
WIPP tours are scheduled for 11 a.m. Tuesday, August 30, and Friday, September 2. Transportation is furnished to the site.

The News seeks community input

In the interest of assuring fairness, The Ruidoso News, under its new ownership, is seeking public members for two advisory panels to allow community residents to participate in news and editorial decisions made by the paper's managers.

WorldWest Limited Liability Company, which became the owner of The News in late June, is establishing an Editorial Page Advisory Board and a News Coverage Advisory Committee to allow community influence into news coverage and the editorial decision-making process.

"We've been impressed by the concerns area residents have for the newspaper — the way they deeply care about it — and also the criticisms they have of it. We hope that these advisory committees will help assure fairness and increase community respect," said Ralph Gage, WorldWest company secretary. Gage also noted that The News is implementing a series of questionnaires aimed at news story subjects, advertisers and readers, to offer a way for community residents to talk to the newspaper's management.

Gage and Dolph C. Simons III, one of the principal owners of WorldWest, were in Ruidoso in mid-July, meeting with community residents.

"We think Ruidoso is a tremendous place, and we were impressed with the sincerity and frankness of the people we met. They have a great affection for the community and want to be certain their newspaper shares it. We hope these steps reassure them about that, and we hope people are willing to volunteer their time, their interest and their expertise to help us demonstrate our commitment,"

Gage said.

The new Editorial Page Advisory Board will meet weekly. Members will discuss topics and perspectives for the editorials that will appear in The News. The newspaper will be represented by publisher Sammy Lopez, editor Frankie Jarrell, a newspaper staff member selected on a rotating basis, and two public members. The newspaper staff member will serve a 60-day term, with various departments represented through the rotation system. One of the first two individuals representing the public on the new board will serve a 60-day term and the other a 90-day term. Thereafter, public members each will be asked to serve for 90 days.

The News Coverage Advisory Committee will meet monthly with representatives of the newspaper's news staff to review and critique published stories and to suggest topics for future stories. Members of the committee will be selected in an attempt to assure a cross-section of representation by ethnic background, age, location where they live, and areas of expertise important to the communities the newspaper serves.

"We're seeking a diverse group, and as long as people are willing to participate, there's no predetermined limit on how long anyone can serve. We'll let the committee set some ground rules on that," Gage said.

Police enforce youth curfew

A little used Ruidoso juvenile curfew law will be strictly enforced beginning Monday, August 1, according to police chief Lanny Maddox.

Under village ordinance 6-5-1, parents can be cited for an appearance in Municipal Court if their child under the age of 18 violates the curfew.

Mayor Jerry Shaw recently said it was time to enforce the curfew and bring responsibility back to the parents.

The law prohibits minors to be present on any public thoroughfare or public place at any time between 10 p.m. and 5 a.m. Sunday through Thursday; and from midnight to 5 a.m. on Friday and Saturday of each week, unless accompanied by a parent or guardian.

The ordinance excludes a minor accompanied by a parent, guardian or adult acting with the authority of the parent or any minor upon an errand of necessity, or attending religious services, or any legitimate

show or athletic event.

Maddox said beginning today (Monday) officers will detain juveniles in curfew violations, and a new juvenile curfew violation form will be completed for the record. He said this will not be an arrest and no fingerprints or photos would be taken.

He said every effort will be made to immediately notify the juvenile's parents, advise them of the violation and arrange immediate response in picking up the child.

Maddox said if a car is involved, a parent will be asked to take possession of the car at the scene, but if a parent is not located, the car will be towed.

He said if parents or a legal guardian cannot be located, the child will be placed in custody of the Children, Youth and Family Division of the Department of Human Services for New Mexico.

Maddox said if a child has violated the curfew three times, his department will make a referral to the juvenile probation officer.

Alamo officials skip meeting to discuss Bonito Road redo

A miffed government contingent from Lincoln County walked out of a road meeting Thursday at U.S. Forest Service district headquarters after being stood up by Alamogordo city manager Bob Stockwell.

The meeting to discuss improvements of the road to Bonito Lake and dam was scheduled for 9 a.m. in Ruidoso, but no one from Alamogordo had arrived by 9:45 a.m.

Alamogordo is a significant part of the negotiations on the road, because the city operates the reservoir at Bonito, controls a water supply pipeline and owns a camp-

ground nearby.

Contacted Friday, Lincoln National Forest supervisor Jerry Hawkes said he had not spoken with Stockwell and didn't know why the Alamogordo manager and engineer hadn't attended the meeting.

The Ruidoso News could not reach Stockwell for comment.

County Commissioner Wilton Howell asked forest officials why the meeting was scheduled when the project still is short by about \$140,000.

The three entities have been negotiating for months on arrangements to rebuild the road and for future maintenance.

At the last session in April, they

generally agreed that Lincoln County would accept jurisdiction on the road, if the forest service and Alamogordo came up with enough money to rebuild it. The road also serves several camping areas in the forest.

"It's a minimum \$500,000 for the project and you all (forest service) have come up with \$200,000 and I think the city said \$160,000, so we're still \$140,000 short," Howell said. "I don't know why we're having a design meeting when we don't have the money."

County road manager Bill Cupit submitted an estimate \$160,000 higher than Howell's figure, using a

triple chip seal surface instead of hot asphalt to stretch the amount of miles that could be covered.

Hawkes suggested starting the road improvements and going as far as money lasts, but Howell said commissioners are not likely to accept responsibility for a road only partially finished.

Commission Chairman Monroy Montes said Alamogordo officials plan to tear up and patch part of the road anyway to install a new water pipeline.

"They need to coordinate the dollars they're going to spend patching the road with the full reconstruction of the road," Montes said. "It's a waste of money to spend \$100,000 of taxpayer dollars to patch it and we come back or the forest service and spend another \$300,000 doing their work all over again. It's a waste of money."

"That's the main reason for this meeting, because they're going to begin that work," said Geri Rivers, a forest service engineer handling the Bonito road project. "I know I wanted to come to some agreement about width and surfacing we're going to use and that sort of thing, so what work they do won't be something that we have to go back in and do it over."

"I think the question is what kind of road would we be willing to go in and take over," Howell said.

"It's hard for us to tell you what kind of road you should build."

Cupit told the representatives of the two entities that they should forget the project on the portion of the seven-mile road that has been under discussion and switch to the area around the dam.

"If you just forget what we're doing now up to the bottom of the dam, my concern now is from the bottom of the dam to the top of the dam," he said.

"If we work on the dangerous spots with the money this year, there may be some kind of commitment I could recommend that the road feels safe enough to be partners in it. But I don't know if I can get (commissioners) to commit to

anything unless we, number one, take care of the dangerous areas and you know the dam area is the main problem."

As it stands, commissioners only want to commit to taking the road from the bottom of the dam to the new part scheduled for improvements toward State Highway 37, not the whole road, he said.

"I won't advise the commission to take any part of any thing beyond the new part, even if we did build this road," Cupit said. "Where the new road ends, that would be where we end our maintenance."

Howell noted that Alamogordo to date hasn't pledged anything above and beyond what it already planned to do with the replacement of the water line.

"Alamogordo is going to spend \$160,000 for something we just have to tear up, so they're really not bringing anything new to the table," Howell said.

"That's work they would have been doing anyway on this project," Rivers agreed.

"So I guess you get to deliver that message," Howell said, noting that Stockwell and his staff were already a half hour late.

Cupit again emphasized the need for immediate improvements on the road around the dam for safety reasons.

"As road superintendent, I'm telling you we need to concentrate on that portion and forget the other for now," he said.

"I have no problem with that," Rivers said. "I would need some assurance that the county would be willing to take over jurisdiction of the road."

"The recommendation was to take it over when it's built and I don't see going against that recommendation," Howell said. "That was the agreement in the first place, that the whole road be done when it was turned over to us. Maintenance and repairs are going to be expensive."

He added that the forest service and Alamogordo also should contribute toward future resurfacing costs in about 10 years.

Commissioners gear up for long meeting

Pack a lunch and maybe, a dinner. The Lincoln County Commission meeting agenda for Tuesday is loaded with 14 items in the morning and includes two public hearings in the afternoon.

Commissioner Wilton Howell, chairman of the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority, will present a request from that agency for an increase in rates from \$5.25 to \$7.50 a month. The authority is a garbage collection and disposal coalition of the county and its five municipalities, but all rate in-

creases must be approved by the individual municipal and county boards.

Representatives of the county Fair Association are scheduled to ask commissioners to reimburse that organization for the cost of liability insurance.

A commissioner will be appointed to serve on the MRS (Monitored Retrievable Storage) Regional Information Committee headed by Ruidoso Mayor Jerry Shaw. The committee is tracking the progress of the Mescalero Apache Tribe is trying to construct a storage facility for high level

radioactive nuclear waste from power plants.

Howell, who serves on the Lincoln County Medical Center board, will give a report on that entity.

Public hearings are set to consider capital improvement planning projects and an ordinance creating a senior citizens olympics committee.

Also on the agenda in the afternoon, is a resolution calling for a special election for voters to consider the question of whether restaurant licenses for sale of wine and beer should be issued in an local option district in the

unincorporated area of the county.

County Clerk Martha Proctor said 2,353 voters are registered in the local option district. The total number of verified signatures required is five percent or 117. David Vigil submitted 120 verified signatures on July 20, within the three-month deadline.

Proctor wants to schedule the referendum with the general election on November 8 to save the \$6,000 cost of a separate election. The issue is being researched by officials with the state elections division.

Those who are nominating others should provide similar information about their nominee.

Gage said such advisory committees have worked well in other communities. He added that he and Lopez hope to have the panels established before the end of the month.

P&Z reviews plans for vacant King's building

An amended commercial site development request by artist Dave McGary, new owner of the King's building, leads a short Ruidoso planning and zoning agenda Monday.

McGary is moving his studio to the new Sudderth Drive location that consists of seven lots with about 498 feet of Sudderth frontage.

The property is improved with a commercial building of 13,136 feet commonly referred to as the "old King's building."

McGary is requesting approval to convert the building to a gallery, studio, offices and production facility for McGary Art Works, and to retain apartment use.

Renovation will include interior

remodeling, renovation of landscaping and paving of the parking lot area.

Village planner Cleatus Richards said foundry production activities will include sand blasting, metal work detailing, mounting and painting. He said staff recommends conditional use approval to allow those production activities.

Landscaping plans indicate 18 trees with a mix of fir and aspen will be added.

In other business, the commission will hear a preliminary and final plat request by R&F Inc., a joint venture partnership of Don Russell, Cheri Russell, Lloyd Fannon and Pamela Fannon.

The property contains 2.0376 acres and has been recommended

for R-1 single family zoning by the planning commission, with master plan amendment to allow low density residential development.

The village council has scheduled a public hearing on the rezoning August 9.

The owners were directed to work with the owners of Springs Condominiums to obtain access easement. All proposed lots exceed the minimum lot area and depth requirements (10,000 square feet and 100 feet respectively.)

Richards said the staff recommends approval of the preliminary plat with following variances: access Lot 7 via private easement; and frontage of 73 feet for Lots 3, 4 and 5.

A condition of approval is to re-

quire installations of sewer line extension for Lot 7 and water and sewer stubouts for all lots prior to final plan acceptance or provision of bond or certificate of deposit of guarantee of the improvements.

Under old business, the commission will continue to review a private septic request by Robert E. Kellerman, who lives on Cedar Creek Drive.

Carl Stubbs of the New Mexico Environmental Department (ED) approved use of the system to serve Kellerman's property.

Planner Richards said the ED letter satisfies questions raised by staff and that no site grading, utility extension or other improvements are involved. He said village council approval is required.

Free student physicals set

Free physicals will be available to student athletes at 7 p.m. Thursday, August 4, at the Ruidoso High School gymnasium.

Athletic coordinator Juan Baca said the physicals are open to all students who anticipate they will be participating in sports or other activities that require a physical.

Solid waste manager quoted in "World Waste" magazine

Joe Lewandowski, general manager of the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority, was quoted extensively in the July 1994 edition of "World Waste" magazine.

In an article on how natural disasters impact landfills and waste collection, Lewandowski said New Mexico's disasters were manmade in the form of lax regulations until a few years ago. Then when new tough rules were imposed, communities were thrown into crises with the closing of local landfills.

The authority managed by Lewandowski is a coalition of the county and its municipalities that joined forces to tackle the garbage problem and created a regional landfill with a similar group in Otero County.

LCMC finances are healthy

The Lincoln County Medical Center's financial health was pronounced sound last week during a meeting of the hospital board of trustees.

Administrator Valerie Miller said that excess revenue over expenses for the month was \$30,000 ahead of June 1993 and \$79,000 ahead of this time last year. The Carrizozo Health Centers are \$700 ahead of budget and Ruidoso Emergency Medical Services was \$8,000 ahead. Dr. Wolfel, chief of the medical staff, reported the resignation of two part time specialists. One has been replaced.

Feds review proposal to fund grass roots efforts to oppose nuclear waste storage

Residents of Lincoln County have a chance to tell the federal government what they think about temporary storage of radioactive waste and to suggest alternatives.

According to information from the Nuclear Information and Resource Service, not only are officials with the Department of Energy (DOE) soliciting public comments on the issue, they also are reviewing a proposal for financial assistance to grass roots groups to allow public participation in upcoming meetings.

The DOE has issued a Notice of Inquiry asking for feedback on the following questions:

—does the department have a legal obligation under the act to accept waste in 1998 in the absence of a repository or other facility?

—if so, should the department seek a release, in whole or part, of any liability arising out of such obligation as a condition of cost sharing?

—does there continue to be a need for a federal or centralized interim storage facility prior to repository operations?

—should the development of an interim spent nuclear fuel storage facility at an existing federal site be pursued?

—what role, if any, should the department play in the development of private interim storage facilities (called Monitored Retrievable Storage or MRS)?

—if the department is successful in making available central interim storage, should each utility have the option to pursue continued storage on-site or elsewhere?

—should the department pursue with Congress the elimination of the existing restrictions on MRS siting, construction and operations?

The written comment period for affected parties ends September 22. Residents and visitors to Lincoln County fall into that category since the neighboring Mescalero Apache Tribe currently is working under a private agreement with 33 nuclear

power utilities to study and then establish an interim storage site on its reservation in Otero County.

Specifically, the department wants feedback on its preliminary view that it doesn't have a statutory obligation to accept spent nuclear fuel in 1998 in the absence of an operational repository or a suitable storage facility constructed under the Nuclear Waste Policy Act of 1982 as amended.

Included as part of the notice was a statement that, although comments are being sought, the Department remains committed to pursuing the permanent disposal of spent nuclear fuel and developing a strategy to address its interim storage.

The Nuclear Waste Policy Act of 1982 required owners and generators of spent nuclear fuel and high-level waste to pay fees into the Nuclear Waste Fund sufficient to ensure the full-cost recovery of all program expenditures (\$3-billion collected to date). The act set a deadline of January 31, 1998 for

the Energy Secretary to dispose of the wastes.

A summary of majority findings from a series of meetings of the National Association of Regulatory Utility Commissioners (NARUC), indicates that they favor centralized off-site interim storage of spent fuel at federally-owned facilities, instead of on-site storage at reactor sites.

"The federal government should take immediate action to establish centralized interim storage capability by 1998, including the commencement of an effort to develop such capacity at one or more federal sites," members of NARUC wrote.

Cali, the calico cat, is looking for a home

An intriguing and attractive Persian mix, Cali the calico cat lost her home when her owners moved to a complex that didn't allow pets.

"My answer when I hear things like that is to find another place, if you love your pet," said Esther Harper, manager of the Lincoln County Humane Society animal shelter. "Of course, there are some cases, especially with the elderly when they have to move to a nursing facility, but for many others, they just don't care that much. For the animal, it could be a death sentence."

"I'm the one who has to point to a dog or cat and say it's time to put it down. It was one of our worst months in June, and 40 dogs lost their lives. That's just a drop when you look at some of the other larger communities nearby that kill 800 to 900 a month. People have to realize what it really means for an animal when they abandon it, what hap-

pens to the dog or cat that has been their companion.

"It doesn't take a great mathematician to figure you're going to run out of homes very quickly with 15 dogs and 45 cats born for every human being.

"Permanent sheltering of a dog is not a humane solution, because they are social animals and need a family, and neither is euthanasia. The only real answer is spaying and neutering to control breeding."

Cali is lucky, because she already is spayed and that increases her chances of being adopted by reducing the fee.

"She's litter trained, can live indoors, is good with dogs and children and even likes to ride in a car," Harper said of the four-year-old female. "She's not as good with other cats, her owners said, but she's done all right here."

Bagel, a fluffy ivory pup with two tan spots, has been living in the shelter for six weeks. As one of

a litter of nine unwanted pups brought to the society when they were six weeks old, he appears to be a Golden retriever mix. One sibling was adopted, two buff colored ones and a black and white brother are left. Four died before their protective shot series was complete.

She is not new to the business. She has been a hairdresser/cosmetologist for 11 years. She worked as an Educational Consultant for Matrix Essentials, teaching coloring, perming and skin care to the other salons all over Alaska.

"I learned an incredible amount from Matrix. It was like going to grad school and getting paid for it. The two former owners that I worked for were great role models and decided my next step in this business would be to own my own salon," comments Garner-Dean.

Staff members at the Look try to stay with ammonia- and peroxide-free colors and use a Shine Intense Conditioning Treatment to revitalize hair that has been damaged by the climate or by the water. Dressing gowns are provided for those receiving color and perms to prevent damage to clothing if the customer desires them.

"We currently have five styling stations and a nail station. In the works are plans to have two massage therapists on board in their own rooms upstairs, which has an accompanying bathroom; plus there will be a massage chair for an upper body massage," Garner-Dean says. "The facial room will also be upstairs," she points out.

Asked what services are offered now, Garner-Dean is quick to say that coloring, perms, spiral perms, eyebrow waxing and arching, pedicures, therapeutic hand bath manicures, make-up lessons, as well as cuts and traditional sets, are all a part of the day-to-day routine.

Prices are comparable to other local salons and yes, men, they do cut hair. A VIP card is given to regulars whereby the sixth visit is free and a \$5 gift certificate is redeemable when a referral mentions that they have been sent by you.

"We are in the process of preparing a menu of salon services," Garner-Dean says.

"Currently, the shop is open from 9:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Tuesday through Saturday, and by appointment, we will come in earlier or later. We also encourage walk-in clients to come see us," says Garner-Dean. Plans are under way to open Mondays, also, with the same hours.

"It is a fun business because you help people feel good about themselves and that raises their self-esteem," says Garner-Dean.

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Ruidoso Downs leases senior center to county to serve as meal site

After raising funds for years to build their own senior citizens center, members of Ruidoso Downs Ladies Auxiliary were on hand last week to oversee the transfer of the center to the county.

County Commissioner L. Ray Nunley and Zia Senior Center

director Cheryl LaBelle presented the agreement and the Downs board approved it during the regular meeting, but not before the auxiliary members were reassured that the center still belongs to the village.

Auxiliary members and village trustees were told they'll still be able to use the center for special

events.

Commissioner Nunley said the lease agreement with the Downs is patterned after the agreement the county has with the Catholic church in San Patricio.

The county's lease makes it possible for the center to serve as a meal site for delivered and congregate meals. Right now funding,

through the Area Agency on Aging, only provides for delivered meals, but plans include adding site meals next year, according to LaBelle.

Nancy Arias, director of this region for the Area Agency on Aging, explained the funding process. This year's allocation, \$66,512, allows for a full-time site manager and operating expenses.

Currently, the Ruidoso Downs program delivers meals three times a week to 36 people. During two of those deliveries, a frozen meal also is delivered for the next day, making five meals a day for the homebound clients.

Arias said it will take a budget of \$80,000 to add congregate meals.

She also revealed plans to add a brown bag breakfast program, where sack meals for the next day are delivered with the lunches.

The breakfast program, too, will depend on funding from the state. Clients who can are encouraged to make a donation for their meals, with suggest amounts ranging from about \$1.25 to \$2 or so.

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
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

Puller and Thunder will be fighting Wednesday at the Tingley Coliseum in Albuquerque on a card that features flyweight dandy Danny Romero.

Thunder will fight George O'Mara, Van Nuys, California, (14-12-3, 9 KOs) in a 10 rounder.

Puller takes on John Heirenclaw from Phoenix, (7-1) in an eight-round event.

The first bout begins at 7:30 p.m.

Weathers said he has been a boxing promoter for the past 20 years and his dream will not be complete until he brings home a heavyweight champion of the world.



Specially Fast beats classy field in the World Championship Classic Sunday

Trainer Dwayne "Sleepy" Gilbreath and jockey Bruce Filkenton captured the Grade I \$52,785 World's Championship Classic for the second straight year when the powerful gelding Specially Fast got up at the wire for a neck triumph over a classy field of older quarter horses, Sunday at Ruidoso Downs.

Gilbreath and Filkenton teamed to win last year's classic with World Champion Refrigerator for owner James Helzer who also co-owns Specially Fast with Six G's Stables, David Gibson et. al.

"When we were going to the gates I told Arnold (assistant trainer Arnold Perkins) you know, it's a lot different going to the gates when you're not on 'The Fridge'."

Filkenton was speaking of last year's classic when Refrigerator

dominated a talented field by an impressive 1 1/4-length win.

"But I felt very confident in this horse after the trials and he's been good to us all year. He broke good and was right there with the pack, then he dug in at the end and got by them," said Filkenton.

In the 440-yard dash, Specially Fast broke fourth from the rail past position and was less than a length behind early leader Royal Down Dash.

Midway through the race, the running order remained unchanged as Royal Down Dash continued to lead Yawls Rabbit by a head, with Femmes Frolic in third.

Nearing the wire, Specially Fast inched closer to the leaders then forged to the lead with 50 yards to go and held on for the narrow win.

The time was :21.83.

Specially Fast has won three of four starts this year with his only setback being a third place performance in the July 21 trials.

"In the trials he kind of got bumped right out of the gate and then Bruce just got hold of him and let him run his own race because we only had to outrun two horses (to qualify)," said Gilbreath.

Specially Fast qualified to three Grade I stakes last year, but failed to win any of those races. This year is a different story as the gelding now has two grade one wins and a grade three to his credit.

"We believe he's getting better all summer and this is the best race he's run all year," said Gilbreath.

Retired couple wins \$59,000

Ted and Nora McCoy, of Granbury, Texas, came to Ruidoso Downs to win a the pickup truck giveaway to be held after the races, but along the way they ended up winning \$59,102 as the lone winners of the largest twin trifecta jackpot of the season, Sunday at Ruidoso Downs.

The McCoy's, who also have a summer home in Ruidoso, chose the correct trifecta combination in the third race and had one shot at repeating their luck in the fourth race. The wager challenges bettors to pick the first three finishers in

both the third and fourth races. The twin trifecta wager had gone unsolved for eight straight race days before the McCoy's came to town.

There were 144 winning exchanges from the third race, but the McCoy's were the only one's able to win the fourth.

"I let him pick one and I picked the other two," said Mrs. McCoy. "I picked the four and three horses (winner Cigliano and third place finisher Mr. Saturday Dance) and he picked the eight (runner-up It's Brandy N Ice)," she added.

McCoy, a retired railroad

engineer, said he boxed the first three finishers in the third race and felt confident in his chances in the fourth.

"I was calm and cool, I just sweated a lot." His wife had a little more trouble handling the excitement.

"I'm not over it yet. I almost fainted."

The McCoy's lived in Fort Worth for most of their lives before moving to Granbury, located 60 miles southwest of Fort Worth, five years ago. They plan on using their winning to pay off their summer home.

Leisure Kite cruises past Thirty One Special to win \$12,700 Ruidoso Oaks

Richard Allen Miller's Leisure Kite broke alertly, relaxed along the backstretch, then wore down pacesetter Thirty One Special in deep stretch to post a 3/4-length victory in the \$12,700 Ruidoso Oaks Handicap, Saturday at Ruidoso Downs.

Leisure Kite had made three of her last five starts against some of the top male handicap performers in New Mexico and was sent of the 8-5 favorite in the 12-horse field of 3-year-old fillies.

The California-bred daughter of Shanekite broke right with the early leaders at the start of the mile contest, but was content to lay fourth as the field entered the backstretch. Under a patient ride by veteran jockey Gilbert Villegas, the filly improved her position to third as pacesetter Thirty One Special with jockey Eric Perner edged clear from 3-1 second choice Count-

ess Blue with less than a half-mile to run. In the turn, Villegas went to the whip and Leisure Kite responded to move within four lengths of the rapidly tiring Thirty One Special.

Down the lane the two fillies hooked up in a stretch duel, but Leisure Kite had more left at the wire as she got up for her third career stakes triumph.

The Doyal Roberts-trained covered the distance in 1:42.1.

Villegas, who scored his second stakes win of the summer, said he was surprised when Leisure Kite broke so close to the lead.

"She's never up that close, but she broke so quick that when I took hold of her she wanted to go on and she was pretty rank going down the backside. When she got to the turn, she started quitting so I really got into her and I didn't think I'd catch her (Thirty One Spe-

cial) 'til the last sixteenth."

"I think if she'd relaxed at the start she would've won easier, but she ran a real pretty race," added Villegas.

The win moved Leisure Kite's career bankroll near the \$45,000 plateau with the \$7,620 winner's share of the purse. As a 2-year-old the filly won the Sunland Juvenile Breeder's Cup Mile and Sunland Fall Futurity in El Paso for owner Miller who resides in Ropesville, Texas, a suburb of Lubbock.

Thirty One Special, who resides in the Kathie Jermain barn, earned \$2,794 for owner Jim Archer of El Paso.

Karat Country, ridden by Charles Rollings for trainer Ray Billingsley, picked up \$1,270 for third. The filly is owned by Beverly Billingsley and Brent Haskins of Sunland Park.

Mountain men to rendezvous with cavalry at Old Lincoln

Mountain men will rendezvous right next to the cavalry and the cowboys during Old Lincoln Days Friday through Sunday, August 5-7, in Lincoln.

These 20th century mountain men and soldiers are recalling a tradition that dates back to the early to mid-19th century.

During the shortlived Fur Trade Era in the old west, all the trappers, voyagers, traders and mountain men would gather once or twice a year at what they called the rendezvous.

Historians say those get-togethers — rendezvous — were a time of plenty. It was a time when traders from the east and south would offer items like knives, guns, blankets, rope, sinew, fabric, liquor and other necessities to the trappers and mountain men in trade for furs.

In 1840, the last rendezvous

took place. It marked the end of the Fur Trade Era and the end of the mountain men, according to a news release.

This year's Billy the Kid celebration in Lincoln, marks the beginning of another tradition with the addition of a recreated mountain man rendezvous and encampment next to the cavalry and cowboy encampment (1840 to 1885).

Dave Berge and Kary Anderson, both of Ruidoso, brought together 10 historians and mountain men from all over New Mexico. Their goal is to bring the history of the mountain man to 20th century people as accurately as possible.

"When you enter the encampment, you step back in time — to a time before 1840 — when the country's first settlers, the mountain men, lived among the animals out in the wild," reads a release provided by the organizers.

"As you pass through the encampment, you enter another era — that of the Cavalry and the cowboy."

Each of the 10 mountain man encampments represents a different group of traders, with historical talks on blacksmithing, musical instruments, bead work, silverwork, leatherwork, spurs, gunsmithing, food, clothing, guns, spurs and knives. Some of the items are authentically reproduced, and some are actually authentic. All items are for sale.

Plans for next year include expanding the mountain man encampment to about 20 camps.

Organizers say it is not only entertaining, but informative and educational. Plenty of opportunities will be offered for guests to question the campers in old Lincoln on any topic of the fur trade, cavalry or cowboy eras.

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SBA tells entrepreneurs how to get financing

A packed room of potential entrepreneurs listened Monday to a free information seminar jointly sponsored by the Small Business Administration and the Ruidoso State Bank.

Garner Young, assistant district director of finance and investment for the Small Business Administration (SBA), explained the LowDoc Program and the Pragmatized Program for women-owned businesses.

Young told the crowd of about 50 women that loans were not made without risk to the borrower, so they should think very hard on whether or not they want to start a business and if that business is a good idea.

He said the 12-state pilot program is designed to streamline applications and provide quick response to loan requests of \$250,000 or less to women-owned (51 percent or more) and managed businesses.

Young said not many loans are for less than \$10,000.

He said the SBA LowDoc program is for small business loans of \$100,000 or less.

A LowDoc loan carries an SBA guarantee of up to 90 percent of the loan. The applicant completes the front of a one-page SBA application; the lender completes the back. He said lenders may require additional information.

The necessary steps Young outlined for the pre-qualified program include preparation of the loan application with a nonprofit intermediary like Gene Simmons of Small Business Development Center in Roswell. An application and business plan is then submitted to the SBA.

After receiving a commitment letter from SBA (a week to 10 days), a participating bank is located. If the bank wants to participate, it fills out a form to submit to the SBA.

Young said the primary considerations are: willingness to pay debts indicated by a good credit history; expected earnings will be sufficient to pay obligations; and the

business has a good chance for success.

The necessity to submit a proper business plan dominated most of the morning meeting at the Texas-New Mexico Power conference room.

Young told attendees they were risking their money just like the bank or the SBA, and their money may have been harder to gain.

He said equity, unborrowed money, is required for the new business and can be cash or property if property is a part of that business.

He gave examples of computers and file cabinets as legitimate property equity in a computer business; or mechanics tools and testing machines as equity in a mechanic's shop.

Several women asked if they would qualify if they were joint owners in a business with their husband.

Young said New Mexico is a community property state. By law, a husband and wife doing business together are entitled to 50 percent

each. He said a woman wanting to expand the business from a particular angle would be better to reorganize to split the efforts.

He said types of business not eligible for SBA loans are those engaged in speculations or investment in real estate or organized as nonprofit.

Eugene Simmons, director of the small business development center in Roswell, said a business plan can be worked through his offices without charge.

He said anyone contemplating a business, but not ready, should take advantage of learning about business plans at the earliest date in order to be better prepared when seeking a loan through the bank.

Maximum interest rates lenders may charge are the prime rate plus 2.25 percent over seven years and 2.75 percent over seven years. Different loan amounts demand different rates.

Like Mother Nature's television spectacle...



Old Lincoln Days

In forty-sixth year

The first weekend in August will see the forty-sixth birthday of Old Lincoln Days.

In 1940, local celebrations were held all over New Mexico to celebrate our state's four hundredth birthday or "Cuarto Centennial," going back to Spanish times.

In Lincoln County, Wilbur Coe, president of the Lincoln County Historical Society, and his wife, Louise, started "A Day in Old Lincoln."

This was a day honoring the pioneers of Lincoln County and the entire Southwest.

In those days, there were many of the old-timers who reached back to the early historical days of Lincoln County, and there was much visiting and exchanging of stories of the early days.

As a feature of the day, Wilbur organized a historical pageant: "The Last Escape of Billy the Kid."

The script for the show was written by a veteran Hollywood western script writer, Blanding Sloop, and his young assistant, Mark Hamilton.

Sloan took almost all his material from a book, published in 1921, by Walter Noble Burns entitled, "The Saga of Billy the Kid." Burns, in turn, took a great deal of his material from Wilbur's father, Frank Coe, who fought and rode with the Kid.

During the war, the pageant was discontinued and revived again in 1949, from that time it has continued to the present.

Through the years, the pageant has been revised and enlarged until it has become an accurate sketch of the high points of the "Lincoln County Wars." Actors in the show come from all over Lincoln County.

In the 1940 show, the stage was the main street of Lincoln and the first Billy the Kid was Peter Hurd, internationally known artist of San Patricio.

The countryside of the frontier village of Lincoln will be dressed up in festive green after the recent rain. Lincoln welcomes everyone the first weekend in August.

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

Don't feed the bears

Feeding the black bears that come lumbering into town from the Lincoln National Forest could spell a death sentence for the hungry animals. Residents who leave tasty tidbits out to tempt the critters may have bitten off more than they can chew.

Sure, the bears are having a tough time finding food, since berries and their other favorite treats aren't readily available in our dry summer season. But, the bears' habitat is in the wilds, and in most cases they can adapt and fend for themselves. Even if they can't, game warden Ron Moore stresses that the entire natural system is disrupted when people change the habits of wild animals, specifically by feeding them.

Moore warns bear feeders, that once these creatures are conditioned to find an easily ready food supply, they'll keep coming back over and over. They'll lose their natural ability to feed themselves, and instead rely on handouts from humans.

There's the rub. Bears aren't predators, but when they move into town, they frighten people who react to protect themselves, sometimes shooting at the bears, killing or wounding them.

The other solution, which involves trapping the bears and removing them to another area in the forest, also endangers the animals' lives. If they are moved into another bear's territory, they have to fight for the right to stay there, and often are killed. Just as often, the enterprising bears find their way back to a populated area where they can rummage through dumpsters.

Those dumpsters are a virtual smorgasbord for black bears, but they've learned that if one tipped over dumpster doesn't have anything good, they can just move down the street and turn over another one. And, once conditioned to the easy source of food, some bears have taken their search a step further this summer and walked into area houses.

It's against the law — a petty misdemeanor — to feed bears. And if that's not enough reason, then think of the bears, and don't sentence them to death. If you really want to keep the bears from endangering themselves by dining out in town, then bag your garbage and keep it inside until the day your dumpster is picked up. Then, the roving bears will give up on a free lunch and head for the hills.

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Upon Reflection

Casey's follies are rooted in the constitution

He probably only meant to reward a few supporters and, perhaps, just to needle the governor a little.

But Lt. Gov. Casey Luna's celebrated appointment of a number of his friends to various state boards and commissions — some to vacancies which, embarrassingly, did not even exist — has invited reflection upon some of New Mexico's more antiquated legal and constitutional provisions touching upon the office of governor.


Luna's appointments were made while Gov. Bruce King was back east attending a meeting of the National Governors' Association. And except for the bungled attempt to place people in already occupied positions, they were wholly within his authority as "acting governor."

Which is what he was: governor, albeit "acting," with all the powers vested in the office to which he had briefly ascended. This, thanks to a provision of the New Mexico constitution which makes the lieutenant governor the state's chief executive whenever a sitting governor is beyond the legal boundaries which define the old Land of Enchantment.

(In the absence of both the governor and lieutenant governor, the constitution stipulates that those responsibilities fall to the secretary of state.)

In the aftermath of Luna's appointments frolic, some, including Bruce King's spokesman John McKean, have suggested that it proves the need to change state law so as to allow major party gubernatorial candidates to select their own running mates. And there may be some merit to that suggestion.

As matters now stand, governors get as their second in command whomever their



party's primary election voters saddle them with. Arguably these same voters often may not even know who to select, given the low-information, low-profile nature of New Mexico primary campaigns for lieutenant governor.

No less a problem is the fact that the present mode of selection robs gubernatorial candidates and their parties of any guaranteed opportunity to balance their tickets for the general election, let alone make certain that a lieutenant governor might be someone with whom the governor gets along.

But Mr. Luna's appointments define an even more fundamental anomaly in the constitutional provisions governing the way our state's highest office operates. It is the sort of thing the late New Mexico constitutional scholar Dorothy Cline liked to call "19th century ideas written into an early 20th century constitution with no relevance to the present."

In the late 19th and early 20th centuries, when the drive for New Mexico statehood finally came to fruition, it probably made perfect sense to have a lieutenant governor sit in for an absent governor. Travel could seem an

eternity in those days, even travel to adjacent states; communications were unreliable and painfully slow.

None of that is the case today. Any of us, governors included, can be in, out and back again in New Mexico in a matter of hours. Failing that, there are telephone lines galore and Fax machines aplenty through which governors can stay in constant and immediate contact with affairs back home.

In short, there is no longer any good reason to require governors to divest themselves of their authority, even temporarily, when they are away. Yet the state constitution, as it has come down to us over these long decades, will have it no other way.

Which, ultimately, is what brought us the brouhaha occasioned by Casey Luna's appointment follies.

Mr. Luna might have made himself the butt of a lot fewer jokes had he made no such appointments whatsoever. Mr. King might have spared himself the irritation of mopping up the Luna mess had he not gone to the National Governors' meeting in Massachusetts.

But short of irradiating, once and for all, the foibles to which humans are prone — even high mucky do humans like lieutenant governors and governors — the only way to prevent such things from happening in the future is to allow our governors to remain governor when affairs take them out of state.

Don't expect that to happen anytime soon, however.



Construction tops \$10.5 million for first half of 1994

Construction slowed down some for the month of June with a two percent decrease from June of 1993. At the end of June, 74 permits had been issued with a dollar value of \$1,667,500 compared to 57 permits totalling \$2,101,148 in June, 1993.

However, year-to-date figures were up 30 percent over year-to-date figures for 1993. At the end of June of this year, the village had issued a total of 301 permits in all categories for a dollar value of \$10,511,751; in comparison at the end of June, 1993, a total of 278 permits had been issued totalling \$8,091,373.

In June of this year, 10 permits were issued for single family home construction for a dollar value of \$969,198, a 43 percent decrease from last year. In May of 1993, 12 permits were issued for new homes totalling \$1,695,767.

Year-to-date single family home permits for 1994 total 47 at \$8,360,782 for the year, up 42 percent over last year's 45 permits at \$5,875,949.

Residential addition/alteration permits were up 57 percent for the month of June with 54 permits for a dollar value of \$415,219. June, 1993, 39 permits were issued totalling \$264,631.

Year-to-date residential addition/alteration permits for 1994 totaled 208 at a dollar value of \$1,592,547, a six percent increase over 189 year-to-date permits for 1993, totaling \$1,507,421.

Two commercial permits were issued for June, 1994, totaling \$90,000, down 18 percent from June, 1993 when one permit was issued for a dollar value of \$110,000.

Year-to-date commercial permits were down by 77 percent with two permits being issued with a dollar value of \$90,000 in comparison to last year with six permits being issued totaling \$396,359.

Commercial remodeling projects for June of this year made a huge 528 percent jump over last June with eight permits issued for a dollar value of \$193,083 in comparison with five permits for June, 1993 totaling \$30,750.

The year-to-date commercial remodeling was down eight percent from 1993 with 33 permits totaling \$274,761 in comparison with 37 permits issued in 1993 for a dollar value of \$298,104.

No permits were issued for apartment additions/alterations last month, but one, valued at \$24,668, has been issued this year.

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Zia begins \$3 million pipeline project

Zia Natural Gas started construction last week on a 43-mile pipeline into the Ruidoso area, announced Zia president Dave Hamilton.

"Today we signed the contract for starting construction on our new pipeline feeding Ruidoso and the surrounding communities in Lincoln County," Hamilton told *The Ruidoso News* Friday.

"We are spending \$3 million on the project," he said.

Hamilton said the new pipeline installed will be an 8 5/8-inch steel pipe capable of handling upwards of 20,000 customers in the Lincoln County area.

"It will leave no questions on the part of the community as to the ability of us to serve," Hamilton said.

"We plan aggressively, as of this date, starting customer connections in this area and intend to connect between three and four thousand customers in the next five years."

Hamilton said he plans to connect to customers now existing either on propane or electricity. He said natural gas runs about half the cost of propane.

"Part of the expansion of our system is to reach now unserved areas," he said. "We plan on expanding into Hondo

Valley, and we are looking at expanding over the mountain into Mescalero onto the reservation. This system will allow us to do that."

Hamilton said the initial pipeline construction is \$3 million dollars and connections to customers will cost the company another \$3 million.

"We're expecting to spend \$6 million dollars in the area in the next five years," he said.

Hamilton said the natural gas is piped in from El Paso Natural. The main pipe line runs approximately 50 miles north of Ruidoso.

Hamilton gave a brief work history of the company located in Ruidoso Downs. He said that Natural Gas Processing, the parent company of Zia Natural Gas, purchased Ruidoso Natural Gas and renamed it Zia Natural Gas about five years ago.

"First, we had to set up an organizational structure here which involved building a complex that we could operate out of."

"Then we had to develop a work force that was to our satisfaction. We have tripled the work force of Zia Natural Gas since we purchased it."

"Then we had to finalize the negotiations with Capitan-Carrizozo Natural Gas Association to purchase their existing four-inch pipeline that feeds the area."

"It took us approximately a year and a half to gain all the right of way we needed on the 43 miles of pipeline to invade the area."

"After getting all of our ducks in a row, we are now ready for a major expansion of the area."

Hamilton said the moment the company was purchased, company officials set up a 10-year schedule.

"I'd say right now we are a year behind schedule, because of a breakdown in the initial negotiations with Capitan-Carrizozo Natural Gas Association," he said. "That is settled and we are back on schedule."

He said construction of the pipeline should be completed in about three months.

"We plan on having the pipeline in service by the first week in November. That will take us into our 1994-95 heating season," he said.

He said construction will begin at the El Paso Natural Gas tap, and work its way toward Ruidoso.

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

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
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GTE extends local service area to include Capitan

GTE has announced it will extend the local calling plans for customers in the Ruidoso and Espanola areas.

Under the plan, all calls to and from Capitan, Ruidoso and Alto will be billed as local calls.

Other communities in the new billing system are in the Espanola area. All those listed below will be billed as local calls:

- Capitan to Ruidoso and Alto
- Abiquiu to Espanola
- Ojo Caliente to Espanola
- Vallecitos to Espanola and Ojo Caliente
- Truchas to Espanola and Chimayo
- Canjilon to Tierra Amarilla
- Dixon to Espanola

This toll-free calling is made possible by Extended Area Service (EAS), a service requested formally by GTE and approved July 6, 1994, by the New Mexico State Corporation Commission.

According to a news release, the service will be available to all customers in the Abiquiu, Alto, Canjilon, Chimayo, Dixon, Espanola, Ojo Caliente, Ruidoso,

Tierra Amarilla, Truchas and Vallecitos exchanges by October 31, 1994.

"Prior to the start of EAS service, each call between these areas was billed separately as a long-distance call and customers would see a long-distance charge per call on their monthly bills," said Tom Phelps, district manager-GTE New Mexico. "Now, these calls are equivalent to local calls."

Customers are not required to take any action to take advantage of the new EAS service and will not see an increase in their rates. Once the EAS service is operational, it will no longer be necessary for customers to dial "1" before the number when placing calls between these communities.

More information will be provided to affected customers in their monthly bills before the service becomes operational.

Phelps said residential customers with questions about the EAS service should call toll-free 1-800-572-8011 and business customers should call 1-800-483-5400.

HOUSEHOLD HELPS

Q: We live in a house built of common brick about 60 years ago. On the east wall in the unfinished attic, the bricks are shedding some kind of white powder that is making a pile on the floor. What should be done about this? In another place where the bricks have been painted, the paint bubbles and the white powder and paint falls. We hope you can advise us on this.

A: The very common and preventable dilemma you are faced with is called efflorescence. Bricks have a makeup of soluble salts which are expelled through the surface, causing a powdery formation. There are a variety of reasons which cause this problem to occur, including the loss of water. This brings us to examine the following steps for prevention of efflorescence.


The need for proper ventilation in your attic is not only important to remove your unsightly problem but to prevent rotting roof boards, too. Without this step, your headaches will continue, eventually ruining your roof shingles as well. Living in the colder northern regions increases the risk of the above. Be sure that your attic is

properly vented and check with your building code to see if you can install roof vents.

The installation of a vapor barrier applied to the exposed brick is another very important factor to consider. This barrier can be simple roofing paper or the use of polyethylene film (at least 3mm thick). These materials are used to retard or prevent the absorption of moisture into a construction (as a wall or floor).

Another vital presence in your attic should be an adequate amount of fiberglass blanket insulation. Being that you mentioned that your attic is unfinished, you can add or beef up the attic insulation there. If nothing else positive happens, at least the extra insulation will prevent the formation of winter's ice dams, which freeze solid on your roof's edge. A vapor barrier also is indirectly responsible for allowing natural air circulation to move more freely like a wind tunnel.

One final possibility to consider is the use of a humidifier. This can be used in conjunction with the above methods. Good luck in your job.

Ruidoso police said there were many methods in verifying a bogus bill, including the absence of blue and red threads embedded in the paper, a low grade of paper without a high percentage of rag material, the bleeding of numbers through the seal, edges that are not crisp and sharp and portraits that are out of focus to the point of not seeing hash mark (stripes) lines on the face.

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

Furr's gives customers a chance to round up tickets to support schools

The next time the cashier rings up the final total on grocery purchases at a local Furr's, expect to be asked to round off the total to help support Earth Shuttle New Mexico.

The company isn't planning to bring a shuttle launch to Ruidoso. But it is a backer of a pilot program designed to decrease dropout rates, improve subject matter competency and motivate 900 Native American, Hispanic and other disadvantaged youths in grades six through eight.

Furr's Supermarkets Inc. has agreed to become the lead business partner in the Earth Shuttle New Mexico program. Buz Doyle, Furr's president and chief operating officer, will serve as chairman of the advisory board from 1994-1997.

He said Furr's officials hope other organizations in New Mexico will become actively involved in this exciting program.

The national Earth Shuttle program was developed in 1984 by educator Lyman Carter to provide disadvantaged students with a unique travel and learning experience. Until now, the pro-

gram was available only to students who were able to pay for the unique educational opportunity.

The nonprofit Earth Shuttle Education Foundation was established in 1994 to bring the benefits to disadvantaged children. New Mexico is the first state in the nation to reach minority majority status. About 60 percent of New Mexico children ages one through 18 are minorities.

The unique cultural diversity of New Mexico mirrors the way the rest of the nation will look by the year 2010. Therefore, national educators are looking to the state to set education standards and teaching techniques for the 21st century.

The New Mexico Board of Education and the Indian Pueblo Cultural Center served as catalysts to bring the program to the state.

Application forms were mailed to sixth through eighth grade mathematics and science teachers in New Mexico, who work with minority and low income students.

Thirty teachers will be chosen by the

Earth Shuttle New Mexico Advisory Board and notified by the end of July. The designated teachers will undergo an extensive week-long curriculum training session at EPCOT Center, Sea World and the Kennedy Space Center prior to the start of the 1994-95 academic year.

The teachers then will be involved in selecting the 30 students from their classes, who they feel will benefit the most from the program and who fit within the demographic mix (300 Hispanic, 300 Native American and 300 other potential achievers).

The State Department of Education anticipates that the program will become a permanent part of the New Mexico education curriculum after 1997. It provides students with a hands-on learning approach, as opposed to a traditional textbook learning experience.

New Mexicans can participate in the Round Up for Earth Shuttle program by telling Furr's checkers to round off their total to the nearest dollar or give whatever amount they choose.

PUC OKs electric rate adjustment

The New Mexico Public Utility Commission has approved an agreement reached by Texas-New Mexico Power Company and the parties to its New Mexico rate application which will result in a \$38 per year decrease for a TNMP residential customer using 500 kwh per month.

According to a news release provided by the electric company, a small commercial customer served by TNMP will see a decrease in electricity costs of about \$260 per year.

The agree approved in May increased TNMP's annual base rate revenues in New Mexico by about \$400,00 or 0.57 percent. However, when considered in conjunction with a decrease of about \$7.1 million in firm purchased power costs which the NMPUC already has allowed TNMP to put into effect, TNMP customers receive a net decrease in their overall rates.

Customers began seeing the effects of the lower purchased power costs in March 1994.

Texas-New Mexico Power serves Ruidoso which is among 90 towns and cities with more than 211,000 customers, about 50,000 of whom are in New Mexico.

Area residents named to state advisory council

Lincoln County residents Cece Griffin, Robert O. Goddard, Flo Maul, Connie Kumler, Brenda Walters, R.L. Van Norman and Harold Garcia attended the Governor's Business Advisory Council recently in Albuquerque.

Governor Bruce King was the keynote speaker.

Governor King spoke about South-eastern New Mexico's expanding agriculture processing facilities. New Mexico now has the country's largest mozzarella cheese manufacturing plant.

Peanut butter is increasingly being produced in the Clovis area rather than having the raw product shipped out of state for processing. The value added by processing our agriculture in-state is one way in which New Mexico's economy is currently expanding.

Speaker of the House Raymond Sanchez reported to the advisory council on the New Mexico Horizons Task Force, and the group toured Phillips Semiconductors' Albuquerque manufacturing plant.

Della Duran of the Department of Economic Development reported on New Mexico's Own Program.



Local artist gains national attention for his work

Over the last five years, world famous bronze sculptor Dave McGary has shared his phenomenal success with the county that he now calls home.

As his honors and prestige have grown, his local operation has expanded with them, pumping money into the economy and enhancing Lincoln County's reputation as an art center.

And he's about to deliver again.

McGary has embarked on what will be the most significant bronze sculpture in New Mexico and has announced plans to move his entire operation to the former King's building on Sudderth Drive.

Visitors will be able to stroll through a gallery, wander among sculptures in a landscaped garden and stop in the studio to watch craftsmen put the finishing touches to McGary's creations.

The huge building also will be perfect to accommodate work on the 225-foot long "Free Spirits at Noisy Water" bronze monument to the American horse commissioned by R.D. and Joan Dale Hubbard.

"It's really exciting to take a parking lot and turn it into a park and a piece of art and something that people can interact with," McGary said of the piece that will cover part of the entry to The Museum of the Horse in Ruidoso Downs.

"It's going to be a huge bronze. It's great to be working with R.D. Hubbard, who thinks big. It's really exciting, and Joan Dale's enthusiasm is infecting."

"The Hubbards are going above and beyond the call of duty to invest in this."

McGary said he mentioned to Hubbard last year that the parking lot in front of the museum screamed for a big piece of art.

"He liked the idea and said he'd have a national competition," McGary said. "He opened it up for all comers from across the country and that geared me up to another level, to offer something monumental in more than just size."

He received word from the Hubbards that he had won when they flew into Ruidoso on their jet, told him his design had been chosen and then took off again while McGary and friends were celebrating on the runway.

"I'm concentrating on the masterwork now, which is 12 feet long," McGary said.

The piece depicts seven breeds of horses in motion: quarterhorse, thoroughbred, Arabian, Appaloosa, Pinto, standard bred and Morgan. It's designed as a tribute to the role the horse played in the development of the American West.

From the masterwork, the monumental sculpture will be developed. He will resculpt the pieces and send them to a foundry in Wyoming, then finish the work at the by then remodeled King's building.

"The piece will show eight horses one and a half times life size," McGary said.

"It will measure 30 feet from the top of the horse to the base and about 250 feet in length, about the size of a football field. It will be wonderful, with waterfalls and landscaping."

"This is going to be the most significant piece of sculpture in the state of New Mexico and one of the most in the United States."

By the August 20 unveiling of the architectural rendering at the museum, McGary hopes to have bronze maquettes of the quarter horse ready to offer.

"I hope a lot of people come and buy a piece of this special monument to the horse," he said. The finished work is scheduled to be ready for the public in June 1995.

Meanwhile, McGary said renovation of the vacant King's building will take about four months. He hopes to move in by November or December.

He was inspired to relocate to town by what he heard and saw during the Community Update luncheon, co-sponsored by MainStreet Ruidoso and The Ruidoso News.

"I got excited about the direction the town is taking," McGary said, referring to a streetscape sidewalk and landscaping project under way by the MainStreet organization.

"I have seven acres on the road to the airport that I was going to use for a new studio, but that King's building has been calling me for one and a half years, and I decided to listen."

The complex will include a gallery and production section, as well as administrative and sales offices.

The staff will expand from 45 to 60 persons, he said.

"We've been running ads in some of the larger towns like Roswell, El Paso and Albuquerque," McGary said. "Right now I'm almost two years behind in orders, so we could double the staff if we could find the people."

"Ninety-eight percent of all the money I make comes from outside and then is circulated in the community. The staff will grow to 60, so the economic impact is really important. It's also an asset to have this type of a business downtown."

Ruidoso Mayor Jerry Shaw said having McGary as a downtown feature should be a big plus for the town.

"What he has in mind is perfect for that building and really in step with the concept for the downtown area," said Shaw.

"It just gives us another big anchor, something for people to do and it plays up our art legacy."

Tom Battin, former president of MainStreet and president of Ruidoso State Bank, said the new relationship between McGary and downtown Ruidoso should be mutually beneficial.

"It will become a destination place for people to see how the bronzes are finished and to view his work. The downtown traffic also should be a big

asset to his operation," Battin said. "I'm extremely pleased that Dave feels that way (about the MainStreet work). We're really lucky to have him."

McGary said he's proud to be a part of Ruidoso.

"A lot of people ask why I don't live in Santa Fe or some other art center," he said. "I have the luxury to choose and I like Ruidoso. The people have been very supportive and that means a lot."

The demands on McGary's time go well beyond the Hubbard assignment and catching up on orders.

"I'm truly utilizing my slogan, 'There

are no limits," he said. "I'm really pushing that right now. I have a major exhibit in Florida coming up, a one-man show in Cairo, Egypt, as the guest of the government, and the United Nations wants to sponsor a worldwide tour. I have a tour of major museums in the United States set for 1996-97."

McGary's work is exhibited in galleries, museums and private collections throughout the United States, Canada and Europe. Two major pieces are in the permanent White House collection.




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

HIGH SCHOOL STUDENT ENROLLMENT
