Hospital board considers hiring docs

The meetings of the not-for-profit, private health care company are not subject to the state open meetings law. Miller called the newspaper after Presbyterian Health Care Systems, which contracts with the County Commission to operate the hospital (LCMC), was contacted by a representative of the American Association of Hospitals. The News had talked to Bill Erwin, the Washington D.C.-based media relations spokesman for the association, asking for information about safe harbor provisions under the Health Care Programs: Fraud and Abuse, Anti-Kickback Statute. The rule, passed in 1991 and amended in 1993, established safe harbors or exceptions to the rules in 10 broad areas, including sales of practice, management contracts, referral services and practitioner recruitment. Miller said she had not mentioned the hiring plan in a previous interview with The News, because she wanted to broach it first with physicians. "The reason we discussed this in executive session was that it is such a change in some ways for the hospital, I felt it needed to be communicated very carefully," Miller said. She disclosed the information to

the hospital's medical committee two weeks ago and was scheduled to meet with department managers last Tuesday. "Most small rural hospitals and even some large ones in urban areas are finding it necessary to employ primary care physicians," Miller said. "In rural settings, this enables a physician to remain in practice where the volumes otherwise don't equal (a sufficient financial return). "What we discussed in the executive session was that employment would be an alternative to private practice, because it's very hard to compete with HMOs (health management organizations) snapping up primary care physicians." Miller said the licensing of new primary care physicians will not meet the demand until the year 2015. "There's a tremendous shortage, so those available are being offered \$115,000, \$120,000 to come to some hospitals," she said. "I've offered \$110,000 and haven't receive one call. It makes it difficult for a rural hospital to recruit or retain physicians. I've been aggressively recruiting an internist for nine months. One of the problems was no hospital employment as an alternative. Private practice is not worth it, except for specialists, such as surgeons and cardiologists. "The income for a primary physician is disproportionately low compared to their technical and procedural colleagues. Miller told The Ruidoso News

Maddox named chief

Lanny Maddox of Loma-Grande was appointed Ruidoso police chief last Friday by village manager Gary Jackson. Maddox replaces Richard Swenor who resigned from his post to pursue a different career. Maddox is a graduate of the Federal Bureau of Investigations (FBI) National Academy in Quantico, Virginia, and holds the state's highest police certification, executive level.

Jackson said that Maddox has had 16 years of law enforcement experience, including the past 10 years with the Ruidoso Police Department as a detective. Maddox is certified to instruct in several areas of law enforcement training. He has helped win Inter-

national Crime Stoppers Awards in 1991, 1992 and 1993 for an outstanding program while serving as coordinator of the Ruidoso-Lincoln County Crimestoppers, Inc. Jackson said the appointment of Maddox culminates a selection process which included an assessment center, analysis of experience, education and training, and an interview with Jackson. Jackson said the initial objectives in the new chief's administration will include a commitment to public service and response to citizen needs; officer training and education; concentration on juvenile issues and coordination with the Ruidoso Municipal School District; and community relations and public educations programs.

School's juvenile daycare center remains homeless

For a moment, the Ruidoso School District appeared to be close to choosing a site for its new juvenile day treatment center. Superintendent Mike Gladden and support services director Paul Wirth viewed several possibilities Wednesday. But Thursday morning, a pile of pamphlets from the state were plunked on Wirth's desk, containing a seemingly endless list of facilities requirements. "We've actually taken a step backwards since I reported to the board Wednesday," Wirth told The Ruidoso News. "We'll have to go back and look at each one again with all of these factors in mind." During a special noon meeting Wednesday, the school board approved the program portion of a

contract with the state for the treatment center. Using \$150,000 appropriated for the project by the New Mexico State Legislature earlier this year, the district aims to create a center to provide a valid educational experience for students who disrupt regular classrooms. Wirth said first priority for placement in the center will go to Ruidoso district students, but those from Capitan will be put on a waiting list and allowed to fill slots as they become vacant. Whether a fee could be charged to those out of district students is uncertain, he said. Board member James Paxton suggested Wirth line up a portable unit as backup for an August opening, in case the problems with finding a building continue. Please see School's, page 2A

Lincoln County auctions surplus property

Heavy piles of bulky pipes, cattleguards, culverts and bridges in the Lincoln County Road Department yard at Capitan are scheduled to be moved to the county's rural events center in Glencoe for a surplus material sale.

Critics question the financial wisdom of moving the items when the sale scheduled for July 30 could have been conducted at the yard.

But County Commissioner Wilton Howell defended the decision.

"The center is more centrally located for buyers coming in from Roswell," he said. "The highway (U.S. 70) is a main thoroughfare and someone is there at the center all of the time to handle people who may want to view the merchandise."

Howell said he is confident that the cost of transporting the items will be recouped through the sale.

"We have better exposure at the center," he said. "And it's not going to be that great an effort to move this stuff. It's a molehill of items. Let's not make it a mountain."

Howell said previous sales always have been conducted in Capitan.

"Maybe it's time for the people in this area to have a break," he said. "I feel this will be the best sale we've ever had. And God forbid we have a nice auction and people see the center and might want to come back and put on their own equipment show there."

Heaps of scrap iron at the road yard will be hauled directly to the smelter in El Paso or a dealer in Alamogordo, Howell said.


"This was a management decision made while our former manager (Andy Wynham) was here," he noted. "The commission did not vote on it. But we expect a lot of participation. Signs will go up down there soon and the auctioneer we

selected has a big following." Road manager Bill Cupit said about 50 cattleguards, three bridges, 16 culverts and three cords of pine are among the items that will head to Glencoe.


They will be transported by a lowboy, a large platform used to transport tractors, which gets about five miles to a gallon of gas. Items not sold must be moved within 48 hours. The round trip from Capitan to Glencoe and back is about 70 miles.

Cupit said he was given a couple of days to complete the moving effort and that equipment will be required at both ends to load and unload.

Other items that will be able to drive the miles on their own include an ambulance and several county vehicles.

Lost llama found

Compo, a llama owned by Patric Carlisle, found its way to the home of Linda and Herb Turck on White Mountain after it escaped from a bear late Saturday night. Owner Carlisle said the bear broke down his fence and attacked the llama. The animal had several bite marks on its hindquarters and a back problem. Turck said he was talking to a neighbor about bears when he saw the llama walking up the street toward him. Carlisle uses llamas for pack animals on touring treks in the Lincoln National Forest.

Lightning blamed for fire

Lightning apparently caused a brush fire near Alto Village Monday afternoon.

Area firefighters confined the blaze to three-quarters of an acre with no loss of structure or injury to nearby residents.

At approximately 3:30 p.m., Bill Tucker of the United States Forest Service spotted the smoke from Monjeau Lookout. A passing helicopter from the Bureau of Indian Affairs also saw the smoke and dropped two firefighters for the initial attack.

Bonito Fire Department and the USFS responded to the end of Sunrise Drive in Alto Village to vacant property owned by Featherstone Farms of Roswell. The fire also burned a small portion of adjacent state land.

Firefighters found dry grass, pine needles and timber burning rapidly, fanned eastward by winds estimated at 10 to 15 miles per hour. They contained the fire within minutes, spending the next

three hours putting out hot spots. Several checks all day Tuesday assured the fire was indeed out.

This fire burned near the site of another fire two years ago that firefighters suspected had been human-caused. However, a senior fire official felt sure this fire was lightning-caused. He pointed to the top of a 35-foot conifer whose top had been blown out and the bark peeled and twisted all the way down.

"That's a typical lightning strike pattern," he said.

Another firefighter noted that tree showed evidence of a previous strike years ago. "This disproves the adage that lightning does not strike twice in the same place," he said.

Fire officials caution visitors and locals alike that the entire state remains under fire restrictions from the USFS and the New Mexico State Forestry. "Fire danger is extremely high."

"We can work it out, but I do want to tell everyone that we appreciate the help from the community, people calling with suggestions," Wirth said.

District business manager Caron Snow said the district will receive a cash advance for the program instead of having to file for periodic reimbursements.

In other business, the board called for bids on a sprinkler system and kitchen equipment for the new Sierra Vista Primary. Gladden explained that kitchen items are being bid as backup to determine whether the best prices are offered through an agency on federal contract to provide such equipment.

The board also is seeking bids

for the seats to cover the visitors side bleachers at Horton Stadium. Gladden said a recent quote offered on the item was much too high at \$14,000.

The district is seeking bids on either a 1995 white Suburban or a 1993-94 with less than 20,000 miles that exceeds the specifications.

The board approved the employment recommendations of Dick Felts to replace Rob Lovett as band director. He has 34 years of band experience. Principal Ron Hodges said of the half dozen candidates interviewed, he "came across the best."

Lisa Vasquez was hired as gifted education teacher before the board went into a closed-to-the-public session on pending litigation.

"I discussed with the board about that becoming an alternative in Ruidoso, because I think we possibly could lose (already established primary care doctors), if not now in the foreseeable future, because they're getting the same offers as the new physicians."

Association spokesman Erwin said offering incentives and subsidies is nothing new in the industry.

"The idea of offering guaranteed income and low rent facilities has been going on for at least 10 years as an incentive to attract particular specialties," Erwin said Monday.

"But some hospitals are purchasing physician practices outright as a way of tying the physicians and their patients to their hospital."

Erwin said a hospital would be in danger of violating the anti-trust laws if a doctor was forbidden entry to a hospital, yet was equally as qualified as others practicing there, or if the hospital offered incentives to one and not others.

Purchasing the practices of physicians is not part of Miller's proposal, although she recommended buying the doctor's medical equipment and renting the building, furniture and fixtures they own and are using.

Miller said the advisory board after the executive session voted to offer the alternative to keep physicians in Lincoln County.

"The response I've heard here has been on the whole supportive, because if they lose a primary care physician, they lose referrals, especially if they're a specialty," Miller said.

She explained that in managed care (under health care plans), a patient has to go to a primary physician for referral to a specialist.

The proposed staff alternative is open to all physicians in the area, Miller said.

"It's open to all. They can discuss it with me," she said. "But like any employer, we have the option of employing or not employing."

She said while some contact has occurred with a few primary care physicians, no specialists have shown an interest.

"We're certainly not the first hospital in New Mexico or nationally (to consider the alternative)," Miller said. "It's all over the place. We're just slower getting started."

Although Miller said the program is not a subsidy, she acknowledged that during the first year, it may amount to that.

"Is it a subsidy? It may be the first year until we realize the efficiency," she said. "But over the long haul, I don't think it will cost the county."

Certainly, it would cost less to retain a physician already in the area compared to recruiting a new one, she noted.

"When you run more through a fixed overhead, the cost of a practice goes down and break even is more likely than an individual trying to practice on his/her own," Miller said.

"In large cities, you'll find very few individuals left in practice by themselves."

Loveless Hospital and Medical Center in Albuquerque is comprised totally of employed physicians, she said.

The Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minnesota, is an example of a large employed model, where physicians are paid a base amount and incentives are tied to revenue they generate.

"The harder they work, the more opportunity to earn more income," she said, but added that the hospital retains its review process to

ensure unnecessary procedures are not ordered.

Miller said she suggested to the advisory board that compensation for physicians hired by LCMC be tied to gross billings.

"If you do it on the net collected, then non-paying patients may be eliminated from a practice. Access should remain the same to all patients," Miller said.

She has not determined the number of physicians that may be brought on board through the new system.

"I have no fixed number," Miller said. "I have a couple interested now. If we are successful with an internist, that would be another."

In addition to a secure bottom line, the system could offer less paperwork and more free time for a physician.

"It offers the ability to come in and see patients, do their records and go home," Miller said. "The administrative nightmare of private practice is gone. They now are spending an inordinate number of hours in managing their practices. That makes them less productive. They could see more patients."

Miller's proposal to the advisory board suggested that employee benefits for physicians include malpractice insurance, 35 days of paid time off and \$2,500 for education and dues.

Internal medicine and family practices are the worst of the different types of practices when it comes to paperwork, she said.

"With orthopedics, it's less difficult, because there are fewer numbers of diagnoses," Miller said. "But in internal medicine or family practices, the way they write the bill is different for every patient. There are primary and secondary problems."

Patients shouldn't notice any difference, if the new arrangement is

enacted, Miller said.

As to possibly violating the safe harbor provisions, Miller said she checked very carefully before proposing the plan.

"I'm very cautious about what we do," she said. "I would never violate our Medicare provider designation or not-for-profit standing under the Medical Fraud and Abuse standards."

"It would jeopardize the whole hospital if we make a mistake."

In 1990 when she took over as administrator, the hospital was a half million dollars in the hole and had just lost three physicians.

"It doesn't take much to find yourself back in that position," Miller noted.

Howell said while he wants to keep a strong hospital, he doesn't think the administration should rush into a new arrangement.

"I think Valerie's estimate that it will cost \$90,000 the first year is conservative," Howell said. "The salary and benefits are not the whole picture. She's talking about renting their buildings and taking on their staffs, buying their equipment and she also wants to hire a practice manager (to handle the conversion, manage the practices, manage the Carrizozo Health Center and coordinate visiting specialty clinics)."

"It's my belief that the (revenue from a special property tax levy allocated to the hospital each year) is not for experiments. It's primarily for capital outlay. I know we've varied from that some, but not for a subsidy for doctors."

He noted that a budget already has been approved for the year and an item like this should have been included.

"Where is the money for it coming from: from Lincoln County, from Presbyterian?" he asked. "There are a lot of unanswered questions."

Firefighters continue battle against wildfires throughout the region

A series of fires broke out in the mountains around Lincoln County over the holiday weekend and most still were blazing Monday morning.

Blazes flared at the Stallion Base of White Sands Missile Range, in the Patos Mountains near White Oaks and at the east end of the

Capitan Mountains.

"The big one is in the Patos, a couple miles directly east of White Oaks and was started Thursday by lightning," said Peg Crim, spokesman for the U.S. Forest Service, which is supervising the fire fighting effort.

"About 600 people are involved and 4,500 acres. We established a line last night and now are burning between the line and the fire to eliminate any fuel. This fire burned into the Big Rocks fire further east."

"We're trying to get helicopters

in to burn islands of fuel still left. They drop pingpong type balls with combustibles inside."

Three different fires were reported Friday and Saturday, one covering more than 200 acres, still were burning Monday in the

Capitans.

"The big one is at the head of the Poncho and Torrez Canyons near Capitan Peak," Crim said. "We let it burn the last couple of days, because we had no available resources. The Smokey Bear Hit

shots will be down in today. But it's pretty steep terrain."

A spokesman for the federal BLM said lightning from thunderstorms Saturday ignited 16 fires within the bureau's Roswell district. Ten still are uncontained.

Cherokee survives to take her place as some lucky family's pet

She greets everyone like a long lost friend, full of affection and an eagerness for life.

Maybe her joy comes from her two close brushes with death in her brief 14 weeks on earth.

Cherokee, a slimy-built black and gray Australian shepherd with narrow muzzle and white eyelashes, was found wandering alone on the highway near Mesalero.

A good Samaritan brought her to the Lincoln County Humane Society animal shelter. The timing wasn't good, because a wave of the deadly disease, Parvo, was sweeping through the puppies.

But Cherokee survived and now has received all of her protective shots.

"She just loves attention and doesn't know a stranger," said shelter manager Esther Harper. "She's smart as a whip and, as young as she is, could be trained

easily." Cherokee was taken to Walmart the weekend before last for a Saturday visit with shoppers, as part of a public awareness campaign and a chance to hand out educational literature.

One of the more attractive blue heeler mixes at the shelter, Levi is heavily flecked with gray and is about 1 1/2 years old.

"He's one who gets along with almost any animal one on one," Harper said. "But if he's in a bigger crowd, he wants to be top dog."

Levi was brought in with another dog by an owner who wanted to get rid of both like pieces of used furniture.

In the feline room, stop to see One-Eyed Jack, a luxurious long hair black cat who was hit by a car and lost one eye. A volunteer took him to a local veterinarian who removed the eyeball, performed a second procedure to take care of a chipped bone and then spayed Jack at the same time.

The Duns say they are not radical environmentalists, but they do believe in developing an awareness of ecology.

"We aren't rabid tree huggers," said Chuck, "but we try to be con-

scious of people's effect on the environment. There's a balance."

Chuck said there are some encouraging signs of progress in our care for the planet. He read that our air is cleaner than it was in the 1970's and that the life span is five years longer.

Nature's Gifts is largely supplied by the Nature Company and Natural Wonders Cooperative, giving them a variable and eclectic inventory.

So far their reception in Ruidoso has been positive. Diane said they are discovering what people like and where their interests lie.

"There's been an increase in the popularity of nature related toys," she said. "It's something that challenges kids to explore and learn something."

"We think it's a healthier investment in their future than Rambo," said Chuck.

On the early morning of the twenty-eighth, the East wind brought in a light mist which soop-faded away as the sun began to heat up the mountain world.



The rodeo and parade have a special Apache charm and color — especially the children in the parade.

During the hot weather there is a gathering at lakes, pools and rivers to escape the heat.

You have to be very, very careful around the water. If you are out on a lake in a canoe, do not dive out to take a swim unless someone remains in the canoe. The breeze will blow the canoe away faster than you can swim.

I pray that you may have a safe and happy Fourth of July. Remember to fly the flag and pray for our country and let us pray for all people everywhere, that peace may soon bless the whole world.



As a Basket Maker, pine needles are my natural choice. What might seem like lawn clutter to others is basket art to me. Pine needle basketry is an ancient and universal craft. My grandmothers made pine needle baskets.
 In 1980 while in Florida, I learned to make the basic stitch and how to take care of a basket. My 20-year-old son's basket, made by her grandmother, was in superb condition, with only a few broken threads. I personally design and hand sew each basket sold by La Naturelle.
 My 1994 collection includes over 50 Old World and contemporary shapes. Each shape is named, often for the customer who gave me the idea, and each basket is numbered. Winner of Best of Show in 1993 from Artists, N.M., Arts Council in 1993, my customers have taken baskets home to England, Japan, Germany, Alaska, and Panama. Although you might think your basket will continue to dry, becoming lighter in color and stiffer as the points naturally break at the thread line, it will not damage the quality of your basket. Don't display in direct sunlight. To clean, wash with damp brush. If it loses its sheen or rigidity, a thin coat of varnish will restore its beauty and increase its life.

U S WEST'S RESPONSE TO STAFF MOTION TO ESTABLISH RULEMAKING

U S WEST Communications, Inc. ("U S WEST"), by and through its attorney, hereby submits its response to Staff Motion to Establish Rulemaking as requested by the State Corporation Commission's May 25 Order Establishing Deadline for Responses to Staff Motion.

U S WEST is in agreement with Staff that the request of the New Mexico State Tribune for the abbreviated dialing number 511 or another N11 dialing number should be held in abeyance. However, U S WEST believes that rulemaking at this time is premature and therefore requests that no action be taken to initiate a general rulemaking on the assignment and use of N11 numbers until the FCC has completed its deliberations in Docket 92-105. This will ensure that standards are national in scope and to the advantage of all customers throughout the United States. It will also have a significant impact on the question of whether rulemaking by this Commission is necessary and if so, exactly what such a rulemaking should consider.

L BACKGROUND

A. Limited Availability of N11 Numbers

There are only eight N11 numbers available for use — 211, 311, 411, 511, 611, 711, 811, and 911. In New Mexico, three of these are being used for public service-related types of access. 411 is used for Directory Assistance, 811 is used by customers for access into the business office to establish new telephone service, 1 and 911 is used for access to emergency services. Both 411 and 911 are, and have long been, universally recognized by the public in most states across the U S WEST region. Currently, four of the eight available N11 numbers are already being used for public service purposes throughout the U S WEST region.

To date, U S WEST has received approximately forty requests for N11 numbers, sixteen of which apply to New Mexico. Although some of these requests are on a regional basis, they request N11 numbers in every one of U S WEST's exchanges, which would include the New Mexico exchanges. U S WEST has carefully documented the receipt of each request for N11 numbers it has received and will continue to do so. Similarly, many requests are now before the FCC for N11 number assignments. If N11 numbers were assigned to these additional public service purposes, all of the available N11 numbers would then be assigned.

B. FCC and State Position

In response to a petition for declaratory ruling by Sprint Corporation, the FCC established Docket 92-105 which is currently pending to investigate and propose national guidelines and standards for the use of N11 codes and other abbreviated dialing arrangements. Subsequent to the FCC receiving Comments in Docket 92-105, the National Center for Law and Deafness and Telecommunications for the Deaf, Inc. filed a joint petition asking the Commission to direct assignment or reservation of uniform nationwide N11 numbers (511 and 711) for TRS, the National Association of State Telecommunications Directors and the Governor of Montana requested that an N11 number, such as 211, be assigned for use by state governments, and the General Services Administration requested an N11 code for use by the public for access to the services of the Federal Government.

To date, no state within the U S WEST region has approved requests for N11 numbers, citing in most instances the pending FCC docket as a reason for denying petitions, thus recognizing the need to resolve this issue at a national level.

II. COMMENTS ON PROPOSED RULEMAKING

A. Assignment of N11 for Public Service Use

U S WEST believes that the assignment of the remaining N11 numbers should be based on the functions provided through the use of the numbers, not on the entity or entities offering the services. For example, if 711 were assigned nationally for a specific function, such as for the hearing impaired, then hearing impaired telephone callers in New Mexico and across the United States, could obtain access to telecommunication relay services (TRS) by dialing 711, regardless of who was providing the service. This uniform application of N11 numbers on a functional basis throughout the national would be an efficient use of this limited resource and eliminate the customer confusion that would result if N11 numbers were assigned for diverse uses in different geographic areas by different network providers. U S WEST submits that it is this kind of example of public service use that N11 numbers should be reserved for, and U S WEST proposes national standards be established that support this use.

B. Establishment of National Guidelines

By establishing national guidelines, the public interest will be benefited by consistent use of N11 numbers that have traditionally been assigned and used for public service, such as 911 for emergency police, fire and medical services; 411 for directory assistance services; and in some states, 611 for telephone repair and 811 for access to telephone business offices. Because N11 numbers are a scarce and valuable resource, every effort should be made to ensure they are administered in a manner that will benefit the public-at-large. To require the use of N11 codes for anything other than public service use would be contrary to this public-at-large objective.

C. Alternative to N11 Numbers

A range of alternative should be considered, preferably at the national level, before rules are adopted which would allow or mandate N11 assignments for commercial use. For example, U S WEST urges the Commission to consider supporting the development of national telephone numbers in the form of 555-XXXX, which would accommodate the demands for abbreviated dialing, provide numbers for up to 10,000 ISPs, and alleviate the need to consider the assignment of N11 numbers for other than public service use.

III. CONCLUSION

U S WEST believes that N11 numbers should be

released only for national public service uses, determined by standards established nationally. By allowing the development of national guidelines surrounding the allocation, assignment, and recovery of N11 numbers, consistency across the country remains intact, customer confusion is kept to a minimum and N11 numbers are assigned that will clearly benefit the public.
