

Mescalero Apache leader angered by state's pitting horse racing against Indian gambling

"The state has never shared these tax revenues with Indian tribal governments, so why expect anything from Indian tribes," he wrote.

"In fact, (the state) receives federal dollars to provide administrative functions and program services in the area of education, social services and law enforcement, otherwise the state would be incapable of providing any services to its Indian citizens."

Sanchez said Monday that he had not seen Chino's letter, but that he and Aragon have nothing to do with who is invited to testify during committee hearings. That decision is left up to the committee chairman.

The president of the Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe says he's incensed because the tribe was left out of recent hearings on horse racing's future in New Mexico.

Since Ruidoso Downs Race Track owner R.D. Hubbard and others testifying contended that

gaming on reservations and pueblos negatively impacts their industry, someone representing Native Americans should have been asked for input, Mescalero President Wendell Chino said Sunday.

He expressed those same opinions in letters sent last week to State Rep. Raymond Sanchez, speaker of the house, and State Sen. Manny M. Aragon, senate president pro tem.

Referring to an article about the hearings in *The Ruidoso News*, Chino wrote the two Democrats from Albuquerque, "We are incensed by the story due to the fact that the Mescalero Apache Tribe was not given the courtesy and fairness expected from representatives of the state legislature to attend and testify at the hearing."

"This is an example of subtle discrimination exercised not only against the Mescalero Apache Tribe, but all tribes in the state. We thought that the legislature was created and exists for all citizens of

the state, but evidently it chooses and selects, instead of being impartial."

He contended that the horse racing industry is declining across the nation.

"Therefore, conditions at Ruidoso Downs cannot be attributed to Mescalero's gaming," Chino wrote.

In his letters, Chino wrote, "We must remind the state legislators and the racing officials that when horse racing had a monopoly in the Ruidoso area, no one cared about the conditions of the Mescalero Apache Tribe. Now that the tribe has several successful operations, it would appear that some people want to take that away, too. We have learned to protect our rights and pursue our rights."

Chino also reminded Sanchez and Aragon that Indian tribes contribute more than \$31.2 million a year in sales taxes to the state treasury "without any returns whatsoever to Indian tribes."

Escapeses captured

Three inmates who escaped from the Camp Sierra Blanca minimum security prison Thursday evening were recaptured Friday with help from two Alto home owners.

Jim Edwards, who also is a field coordinator for White Mountain Search and Rescue, and a woman who asked that her name not be used, led Lincoln County deputies to the escapees by telephone and two-way radio after they spotted the men near a canyon area.

The escape, the fifth since June, has prompted prison officials to review their security measures and the need for a community warning system. It also has County Commissioner Wilton Howell calling for major changes.

Another inmate who escaped earlier this month has been charged with murder in connection with the death of an elderly Lincoln man.

The latest escape ended without violence Friday.

According to Melinda Headley, field coordinator for White Mountain Search and Rescue, the Alto woman called the county Sheriff's Department to report a man walking on the other side of Sunrise Road near her home.

"I had come home and found out that a neighbor's house about a half mile away had been robbed, the woman told *The News*. "Everyone said not to worry, that they were long gone, but I was alone with my two children and I just had a feeling they were near. I kept going out on my deck to check and there they were, two of them across the road walking through some bushes."

"I went right inside and called. At first the 911 woman thought I had seen some deputies, but when another neighbor also called, she knew it must be them."

Deputies already were in the area investigating a break-in at the home of Linda Currin, Headley said. A brown jacket and some food had been stolen. One of the two men was wearing a brown jacket.

A few moments later, Jim Edwards, who works for the state health department, spotted another man walking in the canyon between Sunrise and Miramonte, his home street.

"I had my two-way radio going and heard (county dispatcher) Betty Bennett tell deputies that a woman down the street from me and across the canyon saw a man walking," Edwards told *The Ruidoso News*.

"I saw one guy walking through the canyon wearing a black T-shirt. He may have been coming off Sunrise and looked like he was heading toward the Eagle Creek area."

"I radioed Betty and told her I was looking at the subject."

Within a few minutes, two more men appeared from a stand of trees and joined the first. One was wearing a brown jacket, Edwards said. They walked parallel to the two roads flanking the canyon.

"Betty relayed the information and the deputies (investigating the break-in) raced over," he said. "I directed them to Sunrise and down the canyon."

He directed another group of deputies to a house on the other side of the three men.

"Because of the slope, they couldn't see, but I had a view of the whole thing," Edwards said. "The inmates apparently heard the radios, stopped and ducked into cover. I told the deputies the approximate area and they closed in."

The three were taken to the Lincoln County jail in Carrizozo, where officials say they will face charges in connection with the escape and the burglary.

The inmates are: Andrew Needham, 33, of Roswell, who was serving a seven-year sentence for voluntary manslaughter and wasn't due for release until November 1995; William Brown, 30, from North Carolina, serving 7 1/2 years for attempted robbery, burglary and aggravated assault, who was due to be released in 1997; and Russell Simpson, 23, of Las Cruces, serving a four-year sentence on four counts of forgery, habitual criminal and probation violation.

The three men were counted at the prison at 4:30 p.m. Thursday, but were missing by 5:45 p.m. They drove away in a pickup truck, but either had a flat and hit an embankment about 2 1/2 miles down the road or smashed into the embankment first, prison officials said. From there, they took off on foot.

Howell said the recent escapes and murder illustrate exactly the situation he feared last January when he was critical of some policies at the camp. He and many other residents called then for tighter controls on the work release program and better screening of inmates sent to the minimum security prison.

"I talked to the governor and a couple of staff members and they assured me this situation will be addressed," Howell said Monday.

"They are looking at a fence, additional guards and a different classification of prisoners."

"I assured them that they are going to start doing business a lot different or find another county (for the camp to be located)."

"It's my understanding, one inmate was doing seven years for manslaughter and another wasn't up for parole until 1997. We need to get away from that kind of prisoner. If there aren't enough non-violent inmates to fill the prison, maybe we need to close the whole place down," Howell said.

Linda Currin said it was alarming to realize that the inmates may have been in the area around her house for as long as eight hours before being caught.

"I want them to put up tougher security at the camp and not have those types of inmates," Currin said.

"I'm just thankful that I didn't come home and surprise them."

She has contacted county commissioners and intends to write and call other officials in the state cabinet and legislature. She urged other residents concerned about the situation to do the same.

Sandra McFadin, warden at Camp Sierra Blanca, said her top

Pair of middle school teachers tapped for shuttle project

Two Ruidoso Middle School teachers have been selected for the Earth Shuttle New Mexico program.

Science teachers Ric Berglund and Carla Burns both submitted \$70,000 grant proposals explaining their philosophies.

Teachers statewide submitted grant proposals, but only 30 were chosen to participate, with Berglund and Burns being the only teachers selected from the same school.

"The fact that there are two of us may mean that we will be able to take 60 kids from the 7th and 8th grades on the program," said Berglund.

A letter to Burns and Berglund from the State of New Mexico Department of Education states, "The selection committee believes that you bring special expertise to this project and will be able to assist us in developing and implementing Earth Shuttle New Mexico."

The Earth Shuttle program was developed to take advantage of the close proximity of learning centers located in the Orlando, Fla., area including Epcot Center at the Walt Disney World resort, Kennedy Space Center's Spaceport USA, Sea World, MGM Studios, Merritt Island Wildlife Refuge, Busch Gardens and the U.S. Space Camp.

Each activity is designed for grades three through 12, and each teacher selects the themes best suited for the students.

According to Berglund, the Ruidoso Middle School Earth Shuttle trip probably will take place in March, but not during spring break because the project is sponsored by the Department of Education and is part of curriculum.

Berglund emphasizes that while the program does allow the students some free time, it is not all play and rides.

"The Earth Shuttle uses all of the disciplines, including science, math, language arts, exposure to new cultures and life experience," he said.

The students would spend four to six hours at each shuttle area, explained Berglund, bypassing lines, and getting hands-on experience.

"They see MGM Studios, they see something being filmed, and they are able to film their own film," he said. "They go behind the scenes much more than a normal visitor would be able to do."

The students will begin projects in school which will tie in with experiences in Fla.

"They will do projects here ahead of time," said Berglund. "Then they'll do projects there, and do projects when they get back."

"At Sea World we'll go behind the scenes and see how the wounded Manatee are brought in, how they are brought back to life, how they're bottle fed, and the kids will actually be involved with the bottle feeding."

The criteria for student selection has not yet been determined but, according to Berglund, it probably will be through a committee process.

Even though the Earth Shuttle has been in operation since 1984, thanks to sponsorships, this is the first time students will be able to attend the program with all expenses paid.

Major sponsors of the program are Furr's Supermarkets, Pepsi Cola of New Mexico, the Public Service Company of New Mexico, the Albuquerque Hispano Chamber of Commerce, KOB-TV, the Indian Pueblo Cultural Center, the State Board of Education, the Earth Shuttle Foundation, the New Mexico Congressional Delegation, New Mexico Mesa Inc. and Seeley and Associates.

Furr's Supermarkets asks patrons to round up their purchases, with the difference being contributed to the Earth Shuttle program.

Chief appoints Jaramillo to supervise dispatch area

Utilizing a new testing procedure, Ruidoso Police Chief Lynette Maddox has selected Yvette Jaramillo to fill a newly created position of communication/detention supervisor.

Jaramillo has been employed as a communication/detention officer with the village of Ruidoso police department since October 1980. Prior to that, she was a dispatcher with the Tularosa Police Department.

Jaramillo, 33, has two children and said she has been interested in communications and detention work since she was in school and visited a jail through an "on the job" program.

"I really enjoy communications and detention," she said Sunday. "I have no interest in being out there on the streets."

She also gave her endorsement to the new screening procedure initiated by Maddox.

"It was really great and a good learning experience," she said.

Jaramillo is state certified as a communication/detention officer, as a NCIC (National Crime Information Center) operator, IR 300 intoximeter (testing breath for alcohol content in the blood) operator and keep operator.

The assessment board used in the selection process by Maddox was comprised of business and professional residents of the community. Each of the six applicants were scored on impromptu response, communication skills, presentation, general knowledge, decision making abilities, profes-

sionalism, writing skills and a personal interview with Maddox.

"There's been generic testing in the past, if any, but the approach was inconsistent," he told The Ruidoso News. "I felt having a test that actually addresses the problems we see in our municipality would be a lot more appropriate and ensure we fit officers into the jobs they know how to handle."

Maddox said he patterned the review group after an assessment board village manager Gary Jackson brought for the chief's position.

"It's completely unbiased and certainly assures me as new chief that this person is capable of handling the position and can think on his/her feet."

priority is to institute a long-term computerized community alert system for escapees.

"I've been working on this since the Crawford escape," she said. "It would automatically dial the telephones of key people and a computerized message would tell them what's happened."

Short term, she is working with the Captain fire chief about a siren type signal that could be used to alert that community, and possibly a similar system in Ruidoso.

"But my top priority is to get rid of the public road that runs through the camp (to Bureau of Land Management property),"

McFadin said. "It fosters an attitude with staff that they don't pay attention to traffic and can't stop the cars, anyway."

McFadin, Howell and county manager Carolin Cooney have been working with bureau district supervisor Leslie Cose on a road realignment.

A new test also will be used to screen out inmates with psychological profiles that indicate violence.

"It's supposed to pick up on tendencies that other tests do not," she said. "We have a contract with Florida to grade them. This is something they started working on because of the rash of escapees at Los Lunas."



Nannies are on the go in Ruidoso

The old adage of finding a niche and filling it came true when cousins Sue Fleming and Becky Worley were skiing in Ruidoso.

Noticing many parents at the bottom of the slopes who were taking care of their children, they had an idea.

"We noticed that there was a tremendous demand for someone to watch children so their parents could ski," said Worley.

Worley and Fleming decided to start a business that would allow parents the opportunity to enjoy themselves without worrying about their children, and on the first of April, On-The-Go Nanny Service was born.

Several things make On-The-Go Nanny Service different than a regular babysitter or day care facility.

The nanny service will accompany families on outings, or watch children in hotels, cabins or condos, and is available 24 hours a day, seven days a week, every day of the year.

"We also do weddings, conventions and family reunions," said Fleming. "So we could be hired to watch a large number of children at one time at a central area like a country club or resort while a dance, wedding or reception was going on."

When parents want to have their children with them, but also want a certain amount of freedom, the nanny service can help.

"We go to the racetrack, ski lodge and amusement parks," said Worley. "And I even do travel nanny services, so if parents need to attend a function out of town I can go with them to watch the children."

"We will watch children anytime, including holidays," said Fleming. "We will even watch them on Christmas."

Fleming and Worley are always prepared for the nanny jobs they may receive.

When they have children in their care they don't just sit—they plan lots of activities.

"We color, do puzzles, videos and video games; we take hikes, play

bubbles. We do whatever it takes for the children to feel entertained."

According to Fleming and Worley, vacationing families especially find the service useful.

"A lot of times when families are vacationing together, and the parents choose to go out by themselves they feel guilty about leaving the kids at home with a sitter," said Fleming. "So the biggest part of our nanny service is that we entertain the children while the parents go off and entertain themselves, and everybody is having a wonderful vacation, including the children."

"We kind of figure that the parents aren't our clients, it's the children," Worley said. "If they like us, then the next time the parents come to town they'll use us again."

Both Fleming and Worley are prepared for the unexpected.

"One mother asked me if I knew the Barney the Dinosaur song, because that was the only way her little girl would go to sleep," said Fleming. "Fortunately, I do know the song and sure enough, she went right to sleep."

The nannies keep a notebook with carbon so that the parents have a record of everything that goes on while they watch the children.

"The notebook tells what the children ate, what they said, and what they played," said Fleming. "If they said something cute or adorable, or if they did something obnoxious."


"Fortunately we haven't had any obnoxious children yet," she said.





Bulldogs chew up Warriors

The two-time defending State Champion Artesia Bulldogs showed that they are again the team to beat in AAA football this year as they got a quick start and cruised to victory 34-0 over the Ruidoso Warriors Friday night at W.D. Horton Stadium.

The Warrior loss spoiled the debut of first-year head coach Les Carter, who most recently worked his magic at Los Lunas, turning the cellar-dwelling Tigers into AAAA contenders in recent years.

The Bulldogs are led by former Warrior coach Cooper Henderson who turned the same trick in Ruidoso 10 years ago as Carter did in Los Lunas in the early '90s.

Artesia got the football on the opening kickoff and moved with relative ease until the 'Dogs were flagged with two holding penalties.

Facing third and 21, Henderson opted for a half-back pass and caught the Warrior secondary napping.

The play didn't score, but it did give the Bulldogs a first down in Warrior territory, where they scored on third-and-goal from the five.

After the PAT, Ruidoso trailed 7-0, which could have easily been expected knowing Artesia's full-throttle offense.

It was the next few minutes that turned the tide of the game.

On the ensuing kickoff, the Bulldogs tried to kick away from the Warrior 'Starburst' return. The intent was to kick the ball toward the sideline around the 20 yardline. It didn't happen that way, though.

The Bulldog kicker mis-hit the ball and a high lob to the right sideline was the result. Caught completely by surprise, the Warriors weren't close to recovering the ball and the Bulldog offense set up shop on the Warrior 42 yardline.

Artesia was whistled for a false start on the first play and was moved back to the 47.

Quarterback Ty Houghtaling then spotted wingback Denny Giles for 15 yards on a pass play.

Houghtaling then found Josh Whitmire on a similar play and the Whitmire hit paydirt from 32 yards out. With less than seven minutes gone in the game, Artesia was in front 14-0.

The football gods then awarded the Bulldogs lucky break No. 3 on the Warriors' first offensive play. Junior halfback Kyle Humphreys

apparently broke free for a 60-yard run on the first play from scrimmage, but alas an official's inadvertent whistle brought the play back and the zebras awarded Humphreys with a three-yard gain.

The Warriors went on to get a first down — but punted the ball away (a 13-yarder) after six plays. Again the Bulldogs had the ball inside Warrior territory.

It took 14 plays for Artesia to cross the goal line this time but they got there, and now, the Warriors trailed 22-0.

Artesia had the football eight minutes in the first quarter to Ruidoso's four. The Bulldogs led in total offense to 124 yards to the Warriors eight. It was a dismal first quarter performance for the locals.

The half-back pass on third-and-a-mile, the "onside" kick, the inadvertent whistle, and a shanked punt were almost too much to bear, coming within six minutes of a high school football game.

The second quarter saw Ruidoso fumble the ball away on its first possession, and quarterback John Echols threw the wrong place at the wrong time in the second. Neither turnover netted another Artesia score, but the frustration built and built, and it was obvious that the Blue and Gold just wanted to get the half over in its waning seconds.

Artesia did score in the second quarter. The Bulldogs got the ball on the Warrior 44 after another poor punt and methodically drove the ball down the field with Jeff Jackson going in on a 23-yard romp on the tenth play of the drive.

At half time, Ruidoso trailed 28-0 and was out-gained 236-14 in yardage and 9-2 in first downs.

Time to regroup
The second half saw the Warriors come out and enjoy at least some offensive success. Ruidoso got the opening kickoff and controlled the ball for 13 plays before the drive stalled on the Artesia 19.

The Bulldogs got the ball back and immediately picked up where they left off in the first half, controlling the ball in a four-plus minute, 13-play drive that scored with a 20-yard run from running back Jeff Jackson. A missed extra point let the score stand at a whopping 34-0.

The fourth quarter again saw Ruidoso come out and control the ball with a 14-play drive, but the Warriors never got closer than the Bulldog 25, and again, the Warriors would leave Artesia territory

empty-handed.

The Bulldogs fumbled on their first play and this time, the Warriors got to the Artesia five before the drive fizzled on third-and-goal with John Echols throwing his second interception of the night.

Playing with almost no rest in the game, junior nose-tackle Jesse Fromknecht trapped Artesia reserve quarterback Paul Maupin in the endzone for the Warriors' lone score, a safety.

Artesia had to punt the ball away and again the Warrior offense had one more chance to put a score on the board — and almost did.

Starting at its own 38, Ruidoso got to within Artesia's 13 yardline with catches from Eamello that netted 25 and 19 yards. Kyle Humphreys also gained 15 yards, but the clock ran out on the Warriors, and the State Champs had held the Ruidoso offense scoreless.

Despite the loss, Warrior head coach Les Carter found the good things that his junior-laden team had done against Artesia.

"We went back and reviewed the film, and we saw a lot of positive things ... we also saw some things that we have to correct, too. We're not gonna make any excuses. We made mistakes that a young team is going to make. Those things happen and maybe it's good that it happened now," said Carter.

"The second half we came out and were able to move the ball a little bit and did some good things we thought we had to do. We got great play out of our defensive ends, Joey Bewley and Robert Guardiola ... those guys put their quarterback on the ground play after play after play."

"On the other hand, we had some missed assignments and didn't get the pitch man covered, maybe because we were so concerned with their passing game. Maybe that was (the coaches) fault, but the run really hurt us in this game. I don't know how many times they converted on the 22 and more-than-five ... but it absolutely killed us," said Carter.

"I'm not going to dwell on what we did in our first ball game," Carter continued. "The kids are still getting used to us and we're still getting used to them. We've just started, and believe me, we have a lot of success in front of us this season."




And, as if having fun wasn't enough, the All American Festival combines entertainment and special events with fundraising that pays off all year long.
