



## Council increases garbage rates

The Ruidoso Village Council voted Tuesday to increase the price of garbage collection for both residential and commercial customers.

In a five-to-one vote, with Councilor Frank Potter voting "no," the council boosted residential rates from \$6 to \$7.50 a month and increased commercial rates to \$19 per unit for once-a-week service.

That \$19 will be charged for each additional dumpster and for each additional pickup, according to information provided by Joe Lewandowski, director of the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority.

The village is among the four governing bodies in the authority which provides services of collection and disposal of garbage and refuse in the village, as well as elsewhere in the county.

Even though the authority has the responsibility for operating the system and developing a landfill, it doesn't have the authority to set rates.

That's a problem, according to Councilor Potter, who didn't enter into the half-hour discussion on garbage rates before casting the dissenting vote.

In a telephone interview Wednesday, Potter said he's fed up with the members of the authority treating it as four separate entities rather than one cohesive policy- and rate-setting organization.

"It totally negates possible fairness to members," said Potter. "The authority should have the authority to set rates," he added.

Mayor Jerry Shaw, who serves on the authority board, said during Tuesday's meeting that the county was remiss in refusing to raise rates in light of the figures presented by Lewandowski, who has made detailed presentations to each governing body in the authority.

Potter, too, found fault with the county's decision to defer the

authority's debt rather than raise rates. He said if the county doesn't charge enough to cover the costs of serving its residents, then the people in the villages end up paying.

Lewandowski backed up his request for a rate increase with numbers on how much it costs to serve each village and the county. He said those numbers weren't available when Lincoln County leaders embarked on this regionalization of garbage collection and disposal. Now that he has true numbers, he wants each entity to pay its fair share.

Questioned about why the village was able to operate in the black for so many years before selling its equipment and transferring the garbage department to the solid waste authority, Lewandowski said that times have changed.

"I keep hearing that Ruidoso made money; well, they probably did," said Lewandowski, reminding the council of the rigid and expensive environmental requirements that have been added to the equation since then.

He said the landfill is costing more than \$3 million in contrast to the \$20,000 a year Ruidoso used to pay to use the Capitan landfill.

This rate hike is the first in a dozen years, and it will be used to provide better service, said Lewandowski.

He said modifications at the transfer station on Gavilan Canyon Road will make it more convenient for commercial customers to dispose of their trash. That should cut down on illegal dumping, he said.

Lewandowski described plans to organize the special pickups which are costly to the authority.

Lewandowski said he'll implement a zoned grid system using a two-person crew to work on special pickups all the time. Residents will know what day they're on the

schedule, so they can plan on when to put out large items and bags of pine needles.

Lewandowski said Wednesday the rate increases approved by the villages of Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs and proposed in Capitan will increase revenues by \$239,256, with \$197,400 of that from Ruidoso customers.

He said he'll decrease expenses by \$93,000, with \$75,000 of that in Ruidoso and \$18,000 in the county.

Ruidoso contributes \$1,029,019 annually to the authority, with the county at \$332,782, Ruidoso Downs at \$118,259 and Capitan, \$59,213.

Councilor Potter said Wednesday he's upset with the service as well as the rates.

"This town is as nasty as I've ever seen it in my life," said Potter. "The authority has put us in a position where we have to go out and spend \$10,000 to pick up trash."

"The next thing I am going to propose, if this isn't straightened out by November, is that we sever all relations with the authority and get back in the garbage business."

In other regular business Tuesday, the council:

—Established an Arts and Film board with village manager Gary Jackson as the staff liaison.

—Scheduled a public hearing to consider a New Mexico Finance Authority loan to purchase a street sweeper.

—Scheduled a public hearing to reconsider an ordinance setting standards for fencing.

—Heard a proposal by Tom Dorgan to lease land at Eagle Creek to establish a winter snow play area.

—Heard reports from deputy manager Alan Briley on the water treatment plant, airport project, Main Street and Highway 48.

—Welcomed Chay Rennick as village attorney, sitting in for attorney John Underwood.



## Schools battle bus problems, reorganize Business

With the addition and opening of the new Sierra Vista Primary, Ruidoso Schools bus transportation has undergone a complete overhaul in routing, announced Roger Sowder, transportation director for the schools.

Realizing the new attendance site would produce new and special concerns regarding safety and efficiency, the district applied to the State Department of Education School Bus Transportation and was approved for six new and additional routes, said Sowder.

No routing analysis or evaluation of current busing program has occurred since 1984, when the current Ruidoso High School opened, he added.

However, the district has grown steadily in student population since the 1990-91 school year, with only one additional bus placed in service.

"Growth and population patterns within the district have created high-density pockets which, under past established routes, created no flexibility within the transportation program," said Sowder.

"Additionally, all students of Ruidoso Municipal School district qualify for bus riding privileges because of the hazardous walking conditions clause."

District officials, along with contractors, drivers and school personnel, conducted a complete review of

the transportation program in June as a means to better plan for the current school year and new attendance site.

Sowder said more than 100 man hours were spent in analyzing current situations and future concerns. Maps of routes, loading areas, stops, grade level of students, student residence, route outlines and a summary for each driver were discussed and developed to meet foreseen needs.

Some of the problems which were analyzed in June included, of course, the opening of a new attendance site, extended on-bus time for many students and long waiting times at attendance sites which created discipline concerns, he said.

A particular concern of parents was that younger, elementary students, were required to ride with older, secondary students. Another concern of the district was that the shortage of buses required tiered routing (double runs). Tiered routing requires additional personnel at attendance sites for late departing buses, allows no flexibility in pick-up or drop-off times at individual schools and no flexibility during inclement weather, said Sowder.

Additionally, many younger elementary students were riding the bus for too long and almost all students were riding separate buses for morning pick-up and afternoon delivery home.

Adding to the problems was the

fact that each school site was being served by a majority of the buses, creating excessive traffic congestion and concerns for safety.

"Of utmost concern to the district is revamping the routing system in revamping the children and efficiency of delivery," said Sowder.

"Once the bugs have been worked out, the new routing will alleviate children riding different buses," he said. "They will ride the same bus both a.m. and p.m., which should promote better communication between school, parents, student and driver."

Recognizing the possibility of severe congestion at the White Mountain/Sierra Vista sites, some routes have been organized to serve only one school. Since fewer buses will serve individual schools, less traffic congestion will occur.

Routes now have greater flexibility and adjustments can occur to better accommodate individual school starting times, said Sowder.

"Though problems have been recognized and are currently being worked out, the new routing will eventually reduce riding time for most of the students," said Sowder.

"Parents have been very receptive to the fact that elementary and secondary students will be riding separately."

"The new routing has alleviated many concerns of the past, but the district recognizes that others have

been created. The greatest concern expressed by parents regarding the new routing has been that, in some cases, siblings will be riding different buses both to and from school.

In responding to the concern regarding traffic congestion, fewer buses serving individual schools requires that some families will need to adjust home schedules to benefit from district transportation. Overload adjustments are currently being made to become in compliance with district and state standards."

Route adjustments will occur on Friday, Aug. 26, to relieve overloaded buses.

Sowder said all students affected by the route adjustments have been notified and notes have been sent home to parents. He anticipates that other adjustments, including changes in pick-up and drop-off times, will occur until after Labor Day. Permanent times and routes will become effective by mid-September.

"Parents are urged to recognize the massive undertaking by the district to provide safe and efficient service for the children," said Sowder.

"Creation of an entirely new routing service requires hours of diligent study and cooperation by everyone," said Sowder.

"The district will continue to be responsive to individual concerns."

## Downs speeds up business licensing process

New businesses will be able to begin operations sooner in Ruidoso Downs because of a joint powers agreement between the village and the state Taxation and Revenue Department (TRD) which was approved at the Board of Trustees regular meeting Monday.

The joint powers agreement will enable Ruidoso Downs to register and assign taxpayer identification numbers to taxpayers engaging in business in the village. The local registration of taxpayers will assist new businesses by speeding up a process which previously required about 10 days to receive while

helping the village obtain all the tax revenues it is due.

According to Mayor Joe Hayhurst and village clerk Leanne Weibrecht, the agreement will speed up the process thereby allowing new businesses to begin operations immediately.

Weibrecht explained that all new businesses including road side vendors are required to have a taxpayer identification number.

"The police are given an updated list every Friday and they go out and check," she said.

Chris Weatherford, representing Mothers Against Drunk Driving (MADD), gave a presentation and asked for financial assistance from

the village. It was explained by the mayor that the anti-donation clause prevents the village from granting such requests.

Weatherford responded that the county had the same clause but is structuring a "contract for services" to help with program costs.

Council members praised Weatherford's work with MADD and assured her that they would look at next year's budget and see if some sort of aid was possible.

In other business, two mobile home variances and the bid by Barnett Carpets for village hall window blinds were approved.

The next board of trustees meeting will be at 7 p.m. Monday, Sept. 12, at the municipal building.

functioning very much in a mass production paradigm.

"I also came out of the series of meetings with a partner, the school superintendent," Andrews said. "We went to our local school board and we asked them to put some money on the table on the condition that we would get all the other school boards across the country to put money on the table in an equal amount, and we would bring in some external expertise to help us put together one of the most advanced agile manufacturing technology academies in the nation and that's exactly what we did. We put together a very detailed program design," which is being reproduced at sites across the country.

"We met Bill Butler in Washington D.C. and we've been working together ever since."

Each site should have something unique to offer the others, Andrews said.

"Exactly what it will be at Mesalero is very difficult to say, because everything must be tailored to its own local region," Andrews said. "We're pulling together a national vision as to where industry is headed in the 21st Century. So often education comes to industry and says 'What do you need?' They say, 'I don't really know.' They have not been able to sit down and identify the skills that they need. So what we have done is taken a national vision, put together by the agile manufacturing enterprise forum at Lehigh University (in Pennsylvania) and used that vision to create a program design, an entire curriculum from the bottom up starting with kindergarten."

They found it difficult to change the training at the university level without changing the feeder systems, he said.

The curriculum focuses on kindergarten through high school with college credit for some work.

"Mesalero offers very unique strengths such as environmental respect," Andrews said. "There's an awful lot that other institutions can learn from the Mesalero, particularly in the area of the timber industry."

"Typically, students do not receive any training in organizational design, team building, conflict resolution until they're in a master's program. So we're turning that all upside down and teaching

the children the difference between craft industry, making unique products one at a time, and mass production and lean manufacturing; really the difference between push and pull systems.

"In mass production days, manufacturers pushed their products onto the customers and there were huge inventories and you took whatever was there."

"The lean production paradigm is very much a pull system based on customer wants and needs. The customer pulls the product and that pulls the entire production system down the line. The rate of productivity dramatically increases."

The group developed modules, or learning units based on some of the training programs that GM provides its engineers.

As the program moves into the middle school grades, the focus shifts to an array of technologies.

"Students work in self managed teams, literally teaching themselves in a very hands-on way," Andrews said. They become better informed about career choices.

Business concepts are introduced in high school. Entrepreneur incubators also are part of the program. One class is taught how to repair personal computers, and how to run and manage a related business. The money they earn from that enterprise is used for college scholarships.

Butler said one module he definitely intends to use with his kindergarten students is based on McDonalds and focuses on different work place organizations, visual controls and error proofing.

"The first time through, the wrapping section goes totally crazy," Thompson said.

"We want to adopt the approach, because of our students' lack of knowledge of what manufacturing is, to train our teachers and to bring a viable education to our schools," Butler said.

A high tech laboratory program is set to begin next year in Mesalero in kindergarten classes.

"The elementary teachers really have grabbed onto it. We plan to visit other schools, train our teachers at General Motors, if possible," he said.

The manufacturing skills to be developed will be reservation driven in forestry products, welding containers, fish hatchery, and other technologies to be brought onto the reservation in the future.

### Federal court awards Hondo woman \$85,000 after law officers raid her home by mistake

A Lincoln County woman has been awarded \$85,000 in a settlement of a suit stemming from a 1992 drug raid on the wrong house in the Hondo Valley.

Diana Vazquez contended that she feared for her life and the lives of her children when two men in black ski masks carrying military weapons pushed their way into her home in early October two years ago.

She accused the New Mexico State Police and the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department of

violating her civil rights when they erroneously entered her home looking for a suspect as part of a massive drug raid.

Bob Gardenhire, chief counsel for the New Mexico Department of Public Safety, confirmed the settlement Wednesday.

"We shared responsibility with the sheriff's department," he said.

"We settled, because we made a mistake and went to the wrong residence. We had several search warrants and there was some con-

fusion," he added.

Sheriff James McSwane said he had not been notified by the county's insurance carrier that the case was being settled.

"I don't think the county approved and I know the sheriff's department wasn't contacted about approving a settlement," he said.

Attorney Albert Rivera of Alamogordo represented Vazquez in U.S. District Court in Las Cruces. Contacted in Hondo, Vazquez declined comment on the settlement.

## Consultant describes new direction in plans for nuclear waste storage facility

A representative of the Mescalero Apache Tribal Council says he'll answer questions for a regional nuclear information committee, but won't stand for a barrage of verbal abuse.

Miller Hudson, public information director for the Mescalero/Utility Spent Fuel Initiative, appeared at last week's meeting of the MRS Regional Information Committee in response to an invitation from Chairman Jerry Shaw.

"The council is fully aware that, if it is successful, this project will impact its neighbors," Hudson said.

"We would like to talk about those impacts and how they can be handled to your satisfaction. We will meet anytime, anywhere to discuss those impacts."

"But if the purpose of this forum is to attack the Mescalero Tribal Council, its officers or the tribe itself, we will respect your freedom of speech, but we will not subject ourselves to a monthly dose of public abuse and ignorant invective."

"Nonetheless, we intend to provide accurate information to the public. The former MRS center at Mescalero will soon be open daily with expanded exhibits and informational materials."

Clarifying the current status of the project, Hudson said the tribal council no longer is actively involved in the monitored retrievable storage (MRS) program administered by the federal government.

"This represents more than a name change," he said. "The MRS program is a specific federally legislated approach to the interim storage of spent nuclear fuel. As best we can tell, the program is lacking in both political will and congressional commitment."

The council was involved in the MRS for three years, Hudson noted. That program guaranteed "a seat at the table for all affected communities, financial benefits and the conditions of operation would have been determined not just by the Mescalero Apache Tribe, but by

every government represented here today."

Hudson contended that instead of conferring with the tribe, a strategy of obstruction was adopted. That strategy succeeded in terminating the federal program and the tribal council is now pushing an economic opportunity outside the federal MRS framework.

"We keep hearing that there will be a vote sometime later this year (on the reservation about the storage project)," said Shaw, who is mayor of Ruidoso. "What does the vote have to be, a simple majority or 100 percent?"

"The referendum will not be scheduled until we have an agreement (with the utilities)," Hudson said. "The council feels by Oct. 1, we may be ready. They feel we still are on track. We will have the first draft this week. Representatives from five (of the 33) utilities and their attorneys are meeting with consultants from the other side. If the council feels it can recommend the result, it will be adopted and sent to a referendum."

"The council could require a super majority vote. No one expects it to be unanimous."

Shaw said she doesn't see the project creating jobs for the Mescaleros because of the highly technical nature of the project.

Hudson replied that while the fuel is dangerous, the process amounts to high tech storage. It will demand only a few persons with high qualifications.

"A lot of the jobs will be routine and involve maintenance of the facility," he said. It will take five years and \$8 to \$10 million dollars to get to the point of construction, and then another five years to build the storage unit, he estimated.

During construction, the number of jobs available should be in the hundreds, but after it is completed, about 150 permanent jobs are envisioned, he said. Of those, 10 percent may be technical. The rest would demand no more than an associates degree, usually a two-year program.

"There will be plenty of time to train them over the 10 years it may take to get ready," he told committee members.

Hudson said two sites are being studied, both in the northwest corner of the reservation, east of the Three Rivers area.

Chris Wentz, coordinator of the state's radioactive waste task force, asked whether communities would be allowed to view the agreement between the tribe and the utilities before the tribal council votes.

"We would love input from the state and from local communities as we craft the agreement," Hudson said. But the exact terms concerning revenue, liability, power and control are not being negotiated in a public forum, he said.

"If you want to wade in, I suggest someone wade in now and not wait," Hudson said.

"It's hard to give meaningful input if you're not in on the ground floor and don't know its contents," Wentz said.

Hudson said aspects of the agreement affecting safety will be contained in the public application and subjected to hearings.

"The utilities will hold title to the fuel and all the liability," he said. "I know this is a contentious area at the moment. You will have to decide whether the tribe did a good job when we see the agreement."

"No one has a greater stake in the continued prosperity of tourism (than the Mescaleros)," Hudson said. "This is not being decided lightly. They studied it for three years. It's dangerous. They will have it on their land. Their enterprises will suffer the most. We don't live in a risk free world."

"The council feels it has a vital responsibility to diversify the reservation economy. 50 percent of the residents are under the age of 21. They believe they have the sovereign right to pursue it, but not to ignore the rights of their neighbors."

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# Are you ready for some football?

## Warriors face state champion Artesia Bulldogs Friday

It's been a long year for the young Ruidoso Warrior football team, but finally, the wait is over.

Tomorrow night, Cooper Henderson and his two-time defending state champion Artesia Bulldogs will hit the turf of W.D. Horton Stadium against the upstart Ruidoso Warriors.

Henderson won't have any trouble finding the field, though. As Ruidoso's head coach he guided the Warriors to the playoffs in all but one of his five years at the helm, netting one state championship and two second-place finishes.

Since Henderson's move to Artesia, the Bulldogs have won two-straight championships, and finished second three years ago.

Friday's contest will mark the debut of new Warrior head coach Les Carter.

Carter replaced Mike Gaston who is now the defensive coordinator at Texas AAAAA power San

Antonio Marshall. Previously from Los Lunas, Carter took the Tigers from the out-house to the penthouse in his tenure there. While Los Lunas teams didn't win any championships, they were definitely in the thick of things during the past few seasons, playing mostly Albuquerque schools.

Last week Ruidoso scrimmaged former District 3-AAA rival Oñate. The Warriors and the Knights battled to 1-1 draw, with Ruidoso dominating the last half of the game.

That made Carter a happy camper.

"We were very pleased with the way our young men finished the scrimmage," said Carter. "We were a little flat at first ... I don't know if it was first game, or first scrimmage jitters, but we were a little flat. We have to come out (against Artesia) like we finished against Oñate," said Carter.

The Bulldogs' famed run-and-

shoot offense is first and foremost on Carter's mind. How do you stop it?

One thing that will help Carter and the Warriors is that David Joseph and David Patterson have graduated — whew!

But that still leaves the problem of playing mostly pass defense when most high school football teams run the ball 70 percent of the time. It's just hard to get used to — and Henderson uses the high powered offense masterfully.

"They are a very disciplined ball team, a team we're not going to be able to make very many mistakes against. But, I also feel that they are more disciplined on the offensive side of the ball than the defensive side, so hopefully we will be able to move (the ball) against them," said Carter.

In order for the Warriors to stop the Bulldogs, they have to do something to disrupt the precise timing that the run-and-shoot must have to be successful.

To accomplish that goal, the Warriors will employ a new five-man line — two linebacker alignment. The key is for the defensive ends, Robert Guardiola and Joey Bewley, to bump Artesia's wingbacks and the corner's to do the same against the Bulldogs' wide receivers.

If this can be done, that precious timing will be knocked out of kilter and the Bulldogs will look a little less like a machine and more like a mortal high school football team.

And, of course, another worry that Carter has is Henderson's always-impressive special teams play. In his tenure here as the Warriors head coach, Henderson's Warriors seemed to score countless touchdowns on kickoff and punt returns.

While the Warriors have used the "starburst" return like Artesia, not since Henderson was here was it truly a threat.

The Warriors must kick the ball into the corners, away from the

"dealer" or handoff man — or low and hard, past the front people, who also can run a starburst, if the opportunity presents itself.

Ruidoso is much more prepared to win this football game this year than the Warriors were last year. Those "Super Sophomores" from the 1993 team have another year under their belts and the team played in some very close ball games, including the opener against Artesia, which RHS ultimately lost 31-19.

Of course that score didn't indicate the true ball game, because the Warriors led in the game twice and knocked on the door twice more. It was a great high school football game.

This is a game that is very, very important to Ruidoso; to Artesia it's probably no big deal. The present day Warriors are forced to hear about the success of the football program in the '80s, but face it, quarterback John Echols was in the sixth grade the last time the War-

riors played in the state finals and last year's super sophomores were still trying to find their pacifiers.

The kids from Artesia only know that their coach used to coach in Ruidoso. They are not intimidated by Ruidoso's ancient football success.

That's probably the good news. To be probably the best high school football coach in New Mexico, Coach Henderson's record in pre-district is not that ... stellar.

Perhaps that's because of a tough schedule, or perhaps because he knows kids can only get "up" for a game so many times a season.

Whatever it is, it's a plus for Ruidoso because the Warriors are playing the state champs and the state champs are playing a team that went 4-7 last year.

Game time is set for 7:30 p.m. Channel 11 will offer its replay at 9 a.m. Saturday morning and the live coverage will be provided by both KRUI and KBUY radio stations.

Both Bandit Commander and Roythelittleone scored wins in the Aug. 12 futurity trials and stand out among their competition in the six furlong race.

The futurity is the centerpiece of the 16-race program on tap Saturday. A simulcast of the Grade I \$500,000 Beverly D Stakes from Arlington International Racecourse near Chicago is slated as the fifth race.

Last year's winner, Flawlessly, is expected to face a field of eight, which includes stakes winners Corazona and User Friendly.





The Oklahoma-based rider is well-known for doing a back flip every time he wins a stakes race.


Salvador Estrada Jr. came in for the place with Forest King taking third in the jockey matchup.

Sonnamaker said 164 students enrolled in the new middle school, grades six through eight. Another 165 are attending the high school with 222 at the elementary school.


The figures are close to the district's projection, she said. "That's hitting it close, probably a few more than projected," Sonnamaker said.

Obstetric care remains available to pregnant women in Ruidoso, according to local health officials.

The closing of Dr. Roger Beechie's practice recently threw a scare into some women, who thought they might have to drive hundreds of miles to receive prenatal and obstetric care, officials said.

"Dr. Steven Frey and Dr. Deborah Hewitt provide obstetric care," said Valerie Miller, administrator of Lincoln County Medical Center.

"Dr. Vickie Williams offers gynecological services predominantly," Miller told The Ruidoso News

Wednesday.

Help also can be found at the county Health Department on Kansas Street.

Just as Ruidoso has a highly mobile general population as well as seasonal residents, its medical community also tends to be fluid.

Miller attempts to provide a stable base of services by holding onto the physicians already in town and recruiting others.

"I'm currently recruiting a replacement family practice physician for Dr. Beechie who would do (obstetrics)," Miller said the hospital averages between 25 and 30 deliveries a month.

Although the hospital does not have a neonatal intensive unit, a system to provide that type of care has been established.

"What we attempt is to transfer before delivery, if a woman has gone into premature labor," she said. "If that's not possible, we arrange for a neonatal transport, with special teams that come down from Presbyterian or the University of New Mexico medical centers in Albuquerque. They fly back with the infant."

Presbyterian offers a perinatal unit for high risk pregnant women. Leshia Dunn, office manager for Dr. Hewitt, said early care is an important key to a successful delivery.

"When a woman finds out she's pregnant, she should contact our office or better, she should come in person, because there are so many different plans," Dunn said. "More financial assistance is available than many women realize. The Medicaid income standards have gone way up for prenatal care. Unfortunately, some women wait until late in the pregnancy, because they are afraid of the financial end."

"The sooner women start having prenatal care the better. Vitamins and good care all contribute to a healthier pregnancy and birth."

"If there are problems, they can be identified early and counseling can be arranged, as well as ad-

vanced diagnostic techniques such as level two ultrasound and frequent consultations."

Lisa Silva at the county health department, also encouraged early contact.

"We do pregnancy testing and we do prenatal services here through about six months," she said. "WIC (Women, Infants and Children) is here before and after delivery. Women receive food vouchers to help keep their nutrition balanced."

"We don't base it on income. Anyone who walks in can receive the services. If they appear to qualify for Medicaid, we can give them information on filing. But

many just don't have insurance.

"Early pregnancy detection and prenatal care is vital. New Mexico has one of the worst statistics on that. Babies born at low weight are prone to other problems and chronic conditions."

Dr. Frey, who has been a board certified family practitioner for 11 years, said the primary difference in his practice is that he offers care for the baby and family for the years after delivery.

Although he recently moved to 129 El Paso Road, he's been practicing in the area two years. Assistant Ann Blue offers financial counseling and both emphasized the importance of early prenatal care.



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## Lincoln County rancher honored for taking care of the environment

Sid Goodloe of the Carrizo Valley Ranch at Capitan is the Region VI winner of the National Cattlemen's Association (NCA) fourth annual Environmental Stewardship Award.

He was honored for implementation of innovative programs that conserve and protect valuable natural resources and aid in increasing productivity, according to a news release provided by NCA.

"In the unique, high-altitude (6,500 to 7,500 feet in elevation) Carrizo Valley of southcentral New Mexico's historic Lincoln County, Goodloe runs a cow/calf business centered around a composite breed of cattle specially bred to fit the area environment," reads the release.

In addition to the cattle, Goodloe has utilized all the ranch's natural resources in a sustainable manner. This includes thinning of invading piñon/juniper brush (paid for by sale of firewood), fee hunting of mule deer and turkey, and thinning of Ponderosa pine thickets (paid for by sale of lumber).

"That aspect of stewardship may have been extra worthy in light of recent forest fires that burned in the surrounding Pecos and Capitan mountains," reads the release.

"I have always believed that anyone privileged to own or manage land, first, has the inherent responsibility of understanding the various ecosystems on that land," said Goodloe, who was nominated for the regional award by the New Mexico Cattlemen's Association.

"Secondly, he or she must direct the use and management of that land in a holistic manner toward its most productive, or 'climax,' state.

"Finally, there is an obligation to share that knowledge and experience with others," said Goodloe.

Goodloe, who studied the Savannah's of Africa to learn more about the rangelands in the western United States, explained some techniques he used to accomplish his environmental stewardship goals most effectively:

—Regarding vegetation, Goodloe has reseeded with native species all areas disturbed by mechanical brush management, resulting in exceptionally quick forage and contributing to continued improvement in range condition and wildlife habitat.

—The short-duration grazing practiced on the Carrizo Valley Ranch also has led to excellent range conditions, even at watering points where erosion once resulted from trails to and from water. Because of altitude variation and topography, it was necessary to have three grazing areas — summer paddocks, combination spring/fall paddocks and winter paddocks.

Cattle are rotated every five to seven days during the growing season with a slower rotation during dormancy.

The basic principles of short-duration grazing were brought to the Goodloe Ranch directly from Rhodesia and, with some modifications, have steadily improved range conditions and carrying capacity for 23 years.

—Watershed rehabilitation, of which Goodloe said, "In addition to the many other aspects tied in with our stewardship, we are proud that our watershed rehabilitation program on the ranch and in the Lincoln National Forest above it has significantly reduced runoff turbidity (muddiness) that causes non-point source pollution, which is prevalent in most of our state."

Goodloe's 33-year-old daughter, Sherry Underwood, has played an

active part in range and livestock management on the Carrizo Valley Ranch for several years.

"Sherry regularly participates in replacement selection, pasture rotation and environmental decisions," said Goodloe.

"Sherry's love of the land, livestock and wildlife provides a valuable asset to the ranch and local communities," he added.

The award recognizes cattlemen and their families for protecting the environment and conserving natural resources. Cattlemen throughout the country who have implemented innovative environmental programs that protect the environment and aid in increasing their business productivity compete for the prestigious honor.

"The land is the cattlemen's livelihood and their legacy," said NCA president Dan Koons of Shirley, Illinois.

"Our strong foundation of traditional values — honesty, hard work, love of the land and responsibility to future generations — allows us to produce a safe and nutritious product for consumers while we care for the environment at the same time.

"This award recognizes cattlemen and their families for their many environmental achievements," Koons added.

The seven regional winners — who were selected by a committee composed of experts from environmental groups, government agencies, universities and the cattle industry — went through a rigorous selection process.

Winners had to demonstrate that their environmental stewardship practices benefited both the environment and the productivity and profitability of their cattle business, according to the NCA.

## Game and Fish works with Native Americans in managing resources

The Department of the Interior's U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service is adopting a policy aimed at fostering partnerships with Native American governments in the management of fish and wildlife resources.

The policy was signed by Service Director Mollie Beattie June 28.

"The Fish and Wildlife Service and the tribes have a long history of working together," Beattie said. "Adoption of this policy signals our determination to forge even stronger partnerships with Native Americans to help conserve and restore fish and wildlife and the ecosystems that support them."

The Mescalero Apache Tribe already maintains a partnership with

the service in the operation of its fish hatchery on reservation land neighboring Ruidoso.

Beattie noted that Native Americans control more than 50 million acres on reservations and are involved in managing an additional 50 million acres of ceded territories. These lands offer important habitat for a variety of fish and wildlife species such as bald eagles, waterfowl, salmon, bighorn sheep and neotropical migrant birds.

"Within the service, we view Native Americans as key partners as we move toward a more ecosystem-oriented approach to the conservation challenges of the next century," she said.

The policy calls for increased consultation with Native American governments concerning fish and wildlife management, improved channels of communication and heightened cooperation related to fish and wildlife law enforcement, including coordination of investigations into illegal wildlife activities.

The service also is committed to involving Native American governments in all service actions that may affect their cultural or religious interests, such as archaeological sites and possession of parts of protected animals traditionally used in ceremonial or religious activities.

## ENMU-R offers Native American lit course

ENMU-Ruidoso has added a new non-credit course in Native American literature titled "We Talk, You Listen."

According to a news release, Native Americans will reveal their

unique world-view through myths, stories, songs, poetry, short stories and novels in the humanities-based course.

The class will meet from 6 to 8

p.m. Mondays and Wednesdays beginning Sept. 12 and ending Dec. 14, at Ruidoso High School.



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# New mid school program promotes leadership skills

Thirty Ruidoso Middle School students embarked on phase one of the school's first Alternative Education Program (AEP) Tuesday at Bonita Park Camp and Conference Center.

"The course is primarily a leadership development course," said Jack Nelson, the middle school counselor who organized the program.

"The basic tenets of the course are that the students do the work, and the teachers are the advisers to the students."

Nelson said students are assigned leadership positions designed to help them learn from their mistakes. Student leadership performance is rated by the teachers, the students themselves and their peers.

"They are told the things they're doing right and to keep doing that behavior, and they are also told the things they need to improve on," said Nelson.

"What happens is that the students become very good managers and leaders."

The program consists of 28 phases during the year where students receive training in such skills as team building, skills development, rock climbing, rappelling, using a map and compass, building shelters, fire building, fund raising, citizenship, first aid, space mission

control, scuba diving, ballooning and wilderness survival.

Students are taught to complete a career interest inventory, create a resume using a computer and develop an individual four-year high school curriculum plan.

Nelson explained that the program also incorporates academic skills such as science and math.

Students will be applying the skills they learn during such activities as overnight campouts.

"They will be doing an overnighter in Lincoln National Forest in October where they'll be required to carry a backpack," Nelson said.

"They'll be doing part of the Crest Trail, starting from the ski area and coming out at Bonita Park."

The final overnight activity will be a 25-kilometer trip in May.

Students in the AEP were nominated by principal Paula Papponi and teachers based on a history of academic excellence and the ability to keep up with homework. Parents were contacted for approval of the nomination.

"We really wanted to make sure the students had the support and approval of the parents as well as the ability to keep up with their schoolwork," said Nelson.

The Ruidoso News interviewed four of the AEP students about the first day of the program.

"I thought it was pretty good," said Felicia Frizzell. "There were

some things I didn't think I could do, then I was able to do them and we learned how to trust each other. I'm looking forward to going rappelling and scuba diving."

"I liked the rock climbing, and the obstacle courses were great," said team leader Doug Siddens. "I didn't think we were going to get everybody over the wall, but when we got the teamwork going, it was pretty good."

Siddens is excited about the scuba diving training.

"Every Christmas our family goes to Key West, Florida, and we do lots of snorkeling. This year I'll have some scuba experience so my dad said, maybe we can do that," he said.

Team leader Erica Romero thought the lessons on teamwork were the most valuable.

"Through teamwork we can really accomplish a lot," she said.

"I think that's the main focus of the program, that everybody needs to work together to succeed."

Aaron Gillespie is looking forward to the space mission control aspect of the program.

"My goal right now is to go to college and this program could help me focus on my long-range plans," he said.

Phase two of the Alternative Education Program is scheduled for Sept. 8 through 14, and will include rock climbing and rappelling.



### Patience is a sure cure for our growing pains

Growing pains are the uncomfortable side effect of growth, and the Ruidoso Schools are battling those symptoms this fall.

With the opening of the new Sierra Vista Primary school in the White Mountain School complex this fall, the school system embarked on a new and improved bus schedule — the first such overhaul since 1984. The growing school population led school officials to add six new buses to take care of new routes that serve the new school and improved routes to other schools.

Safety is the primary consideration when dealing with a school transportation system, and Ruidoso Schools transportation director Roger Sowder said that's exactly what takes priority in Ruidoso. Now younger and older students don't share buses, bus drivers don't make double runs and schools can run on school schedules rather than having class times driven by the bus schedules. As in the past, no student is ever dropped off or picked up in an area where they have to cross a street.

School officials are the first to admit that there are problems caused by these new additions. Parents have been frustrated by crowded buses, long lines and confusion about which bus to catch where and when to get their children to school and safely home again.

A cure for growing pains won't happen overnight. Sowder said it will take a few weeks to iron out all the kinks. Meanwhile, he's asking parents to plan on a few extra minutes in the morning and afternoon to accommodate late buses. Motorists, too, need to be aware that bus drivers are learning new routines while carrying a load of little passengers. Some youngsters, confused by the new experience of riding a bus, may dart out into the street or step out in front of a car. A watchful eye and extra caution are in order.

Ruidoso Schools have a lot to celebrate this fall with a brand new school and six new buses. Who could ask for anything more?

School leaders say they need one more thing from the people of this community — patience!
