On the side

Vandals cause post office lobby closure

Due to vandalism, the Ruidoso Post Office will no longer be open 24 hours a day. The lobby will open at 6 a.m. and close at 6 p.m.

According to postmaster Gordon Rowell, vandals have been going into the post office late at night and wreaking havoc. They break the glass in post office boxes, urinate on the trash cans, and even scatter Food Bank donations.

"So far no mail has been stolen," Rowell said. "This has been going on for about six months, and it happens at least once a week. We decided we'll just have to close at night to keep the vandals out."

Rowell said police check on the post office as they do any other business, but have been unable to catch the perpetrators.

According to the postal inspector, defacement of government property is a felony punishable by up to \$10,000 and/or 10 years in prison for damage over \$100. Damage under \$100 carries a maximum penalty of \$1,000 and/or one year in prison.

Village pumps up Capitan clean up

Clean is the operable word in Capitan for the week of April 18-23.

The Capitan Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring an annual clean up effort on Saturday, April 23.

To enhance that effort, the village has declared the entire week, clean up time.

From April 19-23, debris may be dumped at the Capitan landfill free by presenting a village water bill to prove residency.

Council sets two budget workshops

Budget workshops are scheduled for 9 a.m. Monday, April 11, and 1 p.m. Wednesday, April 13, according to village manager Gary Jackson.

Jackson said the purpose of the workshop is to discuss and review the fiscal year 1994-95 of the village as required by state statute.

Jackson said Monday will be an overall review, and Wednesday is reserved for more specific detail in advertising and promotion.

He said a formal hearing was scheduled during the regular meeting of May 10, when a time will be set to approve the preliminary budget. He set the Department of Finance Administration requires the final budget be submitted before July 20.

Downs board talks of cows and money

The Ruidoso Downs Board of Trustees meets at 7 p.m. today (Monday), April 11, at the fire station.

The agenda includes discussion of a cattle nuisance brought up by Mr. Meyers. The board intends to adopt a Small Business Week proclamation and a resolution for budget changes. The resolution calls for adjusting the beginning balance of the general fund from \$46,702 to \$67,701 and the utility fund from \$74,897 to \$179,340 due to addition errors.

MainStreet picks new board members

At their annual meeting Thursday night, MainStreet members elected Pat Smith, Susan Carter and Eddie Fowler to the board of directors. Votes for the fourth director's seat came to a three-way tie among Joan Bailey, Clark Carpenter and Jay Ross.

Bailey withdrew her name from further consideration for a place on the board. "The chamber will work

very closely with MainStreet anyway," she said at the meeting. "I would like to defer to these two gentlemen."

Since a quorum was not in attendance, Don Dutton, who was subsequently named the new president of the board, suggested a coin toss to break the tie.

After some conferring among the directors, it was decided that a tie-breaker would be postponed. The board will resolve the issue at its

meeting April 21. The resignation of J.D. James from the board leaves a vacancy for a village liaison.

In his final evening as MainStreet president, Tom Battin said, "I feel fortunate to have been president of MainStreet the year construction started on a \$1.3 million project to make Midtown Ruidoso safer and more beautiful."

Battin thanked several people who have supported MainStreet, including Mayor Jerry Shaw and

the village council, State Representative John Underwood, village manager Gary Jackson, deputy village manager Alan Briley, former MainStreet director Mary Maul, and founding president Margaret Lahey.

MainStreet presented certificates of appreciation to outgoing board members Alden Deyo, Ann Bolton, Bill Carrigan, Frank Potter

Bargain or boondoggle? Commission moves ahead to purchase sale barn

Lincoln County jumped three steps closer to owning a rural events center Friday.

County Commissioner Stirling Spencer says he just hopes someone knows what to do with it.

Spencer cast the only nay vote on the contract to purchase the center, formerly the Super Select Sales Barn in Glencoe.

But he was joined in a negative vote by Commissioner Bill Schwettmann on a county lease of the property until the sale is consummated, then stood alone again in opposing the proposed \$14,300 operation budget for the remainder of the fiscal year (ending June 30).

Schwettmann, who has opposed the acquisition, indicated that he voted for the purchase agreement because he knew the majority favored the action and by voting with them, he would have the right to revisit the issue in the future.

Commissioners Wilton Howell, L. Ray Nunley and Chairman Monroy Montes voted straight "yes" on all three motions.

Proponents contend the center on U.S. 70 will present a unique opportunity to bring special shows to the area that will positively impact the entire county by drawing more visitors. The possibility of establishing a museum in a portion of the center also has been suggested.

State legislators apparently agreed with those in favor of the purchase and approved \$250,000 to that end last January in addition to \$40,000 for the initial operation and remodeling. Governor Bruce King signed the bill authorizing the allocation.

"To me, this thing looks like it was wired from the start," Spencer said, noting that he has repeatedly asked for information about the previous financial operation of the barn and has never received any feedback. He also hasn't received any concrete answers on the uses for the center.

"Why not buy a farm or a Lear jet and then find some use for them?" he asked. "I'm all for going forward if we have a use."

Spencer also was critical of the State Legislature for using state tax money to finance the purchase of the center. The money could have been better spent on improving existing infrastructure in the county, he said.

Spencer said he also took issue with specific terms in the purchase contract.

"We've never seen the easements or restrictions the property is subject to, and there are ambiguous time lines for the title report and other items," he said. "This looks like a seller's document to me. They get to pick the title company and the exceptions to the title insur-

ance. We split closing costs. I think they should pay for the survey."

"And how can we go to the State Engineer to justify water use if we don't know what the center will be used for yet?"

The commission has taken no action to verify the engineering integrity and construction of the facility, Spencer said.

However, his biggest concern is that no "hold harmless" clause was contained in the document to protect the county in the future if any hazardous waste is found on the land. A clean up "could cost a fortune," he said.

Spencer also objected to leasing the property while waiting for the state money to flow. It's been on the market for two years. What's the rush?

"We pay \$500 a month, plus the upkeep," he noted. "And here we are taking more private land off the county tax rolls. They were paying \$3,600 in taxes a year."

"We're encumbering ourselves to the unknown at the same time the county is deficit spending to the tune of \$200,000 a year."

Although he said plenty of people object to the purchase as a "boondoggle," Spencer said few have contacted the commission to express their opinions.

"Apparently, the majority want the building. Either that or apathy sometimes causes things to hap-

pen," he said.

The board of directors of the Super Select Horse Sale Company, which owns the barn, consists of Gerald Blue, Alton Goodrich, Gary Pogue, Joan Hubbard, Art Shahan and H.C. Werner. Officers are president Grady Stowe, vice president David Gibson, secretary George Middleton and agent Richard Thompson.

Spencer pointed out that the Bonnell Ranch borders the 12-acre parcel on the south and west. Land owned by Eleanor Bonnell Shockey and her husband adjoins the north and east.

In a matter relating the operation of the Lincoln County Medical Center, after a brief discussion, commissioners approved a new 10-year contract with Presbyterian Healthcare Services (PHS) based in Albuquerque.

The item had been included in the consent agenda (which is approved as a block in one vote), but was removed for independent discussion and action on a request from Commissioner L. Ray Nunley.

Spencer voted against the agreement with PHS based on a small change he suggested that was not included.

"It's an excellent contract in general," Spencer later told *The Ruidoso News*. "I wanted to

County leaders increase their pay

Elected Lincoln County officials will see a seven percent increase in their paychecks after January 1, thanks to three county commissioners, who incidentally, also will benefit from the same percentage raise.

The action in a special meeting Friday will cost the county \$12,215 annually, jumping the salaries of the county clerk, treasurer, assessor and sheriff by \$2,135 from \$30,500 to \$32,635. Commissioners, who earn one-third of the salary paid for full-time elected positions, will receive a more modest increase of \$735 to \$11,235.

Commission watchers were shocked to see the usually conservative Commissioner Stirling Spencer offer the motion to approve the increase after listening to appeals for the action by County Clerk Martha Proctor (unopposed for reelection), Sheriff James McSwane (with two more years left in his term) and Treasurer Janice Ware (who is not running for reelection and will not personally benefit from the increase). Assessor Patsy Serna presented a more neutral position.

The commission voted 3-2 to approve the raise with Commissioner Wilton Howell and Chairman Monroy Montes casting the negative votes. Commissioners Spencer, Bill Schwettmann and L. Ray Nunley approved the increase, despite the advice of county attorney Alan Morel.

"Article 4, Section 27 of the State Constitution says commissioners can't receive a salary increase while they are in office (during a single term)," Morel said. "Then in 1990, the State Legislature passed a statute based on the position of equity that says if one elected official or commissioner gets a raise, that all must receive the same percentage."

"The intent was for everybody to be raised January 1, 1991 based on each county's designation on the maximum they could make and the ability to fund it. Yet, the Constitution says there shall be no increase during a term."

Two attorney general opinions in 1983 and again in 1992 stand by the interpretation that the equity statute is unconstitutional and that the raises should only apply to those newly elected or re-elected officials, Morel noted.

"There is a difference here that I can't resolve," he said. "Case law says that a statute is perceived as constitutional until it is proven otherwise. But this could be challenged and I believe if it was, the Constitutional provision would prevail."

"All I wanted to do was make them aware of that."

"Why do we even have an attorney if we're not going to listen to his advice?" Howell asked.

A spokesman for the State Department of Finance and Administration told *The Ruidoso News* that according to a 1968 attorney general's opinion, the increase did not violate state law as long as the total did not exceed the constitu-

change one word that I felt gave PHS autonomy in deciding whether the special tax levy could be used for the county's indigent funding obligation versus the commission having that power.

"When county money is involved, I like to make sure that all corners are covered. But we've come a long way. I just didn't want to give away any commission autonomy."

County manager Andy Wynham, who negotiated the contract, said, "This agreement was everything I could have wanted. Although the rumor is that we gave Presbyterian a hard time over this contract, in less than two months, we mutually came up with a wonderful agreement."

Provisions were added giving Wynham more access to the firm's

full financial picture in reference to the hospital's operation and administration fees. Ownership of equipment was spelled out clearly.

"PHS still doesn't want to become a public entity, but I do have the right to look at the material," Wynham said.

The Presbyterian organization has leased the medical facility and operated a hospital in the county since 1972. The last lease was signed in 1989.

In other action, the commission: —approved a memorandum of understanding among the county, the city of Alamogordo and the U.S. Forest Service on the resurfacing and long term maintenance of Bonito Lake Road.

Spencer cast the only negative vote, recalling that when he first was elected to the commission, service officials agreed to work with

Alamogordo representatives to care for the road. The county shouldn't take on the obligation of maintenance, he said.

Howell pointed out that discussions on the road dilemma have been going on for months.

"Where was Commissioner Spencer when this was going on," he said. "You don't just wait till it hits the table and then reject it."

—appointed Duane Frost from District one and George Schultz from District two to serve on the Agriculture and Rural Affairs Board.

—reappointed Commissioner Nunley and Dolores Rue to the Zia Senior Citizens Board.

Commissioners capped off the day with a tour of the newly remodeled county jail and sheriff's department and then approved the job as substantially completed.

tional limit of the office based on the county's classification.

That limit for commissioners in a "Class B Under" county is \$14,000 a year.

Spencer said he didn't want a raise, but felt one was justified for the full-time elected department heads.

"They had gone three years without an increase and were looking at three more if we didn't approve it," he said. "I didn't want one as a commissioner, but it was tied to it. We had given employees a six percent raise and increases in the cost of living affect everyone. I told the board that I don't intend to keep the extra money. I will either refund it to the county or give it to a charity."

Howell said he was offended by Proctor's use of the county's stationery for a letter sent to commissioners urging passage of the pay increase.

"I wonder how much support there would have been for it if the

raise came up before the deadline to qualify to run for election," he said. "We signed a four-year contract and you don't renegotiate in the middle of a term. We all knew what the jobs paid. This should have been brought up before the qualifying period and maybe more people would have been interested in running."

Defending her use of the county's stationery, Proctor told *The News*, "I felt that the pay issue is part of my job and I don't feel it was out of line (to use the county letterhead). It had to do with county business, not just my personal salary. I was speaking on behalf of all the elected officials."

Howell still was upset hours later.

"I just can't understand how anyone can live with voting themselves a raise," he said. "It should take legislative action or voter approval. If Stirling wants to give it back, he should make sure it gets back to the taxpayers. This might be legal, but it's wrong."

In her letter, Proctor noted that the last raise occurred in January

1991 and if this increase was not approved, the next possible time wouldn't be until January 1996.

"With the exception of commissioners, all elected officials serve on a full time basis and have given up all other careers to do so," she wrote. Proctor added that several county employees are paid more than elected officials.

"Also job security in these positions is left totally up to the voters, and then for limited terms only," she wrote.

However, Montes pointed out that elected officials may experience a double increase during their terms.

Once the county's property valuation hits \$300-million and stays there for a year, elected officials will jump into another category of salaries. The valuation now sits at \$287-million.

Spencer's generosity didn't stop with elected officials. He also made a motion to approve a \$5 an hour increase for Morel and his partner Dan Bryant from \$60 to \$65, but the motion failed 3-2. Commissioners Montes, Howell and Schwettmann voted against it.

and J.D. James.

"Great days lay ahead for MainStreet," said Battin. "We have come to a crossroads. When construction is completed, we will look to the new president and board to lead MainStreet into other projects."

Specifically, MainStreet will turn its attention to a riverwalk project when the Sudderth construction is completed.

New director Pat Smith said she is very optimistic about MainStreet's future and looks forward to representing the merchants.

"I couldn't be more pleased," she said.

Susan Carter said she is excited and ready to do all she can.

"I'm proud to be on the board," she said.

Eddie Fowler was unable to attend the annual meeting due to a personal emergency. He has said previously that he looks forward to continued good communication between MainStreet and merchants.

MainStreet Coffee

While the evening was full of accolades and positive turnings, the morning after was a headache for Battin and MainStreet director Don Miller. At the MainStreet coffee Friday they faced a one-man lecture by Kalliga's owner Jimmy Millar.

Miller is still angry over the loss of parking on Sudderth.

"The mayor told Alan (Briley) to work with people to put back parking, then she crossed the fence at the very next meeting," he said. "There ain't nothing going to take the place of parking on the main street. It's the older people who spend the money and you're pushing them out."

Jimmy Millar also questioned the project's success in complying with ADA requirements, saying that (Don) Miller had promised to make storefronts wheelchair accessible. Millar added that he didn't

see the need for ADA compliance because only one disabled person has ever come into his store.

Don Miller reiterated what Alan Briley said at the MainStreet workshop.

"We're helping businesses comply with ADA where it's feasible. ADA is a federal law," he added. "You guys better take it seriously."

It is the responsibility of individual merchants to comply with the Americans with Disabilities Act. In bringing the sidewalks into ADA compliance, the village has made it easier for some businesses to provide wheelchair accessibility.

Jimmy Millar said that not only are the off-street parking lots a difficult situation for people in wheelchairs, but also that his elderly customers would not park two blocks away to visit his store.

Don Miller said that the MainStreet market survey found that none of the stores on Sudderth were destination stores and that shoppers generally treat the strip like a mall.

"The reason shopping centers are so successful is because they share parking and share customers," Miller said. "When someone parks in your lot, you get first and last shot at that customer. Everyone here depends on everyone else's customers."

Jimmy Millar said he thought Don Miller was wrong on that, and Miller said that anyone in Midtown who believed they had a destination store was free to move to another location.

"I just can't understand how you can spend \$1.3 million of tax payer's money and not have a plan," said Millar. "Somebody dropped the ball here."

Jimmy Millar said he intends to put back signs reserving his 16-space lot for his customers only. They are what Don Miller calls "hate signs." Millar said the construction project is going to hurt downtown Ruidoso.

Many people who disagree with Miller quietly excused themselves from the room while he was talking. Earlier in the meeting discussion had focused on walking space rather than on parking space.

Don Miller said the landscaping was being redone using crates and/or flower beds around the trees.

"We'll have 90 percent concrete and 10 percent landscaping," he said.

Miller said that where extra walking room was needed, the trees would be skirted by crates. In places where the sidewalk is wide enough, small squares will be planted with seasonal flowers. He said the bark they originally planned for would not be used.

Miller said they are looking into affixing ash trays to future trash cans. He said that maintenance of the streetscape is a concern of MainStreet. Many merchants have expressed concern that landscaping feature will collect trash or be trampled.

Jay Ross returned to the problem of merchants parking in front of their stores. He repeated a suggestion to place time limits on Sudderth parking spaces and to have a walking patrol ticket violators. He said having an officer on the street would also enhance the atmosphere, especially in the evenings, by making shoppers feel safe.

"Instead of a ticket, they get a message that says 'Welcome to our town,'" he said.

Miller was receptive to these suggestions.

In updating merchants on the progress of construction, Miller said demolition in front of Brunell's and at Country Club Drive is scheduled for Wednesday. Simultaneous work at the northwestern part of the project won't begin for another two weeks.

He reminded everyone not to park in the construction zone.

The board plans to go behind closed doors for private discussions on recommendations for teachers and other school employees for the 1994-95 year.

The school board will meet with Mescalero students at 7 p.m. Tuesday, May 3, at the Old Road Restaurant in Mescalero; and with the RHS student council at 7 p.m. Wednesday, May 11, at Casa Blanca Restaurant.

All meetings of the Ruidoso School Board are open to the public, and time is set aside on the agenda for comments, limited to three minutes each, from the audience.

Searching for a convention hotel investor, re-striping a portion of Sudderth Drive for left turns only and another Short Street Bridge chapter is scheduled Tuesday for Ruidoso Council discussion.

During the regular council meeting on March 29, the council instructed the village staff to prepare a Request for Proposal (RFP) for the lease of village property for the purpose of constructing a luxury hotel of 125-200 rooms.

Village attorney John Underwood, with the village staff, drafted the RFP for council to discuss and approve Tuesday.

Last year, the New Mexico Highway Department came before the council to discuss a proposal that would: initiate a center left turn lane at the Cattle Baron Restaurant and to eliminate the on-street curb parking at the same location or the entire length of Sudderth Drive from U.S. Highway 70 to Carrizo Canyon Road turnoff.

That plan was rejected by the council, and the Old Mill played a part in the rejection. Officials of the highway department said it was just a matter of time before it would be done anyhow.

Ruidoso police chief Dick Swenor said the study period of April 1, 1993, to March 31, 1994, produced a total of 74 motor vehicle accidents on Sudderth Drive between the intersection at U.S. Highway 70 and Mechem Drive.

He said during that period, no motor vehicle accidents occurred in the specific area depicted by the highway department.

Swenor said the lack of accidents appears directly attributable to the improved entrances of the Cattle Baron.

Swenor will recommend that, as a minimum, a continuous left turn center lane should be endorsed on Sudderth Drive between Paradise Canyon Road and the Carrizo Canyon Road turnoff for the best traffic management benefits.

Two injured in Highway 70 crash

A two car accident with injuries occurred last Monday morning, April 4, on U.S. Highway 70 near mile marker 281 at San Patricio.

Leland Casteel, 78, of Roswell told State Police officer Kevin McPherson that a pickup truck driven by Senon Chavez, 77, pulled out in front of him to cause the collision.

According to State Police reports, Casteel, driving a 1990 Chevrolet Sedan, was driving eastbound. Chavez, from San Patricio, approached the highway from an access road in his 1990 Chevy pickup and proceeded to turn left directly in front of Casteel.

Casteel was cited for failure to yield the right of way.

Lincoln County Wrecker was called to haul one car away and Sierra Blanca Wrecker hauled the other.

Casteel was treated and released. Chavez was not injured.

A pregnant Ruidoso Downs woman and her two children were involved in a three car accident

near the 600 block of Carrizo Creek Drive last Monday, April 4.

Anjanette Chavez, 30 and eight months pregnant, was driving her 1992 white Dodge van westbound on Carrizo Creek Drive following a 1992 Chevy driven by Myra Lapaz, 35, of Mescalero.

Chavez attempted a left turn into a residence and did not see the 1980 blue Ford driven by Pansy Torres, 54, coming from the opposite direction.

Torres was not able to stop in time to avoid a collision and struck Chavez in the right rear, then crossed the center line side swiping Lapaz, damaging the entire left side of her car.

Damage to Chavez's vehicle included the right rear panel and tail light.

The pregnant Chavez complained of pain in the right side and legs, but refused transport from Ruidoso EMS. She said she would go to the clinic at Mescalero to see her doctor.

Margaret Shanta, 10, and Chris-

lyne Shanta, 9, daughters of Chavez, sustained light injuries. Treatment for the two girls also was refused from EMS. Chavez said her daughters would accompany her to the Mescalero clinic.

There were no complaints of injuries from Lapaz or Torres. They also refused EMS treatment.

Cynthia Eggleston, a Wal-Mart employee, was surprised to find her 1987 Toyota damaged in the store's parking lot and a note explaining the accident.

Eggleston told officer Ramona Wheeler she had parked her vehicle in the Wal-Mart parking lot at 4 p.m. for work. When she returned at about 10:20 p.m., she found a note on the windshield stating that an old brown car with a woman driver had hit her car. The good Samaritan also wrote the suspect's license number on the slip of paper.

Officer Wheeler wrote in her report that the case is pending finding the vehicle and owner of the brown car.

A fluffy fur ball of affection, Banjo was found wandering in a remote section of the county around Hale Lake about one month ago. Either someone just dropped her out in wild country to fend for herself when she was only about three months old or maybe she jumped out of a truck while her

owner was cutting wood and they couldn't get her back," said Lincoln County shelter director Esther Harper. "She was found by a citizen who brought her here. Banjo appears to be a shepherd/husky mix, said shelter secretary Kathy Tetreault. "I checked our books and there's nothing that really looks just like her. Her fur is reddish with black ac-

cents and she has a thick undercoat. She's very unusual. She tends to be more aggressive than most dogs her age, I guess because she had to survive on her own for a while. But Banjo loves attention and would be a hardy companion for a person who enjoys outdoor activities. Little Straw Brie also hasn't experienced an easy life. She was brought to the shelter with a litter of puppies to suffer the consequences of an owner who didn't care enough to spay her or keep her when his/her negligence produced puppies.

Straw Brie appears to be a sheltie mix, about one to two years old. She's small and very attractive with brown and white markings. "She's also very intelligent," Harper said. "She's a real escape artist. With the construction going on at the shelter and the outside gates gone, she's managed to get away on occasion, but always hangs around outside."

Tetreault said she thinks Straw Brie just wants to be with people. "She's very affectionate and good with kids, very gentle," Tetreault said. "She just need some human company. She gets along fine with the other dogs, but she wants an owner."

To be adopted, both Banjo and Straw Brie would have to be spayed in compliance with state law that requires sterilization for all animals adopted from shelters. The thrust of the law is to prevent more unwanted litters and abandoned

pets that often face a death sentence. The society's philosophy is to try to give each animal a chance for a new life. Only when conditions become too crowded or an animal is too ill is a dog or cat destroyed. To provide more space and cages, the shelter currently is being expanded, but until that work is completed, space is at a premium. Many different approaches are open to people who want to help the abandoned animals. Sponsors contribute significantly by donating money to cover the cost of spaying or neutering pets up for adoption, greatly reducing the cost to the new owner and increasing the pet's chances for a home. Volunteers are needed almost any time at the society's thrift shop next to Arby's on Sudderth Drive. A clearance sale is planned for the week of April 19-20. Get some exercise and keep the animals socialized by stopping by to play with the cats or walk the dogs at the shelter. Sometimes the ability to behave on a leash can make a big difference when a prospective owner is looking over candidates.

Don't throw out aluminum cans. Haul them to the Lincoln County Solid Waste recycling center on Second Street in Ruidoso Downs and have them credited to the society's account. "Those pennies and dimes add up just like they do in the donation cans around town," Tetreault said. For more information about

Buyer agents take risk out of home-buying

People buying real estate in Lincoln County used to be on their own when it came to looking out for their best interests. Now buyers can enlist the services of a broker and an attorney who can make almost every step of buying a home worry-free.

Lawyers Real Estate Services, Inc. is a partnership of attorney Don Dutton, attorney/broker David Stevens and qualifying broker Douglas Siddens. They are the first in the area to represent buyers and buyers only in real estate transactions. They carry no listings, and their services generally cost the buyer nothing.

"This is the wave of the future," said Siddens. "Buyer agents are already working in Texas, California, New York and Utah. And now it's going to happen in New Mexico."

Stevens explained that until two years ago New Mexico state law required brokers to represent the seller. Even when two brokers were involved in the deal, both were obligated to the seller. If a buyer wanted someone looking out for his interests, he typically had to hire a lawyer.

According to a national study,

Stevens said, 85 percent of buyers who brought brokers into negotiations believed the brokers were representing them, even though brokers signed a disclosure that said they represented the seller.

"Imagine the negotiating table where sits the seller, the seller's broker, the seller's attorney, and the guy with the money, who's all by himself," said Stevens. "There's something wrong with that picture."

"Now the rules have changed," said Siddens. "We're obligated only to you, the buyer."

"It doesn't cost the seller anything extra," said Stevens. "They agree to pay a commission to their broker anyway, and the broker splits the commission with us, just as they would with a Realtor."

The arrangement is beneficial for everyone but any potentially unscrupulous seller. LRS checks out every aspect of the deal in terms of legality and advises the buyer of potential problems like power easements or unusual property lines. If they miss something that comes back to haunt their client, the malpractice insurance covers the costs.

"There are a lot of legal prob-

lems that come up in real estate and result in a lot of litigation," said Stevens. "This is preventative medicine. If you treat something early you save yourself the expense and trauma of a hospital stay."

Another advantage to using a buyer agent is anonymity. LRS is not required to disclose a client's name and so can negotiate deals for entities who prefer to remain nameless when buying real estate.

"That's a sophisticated buyer," said Stevens. "But we're probably most helpful to the unsophisticated buyer, the person who brings in a nest egg of \$20,000 and wants to buy a home in Lincoln County. More than anyone, that person needs us to protect their interests."

Such a buyer can trust that LRS has the best talent in the brokerage business and will give good legal advice, said Stevens.

Siddens was a multi-million dollar broker for Coldwell Bank and he has 17 years experience with the real estate market in this area.

LRS is also allied with Sun Country Mortgage in El Paso, Texas, which allows them to shortcut the loan application process.

"It's one-stop shopping," said

Stevens. "Our objective is to provide full service to our clients. We can familiarize them with the market, negotiate the deal, help with funding and give legal advice."

Stevens pointed out that real estate brokers are limited in their

powers to amend contracts, and they cannot tell a buyer that although a property lists for \$100,000, the buyers could probably get it for \$89,000. LRS, on the other hand, is obligated to get the best price for a property, and an on-site

lawyer can amend contracts or take care of any legalities on the spot.

"Our loyalty is only to our client," said Stevens. "Now that you can get experts to represent only you at no cost to you, why do it any other way?"

Satellite systems soon will beam digital TV into New Mexico

New Mexico residents will be among the first television viewers in the nation to have access to the new digital television system offered by Penasco Telecom Systems of Artesia and by RCA.

Penasco recently announced that they will be the exclusive service provider of DIRECTV television programming/service to households in Eddy, Chavez, Lea, Lincoln and Otero counties.

DIRECTV is a direct broadcast satellite service capable of carrying approximately 150 channels of high quality "cable type" programming, pay-per-view movies, sports and other information/entertainment/education channels.

The direct broadcast service is a joint venture of Penasco Telecom Systems, which is a subsidiary of Penasco Valley Telephone Cooperative, National Rural Telecom-

munications Cooperative and Hughes Communications, the largest operators of satellites in the world.

In December they successfully launched the nation's first direct

broadcast satellite and will offer about 70 channels of digital television service starting this spring, according to a news release.

A sister satellite will be launched this summer to provide the full

compliment of 150 channels.

According to Penasco, the high powered satellites will incorporate

digital compression which significantly increases the channel capacity of the service. The digital signalling will allow Penasco Telecom Systems to provide high-definition television (HDTV) video quality and compact disk (CD) quality audio/sound as well as stereo music channels.

County asks P&Z to hand over control on proposed subdivision

- approval of a replat for Alvin Tingley for lots 25 and 26 in Wingfield Homestead Subdivision.
- approved changing the name of Runway Road South of White Mountain Drive to Shaw Lane.

Lincoln County native announces for judge

Danny B. Garcia, a life-long Lincoln County resident, has declared his candidacy for Magistrate Judge District II, in the June 7 Democratic primary election.

Garcia enters the race with more than a thousand hours of combined training in law enforcement, emergency medical training, fire service training and U.S. Department of the Interior along with Department of the Army explosive training.

According to his announcement, Garcia has also been a firefighter for the Village of Ruidoso since 1968, a member of the State Forestry fire crew and a member of the FOP. He is currently enrolled in his second semester at ENMU-R working toward a degree in criminal justice.

Garcia says, he wants to do more than spend the required 40 hours a week in the court room and believes he can be instrumental in setting up programs with schools around Lincoln County.

"If we can inspire or influence just one kid from each school, it will be rewarding," says Garcia.

Another area of concern for Garcia is DWI. On numerous occasions as a firefighter, he had the unpleasant task of extricating the lifeless bodies of men, women and children from vehicles involved in accidents where alcohol was a factor and attributed to the collision. Garcia intends to be firm and unyielding with these cases.

Garcia was also the originator of the "Happy Holidays Fund Drive" in 1977 which helped those families in need around Lincoln County for the Christmas holidays. The first year Happy Holidays helped 20 families, and then number climbed to more than 300 after the ninth season. The program is still in operation today and is referred to as the annual highly successful Santa Cops, says Garcia.

Garcia is the youngest of five children born to the late Caesar M. and Hortencia G. Garcia. Two older brothers and one sister live in Lin-

coln county while the youngest sister lives in Silver City. Garcia married the daughter of Ermanda and Aneda Chavez who presently reside in the Hondo valley.

Garcia credits his long list of accomplishments to his father who introduced him to hard work at the early age of 11. Garcia remembers working 12 hours a day at \$10 a week.

Garcia says he kept busy during adolescence learning trade secrets from his dad while the late R.A. Bennett made it possible for him to learn the art of meat cutting.

After high school graduation, Garcia joined the U.S. Navy where he spent two years, six months and twenty days from a four-year enlistment overseas.

According to his announcement, he served aboard two aircraft carriers, the Midway and Enterprise working with military explosives in places from the Tonkin Gulf off Vietnam to homeport of Yokosuka, Japan.

Garcia and his wife, Lillian, have two children, a daughter who graduated from Ruidoso High in 1992, and son, Billy, who is currently a sophomore at RHS.

Garcia is quick to point out the problems in raising young children these days and feels that not enough emphasis is being placed on issues enveloping today's youth.

Garcia said he pledges all within his authority to reverse that attitude if elected.

The girls relay teams also performed well, finishing second in the 800-meter and third in the 400-meter events.

The Lady Warrior relay team includes Sarah Dix, Kristie Ryan,

Brandy Pfeffer and Jody Randle.

Senior Kristie Ryan, another of the school's top female athletes, finished second in the 400-meter dash.

Fourth-place finishers for the Warriors included Kyle Humphreys, 110-meter hurdles; Kristie Ryan, long jump; and Brandy Pfeffer, high jump.

Fifth place finishers consisted of Maya Mascarenaz, 100-meter dash; Angie Barnes, 800-meter run; Monique Ramos, discus; and Lita Reyes, long jump.

Head track coach Ronny Maskew is optimistic with the state qualifying and district competitions

coming up. "Both the boys and girls teams improved this week ... our times and distances were better. If we keep improving in those areas, we'll be OK in the next couple of weeks."

"I was particularly proud of the girls, they have improved a lot

week-to-week, and their field events are also really improving."

"The kids (both boys and girls) weren't happy with their team finish this week, so I think we'll see some improvement," said Maskew.

The Warriors will prepare this week for Saturday's Ruidoso Invitational, and Maskew thinks a lot of points will be up for grabs.

"We have our home meet this week against Lovington, Artesia and Socorro, and we feel like that Lovington will be the favorite to take both the boys and girls divisions."

"But the other teams figure pretty even for the boys, and we feel we have a great chance to finish high with the girls," said Maskew.

The Lovington girls beat the locals by three points last week, and the Lady Warriors and Artesia have beaten each other during the last two meetings between the schools.

The Ruidoso Warrior Golf Teams will finally get to play a course that they don't have to ask "where the next hole is" Wednesday as they host seven other schools in the Ruidoso Invitational at the Inn of the Mountain Gods.

The Warriors have played tournaments in El Paso, White Sands and Albuquerque to open the season, and in most cases the kids have never seen the courses.

While the Inn is not as familiar as Cree Meadows, The Links or Alto Lakes, the Warriors have gotten in some good preparation over the tract, which is probably New Mexico's most highly-regarded golf course.

Enjoy pine cooled breezes while learning about porcelain, watercolor and oil from top artists in their medium.

The Carrizo Lodge Art School's summer schedule is crammed with challenging one-week courses.

The unbeatable team of Paula White-Hosmer and Ken Hosmer will lead students from "Paper to Porcelain-Watercolor" during their workshop July 11-15.

The special workshop is designed to teach the porcelain artist unique techniques in design and color in watercolor, applying the same spontaneous techniques to designing porcelains. The student benefits from the expertise of both outstanding artists.

Half the class will be devoted to Hosmer's high-contrast ink drawing technique for design and his unique color system in watercolor.

In the remainder of the class, White-Hosmer will use her expertise in teaching porcelain painting to assist the student in applying these techniques to porcelain.

She is internationally known in the porcelain art field, excelling in the use of lost and found edges, giving her work an illusive, impressionistic quality.

Commissioners set a high value on their public service

Taxpayers are very generous with their elected officials. Sometimes that generosity is only by chance. That's the case with the seven percent pay increase the Lincoln County Commission voted itself on Friday. Voter didn't get a choice.

The increase — budget specialists would call it a recurring expense, since it will impact the county budget over and over and over into infinity — boosts commission pay for five commissioners from \$10,500 to \$11,235; and increases the clerk's, treasurer's, sheriff's and assessor's pay from \$30,500 to \$32,635. That's an overall added burden to taxpayers of \$12,215 (plus any benefits) each year until these folks decide to give themselves another raise.

County officials are among the best paid "workers" in this county, but they lobbied hard to improve their pay because the 1994 State Legislature OK'd up to a seven percent increase for counties where officials were under their statutory limit. Commissioners in a county Lincoln's size can pay themselves as much as \$14,000; other county officials can make up to \$42,000. Our leaders are not at the statutory limit even now, but they certainly are making a fair salary — fair enough that most of them keep running for re-election.

Commissioner Stirling Spencer, a Republican candidate for state land commissioner, made the motion to get his colleagues a boost in pay. Spencer is usually the "penny pincher" on the commission, a trait we've applauded and admired. But, not this time. The commission, which voted the pay hike by three to two, was lobbied hard by the county clerk, the sheriff and the treasurer. (Hooray for assessor Patsy Serna, who didn't make the big pitch!)

Commissioners L. Ray Nunley and Bill Schwettmann both voted to increase their pay, and Commission Chairman Monroy Montes and Commissioner Wilton Howell voted "no."

Taxpayers should expect some thank you notes from our well-paid public servants. And these community minded elected officials may get a message back from the voters the next time they're opposed in an election.

Are the King brothers crying crocodile tears?

Pardon me, but am I the only New Mexican not crying great sad tears over Governor Bruce King's recently voted decision that he might have been the one who "got took" in a big land swap that numerous critics are denouncing as a "sweetheart deal"?


According to the critics, it was the taxpaying public that got cheated, while the King Brothers ranching enterprise made out like a bandit in the December 1992 trade of 17,000 acres of remote King-owned land in Cibola County for 700 acres of prime developable real estate owned by the US Bureau of Land Management in pricey Santa Fe County.

In a sworn affidavit, one of those critics, a veteran real estate agent, says the Santa Fe County land is worth from \$5,000 to \$10,000 an acre in today's market, for a total value between \$8.5 and \$7 million. By contrast, the Cibola land, which the federal government wants as a conservation area near El Malpais National Monument, is valued at just \$95 an acre—\$1.6 million total.

Contributing to the smell of this transaction is the fact that it was quietly rushed through a normally time-consuming federal approval process in the closing weeks of the outgoing Bush administration, when an old friend of King's Manuel Lujan of New Mexico, was still Secretary of the Interior.

And so another critic, a local rancher who has been grazing cattle on the Santa Fe County land for decades, has filed a federal lawsuit alleging, among other things, that he was substantially damaged by the swap, that he was denied his rights to protect it, and that there was a conspiracy among BLM officials to rush approval of the exchange to benefit King and his brothers.

Now the matter rests in federal court, where the governor this month made the surprising contention that if anybody got



shortchanged in the deal, it was the King brothers — because the recent election of a slow-growth mayor and city council in Santa Fe has thrown the future of the land into question.

Sorry, governor, but try as I may, I somehow cannot get all brokenhearted over your plight. And apparently neither can US District Court Judge John Conway, who is hearing the case. Casting a stern eye on the transaction, the judge has offered his assessment that the Kings "came up smelling like a rose."

Conway has noted that the BLM's own appraiser told the agency that the Kings should give up 22,000 acres — not 17,000 — in Cibola County in exchange for the Santa Fe County tract. In another departure from its appraiser's advice, the BLM allowed the Kings to pick up the choicest acreage that the agency owned in Santa Fe County. By comparison, said the judge, the remaining BLM land owned by the public was "junk."

Yet another item that caught Conway's eye was the BLM's generous offer to discount the price of the Santa Fe property by \$250,000, because the displaced rancher's grazing lease had one more year to run before the Kings could take over the land.

All of the judge's objections, replied King, and start all over again, and do it right next were "very explainable." He and his brothers

never offered to swap all 22,000 of their Cibola acres in the deal; they did not seek the "choicest" Santa Fe County land, only land that was "contiguous"; and the discounted purchase prices was merely pegged to interest rates. But the judge was not satisfied, and called for explicit depositions explaining the basis on which the decision was made.

It seems clear to me that a lot more explaining is due. Why, for example, was perhaps three years shaved off, the time that normally is required to get such a swap through the federal bureaucracy? Why did this deal bypass the Interior Board of Land Appeals, which seeks public input on such matters, and became only the second case handled directly by Lujan's office during his entire tenure as secretary of the Interior?

Why did an assistant secretary under Lujan summarily dismiss all protests to the swap two weeks after the November 1992, election at which the Republican administration was voted out?

King and Lujan both insist there was no personal involvement between them in the matter, and you can believe that if you want to. Meanwhile, unless Judge Conway's court finds sufficient grounds to negate the swap, it is a done deal.

You have to wonder about a guy like Bruce King — already a millionaire, probably many times over, getting on in years, chosen not once but several times to be governor of the state for the benefit of all the people-wheeling and dealing in a self-serving affair like this, where his position, influence and power are, to say the very least, suspect.

Now that he is poor-mouthing the swap, King is saying he might prefer to have his Cibola land back. I say he should take it back, and start all over again, and do it right next were "very explainable." He and his brothers
