Ruidoso News to change owners

The Ruidoso News is being sold to a company in Lawrence, Kansas. Contracts have been signed between Raljon Publishing Inc., owner of The News, and WorldWest Limited Liability Company, a communications business headquartered in Lawrence, Kansas. WorldWest also is acquiring ownership of other publications in the Raljon group. The transaction should be closed by the latter part of June.

WorldWest is a company whose members are officers and employees of The World Company, which publishes the Lawrence Journal-World and owns and operates Sunflower CableVision in Lawrence and Columbine CableVision in Fort Collins, Colorado. The company also prints USA Today, under contract, for a six-state area of the Midwest. The World Company is a family owned business founded in 1891.

Raljon purchased The Ruidoso News in 1988 and currently owns publications in Belen, Socorro and Deming, New Mexico, Steamboat Springs, Colorado, and Payson, Arizona.

Dolph C. Simons Jr., who follows his father and grandfather as president of The World Company and editor and publishers of the Lawrence Journal-World, is manager of the new company that will own The News and its related publications.

"We are pleased and enthused about the prospects of becoming a part of Ruidoso," Simons said. "We are optimistic about the continued growth and development of the Southwest in general and Ruidoso in particular, and we want The News to take an active and positive role in helping the community reach its potential as a wonderful location in which to live, work and play."

Simons said WorldWest plans no major changes in the local operations. Sammy Lopez will remain as publisher of The News and also will continue as regional manager of all the properties for WorldWest.

Others involved in WorldWest are Dolph C. Simons III, Dan C. Simons and Ralph D. Gage. The Simons brothers are active in the administration and operation of The World Company's newspaper and cable television businesses. Gage is general manager of the Journal-World.

MainStreet puts on a happy face

MainStreet merchants who support the streetscape project are raising their voices against the boisterous minority of doomsayers.

What was perhaps a record turnout at Friday's coffee consisted mostly of business people who applauded MainStreet president Don Dutton for suggesting they make the best of a difficult and temporary situation.

"If we put on a happy face and say our city is going to be 100 percent better in the downtown area and it's going to reflect the pride of the entire city, we will attract people here," Dutton said. "Why don't we have a construction sale and bring some folks in here? I think that would be great, to tell people to come to our construction site and buy things at a discount. Then, instead of shaking your heads and saying they're not coming because they can't get to your stores, maybe they'll come up there. All I can say is, give it a shot."

Dutton's sentiments were echoed by several merchants, including Nancy Radziewicz who told Pat Adkins she should make lemonade out of lemons. Adkins and Jimmy Millar led the dissent of a handful of people who see the streetscape as a colossal mistake and feel betrayed by the Ruidoso Village Council.



"They are taking away parking after the council promised to save

Schools OK uniform math series

In line with a call for more consistency in curriculum, the Ruidoso School Board Tuesday adopted the Saxon series on mathematics as the new approach from kindergarten through twelfth grade.

Frank Cannella, principal of White Mountain Elementary, explained that each subject area is reviewed on a seven-year cycle to adopt the textbooks and approach.

A committee comprised of representatives from each school and three to four parents began looking at math alternatives last year. They interviewed teachers at other schools and some of Ruidoso's teachers tried Saxon.

"The only exception is that there is no geometry text," Cannella said. "John Saxon is kind of a maverick in publishing circles. He's a former fighter pilot and doesn't know the meaning of retreat. He doesn't believe in geometry and says he works it into the algebra section."

"So the high school will adopt a separate geometry book, because it is needed for college entrance credit."

Teacher Iva Gurulé said she has tried the series and feels it will make a positive difference for students. It consists at her first grade level of 130 lessons, each with a script for the teacher to ensure that all students receive the basic language and concepts.

Each lesson has some hands-on activities.

"They learn in increments instead of blocks," she said. "You don't just drop it and never see an element like 'time' again and then have to reteach it next year."

Tests are included after every 10 lessons. Homework is part of each daily lesson to reinforce what students covered that day and to get parents involved. She was especially impressed because the special needs children in her class did as well as the other students.

Cannella said the adoption will provide a needed continuity of curriculum from grade to grade.

Adults who have difficulty with

Gun toting boys caught at school

Gun shots from the hill behind Ruidoso High School Thursday led school officials to confiscate a weapon and some marijuana.

Several boys were taken to the Ruidoso Police station to be questioned according to police officer Robert Achteberg.

In his report, Achteberg stated two teachers on patrol in the parking lot heard what they suspected were gun shots coming from the back of the school.

"Mr. (Bob) Elder (a teacher) states he began walking in the woods behind the school and did come up on several juveniles smoking what appeared to be marijuana and that they had a gun with them."

"The official took the subjects back to the school. I took custody of the weapon and the bong or marijuana pipe," Achteberg said. School superintendent Mike Gladden told The Ruidoso News that seven boys were involved.

"The duty teacher spotted them during the lunch hour. He went after the boys and notified the police," Gladden said.

"We just will not have this going on and we will be harsh in dealing with students who choose this line. No names were released."

Village to revamp chamber contract

In the future, a revamped village advertising program and an information service bureau paid for with lodgers tax money will be up for bid, according to a committee formed by the village council.

The council committee met with members of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce to elaborate on the recommendation it eventually will bring before the council.

The current administration has adopted a "need more information" philosophy to all organizations spending tax dollars that say "look what we've done for you."

The committee told chamber director Joan Bailey of a concern that more usable information should be gleaned from statistics collected at the chamber.

Committee members also indicated the chamber had become too much of a village department, not the private entity for which it is designed.

Bailey was told by council committee members that there was no intention to disrupt chamber advertising this year, but the chamber should be aware that the council will monitor the advertising/tourist bureau with the purpose of molding a different program spewing a variety of new information. This is to be accomplished through separate request for proposals, one for village advertising and one for the tourist bureau.

The chamber would then be eligible to bid on either or both programs like any other qualified bidder.

The chamber houses three, but separate divisions with three separate budgets that drive the local service industry: chamber business, art festival, and tourist bureau and advertising.

The village council is more concerned over the smaller tourist

bureau and advertising division, because that is where the bulk of lodgers tax money is spent.

Under the current tourist bureau and advertising division, the chain of command starts with Bailey as the chief decision maker.

Tourist Service Bureau and Advertising

Bailey's budget for the tourist service bureau (\$58,000) is paid through the village by lodgers tax money.

The visitors bureau employees are Lisa Storey, visitor's bureau coordinator (paid by the village), and Wanda Griffith, assistant coordinator (pay split between the village and Ruidoso Downs).

Primary responsibilities of the bureau are to collect data such as number of walk-ins and phone calls, plus handle mailings and certain public relations tasks.

An information list is prepared twice a week for chamber members.

The tourist bureau budget includes costs for salaries, payroll burden, merit increase contingency, accounting, employee insurance allowance, equipment rental, telephone, promotion and travel, office supplies, printing, dues, building maintenance, audit, and a fidelity bond.

Under village contract, the advertising budget (\$169,000) includes contracting for advertising the Ruidoso area, and money for labor and commissions to Debbie Jones, graphic artist and advertising agent of the chamber.

Of Bailey's total salary, \$10,800 is paid by the village for her work in advertising out of the line item, tourist bureau salaries.

Bailey said she is the sole decision maker in placing the ads, writing the copy (sometimes with Jones) and she approves all ad copy and art work.

Bailey has a volunteer advertis-

ing committee, but it has been inoperative.

Advertising placement includes: magazine publications, newspaper, trade shows, tours, Mexico television, seasonal event brochures, brochure pages (special newspaper), special miscellaneous (Fort Worth New Mexico Edition), and New Mexico golf manual.

Chamber Business

The regular chamber operation is paid by membership dues and event proceeds. An organizational chart lists membership at the top. Directing the membership is the board of directors.

Presiding under the board of directors is a president with two major arms. One arm is the executive committee of six members, including three vice presidents: vice president and treasurer; vice president of community development over four committees entitled public relations, transportation, education and beautification; and vice president of economic development over three committees, hospitality, building and special events.

The hospitality committee and the education committee are the only committees active at the moment.

Advising the president and the executive committee is it's staff, the other major arm of the chamber. Staff is headed by director Joan Bailey. Two thirds of her salary is paid through membership fee collections and money generated from events.

Ginger Heath serves as office manager and bookkeeper. Billie Dentler is assistant to the director in charge of special events. Both Heath and Dentler are paid through memberships fee collection and proceeds from chamber events.

The staff's responsibilities is to develop and promote ways of ob-

taining new members, keeping existing members and to promote awareness to members and the general public regarding the chamber.

Staff responsibilities include:

—coordinating the annual meeting

—assisting the Ruidoso Valley Greeters

—helping the President's Club, volunteer group aimed at recruiting new members for the chamber

—publishing the chamber newsletter

—coordinating the annual report to the membership

The chamber also has a weekend employee, Debi Jeeter who is paid by the chamber on an hourly basis.

Art Festival

Nearly 30 percent of the chamber's revenues are generated through the art festival, clearing about \$9,600 last year. The event is considered a separate department for the chamber.

No expenses for salaries are charged off to the art festival.

Gate receipts for the art festival produces about 85 percent of the revenues.

Media advertising represents about 18 percent of the expenses for the festival. Other expenses include security, electrician, tent rental, soft drinks and ground beef, artist meals, trophies, and contract labor.

President-elect Joe Gomez and other new board members include accountant Danny Austin, Downs trustee Margie Morales, Enchantment Inn marketing director Laura Reynolds, business owner Chad Smith and insurance agent Fred Gerth.

Gomez reported that the chamber office staff had taken 41,000 phone calls and 20,000 walk-ins this year. Chamber membership is also up 21 percent.

Veterans to gather at Fort Stanton-Merchant Marine cemetery

It is incumbent upon us all, who enjoy the "Four Freedoms," to respect the efforts of those who have served our country and put their lives on the line for us in the cause of peace and those, who may be called upon to serve in the future.

In the final reckoning, it is the will and support of the American People that assured the victory of our troops in the air, in the trenches and on the seas.

With the above in mind, at 3 p.m. Sunday, May 22, a special Memorial service will be conducted at the Merchant Marine and Military Memorial Cemetery near Fort Stanton in Lincoln County.

The service lasts about an hour in the cemetery about a half mile southeast of Fort Stanton on State Highway 214.

The object of this meeting is to pay our respects to those who have served our country in the cause of peace and in too many cases, given their lives in the effort.

This year, two regular members of our Memorial Service Team, both veterans of the U.S. Air Force, Reverend Bill Kennedy, who served in the Pacific War Zone and Cleston Pritchett, who served in the European Theater of operations and also was involved with the formation of the original Thunderbird Squadron, will conduct the service.

They will provide details of the important role their particular branch of the military forces played in the complete victory over Axis Forces in World War II. As in the past, it is expected special guests will honor us with a few words.

Contributing to the Memorial Services, Captain Victor Schaefer, World War II Merchant Marine skipper, will present to Al Schubert, the Philippines Liberation Medal in recognition of his services on board an American Merchant Vessel in Philippine waters during the campaign of General Douglas MacArthur's Forces in their victorious return to the Philippine Islands. Brief details will be provided of the exploits of the American Merchant Marine and the part it has played in the history of our nation.

Sy Feldman, a British Air Force veteran, will pipe the Albuquerque Mariners into the Service and conclude the Service by playing "Amazing Grace" on Scottish bagpipes. Taps will be sounded by Dick Mound, a U.S. Army Veteran.

This date has been selected to avoid conflicting with other Memorial Services. Last year, more than 150 persons attended in spite of threatening weather, black clouds and thunder. But not a drop of rain was felt during the service. It was most heartwarming to see all those hearty souls turn out in their rain gear to remember the men and women of our nation, who served in the cause of Peace and to demonstrate those services were not forgotten.

This year marks the Fiftieth anniversary of the D-Day Normandy invasion of Northern Europe in World War II. Persons from the world over will attend a special Memorial Service on the site of the invasion. Three merchant vessels that participated in the operations will be making a voyage across the Atlantic Ocean to play a part in

this Memorial Service. It should be an impressive gathering of Military and Merchant Mariners of all the Allied Nations, who joined in the great victory of World War II.

A person cannot consider the wastes of wars without including the horrendous wastes of money and materials. This is not by any means to indicate that riding the world of the likes of Hitler and his evil gang of supporters was not a most essential effort.

World War I at last established the idea of an international effort to eliminate wars and make the world safe for Democracy.

By comparison, World War II was a smashing success. Not only did it see a great international campaign to eliminate an evil tyrant and his henchmen, but saw the establishment of the United Nations, a permanent international organization of nations to ensure the abandonment of the use of force against one another and afford assurances that the peoples of all lands may live in safety and freedom from want and fear.

For the longest time, the United Nations appeared to be a very expensive debating society, but at least it kept nations hostile to one another talking, although not always successfully in avoiding a fight. With the passage of a half century since the end of World War II, it appears the United Nations has at last begun to function as was intended and will prevent a Third World War, although mankind seems destined to spend a goodly portion of its human and material wealth putting down "The Greed for Power" wherever it shows its ugly head.

it," Adkins said. "They reversed their decision even after the mayor said to work with merchants and save parking. It's not right to save it one side and take it on the other."

Mayor Jerry Shaw said the policy was changed because accommodating individual desires had had results. "We did it in the beginning and that block looks horrible," he said. "We bent to every merchant and didn't follow the plans. When we saw it, we said 'no more'. This council has stood firm on that, and I do stand behind it."

Dutton reminded merchants that if the New Mexico State Highway Department had its way, Sudderth Drive would be five lanes wide with no parking.

Despite Adkins' claim that her

customers are discouraged by the construction, several merchants said visitors cross through the clutter with hardly a second glance. Construction supervisor Bob Tackett said people park in the construction zone all the time. Bert Brunell said two 70-year-old women didn't mind wading through the mess to get to his store.

Sally Sandora said, "I was telling one customer what a beautiful sidewalk we're going to have when this is finished, and she said 'Oh, I didn't even notice. I'm from L.A. I'm used to dodging bullets.'"

Bob Smith encouraged merchants to maintain a positive attitude. "We've got a positive project here," he said. "Why not support the project but also send a mandate to the council to get some engineers

down here to supervise this project, instead of telling people to get out of town because they're a disruptive factor."

Smith was referring to a comment made by Councilor Robert Donaldson in a heated exchange with Millar. Donaldson told Millar he should sell his property and move on if he believed the situation was so bad. Dutton also told a merchant that if she didn't believe the streetscape would be beneficial, she should put her property on the market, because someone else would want appreciate the project.

"I'm not encouraging anyone to move out of the community," Dutton said. "I urge every merchant to stay here and enjoy the benefits of this."

Dutton again announced that

MainStreet intends to pursue funding from the village. "We had a very productive meeting and we have a work plan scheduled," he said.

At that meeting Dutton called a closed session to discuss the resignation of MainStreet Director Don Miller. Dutton asked guests to leave, offending the merchants who made an effort to attend the board meeting at his written request. No motion was made to go into executive session and no reason was cited. Dutton said the New Mexico Open Meetings Act, which requires prior notice, a roll call vote and purpose statement, does not apply to MainStreet.

Miller's resignation became effective May 15. In his letter he wrote, "I no longer wish to work in an environment where finding fault

is more important than finding solutions. I have attempted to guide the organization in a true sense of direction in revitalizing the Midtown area. Without the support of the community and its government, this has proven futile. My knowledge and experience has been met with resistance and resentment."

"I will assist the organization with any transition required to provide the direction the Board of Directors desires to take for the MainStreet program."

At the coffee Miller said, "I've enjoyed being here. I feel that MainStreet still has a role in this community and I think with government support and your support and involvement, the program will play a major role in revitalizing and improving downtown. I wish each and every one of you a suc-

cessful year."

Friday was not only Miller's last MainStreet Coffee, but it was the village's last coffee as well. Mayor Shaw told The Ruidoso News that she felt the meetings are not accomplishing anything and that she would rather see Tackett devote his time to the construction work.

"Don Dutton, of course, can continue the meetings, but the village is no longer going to participate," Shaw said. "People are welcome to make individual appointments with Bob [Tackett] or Alan [Briley] to discuss their concerns."

Tackett reported that crews stopped work because of the rain, but as soon as things dry they will complete the section between Fern and Center Streets.

mathematics could benefit from the course, they said.

In another matter, support services director Paul Wirth reviewed

a recent evaluation letter of the district's bilingual program (in its second year of operation) from Lupe M. Castillo, state coordinator of the Title VII Bilingual Education.

Her recommendations for the next school year included that the district:

—establish a staff development program aimed at having instructional assistants participate in a program of studies leading them to a teaching degree.

—provide in-service to the staff on issues of collaboration between teachers and teacher assistants. "They must plan together to provide the best services to the students. In addition to providing assistance to students, they are models for the children."

—identify consultants who can come on-site and provide in-classroom demonstrations techniques for language development.

—have the parent representatives from the Mescalero Apache community participate in the evaluation activities. "This parent

should be present when the external evaluator does classroom observations and presents reports. I spoke with Perla La Paz, the parent representative, and she is willing to participate.

—request the external evaluator to analyze test scores and to provide graphs in the report for kindergarten through third grades.

Wirth noted that Castillo commented favorable on the budget accountability for the program.

"It's a ticklish thing and many districts get and then lose their Title VII grants because of accountability," he said.

"She had five recommendations, but there were plenty of compliments," said board chairman Ronnie Hemphill.

In other business, the school board:

—told business manager Caron Snow and superintendent Mike Gladden that in preparation on future budgets, members would like more early input. They don't want to be shut out of the discussion with an overload of technical jargon.

"I'd be willing to put in another night or two to look at it longer before making a decision," said member James Pexton.

"I agree," Lutterman said. "It's real important for those with questions. We really need more time."

"We're saying we want more involvement and more time to study."

—congratulated the Ruidoso High School cheerleading squad for winning the state championship in 3A and scoring higher than Sandia High School, the leader in 4A.

The girls will represent New Mexico against 200 other teams in the nationals. Because of the expense involved, the team probably will only compete in nationals every other year.

Coach/sponsor Rebecca Durham said the win is the culmination of a three year program to earn the state title. Squad leader Robyn Line said a lot of hard work and dedication went into the three year project, but paid off.

"Out of 25 girls (on the squad), 21 are academic all district and we're expected to keep a better attitude," she said. Line recently received a scholarship covering tuition, board and all expenses to New Mexico Junior College, which has won national champ three years ago in its division.

—received invitations to attend the Second Annual launch of the Starship Enlightenment at White Mountain Elementary, Friday, May

20, with pre-launch activities starting at 9 a.m.

The ship (a former school bus) is now available for year-around use and will be permanently painted as a shuttle, said project originator Sue Rhodes. The vehicle will be available for other schools to use on related science projects.

Cannella said he hopes to be able to outfit the inside of the vehicle with instruments for science tests.

—heard an update on construction of Sierra Vista Primary from Gladden, who said this project has caused fewer problems than any other. "It's been about hassle free," he said. The building received a certificate of occupancy last week.

—received a complaint from parent Mike Randle about cuts in funding for school libraries last year when budgets were frozen, because of a shortfall in projected district enrollment. Students working on research papers could not access newspapers or find needed reference books in some cases, he said.

—heard from Carol Hubbard, academic coach at the high school for the four students participating in knowledge matters, that they placed seventh in the state. All but one of the other winners that

placed ahead were 4A schools with more than 2,000 students.

—heard from Ruidoso Middle School principal Paula Papponi that eighth grade teacher Dean Hood and seventh grade teacher Delton Estes, two CORE (language arts, reading, math and social studies) teachers at her school received the Heritage Preservation Award from Governor Bruce King last week in Santa Fe.

Their approach celebrates the three cultures of New Mexico, involving history, culture and archaeology, she said.

"We especially thank the administration, because you can have a wonderful idea, but you need the support and confidence of the board and superintendent to make it work," she said.

—heard a report from physical education teacher Debbie Sanchez and her volunteer adviser Nancy Shaver (who teaches dance and gymnastics in the community) about the success of the second year of a grant to incorporate the arts in curriculum.

Sanchez said dance was woven into her physical education course, with children in kindergarten through fifth grade. The oldest group also performed their dances for other schools, in Santa Fe and

at an open house in the Mescalero Community Center

Wirth said he is confident that the four school districts in the state funded last year for Excellence in Arts will receive continuation grants.

Lutterman asked whether physical education will be offered in the elementary grades since money is tight and eight instructional assistant positions were eliminated.

"We're hoping to get the dance grant funded and hire back one instructional assistant," Cannella said.

Helene Kobelnik, principal at the intermediate school, said Sanchez has built in some planning time on Friday afternoon to provide physical education activities for the other elementary schools.

Nok Hill Elementary principal Roger Sowder said because the school will be handling difference grades this year, he still is reorganizing.

"We're looking for the right person to handle P.E.," he said. "We have a block of time within our model."

Don Weems, principal of the new Sierra Vista Primary school, said he has no plans for physical education, because of limited staff. If grant money materializes, "we certainly will put it back in."

The six month old female is black with a white chest and paws. True to her breed, she's very intelligent and would be a breeze to train, Tetreault said. "She's very sweet, an outstanding dog and she gets along well with all of the other females."

Oreo is sponsored for the cost of her spaying. Sponsors pay for a pet's spaying or neutering to reduce the cost of adoption and to improve a pet's chances for a new home.

By state law, all animals adopted from shelters must be altered to ensure that no more unwanted litters are produced by them in the future. Ruidoso also has a mandatory spay and neuter law for dogs and cats over six months of age.

The state law and local ordinance are aimed at reducing needless deaths and suffering of innocent animals. The end result also will be a reduction in the cost to the taxpayer, who now foots the bill for negligent owners who fail to neuter their pets and allow them to run loose. Violation of the county or village leash law carries a fine and impoundment fee. Violations of the spay and neuter law can add up to hundreds of dollars in fines.

As always, the shelter desperately needs foster homes to care for unprotected litters while the pups or kittens go through their immunizations. The average stay is six to eight weeks and it's a great way for seasonal visitors to enjoy having little ones around, but not have the long term responsibility for them.

Don't forget, the monthly meeting of the society is noon Wednesday, May 18, at the Texas Club. Volunteers are needed, needed, needed at the thrift shop, which is one of the major sources of support

for the shelter, now being expanded to accommodate more animals. Come spend the summer with us, or stop by and walk the dogs.

To generate more support for the shelter, society members will stage a picnic June 19 at Cedar Creek Group Area. Pets owner are encouraged to bring their friends.

The society also will be asking local organizations and persons interested in helping abandoned animals to donate toward more pans.

In addition to sweatshirts, the society now also has T-shirts and tote bags for sale for \$10. The shirts are ash with either pink or turquoise for the logo, which was designed by artist Debbie Jones.

New Mexico - 1983: drivers under the influence of alcohol caused 360 deaths - 65% of fatal traffic accidents in the state involved alcohol. The legislature passed new, tougher DWI laws that went into effect in 1984. New Mexico - 1993: drivers under the influence of alcohol caused 244 deaths - 58% of fatal traffic accidents involved alcohol. Ten years under the new law improved our record, but not nearly enough. The legislature again has responded with new, much tougher DWI laws.

What was once shrugged off as "boys will be boys" can now be a felony in this state. Fourth time convictions, no matter how old the prior offenses, are now filed in district court as felonies. As a United States Magistrate Judge for seventeen years, I have long recognized that a person with his senses impaired by alcohol driving a one to two ton missile down the highway should be treated as the danger he is.

The legislature lowered the legal blood alcohol concentration ("BAC") from .1 to .08. The level for a person under 21 has been reduced to .02. On the penalty side of the equation, the legislature established mandatory jail sentences for second (72 hours), third (30 days), and fourth or subsequent (6 months) offenses. The basic sentence is enhanced if there are aggravating circumstances: a BAC of .16 or greater, the offender causes bodily injury, or the offender refuses to take a chemical test. If there are aggravating circumstances then the basic sentences are modified: first (48 hours), second (an additional 96 hours), and third (an additional 60 days). These mandatory sentences cannot be suspended, deferred or taken under advisement by the court. Defendants must to the jail time.

And that fourth offense? It is a fourth degree felony carrying a basic sentence of eighteen months, six months of which cannot be suspended or deferred. Upon conviction the defendant becomes a felon and will lose his right to vote and his right to own a firearm. Also, if the person has a prior felony he must be sentenced as a habitual offender, which means a mandatory prison sentence of one year which cannot be suspended, deferred or taken under advisement by the court. Subsequent offenses are also subject to the habitual offender act the court adds four years for two and eight years for three or more prior felony convictions.

In addition to jail time, there are new criminal and civil license revocation provisions. For a first or second offense, the criminal penalty is revocation for one year, for a third, fourth or subsequent offense within a ten year period the revocation time is ten years. The civil or administrative revocation is a year for all but first offenses, and there is no requirement for a criminal conviction.

I believe that the next decade will see fewer and fewer DWI deaths as the new laws are enforced. Why we have tolerated such irresponsible conduct in the past will always be a mystery to me, but what surprises me even more is the many people who do not realize that getting put in a jail for drinking and driving is the good news...it's getting put in a coffin for drinking and driving that's the bad news.

The Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce and Lincoln County Heritage Trust helped underwrite the new "Billy the Kid Country" brochure that will take dead aim at the burgeoning domestic and international Heritage Tourism markets, according to the New Mexico Department of Tourism.

The department staff researched and wrote the four-color promotional piece, while the award-winning Santa Fe graphic design firm of Ingersoll-Bosse, Inc., produced it.

The Billy the Kid Outlaw Gang, Roswell Convention & Visitor Bureau, Eastern New Mexico Tourism Association, Las Cruces C&VC, Old Mesilla Association, and Silver City/Grant Chamber of Commerce also helped underwrite it. The \$20,000 project produced 50,000 copies.

The Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce and the trust were among the first organizations to commit to what began as a suggestion from the late Joe Bowlin of Ruidoso said a recent news release from the Tourism Department.

Once word got around about their commitment, the other bureaus and chambers quickly com-

mitted to it.

By earlier agreement with the sponsoring organizations, the Tourism Department took 10,000 of the brochures to respond to a national publicity campaign it's already launched to make its top domestic travel markets aware of the new brochure.

Earlier, tourists who were interested in Billy the Kid were directed only to Lincoln, where visitation has tripled since 1987. Lincoln can be toured in less than a day. But the state wanted Billy buffs — and they are legion throughout the world — to discover that there are scores of Kid sites in New Mexico and that most of them can be driven to during much longer vacations here.

Billy the Kid Country is a consortium of eight sponsoring tourism organizations whose common denominator is the Kid, said a recent news release. These organi-

zations realize that the legend and lore of these historic sites, when properly advertised and promoted as multi-day Heritage Tourism vacations, and backed up by a high-quality piece like the new brochure, can generate millions of tourism dollars.

Interest in the Kid; the release continued, is greater today than ever before, thanks to at least three films and a dozen new books about him since 1989, it was less than \$100,000. Last year it climbed to more than \$850,000.

Bob Utley, author of the 1989 best-selling book "Billy the Kid: A Short & Violent Life," raved about the new "Billy the Kid Country" brochure.

"I can't remember seeing a travel brochure that did so right by history without sacrificing the basic intent of travel promotion," the Wyoming resident said. "The text is thorough in coverage, well written, and faithful to history. (It's also) handsomely designed. All in all, (it's) a truly first-class production."

Russian art techniques examined at Carrizo

The beginning of August will offer a few artists the usual at the Carrizo Lodge Art School.

Cox has 29 years experience in watercolor, is a member of 10 watercolor societies and signature member of Southwest Watercolor, Oklahoma Watercolor and Louisiana Watercolor societies. She is represented by four art galleries and her works hang in many public and private collections.

Early spring rains spur land to rejoice in bloom

The Drought breaks with heavy rains

Yawl Rabbit edges Ed Grimley

James Lewter's Yawl Rabbit broke on top and just held off a late charge from Ed Grimley to win by a neck in the Grade III \$16,025 Mr. Jet Moore Allowance Stakes, Sunday.

The 4-year-old Bay Yawl colt beat the entire field out of the gate and had a half-length advantage over Super Clyde in the early stages of the 400-yard dash. Yawl Rabbit maintained that lead as he approached the finish line and had just enough left at the wire to win. The time was :19.81.

"The horse broke real good and was in front all the way," said jock-

ey Jerry Rodriguez. "He tried to get out a bit at the end, but I had pretty good control of him." Rodriguez went on to say that the Yawl Rabbit runs best fresh and that the five-month layoff between his last start and today made him a better horse. "They (trainer Tim Cross and Lewter) gave him some time off, then I worked him here three weeks ago and he was real sharp so I thought he'd run big."

The first place check was worth \$7,215 to owner Lewter of Clovis. It was the first graded stakes win for Lewter, whose biggest racing thrill prior to today was Yawl Rabbit's

sixth place finish in the 1992 All American Futurity. Yawl Rabbit has now earned \$108,745 from eight wins in 23 outings. The colt also captured the American Airlines Challenge at Sunland Park in November.

Ed Grimley made his first start since last August and just missed winning for the first time in nearly two years. The John Bassett charge earned \$2,645 as runner-up. The 6-year-old gelding by No Tell Motel is owned by Mitch DeGroot and had Kenneth Hart aboard.

Super Clyde and Ryan Vike finished in a dead heat for the show position.

Owned by Alfred and Hubbard, the 8-year-old Argentine-bred son of Logical took the lead heading into the final turn of the 7 1/2 fur-

long race and never looked back en route to a 4 1/2-length win.

Last year, Leger Cat won the Grade II John Henry Handicap at Hollywood Park and placed behind 1993 Horse of the Year Kotashan in the Grade I Eddie Read Handicap at Del Mar.

"The gelding has career earnings of nearly \$900,000 and may be one

of the richest thoroughbreds ever to set foot on the local oval.

"He handled that race easy and he could've won by as much as he wanted to," said jockey David Lidberg. "Down the backside he was really aggressive and there was nothing I could do to hold him back. He was a real handful, but he felt like a very impressive horse."

Children depend on adults to care for them & keep them safe

Safe kids are no accident, that's why every week should be Safe Kids Week in New Mexico and in the world. Safe Kids Week was "officially" celebrated last week, but it's not too late to offer a few tips from New Mexico Safe Kids Coalition:

—Buckle up! A child safety seat only works when it is used each and every time your child rides in the car. No trip is too short! Your children depend on you for safety and protection — their lives, literally are in their adult protectors hands. Buckle those kids into seats specifically designed for their age and size.

—Children learn by example, so buckle up yourself. It's the law, so set a good example for the youngsters in your life and in your car.

—When walking, teach your child to stay out of the way of cars. Very young children may assume that if they see a car, the car's driver sees them. Teach your child to stop, look both ways and wait for a vehicle to go by or come to a complete stop before crossing a street.

—Bicycle safety depends on knowing and following the rules of the road. Bicyclists should obey the same traffic laws as cars — ride on the right side of the street, stop at stop signs and traffic lights. Bicycle riders should wear a helmet, make sure their bike has reflective tape to make it more visible and wear light colored clothing.

Traffic related injuries are the leading cause of death for children in New Mexico. Whether riding in a car, on a bike, or walking down the street, put safety first.

Light of Day

Betting on Bruce—and Alice

With about five weeks to go before the June 7 primary election, neither one of Governor Bruce King's Democratic challengers has given voters a clear picture of why they are running.


The result is that King, who never takes an election for granted, still may be campaigning from morning until night but should be able to sleep fairly soundly.

Both of the challengers, Lt. Governor Casey Luna and former state land commissioner Jim Baca, are well known public figures and could yet overtake King. But Luna's campaign has been plagued by missteps, and Baca is taking a bid risk by failing to hit voters with advertising early.

It's true that King surely didn't look unbeatable in a mid-April poll of registered Democrats. 31 Mexico's best-known politician, he got just 31 percent support, compared to 21 percent for Luna and 19 percent for Baca. More than one of four voters described themselves as undecided.

King is also running in a year in which incumbents around the nation are bracing for a show of voter impatience. If Bruce King isn't an incumbent, no one is.

There is also a sense of unease among many voters in the state, according to King press secretary Jon McKean. This shows up most clearly in constant questions to the campaigning governor about crime. But voters, the press aide said, also are worried that "the whole social fabric isn't holding up as well as it ought to."

Also on the downside for the governor is the unhappiness expressed by some influential groups of voters. Even some members of the labor movement, have bones to pick with governor. But the state AFL-CIO isn't about to abandon its longtime friend this late in the game.

Against these signs of danger for the King campaign are some very good reasons for confidence.

The state's economy is in relatively good shape. If anyone needed a reminder about this, the slew of public works projects approved by the 1994 Legislature made it clear that the economy is generally healthy.

This array of public works, or capital-outlay, programs approved by lawmakers were often referred to as pork barrel projects. But one person's pork is another person's community sewer system. Government spending becomes less and less unpopular the closer it gets to your neighborhood.

Among the beneficiaries of the generally healthy economy—and of an election year—are teachers and state government employees. Both groups got a six percent raise from the 1994 Legislature. It would be surprising if these groups staged a mass defection from King.

Scandal has brought down any number of incumbent governors over the years, but after three terms as governor King remains relatively clean. The land swap that brought him and his brothers some nice expensive real estate in the Santa Fe area looked for a while as though it might gather momentum. But instead it has all but disappeared as a public issue.

Allegations of sexual harassment against State Treasurer David King, the governor's nephew, are the closest thing to a scandal that opponents of the governor have so far. That's not close enough to do serious damage.

King is sometimes portrayed as an old and tired governor who didn't take as active a part in the 1994 Legislature as many people would have liked. But unless he falls asleep at one of the upcoming TV debates, this kind of issue is likely to remain primarily a concern of insiders.

Then there's Alice King, the First Lady. It's no wonder that one of King's campaign ads features her, with the governor to one side. There are some voters out there who might dump Bruce. But Alice? Now that's another matter.



THE NEW EXPLORERS in New Mexico
"On the Trail of a Killer Virus"

Bill Kurtis hosts the search for a deadly virus when The New Explorers accompanies doctors and scientists "On the Trail of a Killer Virus."

May 14, 1993: Doctors in Gallup, New Mexico, receive an alarming call, a report of several sudden and unexplained deaths in the Four Corners region. What at first resembles a simple flu soon turns fatal. The "Navajo disease," so designated because it has affected the Navajo nation primarily, quickly becomes the focus of world attention.

Doctors from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), the New Mexico State Department of Health, the University of New Mexico, and the Indian Health Services collaborate to find the cause of the deadly outbreak. These physicians and scientists are the "new explorers," rushing to solve the mystery with high-tech equipment and the advice of Navajo medicine men.

The New Explorers' Bill Kurtis joins the science team in Albuquerque to examine the x-rays of five healthy young patients who died suddenly after their lungs filled with fluid.

May 27, 1993: There are 16 cases of the mysterious disease; the CDC is called in to help. Within its enormous complex in Atlanta, many of the world's top virologists and molecular biologists experiment with viruses and bacteria to identify a disease, discover its cause, and find a cure. The CDC usually sends one epidemiologist to consult on an emerging virus case. To New Mexico, they send 10.

The CDC and New Mexico health authorities diagnose the disease as a reemerging form of hantavirus, a virus that has plagued humans for centuries. This new strain attacks the lungs, filling them with fluid and "drowning" the victim.

June 3, 1993: Hantavirus has attacked 19 new victims and killed 12. Three hundred medicine men meet for five hours to perform healing ceremonies. Meanwhile, the science team tracks down the source of infection — tiny deer mice.

Kurtis visits a researcher in the New Mexico mountains who has studied the habits of these mice for 15 years and learns that the range of the deer mouse now extends from Canada to parts of Mexico. The deadly hantavirus is not limited to the reservation.

With the diagnosis, older cases are pinpointed and new ones identified throughout the United States. Over 30 victims died in the past year — only half of them Navajo. The team efforts of these "new explorers" is a model of diagnostic detective work — it has taken only 19 days from the time the New Mexico investigation began to identify the illness.
