In spite of a lean ski season due to meager snowfall, the Lincoln County Medical Center was only about \$50,000 off its projected budget for the 1993-94 fiscal year, according to hospital administrator Valerio Miller. "I find that remarkable given the ski season," she told hospital board members at their meeting Thursday. "Normally, I would have expected us to be in the red by a considerable figure." The broken bones and bruised backs of skiers at Ski Apache each winter constitute a significant portion of the hospital's projected annual revenue.

## Council pushes Midtown contractor

"Rinky Dink!"

That's what Councilor Frank Potter called D&S Construction when superintendent Bob Tackett brought up all of his construction problems before the village council. Tackett indicated that his company, D&S, with a million dollar MainStreet contract, would not float a \$10,000, 30-day loan in order to get colored cement in time. Tackett said a concrete vendor wouldn't deliver colored cement critically needed for the progress of the MainStreet project unless paid earlier. Tackett said he had to wait for the village to pay him, before he paid the vendor, about \$10,000. Tackett complained of a series of problems with his vendors and with the specifications (thick sidewalks and retaining walls, and poorly planned drainage pipes that weren't shown) he often blames on the plans submitted by Bohannon-Huston, design architects. The village council appeared irritated with the litany of construction problems that belong more to D&S than the council. Finally, Potter uttered his "rinky dink" comment and suggested the village attorney get involved. Village attorney John Underwood, calling the project a "com-

## Concession stands crop up in Midtown

Between the Ruidoso Store and Ski Shop, a temporary roasted corn stand and seasonal horse carriages are in operation. Monday, the planning and zoning commission will hear a request for another food stand in that area. Susan and Buddy Carter, owners of the Ski Shop, have

permitted Larry Blank of Smokey's Barbecue, to place his eight-by-24-foot trailer on their property to sell cajun food, crawfish, boudin and burgers. A hot dog stand, requested for across the street in that area, was rejected by the commission at its last meeting. During that meeting, village planner Cleatus Richards said there had been several com-

plaints by merchants regarding the mess created by the corn stand. Also during that meeting, inadequate restroom facilities and parking contributed to rejections of several other vendor stands. Aesthetics and the move toward a certain downtown look were mentioned as considerations for approving or disapproving vendors.

The commission concluded that there is no law governing vendors at this time, and that with owner permission, adequate parking and restroom facilities on the property, the vendor would be allowed to operate. Richards said the location requested is at the Ski Shop entrance and will eliminate three parking spaces. He said the applicant's sketch plan of the property does not reflect true parking availability, the front seven spaces appear to overlap onto adjoining property. Richards said the area is heavily pedestrian and with restaurant quality food, will draw customers to the site. Customer seating will not be provided on site, he said.

Richards said he could not recommend approval of this request where 13 of 20 parking spaces are not properly improved and marked. He said the parking deficiency will amount to seven spaces. He said specific time limits should be set for all seasonal operations. In other commission business, John Fuchs requests a replat for his acre of property that is zoned C-2. Half of Fuchs' lot is developed with two buildings. He needs to divide his lot to allow the sale of the developed area. Staff recommends approval. A rear yard variance is requested by Jack Prewitt to allow construction within 15 feet of the rear yard where 20 feet is required. Richards said the lot was vacant and development can be accomplished in compliance with setback requirements. He said hardship is not involved and recommends against the requested variance.



Behind the seasonal horse and carriage and the roasted corn stand on the Ruidoso Store parking lot, another food stand is applying for space next to the ski shop building. That food stand is being proposed to serve cajun food during the summer. At a

recent Planning and Zoning Commission meeting, the village turned down a request by a vendor who wanted to sell snowcones at several Ruidoso locations. Last summer a photographer with longhorn cows also set up shop in this same area.

## Disruptive students to attend new program

The pieces are falling into place for the new Ruidoso school district juvenile day care center, except for one essential ingredient. "We're looking for a location," Paul Wirth told members of the Ruidoso School Board Tuesday. "We need 2,500 square feet of floor space, ADA (Americans With Disabilities) access, which shouldn't be difficult. It should be near population centers and not isolated. "We'd be looking at a one-year lease with an option for a multi-year extension." The district needs those characteristics combined with a "reasonable monthly rental charge," he said. Wirth, who is director of educational support services and ends up piloting many of the district's special projects, said he is "putting the word out" in the community, and would welcome suggestions or offers.

During the same meeting, the board agreed to appoint Karen Taylor-Day as the teacher who will head the educational component of the center, which is being established for students who otherwise may disrupt regular classrooms. The money for the project, \$150,000, comes from the New Mexico State Legislature and expenditures will be supervised by the State Department of Education, Wirth explained. At the same time, he has started working with the Department of Children, Youth and Families regarding licensing under that agency, program requirements and possible future financial support. "A team of four representatives came down and met with us about eligibility criteria," Wirth said. "We have been working on curriculum, using positive ideas from other districts." Ruidoso Middle School principal Paula Papponi said the curriculum framers also will meet with community groups. Board member Susan Luteran asked who determines eligibility for a student to attend the center and how long after they are assigned will it take before they can be transferred. "The state has no say in determining eligibility criteria," Wirth said. "That's left up to the local community."

He said it should take less than one week to enroll a student. "We need to develop a formalized procedure in communication with the court and the schools," he said, adding that he was unclear whether a court order would be required. The district has asked for bids on the psychological services component of the center. Wirth also is working with the Southcentral New Mexico Task Force on Juvenile Services, which is trying to develop alternative facilities to places such as the secured detention center in Springer.

# Failed EDCLC reports final financial figures to county commission

In line with the decision to dissolve the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County, a discussion of how the agency's assets will be distributed is on the agenda for Monday's County Commission meeting.

Commissioner L. Ray Nunley, liaison between the two entities, will present the information. The recipients of all personal property from the corporation (EDCLC) will be senior citizens cents through-out the county.

The commission is scheduled to meet at 9 a.m. today (Monday) in the county courthouse in Carrizozo.

In the cover letter accompanying the EDCLC financial statements, the representative of Dean & Noltensmeyer stated that the accounting firm did not gather and has not audited the figures.

"A compilation is limited to presenting in the form of financial statements information that is the representation of management. We have not audited or reviewed...The accompanying budgeted statements of revenue and expenses...for the 11 months...have not been compiled or examined by us."

The accountants also noted that, "Management has elected to omit substantially all of the disclosures and the statement of cash flows re-

quired by generally accepted accounting principles.

"If the omitted disclosures and the statement of cash flows were included in the financial statements, they might influence the user's conclusions about the company's financial position, results of operations and cash flows."

The development group already has acknowledged that without continued subsidy from the county or villages, it cannot continue due to a lack of financial support from private sources.

Furniture and equipment before depreciation were listed at \$16,523. All money in excess of final expenses will go to the Roswell office

of the Small Business Administration program that benefits the Ruidoso area.

The county's dealing with another economic development group has been more successful and commissioners are expected to sign another contract with the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District.

However, the district has proposed increasing by \$1,000 the annual membership dues for the county to \$3,500.

Dues also are set to go up by about \$100 for four of the five villages in the county. The fifth village, Ruidoso, would see an increase from \$955 for the current

year to \$1,450 for 1994-95.

In another matter, commissioners are expected to take action on a three-way agreement with the Ruidoso village council and the State Highway and Transportation Department.

The contract will transfer responsibility to the state for the entire road to Sierra Blanca Airport and Fort Stanton from State Highway 37 to U.S. 380. The county will retain snow removal obligations.

The village will be released from responsibility for the nine-tenths of a mile of unpaved and 2.1 miles of paved road that was its portion of the 11.5 mile route (now called D004) from highway 37 to the junction with State Highway 214.

In exchange, the county takes on a rough 7.5 mile section of State Highway 214 called Devil's Canyon from U.S. 70 in Glencoe to its junction with D004.

A clause concerning future transfers of roads among the entities was removed at the suggestion of Ruidoso village council members.

Other items scheduled for action include a proposal to purchase a new computer system, a proposal for real estate industry access to computerized property records and narrowing down the field of candidates for the vacant position of county manager.

## Summer school classes draw 100+ students

More than 100 students enrolled in summer school classes at Ruidoso middle and high schools.

"Summer school has been extremely successful at Ruidoso Middle School," principal Paula Papponi told school board members Tuesday. In math, 24 students enrolled and another 20 took language arts.

"It is a self-paced curriculum and they are flourishing under it," she said. "We might think about this system for the regular school year."

Future Farmers of American (FFA) leader, teacher Shawn Dennis also is working with 24 students who are showing animals at functions throughout the summer and 20 others engaged in non-animal FFA activities.

"They'll be working in Capitan over the Fourth of July weekend to help out," Papponi said.

New high school principal Ronald Hodges said the number of students enrolled at the high school over the summer declined by 11 from last year, with nine in English and 13 in mathematics.

He suggested pushing back the start date of classes next summer by at least one week.

"We started six days after the end of the year," Hodges said. "Some students hadn't received their report cards by then and weren't aware of courses they failed."

Paul Wirth, director of educational support services, said 43 kindergarten through third graders enrolled for the second summer of the Title VII summer program,

which emphasizes English language development, as well as the Apache culture and language.

In connection with early education opportunities, Wirth briefed the board on a \$5,000 grant for the Parents as Teachers program from the New Mexico Indian Education Center for Excellence.

The program, centered in Ruidoso, Tularosa and Mesalero, focuses on parent education, helping them work with their children.

"A childhood expert will advise them on development progress and approaches, and offer support," he said. The program is open to children from birth to three years.

"This has been well studied and evaluated for the past 15 years inside and outside of the United States."

It has been shown to increase parent confidence, increase parent

knowledge of child development and how to stimulate learning. It promotes a stable child-parent relationship and provides an opportunity to detect learning or health problems.

"The data is amazing. It's thought that three-quarters of a person's learning for life occurs before you reach three, so early support is very effective."

District Superintendent Mike Gladden apologized to those attending the meeting for the malfunctioning of the public address system at the high school graduation in May.

Hodges said plans already are under way to ensure a new and effective system.

The board awarded a contract to perform its 1993-94 fiscal year audit to Terry Jones of Ruidoso.

tives are identifying needs.

"Right now there are lots of gaps in the service delivery system," Wirth said. As representatives of one of eight regions created in the state, the officials are trying to come up with a more cost effective approach than a secured facility where juveniles could be housed while waiting for their court dates and adjudication, he said.

The state has allocated about \$20,000 for the task force to collect data and come up with a recommendation. Once that has been done, the competition will begin for money from the State Legislature to pay for the new program.

Lincoln County Commission Chairman Monroy Montes is chairman of the task force and would welcome new ideas and letters of support that can be sent to the legislature.

In other business, the school board:

—reviewed with Frank Cannella, principal of White Mountain Elementary, a draft of the district's technological plan, which the state has required from each school district. The plan outlines existing computer and other technological equipment and their uses, and describes the future course of development.

Cannella said Ruidoso is one of the top districts in the state on a computer/student ratio. He said that could not have happened without the strong support of board members.

—announced a positive audit of \$232,000 received under Public Law 81-874. Called Impact Aid, the money is to be used to compensate school districts for lost revenue where federal ownership or activities adversely interfere with any revenue sources they normally would receive, such as sale, property and income taxes, licenses and other fees.

Business manager Caron Snow said the audit, which occurs about every three years, is intense and the program requires a great deal of documentation.

—heard from Snow that the final figure for the per full time

equivalent student equalization reimbursement to the district will be adjusted upward by \$1.40 per unit.

That adjustment will amount to an additional \$5,000 for the district, Snow said. While that doesn't sound like much, she said it is unusual to receive an adjustment this late in the year. Usually, the last figure districts have to live with are determined in February, she said.

—approved the resignations of Iva Gurule as a grade one teacher, Rodney Webb as a high school English teacher and assistant football coach, Rob Lovett as Ruidoso School Band instructor and Debra Lovett as a fourth grade teacher.

—approved recommendations to hire Susan Carter as fourth grade teacher, Paula Timmerman as a school nurse, Terry Flores as a fourth grade teacher, Sheila Norman as fifth grade teacher. Brian Baca as special education teacher at White Mountain Intermediate, Cathleen Busby as high school foreign language and drama, John Roberts for high school math, Brian Johnston as middle school and high school band director, Demaris Howell as second grade teacher, Kathy Hedin as Sierra Vista Primary special education teacher, Connie Romero as bilingual teacher at Sierra Vista and Beth Necastro as first grade teacher.

—approved the non-instructional hiring of Roger Sokol as bus driver, Ruby Chino as Title VII instructional assistant at Nob Hill, Cindy McCloskey as special education instructional assistant at Ruidoso Middle School, Carolyn Rice as instruction assistant, Lisa Jackson as library instructional assistant at White Mountain Elementary, Marianne Rawlings as receptionist, attendance secretary at the high school, Jan Mullican as secretary at White Mountain Elementary and Melinda Schut as Native American Instructional assistant at the elementary school.

The only resignation was from Beckie Chapman as instructional assistant at Nob Hill.

## Garbage gurus meet Tuesday to ponder policies & pickups

A recommendation on a drug and personnel policy, follow up on illegal dumping and a discussion of the general manager's position are on the agenda of the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority for its meeting at 10 a.m. Tuesday, June 21, at the recycling center on Second Street in Ruidoso Downs.

In his manager's report, Joe Lewandowski stated that with 92 percent of the fiscal year past, revenues are at 88 percent generated, while expenses are at 82 percent.

He pointed out that some activities of the authority (clean-up around containers, and pickups of appliances/carpets, limb/brush and pine needles), which generate practically no income at \$1,427 for the year, have cost the authority \$84,805 since June 11, 1993.

A "Harvey Girl." Were you one or did you know one?

The Lincoln County Historical Society will present a program by Ms. Lesley Poling-Kempes, "Writing the Harvey Girls: The Historical Importance of Ordinary People," at 6:30 p.m. Saturday, June 25, at La Finca in San Patricio.

Ms. Poling-Kempes traveled thousands of miles through small town hotels, rented furnished houses, and furnished houses, as well as photographs and archival materials that she will share with everyone.

Fred Harvey, an energetic and visionary restaurateur, opened the first Harvey Eating House in Topeka in 1876.

The Topeka House was followed by others as the railroad tracks were laid westward until they dotted the line at convenient intervals all the way to Los Angeles.

Travelers on the AT&SF railway no longer had to bother with lunches in boxes. At every meal time, the train stopped at a Harvey House. A dinner gong, pounded by a white coated man, announced a meal as was seldom equaled in those days — plenty of good hot food, well cooked and served by

Harvey Girls, with liberal second helpings.

Harvey made his own blend of coffee. A choice of both black and green tea, a curious innovation, was also offered. Cleanliness was unprecedented and the Harvey House offered such service as the West had never known.

This civilizer, even before beginning to build hotels, rented furnished houses, and furnished houses, for his waitresses, who were provided not only with decent quarters, but with chaperones, too.

When the hotels were built, they included rooms for the girls, laundry rooms, ironing rooms, places to sew and places to receive their beaux.

These waitresses were the first respectable women, outside of wives and mothers, that the cowboys and miners had ever seen.

### Drunk drivers, beware!

New Mexico is fed up with drivers who drink and endanger the lives of their fellow citizens. If you don't believe it, just take notice of some things that happened just last week.

The King Administration's liquor director, Mary Ann Hughes, transformed her boss's strong words into action when she closed down a bar in Albuquerque. Hughes said "enough is enough" and told a bar owner whose location had racked up hundreds of complaints, arrests and/or citations, to lock the door. That troublesome location will be ineligible for use as a bar or liquor store for at least a year. Hughes has met with neighboring alcohol sellers who are cooperating to eliminate a growing neighborhood menace.


Closer to home, the Village of Ruidoso Downs turned down a request by the Circle K Corporation to move a liquor license to its convenience store on Highway 70. The board voted "No," citing health, welfare and public safety as reasons for opposing the request.

These two actions, coupled with the recent road-blocks set up by State Police on busy weekends, add up to serious efforts to wipe out DWIs and safeguard New Mexico citizens.

It's worthy of note that the Albuquerque bar closure and the Ruidoso Downs board action took place during the same week that a northern New Mexico man was in court, facing vehicular homicide charges as the results of an accident in which a New Mexico woman and her three daughters were killed. He's accused of drinking and driving in a 1993 holiday season case that prompted a huge public outcry. The jury found this man guilty of drinking and driving even though it reached a stalemate on other charges. There's no doubt the tragic accident and ensuing investigation and trial have heightened awareness of a growing DWI problem in this state.

New Mexico is attacking the problems caused by drinking and driving at all levels. Drunk drivers should pay close attention and cork the bottle or hang up their keys.

On June 6, 1944, the free world held its breath and prayed as Allied troops stormed the beaches of Normandy. The invasion of France, the turning point of World War II, had begun. As global history was made that day, a young pilot was making his own history as he flew into the D-Day battle on his first combat mission.

Fifty years later, public television presents A Fighter Pilot's Story, a poignantly personal account of the glory days of World War II. More than a showcase for battle medals, it portrays the reality of war with a gritty authenticity. The story follows producer Quentin Aanenson through his youthful days in pilot training to the horror of his first killing, and his evolution into a highly decorated combat pilot, and finally his numbed return home.
