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## Council stands firm on streetscape plans

Streetscape parking and Short Street bridge tested the Ruidoso Village Council Tuesday with tough decision making.

Under a full moon, opinions on the council were so diverse and independent, that one motion concerning the MainStreet project failed for a lack of a second. It was eventually resurrected and passed by a four to two margin.

Village manager Gary Jackson said his staff will use severance tax money allocated to the project to solve Midtown parking problems on Sudderth Drive and improve municipal parking lots.

Jackson talked of two lots being purchased by the village for additional parking on El Paso Street.

He reminded councilors of their desire to stick to the design plans as related in a recent workshop.

"Trying to carve out a (parking) place, here and there, is really not desirable," Jackson said.

He also brought up sidewalk widening on Center Street and the use of Center Street as a one way avenue from Sudderth Drive to Wingfield Street.

In addition, Jackson spoke of improving the municipal parking area across from the police station (and one block from Sudderth) with paving, lighting, better signage and handicap accessible.

With severance tax, the sidewalk will be extended along the eastern portion of Center Street, allowing parking on the other side, he said.

Jackson also noted previously budgeted money for river walk construction, about \$20,000, will be used on restroom construction. The restrooms are expected to cost con-

siderably more because of the Americans for Disability Act (ADA) requirements.

Deputy manager Alan Briley reminded the council that in the previous workshop meeting, members expressed a desire to stay with the flowering locust and crabapple tree, but to square the areas surrounding the tree to eliminate some of the dirt and bark.

Councilor Frank Potter recommended a committee to ensure the aesthetics of the planting be consistent with the overall appearance of the streetscape.

"Some people don't care about trees," Potter said. "Others care a lot. It shouldn't be taken lightly. The area needs to be sketched in first."

Briley then asked councilors whether he should continue trying to save every possible parking space on Sudderth by altering the design.

Councilor Robert Donaldson then moved to stay with the plan as originally designated and not to put back any additional parking anywhere else in the project that hasn't already been finished.

Donaldson's motion failed to get a second.

Mayor Shaw said she agrees with Donaldson, and that some of the new area being worked appears "blah."

Donaldson calmly but strongly denounced proposed changes in the design plan.

"If we go out of our way to add parking back, eliminating what was in the design, we are going to ruin the streetscape, fill it up with long four-foot wide sidewalks and we will have wasted our time in doing this project, in my opinion."

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## At last — MainStreet begins streetscape project

Early arrivals at the MainStreet groundbreaking that Monday, November 15, downed a hot breakfast while they braved cold weather and dull skies before the official shovel scoop at 10 a.m.

The ceremonies were held in front of Fenton's Gallery and the project was to start that morning on the south side of Fern Street and Sudderth, instead it was changed to the north side of Fern and Sudderth.

Former MainStreet director Mary Maul sent her regrets.

Mayor Jerry Shaw broke a bottle of champagne over a piece of heavy equipment for the cameras. About 35 merchants and village officials were present.

MainStreet director Don Miller said the change in starting the project in front of Casey's Cabins was due to the changes in street lighting. He said had the project started across the street as planned, the village would not have been able to maintain any street lighting because all the power comes from the pole in that area.

"This will also allow the contractors to work on the sunny side of the street," Miller said. "It will be better for the contractors to work with concrete on the warmer side of the street."

Weekly construction update meetings were scheduled for 9 a.m. each Friday at the MainStreet office.

On December 14, members of the village council were stunned at their meeting with the news that 70 percent of the curbside parking along the new streetscape will be eliminated instead of the 30 percent originally proposed.

Mayor Shaw thanked village attorney John Underwood for bringing the situation to light with the council.

MainStreet director Don Miller said that additional downtown parking must be furnished by July 1, and board member Mike Radziewicz suggested a three-tier parking building costing about \$2.5 million.

The news was unsettling to the mayor.

"It really does set me off that we're in the middle of a project downtown, and then get this kind of information thrown at us. And we hear \$2.5 million for a parking lot," Shaw said.

"Somebody should have brought this to our attention a long time ago," she said.

Not much could be done at the moment. On December 24, Deputy Alan Briley suspended MainStreet operations from Friday, Christmas Day, through Sunday, January 2, 1994, with work to start again on January 3.

## County conducts phone meeting

Breaking new ground in Lincoln County, the County Commission Wednesday became the first elected board to conduct a meeting by telephone conference call.

Under new rules approved by the State Legislature, the Open Meetings Act law has been amended to include conference call sessions as a legal alternative under very specific conditions.

The session Wednesday became necessary when a contract had to be signed with the state, but two commissioners were out of town and the other three faced a 60-mile round trip for a 10-minute meeting at the courthouse in Carrizozo.

Instead, county manager Andy Wynham contacted the AT&T Conference Call Center and they took over.

Exactly at 9 a.m., the operator said everyone was connected and the meeting was called to order by Chairman Monroy Montes from his home in Hondo.

Also attending by long distance were Commissioner Wilton Howell from his One-Stop Auto office in Ruidoso, Commissioner Bill Schwettmann from a board meeting at Ruidoso State Bank, and Commissioner Stirling Spencer from an office in Albuquerque.

Besides the regular long distance charge, the cost consisted of

though far from completed, was not that bad to the eye.

Schedules were revamped for the next block's work, and overbuilding, noted as costly and time consuming in phase one, was simplified.

New village manager Gary Jackson and deputy village manager Alan Briley conducted a special review for Midtown merchants that included plans for additional parking and positioning of new restrooms.

Shaw told the merchants that it was inevitable that some day the highway department would prohibit parking along Sudderth Drive.

She said now was the time to look for alternative areas to park. "You must remember that the state could take away that parking at any time," she said. "It never was yours."

Jackson and Briley talked of paving a municipal parking lot with a sidewalk that complied with the Americans for Disability Act leading into Sudderth.

Ann Bolton, owner of J.Roberts said her Texas clientele wouldn't use it. She indicated even the ADA grade was too much for the Texans.

In spite of a disgruntled merchant or two at that meeting, the north side of Sudderth Drive owners were beginning to move in the spirit of the project.

Not many merchants from the

other side of the street were present. It would appear when construction hits their area, rigorous discussion will start all over again.

A bottom line did manage to emerge from the meeting with statements by Jackson, Mayor Jerry Shaw, Councilor Frank Potter and village manager John Underwood that all indicated streetscape was more than a sidewalk project. It was a Midtown enhancement project that would serve the merchants and tourists.

And that they were going to see that it stayed that way.

Councilor Robert Donaldson told the merchants at the meeting, that sometimes the council had to act in the best interest of the merchant, whether the merchant liked it or not.

Some of the costs of the project surfaced in mid-March. The total MainStreet tab picked up by the village of Ruidoso has been \$277,367.47 to date.

The Riverwalk project has cost the village \$188.75 toward the salary of the executive director and \$4,500 in design fees for another \$4,688.75.

# Wandering Rio Ruidoso leads to a dispute over aging bridge

The Ruidoso Village Council is heading for a showdown over the Short Street Bridge which they say is not OK.

Village staff said the bridge is endangering the village flood insurance and should be brought into compliance or removed.

Attorney Dan Bryant, representing owner Susan Merrill, said removing the bridge would landlock her property. He said the bridge originated as an emergency measure when an act of God, a flood, wiped out the existing village maintained road to her house years ago. He said there is no flood emergency at this time and that the village should work with Merrill in finding a solution.

The bridge has a third owner. It's surrounded by homeowners who want it torn down.

Merrill inherited the house from her parents. During a flood in 1977, the Rio Ruidoso wiped out the existing road in front of her house and changed direction.

Mr. Merrill at that time was given emergency permission to construct a bridge to his house.

The bridge eventually was considered an eyesore, and at least one

nearby homeowner said it hurt the chances of her selling her home.

Richards has given a number of reasons why the bridge should be eliminated. He also has provided a number of alternatives, some very costly, in bridge repair.

The latest reason brought before the council for bridge demolition was the village flood insurance policy.

If a flood wrecked the bridge, causing it to injure someone, the village would be liable, Richards said.

The area is in a flood plain and also the heart of the proposed river walk. It would appear that the same constrictions for the bridge would apply to park benches, public art, light poles, buildings and other construction plans suggested in a revised river walk plan hanging on the Main Street office wall.

Richards said on March 21, a code enforcement officer inspecting the bridge found repairs had been made without a building permit.

"I feel to resolve the issue, we need to move forward with authorization to notify the owners to bring the bridge in compliance within 30 days, or village crews will remove the bridge," Richards said.

# Investigation continues in beating death

Although he was 80 years old, Herman Hulén was not someone to sit around and watch the clouds.

He moved to Capitan from California about 15 years ago with the dream of researching and writing a book on the outlaw Billy the Kid, according to relatives.

He never realized that dream. Sometime last week, he was beaten to death by a thief in his mobile home on Fourth Street in Capitan. His body was discovered last Thursday during a welfare check requested by his daughter in Cali-

fornia. Lincoln County Sheriff James McSwane said his department has been following a number of leads, "but I have nothing right now to justify an arrest."

"We're out listening. Any help I can get from the public would be great."

Wanda Ellerbee, Hulén's niece from Fort Worth, Texas, said she re-established contact with her uncle about six months ago after a 30-year separation.

"I'm interested in genealogy and wrote him about one year ago, but I didn't hear from him until last fall when he called me," she said. "Since then, we've talked four or five times."

Hulén was her mother's brother, Ellerbee said. They grew up in Maxwell, near Raton, New Mexico.

"There were 14 of them all together," she said. "He left and went to California. He returned to Capitan about 15 years ago to write the book. That's why he chose Lin-

coln County.

"He was very alert and put me on to a lot of family members."

But Hulén didn't like to talk about the past, a trait Ellerbee said she also saw in her mother.

Even at age 80, he continued to look toward the future, until someone put an end to his dreams by bashing his head and shoulders with a club-like instrument.

Theft apparently was the motive, McSwane said several weapons used for hunting and self defense were missing.

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Donaldson said.

He said things will get worse on the other side of the street.

"A four-foot sidewalk is going to be a failure," Donaldson said. "You put a wheelchair on it and it's not wide of enough for two people and we will have accomplished nothing."

Councilor Leon Eggleston asked that Donaldson resubmit the motion so he could second it and allow discussion to continue.

Deputy manager Alan Briley said after talking to some owners, he could save seven more parking spaces. Shaw asked Briley if that would leave more four-foot wide sidewalks. Briley said it would.

"That destroys the whole concept," Shaw said. "Part of this whole project was to make downtown handicap accessible." Donaldson agreed.

"This wasn't done just for Main Street. This was done for the Village of Ruidoso," Donaldson said. "It is built with taxpayers money, state and federal as well. It was sold to make an attraction of the downtown area, for the benefit of the Village of Ruidoso as well as downtown merchants."

"The sole beneficiaries will be those businesses. It's incumbent on us that this project is done correctly, and not cave in and compromise and end up with something that isn't going to work."

"There was an agreement with the state on the number of parking spaces, we have to abide by that. We can't take any more away that have already been agreed upon."

"But if we're going to put parking back on the street, then we have no business spending money to upgrade our parking lot and buy additional land. We're doing that so we can do a streetscape that will

provide an attraction for the Village of Ruidoso that in the long run, in my opinion, will be more beneficial."

Mack Kizer, owner of the Sierra Blanca Cleaners building, said the village should try to save downtown parking where possible. He said he likes four-foot wide sidewalks.

Donaldson said some merchants show the importance of parking for their customers by using up the parking spaces in front of businesses.

"I've heard that over and over again," said Kizer. "And I've run them out from in front of my business for 20 years."

"Which you can't do," countered Donaldson. "That's not your parking. That's public highway and anyone can park there." If other businessmen park there, you can't legally run them off.

"I did it," said Kizer. "Not legally," Donaldson said.

"I did it, anyway," said Kizer.

Shaw warned that the state highway department can take away all parking on Sudderth and in all likelihood will in the future. She said the council should be concentrating on off street parking in that eventuality.

"The issue here is, do we ruin the looks of the streetscape project ... do we want a straight four-foot wide sidewalk?" Shaw asked.

The council voted four to two in favor of following the design plan. Councilors Donaldson, Eggleston, Frank Cummins and Potter voted aye, Councilors Joe Gomez and J.D. James voted nay.

Planning and Zoning director Cleatus Richards told the council that he has continued to receive complaints on the Short Street bridge and that owner Susan Merrill has not brought the bridge into compliance since it was discussed last July. (See related story.)

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\$4 per connection or a total of \$20 for the 12-minute meeting.

"When you figure paying two commissioners 25 cents a mile to drive down here from Ruidoso (about \$15 each) and a third from Hondo, we saved money," Wynham said. "Certainly, we would only use this for an agenda that is non-controversial and has a time deadline."

"This way, the commissioners were able to take care of the county's business without leaving their businesses."

The Ruidoso News also sat in on the meeting, using an extension line. A representative from the county clerk's office joined Wynham in his office with a speaker phone.

Although their voices were distinct, commissioners identified themselves before they spoke to eliminate any confusion. Votes on motions were completed by roll call.

Commissioners approved a professional services contract with the State Department of Health, Public Health Division, under which the state will pay \$9,000 for the preparation of a health care

plan for the Lincoln County Maternal and Child Health Council. The study should be completed by June 30.

The report is to include an assessment of needs for maternal and child health services, detailing mortality indicators and the population unable to access adequate services, and an inventory of the numbers and types of providers, their level and scope of services and other resources available in the county.

The council then will use the report to develop a services delivery plan for the county.

The motion by Spencer to approve the contract passed unanimously.

Commissioners also approved two budget amendments. The first was for \$20,000 to cover two change orders on jail renovation. The expense already is covered by cash reserves set aside for the project. The money also will pay for incidentals such as jail reception area furniture and dividers for the deputies dispatch room.

The second amendment concerned a \$395,000 capital outlay transfer of money for LCMC.

# Council sets resort hotel project back on track

The Ruidoso Village Council took steps Tuesday to frame the community's big picture, the long awaited convention hotel.

Mayor Jerry Shaw, during the recent community update meeting at the Convention Civic Events Center, announced that racetrack owner R. D. Hubbard is ready to move on a hotel near the center.

Hubbard previously had entered negotiations with the council to build a hotel, but for a variety of reasons, including increasing demands by the administration, Hubbard walked away.

Local businessmen pleaded with the council last year to allow Hubbard an extension on his agreement with the village to build the hotel. When the council voted against another extension, some businessmen openly booed the council.

With the new administration, Hubbard has returned to the picture with a desire to build the hotel, and the new council has been very receptive.

Village attorney John Underwood told the council that the

process should begin with a request for proposal (RFP). The RFP will allow anyone to bid on constructing a hotel on the village's site.

Mayor Jerry Shaw instructed the village staff to provide guidelines for the RFP to be brought before the council at the next meeting.

In other council business: —Jackson said the new budget would be ready for review next Monday or Tuesday, with meetings to be held on April 11 and April 13.

—Jackson told the council the village infiltration of rain water, waste water and ground water was up to 800,000 gallons per day.

He said the lines were deteriorating, collapsing with root systems.

He said when infiltration is removed from the lines, the share of the village's operating costs, according to the experts, will be about an 88-12 ratio.

Jackson said because the repairs have been done in short segments, only a reduction of about 100,000 has been accomplished, for a share cost of 92.2-7.8.

He said it will continue to be that way until a good comprehen-

sive repair can be accomplished.

Jackson said there is some danger that the clay lines would deteriorate faster with infiltration.

He indicated that repairs in stages over a long period of time, may not result in an overall satisfactory conclusion.

"There is the possibility that with every 100,000 gallons we take out, we could gain 100,000 gallons in another place," Jackson said.

He indicated the most efficient method would be to make all repairs at one time.

—The council agreed with the concept of having concessions at Grindstone Lake, and would pursue interest through the request for proposal (RFP) to the public.

Councilor Robert Donaldson said if no one bid on a concession, and it was considered a necessary concession, the village could consider running that business.

Jackson said it was important that the business not conflict with a similar business in the village.

Staff was instructed to come back with procedures and guidelines that would be acceptable for concessions.

—The council approved a preliminary and final plat for re-subdivision of Fair Hills Subdivision, Starlite Addition and Cree Manor Tract. The purpose of the replat was to consolidate the property into three larger pieces of land to be subdivided at a later date.

—The council scheduled a public hearing for amendments to the animal control ordinance for May 10.

—Board appointments by the mayor included the new seven member Sierra Blanca Airport Advisory Board of Roy Parker, Ralph Gary, Russell Dancy, James Paxton, Tim Morris, Ted Conley and David Noltensmeyer; Norma Falwell to the library board; Jim Hammond and Jim Stoddard to parks and recreation; Pinky Jones, Elwood Grading, Mike Daulton, Roger Sower and Earline Phillips to personnel; Van Patton and Bob Sterchi to planning and zoning; Alan Briley to Eagle Creek Intercommunity Water Supply Association; Robert Donaldson to extrajurisdictional zoning; Gary Jackson and Jerry Wright to Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority; and Frank Potter to the Water Defense Association.

# Ruidoso's one movie theater reopens April 1

Though the case of Anderson versus Coyle has not been settled, the Coyles have sold Sierra Twin Cinema to Deborah Marcum, of South Padre Island, Texas, according to the Andersons' attorney Richard Hawthorne.

Ruidoso's only movie theater closed in early October when William T. and Shirley J. Anderson filed a lawsuit against Kathryn and David O. Coyle.

The Andersons demanded the dissolution of Coyle/Anderson Inc., damages from fraudulent actions of the directors, and they accused the defendants of breach of fiduciary duty.

Although William Coyle had originally stated that he would not

sell the theater until the case was settled, Hawthorne said he forced the Coyles to accept the sale by having the court appoint a receiver.

"We forced them to sell so they couldn't play hardball with the Andersons," said Hawthorne. The money from the sale is being held in escrow until the suit is resolved. Hawthorne expects to go to trial this summer. The case has been consolidated in Chavez county, where Judge Alvin Jones will make the decision.

"We're asking for 25 percent of the sale plus tort damages," said Hawthorne. He said he felt confident that the Andersons would win.

Meanwhile, Marcum opens the

theater April 1 with Naked Gun 33 1/3 and Night Seconds on the twin screens, each showing four times daily. Marcum is offering a matinee price of \$3 for shows before 6 p.m.

"We're committed to offering family entertainment," said Marcum. "The theater is a community center in a way."

Marcum, a former school teacher, is moving to Ruidoso and plans to use the theater as a vehicle for educational programs. She owns another theater in Texas, Island Cinema, and has been in the business for four years.

Mayor Jerry Shaw and the Ruidoso Village Council received a letter from South Padre city man-

ager James Chisholm, introducing Marcum to the community. The letter states in part:

"As an elected official (alderman), Ms. Marcum was an active participant in the development of South Padre Island.... In addition, Ms. Marcum has continued to support the Island as a private citizen."

"Recently ... Deborah donated her local cinema to area children by showing the movie 'Free Willy' - free of charge.... I can say with great confidence that Ms. Marcum will become an asset to your community not only as a local businesswoman, proprietor of Sierra Cinema, but also as a valuable citizen."



## Board sets 1994-95 calendar

During a brief morning meeting at White Mountain Intermediate School Wednesday, the Ruidoso School Board approved the calendar for the 1994-95 school year.

Teachers will report August 17 and students the next day, August 18. Christmas holidays will run from December 19-30, plus January 2. Spring break is set for March 13-17. School will end May 26.

Board members spent the rest of the morning visiting classrooms and sharing school lunches with their teachers, administrators and students.

## Rio Bonito environmental assessment ready for review

Public comment is being sought on an environmental assessment for phase two of the Rio Bonito/Delaware River exchange completed by the staff of the Bureau of Land Management.

The document is available for public review and comment through April 15.

The exchange would place privately-owned parcels along the Rio Bonito river near the settlement of Lincoln into federal ownership. The private owners would receive tracts in Eddy County near the Delaware River.

The assessment is available in the reading rooms of public libraries in Artesia, Roswell, Hobbs and Carlsbad and in the county clerk's office of the Lincoln County Courthouse in Carrizozo.

## Trinity Site tour leaves from Alamogordo Saturday morning

The second of two yearly tours to the Trinity site, where the first atomic bomb was tested in 1945, will be offered Saturday, April 2.

Anyone planning to take the free tour should be at the Otero County Fairgrounds, on the northern edge of Alamogordo, across from White Sands Mall by 7:30 a.m. The caravan will leave at 8 a.m.

Participants should bring water, a sack lunch and a good spare tire. The tour is approximately 150 miles round trip. Use of cameras will be permitted at Trinity site only.

# Judge Butts asks for Democratic nomination

Incumbent Magistrate Judge William Butts, appointed to the Division II position by Governor Bruce King on July 1, 1993, officially announced his candidacy Thursday for the Democratic party's nomination.

Butts submitted his resume to King when former Judge J.R. "Jim" Wheeler retired. Butts was selected from five other applicants.

"Magistrate court is a people's court," Butts said. "I am a very lucky person to be in a position that may make a small difference. I want people to feel they can turn to me at any time for assistance."

Butts is a native New Mexican and is a graduate of Portales High School. He received an Associate of Arts Degree from South Plains Junior College and attended Eastern New Mexico University.

He entered the New Mexico State Police in 1964, and retired as captain 24 years later.

During his career he completed the criminal justice program at New Mexico Military Institute.

"My very first priority is to uphold the constitution. If a person is found guilty, I will attempt to provide those individuals with treatment. If left untreated, we are

looking at a multiple offender. If treatment fails, the only recourse is incarceration for the protection of the community."

Butts said since his appointment he has served with heart and mind.

"I have learned so many things and have applied myself to study the law and do what it instructs a magistrate judge to do. Please elect a person who has dedicated his life as a public servant. I have done so

with complete honesty, integrity and commitment."

Butts experience in law includes: a certified scuba diver and a member of the state police search and recovery team; member of the tactical unit and anti-sniper unit; and a member of the state police pistol team.

He served with Lincoln County Sheriff's office chief deputy, Bob Miller. They were weapons instructors for many years at the State Police Law Enforcement Academy in Santa Fe.

As a magistrate judge, Butts and his co-worker, Lorena Lamay, have handled 152 felonies, 1,156 traffic tickets, 326 misdemeanors, 224 civil cases and 124 DWIs.

Through Judge Butts' efforts with State Representative H. John Underwood (D-Lincoln County), due to the dramatic increase in cases, the legislature approved an additional full time magistrate court clerk for the Ruidoso court.

Butts released a comparison analysis of the nine months into the fiscal year, July 1, 1993, to March 24, 1994, to the previous year.

The following compares to the cases heard in Magistrate Court

Division II at this same time last year:

Felonies - this year 152, last year 42.

Traffic tickets - this year 1,156, last year, 346.

Misdemeanors - this year, 326, last year, 62.

Civil Cases - this year, 224, last year, 184.

DWI - this year, 127, last year, 40.

Butts and his wife, the former Rocki Wheeler, live between Ruidoso and Capitan. They have one daughter, Charni Butts, who is employed at the First National Bank.

Butts has two sons, Wade and Miller Butts, who are both building contractors in Farmington and Roswell, respectively.

Butts said he and his wife raise Appaloosa horses, but after his many years as a public servant, he wanted to be in a position where he can help people and do something for society.

Butts said he solicits the support of the citizens of Lincoln County and pledges to continue his dedication to administer justice fairly and impartially.

# Lady Warrior golfers improve in the Duke City

The Ruidoso High School Lady Warriors continued their improved play Tuesday in Albuquerque as they posted a very respectable total of 483, which was good enough for a third-place finish in the St. Pius Invitational at Ladera Golf Course.

Led by eighth-grader Devon Lowe's 102, the Lady Warriors were beaten by Farmington and Los Lunas, two AAAA schools.

The girls beat District rival Socorro for the first time in at least seven years in the nine-team event.

In addition to Lowe, other Warrior scores included Leigh Ann Christensen's 107; Katie Lukens, 111; Danielle Morris, 116 and Heather Stephens shot 116.

"I'm just elated the way the girls are coming along. We've got some serious girls out here and they want to improve," said girls coach Becky Austin.

"Three of these girls are eighth-graders and one's a freshman, so we're really excited about the future of girls golf at Ruidoso High School," said Austin.

Last week the girls finished fifth in El Paso, which was their best finish in years, but Tuesday's effort was better.

The Lady Warriors beat, and beat-handily, eight AAA schools, with a team that is very, very young.

When Oñate, last year's AAA State Champions, moved up to class AAAA next year, the Lady Warriors will be primed to bring home some State Championship trophies of their own, and Tuesday's performance proves it.

The girls were scheduled to compete in the APS Invitational on Monday but canceled their participation because of poor travel conditions Sunday.

Team scores for the St. Pius In-

vitational included: Farmington, 398; Los Lunas, 421; Ruidoso, 433; Socorro, 438; Grants, 457; Raton, 458; Belen, 461; St. Pius, 490; and St. Mike's, 502.

While the girls are showing great improvement, the boys team has yet to find its gear.

The returning state champions finished tied for fifth place at St. Pius — beaten by Grants, last year's state runner-up by 15 strokes.

Jeff Chapman shot 82 followed by Eric Stephens' 85. Matt Cantu fired a 86 while teammates Ryan Wall and Scott Christensen came in with 87 and 88 respectively.

Plagued by poor short games, the Warriors have been struggling when they don't hit the ball well. Putting problems have caused immense problems in their previous tournaments and this week's events were no exception.

While little good came out of

Tuesday's performance, at least the Warriors did leave Albuquerque with one-third of their State Tournament qualifying under their belts.

Their total of 340 was just good enough to get a "leg" to the state tournament, which will be held here in May.

Actually, it wasn't until mid-April last year when the Warriors got their first leg to State, after winning the Leroy Gooch Invitational.

With some good weather, the Warriors should qualify much earlier than last season.

"If they don't get down on them-

selves they'll be fine ... once we start playing some courses we're familiar with a little later in the season," said Wall.

That familiarity will be put to the test for the next three tournaments as the Warriors get a week off next week while preparing for the Ruidoso Invitational at the Inn of the Mountain Gods Golf Course on April 13.

The week after that, the Warriors will host the Leroy Gooch Invitational, the State's largest high school tournament at the Links at Sierra Blanca, Alto Lakes Country Club and Cree Meadows.

If the team can sharpen their short games and do well in those events against their AAA opponents, then the momentum will be back squarely in the Warriors corner for the State Tournament, which will also be held at the above courses.

# RHS harriers impressive in Las Cruces invitational meet

The Warrior Track Team, coming off a second-place finish in last week's Rose Relays continued to impress in the Oñate Invitational last Saturday in Las Cruces.

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# Hubbard's Hollywood Park takes control of Arizona track

Officials at Hollywood Park Inc. and Turf Paradise Wednesday announced they have signed a letter of intent in which Hollywood Park will acquire Phoenix-based Turf Paradise in a common stock swap valued at approximately \$38 million.

Under the terms of the transaction, Hollywood Park will acquire all 2.6 million shares of Turf Paradise stock in exchange for 1.4 million shares of newly issued Hollywood Park stock, or 6.5 shares of Hollywood Park for each 12 shares of Turf Paradise.

The acquisition will increase the number of Hollywood Park common shares outstanding to approximately 17.6 million. Company officials expect the acquisition will have a positive impact on 1994 earnings.

Turf Paradise, which operates a thoroughbred race track located on 275 acres on the northwest side of Phoenix, had earnings of \$0.48 per share in fiscal 1993 (ended June 30, 1993) and analysts have estimated earnings of \$0.64 per share in 1994.

Turf Paradise has no debt. Turf Paradise in fiscal 1993 had consolidated revenues of \$16.4 million, including \$11.7 million in combined pari-mutuel wagering commissions and a combined wagering handle of \$94.8 million.

"The Turf Paradise acquisition meets our strategy of national expansion through racing and other gaming operations that offer excellent value and significant upside potential," said R.D. Hubbard, Hollywood Park chairman and chief executive officer.

Hollywood Park Inc., headquartered in Inglewood, California, is an expanding gaming and entertainment holding company which owns the Hollywood Park Race Track, one of America's premier thoroughbred racing facilities, according to a news release.

The company owns and operates other attractions located on 335 acres near Los Angeles International Airport and will open a casino-style card club in early 1994.

# Share with wildlife this year on April 15


Have you ever heard of a boreal toad or narrowmouth whiptail lizard? If you haven't, you're probably not alone. Yet these rare animals do exist. Until recently, nothing was known about these little species of wildlife.

Thanks to Share with Wildlife, projects for these and other species are funded to find out just how and where these wildlife species fit into New Mexico's ecosystem.

Share with Wildlife is a way for residents to donate income tax refund money for wildlife. The donations fund numerous projects, that would never be funded otherwise; exploring the species' home range, distribution, habitat or reproductive characteristics for example.

Some of the information gathered is really unique. For instance, gray-cheeked whiptail lizards are only females. No males are found in their habitat. Female whiptails have the ability to develop eggs with needing males for fertilization.

Other projects funded by tax donation moneys are Talking Talons, a youth leader-



ship program emphasizing education and conservation; HawkWatch International, a raptor migration study; and assisting wildlife rehabilitation efforts throughout the state.

Now, your contribution is more important than ever due to a decline in donations. Share with Wildlife donations dropped from \$108,000 in 1990 to \$73,000 in 1991. Last year's donations were at an all-time low of \$35,000. Part of this decline stems from some additional new check-offs on the tax form competing with Share with Wildlife.

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# Chamber board focuses on fiesta & festival

 Plans for Ruidoso's upcoming art festival and for Fiesta de Ruidoso continue to develop.  
 According to Scott Muhn's report at the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce board meeting, his committee has received 249 applicants for the art festival. Only 125 of those will be selected to participate. Muhn said he didn't get as many entries as he expected.  
 "We're down about 11 entries from last year, but the show is still going to look great," he said.  
 Paul Crown speculated that entries may be down because the Ruidoso Art Festival is scheduled for the same weekend as a major festival in Boulder, Colorado, July 22 through 24.  
 Muhn said the jurying will take place next week. The jurors shall remain anonymous and the person selecting the jurors shall remain anonymous.  
 "It should go off without a hitch," said Muhn. "Billie Dentler at the chamber has done a good job helping us."  
 Joe Gomez and Joan Bailey reported on the status of Fiesta de Ruidoso. Bailey said that one rea-

son the Connoisseur Classic was canceled is that it was getting harder and harder to get wineries to participate.  
 Bill Gomez, Joe Gomez's cousin, is the director of the Wine and Wine Society of New Mexico, an association of New Mexico wineries.  
 "Bill Gomez said wineries are getting out of the wine tasting business altogether because it's not worth the expense," said Bailey. "So I guess we refocused our efforts by canceling Connoisseur Classic at the right time."  
 Bill Gomez recommended that no more than four wineries be invited to the event planned for Friday, June 17, at the Museum of the Horse. To kick off the weekend of the fiesta, invited guests will enjoy a wine tasting and entertainment at the Museum of the Horse. Bailey said more than 1,000 invitations will be sent out by the museum and the chamber.  
 Joe Gomez said, "I think it's really great of the museum to send out invitations to their members at their own expense."  
 The event includes strolling mariachis (a pair who performed last year at the Jockey Club), and Bailey has invited the Honda Val-

ley Dancers to perform. It will be catered by K-Bob's Steakhouse and margaritas will be served by the establishment who wins the "Best Margarita" contest.  
 Bailey also hopes that Footsteps Across New Mexico will bring their unique show to the museum. Footsteps traces the history of New Mexico from the land's volcanic evolution through the conquistadors to present times. Bailey said a multi-media show includes a topographical map of New Mexico that serves as a projection screen.  
 "It's really a fun and educational show," said Bailey.  
 Bailey said she has been getting calls from people she hasn't sent information to but who have heard about plans for the fiesta and want to participate.  
 The parade associated with Fiesta de Ruidoso has been canceled, but the chamber is asking local business people to promote the event for the entire month of June by decorating their shops in fiesta colors: hot pink, turquoise and bright yellow.  
 Bailey said that decorating the town starting Memorial Day weekend and ending June 20, at the fiesta's close, is a good way to

celebrate summer and get people excited about the fiesta.  
 "I feel like we've kind of been dropping the ball by not doing anything for Memorial Day weekend," she said. "This (decorating) is part of establishing a mindset. Part of doing business in Ruidoso and getting people into stores is making the atmosphere fun."  
 After Fiesta de Ruidoso, said Bailey, the next decorating event will be for the month of October to celebrate fall, Aspenfest and Oktoberfest. "Then it will be Christmas," said Bailey.  
 In other business at the meeting, Bailey reminded everyone that board elections are scheduled for the second week in April.  
 MainStreet director Don Miller gave the board an update on construction progress, announcing that 27 yards of concrete were laid Wednesday. He said the Ruidoso Village Council decided to complete the project as planned and that the parking issue had been resolved.  
 "Merchants are going to realize that on-street parking for cars isn't as valuable as sidewalks for pedestrians," said Miller. "We really need the six-foot sidewalks. Four feet isn't wide enough."

## Parcels on block for back taxes

State taxation officials anticipate recovering about \$58,000 from delinquent tax sale today when 21 parcels go on the block at the Lincoln County Courthouse in Carrizozo.

"That's what remains from the 81 originally pulled by the Department of Taxation and Revenue after they spent two months down here going through records," said deputy treasurer Joan Park. "Several hundred were flagged at the beginning."

Many parcels were eliminated because bankruptcy was involved or payments were worked out. The state clears up errors in records, checks for liens and assessment problems. The property up for tax sale has been delinquent for three and a half years.

"The minimum bid price represents the tax due, a \$25 state research charge, existing liens and, if the property is very valuable, a higher figure may be listed so that the property isn't just given away," Park said. "The most expensive minimum bid was \$83,000 for a house in Alto, but that was paid off. The lowest minimum bid is \$300. Normally, it's rare for a house to go on sale, but we have one left this year."

If the property is sold, the previous owners have a two year redemption period to prove the taxes had been paid.

The most frequent purchasers are professionals who travel from county to county and buy up parcels. Occasionally, someone is after a particular tract, Park said.

Sometimes the sales bring out the best in people, she said. "One man and his wife came in to pay off the taxes for a couple they didn't want to see lose their home," Park said. "They were concerned, so are we. (County Treasurer Janice Ware) spends hours on the phone trying to find these people and get them off the list. Even yesterday, we were still calling. After all, we represent the people who are your neighbors. We don't like to see this happen."



"Maybe, they got \$50 out of the machine and that's all. There was no vandalism, they apparently were just after money," Sonnemaker said.

## State pays for school landscaping

A state grant will take care of most of the landscaping around Capitan's new Middle School.

Twenty-eight trees have been selected through the \$3,767 grant from the Department of Energy, Minerals and Natural Resources.

Members of the Capitan School Board were told last week that Howard Shanks of the Southcentral Mountain Resource Development and Conservation had written the grant.

Two blue spruce, two white spruce, three Keteleeri juniper and five European mountain ash will be between four to six feet high. Two red maple, two pin oak, three green ash and two purple leaf plum will be six to eight feet and seven narrowleaf cottonwood will be one to two feet tall.

As the district's in-kind service, employees will plant, water and fertilize the trees.

Superintendent Diana Sonnemaker told members that \$34,800 listed on the monthly bills was for the purchase of IBM computers, an item already budgeted.

"They're better than we were

going to order," Sonnemaker told the board. "They were left over from an Albuquerque school district order and came in at a lower price than what I had ordered."

The units are stored until the new middle school is finished, she said. "The warranty doesn't start until we connect them this summer."

By sending two members of the staff for training about the computers, the warranty will be extended one year to a three year period.

Sonnemaker said she'll go back to the State Legislature next year for more computer money if she can't complete with Senate Bill 9 money the \$188,000 computer system revamping project she submitted this year. The legislature approved \$50,000 from each house for a \$100,000 total.

Coach Pam Allen also brought home some grant money.

Allen was awarded \$1,200 from Oshman's Sporting Goods for girls sports equipment. The money will purchase side goals for basketball worth \$800 and \$400 worth of shorts.

"There's lots of money out there

if you know where to go," board President Tom Trost said. "It's good to see our people trying for it."

The board also approved the 1994-95 school calendar selected by the majority of teachers. School will begin August 22 for teachers and August 23 for students. Christmas holiday will run from December 21 through January 2. Spring break covers March 20-24 and school ends May 26.

In other business, the school board:

—approved allowing four Head Start students to ride one of the regular school buses, with the agreement of their parents.

—approved a policy regarding outside employment and consumption of alcohol for the superintendent and principals. The policy prohibits consumption only on school property.

—heard a report from Sonnemaker about citations received on the district's accreditation report.

All dealt with paperwork components. Two of them were based on requirement changes never conveyed to the district by the state. Other districts also were cited.






Care-givers also need specific instructions on how to handle a suspect poisoning, including who to call and what to do and not do.

The council has published a free brochure explaining how parents and other care-givers can prevent childhood deaths and injuries from poisoning.

### Stupidity leads to odd inequities in the law

#### TO THE EDITOR:

A few days ago, I was glancing at the newly-issued New Mexico Hunting & Fishing Proclamations. Being an avid fisherman and an interested hunter, I am careful to plan my hunting and fishing times in order to follow regulations, and I am always impressed by the no-nonsense approach to the regulations governing hunting and fishing. However, while glancing through these publications, a few things struck me as odd.

A hunter that illegally possesses or attempts to transport big game faces a fine of \$1,000 and possible seizure of his weapon, vehicle or both. In addition, a serious hunting or fishing violation is punishable by a fine of up to \$500 and/or six months in jail.

However, when a person snatches a child and then attempts

to take that child across state and/or international boundaries, he receives little or no punishment. In addition, a parent that fails to pay court-ordered child support is committing a violation of the court, yet he receives almost no punishment when legally pursued.

Consider also the fact that "endangered" or "threatened" animal species are protected by federal law.

Are harassed, beaten, neglected and abused persons not then to be considered "endangered" or "threatened"? On the contrary, the victim is the one that carries the burden of proof. Why aren't THEY federally protected?

When caught "spotlighting" for game animals, the violator's vehicle is immediately confiscated as are his weapon and license. On the other hand, when caught driving

while intoxicated, or when convicted of vehicular manslaughter, the violator doesn't lose his license and is allowed to continue to drive his vehicle.

When caught shooting an animal illegally, the violator's firearm and hunting privileges are forfeited, and the violator also faces a fine and/or jail time. However, when caught pointing a firearm at another person's body or personal property, or when convicted of a violent crime involving a firearm, the punishment is minimal and it is assumed that the availability and variety of the weapon is at fault, and again, the victim carries the burden of proof.

How come a poacher is considered a dangerous criminal, but a person who continually commits violent crimes is allowed to roam the streets? Why is a person that

owns a handgun considered more likely to commit a violent crime, while a person owning a car capable of traveling at speeds up to 160 mph (when the speed limit is 55 mph) is not?

How come intelligent people have the ability to realize what is right and wrong when it comes to game laws and the protection of game animals, but lose the ability to see things in perspective when the victims are our fellow humans? Is no one held accountable for their actions anymore?

When are people going to realize that it is people that are committing the crimes, and that it is those criminal offenders (people) who need to be punished? Why should we have to suffer because of the stupidity of others?

# Snow returns to prepare the valley for Easter


When winter returns on Palm Sunday

# Band boosters push to purchase new uniforms

Band boosters promised a spiffy new look for student performers in 1994-95, if the Capitan School Board would help.

And help they did. Board members voted Thursday to request bids from different companies for 35 band uniforms.

Band and chorus instructor Dolores Earwood said she has commitments from 18 returning high school students that they will enroll in band, but she estimated 27 members even before a scheduled band drive. Some junior high students who excel also could be moved up to play with the higher level band, she said.

Booster president Connie Jaquess said the uniforms being used now are about 15 years old and out of style. Juanita Smith has been in charge of a committee gathering information about different uniform options.

Smith showed board members one possible outfit with hat (with or without plume), reversible cape, reversible field performance breast plate, a jacket and slacks.

The arrangement allows snare drummers to hide their straps under the garment. The waistline has some adjustability with a Velcro strip and the slack hem allows three inches for growth. The uniforms are fitted to allow enough room for warm undergarments during cold weather.

The uniforms must be dry cleaned and a deposit will be collected to ensure that is done at the end of each season before the uniform is turned in by the student, Smith said.

The uniform modeled by Jody Sidwell carries a 12-year warranty

on workmanship, Smith said. The bids would be solicited on individual components of the uniform, allowing the board to cut features members decided weren't cost effective.

Those components also can be reordered separately, if a student loses a cape or hat.

"It will extend the life of the uniform with different looks," Smith said. "The estimated cost is between \$325-350 per uniform."

"The kids are excited," Earwood said.

"It's not something that we couldn't build into the budget," Superintendent Diana Sonnamaker told board members.

Smith said the boosters had hoped to get 40 uniforms. The price decreases, if 30 to 50 are ordered and then again from 51 to 75.

"This is the first time we're going to start a band drive," she said. "The boosters this year are more active ... than in other years. We see a real need."

The companies require 120 to 150 days to manufacture the uniforms, which will cut it close to the first half time performance.

The cost could be reduced further by having the kids buy their own garment bags and hangers.

Smith said the uniform modeled by Sidwell may not be the one chosen. Each company will send an example for boosters and board members to evaluate.

"You all have done a lot of work," Trost said.

"We want it," Smith responded.

Jaquess said that although more uniforms could be ordered later, if band enrollment increases, the price also could go up by as much as 40 percent.

"You should be proud of these

kids," Earwood said. "Most are good students, good citizens. They're highly visible on trips and they and the choir, need new uniforms for next year."

Before the regular meeting, board members took a tour of the new middle school under construction on the old practice field.

Back in session at the school library, Edward W. Lang, office manager for Architecture Plus, the firm that designed the school, said the structure is about 55-60 percent complete.

"A lot of materials start showing up Monday (for the interior)," he said. "I'm pretty comfortable with it (the summer completion date)."

The board had called for a meeting with officials from the firm when the person assigned to oversee the project left the company. Even when he was on staff, board members said the project wasn't receiving enough attention.

Lang said Leon Harmon is responsible for on the job inspections.

"If he spots problems, I call the contractor," Lang said. "I handle the administrative things and the in-depth technical I bounce off Steve (Strain, president of the firm)."

Strain told the board he's ultimately responsible, because his stamp is on the plan drawings.

"With me, Ed and Leon, you will see plenty of time devoted to your project," Strain said.

Board member Beverly Payne still seemed unimpressed with the attention promised. She noted that if not for Harmon, the project has received little notice from the firm since construction started.

The new project person replacing the man who resigned is Rod

Shaw, Strain said. He didn't come to the meeting, because being new, he would have "come in cold."

Board president Tom Trost said the previous project person "came in cold and left cold. We were concerned, but Leon has been a big help."

Strain said the firm wants to work with the school board on future projects. "The way we can do that is to give you attention."

Sonnamaker said she had received a complaint from a subcontractor of a subcontractor that he hadn't been paid.

"Before subcontractors are paid, is there any way we can make sure they pay their subs?" she asked Strain.

"We require the general contractor to supply a release of lien before the final payment," he said. "It's illegal to file a lien against public schools, because technically they are owned by the state. We'll get with the general contractor, if a sub says a subcontractor didn't pay."

Trost said the board is very pleased with contractor T.E. Arrington. "He's doing a fine job," he said.

Payne also questioned why the board was charged an additional \$13,000 to raise the building grade for the school.

"Is this error the architect's, the builders, whose?" she asked.

Strain insisted that the plans for the school he issued contained positive drainage away from the building. "Then I hear it's too low and must be raised. I'm still not pleased with the way they went about it."

He acknowledged that the building would have been sitting lower than the street if the grade hadn't been raised.

"We're real concerned about flooding," Trost said. "Last year this building (the high school) flooded. It's better to go up than have three or four days with mops and brooms."

Harmon said, "T.E. and we all got concerned and raised it eight inches."

Strain said he thought the \$13,000 charge "was out of line," even though the original estimate was \$18,000.

"I still don't think it was an absolute necessity," he added. The charge came out of a \$15,000 modification fund included in the original bid.

"What happens to the fund if the money is not used?" Sonnamaker asked.

"It reverts back to the owner," Strain said. He pointed out that no profit is allowed in items covered from the modification fund, although a profit is allowed if a change ordered is approved.

Payne told Strain she'd like another meeting with firm officials, the contractor and the board. "I think we requested that in the beginning and still haven't gotten it."

In other business, board mem-

bers heard that \$1,500 has been encumbered in the student activity account to ensure adequate money for the junior/senior prom.

—were told that lunch bills owed by students in the cafeteria account are being straightened out slowly.

"We'll know in May if there is a problem, because we don't have all the records from September to December (the previous cafeteria manager resigned suddenly at Christmas break)," Sonnamaker said. "We're trying to reconcile our figures with parents."

A new method of tracking by computer will maintain a daily log, noting when charges are made and paid.

—were told that since Hondo school closed down its football program, Capitan bought that district's used equipment for \$1,470.

—heard that some items remain to be corrected before a final payment is sent to Van Winkle Roofing. The new roofs carry a guarantee of 10 years. The board approved an \$18,310 payment as part of the monthly bills.

# School board questions football field's future as Smokey concert stage

Concern over possible damage to Capitan high school's football field Thursday prompted school board members to postpone action on a request to stage a Country Western concert during the Smokey Bear Fiftieth Birthday celebration.

A special meeting has been called for 7 p.m. today with officials putting together the local celebration, including Barbara Luna of Friends of Smokey and the State Forestry Division.

Jean Cunningham and Jody Roberts of the County Fair Associa-

tion said their group is not sponsoring the concert, because of the financial risk. Instead, the American Collegiate Talent booking division of New Mexico State University will handle the concert.

"It may be good for the community, but not for the football field," Roberts said.

Superintendent Diana Sonnamaker said she hasn't received any specifics yet from the university.

"We can't make a decision until we know what they need," she said.

To break even, 3,000 people must pay to get in, and a portable

dance floor has been mentioned, she said. "Where are they going to park 3,000 people?"

"What about our 'no smoking' policy on campus and no alcohol on school grounds," board President Tom Trost asked.

The concert is scheduled to run from 9:30 to 11 p.m. July 2, starting after the Smokey Bear Stampede, Cunningham said.

"They said they would clean up afterward, and provide security, but we would have to do something to protect our track," Sonnamaker said.

High school principal Darrel

Stierwalt said if the field was prepared with extra fertilizer and watering, it probably could stand up to the abuse.

"But it's also our rainy season and if we get a heavy rain the day before, fertilization won't help," he said.

The use of the grounds legally shouldn't be a problem, because the university is another government entity, said board member Jack King.

Member Russell Shearer said the multi-sport field being developed by the village and school district across from the high school

also has been requested for the landing of the Smokey Bear balloon.

"Haven't we already committed that for parking?" Trost asked. "We need to sit down with Howard Shanks (of Friends of Smokey)."

In a related issue, Debra Ingle said Capitan has a chance to bring the traveling exposition on Smokey Bear to the village from July 1 to August 1. She asked the board to consider allowing the school gymnasium/auditorium to be used as a staging area for the exhibit.

"It was scheduled to be in New York," she told board members. "I

feel what they have, should have been offered to Capitan village in the first place, but I had to read about it in a magazine."

"We need 3,000 square feet to set up and must have insurance coverage up to \$4,000."

"We need to find out if our insurance would cover that," Sonnamaker said. The gym is big enough with 5,400 square feet.

"We have sponsors and could provide security for the hours it would be opened," Ingle said.

Shearer asked whether providing insurance would violate the state's anti-donation law.



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## THE LODGE

The historic Carrizo Lodge is a complete lodge where the past and present blend. We are nestled in the cool pine forest, beside a sparkling mountain stream, and offer a long tradition of relaxation and good old-fashioned Southwestern hospitality. The facility offers a variety of lodging units ranging from simple motel rooms to condominiums with fireplaces and kitchenettes. Amenities include hot tubs, swimming pool, full service restaurant. The spacious art studios include a wonderful natural northern skylights. Carrizo Lodge offers the rustic charm and slower pace of a bygone era. You will find the ideal setting to study art or just kick back and enjoy. Only the charm is old-fashioned! Experience the unique blend of old and new for yourself.

Carrizo Lodge: named by the Indians for the abundance of bamboo that grows in the creek.

A registered Historical Landmark, The Carrizo Lodge has a history going back to the Lincoln County War Days.

It was 1879 when Rutherford B. Hayes put his signature on a patent giving title to some 160 acres along the Carrizo Creek, to Colonel George A. Purington came to New Mexico as commander of the army post, Fort Stanton. The Carrizo land had intrigued him, but he didn't have long to enjoy the property or its mountain setting. He died in 1896, a year after his retirement from the army. The property remained with his widow until 1923 when she sold it to a man named Horace Carter for \$25,00 per acre.

Carter sold 40 acres to the New Mexico Military Institute in April of 1925. It was that year that the Institute built the original lodge, for summer retreat for the young cadets. The Institute and the state of New Mexico owned the property until 1943 when World War II interceded.

From 1943 to 1952, the Lodge and property were owned by Annie Coe Titsworth of the Hondo Valley. She was known as an excellent roper and rider. She heard many times how her father and uncle, George Coe, became close friends of Billy the Kid, one hundred years ago.

In 1952, Herb Greggerson, who was noted as the country's number one square dance caller, purchased the Lodge. The Greggersons moved their square dance operation from El Paso to The Carrizo Lodge. The Greggersons were an integral part of The Carrizo Lodge for the next 30 years. During the 1980's, the Lodge went through several changes in ownership.

Today, the beautiful and historic Carrizo Lodge and Art School are owned and operated by C-Net Resorts, Inc. The Carrizo Art School, established in 1956 by Frederic Taubes operates from May through October.

## SPECIAL NOTES...

On arrival, please check in at the front desk, even if you are only taking an art workshop. The front desk will have information on events, such as special get acquainted activities for art students, guests and

instructors. These are usually scheduled at 6:00 p.m. Sunday evening before classes begin on Monday.

## CANCELLATIONS...

Tuition deposits will be refunded if your cancellation is received 30 days prior to your scheduled workshop. A fee of \$100.00 will be deducted from your tuition deposit for cancellations less than 30 days of your workshop.

If a class is cancelled by an instructor, Carrizo Lodge will refund the tuition, but will be responsible for any expenses incurred by students.

## ABOUT YOUR CLASS...

Generally classes meet from 9:00 a.m. - 4:00 pm daily, although this may vary slightly. Each workshop is limited to 25 students to insure maximum personal assistance from your instructor. All instructors teach by combination of demonstration, class painting time and individual help.

There are no special requirements for classes and everyone is welcome. We only ask that you have a desire to learn. Most classes are mixed with beginner and advanced students. Our instructors easily adjust to your level of ability and a mixed class gives you the advantage of learning by observing others in the class. As well as being a practicing artist, each instructor is an experienced teacher, selected especially for their dynamic teaching abilities.

Artist supplies may be available to you. Ask at the front desk prior to class.

The studios are open each evening for students wishing to return to paint. Also, some evenings there are free demonstrations by instructors open to all students and guests.

The mountains of Southern New Mexico provide a landscape painter's paradise, offering great variety in subject matter. Alpine meadows, rushing streams, breathtaking mountain panoramas, spacious deserts and quiet adobe villages are all within a short distance of the lodge. Also for portrait painters, Native American, Hispanics, Rustic Cowboys, and a wide variety of other character types are available for models.

## PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION TO RUIDOSO

Major airlines serve El Paso, Texas 120 miles southwest, and Albuquerque, New Mexico, 191 miles northwest. Ruidoso has a community airport which serves private planes (phone 505-336-8111). Rental cars are available at all of these airports.

Ruidoso has excellent bus service provided by Greyhound Bus Lines with four departures daily to and from El Paso within three hours travel time. Greyhound also arrives from Albuquerque through Roswell. The Carrizo Lodge will make arrangements to pick up guests arriving by bus and at the local airport.

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
**Martha Kellar - Pastel-Oil**

"Problems in painting usually happen at the beginning of a painting, frequently as a result of faulty technique or an overeager approach. Painting from life is essential for the develop-




ment of the artist, and will be the method we will employ in the class," says Kellar.

Steve Grey will begin his week of teaching drawing light and shadow, illustrating form and discussing ways to combine media to give inspiration to an artist's work.



Students may work in medium of choice.





L'Deane, like most serious artists, views art as being as much about communication as creation.

You'll be hard put to draw an overwrought explanation of her work from this painter and sculptor whose full-time focus on art was postponed until her children were grown.

L'Deane at 64 has experienced too many of the necessary but often unglamorous daily tasks of years spent as a teacher, wife, and mother to bother with pretentiousness. Therein lies the charm of both the artwork and the artist: honest impressions of life by a woman who has really lived.



### James Whitlow - Watercolor

August 1-5

Students enrolled in this workshop will receive extra individual attention as Jim Whitlow and his wife, Cherrill, instruct together to teach the discipline, freedom, and spontaneity of paint and color.

Whitlow describes this class as "Impressionism of the Southwest."



Floor Plan


