## Highway 48 project delayed — again

The elusive Highway 48 Project to widen Mechem Drive, pushed back by resident dissent to the spring of 1995, now has been postponed to the spring of 1996. Allen Whitesall of the New Mexico State Highway and Transportation Department told the village council Tuesday that state officials think the project is so important it

should be worked on "in house" with state staff. "Unfortunately, with the increased funding and the more work we had to do, with some personnel problems, changes in drainage, what it ended up doing was delaying the project somewhat," Whitesall said. "In fact, about a year." He said the project is still in a

field design stage and will be ready to let around August of 1995. Whitesall said he is hopeful that with an early spring start, a base course can be put down before the long winter season. He told the council that drainage problems on Mechem Drive are too costly to correct by the state, but the state will work toward not increasing the down flow. Regarding bicycle paths,

Whitesall said, "We do not make provisions for bicycles." He indicated any further changes in design plans would result in further delays. Declaring the village has learned a lesson by its history with MainStreet engineering, village manager Gary Jackson recommended John Carollo Engineering for the Grindstone Water Treatment Plant.

Jackson said John Carollo Engineers is a major national firm, designers of numerous water treatment plants now treating over one and a half billion gallons of water per day. He said the firm has 300 employees throughout the United States, and the project team for Grindstone will be operated out of the El Paso and Phoenix offices.

## Smokey grows up

Did you know Smokey Bear was a cartoon poster before he was a real live bear? According to literature distributed by the U.S. Forest service, during World War II, a Japanese submarine shelled the Southern California coast, and forestry officials were afraid that further attacks might start widespread forest fires. At first, during 1942 and 1943, wartime slogans were used on forest fire prevention posters, but on August 9, 1944, Richard Hammett of the forest service said a bear should be on the poster. According to Hammett the bear was to have "a nose short (panda-type), color black or brown; expression appealing, knowledgeable, quizzical, perhaps wearing a campaign (or Boy Scout) hat that typifies the outdoors and the woods." Albert Staehle was asked to paint the first bear. The first poster showed the bear pouring water on the campfire was printed in 1944 and distributed early 1945. The bear was named "Smokey" after "Smokey Joe" Martin, who was assistant chief of the New York City Fire Department from 1919 to 1930. The first living symbol, Smokey Bear the real bear, didn't occur until 1950 when some careless camper with a match started a devastating fire in Lincoln National Forest. After flames had passed and smoke cleared, the only living thing the firefighters saw was a badly burned cub clinging to a blackened tree. The little cub was taken to the ranger station, where many people tended his burns and nursed him back to health. The rescuers called him "Hot Foot Teddy," but it wasn't long before someone noted the resemblance and called the cub "Smokey" after the original famous poster of Smokey Bear. Smokey was flown to Santa Fe for several weeks treatment by a veterinarian and was gradually nurtured back to health. After the burns healed, the little bear was sent to live at the National Zoo in Washington, D.C. During his 25-year reign as the living symbol of fire prevention, the original Smokey Bear played host to millions of visitors to the zoo; and in his retirement he had a relaxing life in seclusion. The new Smokey Bear, who was appointed May 2, 1975, has a similar background. He was found in 1971 in the Lincoln National Forest, abandoned and half-starved. As the symbolic head of the state, federal and industry.

Smokey Bear, the symbol, was born in 1944 through a poster, but Smokey Bear, the bear, wasn't found and adopted as the fire prevention bear until a forest fire in the Lincoln in 1950. This year, Smokey Bear is the honoree for many activities commemorating his 50th anniversary. The big events, including the rodeo, dance and Monday morning parade, all have headquarters in the Village of Capitan.

Now, in 1994, Smokey is the star of the Fourth of July celebrations throughout his home county of Lincoln, commemorating the 50-year anniversary of the first Smokey poster bear.

Smokey Bear, who is featured in everything from cards and books to stuffed animals, pictures and T-shirts in the Smokey Bear Museum in Capitan, will be the guest of honor at the Smokey Bear Stampede this July 4 weekend.

Events, besides the big annual rodeo, include a ranch rodeo, barbecue, dances, arts and crafts fair, pancake breakfast and the Smokey Bear Run.

## Councilor complains about high gas prices

Angry Village Councilor J. D. James Tuesday deplored the recent gasoline increases at local service stations leading into the Fourth of July holidays.

James told the council that every holiday, gas prices are raised to gouge tourists and local residents, and then decline after holidays.

James said Attorney General Tom Udall investigated the problem recently, but "he hasn't done a damn thing about it."

State Representative John Underwood (D-Ruidoso) said that the State Legislature gave Udall \$200,000 to investigate the oil companies, but that Udall said he needed another \$300,000.

Underwood said gas price increases pose a difficult problem politically, to stay out of regulating private enterprise, but ensuring fairness to the citizen.

James said if citizens would hand together, they could control what he called "price fixing."

In another holiday-related issue, James and village manager Gary Jackson urged people not to use firecrackers in this area, a violation of a village ordinance.

James said the ordinance has

been in effect for four years and he intends to see it is enforced this holiday season.

"With this dry weather, it would be like lighting a match to a haystack," said James.

Ruidoso builder, William Blaney, by a narrow 4-3 vote, lost an appeal to the village council to waive a condition on his replat set by the planning and zoning commission.

The tie-breaker that backed a planning and zoning decision, was issued by Mayor Jerry Shaw, her first tie-breaking vote during her term as mayor.

The commission had approved a replat for Blaney's property on the condition that sewer service be extended to the subdivided tract.

Planner Cleatus Richards said the New Mexico Uniform Plumbing code adopted by the village, provides that connection to public sewer system is required where sewer is available within 200 feet.

Richards said Blaney's property was about 160 feet to the property line, the measure for the village.

Blaney said the line would be 400 feet long to the nearest point of construction.

He said the line could go the "dumb way," which he called "city rules."

Blaney called the cost of an extension unreasonable because he never plans to build on that particular tract.

At times, the mayor had to caution Blaney not to wander from the subject with his complaints of the village in general.

Blaney said he had talked to a councilor and that they had agreed to do something about a village problem at a later time.

At one point, he called Mike Radziewicz, chairman for planning and zoning, a liar concerning an appeal that he lost on another tract.

Councilors Frank Cummins, Leon Eggleston and Frank Potter voted to back the planning and zoning decision. Robert Donaldson, Joe Gomez and J.D. James were nay votes. Shaw then broke the tie.

In other business, the council gave full support to village manager Jackson for an experiment to improve village service to residents and tourists.

Jackson proposed operational hours of village hall be extended by an hour each day, Monday through Friday, from 7:30 a.m. to 6:30 p.m., to accommodate citizens, tourists and calls from out of town customers.

Jackson's plan will call for most of the employees at village hall to

work a 10-hour, four days schedule.

"My commitment to you is if it doesn't work, and we'll know soon, we'll go back to the old way," Jackson told the council.

He said all departments have a tentative schedule that will guarantee extra on a daily basis.

The extra half hour before and after operating hours will help each department stay caught up by not being interrupted with phone calls and walk-ins, according to Jackson.

He said during times the receptionist was unavailable, phones will be answered by other departments for the extra half hour each morning and afternoon that the village will be open.

Jackson said the new schedule should be more efficient and lead to better service.

In other business, the council: —authorized staff to enter an agreement with the New Mexico Self Insurers Fund. The move lowers village employee deductibles to \$200 while representing a saving to the taxpayers.

—approved Ron Anderson to the Lodgers Tax Advisory Board and Galen Farrington to the Citizen's Advisory Committee.

—heard Jackson report that the Retired Senior Volunteer Program Grant was verbally approved.

## Commission targets grant to fight DWI

Two coordinators to oversee and implement programs directly related to the enforcement and prevention of alcohol involved incidents are part of a Lincoln County action plan headed to Santa Fe.

The proposed \$176,860 plan was approved during a special meeting of the County Commission Tuesday. It represents the first time county groups have attempted to take advantage of grant money from the State Health Department, which governs substance abuse agencies.

With the July Fourth weekend looming, the timing couldn't be better to remind officials of the need for stepped up prevention, enforcement and follow-up.

"The State Legislature last year allocated \$5.2-million, which is to be distributed over a period of several years," Magistrate Judge William Butts said Wednesday. "Every DWI (driving while intoxicated) conviction includes a \$75 prevention fee as part of court cost, and that replenishes the fund."

Last year, the DWI project was given \$1,078,352 statewide, but the county collected only about \$6,000, which went to Ruidoso, while Otero County received \$76,508.

But this year, a Lincoln County DWI Planning Council, a coalition of representatives from local law enforcement, judicial and alcohol prevention agencies, was formed. In a meeting of that council last week, Carrizozo police chief Charlie White was appointed to coordinate the project from Lincoln County.

At that meeting, Butts stressed the time factor. A plan must be in the hands of Mike McCann, director of Southeast Economic Development based in Roswell, by Monday. McCann is to hand carry proposal to Santa Fe by July 1.

Butts said the county faces special problems because of its proximity to the Mescalero Apache Reservation and because its population swells from tourists and seasonal residents during certain times of the year and on holiday weekends.

The community requires heavier enforcement and prevention than its year-round population would indicate, he said, adding that 50 to 60 cases are pending in his court.

A summary of the problems facing the county that will ac-

company the plan to Santa Fe pointed out that the municipalities and sheriff's department are understaffed for the onslaught of people during special events.

"In spite of the incredibly low number of law enforcement officials employed in the county, DWI arrests are up and so are the number of alcohol related crashes," it states. "The annual cost of alcohol related crimes has moved the county from sixth to fourth in the state. The recidivism rate of the DWIs is just over 20 percent."

Courts are backlogged with cases, resulting in problems in the tracking, treatment and sentence compliance of offenders. The county lacks alternative sentencing options due to budgetary constraints.

"Individuals sentenced to probation often fall through the cracks due to the non-existence and need for a probation officer who would strictly handle DWI cases and insure that all the conditions of their sentence are met," the summary states.

Under the plan submitted, the DWI coordinators for a cost of \$30,000 each (salaries and benefits) also would act as victims' advocates to work with the victims and families of DWI involved accidents or incidents.

The plan calls for a secretary to be hired for \$19,000 a year to assist the coordinator.

Equipment listed for purchase at \$12,000 includes four computers, four printers, software and miscellaneous supplies for use by the coordinators, secretary and probation officer to assist the courts, district attorney's office and law enforcement official in the tracking and disposition of cases.

The district attorney's office in the Twelfth Judicial District would be responsible for the coordinators and secretary.

One of the major goals is to increase the rate of successful probation by 20 percent in DWI and other alcohol/drug related offenses.

To improve the system, the council is recommending that one probation office deal only with DWI and other drug related offenders in both magistrate and municipal courts. Salary, benefits and travel for the position are listed at \$28,800.

Under enforcement, the plan includes a trailer to be used during road blocks for \$10,000.

## Trash pickup costs skyrocket this summer; Sweattmann proposes rate hike

To keep pace with special pickups, illegal dumping and pecky bears, costs the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority a bundle.

But board members, who primarily are elected officials with government entities in the county, don't want to receive complaints. And they don't like to see collection bins overflowing, even if it's with illegal items.

"Put more people on, pay overtime or raise the rates," County Commissioner and board member Bill Schwettmann insisted during an authority meeting last week.

"Or sub (contract) out the entire service. I don't care how many illegal dumpers are arrested, there are 10 more ready to throw their trash."

The authority is a coalition of the county and its five municipalities, which provides a garbage collection service and is a partner with a similar authority in Otero County in the operation of a regional landfill there.

Member Frank Cummings, a Ruidoso councilor, said the cost on special pickups continues to climb. General manager Joe Lewandowski estimated the cost to the authority since June 11, 1993, as \$84,806.

Illegal dumping continues to be the main culprit, he said.

"We've had some success due to the recent newspaper stories. The judges are taking notice. Several violators have been fined. Maybe people will see that the judge gave them the maximum (sentence)."

Stickers with the number to call to turn in violators and receive a CrimeStoppers reward will be attached to bins, especially in high

violation areas such as Eagle Creek, on State Highway 48 from Alto to Capitan and at Smokey Bear Vista.

Bear Tobias of the U.S. Forest Service suggested using teams of inmates from Camp Sierra Blanca to help on weekends.

Schwettmann said the inmates already help by picking up debris along the highway, but then the bags they leave behind have to be hauled away.

"In the long run, it probably saves money to keep a full staff and pick up over the weekend," said Jerry Shaw, mayor of Ruidoso.

Lewandowski said for a while he had been pulling employees off other duties, such as container repair and recycling, to help with special collections and the cleanup of illegal items around dumpsters.

"We're not here to make money," Schwettmann said. "We're here to do a service. It's not faulty management. I just think there's not enough equipment or people out there."

Contracting with a commercial collector won't help, Lewandowski said.

"When I was doing it privately (for Southwest Waste), it got so bad I had to go to the commission and say that I won't do it anymore," he said. "People were leaving things like telephone poles, everything."

(County road manager) Bill Cupit finally had to go in and pick it up." Lewandowski said he already is scheduling a driver to work Saturday and Sunday to pick up the Ruidoso Downs Race Track. His route could be extended to Ruidoso Downs, Capitan and Cedar Creek dumpster sites.

"We've been working on holidays

and will continue to do that," he said. But he added that part of the problem over holidays is that the Alamogordo landfill does not stay open.

"I think we should address that at the next joint meeting of the Otero and Lincoln authorities," Chairman Wilton Howell, a county commissioner, said.

It would mean Alamogordo, which runs the landfill, would have to keep a crew there, because the garbage must be covered immediately, Lewandowski said.

Howell explained that while drivers should make notations about messy sites they see on their routes, they are not expected to get out of the vehicle and try to pick up anything.

"If it winds up on the side of the road and the dumpster is empty, it's the responsibility of law enforcement to catch them. We need to draw the line," he said.

The board previously had told Lewandowski to look at removing dumpsters in some of the more isolated sites that are subject to heavy abuse.

But Lewandowski said he needs permission to move to a new site.

"We ended up in isolated areas because no one wanted them near their homes," he said.

"I'd still like to see you try," Shaw said.

Tobias said his employees in the Lincoln National Forest have been instructed not to dump garbage in county bins. He apologized for not recognizing sooner the potential problem for tourists and campers who find the bins full.

Lewandowski said the good news is that monthly payments from the environmental group

receipts (sales) taxes, pledged to repay the cost of building the regional landfill are being reimbursed within a week after they are sent to Alamogordo.

"We sent a \$12,000 check to Alamogordo (the city that runs the regional landfill) and they sent a check back for the same amount of money," Lewandowski said. "They are making enough off the gate to offset their bills."

Schwettmann said he was concerned that so many line items in the authority budget were running over the corresponding percentage for the time of the year. Telephone expenses were at 110 percent of budget, fuel at 122 percent and equipment rent at 336 percent (because of a bulldozer being damaged).

"Are we under control on those things or is it a matter of not having a proper budget, which is understandable?" Schwettmann asked Lewandowski.

"It's more just not having the experience of a full 12 months of operation and just guessing on it," Lewandowski said.

After a closed to the public board session on personnel, members agreed to appoint a committee of Jerry Shaw, Dr. Bernd Raimann of Capitan and Ruidoso village manager Gary Jackson to work on a draft of a manager's job description.

Lewandowski has contended that when he was hired, he was told by some board members that a sizable raise would be considered in six months. That time has long since passed and the only raise received was a percentage along with the rest of his staff.

But recently, recycling director Kerry Krumstiek resigned. Instead

of hiring a new management person, his slot is being filled by a laborer at the transfer station, which would leave money available for a raise, if Lewandowski picked up some of Krumstiek's responsibilities.

In other business, authority members: —agreed to review the rules by which their home boards operate and to bring back suggestions for the next meeting.

Chairman Howell had suggested adopting Roberts Rules of Order, but authority attorney J. Robert Beauvais advised against it, saying they "could be a sword and a shield."

"You can tie the people up procedurally. They can bog you down."

With a contentious board that type of safeguard might be needed, but "this board tends to work for consensus," he said. "I think Roberts Rules may be too formal. Perhaps we can go with something less structured."

He noted that some of the governing boards for which he works, such as Capitan and Carrizozo, have adopted a stripped down version of Roberts Rules.

Howell said even the county commission runs its meetings with a loose version.

—received on behalf of their villages and the county annual payments for the purchase of equipment to get the authority started. The arrangement was initiated for repayment over a 15-year period, instead of an outright purchase.

"It was a very lucrative agreement for the towns and it was fair to the authority," Beauvais said.

Ruidoso Downs received a check for \$10,178. Capitan was paid \$3,161 and Lincoln County's check

was for \$10,033. The big check for \$45,403 went to the Village of Ruidoso, which sold its trucks and compactor to the authority.

—approved a new drug and alcohol policy, which specifies that illegal substances cannot be brought on premises and employees may not come to work in an impaired state.

Beauvais said the policy emphasizes self-identification of problems.

"Employees would be encouraged to come forward and identify a problem and we will work with them through our medical coverage," he said. "If they don't identify the problem and it comes to light, it would be done as a disciplinary measure and not considered a medical problem."

—agreed that if Alamogordo doesn't move ahead with acquisition of mineral rights to give the State Land Office in exchange for those lying under the regional landfill, a joint meeting of the two authorities will be called.

The lands office sold a section to the two authorities for \$30,000 south of Alamogordo. Officials had asked for mineral rights to exchange for those under that tract.

If no movement is seen, Lincoln may move ahead on its own to purchase the rights and then bill Otero.

"I think Alamogordo or Otero County or whoever has dropped the ball and we need to go forward on this," Howell said. He noted that he recently received a new offer for the needed rights. State officials are saying they could close down the landfill until the rights are transferred.

—approved purchasing a new bulldozer from Rust Tractor.

# Smokey's friends bicker over birthday celebration

Bickering and in-fighting nearly paralyzed a Lincoln County group organized to promote gaiety and goodwill in the 50th anniversary celebration of Smokey Bear.

Problems in the Friends of Smokey camp surfaced last week when it appeared that group may have misrepresented its work efforts to obtain tax money approval from the Ruidoso Lodgers Tax Advisory Board (LTAB).

Friends representatives submitted a Ruidoso News advertising proposal, which was not adopted and the ads never placed, as their own efforts in advertising the upcoming 50th celebration of the famous bear.

Friends of Smokey is a non-profit volunteer organization originally established in 1939 to help coordinate Smokey Bear's Golden Anniversary this year.

With less than a week to go before the big July 1-4 celebration, that promotional organization has apparently not spent thousands in grant money allocated to promote the event.

Former Friends chairman Rick Riddle said as much as \$15,000 in advertising has not been spent.

David Cummings, fire management officer for the U.S. Forest Service, said \$186,000 was allocated during fiscal year 1993 for the Smokey Bear celebration.

He listed expenditures to date as: salary for coordinator and forest service employee at Smokey Bear State Park (covers most of two salaries for two years each for Cummings and Marianne Gould), \$62,500; travel, mileage and miscellaneous, \$6,700; equipment on loan to Smokey Bear State Park, \$11,100; Cooperative Forest Fire Prevention Campaign (CFFP) materials, \$3,400; Smokey Bear fire prevention trailer, \$19,600; Smokey Bear trailer, equipment and supplies, \$15,300; Interpretive support (vistas, bronze, advertising, signs, etc.), \$38,400; CFFP material for the forest service, \$19,400.

Cummings said \$19,600 remains to be spent during the remaining part of fiscal year 1994 for CFFP

programs. Debbie Ingall, current chairperson of Friends, was not sure how much money was raised by that group and referred questions for that information to Howard Shanks.

Shanks said State Representative John Underwood (D) helped Capitan village with a \$10,000 state grant. He said Friends had received \$5,000 from Ruidoso Downs and \$1,500 from Ruidoso Lodgers Tax Advisory Board.

Ruidoso village clerk Tammie Maddox, official liaison between the village and groups using lodgers tax funds, said she was concerned about outstanding amounts of tax dollars left in the Friends of Smokey budget.

"I want to see a total budget, income and expenses," said Maddox. "And tear sheets from any expenditures. We're dealing with public money here, we have a responsibility."

Riddle said Friends took a new direction about 45 days ago. As a result, he said several members have quit and in Riddle's words, "the ball was dropped."

Luna had a different story. She said not much money was spent with Riddle at the helm. She said every time someone asked about the advertising, they were told it had been taken care of, but nothing ever happened.

Doris Cherry, secretary of Friends, asked the LTAB at the last regular meeting to approve repayment of an ad Friends ran in The Ruidoso News Visitor's Guide for the celebration.

The LTAB approved the request, in part, based on information submitted by Friends that included a breakdown of advertising expenses, the newspaper portion totalling \$12,525.56. Several attachments were included further detailing expenses.

That detailed report turned out to be the exact proposal that The Ruidoso News advertising representative Tami Montes had submitted to the Friends board last October that was never placed with the media.

Montes said she presented her idea for marketing the celebration that included a Friends of Smokey tabloid to be printed by The Ruidoso News and inserted in other newspapers throughout a targeted area.

Her plan called for \$12,525.56 to be spent in various markets in the Southwest Region of the forest service for a total circulation of 378,000.

Montes said the proposal was delayed when Cherry, a reporter for the Lincoln County News, wanted her paper in Carrizozo to be given an opportunity to present a proposal. However, months went by and that newspaper made no proposal.

Montes said Luna told her in May that her Ruidoso News proposal would be used as an example to submit to other newspapers.

On May 24, 1994, Friends sent out an invitation to bid on a Friends of Smokey tabloid with a June 2 deadline for the bids to be returned and to be received by the state tourism department before June 6 for approval.

The Ruidoso News editor and general manager Frankie Jarrell said The News didn't submit a bid. She said if The News submitted a bid and it was approved, the specifications didn't allow adequate time for preparation of an eight-page, four-color tabloid to be adequately distributed before the end of the month.

"We were all pretty frustrated anyway," said Jarrell. "After all, we already made a proposal, one good enough to be copied for an RFP and submitted to the lodgers tax board, but apparently not good enough to be adopted."

According to Debra Ingall, new chairperson for Friends, no newspapers bid on the tabloid.

Tuesday, Montes's original proposal surfaced before the LTAB as expenses of the Friends organization.

When contacted, Shanks said he had not seen the information given the LTAB, but would contact Cherry for an explanation.

Cherry told The Ruidoso News that she submitted an invoice to the

LTAB for \$1,550, the cost of the visitor's guide. She said the information contained in The Ruidoso News proposal had been submitted by Rick Riddle.

"I never saw the report until I saw the Friends of Smokey junk in Kathleen Michelena's office at the civic center," Cherry said. "I don't know the process. All I can say is that Rick Riddle went to the (lodgers tax) board and came back and said the committee approved the \$1,500. I knew it was part of the proposal, but I didn't know that it was going to be attached to the lodgers request."

Cherry said the Capitan Chamber of Commerce and Friends coped an ad in the New Mexico Visitors Guide.

"That's the only money to my knowledge that has been spent out of the \$10,000 grant from the tourism department for Capitan," Cherry said.

She said Thursday the remaining dollars are "in the process of spending in seven regional publications."

Cherry said she was not responsible for the LTAB receiving The News' proposal.

"I wouldn't have submitted it," she said. "He (Riddle) did it."

Ingall explained that matching funds required by LTAB would be covered in four ads recently placed.

She said Ruidoso would be well represented on the Fourth of July at all the information booths.

Contacted by The News, Rick Riddle said the package he submitted to LTAB was, in part, The Ruidoso News proposal.

He said the board had given him the information to take to LTAB and he had submitted it. He said it could have met budget, that there was enough money to cover the proposal.

Luna admitted to past personal conflicts on the board, but says the board today is moving forward.

With the main celebration for Smokey less than a week away, Luna said she thought it would not be in the best interest of the celebration to bring out past dissension on the board in the newspaper.

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# Lincoln County maps out its complicated maze of roads

Drivers who lose their way when they venture out on the back roads of Lincoln County now can pay \$4 and save hours of frustrating searching.

The result of a three-year-long project, maps showing all of the roads in the county are available at the county clerk's office in Carrizozo.

At least they should be available.

"We already sold out, but we're expecting more," an office spokes-

man said Thursday.

County road manager Bill Cupit told county commissioners last week that the 3,000 maps cost about \$10,000.

Commission Chairman Monroy Montes said the county should recoup some of that cost.

Commissioner Stirling Spencer agreed, noting that when people don't pay for maps, they tend to trash them.

County Clerk Martha Proctor said she has been charging \$4 a map until the commission determined if a higher charge was

needed.

"I do expect to see a need from hunters and real estate people, especially," Montes said.

Spencer offered a verbal pat on the back to Cupit and Montes for their work in revamping the road department in the last few years and in tackling the map project.

"They've initiated long-term planning for the roads," he said. "When we came on the board, there was no inventory in the road department. Cupit has worked to straighten all of that out."

In a road-related item, com-

missioners agreed to set a special road review traveling meeting for a Sunday morning in July, the specific date to be advertised.

Commissioners Schwetmann, Montes and L. Ray Nuntley will look firsthand at the possible impact of a request from Sus and Bob Stearns to vacate a portion of Chavez Avenue and Church Streets in the town site of Nogal.

Also in Nogal, they will review a request from Lucy S. Jones to vacate roads within her tract that were included in the town plat (layout), but never built.

On that trip, the commissioners will consider opening two lengths of a mile of road, about four miles south of Tinnie, on Junction 385. The action was requested by Selcino and Alberto Montes.

In other road-related business, commissioners rejected a proposal to chipseal surface a parking area and access road to State Road 48 from Sun Valley Road, used by the Bonito Volunteer Fire Station.

"I have estimated and confirmed the price at \$3,600 with Ruidoso Paving," which already is working in the area, Cupit said. But he

added that he could handle the job later for about half.

Commissioners thanked Karen Kopp for her efforts, although they were unsuccessful, to revive the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County. The group has dissolved and Kopp said equipment is being donated to the senior citizens centers operated by the county.

About \$8,000 to \$5,000 left in its bank account will be given to the Roswell representative of the Small Business Administration (SBA), who comes to Ruidoso.

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## Editorial

### Let freedom ring

Flags will wave freely in the breeze on this Fourth of July as a symbol of the freedom that we enjoy in this great nation — freedom to make choices about where we live, where we work, how we worship, how we spend our spare time.

The stars and stripes demand and receive great respect from the citizenry, and yet that respectful behavior symbolized by Old Glory is by choice. That's the beauty of a free country where people can march in a parade, waving the flag proudly; offer a patriotic salute as the flag passes or even ignore or disdain that symbol of democracy. That's what freedom is all about — personal freedom and choice.

The flag, as a symbol, has a colorful history with a star for every state and a stripe for each of the 13 original colonies. Today's 50-star flag of the United States was raised for the first time officially at 12:01 a.m. on July 4, 1960, at Fort McHenry National Monument in Baltimore, Maryland. The 50th star was added for Hawaii, a year earlier the 49th, for Alaska. Before that no star had been added since 1912, when New Mexico and Arizona were admitted to the Union.

The flag's true history has become so cluttered by a volume of myth and tradition that the facts are difficult, and in some cases impossible, to establish, according to the "World Almanac." But, it's a fact that the Second Continental Congress adopted the 13-stripe, 13-star, red, white and blue design on June 14, 1777. Despite repeated requests, George Washington did not get the flags until 1783, after the Revolutionary War was over, and there's no certainty that those flags were the Stars and Stripes.


Various designs were carried and flown in those early days, but the final design, adopted in 1777, was used until 1795 when two stripes and two stars were added on the admission of Vermont and Kentucky to the union. That design, adding stripes, would soon have overcome the flag design; and so it was ordered on July 4, 1818, that the flag should continue with the 13 original stripes and add stars for each state. No star is specifically identified with any state.

Betsy Ross may or may not have made the first Stars and Stripes, but the popular story of her authorship was unveiled by her grandson in 1870. A sea captain, William Driver of Salem, Massachusetts, is said to have coined the name "Old Glory."

The material and actual design of the flag, as well as the legends of its origins, are far less important than the meaning of the flag as a symbol of freedom. The freedom, not the fabric, even when adopted by the most unpopular groups, is a treasure worth fighting for and protecting at all costs.

Let's celebrate freedom as we fly the flag on Independence Day.

### Some thoughts from Midtown on MainStreet

#### TO THE EDITOR:

Nobody asked for my opinion, but you know, sometimes you just want to give it anyway, for whatever it's worth. Personally, I've had it up to here, and for those of you who know me, that's a pretty tall space.

I've been a merchant in Ruidoso for quite a few years, not as long as some I know. I was one of the presidents of the Spirit of Ruidoso, a large group of concerned merchants who came together to do everything that they possibly could to help create year round events, bring more people to our village and educate the merchants and employees to what was available in our area.

Whatever it takes to "Make them stay one more day," that was our motto and to make their stay as enjoyable as we possibly could. With all the attractions we have in our area, to have them stay one more day and go home happy would only be to the advantage of every merchant and lodger here. Some of the spirit still lingers in our village.

I was one of the first board members of the MainStreet program. I do know that in establishing priorities of things that needed to be done was the ancient complaint of the downtown sidewalks. And that's what the request was — please give us new sidewalks, get rid of the driveways that don't go anywhere and make it hard to walk, just make us some level new sidewalks.

Of course there were dreams of,

wouldn't it be nice to have some benches, lights, plants and restrooms. But those were all things that could have been added later. Some of us got tired and added some of these things years ago, and some of these additions could have always been left up to the individual merchants to add as desired. First things first, the new sidewalks.

I left the MainStreet program when they sponsored the Battle of the Bands during the motorcycle rally in the Midtown area and they closed the entire Midtown for one whole Saturday to have a bicycle race. To me this was not enhancing the Midtown area and it was hurting the merchants. I feel MainStreet, the village council, the county commission and any other organization's goal should be to help each other.

This sidewalk thing has gotten totally out of hand. The people in charge of getting this started were on a payroll, so what happened to the businesses downtown really was not of their concern, the company that drew up the plans did it from aerial shots, not measuring or taking anything into account, so the poor guys that came into do the job had to take 500 times longer to figure it all out and besides all of that they could have started on the side where the worst problems were to begin with.

So back to these people that were just doing this for a paycheck and trips to Santa Fe, they wanted

these pop out things that took all of our parking and that made the merchants start fencing off their back parking lots and posting signs for their customers only, and now tourists are running around with no place to park and dodging all those orange barrels.

The village was asked to buy more land for parking downtown and they have purchased some, but as they do they are passing new ordinances that all parking lots have to be paved and striped, well let me say this, these gravel parking areas have held many cars for many years. If you pave and stripe my back parking lot, you can probably only get about 32 cars in there, but if you come down on a Saturday night those folks, all by themselves can get about 60 cars in there without hitting the trees and without hitting each other. And if you drive off of Sudderth in the winter on to our parking lot and it's paved, you're not going to stop sliding until you reach the river.

If the city wants to do something about the parking, pass an ordinance that says you cannot fence off any parking area downtown (I know that the people that park back here go to many different stores while they're parked here) — spend the tax dollars purchasing more land for parking and don't spend tax dollars for paving and striping. Get these poor construction guys out of here right now, the people are trying to get to our downtown area and they can't and

on the other hand, these guys can't do their job with all the people trying to run around.

I would like to thank the village for trying to enforce and pass the ordinances about vendors, another long time problem. I truly feel like if you want to be here to reap the benefits of tourism and all this fine village has to offer, then you should have been here all the time paying for it. Don't come in for the gravy. And if we are trying to make our village beautiful, then we need to do it with our permanent locations, not tents and carts.

Besides if we're losing parking spaces then why should we set them up in what we have left. I'm sorry, I don't understand some folks' reasoning and greed.

I know that there was a lot of misunderstanding about my opinions on the convention center. I simply thought the convention center was here to bring in conventions (groups of people) that would generate income to our village, not a place to house events that would hurt any type of merchants and take the money away from the village.

I just wish so much that we could all work together again in the best interests of the majority of the people and not be held helpless in the hands of a few who do not necessarily depend on the tourism for their income.

### How about communicating instead of fining?

#### TO THE EDITOR:

It pains me to see the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority (LCSWA) board go to the route of usual bureaucracies, but maybe I shouldn't be all that surprised.

Recently, instead of opting to communicate waste disposal ground rules to the citizens who pay for this service (use it or not), the LCSWA board opted to clamp down and fine and not communicate. Personally, I believe fewer people would violate disposal rules if they knew what they were. Let's communicate first and fine later.

Perhaps when LCSWA defined contraband as items at bins, the LCSWA should read the following two messages from that contraband: 1) the citizen is trying to do the right thing by placing the solid waste there and not in vacant lots or arroyos; and 2) the citizen expects the county to deal with his solid waste disposal problem since it, alone, has the authority and is collecting mandatory revenues each month.

We should also remember that the Ruidoso area has a fluid, ever-changing population. New homes

and residents are always coming in. The same with resale of existing homes. Condos are constantly occupied by newcomers. Apartments and home rentals, too. These new folks have no way of knowing what the disposal bins operating ground rules are.

How are all these new disposers supposed to know? The Village of Ruidoso offices can't help them for they have no "bin-use handout" to give new residents.

How about the other county villages? As new residents arrive with a lack of local disposal ground rules — they may very likely dispose per the customs of the city they left. If I had just arrived and saw a sofa beside a bin — then noticed it was gone a while later — I would probably conclude it's OK to dispose of my sofa in this way.

Not desiring to complain without a recommended solution, here are my suggestions.

The LCSWA should develop a concise listing of Bin-Use Rules for the bins around the county. It'll be happy to help if needed. This list should address at least the following items aimed at educating the

paying public:

1. What may go in the bin. (Flat-ten large boxes first?)
2. What may not be put in the bin. (Building materials?)
3. What may be put beside the bin. (Pine needles? Leaf bags? How many bags?)
4. What may not be put beside the bin. (Furniture?) (Refrigerators?)
5. What does the citizen do with the forbidden items?
6. List the LCSWA phone number for questions and advice.

Next, the LCSWA should go about communicating the above list to the public in a continuous manner so that our ever-changing population can readily know. I'd suggest the following steps would go a long way to lay the proper ground work before fining:

- Develop a large detail of the above Bin-Use Rules list (in English and maybe Spanish, too) and apply them to each bin.
- Put the list in the local paper from time to time.
- Place signs at the bins and make them available for hand-out by offices of each village in the

county, all chambers of commerce in the county, real estate agencies and condo rental offices.

The Ruidoso area is a place of wonderful natural beauty and I also think it is a shame when people mess it up by misusing the bins. But fining isn't going to do the job nearly as well as communicating the Bin-Use Rules, for when the public becomes shook up by the fines and stories, what are they then to do? What are the Bin-Use Rules?

I believe that when the LCSWA does a better job of communicating with the public (other than via newspaper articles about fining), the bin use will greatly improve and there will be far less necessity to resort to muscle. As an analogy, imagine having no highway speed limit signs but constantly getting tickets while passing through changing speed zones. Like highway speed zone laws, I would recommend that solid waste disposal be communicated to be communicated.

On March 24, 1994 the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department was notified of a murder which had occurred at 440 4th Street in Ojo, New Mexico. An eight year old male identified as Herman Lee Hulen was beaten to death during a burglary at his residence. Several items were taken from the victim's home at the time of the murder. The items included a .45 caliber long Colt revolver with holster, a .410 gauge shotgun with pistol grip, a 30-30 model 84 Winchester lever action rifle, and a .357 Magnum revolver. Hulen's father patronized the Ojo, but was always home before dark.

This is Detective Sergeant Lanny Maddox, for the Ruidoso Police Department, urging you to be a crimestopper.

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Still interested? Well, Raye Ann Holland answered the call for just such a "dream job" eleven years ago, and she hasn't missed a beat since. The job title is "Jockey Agent" and the job description for this vocation obviously extends way beyond the reasonable.

Holland has a sunny disposition that seems to be coated with Teflon. If the daily tribulations of selling the talents of her riders to the hundred-plus trainers around the track frustrate her, she does not let it show.

"I just get along with everybody," points out the Colorado native with the constant smile. Her secret is common sense.

"Never burn any bridges no matter how bad somebody does you. You just have to remember it is a dog-eat-dog business. Any horse is fair game and that makes it simple for everybody."

The inevitable conflicts that arise in this volatile business game called horse racing can bring out the worst in some. Holland just concentrates on the positive.

Most of the trainers that have been around know that my riders are trying to do the best that they can. If they feel like they may have received a bad ride from one of my boys, most of them just say, 'we'll get 'em next time.' The best trainers know that you lose some races because you are unlucky, and you win some because somebody else got a bad break," said Holland.

Fortunately Holland represents some of the top riders on the grounds, and that makes the job a pleasant endeavor.

Jockey Billy Peterson is one of the beneficiaries of Holland's even-manner and he knows that a good agent makes all the difference in the world.

"I was at Sunland Park trying to get mounts all by myself. I was really going nowhere," said Peterson. "Some friends of mine hooked me up with Raye Ann and it changed everything. She has a special knack for soothing everything over if conflicts arise. Plus, she has an incredible ability to predict which horse to go with."

I really appreciate the fact that we have a great relationship on and off of the track. She is a top agent, that's for sure, but she is also a

great friend.

As you tag along with Holland on her morning rounds, you watch carefully for those little telltale signs of smoldering exasperation, but nothing ever comes to the surface. That's because no frustration exists, just a thankful attitude. A product of knowing she is doing something that she thoroughly enjoys. She also understands the reality of the game of horse racing.

"The jockeys are the ones taking all of the chances. I just feel awful if I don't try as hard as I can for each of them."

Holland jumps from barn to barn in her electric golf cart asking each trainer if they are going to enter a horse in the races listed in the condition book. The condition book (a preliminary list of races scheduled each day) seems to be glued to her right hand, and you wonder if she sleeps with it under her pillow.

"I keep a file in my head of all of

the horses and where they belong.

Then when a race that fits (distance, age requirements, class level) a certain horse comes up in the book, I go visit the trainer that has that horse."

"It's all free in the morning. We (Holland and her riders) don't get paid for anything we do in the morning," said Holland.

That means that her riders go to the track several times each morning to exercise 1,200 pound thoroughbreds and quarter horses, a dangerous proposition to say the least, with no guarantee of any return unless the horses get in a race where they have a realistic chance to win. For such a risk, all that Raye Ann and her riders ask is an opportunity to ride the horse in the afternoon when the money is paid.

A trainer flags her down as she breezes through the barn area asking her to come over to his barn to

work a couple of horses.

"We don't have that one," replied Holland, meaning the trainer has not given one of her riders the mount on that horse in the afternoon. "Can't help you there."

The smile never leaves her face. As the golf cart moves on, her rider lets out a sigh of relief. "That filly is slower than cold tar," he comments.

Holland outlines the unwritten rules.

"A rider shouldn't have to gallop anything," meaning taking a horse out for light exercise. "We'll work horses (serious exercise timed by official clocks) if we get the mount, but no galloping. Sometimes I will pay an exercise boy/girl to gallop a horse for a trainer so we can keep the mount. But my boys work eight to ten head in the morning and ride another six to eight in the afternoon. That's more than enough for anyone to do."

If you are wondering if all of this hard work is getting Raye Ann ready for a cozy retirement, stop. Her pay can go as high as \$26,000 a year from the 25 percent of each jockey's earnings she receives, but there are expenses.

"I get to write off gas and lodging when I travel, but I provide all of my own insurance and retirement. There are things I could be doing where I would make more money and have more security, but I love this game."

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

Visitors will flock to Capitan this weekend to join the celebration of Smokey Bear's Fiftieth Birthday as a symbol of forest fire prevention.

Although the holiday is the centerpiece members of Friends of Smokey have been promoting, the celebration started in May and will continue through August, winding down with the annual county fair.

The Thirty-Ninth Annual Smokey Bear Stampede is a four-day event, starting at 7 p.m. July 1, 2, 3 and 4, at the Lincoln County Fairground in Capitan. It's handled by Casper Baca Rodeo Co.

Admission is \$5 for adults and \$3 for children, 12 and under.

Dances will follow the rodeo on Friday, Saturday and Sunday, starting at 9 p.m. in the fair building.

Admission is \$5 per person, \$7 per couple or \$10 for a family.

"Let It Ride" band will hit the strings, while dancers twirl and stomp around the floor.

For those who can't get enough of the rough and ready, an Old West Ranch Rodeo is set for 1 p.m. at the fairground July 3 and 4, with a barbecue on the fourth only.

Events will include something for younger cowgals and guys.

The first eight children, six and under, who sign up before each rodeo, will be able to charge into the arena atop a sheep as part of the "Mutton Bustin" contest. No entry fee is required and a prize buckle will be awarded by Smokey.

Children 12 and under can be part of the "Calf Scramble." No entry fee is charged and Smokey will be there to hand out the prize buckle.

At a ranch rodeo, city residents, generations removed from ranching and farming, will see some of the special skills required to ensure their families continue to be supplied with beef.

The rules of the Second Annual Old West Rodeo require contestants to be employees of the ranches they represent. Each team has a minimum of four members and they compete in five events, with the championship going to the team with the highest cumulative score.

Awards also are given for Top Hand, Top Horse and Hard Luck Cowboy of the two-day rodeo.

Events include horse roping, team branding, team roping, team penning and the crowd-pleaser, wild cow milking.

For those who prefer to keep their feet on the ground and shy away from stirrups, the Fourteenth Annual Smokey Bear 10K & Two Mile Fun Run start at 7:30 a.m. from the parking lot of Ruidoso State Bank in Capitan.

Runners will head north on State Highway 246 and swing back to the starting line.

The course is TAC certified, covers paved road with gentle hills, and starts at an elevation of 6,351 feet. The finishing leg of the race primarily is downhill. Prizes will be awarded immediately after the 10K. The entry fee is \$10 and the event is sponsored by the Friends.

The Wildfire Chili Cookoff, in its second year, is headed by Paul Crown, who also promotes the New Mexico State Open Chili Cookoff in Ruidoso during Aspenfest.

The entry fee is two gallons of prepared chili for the Sunday, July 3, competition. A People's Choice Award will be presented in addition to announcing the winner of the judging. Cooks must start with raw meat and are given three hours to complete onsite preparation using red chili only.

Get out of the sun and stop at the Capitan school multipurpose room from noon to 4 p.m., where the band boosters are staging a Food Fair, Auction and Carnival.

Between events, stop at the Smokey Bear Museum or Smokey Bear State Park, where the famous bruin is buried. Read about his rescue from a charred tree as a cub, following a fire that swept through the Capitan Mountains in 1950. (The original Smokey created in 1944 was a cartoon character.)

Plenty of arts and crafts booths and food vendors also will be selling along the street on July Fourth before and after the 10 a.m. Happy Birthday Smokey Parade.



# June brings memories of past celebrations

**The Birthday of Our Mother**  
This is being sent to you in mid-morning of June 30, and will reach you on June 30, two days before the birthday of the mother of the Storm boys.

Bertha Kennedy Storm was born in Coahervilla, Illinois to Captain John Calvin Kennedy and Catherine Cannon Kennedy.

While a small child she was brought to Denver, Colorado. Here she attended East Denver High School where she met her husband-to-be, Lynn Whippo Storm.

They were married May 30, 1906. From this union were born John Whippo Storm, Daniel Agnew Storm, Marcus Kennedy Storm, Joseph Duffield Storm and an infant son who was called home by our Lord at birth.

Our father graduated from the Colorado School of Mines in 1902. And his career of government surveyor, mining engineer and petroleum geologist took the family twice to Alaska, a year in Mexico, Oregon and Austin, Texas.

**A Church Organist**

While still a young girl, our mother played the pipe organ. She played the organ in churches in Valdez and Juneau, Alaska; Ashland, Oregon; El Paso and Austin, Texas. For years, she played the organ at Saint Anne's Chapel, Glendale.

On our travels, we carried along a small portable church organ. Some of my earliest memories are hearing the strains of this little pump organ blending with our mother's voice singing hymns; and of our father singing old time hymns and songs.

The organ which folds up and then loads into a box, was transported by pack mule to a high mountain home where we lived in Mexico. This family treasure has an honored place

in the home of Lynn and Maxine Storm, in Dripping Springs, Texas.

**Arrival in Mescalero**  
In 1926, a friend drove us to Glendee in our 1917 Velle automobile. Here I learned to drive. And on July 1, 1926, we started out with me driving.

The pavement ended at Newman, twenty miles out, and from then on it was "every man for himself and the devil for them all," as the old Texas trail cattle driver once said crossing the Red River.

For awhile, the dirt road went winding through the sand dunes and then just faded away. We picked our way through the dunes, finding and then soon losing the road.

After awhile the wind began blowing the sand and there was nothing left to do but be guided by the mountains blue in the distance, like something in a dream.

After awhile we saw a car heading for El Paso, away off to our right, and we worked our way over that direction through the dunes. And then the same car headed for Alamogordo away to the left.

**Indian Hospitality**

At Tularosa we began the climb up to Mescalero. How wonderful to be welcomed by the piñon and then the pine trees.

We arrived at the old Mescalero feast grounds in midafternoon and then it came a great rain storm.

It seemed in honor of our Mother's birthday that the Mescalero Indians welcomed us with true hospitality and kindness. This was on the second of July, the first day in their four-day celebration. We stayed all four days and nights.

There was barbecued beef, coffee, Indian fried bread, ice cream, cream puffs, bananas, cakes and pies and everything was free.

My brothers and I played games with the Indian children — sack race, three-legged race, egg-on-spoon race.

I remember the courtesy and good manners of the Indians; how clearly they spoke English; the beautiful sounds of their singing and their great sense of reverence.

The Mescalero have a great sense of humor and a gift for making you feel at home.

I remember after 68 years, how their religious singing all night to the beat of the drum, stayed with me for days afterward.

Today on the approach of our mother's birthday, I remember with a grateful heart the kindness of the Mescalero Indians and I send up a prayer for them.

Today, also our mother's spirit and the spirits of all our loved ones are visiting me from Heaven, here in the Vale.

**Warm Weather**

Today on the 27th at 1:30 the temperature is 103. Clouds are moving in from the Southwest being called in by warm weather.

These sunny days make the children of Mother Earth look forward to the rains which are on their way.

Let us say a prayer, thanks to our good Lord for our many blessings.





On June 27, 1994, District Ranger Jerry Hawkes made a decision to implement Alternative A for ecosystem management within the Salado Subwatershed on National Forest system lands on the Smokey Bear Range District, located near Tucson Mountain and Indian Divide in Lincoln County, New Mexico. This alternative will implement: (1) fuelwood harvest on 435 acres; (2) mechanical grubbing of pinyon and juniper seedlings and saplings on 702 acres; (3) chemical

control of encroaching pinyon and juniper seedlings and saplings on 38 acres and chemical treatment of alligator juniper stump sprouts in previously harvested fuelwood areas on 610 acres; (4) light thinning of pinyon and juniper seedlings and saplings to create ground fuels on approximately 300 acres, followed by prescribed fire on 1,170 acres; (5) light thinning on 858 acres; (6) gully rehabilitation on approximately four miles of structures; (7) the redesign of North Salado riparian area to better manage livestock use in the area, while still providing a viable water source; (8) fence construction around Lake Mountain meadow to control livestock during the growing season, and construction of a water development to serve wildlife and livestock; (9) elimination of approximately 0.2 miles of fence to avoid a wet meadow and 300 feet of fence to improve drainage, and improved surfacing and drainage on approximately 0.5 miles of fence to stabilize the riparian area; and (10) grazing systems for the Indian Divide allotment from its current regime (one pasture, yearlong grazing) to a deferred rotations

grazing system, and includes structural improvements include 4.5 miles of fence reconstruction, three miles of new fence construction, installation of a well with a windmill, installation of a 22,000 gallon storage tank, two miles pipeline construction (with installations of three troughs), cleaning three existing stock tanks, and installation of a cattle guard. This alternative will be scheduled for implementation over the next ten years, starting in 1994.


Entries in the parade must be at the grounds by 8:30 a.m. so that the parade can begin as scheduled.
