## Update speakers report the village is doing fine

### Bull Ring auctioned to telephone bidder

The Bull Ring, auctioned off Saturday by R.P. Morton Company, sold for \$375,000 to an anonymous telephone bidder.

R.P. Morton has not yet released the buyer's name, but staff assured everyone that bidding by phone was legitimate. According to rumor, the buyer is Cattle Baron, Inc. When contacted by **The Ruidoso News** at Cattle Baron's Roswell headquarters, Michelle Wilson said Cattle Baron had no comment and was preparing a press release.

The buyer was unable to attend the auction, but close to 80 people filled the lounge at The Bull Ring. The auctioneer started the bidding at \$425,000, but got no takers.

Everything inside the building, down to the silverware and napkins, is included in the sale price. The buyer is eligible for a 15-year loan at 8.5 percent from the Small Business Administration and had to give 10 percent of his bid as earnest money.

### Judge's race draws five candidates

The seat for Division II Magistrate Judge is expected to be the next hotly contested political race in Ruidoso.

Incumbent William R. Butts, a Democrat, will face Danny B. Garcia in the June primary. Garcia recently ran unsuccessfully for Ruidoso municipal judge.

Three Republicans will compete for that party's nomination: Trinidad Zepeda of Ruidoso Downs, Paul Wersich of Ruidoso and Ken Nosker of San Patricio.

Magistrate judges are paid \$47,060 a year.

News that millionaire race track owner R. D. Hubbard is ready to proceed with construction of a companion hotel to the Ruidoso community civic events center set a positive mood Friday at Community Update '94.

Mayor Jerry Shaw's announcement was greeted with enthusiastic applause by the 200 business and government leaders attending the annual event organized by **The Ruidoso News** and MainStreet Ruidoso.

"R.D. Hubbard contacted me two days ago and he's ready to move ahead," Shaw said.

Since Hubbard bowed out in 1993 after tangling with three former councilors and then-mayor Victor Alonso, attempts to line up another hotel builder have failed, although representatives of several chains have looked at the area. But with new mayor Shaw and four new council members, Hubbard apparently has decided he can work with this group to fulfill the original concept.

Of the trio envisioned, The Links Golf Course has been completed by Hubbard and the village built the civic events center, leaving the hotel as the missing ingredient to attract larger conventions.

Shaw said 65,000 people already have crossed the threshold of the events center. Next year, the annual Governor's Conference is scheduled and in 1996, the annual meeting of the New Mexico Municipal League should draw 1,000 visitors, she said.

The main speaker for the Community Update luncheon, Mike Cerletti, State Department of Tourism Secretary, was introduced by master of ceremonies and MainStreet member Don Dutton. He told guests that the state is doing its part in advertising Lincoln County and Southeast New Mexico.

"Although some people don't believe it, 40 percent of our advertising is about northern New Mexico, 40 percent is Southern New Mexico and 20 percent is the Interstate 40 corridor," he said.

It's refreshing to encounter a town that welcomes tourism like Ruidoso, Cerletti said. He hears a lot of complaints from people who, once they have moved to Santa Fe, don't want any more tourists.

To find out what residents of Santa Fe really think, three surveys were conducted from 1989-1993.

"Seventy-seven percent of the people in Santa Fe responded that they love tourism and don't want less," Cerletti said. "I listen to you folks talking about how you appreciate tourism. I wish the naysayers would realize the importance."

"Tourism brings in about \$5,000 for every household in the state, he said.

"It is number one in employees and number two as an overall industry," Cerletti said. "The extractive (mining, oil and gas) still is number one."

New Mexico appears to be a destination for foreign visitors on their second trip to the United States, he said. His department has targeted the first market, the Eastern states, "so they hear about us and it's working."

South America is beginning to impact all over the United States, but Canadian visitors still presents a weak market. Accepting the Canadian dollar "at par" instead of at its current 75-cent value compared to the American dollar would help, he said.

Of the 340,000 inquiries about New Mexico received by the tourism department, a follow up study showed that 34 percent visited the state in 1992 and a solid

41 percent in 1993.

"Virginia has the highest conversion rate in the country at 49-50 percent," Cerletti said.

Despite early scares on the deadly Hanta virus, most tourists didn't cancel, they just postponed their visits to the state until later in the summer. Inquiries still increased by 16 percent in 1993 over 1992. However, the two previous years, the number of inquiries jumped by 55 percent and 87 percent.

His department's \$1,850,000 budget is not large by the standards of many other tourist-oriented states, forcing his staff to be more creative and to seek cooperative projects, Cerletti said.

The state has received 19,000 inquiries off a recent joint advertising venture with Jeep.

The state paid \$100,000 and

## Sheriff investigates Capitan fatal beating

The battered body of an 80-year-old man was found Thursday on the floor of his Capitan home.

Lincoln County Sheriff James McSwane said Herman L. Hulem apparently was the victim of a thief who wanted to eliminate the only witness.

Hulem was struck repeatedly around the head. Several weapons owned by Hulem are believed to be missing.

"After viewing the scene and the body, I personally think the assailant wanted to beat him to death," McSwane said. "He may have been killed as early as last Monday."

Hulem's body was found by Capitan Police officers Thursday lying just inside the front door to his home at 440 Fourth Street.

Residents of the normally quiet rural village of less than 1,000 residents were shocked to hear of the

murder not far from where their children attend school. The possibility that Hulem was killed by someone he knew frightens them even more.

"There was no sign of a forced entry," McSwane said. "Either the person already was in the mobile home when Mr. Hulem arrived or he let the person inside."

"His neighbors describe him as kind of a loner. He didn't have people over."

The sheriff said the Capitan Police Department received a request from Hulem's daughter in California for a welfare check when her father failed to answer the telephone.

"They found the body about 2:50 p.m.," McSwane said. "He had been beaten about the head and shoulders with a club-type instrument."

"We have a suspected object, but we're not sure and prefer not to

# County trades roads with state

Sometimes it pays to hold out and play it tough.

For the Lincoln County Commission, it will mean the difference between receiving \$1.8-million in work from the State Department of Highways and Transportation instead of \$400,000 originally offered.

"We first started with the State Legislature and they sent us to our district engineer, who thought what we wanted was excessive," said Commission Chairman Monroy Montes. "Next we talked to our district representative on the State Highway Commission and he also thought it was too expensive, so we went the full route and appealed to the entire board."

As a result, the county will get rid of its biggest potential headache, D004 or Sierra Blanca Regional Airport Road.

"The road will belong to the state highway department from State Highway 37 through to where it connects with the north part of Highway 214," Montes said. "The important thing is that we no longer are responsible for eight miles of paved road, because in 10 years when it deteriorates, that's will be the big cost."

Part of the road, about 1.3 miles belongs to the Village of Ruidoso. Its officials also are anxious to get rid of that responsibility.

"The state commission approved the road exchange unanimously," Montes said. "They will chip seal four miles of dirt road from the airport to Fort Stanton. In the future, if it deteriorates, depending on the usage, they will pave it. They estimate the chip seal will cost \$600,000."

The county will continue to be responsible for snow removal on the airport road, which it already has been doing.

The contract should be ready for the commission's meeting April 5.

The biggest local hit comes with accepting responsibility for Devil's Canyon Road, the southern end of State Highway 214 from U.S. 70 to the intersection with the airport road.

"Devil's Canyon becomes our responsibility and will be incorporated into our county network," Montes said. "We did some work there two years ago and it didn't cost much because (road manager Bill Cupit) found material out there. I think we can find enough material in the area to upgrade it."

At one point, the county and state actually talked about a higher figure of \$3-million, Montes said.

"We accepted the \$1.8-million, because we're not out to break their backs, just upgrade the road."

Commissioner Wilton Howell,

who worked on the negotiation with the highway department, said now that the airport road is taken care of, the county can turn its attention to working out some improvements on Bonito Lake Road with the U.S. Forest Service.

Commissioners met with forest service officials about six months ago to define responsibility for the roads leading to recreation areas on federal forest land.

The commission's success with the highway department, "is a good example of being persistent and going the extra mile," he said. "We have a saying that the bashful get what the hogs left."

Howell credited county manager Andy Wynham and his administrative staff for putting together a convincing and impressive presentation for highway commission members.

"It contained all sorts of relevant data including traffic counts, our resolution, newspaper articles and a photograph showing what they had repaired. It looked like an oatmeal cookie. They were very impressed," Howell said. "We went to each individual highway commissioner first to plead our case and justify the request, then went to the whole commission."

"It shows that if you do your homework and justify, they will listen and respond."

Jeep paid \$200,000 for an eight page slick color insert to go into Condé Nast Traveler magazine with another 200,000 extra printed for handouts.

"We got five of the eight pages," Cerletti said. "That may sound like a lot of money, but it runs \$25,000 to \$55,000 for many ads in major magazines to appear on one page one time."

The insert features Jeep vehicles in New Mexico settings, a map and photographs of the state and six suggested loops tours in different regions.

Turning to more local development and progress, Mark Doth, marketing director of Ruidoso Downs Racing, spoke about the courage of R.D. Hubbard in risking millions of dollars to renovate Ruidoso Downs Race Track, to build The Links golf course with jogging, walking and hike path, and to take an old building badly in need of repair and turn it into the classic Museum of the Horse.

The golf course generated \$1.2-million in gross receipts; attendance at the museum is up 26 percent this year with 27,000 people enjoying the exhibits in 1993; and the track experienced a 9.5 percent increase in the handle over 1992. Track visitors generated \$168,609 in gross receipts and the state received \$55,000 in income tax from the track payroll of \$2.4-million, in addition to more than \$200,000 in pari-mutuel tax.

The summer season looks good for the racetrack, with 2,000 stall requests already received, he said. Labor Day weekend is 90 percent committed. Three country music artists also will perform in concerts at the track.

Tom Battin, president of MainStreet and of Ruidoso State Bank, said although the \$1.3-million streetscape sidewalk and tree planting project confronted many more challenges than originally anticipated, "Now we can see things moving along. People are getting excited as they can see

what this streetscape thing can be, how it can greatly enhance pedestrian traffic.

"It's not just for Midtown Ruidoso, because visitors stay over. It's for the benefit of every one of us. I think it's a good investment."

He thanked the village council and Mayor Shaw for their cooperation and support.

Tom Rigsby, president of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, said, "I hope it's a good summer, because I'm tired of hearing 'How does it feel to be president of the chamber the year it didn't snow.'"

He said phone inquiries about the area at the chamber have jumped from 35,000 to 41,000 in 1993 with 20,000 visitors to the

ter at Glencoe and revamping of subdivision regulations. He said the county must perfect a balancing act to allow development and tourism, but protect the rural lifestyle that drew people to the county in the first place.

H. John Underwood, Ruidoso's Democrat state representative, ran down the impressive and long list of projects and money he has brought back from the legislature.

His freshman year, he secured \$200,000 for his constituents. The second year, he began to understand the process and brought back \$947,000. His third year, the amount increased to \$956,000. This past session, the total jumped to \$2,691,000. Every community in the county received something.

Underwood said the state is pursuing several exciting new industries and has authorized half million dollars toward a study about construction of the NASA Space Port in New Mexico.

He has asked for an appointment to the Horizons Task Force, a new group that will be charged with the job of coming up with a recommendation for five-year development plan for the state.

Locally, two elements that will influence Lincoln County's economy is the future of Fort Stanton Hospital, which now appears secure as a long term nursing care facility with legislative funding, and the state constitutional amendment vote on video gambling in November.

Underwood said his work consists of "co-creating" with local entities successful projects for the county.

chamber. The inquiries came from all 50 states and several foreign countries. The heaviest numbers came from Texas, California, New York, New Mexico, Florida, Arizona, Oklahoma, Pennsylvania, Colorado and Wisconsin.

Rigsby said he was impressed with the membership drive directed by executive director Joan Bailey.

"We have close to 500 members, which is comparable to chamber membership in the city of Roswell (with 50,000 residents)," he said.

Shaw spoke of the many indicators of progress the village has to celebrate, including a 247 percent increase in building permits, an increase in gross receipts, plans for covering the village swimming pool for year-round use, creating trails, improving parks and recreation.

Part of that effort will be to develop Grindstone Lake recreation area with RV spaces, "and much more," adding to wind surfing and fishing, she said.

More than half a million dollars received from the State Legislature will assure the creation of another water source at Grindstone, she said, adding, "Water is essential for growth."

Lincoln County Commission Chairman Monroy Montes talked about plans for a rural events cen-

# Fire damages Rancho Ruidoso condo

Fire in an electrical wall heater commanded a three department response to the Rancho Ruidoso Condominiums in Alto Saturday morning about 7 a.m.

Prompt response from Bonito Fire Department with assistance from Ruidoso and Fort Stanton fire departments confined the fire to the interior of the manager's office and to the common wall between that unoccupied office and the occupied first unit.

No injuries resulted.

Condo manager David Wozny said he would move operations to another condo in the six unit building and continue business as usual.

"We are running nearly full this week," he said, of the time share operation.

### Pop goes the heater

A loud noise that sounded like a "pop" woke Charles Beitner Saturday morning as he slept in the loft of that first unit. Mr and Mrs. Beitner from North Carolina had checked in Friday evening.

"The noise sounded like it was coming from the heater, so I went downstairs to investigate," Beitner told firefighters. "The wall heater (in the common wall with the office) was glowing orange. I knew that

wasn't right. So I woke my wife and went to the laundry room to find a telephone and called 911."

When Mrs. Beitner awoke she smelled smoke and immediately began carrying their possessions outside.

"I'm surprised there was no smoke alarm in our unit," she commented. "Or a fire extinguisher," added her husband.

After putting the fire out, fire officials checked all six units in the building, they found a small fire extinguisher in one unit, but none in the others, including the Beitner's unit. Fire officials also found no smoke alarms or detectors in any units in that building.

Manager Wozny said that the other two buildings in the condominium complex did contain smoke alarms, although the building where the fire occurred had none.

This statement came as a surprise to one of the firefighters who said he installed smoke alarms and fire extinguishers in that building about three years ago. He pointed out holes in the wall where he said the alarms had once hung.

"I don't know what happened to them, but you can see this is where they used to be."

### Heater was the source

It took firefighters only minutes

to quell the blaze, then fire officials began looking for the cause.

"The worst fire damage was to a table or desk that was near the wall heater in the office. That desk had a large corner burned off," said a fire official.

Smoke damaged the rest of the small office equipment including a computer and typewriter.

"But the phone still works," said Wozny in mild surprise.

Unit 1, the Beitner's unit, sustained damage to the common wall and ceiling and smoke damage to both floors. In addition a television set near the wall heater suffered a burnt cord and case distortion from the heat.

Fire officials also noted that although the heaters electrical wires as well as the thermostat had melted, the circuit breakers did not trip. Otero County Electric Co-op cut off the power to the all electric building while firefighters worked, but restored power to the five undamaged units before fire fighters began leaving at 9:30 a.m..

When fire officials rechecked the building late Saturday afternoon they confirmed no flareups and the situation stable.

Firefighters found their initial efforts hampered by gusting winds, locked interior doors and picture taking sightseers.

# Chamber asks council to OK banners

Request for a banner display, concessionaires at Grindstone Lake and the Short Street bridge are three word-worn subjects that will be hashed over again at the Ruidoso Village Council meeting Tuesday.

Joan Bailey, director of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce will ask the council to include the chamber building as a designated location for banner display.

Currently banners are being allowed at four sites, including: Highway 70 at the "Y" by Ruidoso sign; School House Park, tennis court area; Free Parking Lot, Midtown

area; and Civic Events Center entry drive.

According to a memo from village manager Gary Jackson to Mayor Jerry Shaw, a proposal to provide canoe concession at Grindstone Lake was received by Debbie Jo Almager, parks and recreation director.

Almager recommends that the village deny the proposal. It would appear that the Parks and Recreation Commission also is against concessions at the lake, and will explain that reasoning before the council.

On March 21, 1994, village code enforcement officer Thomas Chavez

observed work in process on the Short Street Bridge, the only access to Susan Merrill's home on the Rio Ruidoso.

Village planner Cleatus Richards requests that the council authorize him to proceed with demolition and removal of the bridge.

Richards said the bridge has not been stabilized and remains a hazard due "to potential to obstruct flood flows."

The bridge is in the proposed River Walk area, and without the bridge access, the Merrill's would be landlocked from their property.

release that information at this time."

The Capitan officers notified the medical investigator, who responded and removed the body for an autopsy in Albuquerque.

"The following day, at 10:30 a.m. Friday, my department was officially notified by the Capitan police that they were dealing with a suspected homicide," McSwane said.

The sheriff said he, the district attorney and three deputies met

with and interviewed the Capitan police officer and chief before his department assumed responsibility for the investigation.

"I've requested the New Mexico crime lab to come down and check for latent prints and to recover evidence that may have not been disturbed," McSwane said. "We took in a video camera. The house had been ransacked, especially the bedroom."

Hulem lived in a three bedroom single-wide mobile and moved to Capitan more than 10 years ago. McSwane did not know his previous

type of employment. He was not wealthy man, but did have some financial resources.

"When I returned from viewing the body in Albuquerque Saturday, I met with the victim's relatives," McSwane said. "We believe some guns are missing; he used them for hunting and for self-defense."

Hulem's vehicle was undisturbed. McSwane said neighbors reported they didn't see or hear anything unusual.

"We have no suspects, but the investigation is just getting under way."

# Blondie, Thumper would make great family pets

Good with children of all ages, Blondie, with her reddish buff-color coat, would enhance the lifestyle of anyone who appreciates a sturdy and loyal friend of the four-legged variety.

She was brought to the Lincoln County Humane Society animal shelter from her home in Mesalero with five puppies, because the owners said they couldn't afford to care for her.

Spaying Blondie before she

reproduced would have alleviated part of that problem, said shelter manager Esther Harper.

The good-natured show mix recently was separated from her last puppy and is ready to be adopted by someone who will give her proper attention and have her spayed.

Her previous owners said she rides well in a car and shelter workers haven't noticed any bad habits. Blondie is used to being outside, but even big dogs can be trained to stay inside overnight.

Literature is available at the shelter describing crate training, one of the fastest and surest methods.

"She seems OK with other dogs, but may need a slight period of readjustment after losing her pups," Harper said. Blondie is a medium-sized dog, but strong.

Thumper, a black "who-knows" mixture, is a smaller female, who arrived when she was five weeks old and survived the many bouts of diseases that often kill young animals at the shelter before their

protective shots can take effect.

Now about five months old, Thumper won't grow much larger judging from her delicate paws. Her coat is short, but softer than a typical Labrador.

"We call her Thumper, because we always know where she is when we come into the shelter. She wags her tail so hard, it hits the side of her cage and thumps," said shelter secretary Kathy Tetreault. "She's had all three of her distemper/Parvo shots. She's one of those who survived and we want desperately to see her have a real chance at a real home."

"She's sweet, eager to please and just glad to be let out with the full-grown dogs (a privilege given last week when she reached the right age)."

Another long time resident of the shelter, who also is delicately built and would be an excellent companion for a woman is Panda, a sheltie/shepherd mix with a medium-length black coat and a face accented with brown eyebrows and cheeks.

When construction begins on the expansion to the shelter, space will be at a premium. Dogs who have been there longer may have to make room for newcomers.

"She's a very cute dog," Tetreault said of Panda. "She is wary of some men, but very affectionate with women and extremely protective."

"She too is a survivor, even pulling through when her sister died. We have hoped and hoped a good owner would choose her."





# EDC regroups with new officers

According to Richard Mound, new president of the Economic Development Corporation's board of directors, there are many businesses seriously interested in moving to Lincoln County and they want industrial districts.

At a board meeting Thursday, Mound said EDC is still waiting for area communities to give them information about plans for industrial parks since only Carrizozo has one.

"We sent inquiries to all the communities last year and never received a response," said Mound.

Mound and other directors noted that rental space is scarce in Ruidoso and surrounding areas.

"People are here and looking for jobs," said Mound. He said Realtors say that young people are moving into the area with and without jobs.

This was the first meeting for new directors Carl Bartley and Mike Daulton, and it was Mound's first meeting as president. In an effort to end the board's history of failing to make a quorum, Mound is compartmentalizing the corporation's work, asking each director to join a committee.

"I think this will give everyone an interest in coming to the meetings," he said.

Bob Boebinger volunteered to lead an agriculture/rural issues committee. Mike Daulton will lead a tourism committee to bring more attractions to this area.

"We need something for tourists to do at times like this when there's not enough snow," said Mound. He added that EDC could help new businesses get start-up assistance from the state and other sources.

Vice president Glen Crane clarified for the board the distinction between EDC's role in tourism and the Chamber of Commerce's role.

"The chamber's job is to promote businesses that are already here," he said. "Our job is to bring in new businesses."

Karen Kopp, EDC executive director, said the chamber sends many inquiries her way.

Jim Miller suggested a committee for service industries.

"We're making an effort to increase health care services in this area and that's going to create jobs," said Miller.

County commissioner L. Ray Nunley, who took Wilton Howell's place on the board, said this area is going to directly benefit from NAFTA and that EDC should help

the county position itself to take advantage of that. Incoming businesses will need to establish credit in U.S. banks and it may be possible to designate either Highway 54 or Highway 70 as a corridor for duty free trucking.

Kopp said EDC brochures need updated inserts, and she said an EDC advertisement in *Corporate Expansion and Relocation*, a Southern California magazine with a circulation of 170,000, drew 10 responses as of February 28. This is the first advertising EDC has done, costing a total of \$7,751 for two different ads to run twice throughout the year.

Kopp said she made 51 good contacts at a recent electronics industry trade show in California. She attended the trade show under the auspices of the Business Quarter.

At the meeting, Kopp proposed several ideas for fundraisers, but the board was largely unresponsive to them. She suggested athletic tournaments such as golf, tennis and bowling. Dick Mound proposed a 3-on-3 basketball tournament, which he said is a big money-maker. The decision on fundraising was left up to the executive committee, which meets again in one month.

Kopp reminded the directors that they were considering a fund raiser because of criticism that EDC simply asks for donations rather than doing something to raise money.

Boebinger asked why EDC members pay no annual dues, and Crane immediately calculated that an annual fee of just \$50 per member would generate \$10,000 for EDC. The executive committee will consider this possibility at their next meeting, also.

Crane also strongly recommended that EDC not rely on the newspaper to keep their members informed.

"We should send them (EDC members) and all members of the village council and county commission schedules of our meetings and regular reports on our activities," he said.

Nunley told Kopp, "The newspaper will print the news; it's up to us to publish the good stuff."

"The truth," Crane added. "The directors agreed that it was not good policy to take money from members then ignore them until time for the annual meeting or for donation drives. Jim Miller offered to help Kopp put out a newsletter."

At the Ruidoso Village Council budget meeting April 13, EDC hopes to receive at least \$20,000. With a fundraising goal of \$59,000 and a current balance of \$17,150, Kopp said she would like to reach \$20,000 in the next few weeks in order to match the '93-94 allotment from the village.

According to Gary Jackson, Ruidoso village manager, there is no \$20,000 set aside for EDC. This \$20,000 figure has been discussed at previous EDC meetings, and apparently the board is confused and believes that if they raise \$20,000 the village has set aside funds to match it.

This is not in the village budget, according to Jackson.

Despite Mound's announcement regarding the interest of prospects in industrial districts, and despite his request for someone to lead an industrial park committee, no volunteers came forward. Mound said that he and Glen Crane would probably lead that effort themselves.

## GTE callers will have to dial area code 505

Beginning June 19, long-distance calls originating and completing in area code 505 should include the area code ("0" or "1" + the area code number + the seven-digit directory number).

There continues to be a growing demand for telephone lines within the 505 area code, according to a recent news release. This expanding need from population growth, economic progress and new technology-cellular telephones, fax machines, paging services, computer modems and others-has required a change in dialing proce-

dures for long-distance calls within the area code.

From now until June 19, callers have the option of using the area code when dialing long-distance calls within the 505 area code.

After June 19, only long-distance calls within the 505 area code using the ten-digit number (area code + the directory number) will be completed. After that date, customers will hear a recording if they dial "1" or "0" + the directory number. The recording will ask the customer to dial the number again using the 505 area code.

GTE is asking customers to be sure telephone equipment requiring dialing reprogramming or modification is changed by June 19. Equipment that may require attention includes PBX systems, key systems, cellular phones, fax machines, computer modems, automatic dialers, voice mail, pagers/beepers, burglar/fire alarms, speed calling and call forwarding features.

# Bears get up and out after winter's sleep

Temperatures are warming, the trees are starting to put on leaves and people are beginning to get strange urges to get outdoors. This is a sure sign that spring is on its way. Another sign that spring is right around the corner is that soon bears will be awakening from their long winter sleep.

Back in November, the first bears started to go into their dens. Pregnant females are the first to den up, followed by young bears and females that are not pregnant. Finally, by the middle of December the older males will decide it's time to get out of the cold.

In the springtime, the process is reversed and older males will emerge from their dens in the middle of March. By the middle of April, most bears will be out of their dens. Because they have been sleeping for so long, bears will normally stay close to their dens for a couple of weeks feeding on spring grasses to build up their strength and to allow their paws to get toughened up.

The black bear is our state mammal, but there are still a lot of myths surrounding this animal. For example, look at their size. Most people, especially those that see a bear in the wild, imagine that they weigh 800 pounds and stand 10 feet tall. However, a full grown adult male will normally weigh about 275 pounds with the female smaller at about 180 pounds. The largest bear recorded in New

Mexico was a monster at 495 pounds. They don't stand on their hind legs very often, and when on all fours will be about the size of a large dog.

Black bears also aren't necessarily black. Color can range from blond to cinnamon to brown to jet black or even albino.

Female bears give birth to cubs in January or February while they are in their den. Number can range from one to three with most having twins. Cubs are very small at birth weighing about a half a pound. They are very dependent on their mother when young and feed while the mother is sleeping.

When they emerge from the den in the springtime they will weigh from five to 10 pounds. They will stay with their mother for almost two years.

For a long time bears were not considered true hibernators. Animals classed as true hibernators drastically reduce their tempera-

ture, respiration, metabolism and heart rate. Bears do the same things, but not to the same degree. They may even wake up and wander around from time to time and can be aroused by an intruder in their den. True hibernators, such as rock squirrels, do have to wake up about every two weeks in order to do their business otherwise toxins build up in their blood stream and will kill them.

Bears on the other hand can sleep for four months without ever having to urinate. They have some way of actually breaking down the uric acid in their blood and forming it into protein to feed their bodies, so maybe they are the only true hibernator!

Another myth about bears is their diet. For centuries people have been under the mistaken impression that bears kill and eat a lot of animals. Most of their diet consists of nuts, berries, insects and green plants.

Bears will rarely, if ever, waste energy by running down and killing a deer or elk. As for attacking people, all the bears I have ever seen in the wild took off so fast when they knew someone was around that their back feet tried to outrun their front feet. Most confrontations between bears and people occur when bears are hungry and people have left some good smelling trash around. In these cases, the bears are after the garbage, not the people.

Gutierrez is a junior majoring in psychology.

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
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

### Register now to vote in June

During recent municipal elections, many citizens relinquished their right to choose the people who will make decisions regarding the health and welfare of their hometowns. As usual, many people didn't bother to vote when it came time to choose mayors, councilors and municipal judges in area villages. Either they didn't care or they had a lot of faith in their neighbors' ability to make good choices.

Soon voters will have another chance to make important decisions. Candidates will be chosen in the June primaries to run in the general election in November. The offices to be filled include state representative, county commissioners, county treasurer and magistrate judge.

Voters will be picking a state legislator to represent Ruidoso and Mescalero in Santa Fe, where he or she will vote on issues that range from public lands to education to ethics and funding for everything from civic centers to water improvements. County commissioners will be elected to make decisions regarding county taxes, county roads, zoning and land use, funding requests and even the county hospital. The treasurer is entrusted with county money and the magistrate judge could well be deciding your fate if you find yourself in court for some reason.

Isn't it worth any citizen's time and energy to vote?

But, you can't vote if you're not registered, and the voters roll closes a month before any election. That means, if you're not registered to vote, you'd better take care of that right now — today.

To register to vote, go to the county clerk's office in the courthouse in Carrizozo, to any municipal building in the county or to a bank. If you aren't registered, you can't vote.

## Run for public office? Are you crazy? Not me!

Unfortunately it is not uncommon that you hear the above remark when the question is asked "Why don't you run for public office?" The sad fact is that those who make this statement are sometimes the most capable persons available to hold public office.

Ruidoso has among its citizens many retirees who live here just to enjoy the climate and others who run businesses, many with previous business experience in operations, finance, engineering, personnel and sales and marketing. Bringing this group into public office would expand the overall capabilities and performance of the council.

Why are so many capable applicants for public service reluctant to try their hand in running for public office?

Looking back over the years discloses some interesting facts.

Those who aspire for public office do not necessarily represent a cross section of those better qualified for office, but they are reluctant to run, win and face the consequences.

The quality and quantity of those aspiring to public office may have a common denominator — the size and population of the town or city.



Small towns have the advantage or disadvantage of being able to investigate each candidate for public office to the point of complete discovery — mostly personal with little attention being paid to that candidate's background in education, operating a business, knowledge of budgets, personnel, etc.

The focus of interest supported by the questions asked and answered in Meet the Candidates forums generally concerns the candidates' family, church affiliation, love for Ruidoso's climate and the Ruidoso River.

So, good, honest, well caring, folks are elected without any of the basic background of how to conduct the business of Ruidoso's \$15 million budget.

It would be interesting to ask those who have served on the council in the past "would you run for public office again?" The answers are very interesting and would disclose the basic reason for the negative answers to the question.

It is not the intention here to denigrate the present or past councils, but simply to point out the voting public should be given a wider and broader choice of candidates when voting for candidates for the next council or elective office.

Let those with experience in business or activities relating to a business come forth and declare if Ruidoso is to continue to grow as an important tourist center.

There are instances where organizations or groups have formed to present a slate of candidates for the voters to choose from. Sometimes the system works — often does not.

It is time for good people of Ruidoso to wake up. No longer is it enough to fail to vote and then follow by being critical of the council's actions.

The ball is in your court!

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# Abandoned camp was temporary community for German ship crew interned at Fort Stanton

Described as good neighbors, industrious and polite, a crew of 410 German seamen spent the years of World War II interned at a former Civilian Conservation Corps Camp next to Fort Stanton Hospital.

To prevent the capture by the British of their 32,000 ton passenger ship, the S.S. Columbus, the crew scuttled the \$40-million vessel in December 1939, 800 miles off the American coast.

They had a fine swimming pool and an old adobe building for a theater," recalls Francis Shaw of Captain, whose husband worked for Fort Stanton for nearly 40 years ending in 1965.

More guests of the government than prisoners, most of the men were multilingual and spoke fluent English and were given a friendly welcome by local residents.

Using the abandoned camp as a basis, they created a small, but efficient community and waited out the end of the war.

They constructed buildings out of adobe, swam laps in a swimming pool with a sophisticated drainage system and diving board, and exercised in a gymnasium that still bears the construction date "Erbout 1944" over the main entrance.

"It was a pretty artistic group of men. Later the building was used for a skating rink for the kids."

"They built shacks for themselves and raised chickens and planted some crops."

Long-time resident Bert Mintner agreed. "If they wanted anything, they tried to make it themselves," he said.

"They were a very nice bunch of men with quite a lot of freedom," Mrs. Shaw said. "The border patrol had control of it."

But security consisted mostly of two daily roll calls, flood lights and


a wire fence erected after Pearl Harbor, she said.

"Only a few got away, but we didn't think about it," Mrs. Shaw said. "In those days, we didn't even lock our doors."


After four and a half years at the end of the war, the crew was released, except for four buried in the fort cemetery.

A flood on the Rio Bonito, the stream separating the camp from Fort Stanton, washed away much of what they built, Mrs. Shaw said, including a swinging bridge across the water.

However, the skeleton of the crew's gymnasium, the crumbling frame of the swimming pool and several gutted cottages still stand as testimony to their time in Lincoln County.

**DISTRIBUTING AND SELLING CABLE TELEVISION SERVICES TO THE INHABITANTS OF LINCOLN COUNTY; SETTING FORTH CONDITIONS ACCOMPANYING THE GRANT OF THIS FRANCHISE; PROVIDING FOR COUNTY REGULATIONS; AND DESCRIBING PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION OF ITS PROVISIONS.**

WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners of the County of Lincoln have the lawful authority to enact ordinances for the health, safety, and welfare of the citizens of Lincoln County; and WHEREAS, it has become necessary to enact a new Ordinance relating to the grant of a Franchise to Rifkin Cable Income Partners, L.P., d/b/a Lincoln Cablevision, to use the public right-of-ways of Lincoln County for the installation and maintenance of its utility system; and WHEREAS, the County of Lincoln has been notified of the pending sale of Rifkin Cable Income Partners, L.P., d/b/a Lincoln Cablevision, from Rifkin Cable Income Partners, L.P., a Delaware limited partnership, to Alert Cable T.V., Inc., a Georgia corporation, d/b/a CVI Cablevision Industries; and WHEREAS, the County of Lincoln hereby expressly authorizes the transfer of this Franchise to Alert Cable T.V., Inc., after passage, if the pending sale is consummated and Alert Cable T.V., Inc., becomes the owner of Rifkin Cable Income Partners, L.P., d/b/a Lincoln Cablevision; NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of County Commissioners in and for the County of Lincoln, State of New Mexico, as follows:

**SECTION 1 - REPEAL:** Franchise Ordinance 16 passed by the Board of County Commissioners of Lincoln County on May 7, 1970, and filed for record in the Lincoln County Clerk's Office on May 11, 1970, in Book 34 of Miscellaneous Records at Pages 26 through 28, inclusive, and all amendments, revisions, and addenda thereto are hereby repealed in their entirety.

**SECTION 2 - SHORT TITLE:** This Franchise Ordinance shall be known and may be cited as the "RIFKIN CABLE INCOME PARTNERS, L.P., D/B/A LINCOLN CABLEVISION FRANCHISE."

**SECTION 3 - DEFINITIONS:** For the purposes of the Franchise Ordinance, the following terms, phrases, words and their derivatives shall have the meaning given herein. When not inconsistent with the context, words used in the present tense include the future; words in the plural number include the singular number; and words in the singular number shall include the plural number. The word "shall" is always mandatory and not merely directory. The captions for each paragraph herein are for convenience only, and such captions shall have no force of law, are not to

be a part of the paragraphs set forth, and are not to be considered in construing the language of paragraph.

(a) "Company" is the grantee of rights under this permit. Company name: Rifkin Cable Income Partners, L.P., d/b/a Lincoln Cablevision.

(b) "Commission" is the Board of County Commissioners of Lincoln County, State of New Mexico.

(c) "Persons" is any person, firm, partnership, association, corporation, company, organization, or individual of any kind.

(d) "System" shall mean the utility systems necessary to and incidental to the providing, distributing and selling of cable television service to the inhabitants of Lincoln County, and access to Grantee's system by its customers outside of Lincoln County.

(e) "Grantor" is Lincoln County, State of New Mexico.

(f) "Grantee" is Rifkin Cable Income Partners, L.P., d/b/a Lincoln Cablevision.

(g) "Franchise Area" - The grant authorized by this Ordinance is inclusive of the geographic area bounded by the political subdivision of Lincoln County excluding the corporate boundaries of the various municipalities located within the County.

(h) "Public Right-of-Way" - The real property interest owned or claimed by the County by deed, dedication, or other recorded instrument, or unrecorded prescriptive easement.

**SECTION 4 - GRANT OF AUTHORITY:**

A. There is hereby granted by Grantor to the Grantee the right and privilege to use the public right-of-ways for their utility systems, as applicable, as necessary and incidental to the use of the same for the inhabitants of Lincoln County or other customers of Grantee beyond the boundaries of the County.

B. Without limiting the generality of the foregoing, this Franchise grant shall and does hereby include the right to utilize the public right-of-ways in the County; to install, erect, operate, and to acquire the use of, by leasing or licensing, any and all utility systems necessary to and incidental to the delivery of cable television service, and the right to repair, replace, and extend said utility systems.

**SECTIONS 5 - COMPLIANCE WITH APPLICABLE LAWS AND ORDINANCES:**

The Grantee shall, at all times during the life of this Franchise, be subject to all lawful exercise of the police power of the County, as codified by statute, ordinance, case law or the common law of New Mexico. Grantee further agrees to be bound by such reasonable regulations as the County shall hereafter provide pursuant to its police powers authorized by common law. Additionally, Grantee shall, at all times during the life of this Franchise, comply with and abide by

all of the laws of the State of New Mexico and the laws of the United States of America, to the extent such laws and regulations are applicable to Grantee's operations.

**SECTION 6 - LIABILITY, INDEMNIFICATION, AND INSURANCE:**

A. The Grantee hereby warrants and represents that Grantee has in place a program of insurance such as to enable Grantee to pay any liabilities arising from the construction, installation, repair, operation or maintenance of the Grantee's system, if caused by the negligent act(s) and/or omission(s) of the Grantee and/or Grantee's officer(s), employee(s), or agent(s) as follows:

(i) \$500,000 for bodily injury or death to any one person;

(ii) \$250,000.00 for property damage resulting from any one occurrence;

(iii) Within the limit of \$1,000,000.00 for bodily injury or death and property damage from any one occurrence.

B. The Grantee further warrants and represents that it shall maintain, throughout the term of this Franchise, insurance

at least equal to the amount of the above-stated limits for all liabilities assumed herein. In the case Grantee is able to show to the satisfaction of Grantor that it is financially solvent and that providing insurance coverage through a third party is unnecessary, the Grantor shall issue Grantee a certificate of self-insurance to that effect, which shall be filed in lieu of the certificate of insurance.

C. The Grantor shall notify the Grantee within thirty (30) days after the presentation of any claim evidenced by the filing of a complaint in appropriate state or federal court, or demand, whether by suit or otherwise, made against the Grantor on account of any alleged act or conduct on the part of the Grantee arising from activities carried out under authority of this Franchise.

D. The Grantee hereby agrees to indemnify and otherwise release the Grantor from all claims by third parties arising from the construction, installation, repair, operation, or maintenance of the Grantee's utility system, if caused by the negligent act(s) and/or omission(s) of the Grantee and/or Grantee's officer(s), employee(s), and/or agent(s).

**SECTION 7 - COMPLAINT PROCEDURE:**

The Grantee will maintain a business office for the purpose of receiving inquiries and complaints from its subscribers and/or customers.

The Grantee will establish a procedure for resolution of complaints consistent with the regulating requirements of the Public Service Commission or the State Corporation Commission, as appropriate. In the event Grantee is not subject to either Public Service Commission or State Corporation Commission regulations, it shall adopt

and implement a complaint procedure substantially equivalent to that required under a Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity issued by the Public Service Commission.

**SECTION 8 - OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE OF SYSTEM:**

Grantee agrees to operate its system in compliance with all applicable rules and regulations of the State Corporation Commission, Public Service Commission, the U.S. Department of Transportation or other appropriate body(ies) governing said operational services. Grantor agrees that if any terms and conditions of this Franchise which are in conflict or duplicate those of an appropriate state or federal regulatory agency, those regulations shall have precedence. Inclusive of the following provisions:

(a) The Grantee shall render efficient service, make repairs promptly, and interrupt service only for good cause and for the shortest time possible.

(b) The Grantee shall at all times employ ordinary care and shall install and maintain in use commonly accepted devices for preventing failures and accidents which are likely to cause damages, injuries, and nuisances to the public.

(c) The Grantee shall install and maintain its systems in compliance with applicable federal and state code and regulatory requirements regarding installations contiguous or adjacent to other existing utilities.

(d) All systems erected by the Grantee within the public right-of-way shall be located, to the extent reasonable, so as to cause minimum interference with adjacent property owners' maintenance and access.

(e) Grantor reserves the right of reasonable regulation within the lawful exercise of its police power, of the construction and installation of any system within a public right-of-way, to the extent not preempted by state and/or federal regulatory authority and to reasonably designate where the same are to be placed upon the public right-of-way.

**SECTION 9 - CONSTRUCTION DISTURBANCES:**

A. In case of any disturbance by Grantee of pavements, or other surfacing in any portion of the public right-of-way, the Grantee shall, at its own cost and expense and in a manner approved by Grantor, replace and repair all paving and other surfaces to as good a condition as before the work involving such disturbances was done; or at the option of the Grantee, and by agreement of the parties, pay to the Grantor the reasonable cost for the County to make such repairs, as evidenced by an itemized bill submitted by the Grantor.

B. If at any time during the term of this Franchise Ordinance, the Grantor shall lawfully elect to alter or change any public right-

of-way requiring the relocation of the facilities of the Grantee located in such public right-of-way, upon prior reasonable notice by the Grantor, Grantee shall remove and/or relocate the same at its own expense.

**SECTION 10 - FRANCHISE TERMS:**

This Franchise Ordinance shall take effect and be in full force from and after thirty (30) days from the date this Franchise is fully executed, and the same shall continue in full force and effect for a term of twenty-five (25) years, beginning with the effective date. Grantee shall have the option to request renewal of the Franchise for an additional period not to exceed twenty-five (25) years upon expiration of this authorization. Should the Grantee desire to exercise this option, it shall so notify the Grantor in writing not less than six (6) months prior to the expiration of the Franchise. Either party reserves the right to renegotiate one or more terms of the existing agreement as a condition precedent to the reauthorization of the Agreement.

**SECTION 11 - FORFEITURE OF FRANCHISE:**

If the Grantee should violate any of the terms, conditions or provisions of this Franchise Ordinance, and should any such violation continue for sixty (60) days after the Grantee shall have received written notice from the Grantor, and the parties have not reached an agreement as to the appropriate remedial action, and/or the Grantee is not attempting to alleviate same, or has not invoked the dispute resolution procedure set forth in the following Section, Grantor shall have the right to terminate and cancel this Franchise, and thereupon shall be deemed to have been forfeited and annulled.

**SECTION 12 - DISPUTE RESOLUTION:**

In the event of a dispute involving the terms and conditions of this Franchise, or in the event the parties cannot agree on the necessary remedial action pursuant to Section 11 above; then the Grantee may request a public hearing before the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners for the purpose of a hearing on the conflict, alleged breach or remedial action recommended. Grantee reserves the right to appeal the decision of the Board of County Commissioners within thirty (30) days after receipt of the written decision to the appropriate agency or court of competent jurisdiction. Such appeal shall be a trial de novo of the entire matter. Any and all further action concerning the termination of the Franchise shall be stayed in the event of such appeal.

**SECTION 13 - TRANSFER OF THE FRANCHISE:**

A. The County of Lincoln has been notified of the pending sale of Rifkin Cable Income Partners, L.P., d/b/a Lincoln

Cablevision, from Rifkin Cable Income Partners, L.P., a Delaware limited partnership, to Alert Cable T.V., Inc., a Georgia corporation, d/b/a CVI Cablevision Industries.

B. The County of Lincoln hereby expressly authorizes the transfer of this Franchise to Alert Cable T.V., Inc., after passage of this Franchise, if the pending sale is consummated and Alert Cable T.V., Inc., becomes the owner of Rifkin Cable Income Partners, L.P., d/b/a Lincoln Cablevision.

C. All of the rights and privileges and all of the obligations, duties, and liabilities created by this Franchise Ordinance shall pass to and be binding upon the successors and assigns of the Grantor and Grantee.

D. No transfer, assignment or other alienation of this Agreement shall become effective until the Grantee has provided written notification of the transfer to the Board of Commissioners of Lincoln County.

E. Notwithstanding the foregoing, Grantee shall have the right to mortgage, pledge, or otherwise hypothecate its assets including the rights granted under this Franchise.

**SECTION 14 - FEES:**

The following fees shall apply to the term of this Franchise:

(a) Grantee agrees to reimburse the Grantor for any and all fees incurred by Grantor in connection with the publication of this Franchise Ordinance, or any other costs incurred by Grantor in connection with the grant of this Franchise, pursuant to Section 62-1-3 NMSA 1978 (1993 Repl.)

(b) Grantor reserves the right to impose by ordinance a reasonable fee for and in consideration of the grant, and exercise of the rights and privileges herein granted, only as authorized by legislation during the period in which this Franchise shall remain in effect. In no event shall the franchise fee be imposed within the corporate boundaries of the municipalities within the County.

**SECTION 15 - CONTRACT:**

This Ordinance, upon acceptance by Grantee, shall become a contract for which the full consideration from each party to the other is set forth herein.

**SECTION 16 - SEVERABILITY:**

If any section, sub-section, sentence, clause, phrase or portion of this Franchise is for any reason held invalid or unconstitutional by any federal or state court of competent jurisdiction, each portion shall be deemed a separate, distinct, and independent provision, and such holding shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions hereof.

**SECTION 17 - EFFECTIVE DATE:**

This Franchise shall take effect and be in full force and effect on the 9th day of April, 1984.

No provision of this Franchise shall create a third party beneficiary in the public or any member thereof; furthermore, no provision of this Franchise shall authorize a third party to maintain any suit for damage to property(ies) and/or any other claim or cause of action pursuant to the provisions of this Franchise.

This Franchise shall be construed under the laws of the State of New Mexico.



Various congregations and pastors will be involved in each service.



# First Christian Church

Service at 6:30 a.m. and Resurrection Worship at 10:45 a.m.



# First Presbyterian Church

The First Presbyterian Church of Ruidoso is located on Nob Hill overlooking the community it has served for more than 40 years.

The Presbyterian Church, organized in 1948 with 18 charter members, is a congregation of the Presbyterian Church, U.S.A. and the Presbytery of Sierra Blanca.

The first meeting place was the American Legion Hall, and later the congregation met in the Woman's Club building. In 1955, the present building, which sits on a knoll at the junction of Sudderth and U.S. Highway 70 just to the east of hospital, was completed.

The First Presbyterian Church is a relatively small, but very active church, whose members reach out with a sincere welcome to seasonal visitors.

That's in keeping with the church's mission statement which says, in part, that the church aims to maintain sensitivity to the needs of seasonal visitors and share its Christ-like loving support of various agencies in the region.

The Lincoln County Food Bank, which presently has headquarters at the First Presbyterian Church, is a major local mission of the church. Even though the food bank has outgrown its quarters in the church and will soon be moving to a new home, the church's

commitment will continue through volunteer service and donations of food.

A community food co-op also uses the First Presbyterian Church as its distribution point.

First Presbyterian's congregations believe in the full use of the building as a part of our ministry. The second floor of the educational building is carpeted and made available for youth retreats and meetings. Sleeping bags are unrolled upstairs and meetings are held in front of the fireplace in the church's combination dining and fellowship hall.

The Presbyterian Church is a member of the Ministerial Alliance and extends its ministry through visits to the hospital and the care center.

The congregation meets for worship at 11 a.m. each Sunday, with Communion celebrated the first Sunday of the even months and on Christmas Eve and Maundy Thursday. A nursery is provided for all services.

Visitors are always welcome to join the congregation for the monthly pot-luck fellowship luncheon the third Sunday of each month.

Church school for children and adults is at 9:45 a.m. Choir rehearsal is on Wednesday, and a women's luncheon and Bible study is conducted at noon the second Tuesday at the church. The church pastor, the Reverend James

Rucker, leads a children's program after school on Thursdays, and the church youth take part in an ecumenical Sunday evening fellowship program.

The community is invited to all church activities.

This Easter Sunday, worship will be at 11 a.m.; the children will join in an Easter egg hunt at noon following the worship service.

Hot dogs and drinks will be available at the party.


The Lincoln County Sheriff's Posse

# Calvary Chapel Ruidoso

## Hippity hop, here comes the Easter Bilby Down Under

SYDNEY, Australia (AP)—Anti-rabbit crusader William Morgan has the cute and cuddly Easter Bunny in his sights. And he won't rest until it's dead and replaced with a fuzzy native marsupial: the Easter Bilby.

Rabbits are a non-native pest in Australia, killing native plants and agricultural crops by eating their seedlings and shoots, and crowding native wildlife out of its home territory.


"Rabbits cost Australian some dlns 90 million (dlns 65 million U.S.) in lost primary production every year," said Morgan, executive officer of the Anti-Rabbit Research Foundation of Australia.

Instead, Morgan is promoting the virtues of an Easter Bilby. The endangered bilby, also known as the rabbit bandicoot, has long ears, hops about and has soft blue-gray fur.

"It's a gentle way of changing young people's attitudes to rabbits," Morgan said.

In 1990, the foundation started promoting the Easter Bilby in South Australia and received "fantastic acceptance," Morgan said.

"In South Australia now there are more chocolate bilbys at Easter than rabbits, and that's what we're aiming for," he said.


Today, Ruidoso has become a very busy resort community offering year-round recreation.





## Fill the Easter basket with books

Ducks and chicks and lots and lots of colored eggs. Easter and its children's books are upon us. The bad news: Most of the new stuff is formulaic, boring or both. The good news: there are a few notable exceptions.

"Egbert, The Slightly Cracked Egg" @G.P. Putnam's Sons, \$14.95, does Humpty Dumpty one better by coming to terms with a character flaw: a slight crack. Egbert is evicted from the only home he's ever known — a refrigerator — when the other residents notice his imperfection.

This egg, who doubles as an artist, leaves for a long and frustrating hunt for a new nest. A patch of flowers seems a good spot, but when Egbert paints his shell to blend in, a bee chases him from the garden. Likewise, the nighttime-star camouflage he paints for himself falls apart when daylight comes and a cat suggests he scramble.

Just when Egbert feels there's no place for someone who's slightly cracked, a wonderful thing happens: he notices the world is full of cracks in the ground and in the clouds and elsewhere.

"To this day Egbert does not regret being cracked. In fact, he is even a little proud of it," writes author Tom Ross.

The message here — that differences are OK — never gets in the way of a very charming story, aptly illustrated by Rex Barron. For ages 4 to 8.

"The Children's Illustrated Bible" @Dorling Kindersley, with stories retold by Selina Hastings, is a well-researched, well-designed introduction to the stories of the Bible in words children will understand.

The stories combine with intricate illustrations by Eric Thomas, photographs of plants, animals and artifacts, maps and other visual aids.

The story of Moses receiving the 10 commandments, for example, includes a drawing of Moses on the mountain and a photograph of Jebel Musa, the mountain believed today to be Mount Sinai.

This book covers both the Old and New Testaments and, with 320 pages that include a detailed index, is well worth the \$19.95 selling price. For ages 8 and up.

"Egg: A Photographic Story of Hatching" @Dorling Kindersley, \$13.95 is a great introduction into the way that ducks, birds and other animals, including penguins, salmon and crocodiles, enter our world.

Author Robert Burton, with the assistance of 500 photographs by Kim Taylor and Jane Burton, offers a peak at life from the moment an egg begins to break until a young animal arrives. "Egg," though a research book, is interesting enough to spark plenty of youthful curiosity.

On the cover of "The Dumb Bunnies" @Scholastic-Blue Sky Press, \$12.95 is a sticker that reads: "This book is TOO DUMB to win an award." At its best —

which is most of the way through the book — Sue Denim's story is dumb in that silly way that delights kids.

"Once upon a time there were three dumb bunnies who lived in a log cabin made out of bricks," the story begins. Borrowing heavily from Goldilocks and the three bears, these dumb bunnies blow on porridge that's too cold and put hot porridge in the oven.

The story falls down a little bit when, in a mean-spirited way, the dumb bunnies flush Little Red Goldilocks down the toilet. But that's a small detraction from this very humorous little book, illustrated by Dav Pilkey. For ages 4 to 8.

In Joyce Dunbar's "The Spring Rabbit," (Lothrop, Lee, Shepard, \$13) a young rabbit named Smudge wants a sibling, but is told by his mother that he has to wait for spring.

When spring finally arrives, Smudge searches in a mouse hole, full of baby mice; the bushes and brambles, with a bird's nest and six speckled eggs; and a frogspawn full of tiny tadpoles. But he can't find any baby rabbits ... until he goes home! Dunbar's sweet story is equally matched by Susan Varley's charming illustrations. For ages 2 and up.

Grosset & Dunlap offers a series of seasonal "pudgy pop-up board books." "Bunny's Easter Basket" @and "Ducky's Rainy Day" @\$4.95 each) are a slight variation on the thick-paged toddler books that are durable and easy for fat little fingers to manipulate. The difference here is the pop-ups themselves, which seem slightly less inclined than other pop-ups to be destroyed after a reading or two.

The text, by Stephanie St. Pierre, is fairly unimaginative. In one, bunny hunts (in rhyme) for hidden eggs; in the other, Ducky tries to find a playmate on a wet day. But the colorful illustrations by Dana Regan likely would please some youngsters. For ages 1 to 3.

"Little Chick," @illustrated by Melissa Sweet, is a palm-sized, thick-paged book for very young children that follows Little Chick in his first adventure through the garden (Grosset & Dunlap, \$2.95).

Impressed by the skills of his neighbors, Little Chick wants to know his own talents. "I'll tell you what you can do," says his mother. "You can flap your little wings and toddle on home."

"Pet the Baby Farm Animals," @illustrated by Lucinda McQueen (Scholastic-Cartwheel, \$8.95), is a knockoff of the ever-popular, "Pat the Bunny." Eight animals invite youngsters to touch a swatch of cloth intended to imitate that animal's fur. My kids tend to love the textures in this type of book. They don't know the idea is a little worn by now — even if I do. For ages 3 months to 5 years.

—"The Easter Book" @by Jean Miller and illustrated by Barbara Lanza. This book introduces readers, ages 2 to 5, to Easter traditions and celebrations around the world (Golden Books, \$1.69).

—"Peter Cottontail" @by Amanda Stephens and illustrated by Christopher Santoro. Someone has stolen all the Easter eggs and it's Easter morning. Peter Cottontail to the rescue (Scholastic, \$2.50)! Ages 3-8.

—"Leo the Lop Mini-Book and Plush Toy" @by Stephen Cosgrove, illustrated by Robin James. A miniature edition of "Leo the Lop," plus a toy bunny (Grosset & Dunlap, Price Stern Sloan, \$9.95). Ages 3 to 9.

—"The Carrot Top Mystery" @by

Bernice Chardiet and illustrated by Margaret A. Hartelius. A "Who Did It?" sticker mystery. Children answer clues to what happened to the carrot tops by applying stickers from the final pages of the book (Scholastic, \$3.50). Ages 3-6.

—"The Great Egg Mystery" @written and illustrated by Margaret A. Hartelius. Another in Scholastic's sticker mystery series. In this one, Dilly Duck has lost her eggs and Hilda Hound, detective, helps her find them (Scholastic, \$3.50). Ages 3-6.

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# Building permits top \$1 million February

Building permits took a giant leap forward in February, topping the same period in 1993 by 147 percent.

The Village of Ruidoso planning department issued 26 permits in February 1994, down in numbers from 1993's 32 permits but way up in dollars at \$1,118,636 for 1994, compared to last February's \$452,939.

Single family homes accounted for most of that big boost, with builders starting seven new homes valued at \$953,184, in February. Last year, permits were issued for three new homes with a value of \$221,452.

Residential additions and alterations made up the rest of February's building starts, with 19 permits issued for 19 projects. That's a 32 percent increase in value over February 1993, when the 32 permits issued were worth \$124,987.

Commercial building is still sluggish with no permits issued thus far in 1994 for new commercial starts or remodeling jobs.

Last year at this time the village had

issued permits for 10 commercial addition/alteration projects, five of them in February and five in January.

February's construction boom brought the year-to-date building permit total to \$2,275,206, a 247 percent increase over the February 1993 year-to-date of \$656,620.

Year-to-date for single family homes is at \$1,996,790, 563 percent higher than 1993's February year-to-date residential of \$301,321.





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# Home builders trade group: Housing affordability remains excellent

WASHINGTON (AP) Despite rising mortgage rates, a home builders trade group maintained Thursday that housing affordability remains excellent in most of the nation, with loan costs still among the lowest in two decades.

Continuing a recent trend, the most affordable markets were primarily in the Midwest and South in the final three months of 1993, according to the National Association of Home Builders. The least affordable generally were in the Northeast and in the West, particularly in California.

In fact, 17 of the 25 most affordable markets in the association's Housing Opportunity Index were in the Midwest. They included Jackson, Michigan, which held onto the No. 1 ranking for the second straight quarter.

Heading the opportunity list in other regions were Brazoria, Texas, in the South; Nashua, New Hampshire, in the Northeast, and Pueblo, Colorado, in the West.

"Housing affordability conditions were excellent in the fourth quarter throughout the entire country and are still excellent, even though mortgage interest rates have risen slightly," said Tommy Thompson, association president and an Owensboro, Kentucky, builder.

Nationally, the index rose to 66.8 in the October-December period, from 65.1 in both the second and third quarters. The index stood at 64.7 during the first three months of last year.

"From Jackson, Michigan, to San Francisco, more people can afford to buy homes today than at this time last year because mortgage interest rates are lower," Thompson added. "And that was even more true in the fourth quarter of 1993 when the national average interest rate hit a low of 6.80 percent."

Thompson acknowledged, however, "the slight uptick in mortgage rates during the last month will hurt those at the edge of affordability."

Fixed-rate, 30-year mortgages averaged 7.8 percent this week, up from a 25-year low of 6.74 percent last October. Still, that was below the double-digit figures that existed as recently as 1990 and many analysts expect rates to remain below 8 percent this year.

Although San Francisco's affordability improved slightly from the third quarter, it remained at the bottom of the Home Builders' list, a ranking it has held since the association began the surveys three years ago.

Least affordable markets in other regions were El Paso, Texas, in the South; Stamford, Connecticut, in the Northeast, and Chicago in the Midwest. Jackson had a 94.7 score on the asso-

ciation's index, which tracked about 500,000 sales of new and previously owned homes in 178 metropolitan areas during the October-December quarter. San Francisco had an 18.5.

The index measures the ability of the typical family to purchase a home in its own market by comparing median family income with median home price. The

median is the midpoint, meaning that half of the families earned more and half earned less, or that half of the homes cost more and half cost less.

Paul Climer, president of the Home Builders Association of Jackson, said his Michigan area benefits from abundant land and steady employment.

The 25 most affordable and 25 least affordable U.S. housing markets in the fourth quarter of 1993, according to the National Association of Home Builders.

The number corresponding to each area is the percentage of the homes sold that were within reach of the median income household at the prevailing mortgage interest rate.

She also will be giving a demonstration on pine needle basketry from 12:30 to 3 p.m. Friday, March 25, at Sierra Mall.



## Household Help

**Q.** I own a home in the northern part of the country so I had a lot of ice and snow on my roof this season. It seems the roof above my crawl-space attic has the potential to leak. I noticed droplets appearing on the underside of the roof sheathing after a thaw. I also would like to repair some damage to the "valley flashing" above an upstairs bedroom window. Can you give me some good advice on how to pursue these repairs?

**A.** First, you must wait for a sunny, dry day in which to work. If you are a relatively new owner, you might want to search the attic and basement for any shingles and roofing materials left behind by previous owners. It is also advisable to have a steady ladder and a dependable helper around.

The most practical way to pinpoint any leaks in your roof is by having access to the space below it. One example of finding a leak is to use a flashlight and an ordinary, thin coat hanger. Most often, water will travel a good distance from a hole before it actually drips into the attic.

Turn off any lights and shine the flashlight along the plywood underside and rafters. Look for any indications of dry rot, such as soft wood and water

through the sheathing and roof shingle. This will confirm what damage you will need to repair.

In response to mending what you explained about the "valley flashing," there are also a few steps you need to implement. While I can't exactly assess what type of repair you have to do, I'm sure the existing flashing is made up of thin metal.

If the flashing is torn, you can place a piece of thin gauged aluminum on top of the cut. Be sure that the piece is large enough to slip under the adjoining sections of shingles on both sides of the flashing. You should not have to face-nail your repair patch to the roof. Instead, use an adequate amount of roofing cement on the tear and the aluminum patch itself. Press firmly in place, and if at all possible, secure a heavy weight on top to assure its contact.

Keep in mind that the repairs outlined here are temporary and will buy you time. However, as your roof ages, you will need a professional to install a whole new roof.

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# Bankers say borrowers will feel rate hike, eventually

ALBUQUERQUE (AP) Interest rate increases by several big banks eventually will filter down to homeowners with adjustable rate mortgages and equity loans, New Mexico bankers and mortgage brokers said.

Large banks hiked the prime lending rate to 6.25 percent Wednesday from 6 percent, the first increase in that rate in more than five years.

The increase followed the Federal Reserve's hike in interest rates Tuesday.

Norwest Corp. of Minneapolis, parent of United New Mexico Financial Corp., was the first to raise the prime base rate banks charge their most credit-worthy customers for short-term loans. Most banks tie their rate to an average set by the New York banks.

Borrowers from United New Mexico Financial wouldn't be directly affected, said Larry Willard, Norwest's regional president and chief operating officer of United New Mexico.

"I don't have anything in my bank tied to the Norwest prime," Willard said.

In fact, much of the impact already had been registered because the

markets try to anticipate the future, said Paul McClendon, executive vice president of Santa Fe-based Charter Bank for Savings.

"It was expected by everybody in the world, from Wall Street on down to every little Podunk banker," McClendon said. "So it was already built into the rates."

Rates local financial institutions charge on mortgages and pay for certificates of deposit have been "inching up" for the past couple of months, McClendon said.

Willard said the average rate would rise as New York banks followed Norwest's lead.

"If you've got a car loan at 7 1/4 percent, that's probably not going to make any difference to you, but for business owners whose loans are tied to that index, it's obviously going to affect them over time," he said.

Many home equity loans also are based on the New York prime rate, and those homeowners will see their payments increase, McClendon said. For a borrower with a \$50,000 loan outstanding, the increase would be about \$10.41 a month, he said.

## Dollars & Sense

Owning a home can be costly but home ownership also is replete with tax-saving opportunities. Your tax savings begin with the points you pay to the mortgage lender to secure a mortgage. Points paid to acquire your principal residence are generally fully deductible in the year you pay them. Points paid for refinancing or purchasing a second home normally must be deducted over the life of the loan.

In a recent reversal, the IRS ruled that points paid from mortgage proceeds are deductible up front as long as the fees you pay at closing, such as those for attorneys, appraisals and abstracts, are at least equal to the amount of points withheld. Prior to this ruling, deductions for points paid out of the loan proceeds were spread over the life of the mortgage.

Deductions for mortgage interest and real estate taxes can also help to offset some of the high costs of home ownership. You may deduct interest paid on up to \$1 million in acquisition debt as long as you use the loan proceeds to

buy, construct or improve your principal or second residence.

Real estate taxes you pay on your property are generally tax deductible. If you buy or sell property during the year, the real estate tax deduction is allocated between the buyer and seller based on the part of the year you each owned the property. This tax deduction, and certain other itemized deductions, however, are phased out for some high-income taxpayers.

The money you spend for home improvements provides another opportunity for tax savings. For tax purposes, an improvement is anything that adds value to your house, prolongs its life, or adapts it to new uses. Permanent improvement costs such as adding a bathroom, installing a new roof, or building a deck, add to your home's "basis" or total cost. When selling your home, the higher your basis, the lower your gain and the lower your taxes. Be sure to save bills, canceled checks, and other documents that support improvement costs incurred.

# The Gardeners Guide: Blooming flowers give quick results

Buying flowers already in bloom can be an expensive way to achieve quick results in the garden. Even worse, sometimes it works well and sometimes it doesn't. But certain precautions simplify the problems and shave the costs.

First, make sure it's the proper time for what you're planting (cool-season or warm-season types).

Second, check that the plants will do well in your climate.

While many annuals now are bred to withstand transplanting in bloom, they usually will flower faster if existing flowers are pinched off before transplanting.

So look for compact, healthy plants that are just starting to show bud color. That way you can be sure the label's color description is reasonably close, and you avoid much of the transplant shock.

Look also for well-proportioned, uniform plants with stocky stems. Avoid those that are leggy or limp.

Leaves should have a rich, green color. If the foliage is mottled or leaf edges curled, pests are likely to be present.

If lower leaves are yellow, it could be because the soil mix became too dry. In that case, the root system may be damaged and the plants may never flourish.

Be convinced in your own mind, too, that the retail nursery's staff is familiar with the care of seedlings. Seeing them watering wilted plants is a good tip to go elsewhere.

It's usually not a good idea to buy plants kept in a sunny location, either.

The amount of soil mix in small packs can heat up tremendously, damaging the roots.

To cut costs, watch for sales. Many garden centers offer weekly specials. Perhaps what you want will be discounted a week or two later. Be sure to follow selection guidelines.

Seeds, of course, are the most economical way to start flowers. They also provide the most possible choices. However, some degree of skill is needed. It also takes time, often many weeks. There is no instant gratification.

In addition to conserving a precious natural resource, a water-wise landscape saves homeowners money by requiring up to 50 percent less water than a traditional garden. Here are five simple steps to increase watering efficiency:

- Plan your landscape design so that plants with similar watering needs are grouped together. By doing so, over- and under-watering plants won't be a problem. Also, select drought-tolerant plants indigenous to your area. Native plants demand less water than transplanted exotics.
- Ideally, plants should be watered early in the morning. This will drastically reduce the amount of water lost to evaporation.
- Watering roots too much and too often can be a problem. A good rule of thumb is to water roots deeply, about one inch, but water less often.
- Install a low-volume drip irrigation system. More effective than traditional sprinklers, root feeders and sprayers can reduce water use by 50 percent by delivering water straight to thirsty plant roots.
- Apply an antitranspirant spray such as Cloud Cover to foliage such as shrubs and flowers, to protect against wind and sun scald, as well as reduce the amount of water lost through transpiration.
- Keep the landscape maintained. Pruning, fertilizing and proper mowing are important as manicured plants use water more efficiently than overgrown ones.

The same difficulties apply to cuttings.

So for the average home gardener, the nursery or garden center six-pack has become the most common route to floral displays, even with the cost.

In general, low-maintenance, easy-to-grow flowers include African daisy, ageratum, sweet alyssum, begonia, celosia, cleome, coleus, cosmos, dusty miller, flowering kale, impatiens, lobelia, nicotiana, petunia, phlox, portulaca, salvia and catharanthus

(vinca). They won't do well in every climate, so be sure to check if you are not sure.

Also, some flowers are easier to care for than others because they don't require removal of fading blooms to stimulate new ones (dead-heading) and they don't need pruning to avoid becoming spindly.

Marigolds, snapdragons and zinnias need to be regularly dead-headed while ageratum, alyssum, begonia, portulaca and catharanthus do not. Grandiflora petunias, snapdragons and zinnias are among those needing pruning while

pansy, catharanthus (vinca) and ver-bena do not.

Many flowers are low-water users. Where possible, it makes sense to opt for those that don't require regular watering. Such a list includes longtime favorite such as achillea, centaurea, coreopsis, gaillardia, gazania, oenothera, rudbeckia, salvia and statice.

Don't plan to grow shade-lovers in sun or sun-lovers in shade. Group them by cultural needs. Do they like moist soil or dry conditions? Do they prefer regular fertilization or refuse to bloom

where soil is too rich in nitrogen?

For instant color, many experts recommend buying 4-to-6-inch pots rather than the more common six-packs.

The larger size provides a better root system to help them adapt when transplanted in bloom. Such pots are considerably more expensive, of course.


