## Hotel project on tap

Dirt is expected to move by late fall on Ruidoso's long awaited convention hotel.

John Sherry, hired last July by R. D. Hubbard as project coordinator and manager of the future three-floor hotel, said he is putting the finishing touches on plans this week with architect Gary Lamb and Associates of Phoenix, Ariz.

"Right now, it's sitting at 152 rooms, a mixture of suites and standard guest rooms. Building materials will include local resources such as native rock," Sherry said.

The cost is "loosely estimated" at between \$10 million and \$15 million, depending on whether gambling is approved for resort communities this November by state voters.

"Plan B consists of a full blown resort with a casino, a pro shop, locker rooms, a grill, a beauty shop, a barber, a masseuse and a day spa where guests can get facials and a wrap," he said. "Plan A wouldn't include the casino, pro shop and such, but would still feature an atrium free-form pool that would give guests the feeling of swimming in a garden.

A large rock two-story fireplace will be the centerpiece of the lobby and there will be a lot of glass for viewing the mountains, he said.

Meeting space will be part of the floor plan.

## Shooting death investigated

A man identified by Ruidoso police as Michael H. Duffey, 44, died from an apparently self-inflicted gunshot wound about 9:30 p.m. Wednesday at his apartment at 706 White Mountain Drive in Ruidoso.

Chief Lanny Maddox said a .41 caliber Smith and Wesson magnum handgun was found between the victim's legs. Police said the shooting was witnessed by another individual and, according to the witness's statement, Duffey pointed the gun to his own head and pulled the trigger. The witness said the victim has been drinking heavily before the incident.

The police department's criminal investigation division is investigating, and an autopsy will be performed by the Office of the Medical Investigator in Albuquerque.

Wanda Shaw, who owns the apartment complex off White Mountain Drive, said the man had lived alone there for about one year.

## Solid waste under attack

Authority adds capacity

Garbage collection officials hope roll-off containers will curb many of Lincoln County's illegal dumping problems.

Members of the county Solid Waste Authority Monday approved purchasing three 20-cubic yard, four 30-cubic yard and six 40-cubic yard containers and the truck needed to collect refuse from them.

"Right now, contractors, who are abiding by the law, use a private service out of Alamogordo," said Wilton Howell, a county commissioner who serves as authority chairman. The group is a coalition of the county, and its five municipalities.

"That private service has to dump at our (regional) landfill (south of Alamogordo shared with the Otero County authority) at the higher non-member price," he said.

A joint meeting with the Otero

Solid Waste Authority is set for 6:30 p.m. Sept. 29 at the Ruidoso Civic Events Center.

"It's our feeling that the roll-offs will be a service to the contractor. They can rent one and take all of their construction waste there. We'll be compensated and it should be a money maker for the authority, yet less costly than the private service for the contractor."

Roll-off stations for the general public also are being considered, Howell said. They would provide easily accessible dump sites across the county for appliances, furniture and other items that now must be taken to the debris landfill in Capitan or to the transfer station on Gavilan Canyon Road.

The truck will cost \$27,000 from Ruidoso Ford/Mercury (pending inspection and acceptance by staff) and the containers will cost \$36,365 from Environmental Systems of Albuquerque.

The purchases will be financed, but, if money starts flowing at a better rate, will be paid off before the due date, said member Bill Schwettmann, a county commissioner.

The authority still is fighting messy dumpster sites. Director Joe Lewandowski has said many bins overflow within hours of being collected, because contractors or homeowners doing repairs drop large items in and around the containers. When residents and visitors drive by to leave garbage, there's no room and it spills out.

Recently approved rate increases by Ruidoso, the county, Ruidoso Downs and Capitan are designed to ease that situation by allowing the

## Harley 'flathead' notable at rally

Oldtime Harley enthusiasts know what's coming when they hear Ray Baker's flathead.

Baker is among the many local motorcyclists who look forward to Ruidoso's annual Golden Aspen Motorcycle Rally. But not many have bikes like his, especially with an old sidecar attached. It turns a lot of heads.

"You pick up the sound and you know it's an old one," says Baker, a resident of Capitan who owns an electrical shop in Ruidoso.

This is a 1942 Harley-Davidson, a bit modified but still recognizable as being among a model used by Army scouts in World War II.

The heavy duty fins allow it to idle longer. The shift is on the tank instead of the handlebar. It has a bobbed rear fender, called a "California Bob." It's heavy and it's rigid, and it takes plenty of "wrenching" (a biker term for mechanical tinkering).

"You can run over a dime and feel it," Baker relates.

The sidecar came off a 1948 Indian Chief. Baker's six-year-old son and four-year-old granddaughter delight in riding in it. The guy he bought it from said he used it to carry his 90-year-old grandmother.

The annual run is a chance for local bikers to see friends and family who return each year to join in the fun. Baker's eldest son turns up

from San Diego, where Baker himself lived until four years ago.

"This run is a big part of Ruidoso," Baker says, noting that it keeps local businesses busy during a relatively slower time of the year.

This is a great place for a run, too.

"You've got a lot of country here to look at," and the history is fascinating, Baker says.

If you're fascinated by unique motorcycles, look for Baker's in Saturday's parade. And if you happen to see a screw drop off his bike due to the heavy vibrations of this big machine, kindly pick it up and return it to him. Those old parts aren't so easy to find anymore.

## County wants work-release halt

Upset by a series of escapes and how they were handled by staff of the Camp Sierra Blanca minimum security prison, Lincoln County Commissioners are demanding a work release program be stopped until security measures are reviewed.

"We are forwarding a resolution to the governor and the state corrections department to stop work release until they re-evaluate the system," Commission Chairman Monroy Montes said Tuesday. Commissioners approved the resolution during a special meeting called at the courthouse in Carrizozo earlier that day.

Problem cited included the method of classifying prisoners accepted at the camp that has al-

lowed criminals with convictions on crimes of violence, and the timing and type of notification of escapes to the sheriff's department and surrounding communities.

"I proposed and other commissioners agreed to also mention possible compensation to the county for the extraordinary hours required to try to find all these escapees," Montes said.

Commissioner Wilton Howell, who led criticism of camp policies and inmate management practices earlier in the year, strongly favored shutting down the program, Montes said. Commissioner L. Ray Nunley's primary concern was the safety of residents in the community.

An elderly resident of the historic Lincoln settlement was killed last month and one of the camp's escapees has been charged. David Michael Crawford was scheduled for a preliminary hearing last week in Roswell, but the case was transferred to district court to determine competency.

Montes said Sheriff James McSwane met with prison officials and representatives of other law enforcement agencies to discuss how notification and searches will be coordinated.

"He doesn't want to panic the population," Montes said.

## Minnesotans deliver warning on MRS

A van full of Minnesota residents who say they have seen first hand the dangers of nuclear reactors and spent nuclear fuel rods brought their message to the MRS Regional Information Committee Wednesday.

They were joined in warnings by Mary Olson of the Nuclear Information and Resource Service, based in Washington D.C. Delivering a status report from the state level was Chris Wentz, coordinator of New Mexico's radioactive waste task force, and State Rep. H. John Underwood (D-Ruidoso).

The regional committee is comprised of elected officials from counties and cities in an area potentially affected by a Mescalero Apache tribal council plan to store high level radioactive waste on the reservation.

Native American Joseph Campbell and Schean Bjoralt told of a radioactive steam leak from Prairie Island, the site of two reactors run by Northern States Power, and fears of higher cancer rates and other impacts.

"Joe Campbell and I drove in a van, stopping at communities to let

them know that it is time to network," Bjoralt said. "There's also opportunity to network with (Underwood), who serves on the National Conference of State Legislators."

The committee watched a 15 minute video of the Prairie Island situation. Recently, the State Legislature in Minnesota granted the right to some dry cask storage at the reactors, because the utility was running out of wet storage space. The same type of dry cask method is being proposed at Mescalero, where 33 utilities anticipate

sending their nuclear spent fuel rods by railroad in large steel containers.

The video urged that the nuclear power industry be required to provide storage space on site and to shut down, if no more storage is available, instead of asking other parts of the country to accommodate them.

"Storage of nuclear waste only accommodates the nuclear industry to continue making it, while profiting at our expense and the expense of future generations," said one commentator in the film. "The

casks are designed to continue our nuclear dependence."

Alternative sources of renewable energy should be encouraged, those interviewed on the video said.

"Wind and solar research has never been subsidized like nuclear power," the commentator noted. "The taxpayers paid the bill and the industry had no liability."

Olson, who called herself an educator on radioactive waste issues, read a letter she wrote refuting statements she said were over

simplification or misrepresentations about the dangers of exposure to radioactive fuel.

"Specifically, citizens have reported to me that a presenter stated that if a cask containing irradiated nuclear fuel were to fully break open and the contents were to fall on the ground, there would be no release of radioactivity, except to the immediate area," she said. "Unshielded irradiated (spent) fuel presents a lethal hazard to anyone in the vicinity."

She said immediate results would be a rise in radiation levels to a lethal dose in seconds.

"Any gas inside the sealed cask will be released, carrying radiation with it." She examined several other scenarios, including that some radioactive waste could end up being buried in trenches, "even though they are laced with plutonium and other materials that pose a threat to human health and the environment for hundreds of years, and have been shown to leach from existing sites, such as ...Maxey Flats, Kentucky."

Wentz said New Mexico has not changed its adamant opposition to a private nuclear storage facility in New Mexico.

"(The fuel waste is) from commercial plants, which is different from WIPP (Waste Isolation Pilot Project), which was developed to handle the waste from national defense," he said.

New Mexico should not be forced to take the waste produced by other states that benefited from the nuclear power or to suffer possible adverse impacts on the health of its citizens, on the environment and on the economy.

"We feel we've done our share," he added.

Some people accuse Gov. Bruce King of being hypocritical by opposing nuclear storage and economic opportunity for the Mescalero when WIPP already is in place.

"Most people don't realize that it's taken 18 years and two lawsuits over the state's agreement with the U.S. Department of Energy (DOE) and WIPP still isn't operational," he said.

Wentz pointed to section of the Nuclear Waste Policy Act that states reactors must provide interim storage at the site and requiring federal control.

"I think it's clear they have responsibility to manage the waste on site" and for the federal government to remain in control, he said. "The primary reason is national defense and security."

The Western Governors' Association also sent a resolution urging the DOE to develop regulations for assistance to states to prepare for shipments of waste, a provision in the Act.

The association sent a draft of suggested rules.

Underwood reported that what has been called the MRS for monitored nuclear storage, a federally-managed storage program, soon will be called ISSI for Independent Storage Site Issue, because it has moved into the private sector.

After touring one of Northern States plants and seeing a storage pool, his opinion remains the same, Underwood said.

He noted that the Minnesota legislature approved limited dry cask storage after hearing testimony from Mescalero representatives that the tribal council's project with 33 utilities is feasible and will be completed.

"It would have been better if they had contacted us and asked," he said. "The governor and legislature remain against the concept. We don't want to be a nuclear storage ground for other states."

Attorney General Tom Udall has been asked to draft an opinion on the issue. Underwood said he and State Senator Thomas Rutherford (D-Bernalillo) will co-sponsor a bill in January designed to make it as difficult as possible for the utilities to transport radioactive material across state boundaries.

"It all will be fought out in the Supreme Court someday," he said. Once the Mescalero submit an application, the state, counties, cities and individuals can become intervenors in the case.

"Minnesota said the nuclear energy industry will shut down in 10 years if no storage outside the state is found," Underwood said. "That says to me they don't consider it

purchase of backup equipment.

Board members postponed action on a proposed indemnification agreement and liability policy pending a check with the authority's insurance carrier.

Although the board gave Lewandowski the nod to advertise for bids on a sideloader truck and 400 90-gallon carts, members emphasized that the equipment purchase will not be approved unless the budget looks good.

The truck was included in the budget for this year, but revenues have not kept up, because of more than \$60,000 in bills 30 days or more overdue, the drain from free services and from heavier demand on regular services.

"I don't see us buying the sideloader truck, if (Lewandowski) doesn't have a good financial position to show," Howell said. The carts will be used in Capitan, where the board of trustees recently approved raising rates from \$7.50 to \$9.25 a month to cover the cost of providing carts at each home. The total new anticipated revenue from the increase is \$7,725.

Lewandowski said the sideloader would be a backup to other trucks.

"If one goes down for repairs, we have to wait until another completes its route," he said. "As we saw this summer, this can cause some delays in service. It also makes it very difficult to provide proper maintenance."

"When the board hired Joe, he made the statement that we had sufficient employees and equipment," Howell said. "All we've done since is hear that we need more. That's what the rate increase is all about."

Board members agreed that the next meeting would focus on setting goals for the authority.

Member Jerry Shaw, mayor of Ruidoso, said she would like to see a uniform rate and treatment of communities involved in the authority. As it stands, each entity sets their own rates and type of service.

That's the way the different members wanted it, Lewandowski reminded her. "I don't do special services for Capitan like I do in Ruidoso, but I will be doing polycarts door to door," he said.

"I don't think any one of the entities wants to change their type of services," Howell said.

"Nothing is impossible," Shaw said, referring to a possible uniform rate.

A different approach previously suggested by Howell would be to form a sanitation district with an autonomous elected board.

Shaw said when she read about the county looking into a sanitation district, "my concern was does the county make that decision for me."

Attorney J. Robert Beauvais said the authority, which was formed under a series of joint power agreements, has no power.

"The initiative lies with the government entities," he said. With an elected seven-member sanitation board, Ruidoso probably would end up with three to four members, he estimated.

Howell said the county will pursue using jail trustys to pick up garbage on the ground around dumpster sites, with the blessing of the authority.

## New road department system put in motion by commission

Trying out a new system devised by Lincoln County Road Manager Bill Cupit, county commissioners Tuesday designated \$400,000 to purchase six blading machines the road department has been using under a lease-purchase agreement.

The purchase should be accomplished by Oct. 1. The county will go out for bids to sell the machines on Oct. 3. The money collected in excess of the county's purchase price then will be used toward the price of newer equipment.

The system worked out by Cupit has been verbally approved by the Department of Finance and Administration (DFA).

"Our DFA representative said we were being overly cautious to wait for a letter," said Commission Chairman Monroy Montes. "They assured our attorney it was all right to move ahead and that a letter would be sent to that effect."

## Commissioners accept dollars to complete center purchase

Although the former Glencoe horse sales barn has been used for the past few months as a rural events center, the deal wasn't official until Tuesday.

Lincoln County Commissioners accepted \$290,000 from the state for the purchase of the complex, which was financed by the State Legislature for \$250,000, plus \$40,000 for renovations and first year operations.

A condition of purchase will be that roof leaks or any other conditions be corrected to ensure that the building on U.S. 70 is in the condition represented by the sellers.

## Schwettmann will be county rep at association meeting

Lincoln Commissioner Bill Schwettmann was appointed Tuesday to represent the county at the Strategic Planning session of the Association of Counties today through Saturday.

"He will hand carry our dues (\$12,500) there with him," said Commission Chairman Monroy Montes. "That was a condition for him being able to attend and this is where they set their legislative goals for the next session. It's important to have input."

Two years ago, the commission dropped its membership in the association in a dispute over what county officials perceived as a lack of representation of the problems facing more rural counties. Commissioners agreed to rejoin at the urging of elected officials in other counties, their own county staff and after some conciliatory approaches by the association executive director.

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"That's one of my major concerns," McSwane said Wednesday. "By notifying everyone, there is an added element of danger to officers who are out searching for escapees, because people will be defending their property and may over-react. I also wanted to make sure that my department was not saddled with the job of notifying, because it would bleed off personnel from the search effort."

McSwane said he met with state police and prison representatives to discuss procedures for notification, which will be handled by the camp and state and will include immediate notice to his department and state police, television and radio.

Another problem is the overload on his department's telephone lines that occurred during the last escape with a flood of calls from concerned people.

"It interfered with essential communication relative to the search," he said.

On the other end of the situation, camp warden Sandra McFadin discussed reforms in her operation, including the possibility of electronic or physical monitoring of the camp perimeter. That could mean an electrified fence.

"I don't believe that would compromise the nature of a minimum security prison," McSwane said. "And it could be done inexpensively with inmate labor."

# Chamber feels new theme fits the community

And the 14 Chamber of Commerce board members meeting Tuesday felt the line was good enough to become their official theme.

Executive Director Joan Bailey introduced the theme, and stressed the need for community cooperation and involvement in chamber activities.

"Many people simply are not aware of all the things that the chamber does," said Bailey, "We would really like people to become helpers and not complainers."

Part of the plan designed to increase community spirit is the "Chamber is Us" program, enabling participants to see the inner workings of the organization.

According to co-ordinator James Hobbs, the program is designed with several objectives in mind.

"If we can get volunteers from business members it will not only help solidify membership, but will improve communications and give a better concept of the inner workings of the chamber. We really are

attempting to change misconceptions and establish dialogue and understanding."

He said last year's drive netted about 100 new chamber members. "And we hope with our latest campaign to do even better."

In other business, the board heard a request from Cindy Lynch on behalf of the Ruidoso Board of Realtors concerning a statewide realtors convention scheduled for October of 1995. Lynch received permission to use the chamber's bulk mailing rate and 1-800 number when contacting conventioners. She also requested assistance with tracking inquiries, a visitor's center function.

Lynch's request stimulated discussion about what effect a Convention Visitors Bureau (CVB) would have on the visitor center presently located at the chamber offices.

Bailey told Lynch, "You may be addressing an entity that may not be here in a couple of months, but we will fight tooth and toenail to keep the visitors center here."

A CVB ad hoc committee has been studying the feasibility of placing a center on U. S. Highway 70.

## Mechem-Cree Meadows traffic signal approved

After counting traffic at the intersection of Mechem Drive (State Highway 48) and Cree Meadows Drive during peak season this year, state officials finally have agreed to install a traffic light.

But the project will be part of a larger highway reconstruction program still far away from a starting date.

Gary Jackson, Ruidoso village manager, told councilors last week that a letter has been sent to District Traffic Engineer Tim Basler of the State Highway and Transportation Department requesting a temporary light.

Part of the signal project would

include closely the portion of County Club Drive that now exits just yards away from the Mechem/Cree intersection.

In the letter, assistant village manager Alan Briley wrote that he would like a letter from the department outlining the steps the village needs to take to secure the temporary signal and for closure of the road.

Residents will get another look at how the highway reconstruction design is shaping up during an information session scheduled by the state from 6:30 p.m. to 8:30 p.m. Sept. 28 at the civic events center.

### The Pinon Jays Sing Songs of September

For the first time that I can remember, bands of Pinon Jays have been flying in and feeding right in the yard, calling out their songs of September.

Some of them come right up to the doorstep and I have the rare opportunity to see these silken dark blue New Mexico favorite bird friends up close, hear their different calls more clearly.

I know of no other bird that has so many different calls, or songs.

While they fly in bands of ten or 20 over the pinon trees they sing out a chorus that is the very voice of happiness. They seem to say, "Joy, Joy, Joy, Jesay, Jesay."

About eleven o'clock, a lone Pinon Jay flew into the cedar tree near the gate, and then down to the bird feed on the ground and began feeding and calling out "Kiwee-Waa, Kiwee-

Waa." Then after a little while, he would fly back up into the tree and call out "Wee-ha-ha, Wee-ha-haa." In about fifteen minutes, here came one of two jays and then a dozen or more, until about fifty were in the pathway to the door feeding, while up in their tree, two or three stayed, calling out "Kaa-Waa-Kaa-Waa, Koo-Waa."

Then these would fly down and a few others would fly up into the tree and begin calling out.

What message were these in the tree calling out? Were they saying that the coast was clear, or that there was food over here?

After a while, one by one they all flew back up in the tree.

Then the whole band, in an instant, flew out of the tree in a sudden rush all close together with a whirring roar rapidly-beating wings, and went on their way rejoicing up toward the cedars and pinons on the hill, leaving you with the hope that they will be back again tomorrow.

Fifty or so years ago and beyond, cowboy songs were popular on records and among cowboys and dudes alike, in singing. Here the last few years at Western gatherings throughout the West, the cowboy poet has become increasingly popular.

My neighbor just up the way at the Canyon Trading Post, Bob Lambert, was a cowboy and ranchman since his boyhood and youth in Arizona.

He had long experience as a chuckwagon cook and still today he is a first-class skillet-wrangler.

Through the years, he has often invited me to dinner and has accused me of coming by purposely at dinner time.

"I was gonna ask you to stay and eat, but I ain't gonna do it. 'Cause all we got to eat is meat, and you can't chew it."

So here Bob Lambert made up a cowboy poem, partly by accident, but not too bad after all.

# No excuses left for not voting

Registered voters have no excuse for not casting their ballots in the November general election, says Lincoln County Clerk Martha Proctor.

The state has done everything short of carrying the ballots to and from a person's house to ensure that the process is accessible to all. Voting can be accomplished by mail or by stopping in before the election.

"Absentee ballots may be requested right now and issued any

time after Sept. 29," Proctor said. "They may be mailed to voters Sept. 29 through Nov. 3. The ballots must be returned to my office (in the county courthouse in Carrizozo) by 7 p.m. on Nov. 8, election day."

Absentee ballots may be requested by calling the clerk's office at (505) 648-2394 or by sending a letter or card to: Lincoln County Clerk, P.O. Box 338, Carrizozo, N.M. 88301, or by arranging for a

friend or relative to request one for the voter.

The application must be signed by the voter, but does not have to be witnessed or notarized. Absentee ballots will be mailed only to the applicant and they cannot be hand carried to the voter. However, any person may bring the ballot back to the clerk's office after it is voted. The ballot also does need not be witnessed or notarized.

Early absentee voting in person will begin Sept. 29. The process is

open to any registered voter by coming to the county clerk's office between 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. The courthouse will be closed Oct. 10 for a holiday. The office will be open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Saturday, Nov. 5 to allow early absentee voting in person.

Voter registration for the general election will close Oct. 11. To register, stop at the clerk's office before 5 p.m. that day and also take advantage of the early-absentee system, Proctor said.

# It's Warriors vs. Rams in crucial test—for both

## Question: Can Ruidoso stop that Portales Veer?

The Ruidoso Warrior football team, fresh off a big homecoming win against Tularosa last week, will travel to Portales Friday for a meeting with the Rams. Game time is 7:30 p.m. at ENMU's Greyhound Stadium.

Ruidoso, 2-2 so far, and Portales, 1-3, are at a similar juncture in the current season. Both schools have played tough teams in pre-district play, and both are coming off needed wins.

Portales got smashed by Clovis on opening weekend and nipped by Muleshoe 25-19 during week two. Their third game saw Friona come out victorious.

The Rams finally got into the winner's circle last week with a 30-point pounding of Albuquerque St. Pius.

The Warriors have one more victory than Portales, but like the Rams, have played some pretty good football teams.

Ruidoso owns wins over AAAA Anthony Gadsden and AA power Tularosa. Artesia, probably the state's best football team in any class, and Las Vegas Robertson have beaten the Warriors.

Ruidoso shocked Tularosa last week by adapting the same offense that befuddled Portales in their loss to Muleshoe. The Warriors lined up three receivers, stacked behind each other, on one side of the formation and two receivers on the other side.

The result in both cases was a confused defense and offenses that moved the football with relative ease.

Against Portales, the Mules trailed 19-0 at halftime and came out in the second half to score 25 unanswered points with the strange and innovative variation of the run-and-shoot.

Against Tularosa, Ruidoso ran and passed its way to the first touchdown of the game using the formation, and the Wildcats never came close to stopping it. Only Warrior turnovers kept the 19-6 score from being worse.

Portales brings its usual Veer option with a touch of the Wing-T to Friday's game. In the Veer, the dive play was the primary form of attack, but the quarterback also had the option of running or pitching the ball.

The Warriors never have done a very good job of stopping the Veer. Last year, the Rams ran over the Warriors, and gave the team its worst beating of the season.

The Wing-T is an offense that the Warrior defense has seen a lot more of, and performed fairly well against. Tularosa ran it last week and moved the football, but didn't score with it.

The Wing-T has been in the Warriors' stable since Cooper Henderson's arrival here ten years

ago. The locals shelved the offense with the arrival of new coach Les Carter, who has demonstrated he is not afraid to tinker with the engine, if it's not running just right.

During pre-season, the Warriors worked on an option attack, but fans have seen just a sprinkling of that offense. In fact, the Warriors have been pretty plain vanilla until last week's explosion with the Run-and-Shoot.

Realistically, the Run-and-Shoot is a perfect offense for the Warriors, because the team's best athletes are receivers. The Warrior line has been improving by leaps and bounds, giving John Echols time to throw the football to his talented stable of pass-catchers.

Plus, Artesia runs the "shoot", and have you seen anyone stop them lately?

Portales has had plenty of experience trying to figure out how to accomplish that task. The Rams are perennial third-place finishers in District 4-AAA to the Bulldogs and to Lovington. But they have had some success in that league also.

It was Portales that beat Ruidoso in the Warriors' last trip to the big dance in 1988. Bobby Crane, the Rams head coach that year, has rejoined the team this season as defensive coordinator. That change was a good one. Crane is a very talented football coach, who is great with kids and X's and O's.

The former Head-Man-turned-Athletic Director-turned-Defensive Coordinator was very complimentary of this year's Warrior squad.

"Ruidoso is very diversified and that is kind of unusual for a high school team. They have a good spread passing game, and they have a very good power running game," said Crane.

"(John Echols) is a very good quarterback. He throws the fade routes real well and seems to make the right decisions. The linebacker (Rex Comanche) also plays very well on both sides of the ball," Crane said.

The Rams seem to have gone back to the basics, working on execution and ball control of late. The early season saw Portales squander chances with poor execution and penalties at inopportune times.

That was not the case last week against St. Pius. Portales looked very good, while ripping the Spartan defense.

Friday's game should be a good one, a typical Portales-Ruidoso clash. For the Warriors to win, Ruidoso must score a lot of points. The Rams, on the other hand, would prefer to see a much lower scoring game.

Both teams are at a pivotal part of the season. A win Friday could mean a successful year. A loss may mean a long season, as both teams head into District play in a couple of weeks.

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# Lower property taxes may be possible

A \$3 million jump in taxable residential property values in Ruidoso may translate to lower property taxes for many village residents, if government budgets stay steady.

The millage necessary to cover the 11 tax levies paid by village residents (at current budget figures) dropped from 40.809 mills in 1993 to 38.821 this year.

Overall, Lincoln County tax rates dropped by two mills, said Doug Whittaker, chief deputy county assessor. One mill equals \$1 per \$1,000 of taxable property value, which is based on one-third of market value after deductions.

Translated to dollars, with a house worth about \$90,000, using one-third taxable value of \$30,000 after deductions, a residential property owner in Ruidoso would pay \$1,224.27 in tax.

Hondo Valley property owners will see the biggest jump in their rates, because of school debt service, which went from 6.7 mills in 1992 to zero in 1993 and back to 4.5 mills this year, Whittaker said.

The taxable value of county property climbed \$5.5 million over 1993 to hit \$279 million. That's good for a non-reappraisal year, Whittaker said. A massive reappraisal in the county from 1991-92 pushed values up \$30 million. Last year the increase was \$3.3 million.

Non-residential values, which includes commercial property and vacant lots, decreased slightly in the Ruidoso tax district to \$35,769,915, but tax rates still dropped by about two mills to 42.061 mills, due to the cumulative effect of reductions in state debt service, municipal, and school district rates.

Under the new rates, a Ruidoso residential property owner would pay 1.2 mills for state debt service compared to 1.696 mills last year.

\$,678 mills for county operations and projects compared to 6.38 mills in 1993; 15.686 mills for municipal operational and debt service compared to 15.605 mills; and 9.111 mills for school operational, debt service and capital improvement compared to 11.264 mills the previous year.

The total millage tab was placed at 40.809 mills for Ruidoso residential property owners and 44.240 for nonresidential in Ruidoso. That figure also includes levies for the Lincoln County Medical Center, the Carrizozo Health Center, the Chaves Soil and Water Conservation District and the branch college of Eastern New Mexico University in Ruidoso.

By Order of the United States District Court for the Southern District of Alabama, a class action has been conditionally certified for settlement purposes on behalf of Settlement Class Members (as defined below) who may now or later have claims against Ciba-Geigy Corporation arising out of work-related exposure to Galecron®. On January 30, 1995, a fairness hearing will be held at the Courthouse, United States District Court, Southern District of Alabama, 113 St. Joseph St., Mobile, Alabama, 36602, at 9:00 a.m. Central Time, so the Court can determine if the class action should be finally certified and if the Settlement summarized in the Notice should be approved as fair, reasonable and adequate. This hearing may be continued without further notice.

**I. DEFINITION OF CLASS**

Under the Settlement, Galecron® is defined as chlordaneform or any chlordaneform-containing product, either manufactured, formulated, packaged, distributed or sold by or on behalf of Ciba-Geigy Corporation or related parties, regardless of the trade name of the product, or any metabolite of Galecron®, including the substance known as 4-COT or 5-CAT.

The Settlement Class is defined as:

- All persons who fall into one of the following categories, and who reside in the United States as of the date of filing of the Class Action Complaint, who have been exposed in the United States to Galecron® ("Exposed Persons")
  - Plant Workers:** An individual (whether or not employed by Ciba-Geigy Corporation) who in the course of his or her employment at Ciba-Geigy Corporation's St. Gabriel, Louisiana or Melrost, Alabama sites, was exposed to Galecron®, including, without limitation, individuals who worked in manufacturing, formulating or packaging Galecron® or in the waste disposal of Galecron®, or worked in the construction, demolition or maintenance of any facilities used for the foregoing activities at such St. Gabriel, Louisiana or Melrost, Alabama sites; or
  - Formulator:** An individual (whether or not employed by Ciba-Geigy Corporation) who in the course of his or her employment was exposed to Galecron® while at a plant or site which was involved in mixing, blending, packaging, handling or otherwise formulating pesticides which contained, in whole or in part, Galecron®; or
  - Applicator:** An individual (whether or not employed by Ciba-Geigy Corporation) who in the course of his or her employment, was exposed to Galecron® while involved in the application of pesticides which contained, in whole or in part, Galecron®, including, without limitation, aerial and hand applications, spraying, mixing, blending, packaging and other individuals who handled such pesticides prior to or during the application process; and
  - Other Covered Workers:** An individual (whether or not employed by Ciba-Geigy Corporation) who in the course of his or her employment was exposed to Galecron® at the Clean Land, Air, Water Corporation or Environmental Purification Advancement, Inc. disposal sites located near Bayou St. John, Louisiana at Bayou, Inc. in Deer Park, Texas; or in a testing or research laboratory, whether or not owned by Ciba-Geigy Corporation; or
- The spouse, parent, child or other relative of the Exposed Person described above.

(Collectively "Settlement Class Members") Note: If you are an Exposed Person, you are a Settlement Class Member whether or not you have been diagnosed with bladder cancer, prostate cancer, or other relatives who are Settlement Class Members but for whom there is no pending or filed lawsuit arising from an Exposed Person's exposure.

**Exclusion:** (Galecron® was registered for use from 1958-1989. Some Exposed Persons may have been exposed before or after these dates.)

**II. IMPORTANT MEDICAL NOTICE To Plant Workers, Formulators, Applicators and Other Covered Workers (as defined above):**

You may have an increased risk of developing bladder cancer if you had on-the-job exposure to Galecron®. Workers exposed to Galecron® should participate in a medical monitoring program because early detection of bladder cancer can result in more effective treatment. As part of the Settlement, Ciba-Geigy has agreed to establish a medical monitoring program for the detection of bladder cancer for those individuals who do not exclude themselves from the lawsuit. Within six months, this program should be available free of charge to all Exposed Persons who do not exclude themselves from the lawsuit.

**III. BRIEF SUMMARY OF LITIGATION**

On February 8, 1994, a class action lawsuit was filed against defendant, Ciba-Geigy Corporation ("Ciba-Geigy"), in the Alabama State Court, which lawsuit was later removed to the United States District Court for the Southern District of Alabama. The Complaint, as amended, alleges that the Settlement Class as defined above is entitled to damages for medical monitoring and other compensation as a result of Exposed Persons' exposure to Galecron®.

Ciba-Geigy has filed an Answer denying all essential allegations of the Complaint, and asserting affirmative legal defenses. The Court has decided that the case can proceed as a class action for purposes of settlement only. This does not mean that the Class Representatives would have been successful had the case gone to trial. The Court has made no such determination, and the proposed Settlement is not to be construed as an expression of any opinion by the Court as to the merits of any of the claims asserted against Ciba-Geigy.

**IV. PROPOSED SETTLEMENT**

A Settlement has been entered into between the Class Representatives, Class Counsel and Ciba-Geigy, which will resolve all past, present and future claims against Ciba-Geigy arising out of Exposed Persons' exposure to Galecron®. The Settlement provides for the establishment by Ciba-Geigy of two funds to provide medical benefits and compensation to Exposed Persons or their legal representatives.

(1) **The Medical Monitoring and Treatment Fund ("The MMT Fund").** If the Settlement is approved, Ciba-Geigy will make an initial deposit of \$5,000,000 into the MMT Fund, and will thereafter make additional deposits on an as-needed basis. There is no limit to the amount of money Ciba-Geigy can be required to contribute over the life of this Fund.

The MMT Fund will pay for a medical monitoring program designed to detect at an early stage the form of bladder cancer alleged to be associated with Galecron®; specifically, primary urothelial carcinoma of the urinary collecting system, i.e., renal pelvis, ureter, bladder and urethra. The MMT Fund also will pay for all medically necessary treatment not paid for by Medicare or Medicaid if the Exposed Person has been or in the future is diagnosed with such bladder cancer.

The MMT Fund will pay for medical monitoring to Exposed Persons for a period of 20 years, and will pay for medical treatment until one full year passes with no claims for treatment being filed but in no event less than 20 years. Ciba-Geigy will have no obligation to continue the medical monitoring and treatment program if the Settlement is not approved. Only Exposed Persons, i.e., eligible Plant Workers, Formulators, Applicators and Other Covered Workers, as defined in this Notice, will be entitled to medical monitoring and treatment.

(2) **The Disease Compensation and Administration Fund ("The DCA Fund").** If the Settlement is approved, Ciba-Geigy will also make an initial deposit of \$30,000,000 into the DCA Fund. In addition to medical treatment paid for by the MMT Fund, the DCA Fund will make cash payments of up to \$40,000, as set forth in more detail below, on behalf of an Exposed Person who, after exposure to Galecron®, has developed or in the future develops (in the form of bladder cancer alleged to be associated with Galecron®, specifically primary urothelial carcinoma of the urinary collecting system, i.e., renal pelvis, ureter, bladder and urethra). Cash payments will vary depending upon the Exposed Person's age, smoking status and participation in the health screening program. For Exposed Persons who are non-smokers and participate in the health screening program, the cash payment will be as follows: (a) \$10,000 in the event of treatment involving an invasive procedure; (b) a one-time payment regardless of the number of procedures; (c) up to \$150,000 in the event of a radical prostatectomy (Males removed) with diagnosis of the urinary tract which is cancerous; (d) a one-time payment of \$10,000 if the Exposed Person is 65 years of age or older and (e) up to \$250,000 in the event an Exposed Person's death is found to be caused by bladder cancer.

**V. CLASS REPRESENTATIVES AND CLASS COUNSEL**

The Court has designated the following Settlement Class Members, Russell W. Price, Leslie E. Hoven, Grady W. Brown, Jeanne Rupp Brown, Jack Harley Woodward, Alta Woodward, Joe H. Bowman and Martha Annie Bowman, as class representatives to represent all Settlement Class Members. The Court has also designated as Class Counsel the following individuals: Timothy E. Eble, J. Cecil Gardner, Joseph J. McKernan, S.C. Middlebrooks III, Charles W. Patrick, Jr., and Patrick W. Pendley.

The Class Representatives and Class Counsel believe that the proposed Settlement is fair, reasonable and adequate. Class Representatives and Class Counsel have entered into the proposed Settlement after weighing the substantial benefits against the probabilities of success or failure, and the long delays that would be likely if the case proceeded to trial.

There has been no agreement between the parties regarding attorneys' fees. At the fairness hearing, Class Counsel will request the Court to award attorneys' fees and reimbursement of costs and expenses, to be paid from the DCA Fund. Class counsel will request a percentage fee award not to exceed 20% of the benefit conferred on the class, half of which will be requested to be paid over a 4-year period while legal work continues.

**VI. RIGHTS AND OPTIONS OF SETTLEMENT CLASS MEMBERS**

If you are a Settlement Class Member, you have the following options:

- You may do nothing and remain a Settlement Class Member.** If you choose to take no action, your interests as a member of the Settlement Class will be represented by the Class Representatives and Class Counsel, at no cost to you individually. You will be bound by any judgment or final disposition of the litigation, and may participate in the benefits available as a member of the Settlement Class. It is important, however, to fill out the REQUEST FOR INFORMATION FORM in order to learn how to receive benefits.

## Water worries mount in Capitan

Residents who illegally subdivide property may end up high and dry, the Capitan Board of Trustees have warned.

They issued that caution and raised garbage collection rates during their regular meeting earlier this month.

The prospect of the village being overwhelmed with water demands has surfaced before. It popped up again, because of Randy White and his problems with a tract in Mesa Verde Two Subdivision. The land had been added to the village in 1982. Over the next 12 years and four owners, the property was divided into two, five-acre tracts.

One tract contained the original water tap, but White purchased the second tract. Village Attorney J. Robert Beauvais cited state law requiring that petitions to subdivide be submitted to a municipality's

planning and zoning board.

Beauvais said White also would come under the review of the newly formed Water Advisory Board, before returning to the trustees for final vote on water service.

Beauvais reminded the board that the village cannot set a precedent by providing service without process in view of the number of similar lots formed without following proper procedures.

Dr. Bernie Reimann warned that the village has exceeded its water rights allocation this year. He pointed out that the village has used 155 acre feet of water, but is entitled to only 139 acres feet. (One acre foot is equal to the amount of water it takes to cover one acre one foot deep.)

In two months, Capitan residents will be able to leave their garbage outside their homes for weekly pickup instead of walking or driving to dumpster.

But the extra service will cost an additional \$1.75 a month. Following a public hearing, the trustees approved a rate increase from \$7.50 to \$9.25 a month.

Along with the added service using polycarts at each home, the Capitan debris landfill will be open seven days a week free to residents to bring their yard waste and large items.

Commercial rates in the village will stay the same at \$29 a month.

## Wastewater 'too fresh'

It's not the most exciting need that exists with the Ruidoso village government, but its the most pressing one.

More than twice the water in the village's wastewater system shouldn't be there. This fresh water seeps into the system from natural streams, snow and rain. It adds up to a whopping 900,000 gallons each

day.

The water coming from the village's water users, which needs to be treated before it's sent back into the local river system, amounts to only 600,000 gallons per day.

Treatment of all that water costs a bundle of money, so when the system has to treat an extra 900,000 gallons that shouldn't be there, the costs run much higher.

It's not cheap to solve the prob-

lem, either. The village has 85 miles of main sewer lines, and many of these are old lines which need to be replaced to stop the "inflow and infiltration" (I&I), as it's technically called.

So the village is going to the state for help -- \$1.16 million worth, to be exact.

The state doles out millions each year to local governments. Local officials aren't sure how much will be available in this go-around, but if they get any money, the I&I problem is their top priority out of 20 needs on a preliminary list.

Village officials joined other local governments in making formal presentations to a state legislative committee Tuesday. A final decision won't come until early next year, when the legislature reconvenes.

This year the village received \$675,000 for improvements to an additional municipal water source, Grindstone Lake. Village officials are hopeful they'll get grant money again next year.

"We're making maximum local efforts to try to handle our own problems," so the state should see that the village is in need of help, says Village Manager Gary Jackson.

Jackson backed up his comments by providing the legislative committee with a chart comparing Ruidoso's bond debt to other New Mexico communities of similar population. Ruidoso had the highest debt of all the 22 towns listed, at \$17.5 million.

The town has some bonding capacity left, but "we're pretty well maxing that out," Jackson said.

Mayor Jerry Shaw has a personal desire to cover the village's swimming pool, but at this time that project is not on the list of capital improvement projects for state funding. Solving the I&I problem will remain the top priority, Shaw predicted.

### Rakocy's help to Parra culminates in local show

Rakocy helped set up a scholarship for Parra, and now, more than 20 years later, the artist is showing over 30 art works in oil, watercolor and drawing at the Bill Rakocy Southwestern Art and History Museum in Ruidoso. Rakocy calls them works done with a personal flair involving "magic realism," and Western impressionism.

The art and history museum is at 2808 Sudderth. Parra will be on hand to greet visitors from 1 p.m. to 3 p.m. on Sunday.

Born in the Copper Canyon near Creel, Chihuahua, Mexico, 42 years ago, Parra came from a large family of brothers and sisters. In order to gain a more productive livelihood his mechanic father moved the family to Juarez when Parra was a child.

Parra, along with all of the children, had to help support one another. Mario was enterprising and took to selling burritos on the streets of Juarez and El Paso.

While peddling his burritos one day he passed by an artist's studio, and peeked through a doorway where a man painted away at his easel. Parra was transfixed, and vowed that someday he too would paint in oils.

Parra completed school in Juarez and began to paint rapid canvases, sometimes doing a dozen

## The Light of Day

### Truly Bill & Hillary & Bruce & Alice?

SANTA FE—Four years ago, before Bruce King had declared for governor for a third term, Sam Thompson was searching for a way to raise money for scholarships to an Albuquerque pre-school.

Thompson, who had a daughter at the school, Las Puerta de Los Ninos, got King's phone number in Stanley, N.M., finding to her surprise that it was listed.

Thompson called the King home and reached Alice King, Thompson, who had never met the former Governor or First Lady, asked if the Kings could help with a champagne brunch designed to raise money for the scholarships.

Mrs. King agreed. Bruce and Alice served champagne at the brunch, and Sam Thompson (who got her normally-male nickname as a child) became one more vote for the state's most successful politician.

Thompson is now working in the King headquarters in Albuquerque. She got her job after serving as Patricia Madrid's campaign manager in Madrid's successful bid for the Democratic nomination for

lieutenant governor.

Thompson's experience with the Kings, when she was raising money for her pre-school, has been duplicated around the state many times over the years.

When Bill and Hillary Clinton went to Washington, D.C., pundits and politicians couldn't get enough of the power couple. Now, some two years later, an alarming number of people (from the Clinton's perspective) are tired of both of them.

The Kings, who have been around much longer, have fared better, even allowing for the disillusionment some high-profile groups in the state feel for the Governor.

And with environmentalists, pueblo leaders and others disappointed in King's performance over the last three years, the personal ties that the Kings have forged become increasingly important.

Much of the affection that many residents feel for the Kings can be credited to Alice King.

She doesn't always agree with the Governor, however. John McKean, King's press secretary, said that when Bruce King decided to reopen the question of Indian

gambling with Native American leaders, "There were people who advised him to do that—but Mrs. King was not one of them."

Mrs. King, according to McKean, "certainly is his (the Governor's) main policy adviser." However, he added, "The Governor is his own tactician."

When the Kings hold office hours in communities around the state, as they have some 20 times during the current term, the people who come to talk to Alice typically have problems centering on their families, according to McKean.

Mrs. King, who has worked on issues involving children and families, often gets questions from parents of children with some sort of disability. Many of these parents want to know what state services are available to them.

Other people ask about problems involving state benefits that they feel they deserve but are not getting. Mrs. King ordinarily doesn't hear from people who want state jobs, according to McKean. These folks tend to ask the Governor directly.

"Typically what happens is somebody comes in," McKean ex-

plains, and tells the Governor that he's on the state job list for, say, an electrician's job. "In all honesty," McKean says, "sometimes we will call over to an agency to make sure the person is at least considered."

If three candidates are equally well-qualified, McKean reports, King's office "would prefer" that the agency hires "the one the Governor knows."

When the office hours are over, according to McKean, the Governor's staff sometimes has to remind Cabinet members to follow up on constituent problems.

No one has to remind Mrs. King to follow up, however, McKean notes.

With Republican Gary Johnson, a politician of the television age, continuing to lead in the polls, New Mexico Democrats can only hope that Bruce and Alice King have made enough follow-up telephone calls—and attended enough champagne brunches—to offset the votes of people who are demanding a change in state government.

# Fete for Henrietta Wyeth Oct. 1

One of the century's great women painters, the head of America's only true dynasty of artists, is the focus of a book to be published this fall by Museum of New Mexico Press. "Henrietta Wyeth: The Artifice of Blue Light" features 60 color plates from a career that has spanned seven decades, and an essay on Wyeth's life and work by Pulitzer Prize winning author Paul Horgan.

The book will be released Oct. 1,

at a party hosted by the Hurd-La Rinconada Gallery in San Patricio, and Museum of New Mexico Press. The event will honor the painter for her contribution to American painting, and present the long-awaited book to Henrietta Wyeth and the world at large.

The daughter of legendary painter and illustrator N.C. Wyeth, Henrietta was born in Pennsylvania in 1907 at the family's Brandywine Farm. From earliest childhood, Henrietta was at her fa-

ther's side, learning about form, color, and light from the acknowledged American master. "To talk to father was being talked to by God," she once said. "By the age of sixteen I was hooked on painting." Henrietta's interest was well nurtured at Brandywine. Her father, his many students and visitors, and her brother Andrew created a milieu saturated with painters, their work and ideas.

Henrietta found a new source of inspiration in Boston, during her

formal schooling there. A lover of the ballet and theatre, she spent countless evenings attending such performances. The fanciful, transforming lighting of the stage expanded the young painter's artistic vision. In her painting, Henrietta would seek to capture "the artifice of blue light" that so vividly illuminated and metamorphized figures of the stage.

Henrietta continued her painting and study at Brandywine, where she met and eventually married a young student, the painter Peter Hurd. The couple remained at Brandywine for a decade. But Hurd, a native westerner, had deeply-planted roots in his homeland, and in 1939 he moved his young family to New Mexico's Hondo Valley.

In the village of San Patricio, far from the amenities and comforts of the east coast, Peter Hurd and Henrietta built Sentinel Ranch. Here they raised their children and here, over the next half-century, some of the great works of American realism were created by both husband and wife.

Henrietta Wyeth's still lifes and portraits today hang in New York's Metropolitan Museum, the Art Institute of Chicago, the Smithsonian Institution, and other great collections worldwide. Throughout a career that has spanned most of this century, Henrietta has remained true, both to her family's great tradition of realism, and to her own very personal vision.


