County Commission withdraws from hospital board

If the aim of the members of the Lincoln County Medical Center board is to control rigidly the information fed to the public about the hospital's operation, County Commissioners say the process won't include commission participation.

In a 5-0 vote Tuesday, commissioners decided to withdraw their liaison to the Hospital (LCMC) board.

During a break following the vote, Commissioner Wilton Howell, who has complained about the lack of public information access since taking the hospital board assignment a few months ago, said he has mixed feelings about the decision.

"On one side, I hate to lose what openness there is by not having a commissioner on the board, but possibly, it's a blessing," he said. "We were going to lose representation anyway, because I was told by board members that if I continued

to press for openness, they would resort to using the executive board (a smaller group of officers for the full board) in making decisions and I am not a member of that committee."

The motion to withdraw commission participation was offered by Commissioner Stirling Spencer, who suggested the move to eliminate liability on the part of the county for any decisions by the hospital board. The motion included that the commission must have ac-

cess to all expenditures from the annual special property tax levied for hospital operation and capital expenditure (\$642,759 this year). The county also expects quarterly reports.

The commission last year revamped and renewed a contract to operate the county facility with Presbyterian Health Care Systems, a private non-profit corporation.

Spencer noted that the contract can be reviewed for further modifications, if problems arise or com-

plaints are received about the operation. But he added, administrator Valerie Miller and Presbyterian appear to have managed the 37 bed hospital well since they took over. Miller came on board about four years ago. As a private group, the hospital's meetings are not subject to the state Open Meetings Act that governs public boards.

Miller told *The Ruidoso News* Wednesday that the commission

County compromises on trash rate increase

Lincoln County will do its part to reduce expenditures and increase revenues for a local government garbage collection coalition, and the plan won't require a rate increase.

Joe Lewandowski, general manager of the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority, told county commissioners Tuesday that some areas of operation are losing money while others are in the black.

To continue to provide free services such as pine needle collection, policing of dumpster sites for illegal items and construction debris, and early morning runs to clean up after marauding bears, revenues must go up.

"We either need a rate increase or cut of services," Lewandowski said.

He previously had showed the authority board, comprised of representatives from the county and its five municipalities, that the heaviest drain on the system was the village of Ruidoso, because that's where most of the free special services were demanded. This past year was the first full year of operation from which Lewandowski could come up with accurate figures.

To ensure that each entity contributed something toward correcting the problem, he presented three options to each member that included rate increases for residential and commercial use; cutting all extra services, except collection and leaving them to the individual entities to handle; or for the villages of Capitan and Ruidoso and the county to forgive the remaining

14 year debt of the authority for used equipment purchased from them at the outset of operations.

The individual boards must approve the course of action and send the decision back to the authority.

Commissioners agreed to forgive one year of the authority's \$10,000 annual debt repayment to the county, with the possibility of more in later years. They also committed to helping with the construction of convenience stations around the county where residents can legally dispose of large items such as couches and water heaters. Those two items together should come close to the \$18,000 that Lewandowski estimated would have been generated by a rate increase in the county.

Commissioner Stirling Spencer, who served on the original board that formed the authority, adamantly refused to budge on a rate increase. Lewandowski had proposed an additional 50 cent per residential account for a total of \$5.75, with no jump in commercial accounts.

But Spencer pointed out that the county's portion of the system is operating with an excess.

"It was understood by the authority board at that time (when collection first was initiated by the authority) that Ruidoso might see a loss after three years," he said. Ruidoso residents have not received a garbage rate increase in 12 years. Commercial rates are at the bottom of 16 communities surveyed.

"I submit to you that Lincoln County has done more than its share and left a cushion," Spencer

"Mad Love" filmed in Carrizozo

Film makers were searching for a landscape directly opposite to the moist green forests of Seattle, Washington.

Tuesday, trucks hauled klieg lights, production tents, props and trailers into the parking lot around the Chevron gas station in Carrizozo at the intersection of State Highway 37 and U.S. 54.

For most of the day, the stars of the film "Mad Love," Drew Barrymore and Chris O'Donnell, shot scenes to be used as part of their desert trek in the search for the mother of O'Donnell's character.

Barrymore staked her claim to

fame as a young child in the movies "E.T." and "The Fire Starter."

O'Donnell recently appeared in "Scent of a Woman" with Al Pacino.

Location manager Tony Grob told *The Ruidoso News* that film commissions in the states of Utah, Colorado, Nevada and New Mexico were contacted initially. Based on the photographs sent back, the location crew narrowed the field to Utah and New Mexico. Scouting teams were sent out and pinpointed the area between Truth or Consequences and Alamogordo as the antithesis to Seattle.

Carrizozo was selected for a small section of the movie trip.

"The film is about two high

school students who embarked on a road trip," he said. "They were running away, but didn't have a destination. The boy hasn't seen his mother since she left nine years ago, but he has a post card that says she's moved to a small city, so they try to find her. They end up in Idaho."

"Some of the trip filming also took place outside of Seattle. For the film, we renamed Truth or Consequences Hot Springs, it's original name."

Grob said the film is being released by Walt Disney Productions in the spring and is directed by Antonia Bird, an English director working on her first major production in America.

Art Festival packs in patrons

Visitors to the 23rd Annual Ruidoso Art Festival last week were treated to 125 artisans displaying and selling everything from jewelry to face painting, while food vendors offered Mexican food, hot dogs, cobblers and bratwurst.

"This was an extremely successful art festival," said Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce executive director Joan Bailey.

According to Bailey, this year's festival was attended by 7,778 people, an increase of 1,100 people from last year.

"Thank goodness there is lots of local affection (for the art festival) and the locals like to get involved," said Bailey. "For example, the boy scouts helped exhibitors move in and pack up, which was greatly appreciated."

Bailey says a 23-year history has

given the Ruidoso Art Festival a credibility which helps a long-term goal of identifying the Ruidoso area with great art.

"The art festival is a natural for this area, which benefits both locals and visitors," Bailey said. "We are trying to bring business to town, not take it away. It has become very balanced, with something for everyone's taste."

In addition to the many local exhibitors at this year's festival, artists also came from Arizona, Colorado, Indiana, Oklahoma, Texas and other regions of New Mexico.

This year's "Best of Show" went to Melanie Fain of Boerne, Texas, for her etchings.

Local artists in the top 10 category were Virgil C. Stevens, bronzework; Tim Wierwille, pot-

tery; Vicki Conley, pottery; and Maggie Doyle, weaving.

New features at the festival included hospitality rooms for both artists and visitors, booth sitting, a change bank and a complimentary dinner on Friday evening for artists and helpers, which was provided by Michelena's Italian Restaurant.

"Next year we hope to increase signage, provide a box lunch for artists and develop a shuttle service to help alleviate parking problems," said Bailey.

The silent auction, started last year by Paul Crown to benefit the chamber's scholarship fund, raised \$4,000, an increase of \$2,800.

County auction at Glencoe exceeds dollar expectations

Skeptics downplayed the chances of a successful county surplus auction at the new rural events center in Glencoe, Lincoln County Commissioners noted Tuesday.

But the final dollar total of more than \$40,000 proved them wrong, Chairman Monroy Montes said Tuesday.

Montes took a few minutes at the monthly commission meeting to crow about sale totals from the Saturday event that far exceeded previous auctions. Two years ago, the county sale at the road yard in Capitan netted about \$27,000 and \$20,000 of that was one piece of heavy equipment.

"The gross at the Saturday sale in Glencoe was about \$40,825," Montes said. "Part will go to the Capitan school district, which brought some of their things that had been sitting in a shed for four

years. Everything sold, except some old cement and field lights from Hondo (school district). This was the first auction of this type and was very successful."

Montes said he was pleased with the participation of prospective buyers.

"(Auctioneer Charles Dickerson) has a good following and the Ruidoso Future Farmers of America (headed by Murry Avery) ran the concession booth to raise money for a trip to Kansas City," he said.

"It was a chance to showcase the facility and show its many uses."

Center property manager Linda Wallace and road manager Bill Cupit were patted on the back for their handling of items.

"Everything could be seen. One man said he bought a cattle guard because for the first time they weren't stacked and he could really see them," said Commissioner Wilton Howell, who with Montes was a strong supporter of the

county purchase of the center. "About 80-90 buyers showed up, many were local, and they all bought something. Those cattle guards two years ago brought an average of \$20 each, but this batch went for as high as \$65. A used culvert sold for \$275."

"One man told me he lives in Bent and had been reading about the purchase of the center (formerly the Ruidoso Super Select Sales Barn). He said he thought it was a bad deal until he came down to the sale and saw what we had here. Now he thinks it was a good deal."

The county purchased the center with \$250,000 allocated by the State Legislature. Another \$40,000 was set aside by the legislature to help with the first year of operation or needed repairs.

Wallace said the next event at the center will be performances on September 2-4 of the western swing band Jody Nix and the Texas Cowboys.

Upper Canyon group fights MRS

The potentially damaging widespread impact of storing high level nuclear waste on the neighboring Mescalero Apache reservation has mobilized a 16-year old property owners group with a history of fighting to protect Ruidoso.

The Ruidoso Upper Canyon Association (RUCA) has opened its membership to anyone in Lincoln County concerned about living next to a storage facility for spent fuel rods from power plants.

An organizational meeting is set for 7 p.m. Wednesday, August 10 in Ruidoso City Hall.

"We formed in 1978 with the purpose of protecting the Upper Canyon area, to maintain its charm and keep things like a freeway from coming through," said president Hazel Haynsworth. "Fighting the MRS (Monitored Retrievable Storage) follows that original direction and the board of directors believes we should open the organization to the public. We're hoping to get a grass roots movement going to oppose the MRS."

The association will include membership coupons in The Ruidoso News for the next four editions.

Members of RUCA recently attended a meeting of the new MRS Regional Information Committee, a group of elected officials from a three-county area. Headed by Ruidoso Mayor Jerry Shaw, the committee will track information about the project. Shaw asked Haynsworth to operate her group as a subcommittee of the board of elected officials.

Currently, 70,000 metric tons of this fuel, with a half-life of 25,000 years, is stored at 70 nuclear reactor sites. Mescalero plans call for temporary storage of 40 years at a site on the reservation until a permanent repository, planned for Yucca Mountain in Nevada is built.

Especially alarming to the group is the prospect of the fuel being transported across several states to reach New Mexico, Haynsworth said.


"If an accident occurred during transportation of the casks contain-

ing the spent fuel, deadly contamination could spread silently and without detection," she said. The concept of sovereign immunity also could preclude injured persons or their families from being compensated for damages by protecting state, local and Native American governments from being sued, Haynsworth noted.

Mescalero tribal council vice president Fred Peso has said that the storage facility will provide jobs and other economic benefits to their members. Council members have studied the concept for three years and Peso contends the project could be handled safely, while providing more independence for the Tribe.

After attempts to work through the federal nuclear negotiator stalled, the Mescalero turned to private industry. The tribal council has entered into an agreement with 33 power plants to apply for site licensing and to move forward on requirements for permits.

The site mentioned most often is on the west slope of the Sacramento Mountains in the Three Rivers portion of the reservation.

decision may be positive for both entities

"I think if our ability to share with them is not to the level they expect, then what we're creating is frustration and then perhaps, it is better this way," she said. "I will go and make verbal reports. With exception of very few items, the information is not very confidential, but some absolutely do demand confidentiality. I think this solves the problem and won't create frustration for them. If I give verbal reports on what we're planning and have done, it might be better."

Howell said he's primarily interested that correct and sufficient information is released to the press and public.

Miller said that while the LCMC board of trustees has discussed the possibility of her preparing a summary of the board meeting each month for the press, no action was taken. For now, the situation will stay the same, with the press allowed to attend, except for closed executive sessions.

"We probably will discuss it more in depth at the next board meeting," Miller said.

During the commission meeting Tuesday, Howell said the brevity of a newspaper report on the 2 1/2 hour meeting was one of the reasons he brought the item to the commission table. He showed a one-page press release summary given by Miller to The News and compared it to a six page meeting summary for the official minutes, which he contended still didn't represent totally what had occurred at the hospital board meeting.

He pointed to a portion of the

minutes that stated, "The importance of confidentiality was discussed. It was noted that with the sensitive information handled by the board, that breaches of confidentiality cannot be allowed or tolerated... It was generally felt that the only interest the county should have regarding LCMC is mill levy funds... It was noted that Mr. Howell is appointed by the commission to the board of trustees, but it is by the invitation of the board that a position is available and it is not a requirement."

The minutes also stated that if commissioners wanted information that violates confidentiality, Howell would consider resigning from the LCMC board.

"I assure you that's not what I said," Howell insisted. "What I said was as long as the commission wanted a representative on the board, it would be me and that I was not considering resigning. I never suggested the commission be involved in the direct operations of the hospital, or in patient records or discussions regarding competition with neighboring hospital. But I believe it is the right of the commission to know what's happening with a facility built by county tax dollars."

"I believe I was selected to serve on the board as a representative of the commission and I must have the right to communicate."

Commissioner L. Ray Nunley, who served on the hospital board before Howell, said he also ran into problems with restrictions on information.

"I think that essentially is what I asked for when I was on the board, accountability and represen-

tation," Nunley said.

Howell said as liaison between the commission and hospital, he thought it was his responsibility to share information with other county commissioners and cited several relevant state statutes.

"I certainly don't feel any information breached confidentiality," he said. But he and the other hospital board members "have a difference of opinion as to how the commission should be represented on the hospital board. It started when I was the lone vote opposing hiring of doctors. They are proceeding with that, but the spill over hinges on how much the commission should know that goes on at the hospital."

Montes said he agreed that a commissioner has a broader responsibility and constituent base to represent than other hospital board members.

Those constituents would be poorly served by an inactive board member or if information was denied, he said.

Commissioner Bill Schwettmann said that although the amount of money involved is much greater, the situation is similar to the relationship of the commission with the fair association. When that group went private and took over management by contract of the county fairground, the commission no longer had a representative on the board.

"We depend on them to give accurate reports," he said. "We need to let them run the hospital, look at the reports and if we don't like it, raise questions and take a close look at the time of renewal."

said. "We're making a profit for it and the others are using it. I think the county should receive roll-offs (convenience stations for disposal) at no additional cost to the citizens since the cost strain is coming from the other entity (Ruidoso)."

"These numbers prove the county had slack and it's time for the others to make adjustments, which are not out of line."

Commissioner Wilton Howell, who serves as chairman of the authority, said his first choice was to forgive the debt since the equip-

ment was over-priced.

"We only are able to spend two percent to three percent a year for capital outlay, which wouldn't have been bad if we had good equipment," Howell said. "But we got a bunch of junk (from the county, Capitan and Ruidoso) at inflated prices."

"I consider it double dipping. We bought out from the different entities what taxpayers already paid for and now are paying for again in their rates."

"I think they will recover that money in the debt repayment to the general fund," Spencer said. "I just

want to put the costs where they are." He noted that the county also turned over a 3,000 residential customer base.

Lewandowski said he is trying to ensure that each entity pays for itself.

He pointed out that the rates cover some major projects such as the authority's successful recycling program and construction of a regional landfill (which already is paying for itself) with a corresponding authority in Otero County. Those two accomplishments put the county way ahead of most communities in the state.

Foreign doctor visits to view local hospital procedures

Lincoln County Medical Center had a noted visitor from Japan this week.

Dr. Kenji Taki, M.D., Ph.D. is the director and associate professor of the newly formed Department of Emergency Medicine at Saga Medical School in Saga, Japan.

Taki is touring United States

emergency rooms on a Japanese government grant in order to gain a broader understanding of the workings of emergency room (ER) procedures.

"Until recently Japan has not had a paramedic or emergency room system," said Taki. "Medicine is highly specialized, and because the hospital system is run by the government, it sets fees and places

caps on services."

In the United States, a Physician's Assistant sees emergency cases first, while in Japan all patients wait to see a specialist.

"One of the problems in my country is that all of the doctors are very specialized," said Taki. "There are no emergency room or family doctors so if there is an accident victim which requires extensive

care, risk increases because of the time involved."

Taki feels that when time is a factor in an emergency situation, it is vital that the patient require immediate care.

"The reason I'm studying the Lincoln County Medical Center emergency system is that I have a friend who lives in Ruidoso," Taki said. "My friend introduced me to

Dr. Stephen J. Frey, who has been kind enough to show me the facilities."

According to Taki, another problem in his country is that there are many accidents and simply not enough paramedics.

"The paramedic system in Japan is only three years old," Taki said. "And it is very understaffed. At the present time we have only about

four paramedics for every 200,000 people."

Taki said he is impressed with the Lincoln County Medical Center ER service.

"There seems to be a good connection between the hospital and the community," he said.

Asked about how he liked Ruidoso, Taki smiled and said, "The air is so very clean!"


Pat Tate was chairman of the baked goods, which were offered in many appetizing forms and were very popular throughout the day.

Emergency measures can prevent lung injuries

Although recent rains have dampened the chances of major fires around Ruidoso, fire remains a danger. Besides the obvious dangers from fire, exposure for asthmatics and others with lung disorders can be especially devastating.

"Inhaling smoke can trigger extreme physical reactions, including headaches, dizziness, physical impairment and burns, both internal and external," according to Dr. Lee Newman, pulmonologist and occupational/environmental medicine physician with the National Jewish Center for Immunology and Respiratory Medicine in Denver.

"Relatively minor injuries and burns shouldn't be overlooked. More serious problems can occur hours after the initial exposure. Observation of the affected person should take place for 24 hours after the exposure."

"There are things one can do to protect your lungs, if you find yourself caught in the path of a fire. For instance, place a dry cloth over your mouth and nose, and stay as low to the ground as possible since heat rises. Seek medical attention immediately after exposure."

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P & Z instructs owner to demolish

Ruidoso resident Flavio Vigil lost his bid to purchase setback property and has been ordered by the Planning and Zoning Commission to raise a two-story addition he had been constructing without a permit.

Vigil, about two months ago, had asked the commission for time to purchase property for a setback and to contact engineers to help him bring the structure off "A" Street into compliance. The commission gave Vigil 120 days to work out his problems.

Village planner Cleatus Richards said Vigil's neighbor met with him a few minutes before the commission meeting Monday with a letter he received from Vigil requesting the purchase of property.

Richards said the man informed him he would not sell any of his back lot line to accommodate Vigil and was preparing a letter of refusal for Richards and Vigil.

Richards said without the property, Vigil could not comply with the setback codes. He said on receipt of the letter, he would immediately advise Vigil to obtain a demolition permit and begin removing the building.

Richards said Vigil would have about 65 days remaining to remove the building. Richards said he received no reply from a letter he sent to Vigil 30 days earlier requesting a progress report. Vigil, who was not at the meeting, could not be reached for comment.

In other business, the commission approved an amended commercial site development request for the "old King's building" by local artist Dave McGary who is moving his studio to the Sudderth Drive location.

McGary is requesting approval to convert the building to a gallery, studio, offices and production facility for McGary Art Works, and to retain apartment use.

Renovation will include interior remodeling, renovation of landscaping and paving of the parking lot area.

Richards said production activities will include sand blasting, metal work detailing, mounting and painting, but no large foundry work.

Landscaping plans indicate 18 trees with a mix of fir and aspen, to prevent blocking visibility of nearby stores.

The commission also approved a preliminary and final plat (layout) request by R&F Inc., a joint venture partnership of Don Russell, Cher Russell, Lloyd Fannon and Pamela Fannon.

The 2-acre property behind The Springs development, pending village council final approval, will be changed to R-1 single family zoning to allow low density residential development.

The village council has scheduled a public hearing on the rezoning for August 9.

A condition of approval is to require installations of sewer line extension for Lot 7 and water and sewer stubouts for all lots. A certificate of deposit was allowed as a guarantee.

Under old business, the commission approved a private septic request by Robert E. Kellerman, who lives on Cedar Creek Drive.

Carl Stubbs of the New Mexico Environmental Department (ED) approved use of the system to serve Kellerman's property.

Planner Richards said final approval rests with the village council.

Sheriff and second driver cited in auto accident south of Capitan on SR 48

An undercover pickup truck driven by Lincoln County Sheriff James McSwane was struck last week as he attempted to pass in pursuit of a traffic violator.

Both McSwane and the driver of the other car received citations from investigating state police officer Michael Browning. McSwane was cited for reckless driving and Pitt William of Ruidoso Downs was cited for failure to signal.

According to Browning's report, McSwane was driving on State Road 48 south of Capitan near contractor Pat Huey's barn when the accident occurred at about 2:30

p.m., Wednesday, July 27.

"I was in the process of trying to locate a vehicle going north," McSwane told The Ruidoso News. "One of the persons in the vehicle displayed some obscene sign language and then passed several vehicles in a no pass zone."

"His car was able to outrun the pickup and I was trying to locate him again. (When the car in front began to turn left) I tried to leave the roadway on the left side, but I hit the car's left fender and took the sign out."

The driver of the other vehicle told investigating officer Michael Browning of the State Police that

his turn signal was on before he began his left turn, McSwane said.

"I didn't see the turn signal and neither did my passenger, but I'm not going to dispute what the other driver said," he said.

McSwane said he notified sheriff's dispatch in Carrizozo to contact the state police to investigate the accident.

No one was injured. William was driving a 1977 Oldsmobile. McSwane was in a 1984 Ford pickup owned by the county.

McSwane said he was traveling at approximately the speed limit and that his emergency lights were blinking.


The Tiger football team will butt heads August 8 with Hatch in an away game to kick off the season. Homecoming is set for September 9 against Batancia.

Garbage customers paying higher rates will expect improved service

Like the little engine that could, the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority has been chugging along for more than a year now. At times the group's task — developing a landfill and taking on solid waste disposal for this entire county — seemed impossible.

But the authority's board and employees kept on thinking they could, and they did. This regional authority, including Otero and Lincoln counties, has led the state in developing the first new landfill under new tough environmental regulations. Meanwhile, the authority has implemented a recycling program and taken on the billing as well as the pickup and disposal of garbage for all of Lincoln County.

The system's not perfect yet, and the authority staff is still facing an uphill battle. Illegal dumping has been a problem all along, and now, with the great number of people in Lincoln County for the summer season, the dumpsters are overloaded and authority staff can't make it around quickly enough to empty neighborhood dumpsters. The system is stressed.

Even as service continues to fall short of expectations, the authority is asking each of its members to implement a rate increase. Higher costs are never welcome, but in this case the rate hike is reasonable. Authority members have known all along that the rates were too low, but waited until the director had some firm figures to reassess the cost to provide the service.

Customers may not like the higher price, but in view of the changing requirements for garbage disposal, they have little choice but to grit their teeth and pay the bill. On the other hand, these same customers might feel justified in demanding better service even during the busy summer season.



The Light of Day

Johnson's Big J Enterprises poses questions for voters

If Gary Johnson planned to run for governor on a platform of giving New Mexico jobs to people from out of state, he'd be off to a good start.

The Republican candidate's Big J Enterprises, it turns out, has been recruiting construction workers from other states and bringing them to New Mexico for Intel Corporation's plant expansion.

Workers recruited by Johnson have told a reporter that they were lured to the Albuquerque area by prospects of steady work, good pay and relocation bonuses of \$200.

These same workers also tell of bitter disappointment not long after their arrival in New Mexico. Pipefitters, electricians, plumbers and other skilled workers said they were laid off just before they qualified for vacations, insurance benefits and raises. Insurance benefits and vacation time start after six months, according to the workers.


Some said they found the promised \$200 bonus was actually just an advance against their salary, which they had to pay back.

"I'm a thousand miles from home and what am I going to do now, and why me?" one of the recruits wondered out loud.

The company has said the workers' complaints don't hold water. "These allegations are simply not true," said Harold Field, a top Big J official.

Nevertheless, the workers' stories deserve consideration — just as Governor Bruce King's controversial land exchange with the Bureau of Land Management opened King's business practices to scrutiny.

Big J is not a construction company in the ordinary sense. News reports suggest the company is similar to a secretarial service that provides workers for companies that need them.



How much of an economic benefit is such a company to a community? Let's compare this kind of company to a traditional construction firm such as Davis and Associates of Santa Fe.

Davis and Associates, whose construction projects have ranged from a new library for St. John's College to school and state government buildings, prides itself on having workers from the Santa Fe and northern New Mexico area who have been with the company for years.

The company's 85 or so employees have health insurance, pension plans and other benefits. The company's philosophy, according to its president, Mark Brenntand, is not so much to make a killing as "to get work that gets everybody some money."

Any business person in any community in the state can tell you that its companies like this — and there are many in New Mexico, operating in many fields — that provide economic health and stability.

Insofar as the complaints of workers at Johnson's Big J Enterprises are representatives of the company's practices, they raise valid questions for voters. Just how beneficial is Big J to the economic well-being of this state?

Johnson, of course, doesn't want to be known as someone who provides temporary,

insecure jobs. Like all candidates for governor, his number one priority has to be good jobs for New Mexicans.

No doubt he believes this company provides a valuable service and perhaps it does. But in light of many of his workers' complaints, he needs to provide assurance to the state that if he's elected governor, he'll focus on creating good jobs with adequate benefits for his constituents.

The Democrats, meanwhile, are raising some questions themselves, as a result of a memorial passed by this year's Legislature. The memorial was co-sponsored by Democratic Senator Pete Campos and had to do with the site for a proposed new prison.

The memorial suggested state government look into replacing the Penitentiary of New Mexico's Main Facility near Santa Fe with a prison in Guadalupe County, one of the counties in Campos' district. Memorials don't have the force of law. But every state bureaucrat knows that when the Legislature suggests something, it's wise to follow up if you value next year's budget.

It turns out that land owned by Campos and his parents was among the prison sites under consideration.

Campos withdrew the land from consideration after some Republican senators got the idea that things weren't smelling just right.

The most striking things about this brief controversy came when Campos said it hadn't occurred to him that offering his land for sale to the state would be construed as a conflict of interest. Well, now he knows. Some people in this state, for no good reason, are just endlessly suspicious.

Apprentices serve in the Inn kitchen

In 1929, a group of chefs met in New York City with the dream of creating a new association with the primary goal of upgrading the cooking profession for American culinarians.

The association was called the American Culinary Federation and today, 60 years later, the work of that handful of chefs has blossomed into a nationwide organization with more than 200 chapters in cities all across the United States and the Caribbean.

As the nation's largest professional association representing culinarians, the ACF today boasts a membership of more than 18,000 cooks, pastry chefs and culinary educators.

According to a news release, the ACF has remained true to the goal established by those founding members. By providing educational op-

portunities for established professional chefs as well as culinary students just beginning their careers, the ACF continues to upgrade the profession.

As the primary representative of the culinary profession, an integral part of the American food service industry which is itself essential to the economic and social well being of the nation, the ACF play an important role in promoting the highest standards in the training of American chefs.

In more than 100 communities across the nation, the American Culinary Federation Educational Institute has established apprenticeship programs, registered with the Department of Labor, and administered by local ACF chapters.


In Mescalero, Certified Executive Chef James Muldowney began

the Mescalero Apache Apprenticeship Program on August 18, 1993, the very first American Indian Apprenticeship Program in the country.

These 10 apprentices must complete three years or 6,000 hours of on-the-job training. This course is planned in six semi-annual stages, with flexibility to shorten or lengthen any period according to individual ability.

During this time, the apprentice will keep a weekly training log book in which he or she will outline recipes and food preparation techniques that have been learned.

After completion, combining classroom instruction and employment with a certified chef, a graduate of the program may enter the culinary profession as a certified cook.
