Mother bear slept peacefully after being tranquilized...

It's up to Ruidoso to BEAR IT

A mother bear was shot and killed in Ruidoso Friday, after being baited to the area with watermelon scraps. At first, the female bear's cub climbed a tree next to the dead parent, but it later ran deeper into the forest, where State Game Warden Ron Moore said its chances of survival are slim.

Cubs usually stay with their mothers 1 1/2 years, including their first winter. Without her protection and food gathering ability, a cub has little chance of living until spring.

Moore had lined up two zoos willing to take the cub, if it had been captured. He was frustrated and irritated at the situation.

Trash authority meeting today

A program that would use Lincoln County jail trustys to clean up illegally dumped items and scattered trash around dumpsters will be considered Monday by members of the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority.

The board meets at 10 a.m. in the recycling center on Second Street in Ruidoso Downs.

Under the trusty plan, a guard would be assigned to each inmate work group. Other items on the agenda include a manager's report, requests to purchase a sideloader truck, personnel policy amendments and a discussion about creating a sanitation district.

Special commission meeting called

A special Lincoln County Commission meeting is scheduled for 1 p.m. Tuesday to sign an agreement with the state for the purchase of a former horse sales barn in Glencoe.

The barn already is being used as the county's rural events center. The purchase was possible, because the State Legislature approved \$250,000 for the acquisition and \$40,000 toward improvements and first year operation.

Commissioners meet in the county courthouse in Carrizozo.

Here come the big bikes, again Wednesday influx due

Thousands of motorcycle enthusiasts from almost everywhere will gather in Ruidoso for the annual Golden Aspen Motorcycle Rally, Wednesday through Sunday. They have been coming for 24 years.

Part of the rally is the American Motorcyclist Association's (AMA) Western National Road Riding Convention, this year at the Ruidoso Civic Event Center. It's one of the AMA/Dunlop Elite Touring Series of road-riding events for 1994.

Ron Andrews is local coordinator for the event.

As part of this year's program, rally visitors will be involved in motorcycle tours of scenic and historic sites near Ruidoso, the Ski Apache Resort, Lincoln National Forest, White Sands, and Carlsbad Caverns.

Riders also will also be treated to a chuckwagon dinner theater, daily non-denominational church services by the Christian Motorcyclists Association (CMA), a nighttime motorcycle light show and parade, live music, exhibitions of trail riding, Native American dance demonstrations, and a motorcycle trade show.

Embezzlement counts face village employees

Two long-time Ruidoso village water department customers' representatives has been charged with embezzlement and have resigned from their posts.

Ruidoso Police Chief Lanny Maddox said today that Mary Wimberly and Paula Giarratano each were charged with one count of embezzlement of more than \$2,500 and less than \$25,000, a third degree felony.


Giarratano was arrested Aug. 17 and Wimberly on Sept. 7. Both were released from jail on conditions set by Magistrate Judge Bill Butts.

Village manager Gary Jackson said an analysis by finance director Lee Ann Nichols of billing records and credits being issued, particularly to paying customers, led to an investigation by the police department.

"In evaluating that situation, irregularities and questions were raised," he said. "We expect and anticipate restitution of the money taken. The time period (of the alleged embezzlement) and the exact amount of money still are being determined, but I feel certain it was more than one year."

Wimberly had worked for the department, most recently as supervisor, since July of 1980. Giarratano joined the village in February of 1984.

Maddox said his investigation began three weeks before the arrest of Giarratano.

County roadblock plans drawing mixed reviews

The prospect of waiting at roadblocks on the highways leading into Ruidoso may discourage some motorcyclists from attending the Golden Aspen Rally this weekend, a motel owner says.

But others, including the event promoter and several lodging owners, say they welcome the extra law enforcement presence as a way of ensuring the safety of both visitors and residents.

The roadblocks and higher concentration of county deputies, Ruidoso police and officers from other agencies helped maintain a smooth motorcycle rally last year. They arrested 38 persons for offenses ranging from DWI (driving while intoxicated) to drinking in public. They handled seven motor vehicle accidents.

That record contrasted to prior years when arrests didn't occur, but occasionally damage to property and even some violence marred the rallies.

But Neil Freed, the new owner of Sitzmark Chalet, contends the roadblocks are overkill and that they may keep some people from coming. He already has received a few cancellations tied to objections about the inconvenience and the negative image roadblocks give the rally, Freed said.

"I'm offended because the roadblocks appear only during the rally," said Freed, who rides a motorcycle and has been coming to the rallies for the past 14 years.

"Ninety percent of the people on these Harleys make more money than the people in town," he said. "I retired last year from IBM. I am offended personally and by the impact on our motel. I won't be able to enjoy the rally this year, because I will have to try to get one day reservations since the four and five day reservations are being canceled."

However, reports that a southwest regional representative of a Harley Davidson club threatened to send his members to Padre Island, Texas, instead of Ruidoso because of the roadblocks couldn't be confirmed.

A spokesman for the membership services division of Harley in Milwaukee, Wis., said she was unaware of any type of advisory concerning the Ruidoso rally.

The man, who identified himself as a regional coordinator, called the wife of rally promoter Ron Andrews, but left no name or contact telephone number.

Although Freed is concerned about the negative image the road-

blocks project, a random check of local motels showed that many operators aren't worried.

Dan Dee Cabins and Innsbruck Lodge reported no cancellations, but an Innsbruck spokesman said he received complaints about having to wait at the roadblocks last year. The Inn at Pine Springs was booked solid. A spokesman for Enchantment Inn said reservations were strong, but he also noted complaints last year about the road blocks.

Carole Wall at Shadow Mountain Lodge said she had received two cancellations, but she quickly booked the rooms to new customers.

"One person who canceled said it was because he was hassled so much last year, but I'd rather have the officers out there. I'm not complaining."

Andrews said his West Winds complex is booked solid and he has been calling other places in town to take the overflow.

"I haven't gotten any calls canceling, but most of my people are vendors or friends. I only have 20 units."

"We want the law enforced next weekend, Labor Day weekend, all the time."

Andrews said pre-registration for the event is running 20 percent more than last year.

"If the weather holds and the gate stays in line, we could hit 12,000 people," he said. "I hear the figure 20,000, but I don't know where that number comes from. We had 10,000 last year over the five days that came through the trade show. But then consider the trade show is free Wednesday evening for the locals and its free Sunday, the last day, and that some of the people are repeats. I think (Ruidoso Police Chief) Lanny Maddox's estimate was 3,500 bikes last year and we might see 4,500 bikes this year."

Andrews said most of the complaints he heard last year were from locals who had to wait in the traffic lines with everybody else.

"They'd get caught on a run to the pharmacy and it discouraged a lot of people from going back and forth," he said. "But I have no problem with the police having a show of force if it can be done without causing much hassle and I'm sure the sheriff will do that."

Rumors also were circulating that chief Maddox had included in Andrews' promotional packet to biking groups a stern letter warning of the roadblocks and other measures.

Tempers start simmering after sixth camp escape

For the sixth time this year, an inmate has escaped from Camp Sierra Blanca Adult Rehabilitation Center.

The latest escape has two Lincoln County Commissioners and the manager of McDonalds burning up the telephone lines calling for changes and a faster response from the state.

"This time, he (the inmate) walked away from his work release assignment at McDonalds," said warden Sandra McFadin, noting the difference between the previous two escapes in which inmates either drove or walked away from the minimum security camp near Fort Stanton.

Frank Serna, 33, from the Los Lunas-Albuquerque area, was serving the last year of an 11-year sentence for aggravated burglary. He was due for release in September of 1995.

He was described as five-foot, nine-inches tall, weighing 120 pounds, with a moustache, a patch of hair under his lip and several tattoos.

"We found his McDonalds clothes, so we have no idea what he may be wearing," McFadin said. "We believe he was assisted, possibly by a girlfriend, since some lady, representing herself as a prison staff member, had called McDonalds to change his day off from Sunday to Thursday. We found that he had been dropped off for work several times when he actually wasn't at McDonalds, but reported at the pickup point to go back to prison at 4:15 p.m. as usual."

Prison officials were unaware of the change in Serna's schedule, she said.

Law enforcement officials were

not notified until about 4:30 p.m., McFadin said.

"We were called by McDonalds after he was dropped off in the morning," she said. "(The manager) told us that Serna had arrived with another inmate and the manager had intended to work him even though it was his day off, as he had done before sometimes, but (Serna) didn't stay. Our guard stopped at a nearby business to ask if anyone had seen him, but (law enforcement agencies) weren't notified, because at that time he just was in violation of his work release contract."

The penalty for violation would have been to restrict him from future work assignments.

McDonalds manager Mark Heinemann said he urged prison officials to notify the police of Serna's "missing" status in the morning, since he had been traced to a nearby mobile home park and was not supposed to be in town that day.

"I was told he had not escaped, yet," Heinemann said. "I said, 'What do you call this?'"

"Look at it from our vantage point," McFadin said. "He apparently had been doing this and always came back. Once we notified the police, it would have been an all-out escape. I do understand the confusion over that."

Commissioner Wilton Howell said if that's the way the camp handles possible escapes, he intends to call for a complete shut-down of the work release program.

"The only way I could support it would be if they had a guard with them at all times, like the county is proposing about trusty at the jail doing clean up around dumpsters."

McFadin said she is contacting area work release employers to let them know they should only accept changes in schedule or other official

information from her or assistant warden Tom Sullivan.

Heinemann said no where in the contract for prison labor does it specify or limit to whom an employer must speak.

"The program is great and the vast majority of inmates need it or they will not be mentally ready for society," Heinemann said. "But I believe there are management problems and that something should be done about the type of prisoners they assign to the camp."

Howell said he also would like to see a different approach used for assigning prisoners.

"Possibly, they could create a state jail system where people doing the last four months of a sentence or who only are in for four months or so, are assigned," he said. "If we don't have 100 (the camp's approximate capacity) of that type in the state's prison system, let's call the camp maximum security."

"I'm asking (Commission Chairman) Monroy Montes to call a special meeting so the commission can do it properly and approve a resolution calling for a change in the classification immediately. I don't share the view of (Commissioner Stirling Spencer) that it's a finely run operation. Eight hours is too long to let someone run. I don't care what the technicality. He could have been out of state by the time law enforcement was notified."

Commissioner L. Ray Nunley said he contacted Gov. Bruce King's office and was told the governor "was working" on the situation.

John McKean, spokesman for King, said King appreciates and understands the concerns of residents in places where occasional walk aways from prison facilities occur.

Commission mends fences, rejoins state-wide group

The tiff between the Lincoln County Commission and the New Mexico Association of Counties seems to be over. Commissioners have voted to rejoin the group they left abruptly about two years ago.

County Manager Carolin Cooney suggested forgetting old grievances and allowing department heads and elected officials to take advantage of advice other counties can offer and expertise on issues by the association staff.

"A lot of interest has been expressed from other county managers and elected officials for us to get back into the group," Cooney told commissioners last week. "I support the move, because I believe in networking tools. You learn from the mistakes of others and keep updated on changes in the law."

Lincoln was the only county out of 33 in the state that was not a member.

Commissioners decided about two years ago to drop out of the association, because in their view, staff members and board officers were unresponsive to the needs and important issues of smaller counties.

But Andrews said he never saw any such letter and Maddox said the only thing he contributed was a few paragraphs welcoming bikers, but pointing out that all laws will be enforced.

"I can't understand folks who mind roadblocks," Maddox said, noting that only the sheriff's department operates the blocks. "If they're insulted, they've got something to hide. I want everyone to have a good time, but abide by the laws. The only way to ensure a safe and good time is to require people to do that."

"I'm not going to promote Ron's rally, but I sure am not going to be against it. My job is to promote the welfare and safety of all the people and to enforce all the laws as usual."

He has requested help from other area law enforcement agencies for the weekend.

Cooney said the approach of association director Donna Smith has been one of "courting" the county. If meetings haven't been conducted in Lincoln County, it was an oversight and some would be scheduled, Cooney said Smith told her. But unless the county rejoins, its officials can not attend the annual strategic planning meeting in October, because it would violate the association bylaws.

Association staff was helpful during a recent crisis with the jail, offering advice on staffing, Cooney said.

"Where would we get the money for annual dues?" Commissioner Wilton Howell asked.

"You've been saving for the last couple of years by not being members," Cooney responded.

Howell proposed waiting until budget review to decide, but Commissioner L. Ray Nunley favored joining right away.

"We will have new elected officials after the (November) election," he said. "This could be a help. I feel there are definite advantages to belong. I know it's been a help a couple of times since I came on board."

The affiliate groups of the asso-

ciation are especially useful, said Joan Park, deputy county treasurer, and Doug Whittaker, chief deputy county assessor.

The dues are \$12,500 per year, but more expense is connected with travel time and per diem to attend the meetings throughout the year.

"We can control that," Cooney said. "Not everyone needs to go. We can send one and they can report back to the rest."

Chairman Monroy Montes questioned whether any department had budgeted for adequate travel, such those items were deleted in budget cuts.

But Park said her department included extra, because the incumbent treasurer was not running for reelection and with a new person at the helm, attending some training meetings would be necessary.

Nunley offered the motion to join and it passed 2-1 with Howell voting nay. Commissioners Stirling Spencer left the meeting early and Commissioner Bill Schwettmann was absent due to a death in his family.

"Gee, I never thought I'd vote for that," said Montes, who had been a strong critic of the association. "Don't tell Donna I voted for it. She'll think I'm easy."

County Commissioner L. Ray Nunley said he is offended by shows of force by law enforcement officials.

"I hate to see so many good citizens put through this for the sake of maybe 10 percent (who cause problems or are operating a vehicle/motorcycle illegally). That's just my point of view."

Sheriff James McSwane said his department is gearing up for the rally and will set up roadblocks randomly throughout the county.

"We expect triple the traffic in the county that weekend," McSwane said. "We'll be looking at vehicle registrations, driving licenses and proof of insurance, and to assist people in any way we can."

"Last year, we issued more than 100 citations in the two to three days of the event. We also gave several verbal warnings and arrested a few for DWI."

"I believe is a very valid opera-

tion. I'm trying to modify it to be a lot quicker, especially for those coming back through a roadblock."

McSwane issued stickers last year that could be posted on a windshield to show the vehicle already had been checked. But some drivers still ended up waiting in long lines of cars to be waved through the check point.

Freed said a better use of the manpower of the sheriff and police departments would be to post officers on every corner in the downtown area. The rally is staged in the civic events center.

"They can't say there are more vehicles with the rally than on the Fourth of July, but you don't see roadblocks then," Freed said. "It's not going to start off the rally well by ticking off the cyclists, because they feel targeted. And realistically, police have more problems with (the element) brought in each summer with the horseracing industry."

viously were being fed by someone in the immediate area, besides frequenting the garbage dumpster on Grove Road, he said. But when she became more aggressive and tried to enter a resident's house through a screen door, the man shot her.

"He didn't realize he had killed her until the next morning," Moore said. Her body was found in a clump of bushes, where Moore left a baited trap in the hope that the frightened and confused cub would return.

A day earlier, Moore was at it again, this time trying to capture a sow with two cubs. The ending may be happier for the threesome, but Moore has his doubts.

According to the police department, the trio had been hanging around a dumpster at Juniper Circle, when one of the cubs caught its paw in the lid and ended up dangling from the large bin.

Larry Hill, village code enforcement officer, managed to free the young bear without being mauled by the mother, who was pacing nearby.

Then Moore, animal control officer Peggy Williams and several police officers attempted to tranquilize the mother and capture the cubs.

"The mother charged at (one of the officers) when he got too close to the cubs," Moore said. "I darted her, but it took a while for it to take. When it did, it knocked her out for hours."

Kentucky Fried Chicken donated some food to bait traps for the cubs and it didn't take long before they were in a cage.

The female was loaded into a culvert trap and, with her cubs, was relocated in another part of the county.

Moore said while the mother probably will survive even if she lands up in another bear's territory, the cubs may not be as lucky. Other adult bears may try to kill them.

"It really gets to me when one of these critters dies, in part because someone is luring them down," Moore said. He tries to avoid having to relocate or destroy any of the bears, but visitors and residents often don't help the situation with their practices of using hummingbird feeders, leaving out pet dishes with food and other items that entice the bruins, he said.

"Our situation is much worse here than in Albuquerque and yet, they say there, an officer last month had no choice but to shoot a bear, because there were children around," Moore said. "We have chil-

dren and bears around together here all the time. They say to go ahead and continue to do what I'm trying to do (relocating bears and citing people who put out food bait), but it makes me nervous."

Other recent bear sightings called into the Ruidoso Police Department include:

—A report at 2:48 a.m. Sept. 1 from Old Lincoln Road that a bear was pestering a home again, but it was chased into the woods by 6:10 a.m.

—A man on McCarty Drive called at 6:42 p.m., Sept. 1 to report that he had shot a bear with an arrow, wounding the animal. The man was charged with shooting in the village. The bear was found at 7:23 p.m. on St. Vitus Dr. and was killed by State Game and Fish officers.

—A bear up a tree was seen on River Trail. A dog at a residence 50 yards away was keeping it in the tree.

—A call was received at 9:17 p.m. Sept. 4 about a bear feasting in a dumpster at Cattle Baron's restaurant on Sudderth Drive.

—A bear was reported at 11:30 a.m. Sept. 6 in a yard on Paradise Canyon Road, but by the time an officer arrived, the bear had left.

Regional MRS unit to meet

The Regional MRS Information Committee will meet at 2 p.m. Wednesday at the Ruidoso administrative center.

A touch of apple magic in the air

Late Summer Rains
This is being sent to you in mid-morning of Sept. 15. All the Value is emerald green sparkling in rain jewelry, ruby, topaz, opal, diamond and aqua marine.

Yesterday evening, I was up town starting for home when here came a blowing rain storm driving out of the west off the mountains.

I stayed just a little ahead of this rain-blizzard and just at the gate it caught up with me. On the way to the house, the road was a miniature creek.

This is the second good rain in three days, following a weather pattern very pleasing to Mother Earth. Rains in September do a lot of good for the land in the wild and also on fields and orchards. All in all it has been a summer of good rains, now helped by these days of "September in the Rain," as the old song goes.

The Apple Picture Grows Brighter
The Lincoln County apple picture is beginning to look a lot better than it seemed early in summer when late fronts and heavy hail took their toll.

The apples are ripening in the Ruidoso Valley from Hondo, through Picacho, and down to Riverside, also over around Bent the apples are showing their colors.

Throughout our country and around the world, the time of the ripening of the apples is a high point in the year—a season for rejoicing.

And here in our valleys, it is our a cheerful sight to see the crimson, scarlet and golden fruit shining amid the "apple green" leaves.

According to the Encyclopedia Britannica, there are thirty-five thousand varieties of ap-



ples in the world, and at one time seven thousand in the United States.

In the United States, the varieties have thinned down to about one hundred varieties and in Lincoln County and surrounding area, maybe a dozen or so led by five or six favorites. This does not include some old time varieties still to be found in the Ruidoso Hondo area, upper Benito Valley, Mesalero, Bent and High Rolls.

Our Local Apples

Some years ago, Mr. Lawrence Stark of Stark Brothers Nurseries of Louisiana and Missouri, came out here to present the late Scott Campbell of Ruidoso Downs a car as a prize for winning the contest of selling the most fruit trees for the Stark's company.

Mr. Stark said that our mountain land was especially well suited to the growing of apples of superior quality.

One thing he mentioned was the high altitude with warm days and cool nights, which help bring flavor and health qualities to the apples.

Main Varieties

The most popular varieties locally and in

New Mexico generally are:
Red Delicious, Golden Delicious, Jonathan, Winesap, Rome Beauty and Red Gold.
Mother Natures Apples

Many of the apple varieties have appeared all by themselves without the help of apple growers.

Many years ago on a hillside at Stark Nurseries, a seedling apple tree appeared. The first apples were tasted and found to have a delicious flavor. They were developed and became the world famous Stark's Delicious Apples.

Years later, on an orchard in the state of Washington, one tree had a branch of bright red apples while all the rest of the orchard was still green.

The orchard owner got Stark Brothers on the phone and was told not to let anything happen to that tree and its early-ripe branch of apples.

Foster homes sought Humane Society offers happiness

Foster families to provide care and safe, healthy temporary homes for puppies and kittens are needed by the Lincoln County Humane Society.

Too many puppies brought to the shelter die from diseases because they have not received protective shots, said society president Lee McKenna.

The people dropping them off at the shelter usually won't keep them the extra weeks even when they know the risks, she said.

Several litters are up for adoption, including two border collie/Australian shepherd mixes in spotted black and white; some shepherd, labrador and blue heeler

mixes.

Two of the shelter's larger adult dogs, Gretchen and Yukon, also are ready for new homes with owners who will treasure them for the rest of their lives.

Yukon is a strikingly attractive black and white Siberian Husky with ice blue eyes, but a warm and friendly nature.

He's about a year old and has the typical easy going disposition of the breed. He loves to run, McKenna said.

"He definitely needs someone who will exercise with him," society board member Jim Slocum said. "These dogs are good for pulling people on cross country skis, but they're aren't particularly good watchdogs, because they usually

like everybody."

Gretchen the shepherd was released by her owner, because the living conditions were poor for an animal. She's about 11 months old and housebroken. She will whine to be let outside and is used to being on a chain.

Gretchen enjoys rawhide chews, likes all types of people and is family oriented, but probably would be happier in a one-dog situation.

Volunteers are needed in many facets of the society's operation from helping a few hours a week at the thrift shop next to Arby's, to walking the dogs at the shelter for exercise and socialization.

Temporarily without a director, the society has called upon board members to pitch in with other

volunteers to run the operations until a new person is chosen.

Helping to care for the animals will give visitors a chance to see the remodeled shelter. Cats are now separated in an airy, well-heated L-shaped room with individual enclosures.

Native Americans aided by estate bequest

The Native American Scholarship Fund (NASF) announced recently that it has received an endowment of \$725,000 from the estate of Louis G. Giannini of San Francisco.

"Most of the estate funds will be used to add to our endowment," said Dr. Dean Chavers, CEO of NASF.

"This is the largest endowment we have received since we began the fund in 1986," said Dr. Suzanne

Soxkey, development officer. "But we expect to have considerably more money for endowment in the near future. We have received three other bequests so far and have 14 more in the pipeline."

"The Giannini endowment will live forever," said Cassie Szeluga, business manager for the NASF. "We will invest it wisely and use only the interest earned, for scholarships for high-potential Indian students."

"We are all excited about the large endowment," she added. "The staff is all motivated to work our hardest to achieve our dreams of having funds to give every deserving student a chance to have the best education in the United States."

Dr. Chavers stated that "The Giannini endowment is just the beginning of our ability to upgrade Indian education in many ways in the next five years. We expect to spend

considerable amounts of endowment and general fund money on upgrading schools. And we expect to award up to 40 more new scholarships this year."

Lynette Charlie, director of recruiting, reported that "we expect to send hundreds of Indian students to the Ivy League colleges in the next five years. We have 56 graduates now, but will have over 100 in three more years. Our students can compete with anyone.

Our retention rate is 92 percent — the highest ever achieved with Indian students, we think."

"The caliber of our students has improved considerably in the past five years," she continued. "This year's students are ten times better than our students were five years ago."

"We expect our graduates to work for Indian people," Dr. Chavers said. "We had three medical doctors graduated this year and

all of them are planning to work in the Indian country."

"We expect our graduates to provide health services to Indians, to provide education services and to create jobs. Our long term goals are to bring jobs to Indian people and to improve their quality of life."

NASF is a national organization serving Indian students in math, science and engineering," he continued. "In 10 years, we plan to be making 500 awards each year."

Scented challenge for Potpourri

Trying to preserve the images of summer year around has progressed from a hobby to a business for Kathy Tetreault and partner, Marcia McClendon.

They have launched a new enterprise, Sierra Scents Potpourri, with floral displays in a few local shops, but primarily aimed at art and craft shows and special celebrations such as Aspenfest and the annual Christmas Jubilee.

"It started back in 1989 when I was on vacation in Colorado and notice that most of the dried arrangements lacked color," Tetreault said. "I missed flowers in the winter and wanted to have color in arrangements year around. I knew there had to be something to

keep them looking like Monjeau Peak in August. Marcia really helped with suggestions on how to accomplish that."

Air drying can take from one week to 10 days, silicone gel about four to five day. Some people use a microwave to dry, but that kills the vibrancy of the colors, she said. They have a few secret extras of their own to guarantee true colors.

"We've come a long way in a few years and won second place in booth presentation our first time participating in the Ruidoso Downs Ladies Auxiliary show," she said.

Their work spans a wide range of products from wreaths to baskets, wall arrangements to potpourri bowls.

The Crazy Kactus Kafe on Sudderth Drive features some of their pieces, but they will take special requests, if a customer has a particular flower or color in mind.

When it's time to gather the flowers and filler material, the whole family gets involved.

Tetreault's husband, David, scouts good locations and unusual additions for the collection.

"The children have learned the names of all the flowers," Tetreault said. "We use native plants primarily and are careful not to over pick or to destroy the main plant."

"We get so delighted with the way they turn out sometimes. It's really an education," McClendon added.

Wreaths run from \$5 for small to \$35 for larger pieces. A four-ounce bag of natural potpourri is \$4.95.

"That's a lot better than the mass produced kind that mostly consist of colored woodchips," McClendon said. "We set and seal them for up to six weeks to mellow the scent before we use any of the potpourri material."

Arrangements run from \$7 to \$15.

"We think our prices are a really good range for gifts," Tetreault said as she slipped a preserved hollyhock with translucent petals into a display.

"People can take a little of Ruidoso back with them when they leave the mountains," McClendon said.

"We feel we've captured the essence of the area," Tetreault added. "Our pieces are delicate, but they hold up and we don't skimp on flowers and accent items like native nuts." Tetreault may be contacted at 267-7655.

Hunting on state lands cleared with joint plan

A joint initiative designed to prevent conflicts between hunters and state trust land lessees during this year's hunting seasons has been agreed to by Land Commissioner Ray Powell, state land commissioner, and Bill Montoya, director of the Game & Fish Department.

The initiative is the first under a memorandum of understanding signed in late August by Powell and Montoya.

The annual big-game and bird hunting seasons are under way in New Mexico. The State Land Office has issued an easement to the Game and Fish Department allowing hunters access to state trust land under most circumstances.

The departments instituted the program as a result of past problems in the field. Hunters are occasionally denied access to trust land where hunting is permitted, and hunters occasionally damage private property in gaining access to trust land.

"State trust lands serve the public in many ways. Through our agreement with the Game and Fish Department, we can make trust land available for recreation by

New Mexico's hunters, trappers and fishers," said Powell.

"As a veterinarian, botanist and field biologist, I understand and appreciate the need for a healthy ecosystem and the proper management of both wildlife and domestic species. Wildlife remain an integral part of these ecosystems," Powell said.

"Hunting's an important tradition to New Mexicans and helps bring family and friends together," said Montoya.

"Access to state trust lands provides extensive public hunting for good populations of big game and birds throughout much of New Mexico. We encourage hunters to treat that land and the lessees with respect, and appreciate the cooperation we get from ranchers and the State Land Office."

The letter, mailed to 3,121 State Land Office lessees, notes that people may hunt on state trust land under a pre-existing agreement. The agreement requires licensed hunters, fishers and trappers to get a landowner's permission to cross private roads or private land to get to state trust land that is not otherwise accessible by a public road.

The kennels include a sunroof, play area and daily walks for all the pampered pets.



Wild horse adoptions scheduled

Wild horses thundering across the plains, manes flowing in the moonlight...An idyllic scene and one which until Federal protection laws went into effect, was doomed to extinction.

Because of the protection, the mustang herds are steadily increasing each year. The Bureau of Land Management (BLM), in order to maintain a natural balance on public lands and protect the health and welfare of the wild horses, is offering healthy wild mustangs, which are gathered from the western ranges, to pre-approved individuals.

Some 100 mustangs will be arriving at the El Paso, Texas County Coliseum, for a BLM adoption on Nov. 19.

Other adoptions are tentatively scheduled in other areas, including Ruidoso in June and Santa Fe in August of 1995.

According to BLM officials, placement of the horses with private individuals is a crucial element in solving problems of over-

population and overgrazing on public rangelands. Adoption to the public provides the people of the United States with access to the horses for a small fee.

Adoption application packets are available from the Bureau of Land Management, Oklahoma Resource Area Office, 221 N. Service Rd., Moore, Ok, 73160; Phone (405) 794-9624. Information also is available from U.S. Department of Agriculture Soil Conservation Service offices.



Warriors derail Tularosa at Homecoming

In a complete turnaround of their previous effort against Las Vegas Robertson, the Ruidoso Warrior football team played well on both sides of the ball — and gave the undefeated Tularosa wildcats their first setback of the season, 19-6, Friday night at W.D. Horton Stadium.

It capped a memorable Homecoming for the Warriors.

The Wildcats took the opening kickoff almost to midfield against the Warriors' shaky kick off team. A 20-yard run got the ball to the Warrior 35, but the locals put the squeeze on Tuli and the Wildcats' drive sputtered.

Much to the delight of the large and boisterous Homecoming crowd, the Warriors took their first possession 74 yards to paydirt with a new-wrinkle offense that bombarded the Wildcats' defense with an aerial attack not seen in these parts since the days of Jeff Willingham and Russell Easter.

With no running backs in the backfield and three receivers stacked on one side and two stacked on the other, present-day quarterback John Echols threw passes to wide-open receivers that would make Willingham and Easter blush.

Catches from speedster Kyle Humphreys and sticky-fingered Brandon Eamello chewed up big chunks of yardage—but the biggest gain of the drive was a 29-yard Echols run, which came while the Wildcats were still trying to figure out who was supposed to cover whom in the Warriors' crazy new Run-and-Shoot formation.

The touchdown came on a one-yard run from Kyle Humphreys and Byron Soules tacked on the extra point.

The huge Tularosa crowd, like their undefeated football team were suddenly down for the first time of the season and the north side of W.D. Horton Stadium had become very quiet.

After a penalty on the ensuing kickoff, the wildcats took their second possession at their own 18. Their Wing-T offense, intent on running the football, got runs of 17 and 13 yards on the first two carries.

Operating from their own 48, the Wildcats picked up a 5-yard penalty and did not recover. The drive ended with a beautiful 45-yard punt with no return.

Ruidoso got the ball at its own five, familiarly territory this season and could not move it. It was three plays and out for the Warrior offense...almost.

Standing in his own endzone, Jackie Roe stood ready to root the ball out and did, getting off a nice kick. But the Wildcats were even nicer, as they were flagged with illegal participation because of having 12 men on the field.

The 15-yard penalty gave the Warrior offense new life and the ball at the 20-yard line.

The gift was short-lived, however.

The Warriors managed just three plays before fumbling the ball away, deep in their own territory.

Starting from the Warrior 26-yardline, the Wildcats mixed their running and passing attack while managing to make it to the Warrior five. Again, the Ruidoso defense

flexed its muscles, and thanks to a great one-on-one tackle from cornerback Billy Rogge, the Wildcats were turned away empty-handed.

From that point on, the Warrior defense controlled the game.

In the second quarter, Ruidoso got the ball three times and scored on their first possession.

Again starting from the Warrior five, Echols went three-for-passing the ball, while receivers Eamello, Roe and Humphreys blew through the Wildcat secondary like Hurricane Beulah.

Eamello went 53 yards on the second play of the drive and was denied the touchdown by a shoestring tackle. It was Humphreys that eventually got the score from 29-yards out on a perfect Echols strike.

Soules' extra point was blocked, due to a high snap.

The second half saw a rejuvenated Wildcat team come out of the locker room, intent on getting on the scoreboard.

The Warriors got the second-half opening kickoff but fumbled on third down, and Tularosa again got a short field to work with.

Starting from their own 44, the Wildcats' Wing-T attack methodically ran the football to striking distance. Once again, the Warrior defense came to life and turned the wildcats away on fourth-and-goal from the four yard line.

Corners Rogge and Jose Prieto made huge one-on-one tackles as the Wildcats rolled snake-eyes again from deep within Warrior territory.

The Wildcats finally broke into the scoring column with a minute to play in the third quarter, after the Tuli defense picked off a well-thrown, but poorly chosen John Echols pass.


The two-point conversion made the score a scary 13-6.

Kyle Humphreys got the final touchdown of the game with 7:22 left from one yard out. The extra point was no good.

A happier Les Carter, the Warrior head Coach, was beaming after the game.

"We wanted to open it up because we thought we could throw it against them. Our boys were excited about the offense we were running and the changes we made on defense, and we got off to a quick start, which was just what we had in the game plan, said Carter.

"We had some mistakes, but those things are going to happen when you put in a new offense and only work on it three days. As a coaching staff, we were extremely pleased with every kid that played.

Council arranges for a little more quiet around village

Thundering beats from car radios and portable tape players on the streets and sidewalks of Ruidoso will have to be toned down a few volumes under a newly approved ordinance.

The village council at its meeting last week amended its unreasonable noise ordinance to include such disturbances in public buildings or on public rights-of-way.

Councilor Joe Gomez was concerned that the amendment could be interpreted to include noise from a football game.

Councilor Robert Donaldson

pointed out that football games already were covered by the ordinance.

"So technically, someone already could complain," he said. "But it also says unreasonable volume and if you bought a home next to the stadium, noise would be expected."

Councilor decided to add the wording "in commercial or public buildings" to cover private businesses the public may frequent.

In another issue, the council adopted an ordinance amendment to restrict the type of fences that may be constructed in residentially zoned areas.

The board in August adopted an ordinance outlining permitted signs in other zoning designations.

The amendment allows barbed or razor wire fences with the approval of the Planning Commission based on specific needs. Fences constructed after the effective date of Sept. 24, must conform to the regulations. Any existing fencing that doesn't comply with the regulations will be classified as a lawful nonconforming fencing installation. All new or replacement fencing at those sites must conform to the amendment provisions. Site development plans must be submitted to the planning commission.



With consideration, Aspen Rally can thrive

Shiny two-wheelers from all over have been rolling into Ruidoso every Fall for 24 years now, and they will be rumbling through the village again starting Wednesday. It's the American Motorcyclist Association's Western National Road Riding Convention, but hereabouts we call it the Golden Aspen Rally. Thousands of motorcycles — some 4,000 were counted on the peak Saturday last year — will be filling parking lots at motels and the Civic Events Center.

Along about now, inevitably, some people begin to worry along stereotypical lines: "Hogs" and outlaw riders and frightening images right out of an early Marlon Brando movie. Worries, too, along opposite lines — will too much law enforcement, in the interest of safety, interfere with the visitors' good time?

Perhaps those worries are legitimate, considering the rash of incidents a year ago — mostly alcohol related.

The sheriff will mount some road blocks in the county. Ruidoso's police, says the chief, will enforce the law "as usual." That's good common sense in the interest of handling any large crowd.

The rule, of course, is for residents and visitors alike to honor and respect each other. Considerate guests are always the best kind...and most welcomed.

An earnest letter to a new president

SANTA FE—The letter sits in the archives of the Kennedy Presidential Library. On a windy point of Boston Harbor, it's a shard of New Mexico history oddly distant, but a clue to both our past and present.

Dated Nov. 15, 1960, personally typed on official stationery, "State of New Mexico, House of Representatives, Twenty-Fourth Legislature," it's from an eager job-seeker to newly elected President John Kennedy. "Needless to say," it begins, "I am very happy you were elected President. [and] I was very happy to be able to help in a small way."

"I am a native of New Mexico and have lived my entire life on a farm and ranch," the writer goes on, describing the large cattle operation he runs with his two brothers. But he is also a loyal Democrat, and an up-and-coming politician, a member of the New Mexico Legislature, "and am in line to be chairman of [the] Agriculture committee this year."

"I know you have a lot of excellent ideas for the farmer," he

tells Kennedy, advising him to steer a nice compromise course. "I hope we don't have to go as far to the left as Farmers Unions would want, or as far to the right as Farm Bureau, but can work out a kind of a middle of the road plan..."

In any case, he wants a job with the new administration. "I would like to offer my help in any way that I can." Filed under "patronage," there's no record whether JFK answered the request. It was signed, "Your Friend, Bruce King."

Looking back on more than three decades of New Mexico history, there is something touching about this long-forgotten letter from an earnest 36-year-old Bruce King at the start of his long career. One imagines a younger, thinner man in cowboy boots and western suit, bending at a typewriter in the old Capitol, artlessly typing over his mistakes—and urging, as always, the compromising middle way, getting along by going along, never too far to any side as he saw it, and never, ever, out in front.

King's relentless middle-ism became creed and habit of 12 years as governor and more than a decade in

the Legislature. Yet what seemed moderate in 1960 or 1970 was already sterile and irrelevant amid the state's growing problems by the late '70s. It erupted in the infamous 1980 prison riot, when King's regime was internationally exposed as so woeful. He left in 1982 amid a pall of petty corruption and incompetence, and came back to win in 1990 mostly by voter amnesia and feeble opposition supposedly a "new Bruce King," and New Mexicans as usual wanted to think well of this twanging figure so familiar, so unthreatening.

After four more years of the old rule, none could hide the substantive nakedness any longer. When Lt. Gov. Casey Luna ran a primary challenge, only Jim Baca's spoiler candidacy saved King from the ignominy of defeat. He held on too long.

Petulant that his last run is not the walk he thinks he deserves, the 1994 King hardly resembles the young rancher who wrote JFK in 1960. His campaign is littered with blunders. Ads attack Republican Gary Johnson, then give Johnson's phone number, actually helping the GOP. King stubbornly refuses to reach out to Luna and disidents. His suit to bar challenger Roberto Mondragon from the ballot was mean-spirited and Constitutionally shameful. His last-minute backing-out of a debate looked cowardly. Insulting running mate Patsy Madrid

with the sexist slur, he then further alienated Luna by giving Madrid a job Casey coveted. It spells disaster.

King's BLM land deal aside—multi-million profiteering at public expense huge to excuse—this basically decent man has overstayed his role. For his anachronism we'll pay. It may be four years of Johnson, exposed as a businessman of sharp practices. Maybe another wasteland, lame-duck term of King.

In either case, governance will be as brittle as that letter in the JFK Library. As Bruce King never seemed to learn, there is no easy way between today and tomorrow, just courage and vision called leadership—and yesterday's men need not apply.
