Enrollment continues to climb at ENMU-R

Enrollment is up by more than five percent at Eastern New Mexico University's Ruidoso Instructional Center.

Dr. Jim Miller, campus director, said that over-all growth has slowed as predicted, but this semester there are more students in each course. Average course enrollment is 17 students.

For the fall 1994 semester, 542 students are registered, up from 1993's 517 students and the 1992 total of 389 students.

Miller said the number of out-of-district students continues to rise, with 204 (37.63 percent) of this semester's enrollment in that category.

Female students continue to account for most of ENMU-Ruidoso's student population, with 392 (72.33 percent) women and 150 men enrolled this fall.

A trend of older students, those 25 and older, continues this semester with 460 students (83.1 percent) above the age of 25 and 92 students (16.9 percent) below the age of 25.

Miller said there are more first-time younger students from Lincoln County high schools enrolled this fall.

"The number of Hispanic students continues to rise," said Miller.

This semester 100 Hispanic students are enrolled, accounting for 18.6 percent of the student body. Anglos make up 70.3 percent, with 381 registered. 55 Native Americans are enrolled this semester with one black, three Asians and two Pacific islanders.

Miller said 64 courses are offered at the Ruidoso instructional center. The two Distance Learning courses that were offered have been canceled.

"Students are enrolling for more classes, more are following degree-track programs and more are seeking financial aide," said Miller.

Shooting still being reviewed

Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs police departments continue to investigate a shooting which occurred Monday night in the Downs.

Michael Shirley, 45, died after allegedly being shot by Downs Police Officer Chris Condon at the Texas Connection restaurant on U.S. Highway 70.

District Attorney Bert Atkins, who is in charge of the investigation, said Thursday morning he could not offer any new information until the material from the investigation is compiled.

Shirley allegedly attacked the officer with a knife after Condon entered the restaurant. Employees of the restaurant had called police after becoming concerned about Shirley.

Condon has been placed on administrative leave pending the outcome of the investigation, which according to DA Atkins, is continuing.

1994 horse sale tops the \$5 million mark

More than \$5 million dollars changed hands during the Ruidoso Horse Sale last weekend at the Sports Theater in Ruidoso Downs.

The combined Super Select and All American sale grossed \$5,058,600, about \$2 million higher than last year's successful total, said Lowell Neumayer, general manager and a director of Ruidoso Horse Sales Co.

The highest price in this year's sale was \$100,000 for a First Down Dash colt out of the mare Zevis Jewel. Neumayer said the colt was consigned by Butterfly Cattle Co. of San Antonio, Texas, and purchased by Dudley J. Lege of Katlan, Louisiana.

Lege races horses here at Ruidoso Downs, so racing fans can expect to see this yearling back next year. Horses consigned to the

1994 sale will be eligible for the 1995 All American Futurity.

Judy Neumayer of Ruidoso and her partner, Janice Knorpp of Clarendon, Texas, sold the second highest priced colt for \$35,000 to Bob and Sandy Erwin of Dallas, Texas.

It was another First Down Dash colt out of Tempered Glass, a mare that ran at Ruidoso Downs.

In the Super Select, 118 horse passed through the ring, and in the All American, 195, for a total of 313 head.

Neumayer said the combined average price was \$16,161.

"That's the best in the nation, by far," said Neumayer.

The sale drew the largest crowd in recent years, said Neumayer,

Water holds the key to area's growth

The villages of Capitan and Ruidoso are surrounded by attractive and highly developable land.

Their climates draw new home hunters from both coasts and between.

But their growth could be cut short, cut off, by one factor more than any other: water.

Already, members of the board of trustees in Capitan have drawn their line. They said two months ago that no more water hookups would be approved for lots outside the village and no more annexations allowed until a pipeline from Eagle Creek is completed and new water flows in the village lines.

Although, Ruidoso is hooked up and pumping from the Eagle Creek source, Ruidoso councilors are pushing for completion of a water project that will utilize Grindstone reservoir, created as an alternate water source and recreation area.

The two villages are equal partners in the Eagle Creek Intercommunity Water Association. Their partnership goes back at least four decades, always with the aim of providing a source of water and a source of growth for the two communities.

But Capitan especially is suffering, because the association's current \$500,000 project is stalled while members try to find a money source.

D.D. Swearingin, whose father Dan was one of the original members of the association board formed in March 1954, himself was a member until earlier this year.

"We were working on a loan from the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) before I left, to do several things: to put an outlet in the Alto Lake Reservoir, to reconstruct the pipeline from the point of diversion on Eagle Creek about two miles north of the Alto turnout, and to rehabilitate the pipeline from the top of Angus Hill to the Bonito Lake turnout," Swearingin said.

"The existing line is worn out and we were going to slip line it."

The stumbling point hinges around loan collateral requirements.

When Swearingin and former Capitan mayor Frank Warth's request for financial help was rejected by the State Legislature, the association turned to the FmHA,

but that agency wanted the villages to pledge their water rights.

"I don't think it's right," Swearingin said. "In my opinion, the loan would be well secured with a first mortgage on the land we own. They're way over collateralized, if they want security interests in our water rights."

The association owns 4,343.8 acre feet of rights in the Eagle Creek drainage area. One acre foot is the amount of water it would take to cover one acre, one foot deep, about 325,851 gallons.

Frank Potter, who serves on the association board and is a Ruidoso village councilor, said the board intends to meet with the New Mexico Mortgage Finance Authority to discuss a loan through that agency.

The association was able to build part of a new pipeline through the cooperation of Alamogordo city officials, Swearingin said.

"They let us piggyback on their construction contract," he said. "We paid for the pipe, basically, and laid new line as they dug (from the turnout to Bonito from Highway 48 to Cora Dutton Road), except for the portion from Angus to Bonito (about 9,000 linear feet), which still is unusable. So Capitan still can't get water."

Association board member David Rouleau of Capitan said the pipeline section from Bonito to Cora Dutton Road that was replaced with Alamogordo was paid for from

Two villages form Eagle Creek board

The Eagle Creek Intercommunity Water Association board is appointed by the governing bodies of Capitan and Ruidoso.

The association meets in public sessions at 3 p.m. the second Tuesday of each month in Ruidoso village hall.

The members are Dr. David Rouleau, former Capitan mayor Benny Coker and Walton Hall from Capitan; former Ruidoso village manager and current councilor Frank Potter, deputy village manager Alan Briley and Richard Sanchez, water department director, from Ruidoso.

The board has the power of eminent domain, can sell bonds and contract for loans.

a portion of water sale revenues.

"But until the latest segment from Angus to Bonito is complete, it's just not usable. It leaks in so many places," he said. "We don't feel either community is willing to put up water rights. Our assets are well in excess of the amount we would be borrowing."

"Our attorney wrote letters and we went to Washington, but they were unwilling to budge."

"Because of the steep terrain and the condition of the pipeline, the scope is larger."

Alto Lake is an important portion of the equation, Potter said.


"The surface drainage of Eagle Creek is not large enough in summer for much runoff into Alto Lake, which was constructed to increase water access when flow volumes fell significantly below what was predicted," Potter said. "The lake was needed for storage and retention. The drainage for Eagle Creek comes from the winter snow pack. The stream system and lake fill in spring during the April snow melt and in years past, was available during the heavy summer months."

"This year has been unusual. The rains weren't there when we needed them," he said.

Although the mean annual precipitation of the area is placed at 22 inches, the actual amount each year varies significantly, with alternating droughts and flooding.

Garbage authority pursues past bills

Collecting past due accounts is a major headache, according to members of the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority (LCSWA).

During a regular meeting Wednesday, the board authorized attorney Bob Beauvais to continue collection efforts on 25 accounts.

"These 25 that we turned over to Bob Beauvais were the ones we had sent many letters and two certified letters — the 25 people that ignored my letters, even my certified," said authority director Joe Lewandowski.

He said the board had some concerns about paying the attorney up front in a lengthy process that involves searching ownership and filing property liens for past due garbage accounts.

"We paid \$4,000 to the attorney and for lien searches, and only \$1,400 was collected. \$1,000 of that went to the attorney," said Lewandowski.

Also Wednesday, the board discussed new legislation allowing for sanitation districts.

The present authority is established among its four members by means of joint powers agreements, with each entity retaining the authority to set rates and enforce codes.

A district would make it a full-fledged governmental body with authority on rate setting, collection and code enforcement, said Lewandowski.

"I'm really kind of enthused about the sanitation district," said chairman Wilton Howell, who has been studying the 34-page law.

"We need more unity," said Howell, agreeing with Ruidoso authority representative Mayor

Jerry Shaw, who said the authority members don't act as a unit.

"I think it's ridiculous the way this authority operates," said Shaw. "If we're going to be an authority, we're all in this together. We should all set one rate and go by it."

"This would create seven districts with representatives to be elected by the people," said Howell.

A district would have the authority to set rates and file liens, and would be responsible for code enforcement.

"The only way this group could raise taxes would be to petition for a mill levy," he added.

"It's something to look at down the road," said Lewandowski.

In other regular business the board:

- approved a resolution to put away money in a special account for closure of the transfer station if it's ever closed. It's part of the permitting, said Lewandowski.

- Now there will be two public meetings set up by the Environmental Department, he added.

- heard a preliminary presentation on a Lincoln County Work Release Program.

- met behind closed doors to discuss pending litigation.

- heard from Lewandowski that his crews just built a new fence at the transfer station to control litter and also to block the view from the public.

- "Every time we pull away some trash falls out, we try to clean it up; it still happens," said Lewandowski. "The gates keeps loose trash contained. We plan on fencing the whole thing."

- Cost of the new fence was \$3,000, said Lewandowski.

Work program proposed to clean up garbage and relieve jail overcrowding

Prisoners at Lincoln County Jail may get the chance to see more of the county while earning good time, if a proposed work program is adopted by the county.

Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority Chairman Wilton Howell presented plans Wednesday for a partnership between the county and the authority in which prisoners would clean up around and maintain dumpsters.

During an authority meeting, Howell said he's done a lot of research on a work program, including talking to the county attorney.

Howell's proposal calls for the authority to fund a deputy and purchase a van.

In exchange, specific prisoners, who are serving jail time for non-violent crimes would work for the authority for no pay, but for earned "good time" to shorten their sentences.

Howell said the county has to provide them a "good time" program to reduce prisoners' sentences, and he's not happy with the program that's in place.

"It was the consensus of the board to go ahead and investigate the possibility of using jail prisoners with an armed guard," said Howell.

"It won't be anything that even resembles what happens at Camp Sierra Blanca," he said.

Howell stressed that the four to

six prisoners in the crew would be screened and would work under the immediate presence and supervision of an armed guard.

"It would relieve some pressure in the county jail," said Howell, noting that the "good time" would get prisoners out sooner.

"No money is involved," he added. "If we put up any money, we simply pay an extra deputy to help guard those guys."

He said he had talked with the county's insurance carrier and workers compensation company, and at this time, they told him they don't think there would be any increase in premiums.

Howell explained that the county will contract with the solid waste authority to supply them four to six hands with the van to go around and clean up, possibly even repair dumpsters.

"Once we got all these sites cleaned up and all these dumpsters cleaned up and looking good, we could do things like build concrete bus stops for children," said Howell.

"I think it will finance itself by way of income from the solid waste authority," said Howell.

"I'll have the costs all put together for the commission Tuesday," said Howell, who plans to make a presentation during the Lincoln County Commission's regular meeting.

Potter said Eagle Creek is Ruidoso's main source of water.

"That's why we worked hard to build Grindstone," he said. "Capitan bought wells to supplement."

"Politics is what caused them to form the association," Swearingin said. "Capitan was totally dependent on wells and had very little water supply. The quality was terrible."

The Southern Pacific Railroad (previously the El Paso and Southwestern Railroad), which built and improved three mountain pipelines to provide pure spring water fuel (free from alkaline contaminants found in the Tularosa Basin) for their steam engines, was politically powerful until the 1960s. The com-

pany sold off the pipelines when it didn't need water for steam and went to diesel motors.

"The city of Alamogordo purchased the Bonito line and Eagle Creek was bought by Ruidoso and Capitan. My father went to Santa Fe and negotiated for the purchase from the railroad, which had built the line in 1913," Swearingin said.

"As I recall, the price for the two villages was \$10,000 and was paid out at somewhere between 2 percent to 4 percent over a term.

"For quite a while, Capitan had no way to take the water, so the association built a pipeline to the Bonito pipeline by the road to Nogal. The line went cross country to a filter plant on the north side of Capitan. They had an arrangement with Alamogordo to transport Eagle

Creek water to Capitan on that pipeline for a very low fee."

About 1988, after disagreements between the city and village officials, Capitan was forced to get off the Bonito pipeline, he said.

"Both villages need to do this project."

The village of Ruidoso benefits in two ways from its connection to Eagle Creek, Swearingin explained. Besides the actual water it receives, the state also allows the village an effluent credit.

"The theory being that Eagle Creek water brought into the Ruidoso drainage (area) through various means is foreign water, not native to Ruidoso," Swearingin said. "It runs through a filter and flows into the district's water sys-

tem. Eventually, it works its way to the sewer plant and some Eagle Creek water is put back into the local stream flow."

The village also owns some water rights in the Rio Ruidoso, "but not a whole lot," Swearingin said. "The main way the village can fill the Grindstone Reservoir is through its effluent credit. But if Eagle Creek is not flowing, there is no effluent credit and it's not flowing now."

The village can't collect credit from Eagle Creek wells, which are considered a different source.

"Capitan and Ruidoso obviously need Eagle Creek water," he said. "The association is a very important organization and most people don't know it even exists."

Taxi owners get the OK to serve Lincoln County

Ruidoso Taxi Cab got the go-ahead Wednesday morning to continue operations in Lincoln County.

During a hearing at Ruidoso Village Hall, the State Corporation Commission (SCC) heard testimony on an application from Ruidoso Taxi Cab Inc., owned by Gladys and Charlie Dillard.

The Dillardards have been operating the taxi service on a temporary authority until the SCC hearing.

Ruidoso Taxi Cab Inc., which had filed for a state wide authority to operate, reached an agreement with Yellow/Checker Cab Company from Las Cruces, and S&S Charter from Ruidoso who had filed an intervention.

The presiding hearing officer was Carlos Jaramillo from Santa Fe. The Dillardards were represented by attorney John Underwood.

"They were concerned about our state wide authority filing," said Mrs. Dillard. "They were thinking that we wanted to come into every county and set up shop."

According to the Dillardards, since the new cab company's base of operations is in Ruidoso, they will be allowed to accept fares and transport passengers to other localities, but not accept fares in other areas.

"The problem really was just in the wording of the application," Mrs. Dillard said.

S&S Charter's concern, accord-

ing to the Dillardards, was that the taxi company would charge a flat fee to take people to the ski area.

"Mr. Jaramillo made it very clear that a shuttle-charter service and a taxi service are two distinct operations," said Mrs. Dillard.

"If someone calls and wants us to take them to the ski area, we have the authority to take them but we are not set up on any flat rate

like they are," said Mr. Dillard.

"We are not a shuttle service, we're a taxi service."

Several prominent Ruidosians testified to the need for a taxi service, including Ruidoso Mayor Jerry Shaw, Ruidoso Downs Trustee Ray Hayhurst, Super 8 Motel manager Rick Arlaud, Realtor and owner of the Incredible Jennie Dorgan and

County Commission Chairman Morroy Montes from the Hondo Valley.

The Dillardards have plans to add additional taxis as the need arises.

"Whatever the traffic warrants, we will supply it," said Mr. Dillard.

who attributed the high interest to the top quality of horses assembled for sale. Another key to the big numbers was moving the sale into town, he said.

Neumayer said consignors and sellers commented favorably on the big tents used to house the yearlings.

"People were really impressed with the tents and the entire set-up," said Neumayer.

Neumayer said he is planning to follow the same format next year.

Julia Roberts and Lyle Lovett, rumored to be on hand for the Ruidoso Horse sale, were actually in Houston, Texas, at the track where the sale was simulcast, said Neumayer.

While well-bred horses were bringing top dollar at the fast-paced auction, Ruidoso Horse Sale graduates were winning top money across the way at Ruidoso Downs

Race Track.

Neumayer said the All American Futurity winner, Noblesse Six, was purchased for \$23,000, and the futurity show horse, Darling Sixarun, was purchased for \$12,000 last year.

"Also, the filly that won the All American Derby, I Hear A Symphony, was purchased here year before last for \$8,000," said Neumayer.

Colts that were purchased here

ran first and second in the All American Futurity this year.

Special Phoebe, winner of the All American Derby Consolation, was purchased in the Ruidoso Horse Sale year before last for \$43,500.

Ruidoso Horse Sales Co. is a joint venture between the Super Select Company and the All American Sale. Last year the sale total was \$3 million for 225 horses, and this year's total was expected to be between \$4.5 and \$5 million.

Attorney Mitchell represents Clark before Supreme Court

When Terry Clark's death sentence was overturned Wednesday in the state Supreme Court, Ruidoso attorney Gary Mitchell his legal representative.

Mitchell, who has the state contract on capital cases, prevailed before the three-judge panel in asking that a new jury be impaneled to sentence Clark, who has been convicted in the 1986 murder of a 9-year-old Artesia girl, Dana Lynn Gore.

According to published reports, Clark's conviction on first-degree murder and kidnap-

ping charges still stands.

The judges reportedly ruled that the death sentence must be overturned because jurors weren't properly told how long Clark would remain in prison if sentenced to life rather than death.

Mitchell told the El Paso Times reporter that his client is grateful, but just wants to be left alone.

The state attorney general's office plans to ask the Supreme Court to reconsider the Wednesday decision.

Warriors go for second season win

The Ruidoso Warrior Football team will try for its second-straight win of the season as by travelling to Las Vegas for a game with the seventh-ranked Robertson Cardinals Friday night at New Mexico Highlands' Perkins Stadium. Game time is set for 7:30 p.m.

The Warriors demolished AAAA Gadsden last Friday night and will bring a record of 1-1 to the game with Robertson. The Cardinals boast a perfect 2-0 mark.

Ruidoso fell to AAA football's No. one ranked Artesia Bulldogs in the season opener, but found Gadsden a somewhat more defeatable foe last week.

The Cardinals played Grants during week one and came away with a 14-0 win, while defeating Trinidad, Colo. 16-0 last week.

Against Grants, Robertson passed the ball with some success and the team's stingy defense remains a strong-suit.

Robertson has now won 11 of their last 13 starts, and the team hasn't lost to a District 2-AAA rival

since 1992.

The Redbirds outgained Grants 246-119 and dominated the game even more impressively on the defensive front. Granted, the Pirates will have a long season, but Robertson has put together several wins and appears to be on the right track.

In last week's contest with the Trinidad Miners, Robertson again proved to be impressive on the defensive side of the ball. The game was closer, but Trinidad was a much better football team than Grants.

The Miners have dominated the series the last two years, but the Cardinals have won the last two meetings.

"Trinidad has been a pain in our side for many years," said Cardinal head coach Art Abreu. "We proved that last year's win was no fluke... hopefully, we've proved that we're a team to be reckoned with."

Offensively against the Miners, Robertson rolled up 176 yards on the ground while passing for 84.

The Miners were held to just 84 yards of total offense.

The heart of the Redbird offense seems to be quarterback Bryon Pino. The senior ran for a 71-yard touchdown on a quarterback draw last week and was also impressive against Grants.

Pino rushed for 98 yards and was 6 of 10 passing.

The Cardinals also scored on a 14-yard pass from Pino to Josh Manzanares and a 27-yard field goal off the foot of Antonio Padilla.

Warrior head coach Las Carter knows the Cardinals are capable of good football.

"We saw their film with Grants and (Grants) is down a little. Robertson looked good on defense but I think we can do some things with our offense that will work."

"We've put in some things, a trick play or two... and I think we'll be very, very competitive with them," said Carter.

In actuality, it's another North-South battle in high school football. While Robertson has had some recent success, they haven't been beating the Artesias, Lovingtons

and Silver City of the world. Those games have been dominated by the southern teams — teams that Ruidoso plays on a weekly basis.

If the same Warrior team shows up in Las Vegas as Gadsden, well, the Cardinals probably won't be undefeated anymore.

Ruidoso played three excellent quarters against a team with superior size and numbers.

Our X's and O's were just better than Gadsden's. There's no two-ways about that.

Against Gadsden fans saw John Echols, the Warrior quarterback, complete some passes that would have been rushed the week before. We saw the much bally-hoo'd speed of Kyle Humphreys. And perhaps most importantly, we saw the offensive and defensive line dominate the game.

The game offers a great chance for Ruidoso get another "W" and those have been few and far between for four or five years.

Let's just hope that Coach Carter has some more secret ingredients for the winning recipe.

Ruidoso soccer team falls to Goddard, 2-1

The Ruidoso High School soccer team fell from the ranks of the undefeated as the Warriors lost to Roswell Goddard, a team Ruidoso defeated last week, 2-1, Tuesday at W.D. Horton Stadium.

What a difference a week makes. Last week, the Warriors dominated the Rockets, despite only winning by a 2-1 margin.

Tuesday's affair was completely different, however.

Goddard scored its first goal in the second quarter and added one last tally with just eight seconds left in the third quarter off a kick that barely caught the top corner of the goal.

Warrior Piper Adamian drew the Warriors to within one point, with four minutes to play, but it was too late to catch the high-flying Rockets, who lost to powerful Alamogordo Saturday.

Head coach Dean Hood was puzzled about the team performance.

"(Goddard) moved the ball a lot better today and I think our kids thought that the same thing would happen today, and Goddard came out here ready to play," said Hood.

"Our passes just weren't there today. I don't know if it was poor communication, or what, but it seems like we would kick it and no

one would be there. I'll just have to look at the film to try to figure out the problem," said Hood.

Hood also thought there may have been another problem with the team's strategy.

"We took a couple of days off and probably blew it. We have three games this week and we had two last week, I just thought we needed the rest, but maybe that was wrong," said Hood.

The Rockets were just one of three good teams that the Warriors have on the agenda this week. Belen, the State's third-place finisher last year, is scheduled for a meeting with the Warriors this afternoon (Thursday).

More importantly, district play begins Saturday as the Warriors travel to Santa Teresa Saturday for a 1 p.m. game with the Desert Warriors.

"My worry is having to play a district game after two tough games, with just one day in-between. We're gonna be dog tired Saturday... but that may be the best thing. I've seen some of these kids play their best games after being tired."

"After today, we may play better tired than when we're fresh," said Hood.

Practice safety first when handling firearms

Many people are really gearing up for this fall's hunting seasons. They are out getting their firearms and ammunition ready, practicing with rifle or shotgun, checking their equipment, training their dogs and finding a good hunting spot.

Along with all the other preparations that go with the sport of hunting, there is one important step that many people forget. Before heading into the field, all hunters should sit down and review some basic rules of safe gun handling.

The first rule is to have respect for your firearm. Treat every gun as if it were loaded at all times. Whenever you pick up a firearm you should open the action and check to see if it is loaded. The excuse "I didn't know it was loaded," is not going to help a person after they have been accidentally shot.

Even after you have checked and made sure the gun is unloaded, give it the respect due a loaded firearm. Guns are not toys and many people have been killed or injured from supposedly "unloaded" firearms.

Second, you should always have control of the muzzle and keep it pointed in a safe direction. This way even if there is an accidental discharge no one will get hurt. The muzzle is the business end of a gun and you should never point it at anything you don't intend to shoot. It is essential you point the muzzle away from companions, buildings or vehicles, especially when loading and unloading the firearm.



When walking in the field or meeting with hunting companions, always remember muzzle control. Know where all other hunters are at all times and maintain a safe zone of fire.

Finally, make sure of your target and what is beyond. Always, before pulling the trigger, clearly identify the object at which you are shooting. Never, but never, shoot at sounds, movement or at something you think may be a game animal.

Remember, that a bullet from a high powered rifle can travel more than four miles, so make sure nothing is beyond your target. Shooting at an animal standing at the top of a ridge not knowing where the bullet will land could really turn into a disaster.

While you are out hunting, use a little common sense. Any time your footing is difficult or unstable, such as during wet weather or when crossing a steep, rocky hillside, unload and leave the action open.

Likewise, you should never run, cross a fence, climb a tree or jump a ditch with a loaded firearm.

If you do happen to fall down, don't throw the firearm. Keep it with you and try to control the muzzle. After a fall, you should always check the action and barrel to make sure there are no obstructions.

Firearms safety shouldn't just be practiced while actually out hunting either. Lots of accidents occur in hunting camps, around vehicles and in the home.

Whenever you enter a camp, vehicle or home, all firearms should be unloaded and stored in a safe place.

Don't be riding around in a vehicle with a loaded firearm or lean one against the bumper of the camper.

Parents should make sure there are no loaded guns around the house, especially where there are children and even teenagers. It's great that kids know they are not supposed to play with firearms, but that isn't always enough. Firearms and ammunition should be locked up, preferably in separate locations. This way, if a youngster does manage to get to a gun, he still doesn't have any ammunition for it.

Firearms safety should be uppermost in the minds of all hunters and gun owners. Stop and take a little time to review the rules before you go hunting, and then make sure you follow them out in the field and at home. It may prevent an accident.





Ruidoso owner adds new chapter to storybook racing career

If you walked past Gordon Cooper in the Ruidoso Downs barn area one day, you'd probably say "there's another one of those old timers who only wants to talk about the good old days."

But once you meet the 81-year-old horseman, you realize that he is a link to the past that is actively involved in the future of horse racing.

The amazing thing about Cooper is he still is coming to Ruidoso 45 years later as an owner after spending six decades training.

In fact, one of his horses, a quarter horse named Presidential John won a maiden race here during the Fourth Of July Weekend.

Born in Duke, Okla., the lifelong horseman moved West to Tucson from Texas in 1936. He began training race horses in 1946 and made his first trek to Ruidoso in 1950.

Ruidoso had a reputation of being the mecca of quarter horse racing. If you could run well at Ruidoso, you could run with the big boys," said Cooper.

Many things have changed at the mountaintop oval since then.

The Ruidoso Downs of 1950 was a far cry from what it is today. The highway from Texas was a crude dirt road and you could only hear radio at night, let alone watch television. The first grandstand was built in 1947 alongside the racing strip, which was originally known as Miller's Field.

Prior to 1947, the racetrack was only an uneven straightaway used for high stakes match races.

According to Cooper, in 1950 purses at Ruidoso were \$700 or \$800, now the minimum is \$2,150.

The first All American Futurity in 1959 was worth \$129,000 compared to \$2 million now.

Straw cost 50 cents, while a bale of hay was \$1. A dollar also was the price for a gallop boy to exercise your horse in the morning, now it's \$6.

Although the cost of running a racing stable has increased, among other things, Cooper said many of the same faces are still here after 40 years.

"I rode Sherman (Joe Sherman who is currently the jockey's kitchen cook) and Benny Roller (a jockey's agent)," said Cooper. Ruidoso steward Bruce Brinkley also was given a leg up on numerous horses by Cooper.

"When we came in '50 there weren't enough people in town to help in the mutuels. At twelve o'clock, the town closed and they put a sign on the door saying that they would re-open after the races were over. You could go up to town and all the stores and bars were closed. Everybody was at the track."

"It was such a small track that you knew everybody. When one of our friends in the shedrow ran a horse, we all went to help him and watch his horse run. It was a family thing."

"They've changed the whole thing. It's grown and I haven't grown with it," said Cooper about Ruidoso, which has seen numerous improvements since R.D. Hubbard purchased the track in 1989.

"The saddling paddock was on the east end of the grandstand and the winner's circle was (on the

apron) across the track from the odds board. So to get there, you had to walk across (the track) through the mud that was half-knee deep. My friend was coming across (the track) with my wife so he picked her up and was carrying her and he lost one of his shoes in the mud and couldn't get it out."

Since that time, the racing oval has been enlarged from five furlongs to seven and the surface completely renovated to withstand the heavy summer rains.

Technology also has changed drastically in the last 45 years.

"When you went to the telephone office to call your owner in Tucson, you'd go in there around seven o'clock — maybe you'd get out at 10 because they had just one little outlet. All these people were using it and you had to wait to get your turn."

"The first year I came here, I ran second in the open Quarter Horse Futurity and second in the Thoroughbred Futurity with a colt named Niger Nate," said Cooper.

The two best horses Cooper trained were the quarter horses Don Bar and Lightning Bar, both sired by the legendary stallion Three Bars. Don Bar was a three-time stakes winner and placed in three other stakes including the Kindergarten Futurity at Los Alamitos.

Lightning Bar placed in two stakes and won four of ten career starts.

"We won the Quarter Horse Futurity here in '57 with Don Bar, then took him to The Fair Grounds in Phoenix," said Cooper. In 1957, the Ruidoso Futurity was worth \$8,054, this year's purse was \$339,515.

When Cooper got to Phoenix, he wanted to enter Don Bar in an allowance race for 3-year-olds and up and the local horsemen scoffed at the idea.

"They told me that you don't run 2-year-olds with old seasoned quarter horses. I was being a little

cocky and I said 'you just watch,' and we won the race."

After the Phoenix meet closed, Cooper thought his horses were of the caliber to compete at Los Alamitos.

"I called Ed Burke, who everyone said never did a favor for anyone. I told him I had a stall for Don Bar, but I also wanted to bring Lightning Bar. I told him he's never started, but we worked him out of the gate. He said 'if you say he's a runner, I'll give you stalls.' That surprised me. I ran him (Lightning Bar) on a Monday and ran second. Later in the week, I won with him and Don Bar also won that week."

The next year Cooper ran Don Bar in the Pacific Coast QHRA Derby trials at Los Alamitos and he equaled the 440-yard track of 22.00 seconds set by three-time world champion Go Man Go. The horse ended up running third in the derby, but later that summer he returned to Ruidoso to win an allowance race by an eye-popping 2 1/2-lengths.

Throughout his career as a trainer Cooper handled horses for many owners, but the most notable was the late Anne Stradling.

A world famous horsewoman, Stradling was the founder and benefactor of the Museum of the Horse now located in Ruidoso Downs. She was a member of the Cowgirl Hall Of Fame.

"When Anne first came to Tucson, she was in jackpot roping (contests) just like the cowboys. We first met in 1945, and I'd been close friends with her because we belonged to the same riding club. I trained two thoroughbred mares for her."

"One of them she bought in Atlantic City and brought her to Tucson. She didn't check her records and the horse had been ruled off the racetrack for having troubles in the (starting) gate."

"I didn't know it either, so I brought her here (to Ruidoso) and I worked her a couple of times before

entering her. She refused (to leave the gates) and I couldn't believe it, so we never started her."

"The other one we took to Agua Caliente (in Tijuana, Mexico) and won with her."

Ever since Cooper can remember, he wanted to work with horses.

"When I was 4 years old, an old friend of mine was an ex-cowpuncher. When the other kids would go to bed, I'd stay up and ask him to tell me about his cowboy days."

"After that, I was determined to become a cowboy," he said.

"When I was six, I started riding all by myself. When I was nine I was breaking my first 2-year-old and he jumped out from under me and I broke my shoulder."

"My dad was a rancher and farmer and I didn't want to farm so my momma said 'if you're going to mess with these horses, you better get good enough that you can make your living at it.'"

That was all the inspiration the young man needed to pursue his lifelong dream.

"I started out cowpunching and I broke reining horses until 1946. I had a stable leased and they kept bringing in these race horses to train and I didn't know anything about racing."

"Instead of trying to train them myself, I hired Bowie Kirk from Farmington who was known as one of the best quarter horse trainers in New Mexico. The second year we were together we won the Rillito Derby with (the quarter horse) Hula Girl."

After an unsuccessful stint as a trainer at Rillito two years ago, Cooper handed his horses over to Tucson-based trainer Howard "Zip" Peterson.

Peterson is perennially one of the top trainers at Rillito and has also made an impact at Ruidoso. In 1989, he qualified Contessa Cash to the All American Futurity and ran seventh behind Strawberry Silk in

the final.

Cooper currently has two horses in training. Presidential John and a thoroughbred filly named Legendary Mistress who made her career debut here two weeks ago.

Both horses were bred and raised by animal science students at the University Of Arizona in Tucson.

"I trained at Rillito in 1992, but didn't do any good. I had a filly that just couldn't back it and I swapped her for Presidential John. Some friends of mine bought Presidential John from the University and he was bucking them off, and they were getting tired of it so I traded my nice filly for John."

"I did this because I liked it, I didn't make any money."

Cooper may not be rich in monetary terms, but as far as memorable experiences and adventures, the old horseman is a millionaire.

"He bucked with 'Zip' for about two months then finally he got him straightened out. If 'Zip' hadn't been a bronc rider himself, I think we would've given up on him."


Although Cooper enjoys being involved in racing, he doesn't feel like becoming a full-time horseman again. That does not keep him from getting on a horse every now and then.

"Last October, I got on a 2-year-old and he bucked me off. That's when I decided it was about time to quit breaking horses. But I'm still riding. I like to go on trail rides and pack trips with my stepdaughter."

Although he can't keep up the rigorous routine he once had, he seems satisfied with his role in the horse business.

"I don't intend to expand (horse ownership). Two is enough and it keeps my energy level up."

Most important of all, Cooper doesn't regret the path he took in life which meant being on horseback much of the time.

Wolf flies high with miniature feathers

Eighteen years ago, while working for an oil company and living in London, England, artist Bill "Wolf" Roberson had an encounter which was destined to change the direction of his life.

That encounter, at an artists' sidewalk show in the Hyde Park district of London, was with Willard Wood, an artist who had devised a method of oil painting on feathers, an extremely difficult process.

The two men developed a friendship and eventually Wood shared with Roberson his secret three-stage formula for stabilizing feathers and preserving the oils.

Roberson, using the method which he has since refined and patented, paints miniature American Indian and southwestern scenes on feathers.

His paintings were featured at the 10th Annual Ruidoso Arts and Crafts Fair over the Labor Day weekend where he received the blue ribbon for "Best Booth."

"The real trick to the feather painting process," Roberson told *The Ruidoso News*, "is that the feathers have natural oils which will repel the oil base of the paint. The treatment of the feathers prevents splitting and paint bleeding as well as neutralizes the tendency of the feather to reject the paint."

Roberson had painted in oils and acrylics for several years prior to his experiments with feathers, even giving a one-man art show in Tulsa, Okla. in the mid seventies.

But the secret formula which Wood had shared in London haunted Roberson, and in 1991, he began feather painting in earnest.

Roberson uses narrow brown wild turkey, pea hen, or blue, gold, and scarlet red macaw feathers for his paintings. He obtains the feathers only through authorized dealers and uses no endangered species.

Because Roberson is not painting on a smooth surface, he must work on both the quill and the bands of ridges which are naturally formed by the feather.

The feather paintings are created using very fine three and five haired brushes and a magnifying glass. Since Roberson cannot draw on the feather but instead must use a brush, the process becomes even more difficult.

Roberson prefers oil tints rather than acrylics for his paintings because acrylics tend to dry very quickly and are difficult to keep moist.

"If you're not quick enough in making corrections," Roberson said in an interview with the *Daily Progress* in Claremore, Okla., "You

end up with a 'stacked-on paint look.'"

By using oil tints, rather than acrylics, Roberson said that he can walk away for a while to rest his eyes.

Most of Roberson's feather paintings depict American Indians, possibly because his great-great-grandmother and great-great-great-grandfather were both Cherokees.

Recently he has added southwestern scenes.

According to an article in *The Ponca City News*, Roberson visualizes the next day's paintings while lying in bed. Sometimes the central figure of the painting comes to mind, maybe a horse or an Indian maiden.

"I have to plan the painting and how to present it," said Roberson.

The feather paintings may be portraits or landscapes but most are less than two inches wide and as long as the feather will allow.

Roberson spends at least 16 hours on each of his feather creations, often much longer, by starting at the point farthest away and then bringing it in toward him. That technique brings the painting to life.

"I was really amazed at the reaction of people," said Roberson. "At every show I attend people say they have never seen anything like it. Western and Indian collectors are especially interested because they are always looking for something new."

Roberson has good reason to be thrilled about the acceptance of his art.

"Some of the pieces are being considered for the new Southwest and Native American display at the Smithsonian Institute," he said.

"And it is also being considered for a Native American art exhibit at Customs Hall in New York City."

The feathers have been featured in *Southwest Magazine* and newspapers across the country.


The average price of Roberson's feather paintings is \$250. Each comes framed on a suede background.

Roberson also offers prints of his

works which, due to a special photography process, seem almost three dimensional.

Roberson continues to exhibit his feather paintings at art shows across the country but his studio is located in Oklahoma.

Summer turns the corner on the busy Labor Day weekend

What a great weekend!

All American weekend left behind a lot of happy memories, but that's not all it did for this bustling resort community. Attendance was up at the track, and those numbers were reflected all over town. Several business operators noted that business was so good this weekend that it made up for some of the slower days during the area's unseasonably hot June.

"Everybody was up," said one Midtown merchant who for years has used a "bag count" as his business barometer. He said shoppers were spending money.

Restaurants were busy, and area lodgers were filled to capacity this weekend.

Traffic reflected these increased numbers, with four or more times the normal population swelling the numbers here. That, too, was a plus, with few problems, and those that occurred were quickly handled by area law officers. When traffic became backed up at the traffic "Y," officers responded quickly to keep things moving.



Caramel Flan

- 1/3 cup sugar
- 3 beaten eggs
- 1 1/2 cups milk
- 1/3 cup sugar
- 1 tsp. vanilla

Ground nutmeg or cinnamon

In a heavy saucepan, cook sugar over medium heat (do not stir) until sugar begins to melt, shake saucepan occasionally. When sugar has melted, reduce heat to low and cook until sugar is golden brown, stir frequently. Pour into 4 6 oz. custard cups or one 3 1/2 cup soufflé dish, tilt to coat.

Combine eggs, milk, sugar and vanilla, beat until well combined, but not foamy. Place soufflé dish or custard cups into an 8 x 8 x 2 inch baking dish and set on oven rack. Pour egg mixture into custard cups or soufflé dish. Sprinkle with nutmeg or cinnamon, if desired. Pour boiling water into the baking dish around custard cups or soufflé dish to a depth of 1 inch.

Bake at 325° for 30 to 45 minutes for custard cups (50 to 60 minutes for soufflé dish) or until a knife inserted near the center comes out clean. Serve warm or chilled. Serves 4.

Bake at 350°, uncovered, about 15 to 20 minutes, or until golden brown. Serves 4.

Skillet Cake

- 1/4 cup unsalted butter
- 3 eggs
- 3/4 cup milk
- 2 tbsp. orange juice
- 3/4 cup all-purpose flour
- Pinch of grated nutmeg
- Powdered sugar

Preheat oven to 425°. Place butter into a heavy 2-quart pan or skillet, not more than 3-inches deep. Place in oven until butter is melted.

Meanwhile, beat eggs in a large bowl until light. Beat in milk, orange juice, flour and nutmeg until smooth. Swirl melted butter over bottom and sides of pan. Pour in batter and return to oven. Bake until golden brown and puffed, about 25 minutes. Dust with powdered sugar and serve immediately with apple sauce and brown sugar. Serves 2 to 4.

EGG-CELLENT EGG-SPERIMENT



How thin is an eggshell? Well, an eggshell averages about .094 of an inch thick and is made up of protein, water and mineral (calcium carbonate). In this experiment, the mineral reacts with the acid in the vinegar. By dissolving away half the thickness of the shell, you're handling an egg with part of its shell about .05 of an inch thick. So handle gently!



Turkey Loaf

- 3/4 loaf Italian bread
- 2 eggs
- 1-1/4 lbs ground turkey
- 1 clove garlic, minced
- 1 large onion, grated
- 2 tbsp. parsley, chopped finely
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1/4 tsp. ground black pepper
- 6 slices ham
- 3 to 4 hard-cooked eggs, peeled
- 2 tbsp. butter or margarine
- 1 tbsp. flour
- 1 cup beef or turkey broth
- 3/4 cup sliced mushrooms

Soak bread in water until soggy. Squeeze water from bread; set aside. In a large bowl, whisk uncooked eggs slightly. Add soaked bread, turkey, garlic, onion, parsley, salt and pepper, mix with hands. Pat into a foil-lined, jelly-roll pan. Hollow-out center to hold the egg stuffing.

Stuffing: Wrap ham around hard-cooked egg. Place neatly in a row down center of meat. Wrap meat mixture over the ham/eggs to seal completely. Bake at 350°, 40 to 45 minutes, or until done.

Gravy: Melt butter over low heat. Add flour, stirring constantly, until thickened. Gradually add broth; heat to boiling; remove from heat. Lightly sauté mushrooms and add to gravy. Serve with Turkey Loaf slices. Serves 6.





Dilled Peas with Walnuts

MICROWAVE RECIPE

- 1 pkg (10 oz) frozen peas
- 1/4 cup chopped onion
- 2 tbsp water
- 1 tbsp margarine or butter
- 1/2 tsp dried dillweed
- Salt and pepper, to taste
- 1/4 cup broken walnuts, toasted

In a 1 quart microwave-safe casserole, cook peas, onion and water, covered, according to peas package microwave directions, drain well. Stir in margarine, dillweed, salt and pepper. Cook, covered, on HIGH (100%), 30 to 60 seconds, or until heated through. Sprinkle with the toasted walnuts. Serves 4.



Tuna Noodle Casserole

- 1/2 lb egg noodles, uncooked
- 1 can (10 3/4 oz) cream of mushroom soup
- 1 can (5 oz) evaporated milk
- 1/2 cup sour cream
- 1 can (6 1/2 oz) tuna, drained and flaked
- 1/2 cup each frozen peas and broccoli, thawed and drained
- 1 can (4 oz) sliced mushrooms, drained
- 1/4 cup sliced, black olives
- 1/4 cup finely chopped onion
- 1/4 tsp ground black pepper
- 1/2 tsp Worcestershire sauce
- 3/4 cup crushed potato chips
- 1/4 cup Parmesan cheese

Prepare noodles according to package directions, drain.

In a medium bowl, blend remaining ingredients, except for the crushed potato chips and Parmesan cheese. Add noodles and mix well. Pour into a greased 2 to 3-quart casserole dish.

Mix crushed potato chips with Parmesan cheese and sprinkle evenly over top of tuna casserole. Bake at 350°, until hot and bubbly, about 35 to 40 minutes. Serves 6.

Potluck Pasta

- 2 cups shells, rotini or elbow macaroni
- 1 pkg (10 oz) frozen peas
- 1/3 cup chopped onion
- 1 can (10-3/4 oz) cream of celery soup
- 8 oz sour cream
- 1 can (4 oz) mushroom stems and pieces
- 1/2 cup milk
- 1/2 cup shredded carrot
- 1 tsp dried, crushed basil
- Pepper, to taste
- 2 tbsp Parmesan cheese

In a large saucepan, cook pasta. Add the frozen peas and onion during the last 6 minutes of cooking, drain.

In the same saucepan, stir together soup, sour cream, mushrooms, milk, carrot, basil and pepper. Cook and stir over medium heat until heated through. Stir in drained pasta mixture, heat through. Transfer to a warm serving dish. Sprinkle with Parmesan cheese and serve immediately. Serves 6.


Creamed Onions and Peas

MICROWAVE RECIPE

- 1/2 lb. small pearl onions, peeled
- 1/4 cup water
- 2 tbsp. butter or margarine
- 2 tbsp. flour
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1 cup evaporated milk
- 1 cup shelled green peas

In a 2-quart, microwave-safe casserole, add onions and the water. Cover and microwave on high (100%) until onions are tender, about 5 to 7 minutes. Drain and set aside.

To the same casserole, add butter and microwave on HIGH (100%) 1 to 1-1/2 minutes, or until butter has melted. Add flour and salt; stir until smooth. Add milk and stir to combine with flour mixture. Microwave on HIGH (100%) 1 minute. Stir, then microwave again on high (100%) about 1 to 2-1/2 minutes, or until sauce bubbles and thickens; stir twice during this time. Add peas and cooked onions. Cover and microwave on HIGH (100%) 1 to 2 minutes, or until vegetables are hot. Serve immediately. Serves 4.



Sancocho

- 8 oz. boneless pork shoulder, cut into 1-inch cubes
- 1/2 cup each, chopped onion and green bell pepper
- 1 tbsp. minced jalapeño pepper
- 4 garlic cloves, minced
- 1 cup canned Italian tomatoes, drained (reserving liquid), seeded and chopped
- 2 tbsp. white vinegar
- 1 tbsp. freshly squeezed lime juice
- 1 qt. water
- 3/4 oz. each, sorted, uncooked peas and pink beans, rinsed
- 3 chicken bouillon cubes
- 1 tbsp. each, minced, fresh parsley and minced, fresh cilantro
- 1 bay leaf
- 1/2 tsp. crushed oregano leaves
- Salt and pepper, to taste
- 6 oz. pared sweet potato, sliced to 1/4-inch

Broil pork just until rare, set aside. Spray 3-quart saucepan with cooking spray; Over medium heat, add onion, bell pepper, jalapeño and garlic; cook, stirring frequently, until soft. Add tomatoes (with reserved liquid), vinegar, and lime juice; stirring constantly, cook for 1 minute. Add remaining ingredients, except sweet potatoes; stir to combine. Reduce heat to low; cover and simmer, stirring occasionally, 30 to 35 minutes. Stir in sweet potatoes; cover and cook until tender, 20 to 25 minutes longer. Remove and discard bay leaf before serving. Serves 4.

Cranberry-Orange Relish

2 medium oranges, separated into sections
1 lb. fresh cranberries
2 cups sugar
1/4 cup finely chopped walnuts

Finely shred 1/4 cup orange peel. In a food processor, grind the orange sections and the cranberries. Stir in sugar, walnuts and orange peel. Cover and store in refrigerator up to 2 weeks. Serve with ham or poultry. Makes 4 cups.



Lemon Broccoli

2 tbsp. olive oil
2 cloves garlic, coarsely chopped
2 cups broccoli florets
1/2 cup water
1/4 cup lemon juice
Freshly ground black pepper

Heat oil in skillet over medium heat. Add garlic and sauté 2 minutes. Remove garlic, leaving oil in skillet. Add broccoli and stir fry over high heat for 2 minutes. Reduce heat to medium, add water, cover, and cook until broccoli is crisp tender, about 4 minutes. Sprinkle with lemon juice and pepper. Serves 4.



Key Lime Pie

1/3 cup margarine or butter
1/4 cup sugar
1 1/4 cups finely crushed graham crackers (about 18 crackers)
3 eggs, separated
1 (14 oz) can condensed milk
1/2 cup key lime juice
1/2 tsp. cream of tartar
6 tbsp. sugar

In a medium saucepan, melt margarine, add 1/4 cup of sugar and graham crackers, toss to mix. Spread evenly into a 9-inch pie plate. Press bottom and sides to form an even crust. Chill at least one hour.

Preheat oven to 350°. In a medium bowl, beat egg yolks. Add condensed milk and lime juice. Continue beating until thick. Pour into prepared pie crust.

For meringue: Allow egg whites to reach room temperature. Beat egg whites with cream of tartar until foamy. Add 6 tablespoons of sugar gradually, beat until stiff peaks form. Spread meringue on top of pie, sealing to edge of crust. Bake 10 to 15 minutes, or until meringue turns golden brown. Let chill approximately 2 hours before serving.

INVISIBLE INK

Fruit juices contain compounds of carbon. These compounds are virtually colorless when dissolved in water. When heated, the carbon compounds break down, producing carbon (the element) - which, is black. Using this principle, lemon, orange, grapefruit, and apple juices can be used as invisible ink.



Apple Kugel

- 2 cups fine egg noodles
- 2 eggs, beaten
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup sour cream
- 1/4 cup milk
- 1/2 tsp. cinnamon
- 1/4 tsp. nutmeg
- 1/4 tsp. salt
- 1/2 tsp. vanilla
- 1 cup chopped, peeled apples
- 1/2 cup golden raisins
- 1/4 cup chopped walnuts

Cinnamon Whipped Cream

- 1 cup heavy cream
- 1 tbsp. sugar
- 1/2 tsp. cinnamon

Preheat oven to 350° and grease a 1-quart casserole.

Cook egg noodles according to directions on the package. Drain, rinse and set aside.

In a large bowl, whisk together eggs, sugar, sour cream, milk, cinnamon, nutmeg, salt and vanilla. Stir in apples and raisins. Fold in cooked and drained noodles. Pour mixture into the prepared casserole and top with walnuts. Place casserole into a 13 x 9-inch baking dish; pour hot water into dish, to about a 1-inch depth. Bake at 350° for 45 minutes, or until set. Let stand and cool for about 15 minutes before serving.

Cinnamon Whipped Cream

In a small bowl, beat cream until soft peaks form. Fold in sugar and cinnamon. Serve with warm Apple Kugel. Serves 6.



Lime Cornish Hens

- 2 Cornish game hens, approximately 1 lb. each
- 1/3 cup olive oil
- 1/4 cup fresh lime juice
- 1/4 cup chopped green onion
- 2 tbsp. chopped parsley
- 1 tbsp. grated lime zest
- Salt and pepper, to taste
- 1/4 tsp. paprika

Wash hens thoroughly and pat dry.

In a shallow baking dish, combine the remaining ingredients and mix thoroughly. Add hens and turn to coat with marinade. Cover and refrigerate overnight or at least 2 hours, turning occasionally.

Remove hens from marinade and transfer to a baking pan, reserve marinade. Bake at 350° for 30 minutes. Turn hens and baste with reserved marinade. Bake 30 minutes more, or until done. Serves 4.

OODLES OF GOOP




Wait 'till you dive into a bowl of goop. You can try to make a splash or pour it like a liquid. Slap it and it acts like a solid.




3. Stop rolling and lift your top hand up. What happened to the ball?



Velvet Corn Soup

- 3/4 lb. chicken breast, boned, skinned and finely chopped
- 1 tbsp. cornstarch
- 1 tbsp. water
- 1 egg white, beaten
- 1/4 tsp. salt
- 1 tbsp. cooking oil
- 1 tbsp. scallion white, chopped
- 4 cups chicken broth
- 2 cans (16 ozs. each) cream-style corn
- 1 tbsp. soy sauce, thin or light
- 2 tbsp. cornstarch, dissolved with 2 tbsp. cold water
- 2 tbsp. sesame oil
- White pepper, to taste
- 1 large egg, beaten
- 4 chopped scallion greens or Chinese parsley, for garnish

Combine chicken with 1 tablespoon cornstarch, water, egg white, and salt, until it forms a thick paste; set aside.

Heat oil in a 3 quart soup pot. Add scallion, stir and heat through. Add broth, corn and soy sauce, bring to a boil while stirring. Reduce heat and simmer 1 minute. Add chicken mixture. Stir vigorously, bring to a boil for 1 minute. Stir in cornstarch/water mixture. Add sesame oil and pepper, to taste. Remove from heat. Pour in beaten egg, while stirring gently. Garnish with scallion greens or parsley, if desired. Serve hot. Serves 6 to 8.

Chocolate Pudding

- 3/4 cup sugar
- 1/3 cup cocoa powder
- 2 tbsp. cornstarch or 1/4 cup all-purpose flour
- 2-2/3 cups milk
- 4 beaten egg yolks
- 1 tbsp. margarine or butter
- 1-1/2 tsp. vanilla

In a heavy saucepan, combine sugar, cocoa powder, cornstarch or flour; add milk. Cook and stir over medium heat, until mixture is thick and bubbly. Cook and stir for 2 minutes more. Remove from heat. Gradually stir about 1 cup of hot mixture into beaten egg yolks.

Return all of egg mixture to the saucepan. Bring to a gentle boil, (not a rolling boil). Reduce heat. Cook and stir for 2 minutes more. Remove from heat. Stir in margarine and vanilla. Pour pudding into a bowl. Cover surface with clear plastic wrap. Chill (do not stir). Serves 6.

Microwave Directions: In a 1-1/2 quart casserole, combine sugar, cocoa and cornstarch or flour. Stir in milk. Microwave on HIGH (100%) for 8 to 10 minutes, or until thick and bubbly; stir every 2 minutes, until thickened, then every 30 seconds. Cook for 1 minute more. Gradually stir about 1 cup of the hot mixture into beaten egg yolks. Return all the mixture to casserole. Cook on HIGH (100%) for 1 to 2 minutes, or until bubbly around the edges, stirring every 30 seconds. Cook for 30 seconds more. Stir in margarine and vanilla. Cover the surface with clear plastic wrap. Chill (do not stir).
