**Police chief points out problems at night spot**

 A history of fights, drug trafficking and drinking violations at the Winner's Circle prompted a strongly worded letter from the Ruidoso police chief to the State Alcohol and Gaming director. A bartender, bouncer, waitress and hired musician of the Winner's Circle were among 15 persons named defendants for trafficking, distribution or conspiracy to distribute for marijuana, cocaine and methamphetamine in a recent drug task force operation. Winner's Circle part owner Jess Stinson said those who were involved with the drug bust were laid off until the cases are resolved and will not be rehired unless they are cleared. He said no bail money was put up by the Winner's Circle for any involved in the drug bust. Ruidoso Police Chief Richard Swenor's letter involves more than the recent drug bust. It records a pattern of public nuisance by the Winner's Circle.

The Swenor letter, addressed to Mary Ann Hughes, secretary of the New Mexico Alcohol and Gaming Division, reads as follows: "The intent of this letter is to advise of a licensed liquor establishment in Ruidoso; the Winner's Circle Lounge, that has established a pattern of customer and employee involved problems or criminal offenses that has consistently and specifically burdened the public safety resources of this agency. "During the week of April 18, 1994, the White Mountain Narcotics Task Force, of which this agency is part, closed out a 14-month undercover narcotics neutralization operation in the Ruidoso area with a total of 21 named defendants for trafficking, distribution or conspiracy to traffic in marijuana, cocaine and methamphetamine. "Of the total, 15 defendants were identified as customers, contract employees or direct employees of the Winner's Circle. "Notwithstanding the cited narcotics activities or other routine liquor licensing violations, since October 1991, this agency has documented another 148 calls for police services, 35 offense/incident reports and 49 actual arrests at/on the Winner's Circle premises. "In all fairness, Ruidoso's other

licensed liquor establishments also occasionally require police services; however, no other establishment regardless of clientele, clientele volumes or other variables, has incurred near the volume of the Winner's Circle. "Inasmuch as this history has developed, it is felt that your office should be kept apprised and we will endeavor to keep your office closely informed in the future. Please advise if further information is required." Director Hughes said a licensed drinking establishment can be closed as a public nuisance. She said she has closed bars in Roswell, Gallup and recently, one in Albuquerque. Hughes said tightened laws call for increased reports that must be logged with her department. She said not too long ago, the Albuquerque police notified her of a bar with constant problems, 350 police reports over the last three years were called to that address. "It was that, (a pattern of maintaining a public nuisance for conduct offensive to persons living in the neighborhood) that I used to close them down," said Hughes. She said she also didn't allow them to transfer their license. "It's the police's responsibility to now report directly to my office," Hughes said. "I've permanently closed down a business in Roswell for the very same thing, one in Gallup for the same thing, and the one in Albuquerque. Hughes said she doesn't believe in picking on the good guys with an occasional infraction, but she believes in going after the bad guys, who present a constant nuisance. She said the Albuquerque police have been very appreciative of the new law. She indicated the new law is not designed to close businesses, but may serve to shape up businesses chronically beset with problems. Stinson asked The Ruidoso News for help in squashing a rumor that surfaced last week that the Winner's Circle is trying to set up a topless bar. He said the rumor probably started because his partner, Jim Bob Jackson, owns a topless bar in Lubbock, Texas. Stinson said there are no plans for opening a topless bar at the Winner's Circle. He said the third owner in the Winner's Circle is Hank Woodruff, from Lubbock.

**Promotions perplex Ruidoso councilors**

 Spending money on advertising effectively and with accountability appeared easier to do than talk about Friday at the special Ruidoso Village Council workshop. After more than an hour of discussing the best approach for the village in spending advertising money while honoring an existing chamber of commerce contract, village attorney John Underwood rescued the council. "One council cannot bind another council from one year's budget to another year's budget, I don't care if you got a 99-year contract," Underwood said. The council and chamber director Joan Bailey were in agreement that the chamber contract, which has been in effect, could be improved. Underwood suggested the council "renegotiate the contract with the chamber that more fully represents what the council is looking for, for the next 12 months." Underwood told the council during those months, negotiations with the chamber can be fine tuned. A motion passed based on Underwood's advice. The urgency for the council to change marketing spending habits has been expressed many times recently by Councilor Frank Potter, who has been pushing for a convention and visitors bureau (CVB). According to the International Association of Convention and Visitor Bureaus, a CVB is a not-for-profit organization supported by lodgers tax, government budget allocations, private membership or a combination of any or all three. The bureau in each city has three prime responsibilities: to encourage groups to hold meetings, conventions and trade shows; to assist those groups with meeting

**EDC looks for private funding**

 Directors of the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County (EDCLC) are hoping the private sector will throw them a line to keep the group afloat. Both the Village of Ruidoso and the Lincoln County Commission have withdrawn the monetary support that has fed the corporation since its founding. "We are not against economic development," said Commissioner L. Ray Nunley at the board meeting. "I believe the county isn't interested in giving more money to EDC because the general feeling is that they haven't gotten a good return for their money," he added. "They feel they've poured money down a hole." Nunley, who was appointed to the EDC board of directors in February, encouraged EDC president Dick Mound to pursue alternative methods of keeping EDC funded. Mound was disappointed that the funding cuts came just when a new, pro-active board was getting started. "We're just starting active committees and we've got some good prospects," he said. "I don't think this has to be the end of EDC," said Nunley. "It could be a beginning." Nunley said that if EDC could develop a good plan and show some results, the funding might be restored next year. Mound was concerned that the county and Ruidoso are not investing in economic development, specifically in an industrial park. According to the EDC prospect list, only one business, a hybrid chip manufacturer, has specifically inquired about an industrial park. Mound said he'd hoped the county would use the area near the Super Select Sale Barn for an industrial park. "We need a facility in place for prospects," Mound said. "Carrizosa is the only one in the county with an industrial facility." Nunley said the county has not set aside land for an industrial park and that Ruidoso's park wouldn't be operable for another five years. The Village of Ruidoso has designated undeveloped land near the Sierra Blanca Airport for an industrial park complex. Several directors feel EDC should operate without public funding, like other businesses. The corporation has a membership of 175 businesses and private individuals who paid a one-time membership fee. EDC now plans to fall back on that membership and will request a modest \$75 in annual dues. They reduced the proposed fee from \$200 annually, recognizing that many of their members are small businesses who can't afford to pay EDC dues in addition to Chamber of Commerce and possibly MainStreet dues. # New Mexicans are in the right spot to view eclipse

New Mexicans in the Sacramento Mountains and Alamogordo will claim a ringside seat for an annular eclipse set to roll across the sky May 10.

An annular eclipse is different from a total solar eclipse, in which the moon's shadow passes over the center of the sun and blocks the solar disk completely, leaving a ring of sunlight streaming around the circumference.

During an annular eclipse, the moon passes across the center of the sun, but it appears smaller than the sun because at that moment, the moon happens to be slightly further from the Earth than usual.

According to a news release from the National Solar Observatory at Sacramento Peak, since the moon does not completely block the sun, the sky appears blue and the faint corona is invisible.

"A partial solar eclipse is seen by observers who are not located on the eclipse centerline," according to information in the release. "In this case, the moon passes to one side of the center of the sun, and only a piece of the sun is blocked."

The eclipse in May will be visible from much of North America. The centerline stretches from San Ignacio in Baja, California, Mexico, through El Paso and Amarillo, Texas; south of Kansas City, Missouri; south of Chicago, Illinois; through Detroit, Michigan, Buffalo New York, most of Vermont, New Hampshire and southern Maine and through Halifax, Nova Scotia.

For Sunspot, New Mexico, near Cloudcroft, the eclipse will begin before 9 a.m. and will end just before noon. Maximum eclipse will occur at 10:12 a.m., when 87 percent of the sun will be covered by the moon and only a thin ring of sunlight will be visible.

Factoring in the probability of good weather, the Space Center in Alamogordo will become one of the

best locations in the world from which to view this eclipse. The center is gearing up for the event and the public is invited to stop and view the spectacular phenomenon.

Experts warn that even though 90 percent of the atmosphere, the bright part of the sun, will be covered, it is dangerous to view an annular eclipse without proper eye protection.

"While it is very tempting to take a peek at the eclipse with your naked eye, it's important to resist that temptation. Even a brief look at the sun can damage eyes. The damage may not be noticed immediately, but it's important to use an alternative means to view the eclipse."

The Space Center will be selling eclipse glasses (contact Michael Turner or Kenn Hitchcock at 1-800-545-4021 for more information). The glasses contain mylar filters that prevent damaging sunlight from reaching retinas.

Another method of viewing is to punch a hole in a piece of paper and tape the paper over the mirror so that the hole is flush with the surface of the mirror. Without looking at the sun, use the mirror to reflect the sun's image onto a wall or piece of paper. Look at the reflected image, not at the mirror. This allows several people to view the eclipse at the same time.

The night before the eclipse, the center plans two free presentations in the planetarium to discuss the science of the eclipse and give demonstrations on how to view it. Times are 5:30 and 7 p.m. Monday, May 9.

The day of the eclipse, the center and the Alamogordo Amateur Astronomers will set up telescopes in the planetarium parking lot to allow for eyepiece protection viewing. Classes on the science of eclipses will be conducted in the parking lot. Viewing will begin at 8:30 a.m. with the maximum eclipse at 10:12 a.m. Viewing

glasses also will be on sale for \$1.25.

Events also are planned for the public at Sacramento Peak near Cloudcroft. Observatory grounds will be open at 7:30 a.m. Safe viewing will be possible with solar viewers available at the observatory.

Live video coverage of the eclipse will be shown to viewers, and scientists will be available to answer questions.

Souvenirs and refreshments will be sold. Telescope buildings will be closed to the public between 7:30 a.m. to noon. Tours of the observatory will begin at 2 p.m.

Several science talks will be given before and after the eclipse. The line up consists of Dr. Jeff Kuhn, "Can the Sun Make It Rain Tomorrow" at 8 a.m.; Dr. Larry November, "Highlights from the 1991 Eclipse on Mauna Kea" at 8:30 a.m.; Dr. Jack Zirker, "Ancient Eclipses and Relativity" at 9 a.m.; Timothy Henry, "Synoptic Solar Observations" at 9:30 a.m.; Dr. George Simon, "Questions and Answers about Sun" at 10 a.m.; and Dr. Steve Keil, "Solar Activity and Terrestrial Effects" at 11 a.m.

While the public is bumping elbows to catch a reflected view, scientists at the National Solar Observatory on Sacramento Peak at Sunspot will be conducting experiments.

Dr. Keil will lead an experiment using both the large Vacuum Tower Telescope and an instrument in the smaller Hilltop Observatory.

The experiment will use the limb of the moon to calibrate the solar images from both observatories. Since the limb of the moon is a very sharp edge, scientists can study how the Earth's atmosphere distorts the moon, and then correct for these distortions.

This correction also can be applied to small features visible on the surface of the sun, and in this way, smaller details can be resolved on the solar surface.

A second project using the large Vacuum Tower Telescope will be run by Dr. Rudolf Kopp from Tucson, Arizona, and Dr. Wolfgang Mattig of the Kiepenheuer Institute in Freiburg, Germany.

This experiment also will use the sharp edge of the lunar limb to correct the image distortions caused by the Earth's atmosphere. By using dark lines that appear in the solar spectrum, this study also will investigate the temperature and velocity of gas at different layers in the solar atmosphere.

Another project will use the telescope at the Evans Solar Facility. Dr. Jean Arnaud from Toulouse Observatory, France, will study the polarization of the ring of sunlight at the peak of the eclipse to measure the magnetic field of the sun.

Magnetic fields have long been known to occur in sunspots, but this experiment will concentrate on measuring the weak magnetic fields on other parts of the solar surface. This project also will study prominences at the limb of the sun; these are large arches of gas which rise high above the solar surface. As the lunar limb moves across a prominence, small details will be measured in an attempt to provide scientists with the best maps of a prominence ever produced.

The final project will be headed by Dr. Bernard Jackson from the University of California, San Diego.

With collaborator, Dr. Jackson will study the height variation of temperature in the solar atmosphere using data from the Full-Limb coronagraph in the Hilltop Dome. The darker-than-normal skies near the maximum phase of the eclipse may allow observations of very faint structures high in the solar atmosphere. These data will refine previous theories about the heating of large structures in the solar atmosphere; some of these structures are so large they stretch all the way to Earth.

### Short, not very sweet, county commission agenda Tuesday

It's hard to imagine, but the Tuesday, May 3, meeting of the Lincoln County Commission may turn into just a half-day session.

The agenda contains another look at the proposed 1994-95 budget before it's shipped to Santa Fe, and a request for some money from the village of Ruidoso.

Final plat (layout) approval for the county's largest subdivision in several decades, Ranches of Sontarra off Airport Road, is scheduled, as is a presentation concerning rangeland reform and proposed regulations by Howard Farman from the U.S. Bureau of Land Management's Roswell office.

Commissioners also have indicated they may add an executive session (closed to the public) on personnel to discuss the selection of county manager Andy Wyman by the Carrizozo Board of Trustees to serve as municipal judge.

The meeting will begin at 9 a.m. in the commission room of the county courthouse in Carrizozo.

### MainStreet prez asks for one more year of village funding

MainStreet's new president Don Dutton was on hand at the Friday coffee to give the community a standing invitation to MainStreet board meetings and to ask MainStreet supporters to call or write to Mayor Jerry Shaw and village councilors, asking them not to cut the volunteer organization from the budget.

"This really needs to be funded for one more year," said Dutton. After that, he said MainStreet should be self-sufficient.

"MainStreet was originally formed to assist the village in this streetscape project, to take some of the burden off village employees," Dutton said.

Dutton said downtown Ruidoso sets the stage for the whole community. He encouraged those involved to continue to work together, voicing criticism and praise.

Construction superintendent Bob Tackett said barrels, barricades and lights will go up Monday in the block from Fern to Center streets. He assured merchants in that area that when work halts for the summer, there will be no holes or unfinished spots.

"Part will be new and part will be old," he said. "We'll be completely out of there."

Project manager Alan Briley explained that bureaucratic snags contribute heavily to delays. Every little change must be approved by the village and the state highway department.

By the third week of May, Tackett said, new street lights should be up and benches and trash cans should be in place along the finished side of the street.

Several local anchor companies contributed between \$500 and \$2,500 last year, and EDC is counting on their repeated generosity. EDC must also double its membership to collect enough money for operating expenses.

Executive director Karen Kopp reported that the corporation currently has enough money to survive through September.

"If we don't get the support from our members, we'll have to close shop," said Mound.

"I've been on this board for three years, and I joined EDC because I believe we need a third economy to consistently employ people," said director Glen Crane.

He stressed the importance of informing the community of EDC's goals and accomplishments. Nunley said it's also important to explain to

small business owners how economic development benefits them.

Several months ago the EDC was approached by The Ruidoso News and adopted plans to print a special section containing just the kinds of information Crane and Nunley said people need to know.

EDC was to have complete control over the content, and the newspaper planned to sell ads to pay for printing 8,000 tabloids to be inserted in The Ruidoso News and then to be used by EDC as a promotional piece.

Also, according to the plan approved by the EDC board, The News would donate a percentage of the ad sales back to EDC; thus the group would have a promotional piece at no cost, and would benefit from telling its own story. Free insertion in the 6,000 press run newspaper would have provided a large readership for EDC's story.

Even though Kopp has not had time to follow through on this publication, she will now co-author a newsletter, apparently to be mailed out at a cost to the struggling EDC board.

As a last ditch effort to garner membership support, Karen Kopp and Jim Miller are producing an EDC newsletter informing members and potential members of EDC's activities and needs.

The newsletter will include a prospect update. The most promising possibility to date is a company that produces condiment packets for fast food chains. Company representatives will visit Lincoln County in May, considering this as one of three possible locations.

Kopp also reported that two advertisements in "Corporate Expansion and Relocation" magazine drew 16 responses.

preparations; and to encourage tourists to visit and enjoy the historic, cultural and recreational opportunities the city offers.

Potter says the delivery of such services in Ruidoso is inadequate and the advertising often is duplicated by the various entities. He wants the delivery and accountability to be more efficient and to come from one area, preferably a Ruidoso CVB. He noted he is a member of the Albuquerque CVB.

Potter appeared concerned that the chamber or convention center did not have the tools at hand to adequately package tour groups or conventioners to places of interest like the Museum of the Horse, a main drawing card of the area.

Potter, who is development director at the Museum of the Horse, talked of the importance in handling conventioners once they have arrived.

"They don't necessarily have to be at our convention center," he said.

He gave as an example a Texas cattle leaders association, which is being handled by a group in Ruidoso, but the association is staying at the Inn of the Mountain Gods.

"What you're trying to do is take

care of those people in your community. It's really tough to handle. There are large groups (conventioners at Inn of the Mountain Gods) interested in coming to Ruidoso," Potter said.

He said he wanted performance reports to review information on their activity during a convention or tour stay.

"What happened to John Deere Tractor? Where did we lose them? Did we get them? How many people? How did we service them?" Potter asked.

Potter said he and a few other people got together and coordinated some services for the cattle feeders trying to help them.

"We're not in that business. We're out there trying to do some things we don't have any business doing," he said.

Asked to give an example, Potter said, "I'm referring to hooking into hotels, motels, attractions... We have golfers running all over town. For as little a town as we are, it takes a lot of planning. If you had a CVB it would make their life easier."

Several councilors, including Robert Donaldson and Frank Cummings were afraid the council was rushing the project.

Cummings said the council had three built-in groups (convention

center, chamber and lodgers tax) that could work out a plan for the council to review.

Donaldson said he was concerned that too much emphasis was being placed on tours and conventions instead of Ruidoso's main staple of skiing and horse racing.

"I just want to make sure that however we do this, that we don't lose sight of our major market. It's in general advertising, advertising to the family and people that are just coming up to enjoy the mountains, not necessarily the convention center," Donaldson said.

Donaldson asked the council for proper focus and weight to the advertising approach.

Donaldson, who owns a ski shop, said the "meat" of the market is skiing, horse racing and cool pines and it shouldn't be neglected.

"That is our market, not conventions and not tours," he said. Ruidoso Downs Race Track, Ski Apache and Museum of the Horse also are major contributors to the public awareness of the community through their advertising budgets.

Jackson walked the council through the Farmington CVB plan that Potter favored, and Jackson also prepared five alternate plans for the council to study.

Jackson said under the law, the CVB would still have to report to the lodgers tax advisory board,

which advises the council of its plans.

In Jackson's analysis of options available to the council he suggested:

-leave everything as is proposed in the preliminary budget.

-request proposals for the CVB and renew the chamber contract for a period of three to six months to allow time for the transition to the CVB arrangement.

-leave as proposed in the preliminary budget for fiscal year 94-95, and budget to contract with the International Convention and Visitors Bureau Association to conduct an independent study and development of specification for a CVB.

-incorporate the CVB into the operation of the Convention Civic Events Center department.

-leave the proposed preliminary budget as is but appoint a new CVB with membership consisting of, but not limited to the following: chair or member of the ITAB; director of the CEC; executive director of the chamber.

Convention center director Kathleen Michelena told the council that duplication existed, but it was at a minimum and that the chamber and convention center had two different markets to approach.

She said that the small town effort is working.

"Why not continue to grease the wheel, it's working," Michelena said.

She reminded Potter that he said the town was busy and that there was nothing going on.

"That should tell you that reader response in advertising is coming back in," Michelena said.

Mayor Jerry Shaw asked Michelena why she thought Ruidoso doesn't need a CVB.

"Because we only have a population of 4,700 people," Michelena said. "You can't compare Ruidoso to Albuquerque. It's nice to have some kind of comparison, but you can't compare it to Albuquerque. How many leads would come out of a CVB in a week? We're not Albuquerque or El Paso where you have an international airport coming in. I know about sales leads. I've worked sales leads for 20 years."

The mayor asked if a comparison could be made with the Farmington CVB.

Donaldson answered that question.

"What's there in Farmington? Who would go to Farmington, if it were not for a convention? Nobody! Ruidoso and Farmington are not alike. People come to Ruidoso because they like it. Farmington could spend all of their lodgers tax money on conventions, because that is the only reason people go there.

They don't go to Farmington on their own," he said. "And then they stay at places like Durango. We have a different world."

Councilor Joe Gomez said service was still questionable.

"When a person calls, can we provide information where to stay for \$10 or \$100. This is what Frank is trying to establish. If one person calls or a 1,000 persons, they will be given help, direction."

Gomez, the incoming president of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, said part of the problem is referred calls for service rather than service under one umbrella.

Michelena said she and the chamber director have been sharing clients and client information.

She said she understood that Councilor Potter would like to get more tours in town.

"But we've only got three motels in this town with 80 plus rooms apiece, and limited meeting space to boot," she said.

Donaldson said when the RTF returns for a new hotel, those officials also will factor into advertising decisions.

"Our advertising has been so ineffective right now, I'd be inclined to leave things alone," he said. "I think there are ways to get to the same place (we all want) without having to recreate the wheel."

If power is your game, two new residents of the Lincoln County Humane Society will fit perfectly into that lifestyle. Buster, an English Fox Hound, was found at the edge of the Capitan village limits. The rescuers wanted to keep him, because they enjoyed his even temperament and fun-loving nature.

But they have small children and it soon was obvious that while Buster loves children, he's just too big and powerful to be around very small kids, said shelter manager Esther Harper. Buster also gets along well with other dogs. He's about two years old with black and brown markings on white. He would need a large exercise area and very secure yard. In a neighboring kennel, Super

Tramp, who appears to be a cross between an Alredale and Otter Hound, is another power house waiting for a new home. He has a lot of things going for him, Harper said. He rides well in a car, he knows the sit and shake hands commands, he's house broken, and he's already neutered, which will lower his cost of adoption. State law requires that all animals adopted from shelters be neutered.

"He's too large to have around young children," Harper said. "His former owner found he just was too big for their kids, because he doesn't know his own strength. He loves to wrestle, but doesn't like to be on a chain." "He's just a great big friendly dog and like Buster, will need a secure and large yard."

Both of these adult dogs appear healthy.

## Puppies need help

Unfortunately, because of limited facilities and the unknown histories of many of the animals and litters brought to the shelter, no health guarantees can be given to new owners. The staff tries hard to protect all of the animals by giving them immunizations or boosters when they first arrive, but sometimes it's too late and the dog or cat already is carrying a disease.

Most at risk are the puppies and kittens, who will have more isolated quarters (with disinfectant footbaths) when the shelter expansion now underway is completed. Until then, in an effort to protect the young ones and the people who eventually may adopt them, the public will not be able to interact or

adopt puppies until they have completed a series of three shots for Parvovirus and a two-week period of observation past the last shot.

Before being adopted, an animal's temperature also will be taken to determine if it is normal. That will be noted on the adoption contract, which specifies that the new owners must follow up with boosters, a rabies shot and neutering at the appropriate times.

To help keep the puppies and kittens isolated, foster homes desperately are needed.

It's a great way for seasonal visitors with appropriate facilities to enjoy having young ones around without worrying about what to do with them when they leave. The foster family must commit to keep the pups for about eight weeks, less if they already have started the shot series. However, few owners abandoning a litter have taken any extra steps, like shots, to give them more of a chance at life.

Other ways volunteers can help include to spend a few hours a week at the society thrift shop, one of the major sources of support for the humane movement locally; to walk the dogs on pleasant afternoons, to play with the cats or to sponsor an animal for the cost of their neutering (the major expense associated with adoption), which greatly enhances their chance to find a new home.

Watch for The Reporter, printed by The Ruidoso News each Wednesday as former featured pets who haven't been adopted get what may be their last chance for public exposure in the front page box called "Kennel Kids."

**J.C. Peso opens in Le Claire's Mountain Village**

At its ribbon-cutting April 14, J.C. Peso was officially welcomed into the Ruidoso business community as part of Le Claire's Mountain Village on Sudderth. Owners David Berge and Karry Anderson are from Pecos, New Mexico, and have lived in Ruidoso since December.

J.C. Peso is an eclectic collection of hand-crafted artifacts that honor the traditions of quality-minded pioneers. Much of the merchandise replicates Spanish designs, especially Anderson's clothes and Berge's knives and spurs.

As a textile artist, Anderson has achieved a look distinctive enough for the likes of Holly Dunn, Cher, Brooks and Dunn and Pam Tillis. Anderson also designs hand-painted pillows and finely detailed dulcimers.

Berge crafts his replica knives and spurs out of pure steel. He melts down old files or buggy springs for his metal.

"You just never know what today's alloys are going to do," he said.

People who are building or decorating houses with an antique style or who are refurbishing historical houses find J.C. Peso an exciting source of authentic details. The Spanish iron work designs of Dimstore Cowboy take the shapes of gates and hinges, decorative window guards, towel and magazine racks, and almost anything else you can imagine.

The store is small, but it's packed with interesting details that the average person can actually afford to buy. The counters of J.C. Peso are laden with hard-to-find items like antique switch plates and tokens from an old brothel.

They even sell hand-tooled straw brooms that sport tree branches for handles.

"He just takes a walk through the woods and picks up sturdy sticks that are kind of bent to fit your hands," she said.

Anderson said she is always getting new things from artisans of the southwest — beadwork from Boerne, Texas; pottery from Pecos, New Mexico; Santa Fe hats from Phoenix, Arizona; and horseshoe figures from Texas.

J.C. Peso even sells scrimshaw works by local artist Brad Wenzel.

"Scrimshaw was the first American art form," said Wenzel. "Originally it was done on whale teeth. Now we use fossil bone and ivory."

A scrimshaw artist polishes the surface of his chosen material, then engraves a drawing. When ink is rubbed over the drawing, it stays only in the crevices. Berge, who also does scrimshaw, cuts in his patterns. Wenzel uses a sewing needle to create line drawings out of millions of dots.

Glen Swanson, one of J.C. Peso's

scrimshaw artists, makes map horns, ivory powder horns engraved with historical maps of various regions.

"We really are vendors for starving artists," said Anderson. J.C. Peso is a mini-mercado of unique, hand-crafted treasures. The store is open every day but Tuesday from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. They will be open seven days a week from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. during the summer. The telephone number is 257-4029.

"If you've never seen a cowboy flashlight," said Anderson, "be sure to stop by."

## Roofing company stays busy in its new Ruidoso branch office

Hail storms across Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas have kept Pearson Brothers Roofing so busy they've opened a branch office in Ruidoso.

Of course, the company's commitment to quality also might have something to do with their expansion.

Estimator Terry McCree suggested opening the office here, telling his boss how beautiful it is in Ruidoso and how ready the market is for them. Mr. Pearson was so impressed with the village, he immediately bought a house in Alto and plans to move here in about five years.

McCree, meanwhile, has taken up residence in the house and made

connections with Ruidoso builders such as Jack Pruitt, Jack Burford and Tom Garber.

"We officially opened in March and we've done nine jobs already," he said.

McCree said Pearson Brothers, based in Dallas, Texas, is known for using high-grade materials and standing behind their work. As a member of the National Shale and Shingle Bureau, which regulates all wood coming into the United States market, Pearson Brothers is obliged to use only #1 grade wood.

"I think Ruidoso is kind of soured on wood (roofs)," said McCree. "Most of the shakes and shingles here are #2 and #3 grade.

Some people think you can't use wood at all here because of the ordinance, but the ordinance only bans untreated wood. #1 wood is treated, but it costs more, so some builders won't use it."

McCree said metal roofs are popular here, probably because they install quickly and can endure hail storms.

"A metal roof is supposed to last 20 years," he said. "But if you don't leave breathing room between the metal and the felt, you cut the value of the roof in half. Also, the neoprene washers only last about 10 years, then they crack and you get leaks."


For the Ruidoso climate, McCree prefers a composition or tile roof. Pearson Brothers gives a five-year warranty on all their work. For flat roofs, McCree likes to use Rubberoid, a rubber roof that carries a 20-year manufacturer warranty.

Not only does McCree believe in doing a job right, but he also believes in doing it efficiently.

"Roofing doesn't have to be slow," he said. "Once we get the materials, we can usually finish a job in three or four days."

Coming from a family of roofers, McCree has been climbing around on buildings since he was a boy in Illinois. He tried coal mining for a while, then went to Texas A&M University for a degree in air conditioning and refrigeration. Finally he returned to the rooftops, this time in Texas, and owned his own company for 10 years.

"Pearson Brothers is a good company," he said. "We're ambitious and we're on the ball. People can count on us."

## Proposed USFS funding formula would help Lincoln Forest region

Legislation that could pave the way for increases in U.S. Forest Service payments to the Southwest has been introduced in the House by Congressman Bill Richardson (D-New Mexico) and is being cosponsored by Congressman Joe Skeen (R-New Mexico) and Steve Schiff (R-New Mexico).

The Forest Service Equity Study Act authorizes a study of Forest Service funding allocations among the nine regions of the National Forest System. The Southwest Region, which consists of New Mexico and Arizona, has historically been disadvantaged in the regional allocation process. In 1993, the Northwest region, which consists of 24 million acres, received nearly twice the money at \$95.2-million, to manage non-timber resources than did the Southwest region, \$56.3-million.

The existing Forest Service formula is unfair and wrongly

deprives New Mexico of needed funds for recreation management, wildlife and fish management, road maintenance and other activities," Richardson said. "As budgets get tighter and it becomes more difficult for Congress to fund even the most basic programs, equity in federal funding on a national basis should be our standard. We cannot expect the American people to pay equally for maintenance of the nation and not receive at least proportional benefits."

Late last year, Skeen asked Comptroller General to investigate why other Forest Service regions receive more money per acre to manage their resources than the Southwest region.

"Clearly, the Forest Service employees in the Southwest region should be able to call upon the same resources as their colleagues in the other regions in managing

our forest resources," Skeen said.

The Act authorizes the Secretary of Agriculture to conduct an equity study within one year. The study would include an analysis of the methodology and rationale justifying funding decisions regarding the regions; examine the equity of the allocations taking into account regional burdens (visitors, miles maintained, animal unit months) and examine the relationships between funding allocations, Forest Service goals, and the diverse needs of the regions based on ecological factors and public demand for multiple use services.

In addition to the New Mexico sponsors, the Richardson legislation also is being cosponsored by Arizona's Bob Stump, Jim Kilbe, Jon Kyl, Ed Pastor and Karen English.

A similar bill has been introduced in the Senate by Senator Jeff Bingaman (D-New Mexico).



# Classes form for Carrizo Lodge Art School summer sessions

He was a two-time winner in the American Advertising Federation Annual Competition. Soares has hangings in several galleries and numerous collections throughout the country. He is a signature member of the National Watercolor Society, Midwest Watercolor Society, Watercolor West and associate member of the American Watercolor Society.

Soares has won numerous National awards. Achievements include acceptance in several exhibits nationwide, including the Salamagundi Club. He was the Spotlight Featured Artist in Southwest

Art Magazine.

Tuition for his session is \$280.

The week of July 25-29, artist Christina Robbins will direct her students through basic drawing and development of composition before painting in oil.

He is one of 12 prominent artists included in the book "Masters of Western Art" published by Watson-Guptill.

Kohn has conducted art seminars nationally and internationally since 1969. Many of his students have received important awards and have established their own art careers.

# RHS Warrior golfers win two more tournaments

It would seem that the Ruidoso Warrior boys golf team is back on track after a sluggish early season as the defending state champions went three-for-three in tournament play last week.

The team's strong play couldn't come at a better time as both the boys and girls will compete in the District 3-AAA Championship Wednesday — a tournament that the boys have won for two-straight years.

The Warriors won first-place trophies at the RISD Invitational Tuesday, the Cloudercroft Invitational, Thursday and the NMMI Invitational on Saturday.

The Warriors averaged an even 900 for the three events, or 75 per man.

Senior Ryan Wall emerged as top contender in the state after the week as he had the low-round in two of the three tournaments, posting scores of 72-75-73 over the three courses.

Thursday's action at the Lodge was little more than a play-day as the Warriors faced only Cloudercroft in the varsity division, but the JV

Warriors whipped always tough Alamo and Socorro to win the junior varsity part of the tourney.

Ruidoso's varsity shot 299 over the course at the Lodge which was a good score, but should have definitely been better.

Matt Cantu and Jeff Chapman tied for the low-round with 74s, with Wall posting a 77 and Eric Stephens shot an 83.

The Lady Warriors also played well at the Lodge, posting a 392 total, beat Alamogordo's JV in the process.

The girls had three scores under 100 with Heather Stephens' 91 leading the way followed by Devon Lowe, 95; Cecilia Fuentes, 99; Danielle Morris, 107; and Katie Lukens, 112.

The 305 the Warrior boys shot at New Mexico Military Institute Saturday was far more impressive than their Cloudercroft outing. The locals beat rivals Lovington, Artesia and Tucumcari — which all have an excellent chance to win this year's State Championship — as well as NMMI, Portales, Jal and Cloudercroft.

The win over Tucumcari and Lovington was particularly sweet for the locals as the Rattlers won

the District 4-AAA championship last week in Artesia, and Lovington came back to beat Tucumcari in Portales on Tuesday.

Ruidoso, Lovington and Tucumcari all tied for second in the Leroy Gooch Invitational on April 17-18. Deming won the Gooch by five strokes.

Team scores at NMMI looked like this: Ruidoso, 305; Tucumcari, 306; Lovington, 311; Artesia, 313; NMMI, 320; Portales, 344; Ruidoso JV, 364; Jal 385; and Cloudercroft 380.

The Warrior scoring was provided by Ryan Wall, 73; Jeff Chapman, 76; Jimmy Varnadore, 76; Matt Cantu, 80 and Eric Stephens, 85.

Stephens, who has played very well of late, was actually "thrown to the wolves" for experience sake as he got a little taste of next year by playing in the No. 1 position, a spot that Jeff Chapman has occupied for the last two years.

A junior, Stephens will be the only returner next year for the Warriors and will most likely be playing in that pressure-packed No. 1 position when next season rolls around.

Head Coach Ron Wall explained

the strategy. "We said all season long that we would play Eric at No. 1 for a tournament or two at the end of the season after we qualified (for State), he said. "It was good for him because he needed to see how those other kids hit the ball and managed themselves on the golf course."

"Jeff will be back up there for District on Wednesday... we just wanted Eric to know what to expect before he gets there next year."

The JV team also competed in Roswell by shooting a score of 369. Scott Christensen led the way with an 83 followed by 94s from Byron Soules, Jackie Roe, Stephen Houghton and Rhett Hightower.

While Roswell was a huge step

forward for the Warriors, Thursday's action at Cloudercroft was more of a walk in the park. The JV's total of 332 beat Alamogordo by 17 strokes.

Team scores from Cloudercroft looked like this: Ruidoso "A", 299; Ruidoso "B", 332; Alamogordo, 349; Ruidoso "C", 383; Socorro "B", 383; Cloudercroft, 364; Ruidoso "3A", 378; Alamogordo "C", 388.

Individually, the Warrior JV was led by Stephen Houghton, who shot an excellent 77. Other Warrior scores included Rhett Hightower, Scott Christensen, 89; Byron Soules, 89; and Jackie Roe, 89.

The C-Team also played very well in Cloudercroft. Their scores looked like this: Brian Phillips, 81; Nathan Pena, 88; Billy Rogge, 98; and Bryne Moore, 97.

The 8th-grade Braves were paced by Eric Russell's 85 followed by Jake Graham, 89; Scott Sebastian, 96; Adrian Wallen, 103; and Ronnie Wright, 109.

The Warriors will now head for Las Cruces Wednesday for the District Championship, hosted by Oñate, while Oñate's girls are the clear-cut favorites to take the girls' championship, the boys' battle should be between Deming and the

Warriors. Ruidoso has won two straight 3-AAA golf championships, and beat Deming last year by two strokes at the Wildcats home course. This year's contest should be just as close as Deming, like Ruidoso last year players to graduation, and actually picked up a couple from move-ins.

The Wildcats have been very competitive this season and their win in the Leroy Gooch proves it. Couple that with more knowledge of the Las Cruces Country Club and the warriors will have to play their best golf to get their third straight District Championship.

On the other hand, the Warrior squad that will face Deming Wednesday is a much better team than faced them in Ruidoso, two weeks ago. At that time, had not played particularly well and lacked the confidence that they have now after beating three of the top six teams in the state last week.

Whether Ruidoso is the favorite to repeat as the boys champions in district is tough to say. But the way the Warriors have been playing, Deming should be ready for a real battle.



# Dan remembers his father's May birthday

## Our Father's Birthday

This is being sent to you on April 28, and will reach you on May 2, the eve of the birthday of our father.

Lynn Whipple Storm was born May 3, 1879, in Rochester, Pennsylvania, to Francis David Storm and the former Althea Ellen Reno. While still a child he was brought to Denver, Colorado, where he attended grade school and East Denver High school where he met his wife-to-be the former Bertha Catherine Kennedy.

They were married in Denver, Colorado, May 30, 1908.

This marriage was blessed by six sons: John, Daniel, Marcus, Joseph, Lynn and an infant son who was called Home by our Lord at birth.

Before his marriage, Lynn attended the Colorado School of Mines in Golden, Colorado, he graduated in the class of 1902 with high honors as president of his class and also class poet. This last was very fitting because although he was gifted in mathematics, engineering and science he remained at heart a poet.

As a mining geologist and mining engineer and government surveyor he went twice to Alaska as a petroleum geologist.

After returning from Mexico, Lynn found



himself in San Antonio here he met one of his classmates from the Colorado School of Mines, who told him that he had changed from mining to oil geology and advised our father to do the same. He became a geologist for the Sun Oil Co.

When his brother, Jerome, heard of this he said, "That company is lucky, when they get Lynn they get brains and they get honesty."

Father worked for the Sun Company for 40 years and worked to the age of 75, 10 years past the retirement age.

The company's attitude was, "Lynn is doing a top job. If he wants to retire he'll have to come to us. We are not going to him."

And our father often said, "I'm not going to the company to retire. They will have to come to me."

Finally, shortly after his 75th birthday, father told the company, "I think I'll retire and go to be with my son, Daniel, in New Mexico."

The company officials said, "Well, that's fine, Lynn; but you have a job with us as long as you want it."

### Active Retirement

While in Alaska, father had collected legends of the Copper River Indians. He also wrote poems and short stories and children's stories. Also, he kept in touch with his school magazine, the Mines Magazine, contributing articles about improving the curriculum, such as teaching more English, for example.

A book about the Ice Ages, "The Ice Comes and Goes," is among his works, as well as articles on oil geology which are used as texts in universities.

Throughout his career, father made hosts of friends among "all sorts and conditions of men."

His schoolmate Frank Bowman in an article about father in Mines Magazine said, "Lynn Storm was universally admired and liked; no one was ever known to dislike him."

Father was active in St. Anne's Chapel in Glencoe, and was often a delegate to the diocesan convention. And he was a true Christian gentleman.

On this beautiful spring day, our father's spirit is very fondly near visiting me from Heaven on the approach of his birthday.

Limited Liability Companies

Traditionally, there have been three forms of doing business in America: sole proprietorships, partnerships, and corporations. Last year New Mexico adopted the Limited Liability Company ("LLC") as an additional form of doing business, and the law became effective June 17, 1993. I predict that as more businesses know about the LLC it will become the form of choice for most small businesses that we have in our communities. LLC's were first developed as a form of doing business in Germany in 1892, and have been widely used in Europe and Latin America. Wyoming was the first state to adopt use of the LLC in 1977, and since that time thirty-six other states have authorized the form and most others are working on it.

The small business man in counties like Otero and Lincoln has to consider many factors in choosing the form in which he wants to operate his business. Partnerships and corporations each have advantages, but the LLC combines the best of both. The LLC can be taxed like a partnership. This means that deductions can be passed through to the owners and not get held up in the LLC. The owners can be shielded from personal liability like a corporation. Finally, the business can be structured in such a way to make it very difficult for creditors to obtain control of the business if they get a judgment against one of the individual owners.

How is an LLC established? You should consult your attorney about forming an LLC. It is new and there are a lot of technicalities. This is not a do-it-yourself project with forms from a stationery store. Basically, articles of organization are filed with the State Corporation Commission. There is a \$50.00 filing fee. What is filed for record only gives the public minimum information concerning the organization, and the most important document is the operating agreement which is much like a partnership agreement or a shareholder agreement and by-laws combined. It sets forth how the LLC is to be managed, fiscal matters, books and records, distribution of profits, members rights, etc. An LLC can be managed by its members or by a manager selected by the members. The beauty of the LLC is that it can be specifically structured to your particular business. A retail business, service business, professional business, or small manufacturing business all can be set up differently, and each could receive the benefit of limited liability and taxation as a partnership if properly done.

In New Mexico, the company name must include the words "limited liability company" or "limited company." The LLC must have a registered office where copies of the articles and operating agreement, names and addresses of members, records that show the voting rights of members, three years' tax returns, and information relating to the accounts of the members can be inspected and copied by members of the organization.

The LLC is an exciting new form of doing business in New Mexico, and you should consider it when forming a new business. Be sure to check with your attorney or accountant before forming an LLC.

### Electives, trips may be cut to save school funds

#### TO THE EDITOR:

I am currently a senior at Ruidoso High School. Throughout my high school years, I have had the opportunity to be involved in many excellent programs.

Two programs that have been very important and influential to me are the drama and band departments.

Mr. Rob Lovett came into Ruidoso High School facing a hand that had not won any awards in about six years. He transformed a small losing band into a 60-member championship ensemble. The 24-karat gold band received the highest ratings possible last year at concert competition, and proceeded to win first in the state marching competition this year.

Even with this excellent record, it was one of the first programs to get funding cut from the budget. Due to the budget cuts, the championship band was only allowed to attend two of the out-of-town football games. Financial cutbacks are certainly necessary, but wouldn't it make a little more sense to cut a small amount from every program rather than a large amount from one?

Five years ago Linda Currin had the inspiration to bring drama into the high school. She worked very hard to build up a department that

now involves more than 60 students. The drama department has never attended a state competition without receiving at least one award. This year they received awards equaling a first, second and third place.

Mrs. Currin is currently teaching three classes, and though other obligations force her to leave the position, she is working to prepare it for whomever takes her place.

Rumor now has it that the drama department may be totally obliterated. Two programs which involve more than 120 students are being intentionally weakened, even though both programs have never, in the past three years, returned from competitions without awards.

I am a teenager and a senior, so I have no power in the school system. The community does. I am asking the community to please take the time to support the program we have a possibility to lose. Please write the school board, the administration and other influential people and tell them how you feel. Don't allow our school to destroy two programs that have made a difference in more than 120 lives.

Recent reports in The Ruidoso News have brought to my attention the need for publicity on the procedure for handling scholarships at Ruidoso High School.

When scholarships are offered:  
1. An announcement is made to the student body over the public address system. Follow-up announcements are made at intervals until the deadline date of the specific scholarship offering.

2. Listings of available scholarships are posted outside the senior English classroom and on the bulletin board in the counseling office.

3. Students have access to a file specifically designated for scholar-

ship applications. The files are located in the outer office so that the secretary is readily available for help or to supply needed information.

4. Each scholarship is listed on a master form, and students sign their names under the scholarship title for which they are applying.

5. If a scholarship offered has no applicants listed on the master form the counseling office recruits qualified students and requests that they apply.

6. Local scholarships are hand delivered by the counseling office secretary, Jeanette Carey, to the sponsor on the date due so that every student has ample time to

apply.

7. Books with information on additional scholarships are available in the school library and in the counseling office. These books have been checked out by students and by interested parents during this school year.

During the three years that the counseling secretary, Mrs. Carey, has had the responsibility for handling scholarships, she has received praise from parents for her help with the students.

I have received no complaints (from Susie Randle or anyone else) or inquiries (from Gary Mitchel or anyone else other than

Ruidoso News) in regard to methods of handling scholarships this school year (my first at Ruidoso High).

We in the counseling office welcome input from all. Personal experiences and insights are valuable to us in evaluating our performances.

We greatly appreciate all offers of scholarships to Ruidoso High students and recognize the impact these awards have on the futures of our graduates. It is to be noted that three retailers in the "walking area" have permanently closed in the last month. It is predictable that more will follow. This will increase village gross receipts tax?

Now MainStreet is requesting from village council budget monies for "just one more year." With \$1,800,000 already down the tube, with the directors' salaries guzzled from the public trough with no achievement evident for the past five or six years, do we as taxpayers need to "donate" even more to the \$278,000 MainStreet has received from the village since its inception?

It's your tax money! What do

other merchants and business owners in other locations in Ruidoso get out of this? Ask them. Many are disgusted.

As for a new council member who took my description of what a community leader should be, pounded his chest and responded "My Tarzan." I will again point out illegal council discussion of his unseconded motion and his arrogant proposal to "eliminate all parking on Sudderth in Midtown."

While purporting to solve "problems developing," such actions appear to be problem generating.

This is not acting in the best interests of Midtown, where MainStreet membership is now reported to be 35 percent of Midtown merchants from the 20 percent membership recorded prior to the recent board election.

I predict this figure will again revert to 20 percent or even less as three month memberships expire.

On final observation, does our village council operate under "Robert's Rules of Order," or just Robert's rules?
