## Trouble for village is in the smell of... WATER County value jumps

That bottom of the barrel odor coming from some Ruidoso water faucets reflects the village's dwindling water supply.

To protect against future water crises, village councilors are considering adoption of a water use restriction ordinance.

Village Manager Gary Jackson told council members Tuesday that the unusually dry winter and summer dealt a blow to the water level in Alto Lake reservoir.

"To call it a lake would be a stretch," he said. "It's closer to a puddle."

"I want the public to know that the smell doesn't mean the water is unsafe," said Mayor Jerry Shaw. "It's much better now with Labor Day behind us."

Jackson said many people who call about the water think that the village is hooked up to Grindstone Lake reservoir, but that source of water won't be available until next Memorial Day. By then, a water

treatment plant and distribution connection should be completed with the help of a \$675,000 allocation from the State Legislature, he said.

"It's a top priority," Jackson said of the project started last year. "We must do it."

"The recent rain hasn't come anywhere near making up the deficit from the spring run-off shortfall," Jackson said. "The past wet years diverted attention from the importance of a water supply."

The staff put together a proposed water contingency ordinance to promote conservation, he said. Councilors agreed to set a public hearing on the proposal.

"It would automatically trigger different phases of enforcement based on prevailing water conditions," Jackson said.

"I hope we have a wet winter and it won't be an issue, but if not, the ordinance will be in place."

During phase one, a state of non-emergency in April and May, public education about conservation would

be emphasized. In phase two, moderate condition, the staff would have determined if the winter snowfall had been light and the run-off was expected to be low.

If the level in Alto reservoir dropped to three feet below the benchmark and/or village wells produced less than a total of 1,800 gallons of water per minute, voluntary conservation would be urged. That would include an odd/even system for watering lawns, whereby homes with even numbers could water on even-numbered days and the opposite for odd.

Municipal water uses would be reduced and warnings would be issued for poor watering practices.

Phase three would trigger water rationing if Alto Lake dropped below 12 feet and/or the wells produced less than 900 gallons per minute.

At that point, no outdoor watering would be allowed and indoor uses would be minimized. Citations would be issued after the first

violation and could result in a fine of \$500 and a jail sentence of up to 90 days on conviction.

"This can be very serious," Jackson said. "We got very close this summer. We need every drop we can get. We're in a period now where consumption is declining, but we need to have this ordinance, so if it is dry and, heaven forbid, we don't complete Grindstone on time, we have something in place."

The staff also is reviewing rate changes that would include premium prices for heavy water users, he said.

Councilors approved a procedure by which the staff can move ahead on technical steps toward completion of the Grindstone water system without point by point approval. At each meeting, a summary of those steps will be submitted for council review.

"There's no use waiting two weeks to go through the motions," Shaw said. "The staff is on top of it and we take your recommendations."

The taxable value of Lincoln County jumped \$5,526,176 since last year, hitting \$279 million.

"That's pretty good considering it was not a reappraisal year," chief deputy assessor Doug Whittaker told county commissioners Tuesday.

The increase is due to county inspectors picking up new construction worth at least three times the amount of the taxable value, since it is based on one-third of the market price.

Millage rates are down generally, because of the increase in values. One mill equals \$1 for each \$1,000 of taxable value.

Whittaker said a breakdown of taxable values and millage rates per village and community area in the county should be available next week after being certified by the State Department of Taxation and Revenue.

## Schools add programs

Brand new public school programs aimed at changing approaches at many grade levels are in effect in the Ruidoso school system.

Alternative schooling, the kindergarten home visitation program, approval of a high school athletic period for credit, and Parents as Teachers (PAT)—all were part of the Ruidoso Municipal School Board of Education's regular meeting Tuesday night.

Paul Wirth, director of academic support services, reported on the new Gavilan Canyon School, designed for students 11-18, who because of special needs, require the intensive services offered by the school.

The Gavilan project is to provide appropriate educational programming, therapeutic counseling, and rehabilitative services to students

who because of various problems are having difficulty in the general education programs of the public schools.

Wirth reported that the school has three middle school and two high school students attending classes. To maintain program and service effectiveness, enrollment is limited to 15 students.

Family involvement and counseling are important parts of the school program, according to Wirth. "We try to meld together requirements of the children with the family."

Another new program this year is the Kindergarten Visitation Program, approved in July, that allows teachers to visit with parents of children entering kindergarten.

Roger Sowder, Nob Hill Elementary principal, along with a team of kindergarten teachers and

parents, said the home visits seemed to ease the first-day jitters of children and parents.

Kindergarten teacher Pat Sullivan expanded on the results of the visitation program: "We were able to visit 100 percent of our families."

After visitation, families attended a special orientation day.

"Children and parents had the opportunity to see the decorated rooms before school started," Sullivan said. "By the first day of school we knew the children's names and they knew who we were."

Parents praised the program's effectiveness in calming fears and helping children cope with the new experience.

"The home visitation dramatically eases the trauma in the first day

## Land developers see road blocks to effort

New developers would like to start selling lots in Rancho Ruidoso Valley Estates near the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport, but road problems could interfere.

Tom White told Lincoln County Commissioners Tuesday that construction began on the roads in 1989.

"The owner did everything he could to comply and communicate with the commission and the county manager and engineer on board then," he said.

White submitted a letter dated Oct. 22, 1990, from the county indicating the roads were completed to standards applicable at that time.

"We presumed at the end of the two-year wear period, the roads automatically would become part of the county's road system," White said. "We wrote a letter when we didn't hear anything. We did a few touch-up items. Six months passed and then we did a few more. I think the two-year maintenance program is going to drag into 20 years."

County Road Manager Bill Cupit said he could not recommend acceptance of the roads in their existing condition and based on an engineer's report.

Commissioner Stirling Spencer contended the main point is whether the roads failed during the initial two-year wear period or after that point. Since no letter can be found in county files showing they were approved in 1992, no proof exists that the roads were in acceptable condition at the end of the initial two years.

Commissioner L. Ray Nunley urged board members to work with

the new developers to help them bring the roads up to standard.

Keith Birch said the lots will be used as sites for regular and HUD (Housing and Urban Development) approved manufactured homes.

He said his company is in the process of acquiring 140 lots in the development, where 75 to 140 homes in the \$70,000 and up range will be built.

"The fact that the roads are not up to standard won't stop us," he told commissioners. "I will be more than glad to meet with you and Mr. Cupit to see what can be done."

Cupit said the chip seal type surface on the roads has a life expectancy of five to six years. That drops to three to five years with low traffic.

Commissioner Wilton Howell asked County Manager Carolin Cooney to determine how much property tax has been paid by the property owners in the development since 1989. The amount could offset some of the expense of resurfacing the roads, he said.

White said the issue is whether this commission "will honor the promise of a previous commission."

Howell pressed Cupit for specifics on what he thought should be done to the roads.

"I have to follow the engineer's recommendation to rebuild the whole road," Cupit said. "I didn't give a definite no because I thought something else might be acceptable."

"We need to give them some direction on this," Nunley agreed.

The roads issue was tabled until Cupit can show each commissioner what he thinks should be done.

# Emergency medical charge boost asked

In an attempt to shift the financial burden for emergency medical service from Lincoln County taxpayer to service users, an increase request that would double some charges will be sent to the state.

The Corporation Commission will conduct hearings and hand down the final decision.

"I certainly agree that a rate increase is in order, but some are

Under the proposal, the basic ambulance charge would double from \$75 to \$150, as well as the \$2.50 per mile charge to \$5 and other rates for supplies, extrication and special services. A new \$35 emergency lights and siren charge would be imposed.

Gregg Kotila, a paramedic with the county emergency medical service (EMS), offered some background.

"I know doubling is a big jump, but the county charges have been steady for nine years while the cost of providing the service and buying equipment has gone up," he said. "We're trying to get us to a level where we can continue to provide good service. Two of the goals are to make the service more self-sustaining and to generate revenue for equipment purchases and ambulance replacement."

Realistically, an emergency ambulance service cannot be operated without some government subsidy, but that extra can be reduced by ensuring rates are updated, he said.

Ruidoso's ambulance service supplements its income with patient transports from the Lincoln County Medical Center to other facilities in Albuquerque, Roswell and El Paso. The charge can run as high as \$1,200. The county doesn't have a chance at those runs.

The new rates would not change the service's attempt to work with those who have difficulty paying, Kotila said. About 50 percent of the billed charges are recovered, he said.

"We can't refuse service based on ability to pay," he said. "A lot of people are traveling through the area and it's a problem tracking them down. We don't want to hound them."

Nunley took exception, saying those who can pay and don't should be hounded.

"Our collectibles have gone down," Chairman Monroy Montes said. "I think the assistant county manager has been making a diligent effort. We can pursue them

for up to three years."

The rate increases could generate an addition \$27,000 with only basic care and as much as \$40,000 with advance life support.

Nunley pointed out that the commission has been supportive of the service, buying two ambulances, uniforms and some equipment this past year. He voted against the motion to pass the request to the state, based on his objection to the percentage of increase. The motion passed 3-1, with Commissioner Bill Schwetmann absent.

Commissioners postponed action until budget time on a request from Kotila for an intercept vehicle that could deliver advance life support and other equipment to county ambulances, instead of turning over cases requiring that level of support to Ruidoso units.

"It would be more of a team approach instead of giving the patient over to whoever comes from Ruidoso," Kotila said. Because of financial limitations, not every ambulance can be equipped with a paramedic and related equipment. They go out on most runs with basic service equipment and emergency medical technicians.

In related matters, commissioners approved writing off \$7,995 in uncollectible accounts for EMS. The amount primarily represents the difference between what is charged and what Medicare or Medicaid will pay.

They also noted that under a proposed change in the personnel policy, employees could not be paid for time spent in volunteer activities, such as fire fighting and other emergency services, especially when they are reimbursed for the by the emergency departments.

The employees can use their compensatory or vacation time or take a pay reduction for the hours away from the office.

Commissioners postponed action on all personnel policy changes until next month to ensure that employees have a chance to review and comment.

# DA finds Chris Condon not at fault in shooting

Dist. Atty Bert Atkins has concluded his investigation of a Sept. 5 shooting at the Texas Connection Cafe in Ruidoso Downs, and exonerated the police officer involved.

According to Atkins' office, Ruidoso Downs Police Officer Chris Condon was justified in using his weapon during an altercation with Michael Shirley, 45, of Capitan.

The DA's news release stated that Condon was in uniform and had responded to a request of the restaurant owner to observe an individual acting suspiciously.

After being observed for several minutes by Condon, Shirley left the restaurant, went to his vehicle and returned, whereupon Condon observed him to be carrying a large survival-type knife in his rear

pants pocket.

As Shirley was paying for his food, Condon approached the man and asked for identification. Shirley produced the knife and advanced towards Condon with the officer retreating towards the rear of the restaurant.

Condon drew his weapon and repeatedly ordered Shirley to drop the knife, to no avail. Shirley continued to advance upon Condon, who grabbed his right wrist, but Shirley broke free.

Shirley then grabbed at Condon's weapon and at that point the officer fired his weapon three times, striking Shirley in the arm and chest area.

Shirley was transported by ambulance to the Lincoln County Medical Center where he un-

derwent surgery and died on the operating table at approximately 11:30 p.m.

Customers and restaurant personnel provided investigators with statements expressing the belief that Condon acted properly in the performance of his duties and in a manner which was justified.

Thus, the district attorney has closed the case with respect to any criminal prosecution.

Condon has been on administrative leave pursuant to Ruidoso Downs Police Department policy pending the investigation and psychological evaluation provided for all officers involved in shootings.

The officer is expected to return to work within the week.

and the beginning of a child's school career," said Sowder.

Wirth announced that last spring a state grant was given for the Parents As Teachers program (PAT). The program, using regularly scheduled home visits by certified parent educators, helps provide all parents of children, from before birth to age 3, support they need to give their children the best start in life.

Children who were enrolled in the PAT program scored higher on tests while parents reported a gain in confidence of child rearing, studies indicate.

The board also heard a request from High School Principal Ron Hodges that the athletic period be certified as part of the curriculum, and credit be awarded for it.

Asked by board members what the "down side" of such a period might be, Hodges said there was none.

The board approved the request.

## Child development board to gather

The New Mexico Child Development Board will hold its regularly scheduled meeting on Thursday 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. and on Friday from 8:30 a.m. to noon at the offices of the Dulce Independent Schools in Dulce.

Items on the agenda includes an update on the Partners in Change Project, an update on Operation Jericho (the Child Care campaign and council of chief staff school officers), and update on the budget of the CYFD Office of Child Development budget for next fiscal year, a revision of the open meeting policy of the CDB Bylaws (indicating the CYFD Public Information Officer will be sending out news releases concerning CDB meetings), the request for reappointment of two board members, and other items.

The Office of Child Development and the Child Development Board was created by the New Mexico Legislature on July 1, 1990 and incorporated into the Children, Youth and Families Department July 1, 1992.

## Glencoe fire department asks for loan to buy pumper

Glencoe-Palo Verde Fire Chief Angel Chavez seemed well on his way to convincing Lincoln County Commissioners Tuesday that the county should loan the volunteer department about \$50,000 to buy a new four wheel drive pumper.

While commissioners stopped short of approving the loan, they directed County Manager Carolin Cooney to review the possibility and to look for good used equipment from other government agencies.

Chavez and assistant chief Rudy Chavez reported that the money set aside this year for equipment by the department was used to buy extrication tools for accidents. The department also is paying installments on a \$130,000 main tanker, but could repay the county for a 580 gallon water and foam brush unit at about \$4,000 a year. A previous \$10,000 county loan already has been repaid.

## Elected trash board debated

Lincoln County voters may decide whether the county's garbage collection is governed by a seven member elected board or will continue under the county Solid Waste Authority.

County Commissioners Tuesday asked their attorney to research the law and determine whether a petition submitted by the commission is enough to schedule a referendum or if it requires a petition signed by voters a percentage of voters.

Commissioner Wilton Howell, who serves as chairman of the authority, a coalition of the county and its five municipalities, said he thinks a board, with members elected from each district would be more efficient and responsive.

"The authority has no authority at all," he told commissioners. "It functions through joint powers agreements. It has no right to cite violators, to stop anyone or to set rates. Every time we do something, we have to go back to each entity. This would take the politics and wearing of different hats out of it."

"My only problem is that this might take away from the final authority of the commission," Commissioner Stirling Spencer said. "I want to make sure we still represent the people and we don't create a pseudo government."

A special district commission would have to conduct public hearings on the issue before a referendum could be scheduled. A sanitation district board would have the power to levy a property tax.

## New jailer added to staff

A new jailer will be added to the staff of the Lincoln County detention center in Carrizozo.

County Commissioners approved the addition Tuesday to improve safety at the facility. Last month, an attempted jail break nearly freed an accused murderer temporarily staying at the county jail.

Commissioner Wilton Howell also asked County Manager Carolin Cooney to take a look at using jail trustees to clean up loose trash around dumpsters.

Chairman Monroy Montes said one of his concerns is possible competition with private industry. Commissioner L. Ray Nunley said he was worried about legal liability if one of the inmates injured a civilian.

## County stationery declared fair game for commissioners

Criticism aimed at Lincoln County Commissioner Stirling Spencer for using county stationery while running for State Land Commissioner fell flat Tuesday.

Commissioner Wilton Howell called for a written policy. He said commissioners should not use the stationery to state personal opinions, especially when they are candidates.

Spencer defended the action, saying he was representing the concerns of residents when he wrote the governor about reform of the state penal system. Howell countered that Spencer was not as vocal last year when officials from Camp Sierra Blanca took exception to criticism of procedures involving the work release program and prisoner selection. Recently, five inmates escaped from the minimum security prison and one is accused of murdering a local resident.

"Gentlemen, we're in a forced partnership of five commissioners," said Chairman Monroy Montes. "We have no policy in place on how the stationery should be used. I hope the issue can be handled in an administrative capacity through our county manager. I don't feel I have to have the approval of the other commissioners or that their disagreement would stop me from sending a letter (on county letterhead) if I felt it was necessary."

Commissioner L. Ray Nunley agreed. "Our names are on the stationery, at least temporarily," he said. "I feel I have the right as a commissioner. I'm guilty of writing the governor on county stationery. I feel it is a necessary tool to flex our muscles as commissioners. I feel we all have a need for political clout."

"I'll be by your office to pick up a pile," Howell told County Manager Carolin Cooney.

"That's a good idea to do your job as a representative of the people," Spencer shot back.

# Sierra Blanca camp getting 'more formal'

Things have become formal at the Camp Sierra Blanca minimum security prison as a result of a rash of inmate escapes.

In a recent interview, Warden Sandra McFadin said a new more formal procedure is being used to count prisoners and a public address system has been installed at the prison near Fort Stanton.

"We have changed the counting procedure to a more formal approach where prisoners stand by their beds," McFadin said. "With informal counts, we would check them at their job sites."

The informal count still may be used on occasion. "If we can't locate an inmate, instead of wasting time running around trying to find him, we call him over the PA system and he has to respond immediately," McFadin said. "It saves us a lot of time."

Some of the suggestions have come from Major Ralph Lucero, a chief of security for the Penitentiary of New Mexico in Santa Fe.

"He's on loan from the Department of Corrections and has 28 years of experience, most recently with the south unit of the penitentiary," McFadin said. "He's done wonderful things. It's good to get ideas from other institutions. Some times, you can't see the forest for the trees."

Lucero will stay until someone is assigned permanently to the security chief's position, with the rank of captain.

McFadin said she's most excited about the prospect of closing a public road that runs through the prison for access to Bureau of Land Management (BLM) property on the Fort Stanton Reservation.

"We had carloads going through this weekend," she said. "They were whooping and hollering in the backs of pick up trucks. I guess it was homecoming (in Capitan). I don't think that's appropriate."

She met with officials from the bureau and is confident by spring the road will be realigned and will no longer cut through the prison.

A security review committee, comprised of wardens from two other prisons and a corrections accreditation auditor from the central office, reviewed the camp layout and procedures for three days last week.

During a visit recently with residents of communities around the prison, Gov. Bruce King said he would look into improved security at the prison, including a fence. That's an approach that McFadin would prefer to avoid, because it changes the nature of the prison, she said.

Other suggestions have included altering the manner in which prisoners are selected for minimum security rehabilitation. McFadin said a new psychological test will be used to detect tendencies toward violence.

Simply eliminating inmates with violent histories is not the answer, she has pointed out. David Michael Crawford, 24, the man accused of the murder of Lincoln resident Clark Pfingsten, had no convictions for violent crimes. He walked away from the camp Aug. 14, with only four months left in his sentence for receiving stolen property, his first felony conviction.

He was apprehended a few days later driving Pfingsten's truck. Roswell police officials say Crawford led them to Pfingsten's body. The elderly man died from wounds suggestive of being run over by a car, according to the medical examiner's report.

About a week later, three more inmates working on a plumbing assignment at the camp drove away from the prison in a truck. They apparently spent hours in the Alto Village subdivision before being spotted by residents and arrested by Lincoln County deputies. Two were serving sentences for crimes involving violence.

## After school transition program OK'd

Capitan juniors will receive special testing and counseling this year as they attempt to choose the right career.

The district school board recently approved a pilot program that was spawned by a \$300-million work transition bill signed into law by President Bill Clinton.

Gary Cozzens, of Region IX Cooperative Education, told the board that the bill will expand the existing transition program, which focuses on helping students with disabilities move from school into jobs, training or college.

"This bill would provide services for every child in the United States," Cozzens said. "New Mexico is one of five states chosen for pilot programs. I'm trying to get a jump on things by using mechanisms already in place. Capitan gives its juniors the Armed Services Voca-

tional Aptitude Battery. It's a good assessment."

Cozzens received approval from the board to move forward on a program to prepare and counsel students on the transition from school to work force or college.

"Even if the full program never comes through, the students will have benefited," he said. "They will have individual folders with information concerning their aptitudes and possible career directions to take home and discuss with their parents."

"I emphasized that none of this is cast in stone. Obviously, a student could change his or her mind, but the aptitude information always will be there."

Cozzens said he also plans to use a Guidance Information System software program given to rural

school districts last year by the state.

"A student punches in the type of career they are considering and the program comes back with the courses that should be taken, the aptitude necessary, the salary range and the prospects for employment," he said.

Before going to the board for approval, Cozzens said he talked to Supt. Diana Sonnemaker, high school principal Darrel Stierwalt and the counselor.

"We envision taking the test results and working with each student, using their preferences for future employment to plug in the test and look at requirements," Cozzens said. "They would work with the counselor, if they're headed to college or with me for a trade or vocational school."



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# 'Robo-Warden' alive and watching hunters

I sit waiting in the darkness with a radio, video camera and a remote control unit. Across the road waiting also is my companion, "Robo-Warden." I know the cold and wind aren't bothering him, he's just a deer decoy, but it sure is bothering me. Well, the good thing is it probably won't be a long wait, at least not usually.

I hear a vehicle coming down the road and soon see the headlights filtering through the trees. I get everything turned on and ready. The vehicle approaches and it's time for Robo to take over. The headlights of the vehicle light up his eyes and almost immediately comes the sound of squealing tires. The vehicle backs up and its headlights shine directly on Robo. I twist the remote control slightly and Robo's head turns away, then swings back directly into the headlights. I call on the radio to other

officers waiting in their units that the vehicle is stopped. We wait.

The driver's side door swings open and the interior lights come on. The sound of the shot is deafening in the dark night. I'm close enough to hear the bolt work on the rifle and hear the spent case hit the pavement. The second shot doesn't startle me quite as bad as the first. I call on the radio that we have shots fired and waiting officers gun their engines and head for the site.

The poacher figures it out when the deer doesn't fall and the tires squeal once again as he tries to make his getaway. He doesn't get far though before being stopped by the flashing lights of a patrol vehicle. The driver and passenger are ordered from the vehicle, handcuffed and searched for weapons. They don't even ask why.

This scene is just one of several such incidents that occurred during last year's deer seasons and will undoubtedly be repeated this year.

The use of the deer decoy by conservation officers is putting a bite in the ranks of the night hunter. The poacher that hunts, not with stealth, but with a blinding light.

There is some good news brought about by the use of our decoy deer. The word is getting around and fewer people are being apprehended shooting at our decoy. This was the goal when the program started to save our deer from poachers. From all indications the number of deer being killed at night is being drastically reduced by the use of the decoy.

Use of the decoy, combined with a law calling for the forfeiture of vehicles used by night hunters has had an effect. The possibility of losing a \$15,000 automobile will make anyone think twice before shooting. Remember that during this year's deer seasons. The deer you're shooting at after dark may just be Robo Warden.

She commented that Ruidoso Mayor Jerry Shaw recently announced that ground-breaking is planned soon for a \$15 million convention hotel facility.


"Those convention people are not just going to stay up at the convention area," said Bailey, "they're going to want to go out and see and do everything, and so we are all going to benefit."

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# Little Theater's new home requires big committment

Ruidoso Little Theater finally has a permanent home next to the post office on Sudderth Drive—this after 14 years of having to function at a variety of locations throughout the community.

In order to have a home for the consolidation of storage for costumes, furniture, props, lighting equipment, sound equipment, stage construction materials, and for readings, rehearsals and performances, the little theater had to make a committment to accept an overhead cost of some \$25,000 per year. That includes the costs of producing four plays for the year, plus such things as rent and utilities.

For RLT to cover the annual cost, ticket sales for nine performances of each play must exceed 80 tickets sold at \$7 per ticket. This will bring in approximately \$20,000. The balance of monies needed, RLT will work to continue to receive from businesses that purchase advertisements in the play programs and the all-important

donations. Monies in addition will be used to upgrade the theater.

Prior to a season of four plays, script reading is necessary to select the plays that RLT can produce, and hundreds of contacts must be made to obtain advertisements and donations for the programs. This must then be assembled for the printer.

by the director and assistants to select actresses and actors. This is all done by volunteers, hundreds of hours consisting of quantities of people no cost to RLT.

For each play, this takes eight weeks of preparation, and the 12 board members are constantly involved. During this period, there are approximately 21 rehearsals.

Think about it, RLT must begin the 1995 season with advance sales of about 670 season tickets, and advance purchase will assure seats for each of four plays and the "Betty Awards." RLT believes that with advanced sales for 1995, beginning now, it can reach its goal and in two or three years, RLT will be pre-sold-out annually.

Tinnie Silver Dollar is located in the historic Tinnie Mercantile Building, a half-hour east of Ruidoso on U.S. Highway 70.

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

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

### Eagle Creek rooted in history

#### TO THE EDITOR:

Re: Story in the Sept. 8, issue of *The Ruidoso News* - "Water holds the key to area's growth"

The referenced story has a few mis-statements, but is accurate overall. A few details need to be corrected and added. When I use the term "Eagle Creek Association" or the "association," I mean the Eagle Creek Inter-community Water Supply Association, Inc.

At Alto Reservoir, the plan is to build an outlet tower so that water can be taken at different depths. At present, raw water can be taken only at one point from the reservoir — off the bottom.

Silt is to be removed from Alto Reservoir to regain storage capacity which has been lost due to sedimentation and bank erosion.

There is no plan to "...to reconstruct the pipeline from the point of diversion...". The plan is to rebuild the intake works at the point of diversion to make it more efficient. The pipeline from the point of diversion to Alto Reservoir was rebuilt in the late 1960s.

The Farmers Home Administration (actually the Rural Development Administration, or RDA) does

not want the "...villages to pledge their water rights". Farmers Home wants the Eagle Creek Association to pledge its water rights. The Eagle Creek Board of Directors cannot make any commitments as to the water rights of Capitan and Ruidoso.

My father, Dan Swearingen, did not go to Santa Fe to negotiate with the railroad. James Earl Harcrow, representing Capitan; Dan Swearingen, representing Ruidoso; Frank Boyce, attorney for the Eagle Creek Association; and several representatives of the State of New Mexico went to San Francisco to negotiate with the railroad. The state sent representatives because the state hospital at Fort Stanton was to be a member of the association.

The association did not build the pipeline "...to the Bonito pipeline."

Capitan built the pipelines from their filter plant to the Alamogordo pipeline (the former railroad pipeline from Bonito Lake).

I trust that Mrs. Stallings will write at least one follow-up story after interviewing those former Eagle Creek Association board members still living. Those men made enormous contributions of their time, skills, and efforts.

Without them, this area of the state could not have grown as it has.

All of us owe a tremendous debt of gratitude to who saw the association through those very difficult first years.

### Small tumors can be detected

The incidence of breast cancer has increased during the past 15 years, although the death rate has not changed. It is estimated that one in nine women will suffer the disease during their lifetime. Breast cancer is the most commonly diagnosed cancer in female patients in the United States and the second leading cause of death from cancer.

Death from cardiovascular and cerebral vascular disease is ten times more common in females than is death from breast cancer. Major risk factors in this disease are positive family history (first degree relatives), early onset of menstruation (menarche) and late first child birth.

Physical examination and mammography are the usual methods of detection; yearly physical examination by a physician and monthly self-examinations are recommended. Mammography is useful in detecting very early nonpalpable tumors, although it is not 100 percent accurate in detecting all breast cancers. Mammography screening seems to be having a positive effect on breast cancer mortality, particularly in the 50-69 year-old age group.

In the 40-49 age group, there is controversy regarding screening, although most medical organizations support this concept. It is difficult to obtain randomized controlled studies with large numbers of patients followed for 20 years, this being essential in obtaining accurate data on the efficacy of mammography.

Worldwide data thus far would suggest that physical examination plus mammographic screening is reducing the disease burden from breast cancer by reducing both morbidity and mortality. In our small series of breast cancers seen at LCMC over the past two years, two-thirds were small tumors, detectable only by mammography.

The screening recommendations (unless clinical factors deem differently) are as follows:

- One mammogram before age 40.
  - Mammogram at 1-2 year intervals between ages 40-50.
  - Annual mammogram over 50.
- Women are encouraged to avail themselves to this mammogram program; it is not restricted to patients having their first mammogram, but is open to patients having annual studies.

SANTA FE—Well, now it's official: no matter what ticket wins the governor's office in November, either the governor or lieutenant governor, conceivably both, will have smoked marijuana.

For another, a remarkable number of citizens would be able to tell Clinton what it feels like to inhale. If smoking marijuana is a sin, it is one of those widely practiced ones.

No one, by the way, has come forward to say they recall sharing a joint with Bruce King. Come to think of it, anyone who has such a recollection would be better advised to take the story to Believe It Or Not.

In the drug-free (isn't it?) race for the U.S. Senate, Republican candidate Colin McMillan has brought his east-side, down-home, good-old-boy twang to bear against incumbent Democrat Jeff Bingaman.

As the McMillan campaign evidently sees things, the campaign pits McMillan, the country boy whom you're likely to meet at a local cafe on weekday mornings, against Bingaman, the faithful member of the Eastern Establishment who has sunk so low that even he hangs out with people like Bill Clinton and Teddy Kennedy.

He received his medical training at the University of Texas at Houston and residency training at Johns Hopkins in Baltimore, Md., where he also was a faculty member for a

year after his residency was completed.

The hospital is located on the Mescalero Reservation and has a staff of five full-time doctors and 20 nurses. The hospital is open 24 hours a day, year-round.

"The biggest thing we are trying to do for the Mescalero community is to provide a hospital that they can be proud of," said Dr. Wilson, "and a place where they can get the very best care."

According to Dr. Wilson, one mission of the hospital is to address certain conditions unique to the Mescalero area. Diabetes, for example, is five to six times more

prevalent among native Americans than other ethnic groups.

"We provide education about diabetes and diabetes prevention, alcohol and drug abuse, injury prevention and weight control," Dr. Wilson said. "We also provide prenatal care and pregnancy education."

The hospital also houses a busy out-patient clinic for the community, he said.

Dr. Wilson makes periodic visits to the Ruidoso Care Center to look in on an elderly couple who recently moved from the reservation.

"They are a great couple," said Dr. Wilson, "and seem to be making the adjustment very well."

Dr. Wilson said he and the other doctors and staff at the Mescalero hospital look forward to continuing to provide patients with the most modern treatment and education programs available.

Now we may have it right, as the Mediterranean people have for centuries enjoyed a life style that includes living well, longer and healthier than many other peoples of the world.

ample of a people who ascribe to the Mediterranean diet with gusto. At its most basic, the diet combines a heavy use of grains, as in pasta, rice and bread made simply without a lot of shortening; sparing use of animal fats; little alcohol other than wine with meals; fewer meats and dairy foods; and less sugars. Instead, plenty of good extra-virgin olive oil, lots of fresh fruit and vegetables and garlic by the head are front and center.

Spain, unlike many other European countries, has vastly diverse

cuisines. This came about from three primary forces: the diversity of the people and conquerors who stayed; the variety of new foods introduced from the new world and through the spice trade; and the bounty gleaned from the land and surrounding seas.

Because of this, Spain is rightly called "The market garden of Europe." It is also a major importer of foods into the United States; almost all canned pimientos, artichokes and olives come from Spain.

### NOTICE OF HEARING AND PROCEDURAL ORDER

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that, on September 1, 1994, GTE Southwest, Inc. and Centel of the West (collectively referred to as "GTE") filed an Application with the New Mexico State Corporation Commission ("Commission") to restructure and merge the rates and tariffs of the two companies and requesting that the Commission review the fairness and reasonableness of the rates and charges of the companies on a merged operational basis. The Application requests approval of a merged revenue requirement of \$45,497,898, a return on equity of 13.70%, and an overall cost of capital of 11.166%. The Application includes the supporting testimony of six witnesses and certain workpapers and exhibits.

GTE's Application was filed in accordance with its February 15, 1994 Stipulation in Docket No. 90-88-TC, which the Commission approved in relevant part by an order of March 28, 1994 in the same docket. As provided by the Stipulation, the proceeding in this docket that was initiated by the September 1st Application shall be bifurcated into a revenue requirement phase ("Phase I") and a rate design phase ("Phase II").

GTE's September 1st filing relates to Phase I. Phase II shall commence after the Commission's entry of an order for Phase I and upon GTE's filing of its direct testimony relating to rate design. Under the terms of GTE's Application and waiver, the Commission has until March 31, 1995 to issue an order concerning Phase I.

GTE does not propose to adjust its rates during the pendency of Phase II. GTE has proposed that, although the effective date of the proposed changes shall be the date of the Order entered in Phase I, any rate increase or decrease shall be deferred until the conclusion of Phase II of the proceeding.

More specifically, GTE has proposed that, at the conclusion of Phase II, all rate changes shall be billed on a going-forward basis. Further, GTE has proposed that any rate decreases or increases accumulating during the pendency of Phase II should be effected through either a surcharge or credit, whichever is applicable. With regard to non-recurring revenue items (primarily those related to usage-based elements such as toll, access and local usage revenues), GTE has proposed that the distribution of any appropriately identified surcharge or credit need not be directly tied to actual individual customers' usage incurred during the pendency of Phase II. GTE has proposed that a distribution method affecting the appropriate surcharges or credits for usage-based revenues be developed as part of the Phase II proposal.

#### IT IS, THEREFORE, ORDERED:

- On or before October 18, 1994, any party desiring to intervene and become a party to this proceeding shall file in the above-captioned docket, and serve upon GTE and all parties of record, a Motion to Intervene as provided by the Commission's Rules of Procedure. All motions to intervene shall specify whether the prospective intervenor intends to participate in Phase I of the proceeding, Phase II of the proceeding, or both phases.
- A prehearing conference shall be held on October 27, 1994 at 10:00 a.m. in the Commission Hearing Room, Fourth Floor, PERA Building, Corner of Paseo de Peralta and Old Santa Fe Trail, Santa Fe, New Mexico.
- Intervenors shall file their direct testimony for Phase I on or before November 1, 1994.
- Commission Staff ("Staff") shall file its direct testimony for Phase I on or before November 30, 1994.

5. GTE shall file its rebuttal testimony for Phase I on or before January 6, 1995.

6. A public hearing on the merits of Phase I of the proceeding shall be held commencing on January 23, 1995, at 9:30 a.m., in the Commission Hearing Room, Fourth Floor, PERA Building, Corner of Paseo de Peralta and Old Santa Fe Trail, Santa Fe, New Mexico. The hearing shall continue until completed, although the parties currently anticipate that the hearing will continue through January 27, 1994. The Commission will entertain public comments at the hearing.

7. GTE shall publish a copy of this Notice and Procedural Order no later than September 18, 1994, in the Albuquerque Journal and in each of the other newspapers serving GTE's operating territory. GTE shall provide the Commission with proof of said publications.

8. GTE also shall include inserts in its bills for the October billing cycle that describe the proceeding in this docket, including hearing dates. GTE shall develop the wording of the bill insert in conjunction with Staff and the Intervenor Attorney General.

9. The Commission Staff shall mail this Notice of Hearing and Procedural Order to the Commission's telecommunications mailing list and provide the Commission with a certificate of such mailing.

10. The following procedural schedule shall apply to Phase II of the proceeding:

- GTE's direct testimony for Phase II is due 30 days from the date of the Commission's Phase I Order;
- Intervenors' direct testimony for Phase II is due 60 days from the date of the Commission's Phase I Order;
- Staff's direct testimony for Phase II is due 105 days from the date of the Commission's Phase I Order;
- GTE's rebuttal testimony for Phase II is due 135 days from the date of the Commission's Phase I Order;
- A hearing on the merits of Phase II of the proceeding shall commence 180 days from the date of the Commission's Phase I Order, at 9:30 a.m., in the Commission Hearing Room, Fourth Floor, PERA Building, Corner of Paseo de Peralta and Old Santa Fe Trail, Santa Fe, New Mexico and shall continue until completed;

F. Following the issuance of the Phase I Order, GTE shall publish such further notice of the date and time of the Phase II hearing on the merits as the Commission may direct.

11. The above schedule for Phase II is based upon the Commission's understanding that the Commission's six-month timeline for issuing a Decision for Phase II starts upon the filing of GTE's direct testimony for Phase II. If GTE does not share this understanding, it shall notify the Commission immediately.

12.
