Volunteers are needed at the Lincoln County Humane Society Thriftshop, which has been revamped and is under new management.



Casey Luna buses to Ruidoso

Lieutenant Governor Casey Luna, a gubernatorial candidate, brought his "On the Road New Mexico Bus Tour" to Ruidoso Wednesday to meet the public and ask for Democratic support in the June primary.

"Of vital importance to anyone running for the office of Governor is nuclear waste storage on Mescalero tribal land," said Luna. "I want people in this area to know that although Wendell Chino and the Mescalero Tribe have endorsed my candidacy, it has put us in an important position to communicate with him."

"Because Wendell Chino feels he's been alienated by the governor of this state, I have a relationship with him that will enable me to sit and discuss with him about other means of providing economic development opportunities for his people. And I would work extremely hard to dissuade him from building a nuclear waste storage facility."

"Wendell Chino has a lot of respect for his neighbors. In many ways, I think he has been pushed into a corner."

"I can't speak for Wendell Chino, but I would be in the position to speak to him, where Bruce King would not be."

Luna said he would sign compacts with the Indians regarding gambling, and supports gambling in general statewide.

"We have gaming now throughout the state. We need to make it legal and remove the gray cloud we're under and eliminate confrontation," Luna said.

"Clubs throughout the state are loaded with all forms of gaming machines, and the problem is with all the questions of legality. We need to remove that stigma. We need to make it legal once and for all."

Luna's press agent said the bus will log over 2000 miles, and Luna will shake hands with tens of thousands of New Mexicans.

REC viewed as big bargain

Questions about the value of the new Lincoln County Rural Events Center may be put to rest with a building evaluation report from architect Wayne C. Andrews of Albuquerque.

In a report dated May 9, he stated that the former Super Select Horse Sales Barn and 11.6 acres of property is worth about \$711,000.

"The purchase of the Ruidoso Super Sales Barn by the county of Lincoln is an extremely good buy," he wrote. "The facility is basically sound in all aspects. The one big ticket item at this point would be to remodel the existing public restroom to meet handicapped access requirements. Future cosmetic change, such as painting, can be accomplished relatively inexpensively."

"The potential to serve the community in a wide-range is very positive. As the community debates the possible uses, and the facility has had several functions, the county could explore the enclosing of the west canopied area to add additional heated/cooling space. This also would be relatively inexpensive."

"As stated earlier, the purchase of an 18,600 square foot building on 11.626 acres for \$250,000 is unquestionably a good buy. To build a facility of that magnitude at today's material and labor cost would cost the county about \$700,000."

The New Mexico State Legislature appropriated \$250,000 for the county to purchase the center and another \$40,000 toward renovation and operation the first year.

But critics have said the Super Select Horse Sales Barn in Glencoe

wasn't a bargain. They point out that the owners apparently had been unable to sell it on the private market for more than one year and contend that the structure and systems such as electrical and plumbing will need major overhauls.

They also question whether the facility can become self-supporting.

In his \$633 report submitted to commissioners, Andrews stated that the 11.6 acres of property is worth \$45,000, the metal building is worth \$504,000 and the office portion, another \$108,000, with canopy structures, about \$54,000.

In his examination of the structure, Andrews stated, "There does not appear to be any structural problems upon a visual inspection of the building. There are no indications of foundation settlement. The

Grease heads to Otero

A contract to dump restaurant grease on about 15 acres of the Otero-Lincoln County Regional Landfill was approved Monday by members of the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority.

Last month, the authority had rejected the proposal passed along by their counterparts in Otero County.

Members objected to allowing a private company an exclusive right to use the land. They also wanted some assurances that the authority would not be liable for any environmental consequences and that the

company would pledge enough money to restore land used for disposal.

Alamogordo city manager Bob Stockwell told authority members Monday that after hearing the group's objections, he investigated what type of activities occur on a grease dump and talked to state environment officials.

(The city is responsible for the operation of the regional landfill and is a member of the Otero authority).

"What we came up with is that the risk is minimal, only 15 acres

EPA cleanup called too costly

Hundreds of thousands of dollars may have been wasted and a \$1-million mill destroyed as part of a Superfund clean up at Cimarron Mill near Carrizozo.

Speaking to the Southwest American Association of Petroleum Geologists last week in Ruidoso, Lynn Brandvold, senior chemist with the New Mexico Bureau of Mines & Mineral Resources, questioned whether the mill site needed to be cleaned up at all.

She pointed out that some of the procedures used by the federal Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) were, at the very least, questionable.

"At this point in time, a small mill with equipment estimated to be worth a million dollars has been destroyed, the EPA has spent at least \$968,171, the site has not been declared cleaned up and will have to be monitored for 10 years following cleanup," she told those at the three-day session meeting in the Ruidoso Convention and Civic Events Center. "All this for a site where it is questionable if it should have ever been declared a Superfund site in the first place."

Background

Located at the intersection of U.S. Highways 54 and 380 in Carrizozo, the mill was built in the late 1960s and originally was operated to concentrate iron ore, Brandvold said. It changed ownership six times between 1977 and 1979 and was finally purchased and operated by Southwest Minerals Company under the name of Cimarron Mining Company (CMC).

"The company became convinced that the iron ore the mill had previously been processing contained large amounts of gold," she said. "In order to recover this gold, the iron ore concentration process was changed to a cyanide process. The cyanide process was evidently not recovering sufficient gold, so it was modified further to use a combination of a cyanide salt and a metal stripper of the type used to recover gold from electronic parts."

"In 1980, the New Mexico Environmental Improvement Division (EID), now called the New Mexico Environment Department, (ED) received a report of improper use and dumping of cyanide at the site," she said.

After company officials received

a certified notice of violations in 1982, (discharging into a non-permitted pit), company officials filed for bankruptcy in 1983, stopping any actions by the state on the violations.

The mill was listed as a Superfund site by the federal Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) five years later.

A feasibility study to determine the method of clean up was completed by EPA contractors in June 1990, a method was chosen in September of that year.

Cleanup was scheduled to begin in the spring of 1991 and to be completed in 1992.

"However, cleanup did not begin until late fall of 1991, and is not yet complete to EPA standards and probably never will be," Brandvold said.

The EPA hired Ecology and Environment Inc. of Dallas to conduct an expanded site inspection, which included surface and subsurface sampling, installation of monitoring wells and sampling ground water in the wells, municipal drinking water supplies and irrigation wells near the site.

Special events money reviewed

Tax money allocated for special events will be viewed differently for fiscal 1994-95, according to village clerk Tammie Maddox.

Maddox sits in for guidance on the Ruidoso Lodgers Tax Committee that advises the village council to approve or disapprove lodgers tax money for special events.

According to Maddox, promoters of special events will no longer be given money for their special event advertising needs without a contract to avoid the anti-donation clause. She said the contract would probably be through the Ruidoso

Valley Chamber of Commerce or the village itself.

Maddox was referring to an attorney general's opinion on the appropriate use of lodgers' tax proceeds.

Assistant attorney general Elizabeth Glenn responded to the Department of Finance and Administration regarding a grant without a contract for services and a grant to a local organization for costumes, equipment and advertising.

"We believe that grants of public money for either of these purposes are not a permissible use of lodgers' tax proceeds because they are clearly prohibited by the anti-donation clause of Article IX, Section 14 of the New Mexico Constitution," she

stated.

Glenn cited the pertinent part that read, "Neither the state, nor any county, school district, or municipality ... shall directly or indirectly ... make any donation to or in aid of any person, association or public or private corporation ..."

Glenn wrote that the constitution prohibits the named governmental units from providing any gift, allocation or appropriation of something of value to a private person or organization without consideration.

Grants without consideration amount to subsidizing the business operation of private entities, she said.

would be involved well within the fenced area and the only access would be through the front gate, which would allow us to monitor activities," Stockwell said. "The maximum liability they can purchase is \$100,000 and we feel that is adequate if they abandon the site."

More than 70 percent of the material being hauled to the site is water, he said. "The grease is suspended in it and the material would be applied to the top of the soil."

When the moisture evaporates, the remaining material would be disked into the soil to allow the natural biological process to break it down.

"An area once processed sits idle for three years and then they come back in as part of a rotation cycle," Stockwell said.

He urged approval of the contract, saying, "It's a matter of great importance to Otero. Your (restaurant owners) apparently have reasonable alternatives, ours do not and Doña Ana County may not continue their (grease) operation."

A site the company, C&C Sanitation, tried to permit in Tularosa is near a residential area and was blocked by objecting towns people, he said, adding, "Ours has no neighbors. It creates no problems down there."

The regional landfill is situated south of Alamogordo on the way to El Paso near Orogrande on a section of former state public trust land.

"We're not getting into the busi-

ness, but we're allowing someone to dispose of the grease at a reasonable price and reasonable distance," Stockwell said. "If the price goes too high (for disposal, forcing haulers to drive great distances and pay high fees), it will end up in manholes, arroyos and our sewer system."

"There's a level of trust here. We're going to do a good job monitoring the landfill and this property."

"I hope you will reconsider your vote and authorize us to enter a five year lease. We simply don't have to renew if you don't like it and there is a provision for termination for cause."

Gary Jackson, an authority member and Ruidoso village manager, questioned whether the indemnification clause could be beefed up to more of a hold harmless clause.

"It wouldn't be a problem," Stockwell said.

"It would make me feel more comfortable with both indemnification and hold harmless," said authority attorney J. Robert Beauvais. "A third party would have to jump through additional hoops to get to us, and restoration money. There's always the potential for liability."

"I don't think it's a problem at all," Stockwell reiterated, adding that the surety bond for remediation is \$10,000 and the company has purchased \$100,000 coverage for liability.

"If somebody puts something nasty in there, rolled up in a carpet or hidden in something else, \$100,000 won't begin to cover it,"

Beauvais said.

"They're not going to be able to monitor whether hazardous waste is brought in," chairman Wilton Howell agreed.

"The rule we live by (at the landfill) is that we will make a reasonable effort to monitor, but we may never see that 55 gallons of really bad stuff in the middle of a compacted load from Lincoln County and we'd never know," Stockwell said.

"We get everything from horses to sofas in our dumpsters," Beauvais agreed.

"The Environment Department is comfortable with the operation," Stockwell said.

Jackson also questioned whether the land could be subleased.

"The intent was for prior approval of a sublease (or for assigning the lease)," Stockwell said. "We don't intend to allow them to sublease, that would end the lease, yet they can work out a reasonable business arrangement for others to dump grease too."

"We didn't want to support a monopoly," Beauvais said. He noted that the authority would receive 10 percent of any revenues generated by allowing others to dump.

"All of the state permits need to be in place before we allow them to start hauling grease," he said.

Howell said he heard 15 acres of private land is for sale in the same vicinity and indicated her preferred the operation not involve public land.

The motion to accept the \$350 a year (subject to annual increases based on the Consumer Price Index) contract with the changes, of-

fered by member Bill Schwettmann, a county commissioner, passed 5-2 with Howell and member Jerry Wright voting nay.

In other business, the authority:

—urged Stockwell to complete a commitment to the State Public Lands Department to find minerals rights that can be given to the state to offset the rights conveyed with the landfill property.

—approved the third year on a three year contract for legal services by Beauvais with some clarifications on billing.

—agreed to request proposals for auditing services.

—agreed that the authority at this time should not take over residential billing from the villages it serves. The villages send the bills with their water accounts for an administration fee charged to the authority. They have the leverage of being able to cut off water if payments are not submitted. The county can only file liens against a person's property.

General manager Joe Lewandowski said the authority is billing 4,000 county residential and commercial accounts and is nearly at the maximum load it can handle.

"This would almost triple our bills if we took it on," he said.

Ruidoso mayor Jerry Shaw, a member of the authority, noted that when her village first agreed to handle the billing for its residents, it was to be a temporary situation.

"If you can't do it now, when?" she asked.

Ruidoso and the four other vil-

lages in Lincoln County, plus the county commission are members of the authority, a coalition formed to handle solid waste collection and disposal.

"I don't want it, because it would be very costly for us," Lewandowski said.

Howell asked Shaw and Jackson to bring back an estimate of the village's cost of handling the bills for the authority.

—unanimously approved imposing a 5-10 percent late fee on commercial accounts.

—heard from Lewandowski that one of the reasons the revenue at the Capitan debris landfill are lower than several years ago is that the village of Ruidoso no longer pays to dump there.

"They paid as much as \$1,700 a month and now there is no charge as a partner," he said.

He suggested charging a rate based on the size of the vehicle instead of trying to estimate the size of the load.

"It takes the pressure off the gate attendant," he said.

Jackson said he always thought rates were based on the cost of operation.

Lewandowski said the landfill may break even generating \$40,000 a year, but that amount doesn't provide money to dig another hole in the future or to make other improvements.

"This is the first step to get revenues up to what's going on out there," he said. "No rate increase is being requested now."

—agreed that instead of trying to repair an old bulldozer that burned to go out for bids on a new

unit for the Capitan landfill.

—decided to lease the Texas-New Mexico Power Company building on Second Street in Ruidoso Downs for one more year on an option to buy basis. Of the \$700 a month rent, \$200 would go toward the purchase price.

Lewandowski said that the power company will only agree to one more year on that basis. The authority must either buy the building or give it up at the end of the next year.

—approved requesting bids for a roll-off unit to accommodate commercial accounts, contractors and others with large loads.

Lewandowski said he also would like a residential pickup truck, if only one can be pursued, he would prefer the roll-off, because it would generate revenue for the authority.

Shaw said she doesn't want to see the level of service drop, especially during the summer when the town is crowded with seasonal residents and tourists.

But Lewandowski said the authority has been operating without the truck for the past month and no one has noticed. He will take a bid at the budget again, mid-year to determine whether he can afford to purchase the residential truck.

—approved a preliminary annual budget of \$1.5-million.

—gave Lewandowski permission to survey restaurant owners to determine whether they would be interested in an extra pickup on Sunday morning. The services would generate more income for the authority.

Their report, when it finally became public, frightened many of the townspeople.

The study concluded that both the surface and subsurface soils were contaminated with cyanide, arsenic, chromium, mercury and cobalt. Process bathing tanks contained hazardous materials from cyanide and metal stripping agents disposed into an unlined, non-permitted discharge pit.

Solid wastes were placed directly on the ground at the tailings waste pile area. The combination of those activities contaminated ground-water. Tailing waste piles were the sources of subsurface contamination.

However, at the first public meeting in Carrizozo on the cleanup, a former manager of the mill stated that at no time was a 50/50 solution of cyanide salt and metal stripper used as had been stated in a fact sheet handed out at the meeting, Brandvold said.

"The EPA later corrected their statement to reflect these dilute solution concentrations," she said.

At the same meeting, staff from the mining bureau pointed out that 'free' cyanide breaks down in a very short time (months to several years) to non-hazardous substances.

"Because operations at the site ceased in 1982, sufficient time had passed for all the 'free' cyanide exposed to air to break down," Brandvold said.

After another EPA contractor, Camp Dresser & McKee Inc., finished its Remedial Investigation (RI) and Feasibility Study (FS), another open house was conducted in Carrizozo in March 1989.

At that meeting, bureau staff attempted to convince EPA and their contractor that on the basis of the study by Ecology and Environment Inc., the geology of the site, and cyanide chemistry, the cyanide contamination would be confined to the shallow ground water," she said. "Therefore, it would not be necessary to drill more monitoring wells. However, more monitoring wells were drilled on and off site, bringing the total to 17 wells."

Contamination was reported only in wells on the milling site and only in shallow ground water.

"The final conclusion was that one shallow well at the site had been contaminated with cyanide," she said. "The amount of ground water impacted was thought to be about three million gallons."

"EPA estimated that at that time, approximately \$631,000 had been spent at the site," Brandvold said.

In July 1990, another public meeting was conducted to review possible corrective actions. The EPA favored pumping the wells and discharging the ground water into the city's sewage system. All other hazardous substances would be removed and equipment would be cleaned to remove hazardous material.

The work was expected to cost about \$95,000 and to begin in early 1991.

The city twice tangled with the EPA during the process. Although EPA officials contended Superfund projects supersede state law, Mayor Cecelia Kuhnel, backed by the State Engineer's Office, insisted the EPA obtain state permits and the Bureau of Reclamation filed the necessary permits.

But before the pumping began, the mayor wanted more assurances that the town wouldn't be held legally responsible, if someone's plumbing backed up during the process and cyanide laden water flooded their home.

"EPA had done such a good job of convincing the townspeople of the dangers at the site that the mayor and board of trustees were alarmed that the EPA would put that 'hazardous' material into their sewer system," Brandvold said.

Staff from the ED and the mining bureau tried to reassure town officials that any cyanide in the water would be destroyed by aeration and bacterial action in the sewage treatment plant, she said.

But the officials were afraid that by allowing the water into their system, some future liability might occur.

At first, EPA officials balked and threatened the use of an administrative order to proceed, while assessing financial penalties of \$25,000 a day.

"The (town) officials stood their ground and eventually the EPA agreed to most of their terms, including testing at the site and only pumping into the sewage system if the cyanide concentration was at an acceptable level, as well as paying the town \$1,500 a month for use of the treatment plant."

"Without the third-party indemnity requested by the town, pumping began in the fall of 1992 and continued until the summer of 1993 when the wells went dry."

"When the pump was pulled from the wells, it was discovered that the pumps were all badly corroded and then it wasn't known for sure whether the wells were dry or

not," Brandvold said.

Brandvold's view

"There were some major problems with the SIF (Site Inspection Follow-Up) report which were never addressed by the EPA or EID," Brandvold said. "If they had been, I doubt that the site could have ever qualified for listing as a Superfund site."

"This site is on alluvial fans fed in part by debris from local mining districts. Elevated levels of heavy metals are not unusual in this type of situation. The values of heavy metals as listed in this report in surface and subsurface soils are in the range of what would normally be expected."

"Furthermore, the ore, high grade magnetite, was brought to the site for the very reason that it contained elevated levels of heavy metals. The 100, 55-gallon drums of material stockpiled along the west fence contained magnetite concentrate."

She contended the testing procedure used on water samples by the EPA on monitoring wells was flawed so as to reflect heavy metals in any sediment brought up with the water or sediment that might have been carried into the well from the surface by the drill bit and then brought up with the water.

"Thus, the results are not an accurate measure of heavy metals in the ground water," she concluded.

In the same vein, cyanide determinations were for 'total' cyanide, not for 'free' cyanide, the form which is considered hazardous, she said.

"Iron cyanide complexes, the form of cyanide most likely to be present at this site, are very stable

and nonhazardous," Brandvold said. "The EPA's definition of hazardous substances is based on total amounts present, and does not take into consideration solubility, biological availability or chemical form."

Brandvold said the federal government tied the hands of local officials and private companies that would have helped the situation and saved money.

Her agency in 1988 contacted two manufacturers of 26 cardboard drums of metal stripped compounds, many of which were stored outside where they were exposed to wind and rain. The manufacturers said they would accept the material for reuse, Brandvold said.

"This information was passed on to the EPA site manager. In 1992, the EPA had them taken to an approved disposal facility," she said.

"The representative of the court handling the OMC bankruptcy was approached by individuals who wished to purchase equipment and materials from the site."

"These individuals were referred to EPA, because nothing could be removed from the site without their permission (everything on the Superfund site is considered to be hazardous material)."

"The New Mexico State Highway Department was building a new highway west of Carrizozo and was interested in buying the unprocessed ore from the site for highway fill. EPA refused to consider this offer until after the RI and FS had been completed, which was estimated to be late 1990."

Another individual wrote about buying the property, cleaning it up and operating a cyanide mill at the site, she said. "He was told that if

he purchased the property, he would become a 'Potentially Responsible Party,'...and would be responsible for some or all the costs associated with clean up of the site, which would have to be done under EPA's oversight."

Brandvold said a third person asked about buying the equipment and moving it to another site.

"He was told that any equipment which had cyanide residuals on it (ball mill, vats, piping, tanks) would have to be decontaminated before leaving the site," she said. "A decontamination plan would have to be submitted to EPA for approval and would have to include: dismantling the equipment, hauling equipment by crane to a cleaning area, steam cleaning equipment, testing to determine disposal options for rinse solutions, and chemicals to be used in steam cleaning. The cleaning would have to be done under the supervision of EPA supervision and EPA personnel would have to be compensated for their time plus travel and per diem."

"All this for equipment which would then be used in a similar cyanide process at a different site."

At that same time, the EPA was demanding such an excessive standard for others, Brandvold said, "the cyanide sales were contained in cardboard drums sitting outside exposed to the elements. There were potentially the most hazardous materials at the site, yet no effort was made to remove them or even move them inside."

"Finally, the drums were removed without EPA participation by a local townspeople at a cost of \$100 a barrel, and donated to a cyanide mining operation in the state."

Tribe to honor veterans

Veterans will be remembered during a special celebration beginning with an ecumenical worship service at 11 a.m. Saturday, May 28, at St. Joseph Apache Mission in Mescalero.

The public and all veterans are invited to attend and remain for the festivities following the service, according to a press release.

The Most Reverend Ricardo Ramirez, OSB, Bishop for the Catholic Diocese of Las Cruces, will be the principal celebrant and key speaker. He will be joined by ministers from the Reformed, Baptist and Assembly of God churches of the area.

The service will include a "Massing of Flags" outside the church so veterans organizations are asked to bring their standards.

Following the service there will be a fiesta celebration, with drumming and Indian dancing, barbecue dinners, arts and crafts, games and other events. These events will continue through Sunday for those who would like to stay longer or bring their families to see.

St. Joseph Apache Mission and church is located on the Mescalero Apache Reservation and can be seen from U.S. Highway 70. The site is about 20 miles east of Tularosa.

According to the release, the church itself is the realized dream of Father Albert Braun, OFM (LTC, USAR Ret), "the hero priest of Corregidor," who built it and 55 years ago dedicated it to the Veterans of World War I.

Following his return from a Jap-

anese POW Camp in 1946, he rededicated it also to the veterans of World War II.

Father Braun was pastor of St. Joseph's until 1915, until health complications following his imprisonment forced him to leave shortly after World War II.

The church is an impressive gothic structure of native stone with a timber ceiling that rises 70 feet above the floor. It took 20 years to complete and is set against an alpine backdrop. It has served as a place of pilgrimage for veterans of all denominations for many years.

"The Apache people are proud of their church and their country," continues the release. "As most Americans know, the Apaches are a military people and veterans in their community are treated with the highest honors. There is even a ceremonial dance, the gourd dance, which is only performed by veterans."

Apaches from Mescalero have served with honor in the U.S. armed forces since the days when the Apache Scouts served with the renowned Buffalo Soldiers here in New Mexico.

"The people of Mescalero and the Diocese of Las Cruces ask that you join with them in honoring the heroism and dedication of the veterans who gave so much that we may stay free," reads the release.

Color bursts from thirsty trees and flowers

The magic of rain brings a mountain wonderland.

This is being sent to you just after high noon on May fourteen, and you can see on every hand how the mountain world has responded to the heavy early rains, the best in many a day to fall in the month of May.


The gray clouds to the west over Storm mountain seems to be saying: "You ain't seen nothing yet." Reminding us that the traditional rainy season does not begin with July, so that we have a running start into one of the greenest and most flowery summers to glorify our mountain land in a long time.

Here in the vale, the white clouds, marching through the blue sky on the east wind, cast the world below into a sunshine-and-shadow pageant of every shade of green.

The mountain meadows have turned from pale green to emerald all in a day.

The large apricot tree, before the rains, was out in half leaf and now the leaves are full size, fluttering and flashing in the sunny breeze.

The small apricot tree with its branches encircling one corner of the sun room with "leafy



arms", had normal sized leaves before the rains; and now is out in heart-shaped leaves of giant size.

The river trees

Before the rains, you could see daylight between the leaves when you looked at the oak, box elder and cottonwood trees along the winding river. Now the oaks and box elder and wild cherry have burst forth.

New leaves so that they present trees with solid masses of leaves each in their own color — new green, summer green, and green touched with amber — all forming a vast winding tunnel for the river.

The oak brush

All along the hillsides looking down upon the river, the oak brush had leafed out earlier; now it has put on a good surge of growth, in the spaces between the evergreens, with its yellow green, light crimson, and pink, harmonizing with the darker velvet shades of the piñon, cedar, juniper and pine.

The oak brush is the pride and joy of the deer and other browsing creatures, and is also one of the brush family that is food for cows and sheep.

A new world

The thirsty ground drank deeply of the watery benediction from the sky, so that there was not as much flooding as you might expect.

Tiny wet weather springs are flooding over rocky banks and small cliffs, trickling into beds of moss and flowers. New Mexico pinks and Indian paint brushes appearing in solid beds of pink and orange-red.

Happiness is in the pure, fragrant, life-giving air; and along with the creatures of the land and the birds of the air, we all rejoice and give thanks to God.

Ceballos at Downs


Jockey Oscar Ceballos, resident of Capitan, New Mexico, returns to Ruidoso Downs this summer after a record-breaking season at Sunland Park.

Plants hurt by dry winter

Meager rain and snow over the winter after a hot, dry summer will translate to a low stream flow in the Rio Hondo this spring and significant damage to evergreen trees and shrubs in southern New Mexico.

Based on selected stations along the river, stream flow on the Rio Hondo is forecast at 68 percent of average. Although precipitation in March was 172 percent of average, the overall rate for water year-to-date is only 95 percent of average.

Combine that shortfall with the fact that the snow pack by April 1 was 51 percent of average, and it seems certain that surface water supplies in the basin will be significantly below average this spring.

Natalie Goldberg, a plant

pathologist with New Mexico State University's Cooperative Extension Service, said sickly Afghan pines, cypress and junipers could be suffering from either of two environmental stress related ailments.

"We normally don't get enough natural precipitation in southern New Mexico to maintain plant growth, so we need to supplement plants with irrigation water to avoid winter drought stress," Goldberg said.

Trees stricken with winter drought stress begin to die from the inside out, and needles turn yellow before dropping from the plant.



But an environmental stress that goes on for several years can be just as deadly, Goldberg said. Heavy irrigation or moisture following cool winters and hot, dry sum-

mers can harm a tree.

"When this happens, the roots will rot and the remaining healthy roots can't support the tree's growth," she said. "Trees beginning to show signs of stress die from the top down and you'll see this happening in many landscape plants."

Not much hope exists for a heavily damaged tree, Goldberg advises homeowners to remove a severely affected plant from the landscape and start over.

"But plants that were damaged simply from winter drought and those that did not accumulate long term environmental stress may put out a flush of new growth coming into spring," she said. Additional water and fertilizer could encourage this new growth, helping the plant eventually recover.

Forty-two parking spaces are required based on the current use and proposed use of the addition for the ski shop, video store, the existing convenience store, lounge, and gas pumps.

A zone map amendment request by Leah Jones for her lots fronting Mechem Drive died for lack of a motion.

The property is zoned C-2 Community Business and has a frontage on Mechem Drive and Upper Terrace Drive. Jones wants the property rezoned to R-1, residential.

Jones has a residence that now exists on one portion of her lots and another residence for her daughter. The residence on Lot 14A was approved for Conditional Use on

April, 1993.

The Master Plan designates property between Mechem Drive and Upper Terrace Drive as C-2. The development patterns are mixed with commercial and residential, however, the predominate use of the lots are commercial.

The planning staff recommended not to rezone.

structure appears to be sound."

Under architectural notes, Andrews stated that the biggest problem would be to remodel existing restrooms to meet standards required by the Americans with Disabilities (ADA) Act.

He suggested the county could complete some cosmetic changes such as painting.

"Portions of the building could be partitioned off to create 'classrooms' or 'mini-conference rooms,'" he wrote.

"A suspended ceiling in all, or part of the vast space, would articulate a different atmosphere or environment.

"A Building Code analysis indicates that it may be necessary to add additional exiting to comply with assembly usage."

He noted that a new roof was put on last year, according to information he has received, and that the building already is accessible to the handicapped.

In his review of the mechanical systems, Andrews said they appear to be adequate, but he recommended an inspection by a qualified mechanical engineer.

He also noted that:

- a regular maintenance program should be adopted
- additional investigations may be required once the multi-use

characteristics have been identified -multi-use functions may require the modification of the existing heating and cooling system.

-no upgrade in the existing electrical system should be necessary if activities do not impact it dramatically.

-the site does not appear to present problems. The drainage is away from the building on all sides.

Andrews listed several possible uses for the building and grounds including 4-H activities, local high school graduations, high school proms, concerts, weddings and vocational classroom activities such as welding, automotive repair or building trade activities by partitioning space.

Meanwhile, county commissioners are looking for someone to manage the center. They have scheduled interviews for 10 a.m. Friday.

Ten applicants submitted their resumes for consideration for the job that initially will pay about \$7 an hour, but will be upgraded next fiscal year to an annual salary of about \$25,000.

TNP to reduce customers rates

The Public Utility Commission approved an agreement today between the Commission Staff and Texas-New Mexico Power (TNP), which reduces electric rates to regular customers by almost 13 percent.

The Commission's decision reduces overall revenues by almost \$7.8 million, out of revenues of \$60 million for the utility, with the typical residential customer bill dropping from \$47.98 to \$44.85 for 600 kilowatt hours (KWH).

The average general service customer, which has a higher level of consumption, should experience a drop in a typical bill from \$308.03

to \$281.42.

The power company serves about 39,785 customers in southwestern New Mexico, of which 34,688 are residential customers.

This is a good example of what can be accomplished for the benefit of ratepayers when the parties work together, according to a recent news release from the commission. Through this type of cooperation, the commission has lowered rates for many customers of Texas-New Mexico Power Company, which provides electric power to the Silver City area, Ruidoso and Alamogordo.

Much of the cost reduction is due

to savings the company has experienced in the cost of power TNP purchases from other generating utilities.

Power company personnel said at the open commission meeting that they did not anticipate filing another rate case in the next four years.

Several parties negotiated the agreement with the utility after it filed its rate case in August 1993. Also signing the stipulation were the State Attorney General's office, Phelps Dodge Corporation and Cyprus Pinos Altos Corporation, which operate several mines in TNP's service territory.

RC&D given nod on juniper study

A study on marketing the juniper will be financed in part with a \$18,000 allocation from the Rural Community Assistance program.

The award was announced by Lee Poague, Lincoln National Forest supervisor, who said the money would be used by the South Central Mountain Resource Conservation and Development (RC&D) organization.

It was one of four awards from the allocation. One of the other three, for \$4,000, went to the Carrizozo Action Plan Development group for an economic recovery plan.

"We have been granted \$46,000," Poague said. "This is a commendable achievement considering 83 project proposals requesting over \$1-million were submitted to the U.S. Forest Service by communities, counties and Indian Tribes."

The local money will focus on opportunities to increase existing markets for traditional uses of juniper, such as fuelwood, and the potential for development of new products from juniper. Possibilities include wood fiber, composite lumber and sheet good materials and oil extraction.

According to Hollis Fuchs of the Carrizozo Soil and Water Conservation office, the study could possible help in efforts to restore the brush/grass balance in range ecosystems.

"Perhaps additional economic uses will be found for our junipers, which will enable us to accelerate our efforts at brush management," he said. "As many are aware, brush management is sometimes prohibitively expensive. But juniper invasion cannot be ignored if we are to retain our soil, the most basic resource, and maintain the productivity of our ecosystems."

Members of the Apache Trails promotion Council are leery of the new Regional Tourism Marketing Board. Joan Bailey and Lisa Storey of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce attended the orientation meeting for Southeastern Region 3.

strong reservations about Department of Tourism's new approach. The highlight for this region focuses on Carlsbad Caverns, then touches on smaller attractions like the Ruidoso Downs Race Track. Rural areas in the region are sorely neglected, Storey and Bailey said.

Storey said Apache Trails has been working from a regional concept since 1990, yet the group was

recently overlooked by Regional Economic Development Through Tourism (REDTT) when that group published a list of promotion agencies. REDTT also skipped out-of-the-way areas in a recent tour they organized, according to Kathleen Hellman, Trails president.

"Apache Trails has got to stay strong and cohesive and find a way to operate independently," Storey

said. "If we're swallowed into this regional board, the little towns like Corona and Carrizozo are going to be forgotten."

The Apache Trails Council is concerned that state matching-funds grants will be funneled exclusively through the new regional tourism boards. That could leave small groups like Apache Trails out in the cold and small towns off the map.

"We have to think of the tiny communities like Mayhill, Corona, White Oaks, Timberon," Hellman said.

Apache Trails members are currently involved in assembling an asset inventory for the state, and they are trying to update and improve a Lincoln County area attractions map.

The group also intends to solicit

support with a membership drive (\$60 annual dues). They especially hope to gain the monetary support of the Mescalero Apache Indian Reservation. The Apache Trails Council was the brainchild of Chief Wendell Chino, but the tribe has never allotted funds to support the group.

Senator rallies state rangeland users

Hundreds of people from across the country will be converging on Glorieta, New Mexico on June 1 to hear U.S. Sen. Malcolm Wallop talk about what ordinary people can do to defend themselves against Interior Secretary Bruce Babbitt's so-called rangeland reform and other assaults on public lands users and producers of the nation's basic resources.

The Wyoming senator will bring his special message to the People for the West conference, where members from as far away as Wisconsin and Missouri will be gathering to lay plans for a grassroots campaign to counter environmental attacks on ranching, mining, logging, and recreation on federal public lands.

Wallop, along with Sen. Pete Domenici of New Mexico, led the Senate filibuster last November that forced Babbitt to withdraw his original federal grazing plan.

The rangeland debate is considered a crucial battle in the fight to keep public lands open to miners, loggers, and other public lands multiple users.

The rangeland debate will be coming to a head on June 8 when public hearings are scheduled for the new Babbitt proposal.

Other speakers at the national People for the West conference will include New Mexico Governor Bruce King, U.S. Rep. Scott McInnis of Colorado, and a host of other policy-makers and experts on

natural resource production, with special guests from Australia and Canada. Senators Domenici and Larry Craig of Idaho will address the conference via satellite hook-up.

The strategy session comes at a critical time for rural Western communities, which face legislative and regulatory assaults on their economies and traditions. In addition to the rangeland issue, westerners face increasing wilderness set-asides, efforts to abolish the General Mining Law, growing restrictions on timber harvesting and public lands recreation, an expanding Endangered Species Act, unfunded federal mandates, and other actions that hold the potential of destroying traditional land uses.

The May 31-June 2 national People for the West conference will be the first ever grassroots gathering of this magnitude for federal public lands users and producer of the nation's basic resources. People for the West is a nonpartisan grassroots campaign with more than 100 chapters throughout the country.

Conference activities will include a variety of educational workshops and panel sessions as well as chapter displays, youth programs, a Western concert and an awards banquet.

Artists make a statement with their creative transportation

For some people, life is too short to drive a hum-drum car. They turn their cars into something distinctive, what some would call bizarre and others would call art.

Eight of these car artists rolled through Rudoso Monday on their way to the International Art Festival in Houston, Texas. At the festival's Orange Show, two of these eight artists will receive special recognition from the students of Rudoso High School.

Mike Gieb arranged for the students to vote for the cars most deserving of the "Pozeist Award" and the "Re-Car-Dough Award." The awards were created by his art class, and trophies as eclectic as the cars were designed by Guadalupe Garcia, whose father is local artist Ernie Garcia.

The "Pozeist" honor will go to a car that stirs the spirit and touches the emotions, whether it evokes admiration or disgust. The entire student body had a say in choosing this car.

"The main point of modern art is to get people to react," reads the Pozeist criteria. "The objective is to get the viewer to see something in it besides a mass of shapes and colors that causes no response from

the viewer."

The "Re-Car-Dough," named after art student Ricardo Ontiveros, recognizes the artist who's invested in the maintenance and stability of his or her work. Not only must the car be in good shape mechanically, but the artwork must withstand inclement weather and highway travel. Judging for the "Re-Car-Dough" fell to a panel of power mechanics students.

With designs ranging from mobile sculptures and paintings to transformers, like Ruben Margolan's car that turns into a table, judges may face some tough calls.

There are the cars with alter-egos like the Oldsmobile yacht by local car artist Eric Lamb. Laura and George Kayser, from Mountain Air, New Mexico, drive a hybrid car-cycle, with the front end of a Subaru and the seating of a cruiser built for two.

Then there are cars with interactive features like assaultive gizmos and blinking lights. The car driven by Arizonans Gretchen Baer and Tim Johnson bears lion murals and a few surprises, like a working catapult and sprinklers. A switch in the camera van, designed by Harrod Blank from Berkley, California, sets off dozens of flash bulbs.

Kathleen Pearson, from Bisby, Arizona, drives the "Love Car," a pink travelling showcase of resurrected plastic trophies, dolls, toys and pop icons. Cars like Pearson's and Reverend Charles Linville's give testimony of our throw-away culture.

An ordained minister from Portland, Oregon, Linville says his church is Our Lady of Eternal Combustion. His car is a museum of trinkets and toys that were once fads.

"One thing about driving a car like this," said Linville, "is that people tend to keep their distance. And if it gets damaged, it doesn't really matter. You just work with the damage."


Some cars look like something out of a Road Warriors movie, fiercely armored for urban intimidation. Charles Hunt has mounted all manner of skulls and bones on his car. He said he's been adding to his collection for seven years.

"I started by accident," he said. "I put a bull's head up there and people laughed at it, so I added more stuff."


Art cars are generally works in progress, developing new features at the whim of their owners. There's no telling what these cars will look like next year.




Reverend Charles Linville recycles short-lived trends and gives them new purpose as born-again hood, roof, door, trunk and window ornaments on his art car.

Charles Hunt armored his car with an intimidating array of bones and skulls (left). The camera van (right) is the creation of Harrod Blank, who is an art car journalist.




"My other car is a table" might be an appropriate bumper sticker for this transformer, the drive-able picnic table created by Ruben Margolan.

Open government falls victim to ignorance

Ignorance is no excuse. Who hasn't heard those words over the years — from parents, teachers, police officers, judges and just about anybody in authority. In the case of traffic laws, John Q. Citizen isn't cut any slack for going over the speed limit, just because he didn't know what the speed limit was. The same holds true throughout life for most of us.

But, that's not true for some elected officials. When it comes to official misconduct regarding open meetings and open records, boards and commissions have been reprimanded many times but haven't had to pay any price because those involved didn't know any better.

In Gallup, the city council closed a work session and the Attorney General's office (AG) ruled that the action was improper, but since the violation was unintentional, no fine would be levied. Vaughn's mayor and council were admonished for going into a closed session without following the law and discussing business that belonged in an open session — no fine. The Santa Fe Council conducted an improper closed meeting — no fine. The list goes on and on.

Zuni Board of Education repeatedly violated the Open Meetings Act in recent closed meetings, according to the AG's office. But, because the board apparently was ignorant of the law, no action would be taken except to keep a record of violations.

The Town of Bernalillo, in a rare case of ignorance not being an excuse, was found guilty of withholding public information by refusing to release the applications and resumes of finalist applicants for two public jobs. (The Ruidoso News ran into this same problem when MainStreet hired its director, who is paid with public funds; but The News opted not to pursue charges against MainStreet.) Bernalillo had to pay all court costs and \$500 of the attorney fees of the newspaper, the Sandoval Sentinel, which made the original complaint. The town agreed to release the names in this case and in all future cases.

The moral of this story seems to be that ignorance is an excuse for leaders, but not for regular folks.

"And our special today is..."

Need a couple of free tickets to a Lobos basketball game? Try getting elected to the State Corporation Commission.

The chairman of the State Corporation Commission, Eric Serna, got two free Lobo basketball tickets. Commission member Jerome Block got five Lobo football tickets.

The donor? Thomas Garcia, the vice president and lobbyist for US West, according to recent news reports.


US West is regulated by the State Corporation Commission. But in New Mexico, this system of gift giving is perfectly legal. Serna and Block were entirely within the state government's ethical guidelines in accepting the gifts.

The same goes for other gifts they got. US West's Garcia bought concert tickets and meals, as well as sports tickets, for Serna, according to lobbyist filings mandated by the 1993 ethic law. Garcia also bought Block a meal.

Garcia, in addition, showed a nice touch by buying flowers for both men.

Serna said the gifts don't influence him. "I hope we don't get to the point where elected officials can't be social with their constituents," he added in comments to a reporter.

If anyone tried to argue with various state regulatory officials about gifts they have gotten, you can bet that at least some of them would cite chapter and verse about cuts they've made in the rates desired by the regulated companies. Moreover, it wouldn't be fair to single out Serna and Block for accepting



gifts. They're not doing anything unusual.

Five workers at the Oil Conservation Division, which helps regulate the oil industry, ate out at the expense of a lobbyist for the Amoco oil production company. William LeMay, director of the division, said such meetings are useful because they allow industry representatives a chance to comment on state rules.

"It's hard to regulate in a vacuum," LeMay commented.

A similar view was taken by Lawrence Ingram, who chairs the state Public Utility Commission. Ingram has dined out at the expense of lobbyists from the Public Service Company and the Gas Company of New Mexico. The utilities are regulated by the commission Ingram heads.

Ingram said he doesn't talk about pending cases with utility lobbyists over free meals but does talk about other issues related to the industries.

"How do you learn anything unless you sit down and visit with them," he asked.

The same response might be given by thou-

sands of public officials throughout the nation. Gifts to New Mexico regulators don't amount to a whole lot when compared to the gifts lavished on people in Congress, for example.

Still, freebies from lobbyists in New Mexico are getting out of hand. Why can't the Oil Conservation Division officials meet with Amoco over coffee instead of dinner? If it's state business, why not do it on state time?

The state Legislature, which writes the laws that govern ethics for these agencies, gets quite a few freebies itself. Representative Mario Torres, an Alamogordo Democrat, got 10 tickets for a football game in El Paso, courtesy of a lobbyist for Chevron.

The lobbyist didn't ask for anything in return, Torres commented. Of course he didn't. That's not the point.

The point is treating public officials to tickets and other goodies was clearly explained by Garcia, the US West lobbyist.

"I'm sure they're very appreciative of receiving tickets... It creates good will between the parties," he commented.

Good will. No effective lobbyist underrates it, and much of politics, like much of business, runs on it.

The trouble is that ordinary citizens can't afford to buy sports tickets, dinners and flowers for state officials. The next time the Legislature revises its ethics laws, it should ban the kind of freebies recently reported by lobbyists. Why should US West, or Amoco, be able to bend the ears of regulators over dinner when the average person can't?
