RHS Class of '94 graduates 101

Tears flowed, hands blushed red from clapping and camera bulbs flashed like strobe lights as 101 Ruidoso High School seniors accepted their graduation diplomas Thursday and stepped into real life.

District superintendent Mike Gladden proudly announced that the students waiting to toss their caps and tassels had received \$253,146 in scholarships.

After the processional, high school principal Don Weems welcomed parents and friends to the ceremony and Jeremy Pinto gave the opening reading.

Salutatorian Montana Hisel spoke her last official words as a senior and then gave the podium over to valedictorian Melissa Currin.

School board vice chairman Mike Morris filled in for board president Ron Hemphill, who was attending another graduation of a family member.

Teacher Gerald Ames received loud applause and a standing tribute from the seniors, who had selected him as their keynote speaker.

"You dream about a day like this happening and then when it does, you don't know what to say," Ames told the students. But he found the words, noting how they had grown in his affections over the past four years, offering his well-known brand of reality-based advice and ending with an uncharacteristic sentimental farewell.

After the presentation of diplo-

mas and scholarships by Weems and assistant principal Danny Flores, Mandy Parker led the closing and the evening wound down with another round of Pomp and Circumstance by the Ruidoso High School 24 Karat Gold Band.

Daniel Espinosa, Earl Holstein, Jenny Ames and Kristie Bautista comprised the honor guard. Scott Christensen, Zack Turner, Mandy Todd and Lara Wozny acted as ushers.

Mandy Parker served as class president, Kristie Ryan as vice president, Laverne Piatta as secretary-treasurer, Tawnya Rawlings and Jessica Cox as student council representatives.

MainStreet makes pitch for money

MainStreet officials will ask the Ruidoso Village Council Tuesday to reconsider creating a budget subsidy for the 1994-1995 fiscal year.

MainStreet president Don Dutton said he will ask for partial funding of the ongoing project. A proposed budget was submitted to the council that includes a \$15,000 payroll.

The governing body, on the advice of village manager Gary Jackson, cut MainStreet from their budget this fiscal year.

Jackson told the council during budget sessions that long-term financial commitments to continuing outlays should be avoided unless sustained revenue growth is assured.

Two such entities, MainStreet and the Lincoln County Economic Development Corporation, were both cut from this year's budget.

Jackson said non-recurring

revenues and resources should not be used to finance continuing operations.

The council has firmly supported Jackson's assessment of the budget.

Jackson said that non-recurring expenses should be viewed as capital expenses and prioritized. The council has listed the correction of water and sewer problems and demands as the top capital expenses.

MainStreet is a not-for-profit corporation, whose focus is downtown rehabilitation. It works from a paid director and volunteers, including a board.

Mayor Jerry Shaw told MainStreet officials at a prior council meeting that although not included in the budget, the village supports MainStreet and will pay a membership dues as a show of support.

Some village officials expressed

Police reveal five people may have been in fatal car crash

New information indicates a number of persons were involved in the automobile accident last week that claimed the life of Molly Gayton of Mesalero.

Gayton and passenger Sharolyn Evans skidded off a curved road near Grindstone Resort Drive and crashed head-on into a gully. The accident occurred mid-afternoon Sunday, May 22.

Gayton died at Lincoln County Medical Center the following Monday afternoon from internal injuries, according to police reports. Ruidoso police investigating of-

ficer Robert Achterberg said he has contacted several witnesses who indicated there may have been up to five persons in the car. Original reports indicated two passengers.

Achterberg said, eyewitnesses to the accident named Molly Gayton and Sharolyn Evans as well as three more passengers they believed were in the car. Achterberg said he is working on confirmation.

He said Friday that Evans, who was transported to an Albuquerque Hospital with a possible broken neck, had regained consciousness and experienced some movement.

MainStreet moves to Gazebo

MainStreet Ruidoso has a new headquarters and a renewed vision for its role in the community.

Echoing the sentiments of many MainStreet directors, Bonnie Mattox said she would like to see the organization stop worrying about Midtown construction, which is now completely in village hands, and go back to being something of a merchants association.

"I think we should focus on the four aspects of the national MainStreet organization," she said. "That's design, organization of everyone downtown, promotion and economic restructuring."

Mattox has successfully orchestrated MainStreet's relocation behind Forget Me Not, In-Espresso-ble and For the Birds in Unit 12 of The Gazebo Shopping Center. MainStreet is renting the space for \$300 a month including utilities, about one third of the cost of the previous office.

A patio somewhat shielded from Sudderth traffic noise makes a larger, more comfortable meeting space for the Friday morning coffees.

Without benefit of construction updates from the village, MainStreet is continuing the informal Friday morning gatherings. Last week president Don Dutton announced that Julie Johncox, Executive Director of MainStreet New Mexico, will speak on MainStreet's behalf at the next village council meeting.

She will also be at the MainStreet Office around 4:30 p.m. Tuesday, May 31, for an informal meeting with MainStreet members. Dutton said the public is invited to attend this gathering.

A committee chaired by MainStreet Vice President Margaret Lahey has prepared a

work plan and budget proposal for the village in a request for \$16,000 funding. Their original request for 1994-95 was \$32,000. Mayor Jerry Shaw has made it very clear to Dutton that she intends to vote against funding MainStreet at this time. Councilor J.D. James is also opposed to renewing the group's funding at this time.

James told Dutton he was not pleased with what happened, or more accurately what failed to happen, during Don Miller's term as MainStreet director.

"I was the village liaison for MainStreet, and I was never kept updated and informed," James said. "I told Don [Dutton] that if they come back in about six months and if village gross receipts taxes are up, we might take another look. I'm not committing to anything, though."

Dutton said he had a good meeting with Mayor Shaw on Monday, but that rumors of hostility between the council and MainStreet are spreading.

"Jerry [Shaw] has no harsh feelings toward MainStreet or me," he said. "She and the councilors realize this [construction] is a temporary thing and it will pass, and when it does, we'll all have smiles on our faces."

Some MainStreet directors are strongly opposed to asking the village for money again. Dutton said he is appealing to the council once more to establish a clear directive statement from the village to MainStreet.

"I think we voted to present a proposal," he said. "We can't build a foundation on rumor and conjecture. We need to get the consensus of the council and act accordingly. I'm not planning to brow beat anyone Tuesday. We'll be going in hat in hand, but with our chins up and

our chests out. I want us to walk down MainStreet together."

Dutton wants to refocus on the original public-private partnership between MainStreet and the village to preserve the downtown area and its historical significance.

"The purpose of MainStreet is to relieve the city government of burdens like pursuing funding for the streetscape project," Dutton said. "We had a dynamic, if controversial, director in Mary Maul, who brought \$1.3 million to town."

Dutton said MainStreet Ruidoso is in the minds of people in Santa Fe. "They see this as a flagship project and they don't want it diminished," he said.

According to Dutton, former MainStreet Director Mary Maul is sending a letter of support for MainStreet to the village council. She also hopes to ask the secretary of economic development to send a letter.

"I think this project is going to help everything here in Ruidoso," Dutton said. "We're not making money off of this. We do this for the love of Ruidoso and the people here."

While Dutton makes peace with the village, Mattox and her volunteers (including Margaret Lahey, Trink Edmunds and Susan Carter) will answer the phone and take care of business at the new MainStreet Office.

Mattox said there are no immediate plans to hire another director and that volunteers will make MainStreet headquarters a source of information and support for merchants and visitors alike.

"A lot of merchants don't know that we can help them get low-interest loans for remodeling," Mattox said, offering an example of MainStreet's broader role. The MainStreet phone number is still 257-6346.

concerns over duplication of a paid director and the time spent by village deputy manager Alan Briley and other village staff.

Last year, payroll exceeded \$30,000 for former director Don Miller.

Dutton said he will bring state MainStreet official Julie Johncox with him to the council meeting.

Several downtown merchants expressed ire when Johncox brought a parking specialist to the area several months ago to view the downtown area. The specialist concluded that there was no parking problem, only a management and communication problem with the downtown merchants.

A workplan for 1994-95 has been submitted to the council that includes parking, landscaping, loan programs, downtown security, and developing sources of revenue, which apparently includes the village.

In addition to the \$15,000 payroll, the revised MainStreet budget lists expenses as accounting and audit, \$1,003; regulatory fees, \$500; entertainment, \$100; licenses, \$10; insurance, \$700; office supplies, \$500; postage, \$400; rent, \$3,600; telephone, \$900; payroll taxes, \$1,270; community update expenses, \$1,600; education, \$50; a market survey, \$600; and it's membership \$300.

It lists receipts of membership dues, \$9,500; a market survey of \$1,500; and community update receipts at \$2,000.

In a further commitment to another top priority for the council, village manager Jackson and village parks director Debbie Jo Almaguer will ask the council to approve an application for a Land and Water Conservation Grant.

Jackson wrote that the council that, "It is long over due for Schoolhouse Park to be improved to be used by more citizens. Our request

is to develop a new playground area accessible to youth of all abilities."

Jackson said the grant would also be used to develop the trailhead to lead into a multi-use trail for all citizens. He said the trail would be specifically designed towards senior citizens and would be located near the senior center.

Jackson said a new picnic shelter will be added to the park, along with landscaping for erosion control along the parking lot and an irrigation system for efficient water control.

An amendment to the Counseling Center contract is up for consideration.

Jackson noted that he investigated a prior council decision to budget the center through a line-item in the police department budget with chief Dick Swenor.

He said they discussed amending the agreement to operate on an "as need" basis.

Jackson said the center director indicated his charges to be \$65 per hour and that 140 hours of direct services were attributed to the police department last year. Jackson said that would equate to \$9,100 as opposed to the current contract of \$12,500.

Jackson wrote that an amendment to the contract for that amount will be placed on the agenda for council approval.

The council has four public hearings scheduled on the agenda.

Zone map amendment PZ94-002 changes a high density residential area in the White Mountain subdivision to a low density residential area.

Ordinance 94-9 is regarding the mandatory fees and municipal judge benefits.

Ordinance 94-10 amends the Special Events Code to allow liquor dispensers license owners to have a special dispensers permit (picnic license) on their premises.

The change will effect Chapter 7, Article 2, Section 9.D1 that now reads, in part that "no special

events license shall be used for a location on the premises of an existing alcoholic beverage license."

According to village clerk Tammie Maddox, the special dispensers permit applicant must come before the council to obtain approval as has always been the requirement.

The final public hearing, Ordinance 94-11, if passed, will increase building code and zoning code permit and application fees.

Planning administrator Cleatus Richards is asking for increases to cover costs of services provided now paid out of the General Fund.

"Current fee structure covers approximately 62 percent of building inspections operating cost and 50 percent of cost processing planning and zoning applications," Richards wrote the council. He said the increase would bring both to a break even basis for services rendered.

In other agenda items, the council will consider:

—motorized boating on Grindstone Lake, the village water supply reservoir.

—a request by Bohannon-Huston, Inc. to release money withheld in conjunction with the MainStreet design services.

Deputy manager Briley said the village has paid that firm a total of \$61,888 out of a \$66,440 contract. Briley said they are entitled to \$4,551. Bohannon-Huston is asking for \$6,644.

—an award contract to Schrock Aviation for aircraft mechanic services at the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport.

—bid awards for a number of items including: plumbing, heating and air conditioning maintenance, electrical maintenance, a compact utility tractor, and aggregate for the street department.

In a village manager report, Jackson will discuss details of the Allhub Inc. request to build a resort hotel on village property, and a severance tax (mining gas and oil) reallocation from the state.



JASON'S STORY PART II

We pick up Jason's story when he began serving probation after a stay at the New Mexico Diagnostic & Development Center. His mother, Tammy, was made a party to the petition, which means the judge could hold her in contempt if she didn't attend counseling. Tammy didn't start attending counseling until nine weeks after she was ordered to go because there had been a waiting list at the local counseling facility. By then she and Jason both had fallen back into old patterns. She quit going to counseling after two sessions, and the children's court attorney didn't ask that she be held in contempt. After a few months, Jason stole a car and ran away. When Jason was picked up in El Paso he had a stolen gun in his possession and was adjudicated for two separate felonies and sent for a long-term commitment (up to two years) to Springer. The judge could have ordered a short-term commitment, which could have been for one year, no more than six months of which could have been spent in a facility like Springer. A review of Jason's history, however, convinced the judge that his only hope was to remove him from the streets and force him into school.

Jason was paroled from Springer eight months later (the judge couldn't control that) into a reintegration center, promptly stole another car. This time Jason was adjudicated a "youthful offender" as opposed to delinquent child. Youthful offenders are fifteen to eighteen years of age who have committed a violent felony or who have had three prior, separate felony adjudications within a two year period.

The judge could have imposed an adult sentence on Jason, but felt there was still a chance for him in the juvenile system and sent him back to Springer. Boistered by gang friends at Springer, Jason graduated to violent crimes. When he was paroled from Springer the second time, Jason was involved in a drive-by shooting and killed a rival gang member. Jason became a "serious youthful offender" when, at seventeen, he was indicted for first degree murder. Serious youthful offenders and their court experience in adult court -- and when Jason was convicted of first degree murder he was sentenced to life imprisonment (no possibility of parole for thirty years) in the penitentiary.

Jason is a fictional but highly believable and even predictable convict. Those like Jason at various stages along his path appear every week in the District Courts of Lincoln and Otero Counties. A study in one precinct showed eighty percent of the inmates had been born to teenage mothers. With no adequate adult role models in a system dedicated to "family preservation", Jason grew up with inadequate nurturing and poor self-esteem. From a victim he became a predator, and society became his victim.

Meltdown wins Ruidoso Futurity

Enrique Carrion's Meltdown out-battled fastest qualifier Casanovas Charge in a vicious stretch duel along the rail to gain a neck victory in the Grade I \$840,803 Ruidoso Futurity Sunday.

The Jack Brooks-trained colt broke a half-length behind Casanovas Charge with 100 yards to go. Meltdown finally edged past his rival and held him off at the wire to stop the timer in 1:17.76 seconds.

"He was a neck off the two horses (Casanovas Charge) at first, but after that he did it all on his own," said jockey Todd Fincher who recorded his first career Grade I victory. "Once I got after him (Meltdown), he came up to him midway down then he eased passed him."

Fincher, the second call rider for Brooks, who qualified four horses to the futurity, said that he always liked Meltdown. "Jacky (Martin) always gets first call and he chose Hank The First, so both of us were happy. He's one of the best man-

nered horses to be around for a 2-year-old colt."

Brooks, who has won the All American Futurity six times, had only won this race once, in 1987 with Shoot Yeah.

"He fell down in the West Texas Futurity Consolation, got up and beat some nice horses, so I had and I expected this from him," said Brooks.

Owner Enrique Carrion is a rancher from Vera Cruz, Mexico who has owned quarter horses his entire life, but has only raced in the United States for two years. He met Brooks at the 1992 Heritage Farm Sale where he bought Meltdown and the trainer obliged when Carrion asked him to train the colt.

"Brooks said he would train this horse without even really knowing me, so I admire his professionalism," the 41-year-old owner said. "I give all the credit to him and Fincher."

Meltdown was the seventh

fastest qualifier to the race after finishing second behind The Incredible Dash in the May 18 trials.

The futurity victory was the second in four tries for Meltdown. The son of First Down Dash also won the West Texas Futurity Consolation at Sunland Park in March. The colt earned \$140,579 today and raised his career bankroll to \$144,127.

Casanovas Charge finished a strong second, 1 1/4-lengths in front of third place finisher Hank The First.

Trained by Ben Torres and owned by Homer Garza of Mesquite, N.M., the Casady Casanova colt clocked the fastest qualifying time of 1:17.95 and was sent off the 2-1 favorite in the nine-horse field under jockey Jerry Rodriguez.

Casanovas Charge earned \$64,264 as runner-up. The third place check of \$32,936 went to Hank The First.

The gelded son of freshman sire Sig Hanson had a slight lead as the field broke from the gate in the 350-yard dash and continued that advantage with 100 yards to go. Nearing the wire, Sigabit had to hold off a late charge from 2-1 shot Mildly Sinful, but just had enough left to secure the win. The time was 1:17.98.

 America continues to lose the battle against illegal immigration. In 1992, an estimated 2.5 million illegal immigrants came to America — in addition to another 973,000 who arrived legally. How long can it go on? And how real are the growing fears about economic costs and long-term social and political disruption?

Village construction tops \$2.5 million in April

Construction topped the \$2 million mark in April, up 55 percent over April 1994.

The Village of Ruidoso planning department issued permits for 72 construction projects valued at \$2,781,046, a cool million up from April 1993 when building totaled \$1,789,730 for 50 permits.

Last month, in March 1994, village building totaled \$1,713,868.

Construction is valued at \$6,802,743 year-to-date for 1994, up 61 percent over the same period last year when building was at \$4,234,240.

Permits total 188 for all categories through April this year, and that number was at 167 for 1993.

Permits for single family homes numbered 20 in April for a total of \$2,337,909; 79 percent over April 1993's 11 permits totaling \$1,303,936.

Remodeling permits increased in numbers by decreased in value during April when 40 permits were issued with an estimated price of \$263,474; down 28 percent from last April's 30 permits valued at \$366,594.

No new commercial permits were issued in April, but nine commercial remodels worth \$33,200 were started. Last April nine commercial addition/alteration permits were issued worth \$119,200.

A permit was issued for the new animal shelter with an estimated value of \$136,000.

Two other permits, worth \$9,462, were issued, as was one demolition

permit at \$1,000.



Homeowners in the South spend less on maintenance

Fifty-six percent of homeowners residing in the nation's Southern region spent money on home maintenance, compared to 64 percent in the West and Midwest and 66 percent in the Northeast, according to a report, "Homeowners, Home Maintenance, and Home Improvements: 1991" released Wednesday by the Commerce Department's Census Bureau.

Report author Barbara Williams says, "The South contains a relatively large number of mobile homes and newly built homes and lower income households, all groups with lower rates of maintenance and improvements."

For example, 52 percent of homeowners with incomes of \$60,000 or more spent some money on home improvement compared with 37 percent for homeowners with incomes less than \$20,000.

"Therefore, homeowners in the South are not as likely to do home improvements," she said.

However, due to the large size of the Southern region, it had the largest number of households paying for either maintenance or home improvements.

The author also says, "Dealing with maintenance and home improvements is an important part of the process of home ownership. However, all repair jobs are not created equal. For example, roofing repairs get done regardless of income, while other repairs are more of an option."

"Homeowners, Home Maintenance, and Home Improvements" looks at the characteristics for both homeowners and their units in an effort to illuminate how much money, if any, homeowners spend on repairs and on what kinds of repairs. This is the first time home improvements have been included in the report.

Other highlights from the report include:

—Homeowners who had lived in their homes for at least two years, but

less than six years, was one of the largest markets for home improvements.

—Homeowners of homes built between 1970 and 1984 were more likely to do maintenance to their homes than homeowners of homes built either before or after that period.

—Homeowners in structures built since 1989 were less likely to spend money for either maintenance or improvements as compared with homeowners in structures built prior to 1990.

Single-family detached houses dominated maintenance and improvement activities. 91 percent of the most expensive improvements (costing \$9,997 or more) and 86 percent of the maintenance costing \$5,000 or more were done in single-family detached homes.

In one-person households, women, regardless of age, were less likely than men to perform do-it-yourself home im-

provements.

—One-person households were less likely than households with more members to spend money on home improvements (38 percent vs. 47 percent). Of those living alone, men were just as likely as women to pay for improvements.

—Homeowners between 45 and 64 years old spent more per household than any other age group on home improvements.

—Larger homes were linked to more expensive home improvement and maintenance work. For example, homes of 1,775 square feet (the median size of single-family detached homes and mobile homes) or more accounted for 60 percent of the most expensive home improvements and maintenance costs.

—Owners of mobile homes spent less than half of what owners of single-family detached homes spent on improvements (\$837 vs. \$2,190).

Homeowners turn to pros for remodels

The share of home remodeling handled by professionals will grow by nearly 12 percent this year, according to a recent estimate by the Home Improvement Research Institute.

"Contractors, especially, are enjoying the homeowner trend to increase spaces and change styles in existing homes," said Mike Kruse, general manager of Pella Rio Grande, Inc., an Albuquerque distributor of windows and doors.


"Popular larger projects like sunrooms or window configurations require the skills and equipment contractors have and homeowners need."

Kruse said homeowners are sometimes hesitant to involve contractors because of perceived cost. However, the professional's ability to offset renovation headaches in advance can make the partnership a "smart investment."

"Contractor selection is critical," said Kruse. "A few basic questions up front could save dollars and frustration down the road."

Tips for homeowners include: Ask for written proof of property insurance, liability insurance and worker's compensation. Clearly identify everyone's expectations, such as projected cost, starting and finishing dates, specific brands to use and provisions for releasing liens as payments are made. If a lender is involved, they will help with proper lien waivers.

Kruse said Pella Corporation, and other home products manufacturers, have developed programs to certify quality contractors to install their products. Kruse suggested looking into this option for brand specific projects.

The Public Utility Commission approved an agreement May 16 between the commission staff and Texas-New Mexico Power company which reduces electric rates to regular customers by almost 13 percent.

The commission's decision reduces overall revenues by almost \$7.8 million, out of revenues of \$60 million for the utility, with the typical residential customer bill dropping from \$47.98 to \$44.85 for 500 kilowatt ours.

In addition, the average general service customer, which has a higher level of consumption, should experience a drop in a typical bill from \$303.03 to \$281.42. Much of the cost reduction is due to savings the company has experienced in the cost of power Texas-New Mexico Power purchases from other generating utilities.

HOUSEHOLD HELPS

If you haven't already done so, you should get your air conditioners checked immediately by a qualified contractor or service technician.

For example, if your unit is not cooling sufficiently, this could be a simple thing, such as a fuse or resetting a circuit breaker. It could also be a matter of checking the thermostat setting. Of course, if the above-mentioned aren't the cause, the refrigerant may be at a low level and need to be replenished. If further investigation proves that's not the cause either, you may have a compressor problem. This would be indicated by strange noises emanating from your unit when you try to run it.

If you find that your unit or units require more money than you'd care to spend, it may be time to replace it. The newer units are generally more energy efficient. In fact, you may want to look into CFC-free air conditioners which are much safer for the environment. CFC-free means that no chlorofluorocarbons are used as a coolant.

If you need more information, you can send for the Air-Conditioning and Refrigeration Institute's free pamphlet, "How to Keep Your Cool and Save Cold Cash," at ARI, Dept. 94/U1, 4301 N. Fairfax Drive, Suite 425, Arlington, Va. 22203.

Besides your normal spring/summer spruce-up, you should turn some attention to accident-proofing your home for the safety of your family, particularly your children. The best way to do this, according to KinderGard's 1994 "Safechild" booklet, is to actually get down on all fours to see what dangers lurk at a child's eye level.


When a child progresses from the crawling stage to the walking stage, he will generally try to pull himself up on whatever's available (including the family dog!).

If the child does this in the kitchen, an unsecured cabinet door could swing open revealing all the potentially dangerous contents, such as household cleaners. An opened kitchen drawer could cause a rainfall of knives and forks. To prevent this, fasten cabinets and drawers with child-proof cabinet locks or latches.

In the bedroom, install clear electrical plugs or outlet covers.

In the family room, prevent accidental head bumps and bruises by attaching cushions on all sharp furniture corners and edges.

JAMES BRAZAE

Local inventor markets his new odorless toilet

A Ruidoso inventor has created a new odorless toilet that he is building and marketing here under the name Sani-Vac.

James Brazael spent seven years building and remodeling kitchens and baths in El Paso, Texas. As the owner of his own company, he attended seminars and trade shows on the best and latest in every kitchen and bath feature. One of the main topics was air contaminants, especially in the bathroom.

Seeing a need and demand for odor free bathrooms, Brazael put his imagination and design skills to work.

After years of trial and error, he came up with Sani-Vac, the odorless toilet.

"Most bathrooms have fans in the ceiling for pulling out contaminants," he said. "But they don't work because you'd have to vacuum out all the air in the room to catch all the diffused contaminants."

Brazael guarantees Sani-Vac to keep the bathroom odor free. A device the size of a hairdryer, the vacuum is installed in the toilet bowl, where it draws contaminants away at their source.

With no financial backing, Brazael has worked on his idea since 1989,

spending hundreds of dollars trying out other products that don't work. From there, he started a Frankenstein procedure of taking parts from already manufactured products and assembling them into evolving versions of the Sani-Vac.

When he had something that worked, he started the patent process.

It cost Brazael \$12,000 to get a patent pending on his idea.

During the complicated and expensive process of trying to get a patent, Brazael encountered a few inventions trying to accomplish the same goal as his Sani-Vac, but nothing that compares to its compact size and efficient operation.

The Sani-Vac is small, and Brazael plans to package it as a kit for do-it-yourself installation. Right now, with Brazael doing the installation himself, the total cost comes to \$175.

Without the labor, it will eventually cost less.

"All you'll need to install it is a screwdriver and a drill," he said.

Brazael plans to build his business in Ruidoso, eventually hiring people to cast porcelain and assemble the Sani-Vacs. He is a native New Mexican whose family settled in Cloudcroft.
