## Escapee leads lawmen to missing man's body

An escapee from a minimum security prison led law enforcement officials to the body of Clark "Duke" Pfingsten, 84, who had been missing from his Lincoln home since early last week, a spokesman for the Roswell Police Department said.

David Michael Crawford, 24, who escaped Sunday from Camp

Sierra Blanca Adult Rehabilitation Center near Fort Stanton, was apprehended by police Wednesday evening at Goddard High School in Roswell after the department received a tip, police Sgt. Leo Lopez said.

Crawford was driving Pfingsten's pickup, according to police. Reports indicate Pfingsten had not been seen since Monday.

Sgt. Lopez said that Friday,

Crawford took police to a site nine miles east of Roswell, where they found Pfingsten's body behind a bush about 20 feet off a road at Bottomless Lakes State Park.

Lopez said Pfingsten apparently had been dead a few days. The state Office of the Medical Investigator in Albuquerque conducted an autopsy. Initial reports indicated Pfingsten had been crushed, possi-

ly from being run over by a vehicle.

Lou Armijo, public information officer for the State Corrections Department, previously told **The Ruidoso News** that Crawford had no history of violence. He was serving an 18-month sentence for receiving stolen property. He had been paroled last year, but violated the conditions of the parole and was sent back to prison. He was due to be released in late Decem-

ber, said Armijo.

Crawford was transferred from Chaves County to the Lincoln County Jail Friday. But Sunday, after being involved in a failed escape attempt (see related story), he was moved to a state prison facility.

Graveside services for Pfingsten will be at 11 a.m. Tuesday at the Lincoln Cemetery. Officiating will be Herman Ottshofski of Roswell.

## Freed inmate stops jail break attempt

A jailer on duty alone late Saturday was overpowered by several inmates during an attempted escape from the Lincoln County Jail.

But the escape was thwarted by other inmates, who rescued the jailer and forced the would-be escapees back into their cells.

County Commissioner Wilton Howell said Jeanette Walker was on duty by herself about 10:10 p.m. when inmates in one of the two "bullpens" or group cells, asked if she would open the cell door and remove a basket full of trash.

"They said the trash smelled and would she let them hand it to her," Howell said. "When she opened it, they overpowered her, tied her up, possibly with the intent of killing her."

"They released David Crawford, who was in solitary confinement (in connection with the death of Clark Pfingsten. See related story)."

County manager Carolin Cooney, who supervises the operation of the jail as part of her duties, said the jailer was gagged and placed in Crawford's cell.

"They had a towel around her neck, so apparently, they were ready to do what they had to do from all indications," she said.

One inmate, a large man from Capitan who was in the group cell with eight other offenders, appeared to be the leader of the escape effort, Cooney said.

Everybody else was much smaller than he, and I think they probably were intimidated," she said.

One of the eight opened the door to the other bullpen where several other large inmates were confined, said Cooney.

"They (the inmates in the second bullpen) took charge and got the

jailer out, especially, this one guy who had been used as a trustee," she said.

"He put her in the dispatch office and she called for help. The Carizozo police (Chief Charlie White and officer Duane Vinson) arrived within one minute. Our nearest deputy was in Nogal. But by the time they got there, the inmate had all of the others back in their cells. He handed the police officer the keys and said, 'Lock me up.'"

The inmate who helped the dispatcher was identified as Anthony Edward Estrada, serving 105 days for disorderly conduct, assault on a peace officer, resisting arrest and criminal damage to property.

"Wayland said he intends to speak to the judge about some serious time off his sentence after this," Cooney said.

Four other inmates who helped subdue those attempting to escape were George Padilla, Greg Baca, Fred Baca and Larry Barber.

Howell said it was "an extensive lesson and learned real inexpensively."

He was referring to the practice of having only one detention officer handling certain shifts.

It shows a need for a change of policy, not having one on duty alone at any time, whether they're female or not," Howell said.

Walker worked part time for the county as a jailer for a year before going full time about two to three months ago, Cooney said.

Howell commended Cooney for her handling of the situation.

"She immediately had (head detention officer) Wayland Hill double up manpower on each shift, especially with someone possibly associated with a murder in one of the cells," Howell said.

## Midtown construction crews go back to work after Labor Day; MainStreet board discusses parking, staffing, training and unity

Midtown sidewalk construction will resume on Sept. 6, Ruidoso assistant manager Alan Briley told the MainStreet board during a regular meeting Thursday.

Briley, liaison between the village and MainStreet, gave an update about the Sudderth Drive improvements project.

Board members told Briley that some Midtown merchants are concerned about traffic problems when construction begins again the day after Labor Day. He assured those present that all construction will take place between 5 a.m. and 10 a.m. to keep traffic problems to a minimum.

Answering questions about plans for parking lots and public

restrooms, Briley reported that the restroom facilities are on hold until a gas line can be moved. He said parking lots will continue to be paved as time and construction schedules permit.

Briley said the new wooden benches have been installed along Sudderth, and matching trash receptacles have arrived but need special liners which have been ordered. The receptacles will be placed next to the new benches.

Briley also mentioned that new light poles will be installed on Sudderth as soon as they arrive.

Board members commented on the positive input they have received about the entire project — the improved accessibility for per-

sons who are handicapped, parking, trees and the overall look of Sudderth.

"The response of the public about the new sidewalks has been very, very favorable," said board member Jay Ross.

Briley introduced Craig Remington, president of D&S Construction, who is in charge of the next phase of work.

In other discussion, one board member said that a couple of MainStreet volunteers have been overworked since the organization lost its paid project manager.

She expressed concern about the work load, including accounting and paperwork, which has been

carried by one or two board members.

"I think it's really too much to ask volunteers to handle that, when everybody is working full time somewhere else," said board member Sally Burkstaller.

"This is a job that's too much for volunteers," she added.

It was suggested that a part-time staff person be hired or retirees be enlisted to take over some of the office work.

Board member Bonnie Mattox said the new state director for MainStreet USA, Elmo Baca, will visit Ruidoso in September. Joining Baca in Ruidoso will be the nation-

al representative of Mainstreet USA.

"They expect to have training with every board member," said Mattox. "They want appointments set up with merchants along the street, and they expect to have a meeting with all the MainStreet membership. They also want to have a meeting with the village council," she added.

Discussion followed on ways to promote unity among Ruidoso businesses. Ideas ranged from organizing a Ruidoso business rally to running public service messages.

The next MainStreet Ruidoso board meeting will be at 8:30 a.m. Sept. 8, at the office in the Gazebo shopping center.

# Horse racing leaders testify before state legislative committee; warn of Indian gaming's impact on their industry & state taxes

Horse racing constitutes a \$367 million a year business in New Mexico, but industry figures say its future is threatened by gambling on Native American reservations and by the prospect of a state lottery.

R.D. Hubbard, owner of Ruidoso Downs and racetracks in several other states, told members of the legislative Revenue Stabilization and Tax Policy Committee Tuesday the only way racetracks can compete in New Mexico is to allow gaming machines at tracks.

Other states are recognizing the value of racetracks and are taking steps to keep them competitive, he said.

"It started in Louisiana. The law originally had been written to permit machines at truck stops, but there was no clear definition and anyone with a gas tank turned into a casino. It's been expanded now to a portion (of revenue) of all machines in the state goes to the racetracks," he said.

If voters approve a constitutional amendment in November for a state lottery and limited video gaming, the state will benefit in tax revenue from machines at tracks and can require a bigger percentage payoff than the public receives from machines on reservations.

"Every dollar spent there now takes money away from the track. People just don't have as much money the next day for track," Hubbard said. "And the state doesn't receive a penny in taxes."

State Rep. H. John Underwood (D-Ruidoso), noted that Ruidoso Downs will be competing against Casino Apache (at The Inn of the Mountain Gods), regardless of what happens in November.

"It's probably the same in Albuquerque and Santa Fe," he said. "I'm hearing that no matter what happens in November, the track is in competition with Indian gaming. If we don't pass the amendment, other legislation is needed to allow racing to compete."

"We can't control the Indian tribes through state legislation, but we can give racetracks more options. This area depends a great deal on racing. Without it, we're looking at severe economic disaster."

A card casino was initiated Aug. 1 at Hubbard's Hollywood Park in California.

"It's the first time casino and racetrack have been side by side," he said. "Simulcasting betting is up 20 percent, all from the card players. We make it very user friendly to bet the horses."

Television monitors are set up at each table and bet runners take the

money to place wagers and bring back tickets, he said.

"We don't have to be in direct competition," Hubbard said. "We can work as one industry."

"We'll find out in November what the voters want. If (the state lottery and limited machine gambling constitutional amendment) passes, you will be faced with designing the enabling legislation."

Committee chairman Edward Lopez, a state senator and Democrat from Santa Fe, noted that the law conveying a tax credit to racetracks for marketing is due to expire next year.

Hubbard said the provision provided a major positive impact for Ruidoso Downs.

"Nearly 100 percent of the patrons are from out of state and we spend in excess of a half million in advertising. The \$100,000 from the state is a major help and I'm sure that's true for the other tracks," he said.

Committee vice chairman Jerry W. Sandel, a state representative and Democrat from Farmington, asked Hubbard whether off track betting would impact the industry in New Mexico. Although the state legislature previously passed a bill permitting off track betting, it was vetoed by the governor, noted Bruce Rimbo, president of R.D. Hubbard Enterprises Inc.

Hubbard said the impact varies. In Arizona over the last three to four years, 35 off track locations have been opened. The handle went up 40 percent, but attendance at the track and related revenue from parking, admission and concessions went down.

"It will be the only salvation (in New Mexico), if (gaming) doesn't pass in November," he said.

Julian Luna, director of the State Racing Commission, agreed that off track betting and video gaming at racetracks are two avenues that could create a level playing field for racetracks to compete.

Underwood asked about the im-

act of Texas racing on New Mexico.

Hubbard said he didn't have any figures, but added, "I can tell you that a tremendous amount of horses, owners and trainers are going to Oklahoma."

Higher purses will keep them coming to New Mexico, he added.

"In the theory of racing, the higher the purse, the more valuable the horse and the more money is made from sales and the more off breeding," Hubbard said.

"Texas has not been that successful. We have an opportunity to bring a lot back here if the purses were higher."

"More importantly, people still are coming to Ruidoso, they're just not betting as much."

Ruidoso is down 10 percent in handle this last year and 20 percent for the past four years, he said.

"The tracks all say they are losing money annually," said Gil Moutray, chairman of the racing commission and a horse breeder.

"Ninety-five percent of the horsemen are losing money. Unless they win a substantial race, it's tough to hold your operation together. Less than 10 breeding farms in the state can actually show a profit. The industry genuinely needs help," said Moutray.

"This industry produces jobs, lots of jobs and we need them all," he added.

Part of the Hubbard presenta-

tion focused on the industry's economic impact based on a study commissioned by the racing commission. The information was compiled by James Hayes and Associates.

Pari-mutual racing and breeding is responsible for 9,300 jobs, most year-round, Rimbo said, quoting from the study. Racetracks provide 4,800 jobs and 4,500 come from related industries, including tourism. The average annual salary is \$14,000, slightly more than the state average.


But all of the impressive figures could be wiped out in a few years if casino and gambling devices proliferate, the study concludes.

Rimbo said the study showed that in 1991, Native American gambling accounted for 3 percent or \$720 million of the revenue pie. By 1993, that percentage had changed to 7.5 percent and \$2.5-billion.

All of it is tax free, he reminded legislators.

"We're facing the same thing here. We're three miles away from the Inn of the Mountain Gods," Rimbo said. "It's open 24 hours a day from Thursday through Saturday, the days the racetrack is open, and more limited hours on days we're not racing."

"We are feeling the impact. We're 1 percent down on attendance on live racing despite an extraordinary advertising campaign," he said.

After this incident, "I think the commission will take a different direction on staffing permanently," he said.

Cooney said she contacted Camp Sierra Blanca warden Sandra McFadin about moving Crawford to a state prison facility. Crawford escaped from the minimum security camp Aug. 14 and was arrested

Wednesday driving a pickup truck that belonged to Clark Pfingsten, who had been missing from his Lincoln home since last Monday.

Crawford later led authorities to the body of the 84-year-old Lincoln man.

Cooney said McFadin "put together an armed transport and he was out of here by 1 p.m. Sunday."

## Parents go back to school with students

Ruidoso Middle School was the site of eighth grade orientation Tuesday.

More than 200 students and parents received information about the "thematic" teaching technique which is used for the eighth grade class.

The thematic approach consists of two teams of four "core" teachers. With about 90 students per team, teachers are better able to give individual attention.

Any of the core teachers are able to help with student problem areas. The teachers talk and plan with each other to cooperate and build large instructional units around a central theme which changes every nine weeks.

Each nine-week theme incorporates the four core disciplines of science, math, language arts and social studies into a learning environment without highly structured limits such as defined subject class times. This approach allows students and teachers the flexibility to work on solving lengthy problems.

According to teachers, the thematic teaching approach allows the student to develop "real world" problem solving skills such as seeing the overall picture, time management, group cooperation and individual achievement.

The first theme is called "Who Am I?" and will bring together ele-

ments such as archaeological digs, tracing a family tree, social studies, statistics, science, culture, mathematics and language arts.

At the conclusion of each nine-week project, an "Expo" allows the students to display their findings and conclusions.

"Student comments on the program have been very positive," said principal Paula Papponi.

"They seem pleased with the results and can see how things fit together in the grand scheme of things."

Teachers also have seen student improvements in comprehension, retention and discipline.

According to a parent whose child had participated in the thematic program, teachers get to know the students better, thus allowing any problem areas to be quickly addressed.

Because of the nature of the program, a variety of supplies are needed. Teachers are asking for donations of items which will be used throughout the year for the various projects.

The items needed include: buckets, trowels, wood stakes, twine, string, shovels, hoes, plywood, old Legos, Tinker Toys, toothpicks, slide film, cassette tapes, tissue paper, wood glue, school glue and 35mm cameras.

Donations may be dropped off in the office at Ruidoso Middle School.

## New program helps keep teen parents in school

A new program to help pregnant teens and young parents stay in school is now in place at Ruidoso High School.

The Graduation, Reality, and Dual-Role Skills (GRADS) program encourages pregnant and parenting students to remain in school through graduation, while also teaching child development and parenting skills.

According to the local director of the GRADS program, Gayla Stanaland, many young people who find themselves in a parenting situation end up on welfare and feel unable to cope with the future.

"We look at different components," said Stanaland.

"We focus on prenatal care, pregnancy and economic independence, and how to balance all those roles successfully."

Helping prepare for the future

by providing learning experiences related to a positive self image is another way the GRADS program helps participants.

"We try to give students the confidence to make informed choices for themselves and their children," Stanaland said.

The GRADS program also provides an opportunity to acquire skills in communications, conflict resolution and problem solving, plus getting along with parents, boyfriends, husbands, in-laws and siblings.

Because childcare is a concern, the GRADS program is working to supply assistance, said Stanaland.

"We have a vision of in January having some type of childcare on campus," said Stanaland. "It is our goal to become licensed, even though at the present time the

state does not mandate that we do so, it will give us a lot more credibility."

The school already has a portable classroom in place by the football field specifically for the day care program.

"The daycare program is not actually part of the GRADS program, which is the educational part," said Stanaland. "The childcare component is separate, but they work so well together."

Until the on campus day care center becomes functional, Stanaland works with "Project Forward" and the Child Care Bureau to provide payment for baby sitting services to parents attending the GRADS program.

"There really is no reason why anyone can't take advantage of the GRADS program," Stanaland continued.

## March and rally planned to protest nuclear storage

A march and rally to protest plans to store nuclear waste in this area is set for Saturday starting at the Sacramento Building on Sudderth Drive, according to information provided by the organizers.

From 11 a.m. to 1 p.m., marchers will gather at 648 Sudderth Drive. The march will begin at 1 p.m. and move up Carrizo Canyon Road to the Mescalero Apache Reservation border for a demonstration.

An anti-nuclear rally will follow from 4 p.m. until dark at Two Rivers Park.

Organizers, who include Sacramento owner Dave Dale and Russ Warwick, former environmental officer for the Mescalero tribe, say there will be music and open microphones for persons to state their concerns.

"Help us tell (Mescalero Presidents Wehdell) Chino and the nuclear power industry where we

stand," they invite in a release about the event.

The Mescalero Tribal Council is working with 33 private nuclear fuel users to create a private storage facility on the reservation for high-level radioactive waste in the form of spent nuclear fuel rods.

The term MRS refers to a particular monitored retrievable storage facility that the federal nuclear negotiator and the Nuclear Regulatory Commission attempted to site on Mescalero and on other Native American tribal lands.

That program was put aside by the Mescalero tribe in favor of the private venture when federal money for studies ran out.

A new opposition group, based in an area that adjoins the reservation, and a government regional information committee have formed in recent months, focusing more local attention on the proposal.



# Lady Warriors qualify for state; boys take second in tournament

The Ruidoso High School Lady Warriors golf team turned in its best performance in years Monday and Tuesday in the Leroy Gooch Invitational at Cree Meadows, according to coach Becky Austin.

That exceptional effort qualified the team for the state tournament, which will be held in Ruidoso next month.

The girls' total of 816 was fifth overall in the AAA division, but just one shot back of district rival Socorro, who the girls will be battling in two weeks at the district tournament for the 3-AAA runner-up spot.

Oñate, last year's AAA state champion, is again very strong and should repeat as the district champ as the Las Cruces school will be

hosting the tournament on the home course, said Austin.

This year marks the first appearance by the Lady Warriors in the state tournament since 1988, when the girls finished sixth.

Three of the five spots on the Warrior team belong to eighth graders. Devon Lowe's 193 led the girls for the two days followed by Heather Stephens' 197.

The team's lone senior, Danielle Morris, a four-year letterman for the Warriors, was next with 210.

Katie Lukens shot 217 followed by sophomore Cecilia Fuentes' 220.

"I'm just so happy to see these girls do this," said Coach Austin.

"We've worked so hard and these girls have improved so much ... this will do so much for the program. I'm so happy for Danielle, who has stuck with it year after year, and

now she's going to get to go to a state tournament," said Austin.

The complete results of the Gooch appear below.

The boys team finished tied for second in the AAA of the Gooch, beaten five strokes by Deming.

The Warriors were third after the first day's play at Alto — five shots behind Lovington and three shots behind pre-tournament favorite Grants.

The Warriors' 325 during the second day at The Links at Sierra Blanca was the team's best total of the year, but Deming got a remarkable effort by Wildcats' fifth ranked player, Jon Sanchez. A sophomore, Sanchez fired an amazing 75, just one shot off the day's best score of 74, which was posted by Silver's All-Star Aaron Salars.

The Wildcats shot 333-313 for the two days.

Ruidoso had the ball first on offense and looked out of step for the entire 15-play series. Only a John Echols-to-Byron Soules pass play netted any real yardage as the Oñate defense dominated the line of scrimmage.

Oñate's first possession saw the Warrior defense give up yardage to start with, but as the series went on, Ruidoso tightened the screws on the bigger, stronger Knight offensive group.

The Warriors held Oñate's A-team scoreless on the Knights' first possession, which seemed to fire up the nervous home team's offense.

Starting at his own 30-yard line, Echols engineered a Warrior drive that mixed running and passing and methodically moved the football down the field against a very surprised Knight defense.

Facing a fourth down and five from the 15, Echols completed another key reception to Soules to potentially give the Warriors four more plays. They got one.

On first down, the Warrior coaches called an option, but Echols fumbled the ball and Oñate recovered ending the drive, leaving the Warriors with a bittersweet, "we-moved-the-ball-but-didn't-

score" taste in their mouths.

Oñate's second at-bat on offense was much more productive than its initial effort. The Warrior defense gave up a couple of big plays and suddenly Oñate was knocking on the door.

A key defensive pass interference call on the 10th play of the drive gave the Knights a first down on the five-yard line.

It took 13 of the allotted 15 plays, but Oñate scored from three yards out on third and goal. And again, as in the first defensive series, the Warrior defense played well with the exception of two-or-three plays.

The final "live" portion of the scrimmage, which was set to simulate game situations, saw the Warriors get Ruidoso's first score.

Oñate had the ball first on offense, but after one first down, the stingy Warrior defense got the ball back for the offense, and again Echols and the offensive group moved the ball down the field with precision.

Running backs Kyle Humphreys and Rex Comanche carried the football through huge holes the mostly-new Warrior line provided, putting the Warriors in position to score again.

A face-mask penalty on Oñate gave the Warriors a first down and moved the ball to the nine-yard line. Two running plays saw the ball get to the four but it appeared that Oñate's defense would fill the right gaps and keep the Warriors from scoring.

Third down brought a passing situation and when Echols rolled to his left, he spotted an open Ricky Pacini. The pass was low and a little in front of the receiver, but Pacini stretched out and made a circus catch in the end zone and there was nothing that any defender could do about it.

When the entire Warrior bench swarmed Pacini and Echols, fans said it was like a game-winning catch for the district championship in November, not a five-yard pass in a scrimmage in August.

After the field was cleared, and

Byron Soules pounded through the extra point, Oñate had two minutes to try to score again. The Knights made it to midfield before running out of time and opportunity.

### Coach pleased with Warriors' first efforts

First year Warrior head coach Les Carter was beaming after the scrimmage.

"I was really pleased at the way the kids played at the end. They showed they know how to win and they're not afraid to win. Our second and third possessions really showed what they're made of ... at this point, I couldn't be happier," said Carter.

"When I first went to Los Lunas, we had good kids, but they didn't think they could compete ... they were afraid to win. It took a couple of years with our system before they believed in themselves and had some success.

"The kids here are different. They believe they are a good football team. They believe they can beat the Artesias and the Lovingtons. That's one thing we're not going to have to teach them. I'm really proud of every one of them today," said Carter.

Carter wasn't the only coach who was impressed with the Warriors.

Former Warrior head coach Cooper Henderson was on hand to watch the scrimmage.

"I was impressed," said Henderson, who is the head coach in Artesia.

"The Ruidoso kids came back from a really shaky start and moved the football real well and their defense also looked very good. It should be a good game Friday. I'm looking forward to it," said Henderson.

The Warriors open the season at home Friday against Henderson's Artesia Bulldogs.

The Bulldogs have played in the state championship game in each of the last three years, winning the title twice.

Ruidoso Downs to post the fastest qualifying time for the world's richest quarter horse race to be run for the 36th time on Labor Day, Sept. 5.

## Major Rime, Daring Difference post the fastest qualifying times for the All American Futurity

The undefeated New Mexico-bred Major Rime and the stakes winning filly Daring Difference turned in impressive trial performances for the Grade I All American Futurity Friday and both qualified for the world's richest quarter horse race.

The classy juveniles will make their next start in the 36th running of the \$1.58 million All American on Sept. 5.

The All American is yard-for-yard the richest horse race in the world and annually attracts the nation's best 2-year-old quarter horses, according to a news release provided by Ruidoso Downs Race Track.

The winning owner will receive a check for \$1 million.

Major Rime scored his sixth straight win when he posted a neck win over Delightful Lark in the eighth trial division. The colt checked in with the fastest time.

Heritage Place Futurity winner Daring Difference made her Ruidoso debut a winning one when she toyed with her trial foes en route to an eye-popping 2 1/4-length win in the eleventh race. The filly stopped the timer in :21.54, which ranked her third on the list of 10 qualifiers.

Major Rime, who was supplemented to the trials for \$50,000 by owner-trainer Robert Driggers of Clovis, broke on the lead and held a head advantage over Delightful Lark 100 yards out of the gate.

Both horses dueling along the rail with Major Rime edging clear at the wire to win handily under jockey Bobby Don Harmon.

"He was about a neck off (the lead) at the start, but he ran up to the horse Eric (Perner) was on (Delightful Lark) and just went on with it," said Harmon. "The last 25 to 30 yards he might have been get-

ting a little tired, but his last race was the Zia (futures nearly two months ago). I think the race will do him good because he'd never run more than 350 yards."

The son of freshman sire Rime has never been seriously threatened in any of his starts for Driggers who also bred the colt.

Major Rime will seek his third futurity win in the All American.

The Mike Robbins-trainee Daring Difference broke perfectly from the gate and quickly opened up a two length lead on her competition in the eleventh trial.

The Victory Dash filly maintained her commanding lead midway down the racing strip and went on to win in effortless fashion with little urging from jockey G.R. Carter.

"She stumbled a little at the start, but she ran a really strong race and I rode her pretty hard to

make sure she'd get in (the final) because of the way the wind has been today," said Carter.

In fact, the wind was the primary reason local futurity winners Meltdown and Dash Its Couper did not qualify. The two finished seconds apart in the fifth trial, but ran into a stiff headwind which caused their respective times of :22.21 and :22.22 to be much slower than those later in the day when there was a tailwind or no wind at all.

Daring Difference has been a model of consistency throughout her young career and should be a major force in the rich final. The filly is owned by Joe Kirk Fulton of Lubbock, Texas.

Darlin Sixarun, who beat Daring Difference in the Remington Park Futurity, also qualified to the futurity with a :21.605 in the 10th race. The Sixarun gelding was supplemented by owners Gene Voss and Ernesto Guerra.

## Gypsy's On Parade rallies for a nose win in Sierra Blanca 'Cap

Janice Dunivan's Gypsy's On Parade uncharacteristically came from off the pace to score a nose win over fellow closer Whister Queen in the inaugural running of the \$24,850 Sierra Blanca Handicap, Sunday at Ruidoso Downs, according to a news release provided by Ruidoso Downs Race Track.

The 7-year-old by A Gypsy Says was sent off the lukewarm 3-1 favorite in the 11-horse field of New Mexico-bred fillies and mares. Under jockey Eric Perner, Gypsy's On

Parade did not flash her usual early speed and was eighth at the start of the six furlong sprint. Midway down the backstretch, the mare had improved her position to sixth, and was only four lengths behind pacesetter Thirty One Special.

In the turn, Perner guided Gypsy's On Parade to the outside and she quickly moved into second at the top of the lane. Under strong urging by Perner, the mare passed the rapidly firing Thirty One Special, then held off a late charge

from Whister Queen along the rail to secure the win. Sister Twister was a 3/4-length back in third.

The time was 1:13.1 over a muddy track.

"She broke good, but they were really running from there (the gate) and she took herself back. Down the backside I got through on the rail and once the speed horses stopped she kicked into another gear," said Perner, who had never ridden the mare before.

The win was worth \$14,910 to Dunivan of Bosque Farms, and

raised Gypsy's On Parade's earnings to \$62,582.

Whister Queen, trained by Jon Arnett and ridden by Billy Peterson, received \$5,487 for her effort. The 4-year-old filly by Tumbler is owned by Calvin Brewster of Albuquerque.

Sister Twister, who ran for a \$5,000 claiming tag only a month ago, ran a strong third with Carlos Rivas in the irons. The 4-year-old Full Choke filly is owned by Turner Racing Stable and trained by Gerald Marr.

## Longshot Imsortaspecial surprises favored field to win sprint

Jockey Todd Fincher won his fifth stakes race of the meet when he guided 24-1 longshot Imsortaspecial to an upset victory over a solid field of sprinters in the \$10,325 Ruidoso Sprint Championship, Saturday.

Imsortaspecial broke right with the leaders from the eight post in the six furlong sprint, but was

forced to travel five-wide down the backstretch.

Nearing the turn, Imsortaspecial was two-lengths off the lead of Power Stretch and remained within striking distance with three furlongs to go. At the head of the lane, five horses battled for the lead with Imsortaspecial on the far outside. Under a smart ride by Fincher, the

6-year-old gelding got a head in front of new leader Narbonne High then drew off in the final sixteenth to win by a comfortable two-length margin. The time was 1:11.3.

"There was a lot of trouble on the backside, but he got a clean trip because he was so wide," said Fincher. "He layed closer than I thought he would and when he is

that close he can be tough."

Trainer Ray Ashford had only started Imsortaspecial three times prior to the Sprint Championship after owner Carlos Perea put the gelding under his care in mid-June.

The 23-year-old conditioner is one of the youngest trainers on the grounds.

## Bassett horses dominate All American derby trials

Trainer John Bassett dominated the All American Derby trials as he won three races and qualified all of his entrants to the Grade I \$178,236 race, Thursday at Ruidoso Downs.

Bassett saddled R.D. Hubbard's First To Score to a 2 1/4-length win in the second trial.

In the next trial, Joan Dale Hubbard's Pritzi Dash outbattled 1-2 favorite A Streak Of Cash for a head victory to give Bassett two straight wins.

In the fourth, the Arizona-based conditioner took Heza Fast Man to the gate as the 1-5 favorite and he lived up to the bettors' high expectations as he drew off nearing the finish for a 3/4-length win over filly Special Eye Appeal.

Heza Fast Man, owned by San Tan Tillage, Mike Hastings and others of Queen Creek, Ariz., stopped the timer in :21.44 seconds and is the fastest qualifier for the 440-yard final for 3-year-olds slated for Sept. 4.

Pritzi Dash clocked a :21.73, which was sixth fastest, while First To Score made it into the final with the ninth fastest time of :21.83.

"Before today I thought I had three great derby horses and any one of them could win," said Bassett. "They all are training good and were setting up to the trials perfectly."

Heza Fast Man finished second by a nose in last year's All American Futurity and, according to jockey Henry Garcia, the colt by The Signature has improved with age.

"I think he's a way better horse than he was as a 2-year-old and

he's running awful big right now," said veteran rider Garcia. "He's the type of horse that likes to play and you've got to keep after him, but he runs good and fast and you can't ask anymore than that."

Second fastest qualifier Time For Royal Cash easily defeated her trial foes by an ever-widening 2 1/4-lengths in the fifth and final trial. The Dash For Cash filly traveled the 440 yards in :21.50 seconds under jockey Alex Baldillez who was riding the Vicki Wiggins-trainee for the first time.

"They said they wanted a good quarter mile (race) in her and I gave them one," said Baldillez, who was offered the mount on Time For Royal Cash a week ago.

"I figured she'd be tough in the race. I hit her six or seven times, but she did it easy."

Time For Royal Cash is out of the dam Time To Take Off and is a half-sister to last year's All American Derby winner Royal Down Dash. The filly is owned by Abigail Kawanakoa of Honolulu, Hawaii, who also owns A Classic Dash, winner of the 1993 All American Futurity.

The first trial was the best race of the day as Ducky Fred and I Hear A Symphony dead heated for the win. Both horses qualified to the derby with a time of :21.70.

# Candidate for lieutenant governor speaks to Ruidoso Rotary Club

Patricia Madrid, Democrat candidate for state lieutenant governor, spoke recently to a full house at the Ruidoso Rotary Club, according to a news release.

Madrid is the running mate of incumbent Democrat Gov. Bruce King in the November general election.

Introduced by State Rep. John Underwood (D-Ruidoso), Madrid discussed her role in a King administration and emphasized the experience and leadership of Gov. King, continued the release.

Madrid explained her background as being in the third branch of government, the judiciary. A former district judge, she has served as the chief presiding judge for the second judicial district in Bernalillo County.

She currently practices commercial law in Albuquerque.

An lieutenant governor, Madrid said she would preside over the state senate, serve in the governor's cabinet, act as governor in the absence of the governor, serve as a voting member of the State Board of Finance and chair the Border Authority.

Discussing Gov. King's background, Madrid drew contrasts between him and Republican Gary Johnson.

According to the release, Madrid noted Johnson's lack of experience and said that he has previously performed no government service. Gov. King, she said, has given many years of service to New Mexico. She referred to recent polls which show significant King support among long-time New Mexicans.

Madrid emphasized the strong leadership which King has provided and added that he is widely known for his even temper, his loyalty and his honesty. She said previous King administrations have successfully left the state budget in the black and that the state currently enjoys a budget surplus.

Referring to New Mexico's flourishing economy, she told Rotarians that the state has recently received an AA-1 bond rating and is one of only 10 states to have a rating that high.

She urged New Mexicans to study the issues, listen to the candidates and to continue their support for Gov. King.

This week, Colin McMillan, Republican candidate for the U.S. Senate, will speak at the Ruidoso

She married K.C. Pritchett Dec. 6, 1937. He preceded her in death in August 1979.



### Thanks for helping us help the animals

Generous is the word that best describes the people of Ruidoso.

Each year The Ruidoso News sponsors a giant community garage sale to benefit the Lincoln County Humane Society, and each year the people who live in and around Ruidoso donate tons of items to sell at the daylong event. This year was no exception. As soon as we spread the word that we were getting ready for the garage sale, generous people started driving up and unloading truckloads of merchandise.

On Friday, the day of the sale, customers started lining up at 7:30 a.m., ready to spend a few dollars to support the Lincoln County Humane Society. Over and over generous customers said, "keep the change; it's for a good cause."

Money raised at the garage sale (final figure isn't available yet) will be used to spay and neuter abandoned animals at the shelter. Spending money to spay and neuter animals is an investment in a brighter future for animals. Preventing the continuing unchecked reproduction of cats and dogs is the most important step in eliminating the suffering of the animals and the tax burden to the community.

Animals that are not spayed or neutered reproduce at an alarming rate — 45 cats and 15 dogs are born for every human baby. Because of this national crisis in animal overpopulation, 14 million dogs and cats are killed in shelters each year.

That message has been heard loud and clear in the Ruidoso area, where the council passed a mandatory spay and neuter ordinance before the state followed suit with a similar law.

Thanks, Ruidoso, for pitching in to help make our community garage sale a big success for the abandoned and neglected dogs and cats who end up in the kennels at the humane society.



## The Light of Day

### Is there a blueprint in our future?

State Sen. Manny Aragon and state Rep. Max Coll can expect a lot of grief for their separate proposals to increase taxes to improve education, roads, parks and the like. But their ideas are worth listening to — unless New Mexicans want to abandon any chance of improving our standard of living.

We can't have it both ways. We can't have better and better schools and lower and lower taxes; we can't have the infrastructure necessary for economic growth without paying for it.


For years, we have listened, at distressing length, to statistics about New Mexico's poor showing relative to many other states. Our average income is alarmingly low, our teenage pregnancy rates are high, our dropout rates in some districts are shameful, critics tell us.

During the current election campaign, it would be too much to ask our major politicians running for office to confront head-on the issue of basic improvements — and the taxes to finance them.

Ever since Walter Mondale, running for president, raised the possibility of higher taxes — and was swamped at the polls — politicians have been even more certain than before that taxes mean death at the polls.

But Aragon, the Senate president pro tem from Albuquerque, and Coll, a powerful representative from Santa Fe, are on solid enough political footing to raise some questions, and suggest some painful answers, to some of New Mexico's real-life problems.

Aragon, in defending his proposal for long-range planning (and long-range tax increases) quoted from a 1991 report by New Mexico First, a sort of citizen think tank, as he called it. He noted that U.S. senators Pete Domenici

(R) and Jeff Bingaman (D) played key roles in establishing the organization.

By relying on New Mexico First for some of his information, Aragon was trying to convince critics that he isn't the wild-spending, crazy liberal they make him out to be.

New Mexico First, Aragon recalled, said that "New Mexico's investment in infrastructure has steadily declined since the early 1980s. Time is running out."

"If New Mexico is to avoid a crisis, then we must create new and innovative means of identifying, prioritizing and financing our emerging infrastructure needs."

New Mexico First went on to stress that improvements shouldn't be done piecemeal. The group said it "believes that any immediate changes should be made solely within the framework of long-range solutions. Strong leadership and carefully crafted planning will allow New Mexico to enter the 21st century with the infrastructure it needs to realize its vision."

One critic of Aragon's suggestion — and he hasn't lacked for critics — said Aragon "has been contemplating how much pork he could smear around our state — and how many

grateful voters he could grab for himself and his partisans — by boosting taxes of one kind or another for a billion-dollar spending spree.

Coll, concerned about education in the state, wants residents to consider improving higher education through increases in property taxes.

Property tax increases always face tremendous opposition in the Legislature, both from representatives of poor people, who stand to lose their homes if property levies go too high, and of the wealthy — most of whom could, if truth be known, absorb some pretty hefty increases in property rates.

Any time, moreover, that politicians propose spending programs, the voters figure most of the benefits will go to friends of lawmakers — contractors, road builders and so on. Pork barrel projects will be scattered around the state according to which lawmakers vote with the legislative leadership, rather than where the projects are needed, the voters figure.

The voters are right. The Legislature always gives us the bad right along with the good. But we need to improve our schools, and money is part of the way to do it. And to have a sound economy, we have to have a sound infrastructure — roads, parks, water and sewer systems.

We can't maintain, much less improve, our standard of living on the cheap. The voters know that, and if the politicians have a real blueprint for the future — and not just the usual, year-to-year sketches for giving tax money to favored constituents — voters will listen.
