're only doing that where it's feasible."

MainStreet director Don Miller said it is important that the village enforce business ADA compliance due to liability.

The last problem Briley presented at the workshop concerned the horse-drawn buggy that operates out of The Ruidoso Store's parking lot. Jimmy Jeter relies on the

spotlight at Eagle street to stop traffic so he can pull onto the highway.

MainStreet design plans, however, call for enclosing that area for restrooms and benches. Briley said they may be able to widen the wheelchair ramp there, but he isn't sure it's legal for the buggy to use the ramp.

Mayor Shaw and many other people noted that the horse-drawn buggy is a successful business and a valuable attraction.

"It'd be a shame to lose that," said Shaw.

The council encouraged Briley to find a way to accommodate Jeter's request for protected highway access. One audience member speculated that Jeter was likely to begin a shuttle service to off-street parking, which might ease some people's concerns that shoppers will resist using the lots.

Village attorney John Underwood said it was nice to see an air of cooperation among the audience members, and he offered to give MainStreet a workshop on cooperative parking lots. Tom Babin, president of the MainStreet board, accepted Underwood's offer, and Margaret Lahey proposed that MainStreet also conduct its own workshops in an effort to take some of the load off village staff.

Briley reported that the current phase of MainStreet construction will be complete in about two weeks.

"We've completed nearly 75 percent of the project in less than a month," he said.

# County's dangerous bridges have been repaired

One of the bridges in Lincoln County received the dubious distinction of being included on a national television network's list of New Mexico bridges in dangerous condition.

Fortunately, for residents and travelers, the bridge already has been replaced by the State Highway and Transportation Department. Several other bridges in poor condition also have been replaced with culverts by the county road department in the last four years since road manager Bill Cupit was hired.

The infamous bridge cited on a list compiled by the program Dateline on NBC spans a narrow stretch of the Rio Romito at Fort Stanton.

On the network's evaluation list, average daily traffic on the bridge was estimated at 644. The substructure (pillars and foundation that anchor the bridge) was rated a seven on a scale of 0-9 with nine the highest; the super structure (the girders, wires and beams supporting the deck) and the deck (the part that actually carries the traffic) were each rated a four for a sufficiency rating (safety plus lane width, traffic flow and other factors) of 18 on a scale of 0-100.

"That one was in a critical condition, but the state has replaced it and we're in good shape," Cupit said. "They also did a lot of work and installed a new bridge on U.S. 70 at Biscuit Hill."

"All of our bridges that were in critical condition when I came on board have been taken care of. I took out the bridge structures and put in larger culverts. Next year, we plan to go back and install concrete slopes. They all turned out great," Cupit said.

"The problem was they were never maintained, they were neglected," he said. "I guess for

years, this county had the bad habit of patching, just throwing stuff together and building bridges out of whatever they could find.

"There was another one on Old Fort Stanton Road that was the worst. We put in a 10-foot culvert."

Cupit said each one of the replacement culvert projects cost the county about \$14,000.

The list of 58 New Mexico bridges in serious condition or worse was excerpted by Dateline from the Federal Highway Administration's Bridge Database. The government only requires bridges to be inspected once every two years.

# Burglars take booze from barn

A front window was broken and some alcohol may have been stolen during a break-in at the Super Select Sale Barn in Glencoe.

The burglary was reported to the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department at 10 a.m. Tuesday.

"A four- by eight-foot or larger picture window was broken by using a 'no parking' sign with a heavy tire attached," said Sheriff James McSwane.

"One of my deputies investigated and has contacted representatives of those responsible for the property. They're to contact us if anything of value is missing and we haven't heard from them as of Wednesday."

McSwane said the window was the only item damaged.

"They went through some things, but it's unknown what might have been taken," he said.

"There was no money on the premises, but the bar area still was somewhat stocked and they may have taken alcohol."

The Lincoln County Commission has approved the purchase of the Glencoe barn about 10 miles east of Ruidoso on U.S. 70 with plans to turn it into a rural events center.

Reacting to a commission request, the State Legislature appropriated \$250,000 for the purchase and another \$40,000 toward needed repair and the first year's operation.

# Supreme Court dismisses Webb suit against Village of Ruidoso Downs

The case of Wilma Webb versus the governing body of Ruidoso Downs was continued when Webb's attorney Gary Mitchell filed for a discretionary review by the Supreme Court.

The suit has been in litigation since 1986, according to Ruidoso Downs Village Clerk Leann Weibrecht.

Webb, a former village clerk and two-time trustee, originally was

awarded \$25,076 for her claim of wrongful termination when she was not reappointed by former mayor Jake Harris.

The village appealed, and the decision was reversed by the New Mexico Court of Appeals in February.

According to Ruidoso Downs attorney Robert Beauvais, the appeals court decided Webb was an appointed official, not an employee,

and therefore was not a protected member of personnel.

The Supreme Court upheld that decision this week by dismissing the Webb case.

"This is a pretty important decision, because it means that new administrations should have the freedom to appoint people they trust and not be saddled with holdovers from previous administrations," said Beauvais.

# King appoints Counts as judge

Governor Bruce King has appointed Alamogordo attorney James W. Counts to a newly-created district judge position in Lincoln and Otero counties.

Counts was one of three persons recommended for the job by the 12th District Judicial Selection Committee. He also is one of four people - two Republicans and two Democrats - who have filed to run for the district judge post in this year's elections.

According to a news release, to remain as judge, Counts must win the June Democratic primary and the November general election.

Governor King in a recent news release said that he believed James Counts would make an excellent judge and was happy to appoint him to this position.

# Private MRS plan draws 24 partners

Minnesota's Prairie Island River Nuclear Plant is running out of storage space for spent fuel rods which has escalated the need for the Mescalero Site to be built.

Twenty-four nuclear power plant operators have joined in the study of the proposed storage complex on the Mescalero Apache reservation according to project organizers.

Project spokesman Miller Hudson whose office is in Mescalero said that he expected more than 24 to join as partners.

"Essentially, we wrote a letter and said if you want to get on board for this project, send us a check by April 1. Twenty-four have responded. We expect more," Hudson said.

The facility at Mescalero would hold the reactor rods until a permanent nuclear waste dump is opened sometime after 2010.

The plan doesn't specify individual utilities' share of costs, but an estimated \$8 million has been mentioned to design the complex.



The Ruidoso Warriors track team came back from spring break in good fashion as they recorded second and third place finishes respectively in boys and girls divisions of the Rose Relays, Tuesday in Tularosa.

Alamogordo took the blue ribbon in the boys competition with 108 points followed by Ruidoso, 69.5; Socorro, 54.5; Santa Fe Prep, 26; Hatch, 24 and Dexter, 23.

On the girls side, Deming got first place with a whopping 119 points, followed by Socorro, 52; Ruidoso, 43.5; Santa Fe Prep, 32; Alamogordo, 25 and Magdalena, 11.

Kyle Humphreys carried much of the load for the Warriors as he accounted for 22.5 points. The swift sophomore nabbed first place in the 110-meter hurdles in 16.81 and he also won the long jump with a leap of 19-8.

Senior Casey Kearns took the blue ribbon in the 400 with a blazing time of 51.86.

Stephanie Haas won the 3200 with 13:30.3 and teammate Sarah Dix grabbed the long jump trophy with a 14-9 1/2 tally.

Both the boys and girls teams recorded second-place finishes in the 400 relays.

Anthony Torres, Kearns, Arthur Rojas and Humphreys comprised the boys squad, while Dix, Kristie Ryan, Brandy Pfeffer and Lena Centeno got the place for the girls.

Humphreys, Torres, Eran McManemy and Kearns also finished second in the 1600-meter relay, while Dix, Ryan, Pfeffer and Centeno checked in second in the 800-meter relay.

Third-place finishes for the Warriors were taken by Monique Ramos in the discus (95.5); Brandy Pfeffer, high jump (4-8); Sarah Dix, 100 high hurdles (17.94); Kyle

Humphreys, 100-meter dash (11.4); and Anthony Torres, 200-meter dash (23.92).

Head track coach Ronny Maskew was pleased with his team's performance.

"We were fairly pleased with our 400-meter relay team because we hadn't had a lot work with spring break and everything ... their time improved so they are making progress."

"The medley team also did pretty well (fourth), considering we just put them together at the meet. As of right now we'll stick with these guys, but we might tinker around a little later in the season," said Maskew.

"I told the girls that if we had any more bad handoffs, I was going to borrow the starter's pistol," Maskew said, smiling.

"We could have won the 400 relay if we hadn't botched two of the three handoffs. We've just got


harder on them," said Maskew.



## Volunteers raise barn at Bible camp

Just a dream 13 years ago, two Bible camps are growing among the scrub brush and junipers at the western foot of the Capitan Mountains.

Last weekend, more than 100 volunteers showed up at Fort Lone Tree near Capitan Gap to pitch in with saws, hammers and muscle as part of an old fashion barn raising.

Only this time, it wasn't a barn. The 50x60-foot building will be used for a dining hall as part of the transition from tents to permanent structures at the camp, a concept brought to reality by Tim Worrell.

"In 1980, my wife and I moved out, lived in a tent, put together our own sawmill and started building Lone Tree Bible Ranch (further east of the fort)," he said.

Worrell had purchased 20 acres of a 160-acre homestead and later acquired another 72 acres (where Fort Lone Tree is being built) with an option for 30 more.

The ranch was designed for older children, 13 and up, but Worrell wanted a place for younger kids, eight to 12, too. On a trip to DisneyWorld, he noticed the enthusiasm of his own children for the western fort.

"They would have stayed there all day," he said. Worrell left convinced he had found the right concept for his new camp.

Fort Lone Tree opened for its first summer season in 1991. The entrance is framed by two towers (with sleeping quarters) connected by a rustic log wall.

The sides of the fort now are formed by a series of sleeping tents,

which eventually will be replaced by 25x30-foot cabins. The dining hall is at the back of the fort and will be framed by two more corner towers.

The camps are dedicated to showing each child individual attention. One counselor is on staff for every four campers. Each cabin/tent takes care of eight campers and two counselors, Worrell said.

"We believe that sharing adventure is one way of establishing relationships," he said. The camps offer horseback riding, archery, rifle target practice, rappelling/mountain climbing and crafts. Each camp week wraps up with a Friday rodeo to allow visitors to show off the skills they've acquired.

A third camp has been established on the shores of Elephant Butte Reservoir, where campers live in houseboats or sleep on the beach.

Many campers enjoy the experience so much, they enter a training program. The type of program, leader in training or counselor in training, depends on the child's age. By the time they are old enough to be hired at 18, Worrell and Fort Lone Tree Camp director David Jaquess know what they're getting.

"You can't tell just by reading a resume," Worrell said.

The camps are being developed and built to standards that he hopes will win the mark of acceptance by the American Camping Association, the top level in the field.

While camp staff use experiences and interaction with campers

to talk about the Bible and a moral lifestyle, the approach is non-denominational.

"The two greatest influences in a child's life are their parents and friends," Jaquess said. "We certainly don't want to try to replace their parents, but we do want to be their friends."

Worrell said when hiring a director for a camp or for other jobs in the complex, "I try to find people with a heart for it." Many have left higher paying, higher profile positions to join his organization, he said.

Worrell also works with crews of teenage volunteers who fly in from around the country to spend three days in Juarez building 10x15-foot houses to replace cardboard structures being used by some families.




His future dreams include building an adult hotel on a parcel further southwest from the fort and across a canyon.

Everything to date has been built without borrowing money and with volunteer labor.

By the time volunteers from as far away as Florida and as close as Capitan packed up Sunday, the dining hall's four walls and trusses were in place.

"It's the type of coming together for a common goal that just makes you feel good about the world," said Connie Jaquess, wife of the camp director.

Worrell said many of the contractors and weekend carpenters are the fathers of former campers. They traveled on their own time and resources from across New Mexico, Oklahoma and Texas, and from Florida, to help the camp.

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# Poisonous plants pose a danger to area livestock

An alert warning ranchers and pet owners about an outbreak of poisonous plants has been issued by the Soil Conservation Service of the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Hollis Fuchs, local soil conservationist, said because of the mild past winter, Redstem peavine, also called Emory milkvetch, a locoweed, is showing up in Lincoln County this spring in greater than normal quantities.

This plant is being found at elevations of about 5,000 feet to 6,000 feet, and may show up later at higher elevation, Fuchs said.

This poisonous locoweed is an annual or winter annual with a prostrate (horizontal) growth habit. Individual plants may cover a diameter of a few inches up to 30 inches. It is green and develops small, blue pea-like flowers, usually in March, April and May.

After flowering, the plants develop small seed pods similar to tiny peas. Stems often become red near the time of flowering. The flowers are beginning to show in Oscura, Carrizozo, Ancho and White Oaks areas at this time.

"This plant contains toxic nitro compounds that are poisonous to both birds and mammals. Ruminants (animals that chew for long periods) are more susceptible to poisoning than are monogastric animals."

Fuchs said the toxic symptoms may be gradual and long term, or sudden with a short course of symptoms followed by permanent debilitation or death.

"Animals show general dullness and become 'locoed' with an unsteady, somewhat sideway gait and overall weakness, particularly in the hindquarters," Fuchs said.

"Animals may stumble over small objects and walk directly into barriers such as water troughs or fences. Poisoned animals often have pocked fetlock joints. Respiration is labored and audible, urination is abnormally frequent, and froth appears at the nose as the lungs become congested.

"Animals collapse and die of cardiac and respiratory failure."

Quick action could save a poisoned animal.

"It should be taken very seriously when symptoms occur," Fuchs said. "There is no satisfactory treatment for advanced nitro poisoning, but affected animals should be cared for. A veterinarian should be consulted regarding animal treatment needs."

Animals should not graze peavine-infested range until the seed has shattered and plants have dried up, he said.

"Commonly, the time of greatest concern is from mid-March until late May," Fuchs said. "Whenever livestock show symptoms of the 'loco syndrome,' the animals should be gently, but immediately moved to a non-infested pasture, or placed in a holding pen and fed and watered."

"The difference between a lethal and non-lethal dose of the toxin is small. A small increase in dosage can cause acute poisoning and death within a few hours. For these reasons, affected animals should be prevented from eating more peavine."

Peavine began germinating last fall and emerged in small quantities, he said. The plants survived over the mild winter and had a head start for growth this spring.

"The spring moisture we've had, along with the mild temperatures, has resulted in additional germination for what appears to be a bumper crop of this poisonous weed," Fuchs said. "This vetch is poisonous at all stages of growth, and animals may show symptoms of the loco syndrome before the flowers appear or the peavine is noticed."

"The nitro content peaks about April 1-15. It usually decreases after the early pod stage."

For assistance in identifying suspected poisonous plants or plants of any type, consult with plant science professionals with the soil conservation service, the extension service the U.S. Forest Service or the New Mexico Forestry Division.

This convention was the first to use voting machines for the delegates to cast their votes. This shortened the time necessary for voting.

Lincoln County Democrats had a full delegation and several alternates attending.

## Busted water pipe shuts down lunch business

Just in time for the lunch rush yesterday, a water pipe broke at the MainStreet construction site, forcing many restaurants between Win, Place and Show and Cattle Baron to shut down for two hours.

Deputy village manager Alan Briley said a front-end loader nicked a stop valve in front of Win, Place and Show, and crews had to re-route the water until the break was repaired.

Restaurants including Si Señor, In-Espresso-ble coffeehouse, and La Terraza were forced to close their doors.

Fred Poulos managed to keep

Cafe Rio open, but he said he definitely lost sales.

"We ran out of dishes and had to go to paper products," he said. "Couldn't serve coffee or soft drinks. What's distressing is that nobody notified me."

Many restaurant owners were annoyed that no one informed them of the situation or gave notice of how long the water would be off. Briley said the accident affected so many people that it was impossible to notify them all.

"I think there was a public service announcement on the radio," he said.

Briley was also occupied with inspectors of the MainStreet construction yesterday. Briley said Jack Petring, from the Federal Highway Administration, gave the project a good report overall and made five minor recommendations.

Petring wants SHB Agra, the Alamogordo testing lab contracted by MainStreet, to receive certification from the state. Briley said the state highway department said no certification was necessary.

Inspectors also wanted federal wages listed on the project bulletin board, and Petring wants change orders for every phase to keep him

up to date on adjustments and quantities.

Briley also has to replace missing construction warning signs at the north end of the project. Petring rated the progress of construction unsatisfactory, and construction supervisor Bob Tackett is required to produce a revised schedule of deadlines.

"We're 20 percent complete with the project in 57 percent of the time," said Briley.

Inspectors did give verbal approval of simultaneous work on the next two phases of construction.

He also has served as chairman and member of the Water Defense


Association.

## Think About It Legislators' pockets full of tobacco money

Money talks, as the saying goes. And money buys results. But a curious fact emerges when one looks at the vast sums of money the tobacco industry pours into the pockets of our elected representatives in Congress.

This special interest money is not buying action by congressmen. Rather, it is buying apathy and compliance with the tobacco industry agenda of preserving the status quo and spiking anything that would hurt its take. Put bluntly, this means tobacco money is paying senators and congressmen to do nothing when it concerns tobacco.

It is yet another example of too many legislators, because of money, placing special interests ahead of the best interests and health of their constituents and the entire national. This is wrong, and it is another reason for the lack of respect and trust of the people for Congress.

What makes this so despicable is that tobacco kills, and nearly half a million Americans die every year because of tobacco products. It is undeniable that tobacco is the only product on the market that can kill when used as intended. And every time a tobacco-control bill is killed by Congress, thousands of Americans die. So the number one preventable cause of death in the U.S. is avoiding control



because a bunch of senators and congressmen want to pocket a pile of tobacco industry hush money.

So this ceaseless flow of tobacco money is silencing the people's so-called representatives and drowning effects to control use of a deadly drug.

Because of this inaction, dozens of measures aimed at curbing America's smoking epidemic are going down the drain.

These include bills to raise excise taxes on the sale of cigarettes, preventing tobacco advertising from targeting children as it does now and curtailing the U.S. trade representative's aggressive support of cigarette exports to Third World countries.

A thorough study by the Public Citizen Health Research Group documents that a

huge slush fund of \$2.5 million was paid during 1991 and 1992 for congressional inaction.

Proving that money matters, the study documents that members of the House and Senate receiving the most tobacco interest money were most likely to vote against tobacco control bills.

The study also showed that a disproportionate amount of money (88 percent) was funneled to those seeking re-election!

Among the top "six-pack" takers in the Senate taking tobacco industry money (who could be called the "Cigarette Pack") were Jesse Helms (R-NC) \$67,652, and Senate Minority Leader Robert Dole (R-Kansas) \$54,500. And Pete Domenici (R-NM) raked in \$24,000 in tobacco money in 1990 alone.

To his credit, Senator John Glenn (D-Ohio) was the only senator running for re-election last year who didn't take any tobacco money.

As proof that the tobacco industry gets what it pays for, a sensible amendment by Senator Jeff Bingaman (D-NM) to save money and end taxpayer subsidy of tobacco products in military commissaries by raising the prices to levels in civilian stores was defeated 55 to 43 — with the help of many "free market" senators like Pete Domenici who are so concerned about unnecessary spending, the deficit and unbalanced budgets!

## New support group tries to help people breathe just a little easier

If you are one of the hundreds of people in Lincoln County who have a chronic breathing problem, join the club — the Better Breathers Club newly established by Keith Thomas of Ruidoso Medical Supply.

Better Breathers is affiliated with the American Lung Association, which provides educational literature and resources.

Thomas said he is starting the group because it is frightening to be put on oxygen, and he feels that a social and educational group for people with breathing problems would improve many people's quality of life.

"I've seen the fear in people's eyes when I bring them their equipment and show them how it works," he said. "My business partner was part of the Better Breathers Club in Clovis, and I thought we should start one here."

Thomas said more than 300 people in Lincoln County are on oxygen.

"There's no telling how many have asthma or use inhalers," he said.

Better Breathers is for anyone who has a chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD), such as asthma or emphysema. The group will meet once a month starting April 8, and each meeting will feature a speaker and free pulse oximetry screenings, which measures how much oxygen is reaching the tissues.

For the first meeting, Dr. Gary Jackson will talk about the therapeutic use of metered dosage inhalers.

Refreshments will be served, and there will be time for socializing.

After the presentation, Dr. Jackson will answer questions on any pulmonary subject.

Thomas plans to bring in doctors, respiratory therapists and physical therapists as speakers. He

also plans to organize Better Breathers into committees; a steering committee for the group, a committee to make reminder calls, and a committee to help with transportation.

Participants can also put themselves on the mailing list for the Huff and Puff newsletter published by the American Lung Association.

Thomas stressed that no one will be pushing medical supply products at the meetings.

"This is not a promotional thing for my business," he said.

Thomas, who is a former fireman, arson investigator and paramedic, said he is concerned about the health, safety and peace of mind of people with breathing problems.
