United Blood Services of El Paso will be at the Lincoln County Medical Center Conference Room from 11 a.m. to 6 p.m. Wednesday, May 11. They recommend that morning donors eat a good breakfast and afternoon donors eat a good lunch.

A four-person team is expected, so there should not be any long waiting periods.

There is still a critical shortage of donor blood throughout the country, and the LCMC Auxiliary hopes that as many donors as possible will volunteer.

Every blood bank uses a new disposable needle for each donor. There has not been a single case of transmittable disease by giving blood. Every pint of blood is given seven screening tests and as a result, the blood supply is safer than it has ever been.

Vandals damage Cree golf course

Golf course vandals struck early Friday inflicting \$7,500 in damages to the Cree Meadows Golf Course.

Ruidoso detective Wolfgang Borne said sometime between 2:30 a.m. and 6:50 a.m., an unknown driver drove a vehicle on the 11th green at Cree Meadows and began spinning its wheels, creating burns and rolled up turf.

The 11th green is located near Barcus and View Course, on the Mechem side.

MainStreet merchants say they're in the dark

While village managers and the construction contractor continue to find themselves hung up in bureaucratic nets, MainStreet merchants continue to ask the same questions.

How much longer? What's the hold-up? Who's in charge? Who will be held accountable for the costly mistakes made by Bohannon-Huston engineers?

Merchants are biting their nails and grinding their teeth over the prospect of a June filled with orange barrels, green ramps and big holes — not to mention the situation of limited parking.

Deputy village manager Alan Briley reports that the village's request for reappropriation of \$150,000 severance tax is still on a desk in Santa Fe. The village needs that money now to buy a parking lot and build public restrooms.

Anxiety ran high at the last MainStreet coffee where more than 20 people gathered to hear that supplies have been delayed, again, and that no one directly involved in the project has any control over completion schedules.

Briley said that with work suspended as of July 1, and with village-approved extensions, the contractor has until September 14 before having to pay liquidated damages of \$700 a day. The New Mexico State Highway Department has yet to approve those extensions in writing and has not allowed D&S Construction weather days, meaning that as far as the state is concerned, the D&S contract ends May 17.

"That's only the extensions he (Tackett) requested on the first two phases," said Briley. "In a meeting Thursday, the state verbally approved 30 of 41 extensions, except 11 weather days. I expect him to ask for at least 30 more days after this."

Regardless of where on the calendar the completion deadline finally lands, Briley said the contractor will finish the job. He said some people had expressed concern, too, that construction would stop if the MainStreet project is not funded by the village.

"Everything is between the village, state and federal governments and the contractor," Briley said. "MainStreet has nothing to do with it now."

Construction superintendent

Bob Tackett said he is just as eager as everyone else in Ruidoso to finish the job.

"I don't think people realize just how complicated it is to make little changes," he said. Tackett said he spends more time filling out change orders than supervising his workers.

Just fulfilling the simple request to convert planter boxes to gasketed trees requires documenting the changes and their reasons, submitting the request to Briley, who has it approved by the village, then sends it to the state, who then sends it to the Federal Highway Department, who returns it to the state, who returns it to Briley.

Often the state refuses to approve anything until a punctuation or spelling error has been corrected. Councilor Robert Donaldson said the state will stop at an error and return the document for correction, rather than reading the whole thing and having all corrections made at once.

Even without written state approval, D&S moves ahead with changes. To accommodate the tree grates, construction foreman Rusty Trantham works until 11 p.m. building frames to set in the concrete. He must make 80 frames and completes seven per night.

Flawed blueprints have been the main source of delay and increasing cost. For example, what was marked as water meters on the plans are really traffic control junction boxes. Pipes meant to supply water for landscaping lie between planter areas with no means for getting water to the surface and into the beds. Tackett said Briley told him that landscaping was not part of Bohannon-Huston's obligations.

Other problems are unforeseeable, like encountering a foot of concrete in front of Brunell's. For every snag, Tackett must adjust the design and submit a change order.

"The merchants have really been great," Tackett said. "They can come straight to me with questions, and we'll work something out."

At the MainStreet coffee Friday, merchants were understanding of Briley's and Tackett's situations, but they still have no satisfactory answers to their questions. Some eyes are turning to the governor's office for an explanation of why the "powers that be" cannot expedite this project for the sake of the community.

Ruidoso Downs village moves offices into a brand new municipal building

The Village of Ruidoso Downs welcomed visitors to the opening of their new municipal building at 122 Downs Drive. State Representative John Underwood cut the red ribbon, thanking his colleagues in Santa Fe for voting to fund the project.

Underwood said the village administration's previous working conditions were cramped to a point almost beyond the call of duty. Village offices were previously housed

in a temporary building with only two main rooms. The new building has offices for everyone, plus two holding cells in the police department, and bathrooms aplenty.

The Board of Trustees' spacious new meeting room was dedicated to R.D. and Joan Dale Hubbard for their contribution of \$19,000. Most of the building money came from two state grants of \$200,000 and \$200,500.

Still to come are the finishing touches, including two paved park-

ing lots and landscaping. Mayor Joe Hayhurst thanked everyone from the Ruidoso Downs citizens to Governor Bruce King. A special dedication plaque by the main entrance honors the people who worked to fund and build the new village hall complex.

Village employees will move into the building Monday, May 9, and the Board of Trustees will have its first meeting in the Hubbard Room that night.

Ruidoso council considers increased sewer rates

Rising sewer rates and an expensive new Convention Civic Event Center sign are two of a dozen issues on the agenda for Tuesday's meeting of the Ruidoso Village Council.

Ordinance 94-8, a sewer rate increase of \$2 per month, is expected to pass with little opposition.

The village sewer department has experienced a number of aging problems, including a plant overload several years ago that caused the Environmental Department to lay down certain mandates for improving the village system.

Village manager Gary Jackson in earlier budget sessions told the council that water should no longer subsidize the sewer department, that each department should

maintain its own accountability.

Jackson said the rate raise is for maintaining, enlarging, constructing and repairing the sewage facilities and for paying the interest and principal on revenue bonds issued for the construction of the public sewer.

The ordinance reads that payment of the applicable sewer service charge shall not relieve the owner or occupant of any property capable of being served by the public sewer from the obligation imposed by this ordinance to connect to the public sewer.

The long awaited convention center sign is expected to cost anywhere from \$25,000 to \$100,000.

After some discussion, the council is expected to authorize a call for bids for the sign to be located off Mechem Drive near the entrance.

Other public hearings for the meeting include:

—an ordinance reinstating the amendments to the Animal Control Ordinance.

—an ordinance repealing the existing collective bargaining ordinance, and adopting a new collective bargaining ordinance.

—a consideration of the 1994-95 fiscal year preliminary budget.

Under regular items, the council will:

—hear an appeal of a violation notice for illegal fencing behind Village Hardware. The hardware store is using razor wire, a type of barbed wire, to protect the back of the property. The village is attempting to rid all fences within the village of barbed or razor wire as a health hazard. Health hazards cannot be grandfathered.

County manager resigns, but doesn't go out like a lamb

It looked for a while that the parting of former Lincoln County manager Andy Wynham and the five county commissioners would end on a note of honest disagreement, with mutual respect.

But within 24 hours, the situation crumbled.

Just two days after Wynham submitted his resignation, Commission Chairman Montez called a special meeting for last Friday.

Word was that Montez would ask for commission concurrence that Wynham leave immediately and not stay two weeks to help with the transition, as previously arranged. Apparently, Wynham hadn't been handling the split the way his soon-to-be former bosses envisioned.

However, the special meeting was canceled Friday morning, because Wynham turned in his keys Thursday evening.

Although Wynham's decision to accept an appointment as Carrizozo municipal judge, a minor elected position that pays \$200 a month, was the catalyst for a closed to the public meeting on personnel Tuesday, apparently, commissioners harbored other criticisms of their

manager.

After more than three hours behind closed doors, Wynham offered his resignation with six months severance pay.

Montez said several commissioners noticed a change in Wynham's attitude shortly after the commission approved a two-year contract for him last October. Generally, they saw him as "aggressive and prone to push his personal agenda instead of just presenting the facts of a situation."

They also contended the manager's job should be a 24-hour-a-day assignment and that in a recent budget session, the manager asked for more help to do his job. They pointed out that Wynham already was away to attend school and to volunteer with the local volunteer fire department and ambulance service.

Wynham, on the other hand, viewed his involvement as a commitment and sign of his dedication to the community. He saw no conflict, as long as the judge's job was handled on his personal time. He pointed to his accomplishments since being hired in March 1992, the long hours he has poured into the manager's job and his grasp of government.

Wynham leaves with six months

severance pay, plus the two weeks.

He told The Ruidoso News late Friday that Montez' decision shocked him.

"I talked to him about 6:30 p.m.," he said. "I called the chairman when I heard he had called a special meeting. He said commissioners had become incompatible with me. I asked why now. He said he would feel uncomfortable if he ran into me. I don't know why, but personally, I feel guilt makes one very uncomfortable."

"I thought I was leaving on the best of circumstances. I made a good faith offer to help two weeks and beyond. I was flabbergasted."

"I feel he had no reason to be concerned. I think it came down to a political power struggle. I think they thought I had too much power, but it's only as much as they want me to have."

"He said people had been calling him and he was uncomfortable. I asked him if he had the votes lined up (for a majority decision that he should leave right away). He indicated he did and I said if that's the way it's going to be, I'll pack up and go."

Wynham said he asked Montez to let him stay until Monday, because he had a doctor's appoint-

ment Friday, but Montez preferred he leave immediately.

"I called Commissioner Howell and he indicated some displeasure with my comments in the newspaper. I read both (newspaper accounts) and felt they were fair and not overly inflammatory and reflected what happened."

"He told me he had been thinking about turning it around (reconsidering the resignation), but was displeased with my comments."

"How do you apologize for telling the truth?" Wynham said.

He said some comments from commissioner published in The Ruidoso News' article gave him the first concrete reasons for their position last Tuesday.

"I read some things that never were verbalized to me before," he said.

He disputed a remark by Howell that he didn't present both sides of an issue and that he lobbied for his side.

"When I didn't give the side they wanted, they didn't appreciate it," Wynham said. "I vocalized my concerns about the sale barn (rural events center) and they didn't want to hear it. The next guy better not make recommendations."

"If they overruled my recom-

mendation, I never hesitated to follow through on their decision once made."

After talking to Montez, he called commissioners Howell and L. Ray Nunley, who were of the same mind as Montez.

"Martha Guevara is more than capable of keeping things on an even keel," Wynham said of his administrative assistant. "But there are so many things going on that I really feel I needed to go over and put notes down on paper, like the budget, the road agreement, the sales barn (rural events center)."

"I'm just beginning to try to pull things out of my mind. If I have a weakness as county manager, it's keeping things in my mind. I needed to get them on paper so the next manager will see and know."

"I'm seriously worried things will fall or fall through the cracks and I really don't want that to be my responsibility. I want people to know I made a good faith offer to commissioners."

"The biggest jolt was the speed of the final break," Wynham said.

"After I made my decision to resign, I thought I had two weeks to adjust. People were coming by and wishing me well and I said, 'I'll see you again before I leave. This

was sudden and full of heavy emotion."

"I didn't want to leave. It was something I enjoyed doing. I really thought it was a lousy way to go. Kind of emotional for me, too."

Wynham said he brought maintenance supervisor Leroy Zamora to watch as he packed up his things. Guevara took notes as he dictated things she needed to know.

"I wrapped it up about 9:30 p.m. after three hours," Wynham said.

"It's not a financial thing, but it's a hell of an emotional burden. I felt it wasn't warranted."

"Montez said he needed 100 percent loyalty from a manager. I feel I've been 150 percent loyal and I guess I got my reward. It didn't need to be this way."

Wynham added, "Please thank all those people for their support in Carrizozo and Ruidoso. They've been wonderful. They made me feel good about the job I've been doing."

Montez said the county has gone through a transition period without a manager before and survived with Guevara handling administration.

"We'll do it again," he said. "This (situation with Wynham) has been building for the past 30-40 days."

Indian journalist says feds are exploiting native Americans with attempts to store highly radioactive nuclear waste on tribal lands

The attempt to place high-level nuclear waste on their Reservation transforms the Mescalero Apaches into the latest victims of environmental racism, according to Native American journalist Valerie Taliman.

A member of the Navajo Nation and a correspondent for six of the largest Indian newspapers in the United States, Taliman said the Mescalero are among many of the 500 tribal groups in North America being exploited at the sacrifice of their land and possibly their health.

The tragedy is only increased by the fact that in some cases tribal leaders seem oblivious to the possible long term consequences for their own people and their land from an accidental release of radiation, contamination of water sources and degradation of other natural resources.

Taliman offered those observations during a recent appearance at a seminar sponsored by the Center for Environmental Journalism at the University of Colorado in Boulder.

The Environmental Justice Bill approved in February acknowledges that people of color suffer disproportionately from the siting of toxic waste, uranium mining and other extraction abuses, she said. However, unlike groups not tied as tightly to their land, tribal members don't just pick up and move when their land becomes contaminated.

Heavy pressure

"More than 100 waste proposals have been pitched to tribes in the last four years," Taliman said.

Most Native Americans look at the resources on their reservations as sacred, but money is a strong incentive for leaders. Many don't understand the technology to be placed on their land. They don't foresee the devastating consequences, she said.

"There seems to be the mentality (among corporations) that open land, the West, seems to be the area where you can take things and dump them, because nobody's living there," she said. "What happens goes beyond economic blackmail and falls into the area of exploiting cultural barriers."

People often question tribal claims of being sovereign nations, she noted.

"We have a real hard time convincing the state and federal government... but when it comes to toxic waste, all of a sudden everyone is willing to recognize sovereignty. That's because we don't fall under the jurisdiction of states and there's a lot less red tape for a landfill or toxic waste incinerator."

The fight against the latest invasion of their homelands has fallen to grass roots organizations, such as the Native American Rights Fund, Taliman said.

"A company might come in and offer millions of dollars to a tribe for a landfill, and this in fact has happened on many reservations, being courted by big money," she said.

"The first contact I had with this happened on my own reservation (in Arizona) and it was when Waste Management decided to come to the Navajo Nation and place a landfill and a high level waste incinerator."

She described the area as an arid, high desert region near Flagstaff where primarily Navajo is spoken.

"(They) came in and explained to the (leaders) of the nation that they were going to dig a hole in the earth and burn some trash," Taliman said. "And it sounded all right to many of those in the nation. We don't have words for dioxin."

"Beyond that, the Navajo (leaders) were questioning why would anyone ever produce something so toxic that it's going to poison us for generations to come. That ethic, that mentality, doesn't even exist among my people."

Language barrier

"What we found was that the language barrier really was one element used in the campaign. One (leader) had a grandson who came home (from college and told them the consequences of such a landfill; that there may be jobs, but there also would be contamination)."

That led to the organization of a national conference in 1990, which was the foundation of a network of 75 indigenous people.

She attended the 1991 conference and heard other cases of environmental racism, Taliman said.

"There's been a lot of economic blackmail in impoverished Native American communities, where all of a sudden companies are pitching environmental racism under the guise of economic development," she said. "To people who have no jobs and no money, it looks more attractive. It's wide spread in this country."

"There isn't a single community I've been to, native nations, that you don't see this kind of thing going on; economic blackmail and environmental racism."

"They are devastating our community."

She spoke of the effects of uranium mining on the Navajo Nation in reference to recent disclosures that the United States government authorized secret use of radioactive substances in humans in the 1940s and 1950s.

"We were probably the first live animals involved in that kind of ex-

ploitation," Taliman said. "In the 1940s and 1950s, the U.S. government needed uranium. Two thirds of the nation's uranium supply was on Indian nations."

More than 17 tribes have come forward to talk about what happened to them while trying to help the government.

"A lot of people were involved in this 24-hour-a-day mining operation at Newcomb and Shiprock, New Mexico, in a real push to get more material," she said.

Study suppressed

A physician named Victor Archer in the 1950s conducted a study to determine the effects of such exposure, but it wasn't published until a few years ago, Taliman said.

While the study was on-going, the doctors looked for diseases the miners may have contracted and their mortality rate, but Archer contends he was not allowed to tell the miners they were in danger, she said.

"He had to convince his bosses with bodies that the people had been contaminated," Taliman said.

In 1990, Congress passed the Radiation Exposure Compensation Act and the government officially apologized for what happened, she said.

But getting that compensation hasn't been easy.

"I understand several thousand filed and only 53 actually have been able to make it through the loopholes and get compensation," she said.

"What was left behind by the U.S. government and corporations

was a toxic legacy that our people are dying with. Teenagers who live in the shadow of uranium tailings contract ovarian and testicular cancer at a 15 time the national average."

More than 1,000 unclaimed uranium mines still pockmark the terrain, she said.

Rivers are contaminated and, in turn, they contaminate livestock consumed by the Navajo while the Environmental Protection Agency attempts to "find a single source of contamination" to blame for the problem.

Taliman claimed that most Native Americans are tied to their land for religious reasons as well as sustenance.

"Many people came to this country seeking religious freedom, but in this country, we are the only ones who don't enjoy the first amendment rights to protect resources considered sacred," she said.

Contamination

"When we talk about contaminating a river with nuclear waste, you're not talking just about environment as recreation. To our people they are sources of food, medicine and religious material."

The tribe is charged with taking care of the fish and the fish will provide food for the people, she said.

Taliman noted the frustration of a tribe along the Columbia River (in the state of Washington), after they started to find mutant salmon with no eyes and no backbone. A nearby nuclear power operation

later acknowledged accidental releases of radiation into the air and water.

"It doesn't take a Ph.D. in physics to see that what happened to the fish will happen to people," she said. "In reporting environmental stories, I see a lack of bringing it down to the level of survival."

In another example, Taliman pointed to 10,000 Cree who would be displaced by a proposed James Bay Hydro project.

"What happens to your traditional foods? What happens to your medicines? What happens to your sense of humanity when you as a people no longer have where they came from?"

Back on the issue of nuclear waste, she pointed to the Western Shoshoni, whose sacred mountain (Yucca Mountain) in Nevada has been designated as a permanent storage site by the year 2010 for spent nuclear fuel rods produced by Eastern and Midwestern utilities.

She contended the choice is doubly poor because the area is prone to earthquakes and is connected to a major aquifer (underground water supply).

"If you want to look at the short term Monitored Retrievable Storage (MRS), it first was pitched by government and now pitched by industry (to tribes) to store nuclear waste temporarily," Taliman said.

"The Mescalero Apache have moved forward on constructing on their Reservation a facility for 40 to 50 years or until a permanent storage is built," she said. "What's happened is that 20 to 30 private

utilities have stepped in and said we'd love to bury our waste there, because there aren't any other options."

The Mescalero tribal council recently signed with Minneapolis-based Northern States Power Company and 32 other utilities to create a private storage facility. This private initiative came after three years of study money ran out from the State Department of Energy.

"I think you are going to see a lot of activity on this issue," Taliman said. "Transportation will be a big issue, crossing other states. And the concept is a hot bed of controversy among native people who say we should be taking no one's waste. We have enough on our hands to deal with."

Although both Lincoln County and Ruidoso government bodies have urged Mescalero tribal leaders to abandon their nuclear storage plan, they have not been able to organize any effective effort to block it, since the reservation doesn't fall under the state's jurisdiction.

The Mescalero currently operate a ski resort, a luxury inn, a timber mill and a container welding business on their Reservation, which is situated among some of the spectacular scenery in the Southwest.

Tribal spokesman have contended that the issue of the MRS will be put to a member vote and that they would not proceed if they viewed the proposal as dangerous. They point to a multi-million dollars worth of immediate benefits to tribal members, as well as long term employment possibilities.

Fort Wingate proposed as site for nuclear waste

While some people don't want to see high level nuclear waste stored in their back yard, others welcome it and even feel an obligation to provide an interim resting place for the material produced from their territory.

Jeff Condrey, former city manager of Gallup and former executive director of the Economic Development Group of Gallup/McKinley county, has formed Fort Wingate MRS, Inc. in an effort to convince the Department of Energy (DOE) and private utilities to bring their spent nuclear fuel rods back to northwestern New Mexico.

In a letter to Thomas P. Grumbly, department of Energy Assistant Secretary for Environmental Restoration and Waste Management in Washington D.C., asked to add former Fort Wingate Depot Activity to a list of sites subject to evaluation under an environmental impact statement (EIS) announced by the DOE March 14.

"(The fort) is a massive surplus Army facility, designed for hazardous materials storage, that was decommissioned in January of this year," wrote Conley, chief executive officer of Fort Wingate MRS. "The Department of Ener-

gy has a priority claim on this surplus federal facility before it is released to other interested parties for reuse."

"This 21,812 acre complex offers 737 reinforced concrete bunkers, rail access, interstate highway access - and is available now. It is located in the richest uranium mining region of the United States. Much of the fuel for the nation's nuclear reactors (commercial, defense or research) originated here in northwest New Mexico. Some of us believe that all aspects of the nuclear fuel cycle - from uranium mine to repository - are potential economic development opportunities for this rural area," Conley wrote.

"Further, it would be politically correct to add (the depot) as a candidate site because some of the DOE's spent fuel is now stored at seven facilities adjacent to New Mexico's major metropolitan areas."

Condrey told The Ruidoso News Monday that during his term as city manager, Gallup was approached by Pacific Nuclear Systems, the same company that has worked with the Mescalero Apache Tribal Council in trying to site a monitored retrievable storage facility (MRS) on tribal land.

But shortly after initial meetings in 1990,

the city's administration change and Condrey was no longer manager.

"The project floundered," he said. "In 1991, (former federal negotiator) David LeRoy put out his invitation to participate in voluntary siting of an MRS. We got 45 business people together interested in studying the possibility, but Governor Bruce King blocked our application to the DOE within three days and he clearly had that authority. Meanwhile, Mescalero already had received its first exploratory grant and were plugging away. I put it on a back burner."

"When U.S. Senator Jeff Bingaman succeeded in stopping their last grant, I took that as a signal that the voluntary process had failed and the federal government needed a private sector solution."

Last October, he incorporated the Fort Wingate group.

"I didn't know Mescalero had come to the same conclusion and have moved on that (private sector) also," Condrey said.

"I think Fort Wingate is an ideal site. We have to have a solution and this facility already is owned by the United States."

Two good-natured black Labrador/chow siblings, abandoned when they were five weeks old, are ready for adoption at the Lincoln County Humane Society shelter.

Manager Esther Harper said Eclipse and Ebony, brother and sister, have received the full three shot series for Parvo/distemper and have survived runs of the diseases that have killed many other puppies.

"We're keeping them socialized, but they look at us each morning like, 'is this the morning we get to

go home," she said. "They have thick hair and would do all right outside with a warm dog house. They would need boosters and rabies shots."

By state law, all animals adopted from a shelter in New Mexico also must be spayed or neutered to ensure they do not produce more unwanted offspring.

Blondie, a sensational-looking reddish buff-color chow mix featured March 28, has been sponsored for her spaying by long-time humane supporters Carol and Doug Armstrong from Texas, who have sponsored many other

animals in the last few years. Their goodwill reduces the cost of Blondie's adoption fee by covering the major expense.

Kim Mills of Pampered Pets recently groomed several of the shelter's adoption candidates to enhance their chances and Alison Walstad at Hondo Valley Kennels continues to offer free grooming for newly adopted dogs.

All of the local veterinarians also extend a helping hand by taking turns checking the health of the animals and offering suggestions for improvement.

In the temporary cat room (until

the shelter expansion is completed), many felines are ready to go home.

Jerry, named after Ruidoso Mayor Jerry Shaw, is an adult gray Persian mix male with a white undercoat. He was named in honor of the mayor after Shaw help mobilize help from the local fire department to rescue the cat, who had been stranded in a tree for several days.

To help improve the life expectancy of puppies, foster homes, which would keep them for eight weeks while their shots are administered, are desperately needed.

Money limitations may cut down the number of additional indoor/outdoor dog pens that can be added to the shelter as part of the expansion underway.

The society will be looking to area organizations and individuals interested in the welfare of abandoned animals for help in buying more pens. The units cost between \$300 and \$350. A plaque will be installed bearing the name of the donor.

In an effort to increase participation and membership, the society also is throwing a summer picnic for owners and their pets Sunday, June 19. With the help of donations from many local businesses, the summer get-together will be staged at the Cedar Creek Group Campground. Buy a \$15 family or \$10 individual membership and come in for a free lunch and lots of two and four-legged games.

To join the fun, but not become a member, the 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. fun fest will cost \$5, with all money going toward the support of the

shelter. Board members are volunteers and receive no pay or expense reimbursement.



Carrizo Art School lines out full summer of classes

The week of July 25-29 promises to be a chance for experimentation at Carrizo Lodge Art School with three instructors who encourage individuality and challenge their students.

In "Watercolor," Naomi Brotherton emphasizes design planning and introduces use of color schemes using mostly transparent pigments in depicting the various kinds of weather and times of day.

Working from sketches or photographs, Brotherton helps the student to compose, design and express, but not to copy nature. Landscapes dominate the work, but usually one day of flower painting is included. Sketching trips to local picturesque spots will glean material to work with in the studio.

With a bachelor's degree in art and a graduate of the Art Students League and Art Career School in New York City, Brotherton has taught workshops across the United States for 27 years.

She has been on the faculty at Carrizo Art School for 24 years. Her night scenes were described in the March 1991 issue of "American Artist," and she is featured in "Northlight" and "Scene."

Brotherton co-authored the book "Variations in Watercolor" and produced three video tapes on techniques in landscapes and flower painting. She has won numerous

awards and has had more than 40 one-artist exhibitions. Her personal papers are recorded in the Archives of American Art at the Smithsonian Institution.

Tuition for her session is \$250.

That same week, Bobbie Kilpatrick will guide her students through mixed media in "Discovering Your Creativity." She will help the intermediate or advanced student who is ready to explore the many possibilities of personal expression as an art career.

The aim of this workshop is to find and encourage the unique artist within each individual. Any medium and style is acceptable.

Students are encouraged to bring artwork or slides to class for critiquing. Projects will have emphasis on creative thinking and imagination, as well as individual concept. Problem solving will cover the basics with design being the major topic.

Also included in the class will be goal setting, motivational techniques for achievement and success in marketing or galleries.

Painting since 1972, Kilpatrick has worked in oils, acrylic, watercolor, pencil and pen and ink. She does most of her work in oils but likes to experiment with media.

Kilpatrick has exhibited in Texas and the Southwest through galleries, one-person and group shows. Her paintings hang in many

prominent individual and corporate collections.

Tuition for her workshop is \$250.

L'Deane Trueblood will cover "Portraits and Figure in Watercolor" with her students during the week long session.

Widely known for her sculptures and paintings of people, Trueblood has mastered the difficult medium of watercolor for capturing sparkling likenesses of people that reveal the inner spirit of the person.

Her work has won awards from top jurors and is in museums and corporate and individual collections.

She has studied with some of the most renowned teachers in the country, notably Charles Reid, whose workshops she attended for several years.

Her portrait and figure painting workshop will be for students with experience using watercolor and some knowledge of drawing.

Classes will begin with discussion and demonstration, followed by painting from a clothed model.

Individual instruction will occupy the afternoon except for a few longer demonstrations. A concluding informal critique will be held when time permits.

All painting will be done vertically and a standing easel is required.

Each student should plan to

bring equipment that is compact and portable, that will occupy a space about six square feet. A Julian-type portable easel is good, or a light-weight folding metal easel with extendible legs.

Trueblood, like most serious artists, views art as being as much about communication as creation.

You'll be hard put to draw an overwrought explanation of her work from this painter and sculptor whose full-time focus on art was postponed until her children were grown.

At 64, Trueblood has experienced too many of the necessary, but often unglamorous daily tasks during years spent as a teacher, wife, and mother to bother with pretentiousness. Therein lies the charm of both the artwork and the artist: honest impressions of life by a woman who has really lived.

Tuition for this interesting class is \$275.

A full schedule of workshops will continue through August 5, with other artists and instructors to be featured in upcoming editions.

The boys are playing at the Inn of the Mountain Gods and the girls' action is slated for Alto Lakes Golf and Country Club.
Tuesday's final rounds will be conducted at the Links at Sierra Blanca for the boys and the girls will conclude at Cree Meadows.

The tournament is divided into two classes — A-AAA and AAAA — for both boys and girls.

Ruidoso and Clovis, the defending boys champions, are both in the tournament as is Albuquerque Academy and Roswell Goddard, the winners in the girls divisions last year.
The Warriors come into the tournament red-hot, after winning four-straight tournaments — including the District 3-AAA Championship last week.

The Warrior boys team score averaged 303 during the last four tournaments, or just over 75 per man. Those numbers easily reflect the best golf in school history over an extended period of time.
The main reason for the Warriors strong play is the emergence of Jeff Chapman and Ryan Wall, the team's top two players.

Chapman crushed his district opponents with a one-under 71 last week in Las Cruces to take the individual title in perhaps his steadiest round as Warrior.
Wall, who finished second to Chapman at District, took medalist honors twice two weeks ago with rounds of 72-73 at Spring River and NMMI golf courses in Roswell.

While Chapman and Wall are at the top of their games, the chance of repeating as State Champions lies squarely in the hands of Matt Cantu, Jimmy Varnadore and Eric Stephens — the Warriors third, fourth and fifth men.
If they play well, Ruidoso will be very, very tough to beat over their home courses.

Cantu has also played well of late. The senior's scores in Roswell averaged under 80 and he plays the Links at Sierra Blanca very well, tuning up with a 76 in Friday's practice round.
Varnadore, another senior, has been on an absolute tear.
His last three tournament scores of 76, 77 and 76 have been career tournament lows and the four-year letterman has picked the perfect time to peak — finishing third to Chapman and Wall in the District Championship.

While those four golfers will provide the leadership and experience for the Warriors, it was Eric Stephens last year that ultimately gave the Warriors the title. His scores of 82-83 at Pinon Hills last year provided the Warriors their margin of victory and gave Stephens an 11th-place finish in the tournament.
The Warriors won the title last year because they got consistent play from all their players, and those players appear to better golfers than last year's team.

But while Ruidoso is better, there are a lot of other teams.
Tucumcari, Grants, Lovington and Artesia are much improved over their 1993 editions and throw in Academy and you've got what should be a whale of a battle for the State Championship.
Tucumcari has shot below 300 twice this year and finished second to the Warriors at NMMI by just one stroke.

The Rattlers also tied Ruidoso in the Leroy Geoch Invitational last month, but lost a playoff to the locals.
Grants, who finished second to the Warriors last year in the state, seem to have also played particularly well this year. The Pirates boast one of AAA's best golfers in senior Matt Murdoch and should be very competitive as they are strong, like the Warriors from top to bottom.
Lovington and Artesia like always are again very tough.

Lovington tied the Warriors for second in the Geoch, and then beat the locals in the playoff. But the Wildcats have played very well of late and own victories over Tucumcari and Artesia in the past week.
Artesia's Mark Byers is certainly the longest-driving player in the tournament, and when he's got it going, one of the best players. The Bulldogs are certainly capable of taking first if they keep the ball in play.
And one cannot leave out Academy from any pre-tournament consideration. The Chargers are always in the thick of things and seem to finish in the top three every year.

The Lady Warriors will be making their first appearance in the tournament in several years. While the girls don't appear to be headed for a trophy this year, the team should become a dominant force in AAA golf in near future.
Playing with three 8th graders, a sophomore and a senior, the Lady Warriors have the talent to heard for several years to come.
Heather Stephens, Davon Lowe, Danielle Morris, Cecilia Fuentes and Katie Lukens will represent the Blue and Gold when play begins at Alto.
Onate, Academy and Portales appear to be the teams to beat in the AAA division.
Tee times will begin at 8:00 a.m. both days at all courses.

Warriors boys track team takes second at district meet

In perhaps their best performance of the season, the Ruidoso Warrior boys track team finished as the district runner-up Friday and Saturday in Las Cruces.
Silver's 100 points was the best team total, with the Warriors not far behind at 82 points. Oñate finished third with 80, followed by Socorro (62), Deming, (47), and Cobre, (36).

Sophomore Kyle Humphreys took home the district Championship in the Long Jump, joining teammate Sarah Dix took the same honor in the same event in the girls division.
In addition, Humphreys qualified for State in four other events by finishing second four times.

State qualifiers are determined by qualifying meets where specific times or distances must be matched, or by finishing first or second at the District track meet.
The Lady Warriors finished fourth in District, behind perhaps the top three teams in the state —

Silver, Deming, and Oñate. The girls bested the squads from Socorro and Cobre.

While Humphreys and Dix were the only first place finishers, the Warriors brought home several second and third-place ribbons.
Humphreys nabbed second in the 110-meter hurdles as well as the 200-meter dash; and was on the 400 and 1600-meter relay teams that also finished second.

In addition to Humphreys, the 400-relay team consists of Anthony Torres, Casey Kearns and Danny Schrader.

The 1600-meter relay team is the same except Rex Comanche takes the place of Schrader.

The Warriors also got runner-up finishes from Brandon Abeita in both the Discus and Shot Put, and Earl Holstein checked in second in the Pole Vault.

Senior Casey Kearns is gradually battling back from a bad case of the flu and checked in third in the 400-meter dash.

The girls division saw Stephanie Haas take second in the 1600- and 3200-meter runs, joining teammate Jody Randle who finished as the

runner-up in the High Jump.
Monique Ramos finished second in the Discus and will be joining Haas, Randle and Dix at the State Meet.

The girls third place finishers included Sarah Dix in the 100-meter dash and Robin Line in the shot put.

Head coach Ronny Maskew was pleased with the progress his team made.

"I thought both the boys and girls teams did real well," said Maskew. "They just have so much more depth than us, it's difficult because those big schools get to run fresh kids all the time."

"Kyle (Humphreys) had a real good day for us and so did a lot of other kids," said Maskew.

"As far as the girls are concerned, the teams that beat us are probably the best teams in the State. We competed with them very well in our strong events and we should improve even more at State," said Maskew.

Maskew and the state qualifiers head to Albuquerque this weekend to end the season at the State Track Championships.

County fair queen candidates sign up

The time to select a new Lincoln County Fair Queen is coming around again and Mary Dell Jones wants to be sure local beauties know the contest is a countywide competition.

"I want to clear up the misconception that this is limited to girls from Capitan, or those just in ranching communities," Jones said Wednesday. "If you know how to handle a horse, but are equally at ease in a dress and in front of an audience, this is a great opportunity."

The winner of the county competition will be sponsored by the County Fair Association and the Sheriff's Posse to compete at the Albuquerque State Fair in late summer.

"She'll spend four days at the fair with 24 girls in a dormitory, one girl from each of the 24 counties that participate," Jones said. "They'll be entertained during the day time at the fairground and

at night, they will ride in the grand entry and meet all of the different starts performing."

"The great thing is that although only one girl can win the state title, sometimes we don't remember who that is years later, but the girls never forget the experience."

This year will be the first since the county dropped its system of electing a queen in waiting. Instead the new queen will head straight to the state fair after presiding over the annual county fair in Capitan.

"I guess they used to have the queen in waiting to give the girls a whole year to prepare their horses and clothing," Jones said. "Now there's not so much emphasis on the clothes. They just want them coordinated."

The fair board will donate \$250 toward the new queen's expenses at the state fair, plus the prize buckle, tiara and other accessories (totaling about \$600). The Posse will help with a \$300 contribution.

The local contest is judged 60 percent on horsemanship and 40 percent on personality.

An orientation and the final sign up date is set for 7 p.m. May 13 at the county fair building in Capitan.

"I'll give each girl a pattern they must ride for the horsemanship competition," Jones said. "With the personality division, they just need a casual western dress, or a blouse and skirt. They can wear heels or boots. For the riding, all of them will be dressed in blue denim pants, white shirts, hats and boots, so the judges aren't influenced by individual appearance at that time."

The local judging is scheduled for June 4. The queen will be crowned by association president Gordon Barham during the rodeo Friday night as part of the July Fourth celebration.

DURABLE POWER OF ATTORNEY

You have heard that everyone should have a will. This is true. A will, however, only takes effect when you die. You also need a document that will take care of you while you are living. I believe that a durable power of attorney is probably the most important document that an individual can have. A power of attorney is a written document by which you give another person the power to act on your behalf. That person becomes your attorney in fact or agent.

A power of attorney terminates upon the death of the principal, the person who gives the power. Therefore, you cannot use a power of attorney as a substitute for a will. If the principal becomes incapacitated the law automatically terminates the power of attorney. Because of this rule of law, almost all states have adopted laws to allow a person to state in his power of attorney that the power will not be affected by the principal's disability. This is known as a durable power of attorney (DPOA). Therefore, if you have a DPOA and go into a coma, the DPOA is still in effect and your attorney in fact may still act on your behalf.

Things can be important. Most people will want the DPOA to go into effect only when they become incapacitated because they are quite capable of taking care of their own affairs. Until the unexpected incapacity occurs, a DPOA can be drafted to provide that it will take effect only upon the principal becoming incapacitated. This type of power of attorney is called a Springing Durable Power of Attorney (SDPOA) because it only springs into effect when the disability arises. A DPOA and SDPOA can be combined. Many married couples will grant to each other a DPOA and then provide that if they both become disabled that a third person (usually an adult child or trusted friend) will have a SDPOA.

A DPOA can also be combined with a health care directive. This health care directive will give your attorney in fact authority to make health care decisions for you if you are unable to do so. This will enable your attorney in fact to review your medical records, to sign releases or authorizations for your health care, and even fire physicians and other health care professionals on your behalf.

The bottom line is that a person with a DPOA combined with a health care directive will rarely need a court appointed conservator or guardian. This means that a lot of your money will be saved to be used for your benefit and not spent on courts, lawyers and accountants in establishing and maintaining a court-appointed conservator or guardian. Also, you will have picked who you want to manage your affairs and not leave that decision to the court.

Because a DPOA can give enormous power to another person it must be drafted with care, and you should always consult with your attorney before you decide to use a DPOA.

QUALIFIED TAX EXEMPT OBLIGATIONS The District intends to designate the bonds as "QUALIFIED TAX EXEMPT OBLIGATIONS" for purposes of Section 265 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended (the "Code"). Section 265 of the Code permits the designation of governmental bonds such as these bonds as qualified tax exempt obligations, based upon certain representations made herein below:

(a) The bonds are not private activity bonds; (b) The District does not reasonably expect to issue qualified tax exempt obligations in an aggregate principal amount exceeding \$10,000,000.00 during calendar year 1994; and (c) The District will not designate more than \$10,000,000.00 in aggregate principal amount of qualified tax exempt bonds during calendar year 1994.

INTEREST RATE

Interest on said bonds will be payable May 1, 1995, and semi-annually thereafter on May 1 and November 1 in each year until maturity.

The maximum net effective interest rate permitted on said bonds is twelve percent (12%); provided, however, that if the net effective interest rate on such bonds is greater than ten percent (10%) per annum (based on the actual price to be paid to the District for said bonds, calculated to maturity according to the standard table of bond values), such rate must be approved in writing by the New Mexico State Board of Finance, and the District may not issue the bonds before such approval is given. It is permissible to bid different or split rates of interest; provided, however, that:

(1) no bid shall specify more than one interest rate for each maturity; (2) the maximum interest rate permitted is twelve percent (12%) per annum; (3) each interest rate specified must be stated in a multiple of one-eighth (1/8) or one-twentieth (1/20) of one percent (1%) per annum; and (4) the maximum interest rate specified may exceed the minimum interest rate specified by no more than two (2%) percent.

Bidders are required to submit a bid specifying (a) the lowest rate or rates of interest and premium, if any, at which such bidder will purchase such bonds. For informational purposes only, each bidder is requested to specify (b) the total net interest cost to the District in dollars and cents and (c) the net effective interest rate in a stated percentage. Proposals should be enclosed in a sealed envelope endorsed "Bid for General Obligation School Building Bonds of Hondo Valley Public School District No. 20, County of Lincoln, New Mexico," addressed as follows: Hondo Valley Public School District No. 20, Administrative Office, P.O. Box 44, Hondo, New Mexico 88336, Attention: Secretary, Board of Education. Only unconditional bids shall be considered. Bids should be submitted on the official bid form which may be obtained from the District's financial

consultant (see "INFORMATION" which appears hereafter).

BASIS OF AWARD

Said bonds will be awarded to the best bidder considering the interest rate or rates specified and the premium offered, if any, and subject to the right of the Board to reject any and all bids and re-advertise. The best bid will be determined by deducting the amount of the premium bid, if any, from the total amount of interest which the District would be required to pay from the date of the bonds to the respective maturity dates at the rate or rates specified in the proposal, and said bonds will be awarded on the basis of the lowest net interest cost to the District. The purchaser must pay accrued interest from the date of the bonds to the date of delivery. The bonds will not be sold for less than par plus accrued interest. The District reserves the privilege of waiving any irregularity or informality in any bid.

GOOD FAITH DEPOSIT

All bids shall be sealed and, expect the bid of the State of New Mexico, if one is received, shall be accompanied by a good faith deposit of not less than \$13,600 (i.e., two percent (2%) of the principal amount of the bonds) in cash or by cashier's or treasurer's check of, or by certified check drawn on a solvent commercial bank or trust company in the United States of America and payable to "Hondo Valley Public School District No. 20". Such good faith check shall be returned if the bid is not accepted. If the successful bidder shall fail or neglect to complete the purchase of said bonds within forty-five (45) days following the acceptance of the bid or within ten (10) days after the bonds are offered for delivery, whichever is later, the amount of the deposit shall be forfeited to the District as liquidated damages and, in that event, the Board may accept the bid of the one making the next best bid. If all bids are rejected, the Board shall re-advertise said bonds for sale in the same manner as herein provided for the original advertisement. If there be two or more equal bids and such bids are the best bids received and for not less than par and accrued interest, the Board shall determine which bid shall be accepted.

TIME OF AWARD AND DELIVERY

The Board will take action awarding the bonds or rejecting all bids not later than 24 hours after the expiration of the time herein prescribed for the receipt of the bids. Delivery of the bonds will be made to the successful bidder at some bank or trust company in Albuquerque, New Mexico, or elsewhere at its request and at its expense, within 60 days, the successful bidder shall have the right to purchase said bonds during the succeeding 30 days upon the same terms, or at the request of the successful bidder, during said succeeding 30 days, the good faith deposit will be returned and such bidder shall be relieved on any further obligation. The successful bidder shall make final payment for said bonds with Federal Reserve Funds or other funds acceptable to the District for immediate and unconditional credit to the account of the District. It

is anticipated that the delivery of the bonds will be on or about June 15, 1994.

INFORMATION

Information concerning the bonds, including the District's Official Statement may be obtained from the District's Financial Consultant, Southwest Securities, Inc. The Official Statement is deemed final by the District for purposes of SEC Rule 15C2-12(b)(1) [15 CFR 240.15C-2-12(b)(1)] except for the omission of the following information: the offering price(s), interest rate(s), selling compensation, aggregate principal amount, principal amount per maturity, delivery dates, any other terms or provisions required by an issuer of such securities to be specified in a competitive bid, ratings, other terms of the securities depending on such matters, and the identity of the underwriter(s).

The written approval of the New Mexico Attorney General of said bonds as to form and legality will be supplied. The legality of the bonds, in addition, will be approved by Simons, Cuddy & Friedman, Attorneys at Law, Santa Fe, New Mexico and McCall, Parkhurst & Horton, L.L.P., Dallas, Texas (Co-Bond Counsel), whose opinion approving the legality of the bonds will be furnished to the successful bidder at no cost to the successful bidder. The opinion will state in substance that the issue of the bonds in the amount aforesaid is valid and legally binding upon the District, that all of the taxable property in the District is subject to the levy of a tax pay the same without limitation of rate or amount, that interest on the bonds is excludable from gross income for purposes of federal income tax, and that the District has properly designated such bonds as "Qualified Tax Exempt Obligations." The successful bidder (without cost to such bidder) will also be furnished with printed bonds (with the opinion of Bond Counsel printed thereon), and a complete transcript of the legal proceedings, including a no-litigation certificate which will state that no litigation is pending to the knowledge of the signer or signers thereof as of the date of the delivery of bonds affecting their validity or the levy or collection of such taxes for their payment.

CUSIP NUMBERS

CUSIP identification numbers may be typed or printed on the bonds, but neither the failure to provide such number on any bond nor any error with respect thereto will constitute cause for failure or refusal by the purchaser thereof to accept delivery of and to pay for the bonds in accordance with the terms hereof.
