Society shelter open house Sunday



State may want our water for Texas, official warns

Hondo Basin residents may have to decide whether they want green grass or a drink of water, a local water official warned Tuesday.

Dub Williams of the Water Defense Association, which fought successfully to protect the water rights of families in the Hondo, Bonito and Ruidoso basins against Mescalero Apache claims, told Lincoln County Commissioners Tuesday that a new threat to rights exists.

If an underground connection between the Pecos Basin and the Hondo Basin (east of Ruidoso) can be established, the state could come into the area and buy up rights to help satisfy its water debt to Texas, he said.

But if a hydrological study showed no such connection existed, "we'd be in a position to say that our basin is closed and we don't owe Pecos anything," Williams said.

Sparked by two lawsuits, one requiring New Mexico to deliver 10,000 more acre feet of water each year to Texas through the Pecos River, the state is trying to inventory its water resources and establish legally recognized priority dates. The older the date, the better standing for claiming water when shortages occur.

Commission Chairman Monroy Montes, who operates orchards, received concurrence from the board to draft a letter to the State Engineer's office asking for proof

a connection between the basins.

"Water is a natural resource of the county and I'd like to ask at our next meeting for this commission to encumber money for a hydrological study or to go to the State Engineer's office to find an existing one," Montes said.

"I feel as strongly as you do about water," said Commissioner Stirling Spencer by conference call from Santa Fe. "I think we should go to the state and ask them to give us details as to the proof they have and what they plan to do. We can ask them to come back to the commission with answers," the rancher added.

From her office in Santa Fe, Rebecca Dempsey, special assistant attorney general for the State Engineer, said Thursday that she isn't aware the state has taken a position on the basin connection.

"I've only been here one year and I don't know if a study has been done," she said. "If there is a connection, they could claim people drawing from the Hondo affect the Pecos."

Before any action could occur, the state would have to prove the connection existed, Williams said.

The State Engineer's office has conducted a series of meetings with water rights owners over the last year to pinpoint priority dates on wells in the Hondo Basin.

Dempsey said the purpose for the latest meeting in Glencoe was to explain the procedure the state must follow to establish priority

dates for wells.

"We sent out 250 orders to show cause if they disagreed with the priority dates proposed by the state," she said. "They were the dates the wells were drilled or filed with the state. A lot didn't like the dates and asked me to come down and explain."

"People have the opportunity to respond and many contend we should apply the priority date of

their surface water rights."

The dates are based on when they began to draw from the stream and many go back more than 100 years.

She said the issue probably will be settled in a court and that some hydrological proof will have to be shown that the well is directly connected to the stream.

Williams said the urban development across New Mexico is

threatening rural water rights.

"I've always said if all those who produced the nation's food would take a vacation for a year, it would bring home the importance of agricultural use of water," he said.

"It's coming to the point where a decision will have to be made whether the urban guy or rural guy is going to use that water. The assault on water rights is occurring across the state."

Bears affected by hunt, drought

Black bears probably will continue to raid dumpsters and be sighted in town for at least another month, but most will be sows with their cubs.

More than 20 males already have been killed this hunting season, easy pickings for hunters as the animals rummage through garbage during a drought.

The drought could have another, long-term effect. Scarcity of food could put a hold on bears' reproduction for the year.

State Game Warden Ron Moore said bears normally seek out or create dens in November, but the timing depends on the weather and how much fat they have stored in their bodies.

"Who knows this year what they'll do," Moore said. "The forest didn't produce any berries or nuts. We had a late freeze in the spring and it killed everything that was growing. Then we had dry weather.

The rains came late.

"There are no acorns to speak of this year and that's a big part of the food source for this area. The bears in the wilderness are looking pretty thin."

Putting on fat hasn't been a problem for the bears that are being fed by humans and are raiding garbage bins. The practice also has been deadly for many males.

"The bears that have been harvested around town (outside of the city limits) are plenty fat, but their stomachs are full of trash," Moore said. "They're easy prey. In the last two years, the kill rate by hunters has been real high around town, because that's where the bears are. The hunters don't have to expend much effort. It's beyond me what pleasure they get from that."

Twenty-four bears were killed in the hunting district around Ruidoso last year. This year, 20 have been shot as of last week, Moore said.

Seldom are they killed for meat. Usually it's for their hides, he said.

"We've had a couple of big ones killed this year," he said. "Mature males normally weigh about 350 pounds and these were 500 pounds. They were extremely fat, because they could get to the trash or bait scraps easily and didn't have to work to get food."

Most of the male bears already have either retreated or been killed, he said.

"The only ones I'm getting calls on now are sows with cubs, because it's not legal to hunt them," he said. Black bears are not true hibernators.

"They can come out any time and can be disturbed," he said. "On the other hand, a hibernating squirrel's heartbeat goes down to nothing. You could play catch with them and they wouldn't wake up."


Bears try to find a den or dig one on a south-facing slope for sun. They usually create several dens for relocation if one is disturbed.

The lack of food could have

Local Cowboy Symposium honored by state; trail ride leads off this year's events Tuesday

Ray Reed, founder of the annual Lincoln County Cowboy Symposium, was excited to show off the latest in a string of recognitions given to his annual celebration of the cowboy, set this year for the weekend of Oct. 14-16.

The new plaque, naming the symposium as recipient of the 1994 Special Events Award, was presented to symposium president Frank Potter at the annual Governor's Council on Tourism last month in Farmington.

The Tourism Association of New Mexico also picked The Flying J Ranch as destination spot for the year.

"That means the Ruidoso area took two of the five awards presented," Potter said. "We're real proud. The symposium would be an impossible project if not for all of volunteer help and the cooperation of adjoining property owner."

The event grows each year with 22 chuckwagons now entered in the annual cooking over campfires competition.

Reed said the big trail ride Tues-

day is a special part of the program preceding the weekend.

"This is designed for someone

who really wants to be part of an experience that's becoming rare, a chance to ride the trail for three days and two nights over portions of the Mescalero Apache Reservation," Reed said.

"We're going to camp overnight near the Tunstall Monument (from the Lincoln County Wars). At night, there'll be steak dinners and entertainment around the campfire with Nathan Chee and his dancers, and some old-time entertainers like me, Randy 'Snuffy' Elmore, Rich O'Brien and Buck Reams.

"On Wednesday, we'll go over to Dub Williams' ranch. He's saved 20 calves for branding."

About 30 riders are signed up for the event. Six airplanes are flying in with riders from Alaska and four persons are coming from Florida.

The charge is \$250, which Reed said is half of what "some fancy" outfits in Colorado charge.

"If people knew the kind of scenery we're going to see and the quality of entertainment, they'd be standing in line," he said.

Errors found in county policy

Employees better take another look at the proposed revision of Lincoln County personnel policy. Errors discovered Tuesday nearly left two county managers without job protection.

Acceptance of the revised county personnel policy was postponed for the second time by the county commission, so questions about the job security issue could be resolved.

The first delay last month was to give employees an opportunity to review the draft. This time, County Road Manager Bill Cupit raised a question as to his status. He was listed as an unclassified position. That means he would serve at the will of the commission.

But Cupit pointed out his job was turned into a classified post by the three-man commission that served before the board was expanded to five representatives two years ago. Commissioners at that time, who were pleased with Cupit's work, wanted to insulate the road manager from political changes. Classified positions require that cause be shown before someone can be fired and set forth a specified number of vacation days, among other benefits.

"You can't arbitrarily declassify a position," County Attorney Alan Morel told commissioners.

"You were hired as unclassified?" Commissioner L. Ray Nunley asked Cupit.

"Yes, but the previous commission classified the position," Cupit said.

"Can you carry over a previous commission's commitment?" Commissioner Wilton Howell asked Morel.

"If he has accrued rights, a subsequent commission could not declassify and take those away," Morel said.

Chairman Monroy Montes noticed that Zia Seniors Citizens director Cheryl LaBelle also was listed as an unclassified position, when he thought she was classified.

County Manager Carolyn Cooney said she'd like to clear up those questions and other loose ends. She asked for a postponement.

Howell said employees with concerns should bring them up to Cooney to ensure they can be settled before the next commission meeting.

A sexual harassment section has been added to the proposed policy. County Clerk Martha Proctor said she could use some training on identifying what constitutes sexual harassment.

Morel said he could conduct a seminar on sexual harassment, identifying it and stopping it.

The policy encourages settling the situation at the lowest level by working it out between the two persons involved, but sets forth procedures for taking the issue higher.

Nunley said all elected officials should attend the seminar.

ramifications in the rate of reproduction two or three years down the line, Moore said.

"If the female goes into hibernation and her system tells her that she's not healthy enough to give birth and care for a cub, she'll absorb the embryo for food," he said. "So there will be no offspring. They will hold off until their systems tell them they are healthy enough to care for the cubs. It's nature's way of not wasting a year of breeding, because the cub couldn't survive without the mother. Cubs stay with their mothers for two years. We won't see the effect (of scarce food) for a couple of years. It's a pretty unique animal."

Other natural sources of food for the bears are insects, often found under rocks or in tree bark; some meat, but mostly carrion; grass and plant material; and the red fruit from prickly pear cacti.

"I'm still getting calls from people upset about their trash being scattered, who want a bear moved," Moore said. "But I'm not about to move a bear over trash problems."

Moore said he's been in contact with other areas and "everywhere there's bears, the biggest problem

is people feeding them. It's not unique here. I guess I'll never get people to stop feeding them, but locks on trash container lids would help."

The Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority, which collects garbage in Ruidoso, already has put locks on some containers in heavy bear areas, but the director has said that most of the units are not designed for self-locking devices. Until the authority can afford to buy new bear-proof model dumpster, the problem will continue.

In recent bear incidents, the Ruidoso Police dispatcher listed:

—a call at 4:02 p.m., Sept. 30 that two men in an early model pickup were trying to shoot a bear at a dumpster on Perk Canyon Drive.

—a call at 8:53 a.m. Oct. 2, about someone possibly hunting in the city limits with dogs on University Street.

—a call at 4:36 p.m., Oct. 3, reporting that children were playing with a bear on Carter Lane, but by the time a police officer arrived, the bear and children were gone.

—a call at 1:47 p.m., Oct. 6 advising that a bear was in the front yard of a home at Pine Street and Ridge.



Time is running out for discarded pets

Inside, inside, inside. The Lincoln County Humane Society recommends that cats be kept inside.

Last week's pet feature detailed the life expectancy advantages of keeping a cat inside, but then a slip of the fingers on the keyboard changed the final recommendation. To repeat the statistics, an out-

door cat averages three years of life, an indoor-outdoor about seven and an indoor, 13 years. The figures should speak for themselves.

Back at the kennels, Romeo, a buff-color shorthair, who has Labrador blood, but is very small, is ready for adoption.

"He's a real bargain," said Roberta Cox, a member of the society board who is acting shelter

director until a new person is hired. "He's already neutered, has his rabies shots and a license. Only a small adoption fee and replacement rabies tag fee would be involved.

"He's very affectionate and hugs you when he's picked up. He gets along with children and is not a barker or aggressive. And he's already experienced one disappointment. He was adopted by a woman with an old shelly that just wouldn't accept him and she brought Romeo back after a few weeks.

"His small size is suitable for apartment living and he just loves being with people whatever they're doing."

Romeo is about one year old.

In the outside cages, two female German shepherds also need homes, especially Bridget, who is nearing the time when she may have to be put down to make room for incoming animals.

"Both are about two years old," Cox said. "Bridget is more gray and is beginning to suffer from being in a kennel. Although she's still walks well on a leash with volunteers, she's starting to bark at people who come around her cage and that's a change in her personality.

"She need to find a home soon. She needs individual human attention."

Indigo is darker and very friendly. When she was brought in as a stray, she was shy, but has learned to trust again and is a good looking and affectionate dog, Cox said.

"These larger dogs aren't viewed by the public as much as the small-

er or medium size that are inside the kennel," she said. "Because they are outside in back and tend to bark in chorus when people come around, many don't bother and it's a shame. We have some wonderful pets there."

One of the activities that can help dogs from becoming neurotic in their kennels from confinement is the personal touch from volunteers who will walk them and spend time talking to and petting them.

"The volunteer who helps us the most in that way, is moving and we really need some others to help out, even temporarily," Cox said. "It's good for the dog's health mentally and physically."

Another pressing need for shelter animals is medicine. Although all animals now are routinely inoculated for Parvo and distemper, puppies and even some adults continue to die from those diseases and from other illnesses that could be treated more effectively with better resources.

Isolation of pups, strict disinfection policies and other measures being taken aren't enough. If the small ones are not adopted out quickly, their chances of contracting a disease grows each day.

"We know we can't save everyone, but there are some diseases we could treat, if we had the proper medication," Cox said.

The shelter must turn to the community in search of a benefactor, willing to finance at least a trial period to determine whether some newer, more expensive pre-

vention techniques will help.

Although the shelter has many other needs, members consider the health of their small, helpless charges the first priority. The current budget provides the necessities of operation and food, but not much more. The recent expansion to serve more areas of the county doesn't help the animals, if they cannot be kept healthy.

The society will conduct an open house for the public to view the expanded facility from 1-4 p.m. Sunday. It features a separate cat area, puppy and small dogs section, quarantine, plus isolation. Skylights keep the interior bright and more upbeat, and most dogs are kept in individual pens.

Valerie Maldonado read from the Book of Wisdom: "The souls of the just are in the hands of the Lord."



Book details copier's success

Former hippie Virginia Rogers, who changed her lifestyle and started the first quick copy business, is the subject of a biography written by a local resident.

Don Hawley, a retired architect and engineer who lives in Ruidoso, has also written "Nature of Things," a philosophy book first published in 1959.

Hawley decided to write "Jenny, Duplicating Success," after meeting Rogers at a Ba'hai Faith seminar.

Rogers began her business, Jenny's Copy Service, in Austin, Texas, on her kitchen table in the early 1970's. She had been a radical hippie when she decided to hire what most of society termed "losers" and produce copies for businesses. Even though the idea was initially laughed at, Rogers became the largest copy service customer of Xerox and established volume copy printing as it is known today.

According to Hawley, Rogers made millions of dollars in the quick-copy business and established the National Association of Quick Copiers, only to sell everything to her employees and become a Ba'hai Faith missionary.

Hawley's book is currently in the pre-publication stage and should be available at bookstores soon.



Warriors lose district opener

The Ruidoso Warrior football team won the battle but lost the war Friday night as District 3-AAA play began.

Santa Teresa, now 5-1 on the season, intercepted two fourth quarter passes and ran them in for touchdowns, giving themselves their first win in District 3-AAA play in the school's history.

Silver, Santa Teresa and Socorro now move atop the District standings with 1-0 marks, while the Warriors, Cobre and Hot Springs comprise the lower half with 0-1 records.

Ruidoso led the game 15-14 through three quarters and had controlled the game in all statistical departments until the roof fell in at the beginning of the final stanza.

The Warriors trailed early, but fought back to take the lead late in the second quarter. Both teams struggled offensively in the third quarter, with neither squad threatening to score after the halftime period.

The fourth quarter was a completely different story, ala the Warrior turnovers.

Santa Teresa made Ruidoso's coin toss record 0-7 in 1994 and took their first possession 72 yards in just six plays - scoring on a 15-yard run. The PAT gave the Desert Warriors a 7-0 lead. It looked like it was going to be a long night for the locals.

Ruidoso got the kickoff and went to work. The Warriors ground out four first downs on a drive that began at their own 35. The longest jaunts belonged to Kyle Humphreys (20 yards) and John Echols (11).

The Warriors' six-minute, 65-yard drive was impressive. Utilizing little more than four or five offensive plays, Ruidoso went for quality, not quantity after last week's "back to basics" strategy worked like a charm.

Humphreys got the Warriors to the Santa Teresa two with an eight-yard run, but a false start moved Ruidoso back five yards on the next play. Humphreys' number was called on first down for no gain.

Now facing second-and-goal from the eight, the Warrior coaching staff called for the first pass of the night. It was a beauty. Echols found wingback Jackie Roe streaking in the end zone and delivered a perfect spiral. Roe's routine catch got Ruidoso on the board for the first time of the night.

That's when the Warrior fans knew that Lady Luck resided on the north side of the field.

The Warriors lined up for the extra point, but appeared to be one man short. Echols frantically waived to the sideline for another

player but got no response. Rushed and confused, Echols opted to try the play without calling timeout to reorganize. The kick missed and the Warriors trailed by one, 7-6.

Perhaps the problem stemmed from Brandon Eamello taking over the kicking duties from Byron Soules. Because Soules kicks off and wears a kicking shoe, the PAT attempt was an opportunity to give Byron both a short breather and a change of footwear. But alas, Mr. Murphy showed up and we didn't get Soules' replacement on the field and the kick was foiled.

The second quarter saw both teams exchange possessions twice before Santa Teresa got back into the scoring column with a 19-yard touchdown pass. Like the first drive, the Desert Warriors took advantage of the Ruidoso's linebacker corps with counter-action, reeling off runs of 10, 13, and 11 yards in the six-play 58-yard drive.

The extra point gave Santa Teresa a 14-6 advantage and another opportunity for the Warrior offense to fold up its tent.

It didn't happen. It took John Echols and the offensive group exactly two plays to match the Desert Warriors' touchdown. A beautiful 23-yard run from Rex Comanche got Echols in position to loft a pinpoint spiral to Brandon Eamello over the middle.

Unfortunately, the Warriors were attempting a two-point conversion, but through miscommunication, not all players knew it. When the two players arrived on the field without knowing the play, there was no hope of success.

Like Santa Teresa, Ruidoso had crossed the goal line twice, but still trailed by two points.

Santa Teresa managed just one yard on their next possession, turning the ball back to the Warriors at their own 26 after a 32-yard punt and a great 29-yard return from Jose Prieto.

Mid-way throughout the second quarter, Ruidoso now had a chance to take the lead in the game with great field position and momentum squarely at their backs.

From the Santa Teresa 26, Humphreys managed five yards on the first down, while Comanche got the first down with six on the next play. From the 15, the Warriors could manage just five more before the drive stalled.

Head Coach Les Carter called for the field goal unit and Brandon Eamello's 26-yard kick was true, giving Ruidoso a 15-14 lead with 3:00 left in the half.

Prieto ended the Desert Warriors next scoring hope with an interception at the fifty-five second mark, the Warriors got a couple of first downs and moved to the fifty,

but could not manage a score. The half ended with the Warriors teetering with that one-point lead.

Both teams adjusted well in the third quarter to each other's first-half strong-suits. Neither team moved the ball particularly well and it looked like the rest of the game was going to be a defensive struggle. That's when Murphy made his way to the Warrior huddle.

The fourth quarter's first possession for the Warriors saw Echols manage two yards in two plays. Facing third-and-eight from their own 43, Echols fired a pass in the hopes of moving the chains, and ultimately the clock.

But upon making his break, Brandon Eamello slipped, as many receivers had done on the wet field, and a Santa Teresa defender tipped the ball up, made a circus catch and scampered 45 yards to paydirt. The Desert Warriors had taken the lead and control of the game.

Ruidoso lost yardage in four plays and exchanged possessions with Santa Teresa, who also ran four plays.

The Warriors got the ball back at the Desert Warrior 10 with just over two minutes left, but couldn't move the chains despite getting eight yards on first down.

Strangely, Santa Teresa ran three passing plays, stopping the clock with each incomplete pass. At the time, it was great for the Warriors because the offense would get another shot. Ultimately it was the local's undoing.


Echols had his third pass of the night intercepted and second for a touchdown.

The Warriors had lost a game which they had in their grasp. Likewise, Santa Teresa had won a game that they could have - make that should have - lost.

"It was like two different ball games," said Head Coach Les Carter. "We put one half together and in district play it's tough to beat anybody like that. We told the kids Santa Teresa had a knack for winning. They've won a couple of games this year they should have lost. Now, we have to learn to do that."

That will be a difficult, but not impossible task on Friday night. Third-ranked Silver, off a 41-0 victory over Hot Springs, will play host to the Warriors. Silver is undefeated under second-year Head Coach Henry Carrillo, a foe that Coach Carter knows well and has great respect for.

"Henry is a very good football coach. They are big and they execute very well, but like all football teams, they can be beat. We have the talent and we've won some good games. I expect a very, very good ball game," said Carter.



Ruidoso School Board members face an agenda of more than 20 items at their 7 p.m. meeting Tuesday in the administration complex on Horton Circle.

Cathy Jones will report on the eighth grade kindergarten mentorship program. Other reports will include the internship program at the high school and the GRADS/Day Care project. The board is scheduled to name the recipient of its second Friend of Ruidoso Schools Award.

Being recommended for employment are Sylvia Trujillo and Gary F. Sims as bus drivers, Melanie Kis and Merilee Kashe as Title VII instructional assistants, Catrina Judd as cafeteria cashier, Paula Engle as IDBA instructional assistant, and Paulie Saenz as bus aide.

Regional defense spending approved

The Senate has approved the conference committee report on the 1995 Defense Appropriations Bill, thus completing all congressional work on the funding measure that includes money for a number of defense projects in southern New Mexico.

Senator Pete Domenici of New Mexico, a member of the Senate Appropriations Committee and its Subcommittee on Defense, said the bill will now be sent to the President for his signature. The 1995 fiscal year begins Oct. 1.

The bill includes \$24.8 million for the White Sand Missile Range's High Energy Laser Systems Test Facility (HELSTF), \$30 million for the Radar Targeting and Scattering Facility at Holloman Air Force Base, and \$650,000 for the operation of the National Solar Observatory at Sunspot.

HELSTF combines several lasers with an extensive array of the instrumented test sites to include dynamic operational sites and the Sea Lite Beam Director. The facility employs approximately 350 research and development personnel.

The bill also includes \$30 million for the Radar Targeting and Scattering Facility (RATSCAT) of the 46th Test Group at Holloman Air Force Base.

RATSCAT is the Department of Defense's premier state-of-the-art Radar Cross Section test range. The funding includes an additional \$4 million to begin phase two of the Rocket Sled Test Track Upgrade program. Domenici had requested \$4 million over the budget request for the modernization program.


In addition, the committee approved Domenici's request of \$650,000 as the Air Force's contribution toward the operation of the National Solar Observatory at Sacramento Peak south of Cloudcroft. The National Solar Observatory is a world renowned site for the study of the sun.

Energy-efficient lights installed

An energy-efficient lighting project has been completed at the Mesalero, said Gov. Bruce King. The project is one example of how successful projects can reduce energy costs and improve safety conditions.

It is estimated that the new light fixtures will save approximately \$800 per year in energy costs, in addition to reduced maintenance and increased safety due to proper lighting.

Some highways may be happy, but not U.S. 70

Every auto accident that takes a human life is a tragedy. The Oct. 3 accident on U.S. 70 near San Patricio was a tragedy, and also must stand as an example of the convergence of elements that turns chance into death on a highway.

According to State Police, the victim (and we use the word advisedly), drove her truck onto U.S. 70 from a side road and was hit by a car whose driver tried to avoid collision. Her son, a passenger in the truck, and the driver of the other car both were wearing seat belts and survived. She wasn't, and was thrown from her vehicle and died at the scene.

The investigating officer speculated that she "wasn't paying attention."

Perhaps, but there may be another contributing element. Highway 70 between Ruidoso and Roswell is well maintained, well engineered and well patrolled year-round. Even so, more than 20 people have lost their lives on that route in the past five years, and with such numbers come questions.

The nation spent a half-century building the magnificent Interstate Highway System to save lives, and it did. It also conditioned a generation of drivers to drive without paying maximum attention. Highway 70 is no Interstate; part of it invites high speeds, the rest winds through the beautiful Hondo Valley. Everywhere side-roads converge.

Highway 70 is the primary route for most visitors to Ruidoso, and as Ruidoso grows so will grow the demands on the highway. The old song says "highways are happy ways when they lead the way to home..." Unfortunately, that doesn't apply to U.S. 70.

It's something of an irony that another road, State Highway 48 in Ruidoso, is getting the lion's share of local attention — while people die trying to get here.



New Mexico Perspective

Governor's race reveals deep rift

SANTA FE—A new poll of New Mexico voters in the 1994 Governors' race shows vividly the depth of discontent, disillusion and division brought on by the political bankruptcy of the two old parties, and its omens are likely to haunt state politics far beyond the November election.

Conducted by the experienced Z-Group New Mexico, the survey canvassed some 550 households between September 5 and 11, and included the most detailed questioning of voters yet conducted in this year's unique three-man gubernatorial contest. And although the results went unreported by most of the large Albuquerque media—which tend to buy their own quick-dip pollsters and blithely ignore any other findings—many of the numbers were significant, if not downright startling.

First, the survey revealed some remarkable latent strength for the underdog Green party candidate in the race, Roberto Mondragon.

Forty-five percent of voters in North Central New Mexico said they'd like to see Mondragon elected. As a matter of preference, the former Lieutenant Governor

swept six counties—Santa Fe, Colfax, San Miguel, Rio Arriba, Mora and Taos. On the same preference questions statewide, Mondragon and his running mate Steve Schmidt polled a respectable 20 percent, with Democrat incumbent Bruce King at 26 percent and Republican Gary Johnson at 31 percent, with a full 21 percent undecided.

Mondragon & Co. still suffer the old reluctance of many voters to declare for a third party. Matched against the others in a pure horse-race, "who-would-you-vote-for-today" question, he takes only 34 percent north of I-40 and 15 percent statewide.

Still, the poll numbers show the Mondragon challenge much stronger than most journalists and politicians have acknowledged, a mark of how bitterly disappointed most New Mexicans have become with the choices offered by the Democrats and Republicans.

But deeper inside the polling data are still more important signs. —Mondragon defeats both King and Johnson among voters 45 and under, and falls behind only with segments aged 46 and over. It's a sharp generational cleavage between younger New Mexicans'

yearning for change and their elders' settling for status quo.

—Just as dramatically the polling exposes how deeply Republican Gary Johnson divides the state ethnically and in class terms. The millionaire right-winger, who poured over \$800,000 of his own money into the primary and looks to buy and even bigger slice of the general, takes 47 percent of Anglo voters against King's 21 percent and Mondragon's 12 percent, and carries Albuquerque's affluent Northeast Heights with nearly 40 percent to King's 22 percent and Mondragon's 11 percent.

—So, too, the poll forecasts that this race will split the state as seldom before into region versus region, north versus south. While Mondragon carries the North with 45 percent, Johnson walks away with 42 percent of the 2nd Congressional District in the southern half of the state. Johnson is the preference of males, but 46 percent of women would rather choose either Mondragon or King.

—Finally, and perhaps most intriguing, the September survey shows that some 22 percent of Democrats, 15 percent of Republicans and nearly half of all inde-

pendents are still undecided about the campaigns for governor. Between the lines, thousands of New Mexicans would just as soon vote. "No" this crucial Nov. 8th. We can hardly blame them. The two old parties most of us have grown up with have managed to inflict this year on the Land of Enchantment a pair of the worst choices since statehood. Too many know the reality too well. Bruce King won't govern. Gary Johnson can't. Both are tainted by sleazy business practices. Neither will do anything real about tragically real problems.

Much as New Mexicans are bound by tradition to spurn third parties, the choice only points toward the Mondragon alternative, and the Z-Group poll suggests that thousands seem to be thinking just that. Whatever stripes he wears, the third man deserves a look—for our own dignity if nothing else. Both the Democrats and the Republicans should be told in no uncertain terms that they can't keep insulting so carelessly the intelligence of New Mexico voters.

The weekend-long event features everything from the world's richest chuckwagon cook-off to team roping, trail rides, cowboy poetry and songs, and performances by the local Mescalero Tribal Dancers and Hispanic Folklorico Dancers.

Johnny Gimble and many of the former Texas Playboys will set toes to tappin' when they give two rousing performances at dances on Friday and Saturday, Oct. 14 and 15, from 9 p.m. to midnight. This is country western swing the way it was meant to be sung.

An overnight trail ride through historic Lincoln County and the Mescalero

Apache Indian Reservation gives participants a chance to really become immersed in the cowboy way. For three days and two nights you can live the life of the cowboy, enjoying stories and singing around the campfire and savoring delicious chuckwagon cooking after a day in the saddle.

If it's just the campfire cookin' that you crave and not saddle sores, make plans to check out the world's richest chuckwagon cook-off at noon on Saturday, Oct. 15. Each year wagons from all over the west set up camp and prepare to compete.

After the judging is complete, each wagon serves up hearty meals for the visiting crowds. Competing chuckwagons are judged on authenticity of their wagon and camp as well as the content of their fare. After a tasty meal of beef, beans, sourdough biscuits and sweet cobbler, everyone's bellies will be happily full.

"Shop 'Til You Drop" may not be an old cowboy saying, but it does have meaning at the Cowboy Symposium. A large number of western artists, craftsmen and exhibitors will be plying their trade in the special vendor areas adjacent to the performance stages at

Best chuckwagon cook hauls off \$2,500

A touch of celebrity will be added to the World's Richest Chuckwagon Cook-off competition this year at the Fifth Annual Lincoln County Symposium.

Actor Richard Farnsworth, well-known for his leading role in "The Grey Fox" film and supporting roles in "The Natural" and more recently, "The Get Away," has entered the contest.

When he's not away filming, Farnsworth, a resident of Lincoln and longhorn cattle enthusiast, has been a loyal supporter of the annual homage to real cowboys and disappearing ranch life.

Bob Graham, also of Lincoln, will handle the cooking for Farnsworth's Diamond D Ranch chuckwagon for the "real taste of the West" competition Saturday, Oct. 15.

Organizers already have received 21 entries, the heaviest participation to date.

Graham said his crew will be out to win their first time competing.

"Richard wants the belt buckle, I want the notoriety and the girls say they're ready to spend the \$2,500 prize," Graham said.

No novice with a dutch oven, Graham said he recently turned out some big meals at the R.D. Hubbard Ranch

for the racetrack owner and some of his friends, who were hunting pronghorn.

"This will be my first time cooking at the symposium, but I've never missed the event," he said. "I have a chuckwagon of my own. Dick's wagon is an 1860-1880 vintage, but we're not real sure about the origins."

Sharing recipes with the public is out of the question.

"The basic menu is the same for everyone," he said. "They bring a slab of top round that can be cooked any way except barbecue or chili. There's beans and potatoes anyway and a cobbler of some type. It all has to be done in dutch ovens over a wood fire."

No one will dispute that when the dinner bell sounds Oct. 15, the best place to be is in front of one of the wagons competing for a total of \$5,600 in prizes and the grand prize of \$2,500.

A panel of judges will review the food in several categories, including meat, beans, bread and dessert.

All food must be cooked over a wood fire to maintain the feeling of a cowboy camp. Competitors also will be judged on the authenticity of their wagon and the neatness of camp, as well as the appearance and western flair of the cook and his helpers.

One of the most popular events at the symposium, the cook-off will be

open to the public to eat around the campfire beginning at noon for \$10 per person, but you better sign up in advance. The food goes fast.

"We'll have some of the best sourdough biscuits and piping hot cobbler you've ever tasted," promises Ray Reed and other symposium organizers. "Step back in time, smell the mesquite fire and taste a bit of history at the chuckwagon cook-off."

Each chuckwagon feeds only 35 people. Tickets may be purchased at the Glencoe Rural Events Center in Glencoe beginning Friday, Oct. 14 or in advance by calling the Museum of the Horse at 505-378-4142.

Flying J Wranglers pound out western sound

A few miles north of Ruidoso is the Flying J Ranch, home of the world famous Flying J Wranglers western music group.

Each evening from mid-May through Labor Day, the Flying J serves up a chuckwagon supper much like what the cowboy might have eaten on the trail many years ago. The supper is followed by a fast paced "foot stompin" western stage show in the big show barn.

The Flying J Wranglers will perform their smooth brand of western music during the 5th Annual Lincoln County Cowboy Symposium Oct. 14-16 to crowds of enthusiastic visitors.

One of the few local acts, they can be heard at noon Friday and Saturday on the main stage. Other musical and poetry performances take place all day Friday, Saturday and Sunday on the main stage and in the tent, providing non-stop entertainment the cowboy way.

James Hobbs, the Flying J's owner, told about the Wranglers and the response to their music.

"The Flying J has always been committed to the western music," said Hobbs. "The group itself has probably done over 125 shows this year alone and

we've been in every Cowboy Symposium, performed at the Grand Ole Opry in November of '91, went on the Nashville Network, and most recently, in April of '95, we were sent to Italy and Germany for ten days by the State of New Mexico to promote

tourism."

Even with their busy schedule, The Flying J Wranglers have still found time to record seven albums since their inception in 1982, with one of their songs, "Song for New Mexico," being considered by the state legislature as

the official state western song.

Members of the group include James Hobbs on guitar and vocals; Cindy Hobbs, winner of the 1990 Grand National Western Yodeling Championship; world champion fiddler Bart Trotter; and on bass guitar, mandolin, and vocals, Jayson Jones.

"Bart is the 1986 World Champion Fiddler, a three-time national champ, and the runner-up twice at the Grand Masters Contest at the Grand Ole Opry in Nashville," Hobbs said.

Bragging about his wife Cindy, Hobbs relates how Dick Goodman, leader of Rex Allen's western band, said that she had the best female voice he'd heard in the last 30 years.

Hobbs said he fell in love with western music and the chuckwagon business.

"I was listening to the Eagles and Pure Prairie League, which has traditional western influences," he said. "My generation kind of missed the old western movies with that type of music and they just weren't playing it on the radio."

When Hobbs heard the real thing it was love at first listen.

"I'm still amazed at how many people have never experienced the real western music," said Hobbs, "Our primary objective is to keep up the western traditions and the ranch style of life."

The Western bronze sculptures of artist Wes Smith fit right into the Fifth Annual Lincoln County Symposium and it's no surprise that his work was picked this year for the cover of the program.

Smith's sculptures already are part of the permanent collection at the Anne C. Stradling Museum of the Horse in Ruidoso Downs. Gov. Bruce King bought one of his pieces shown in the Governor's Classic Art Show two years ago.

Smith's works have been honored many times. Most recently, he won Best of Show at the Mountain Oyster Art

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History lives in local ranchers

Tully still winning roping contests at age 90

Still riding tall in the saddle at age 91, Gerald Tully embodies that rough and ready spirit of the West being celebrated at the annual Lincoln County Cowboy Symposium.

The team roping events for the symposium are staged at the Tully family arena in Glencoe. The Tully children and grandchildren help.

The competition is scheduled this year at 9 a.m. Saturday, Oct. 15, at the arena one mile west of Glencoe, and will run continuously until dark. Entry time is 8:30 a.m.

Gerald Tully is sure to be there.

Tully announced his retirement from rodeo competition in 1988 and sold his horse. But it wasn't long before he started borrowing horses. Earlier this year, he was at it again, winning a belt buckle for team roping at a competition in Hondo.

The last buckle win before that came in 1985 at the age of 80.

While his accomplishments amaze many younger admirers, the Glencoe

rancher doesn't view them as anything extraordinary. In fact, he's annoyed by some of his chores being taken over by his children and grudgingly refers to his decision to stay off the highways.

"I was pumping water at the east end (of the property), but I turned that over to (son) Jerry (Tully) to stay off the highway," Tully said. "All I do is bowl and I've been doing that since 1949."

"And he's an inspiration to a lot of them that quit at 60," said Tully's wife, Wynema.

Although he had ridden since he was a toddler, Tully said he didn't decide to compete in a rodeo until 1928.

"I was playing baseball when the rodeo was going on," he said. "I was wearing nothing but a baseball suit. I borrowed a horse, boots and a rope."

His years of roping experience on the range paid off with a second place in calf roping and first place in wild cow milking. He still can tick off the names and rankings of the other winners, Bob and Harold Crosby.

Just as easily, he can recall each of his favorite horses, including Red Man,

his team roping buddy; Campo for head and heeling; Dutchman and Indian, both for steer roping.

Range work came first, managing as many as 250 head of cattle, but whenever he could squeeze it in, Tully competed in rodeo, notching up about 300 over his career and probably as many first place awards, which he has given away as fast as he's collected them.

But one trophy he has kept. The Crosby Trophy, a bit tarnished from time, sits on top of a bookcase.

In 1946 in Capitan, Tully beat by 35 seconds, world champion Bob Crosby's time for roping 12 steers. Crosby was

the only man who had won the Roosevelt Trophy, which signified that he had been world champion cowboy three times.

Crosby died in a jeep accident near Roswell soon after. A roping competition was initiated in his honor. To retain permanent possession of the trophy, a roper had to successfully defeat two challengers.

Tully won the trophy after defeating Cotton Lee at Albuquerque and then immediately vanquishing challenger Jeff Good.

Joetyne Wright is still cowgirl at heart

She's third generation Lincoln County and a cowgirl at heart, even when wielding a telephone at the family building supply business.

Sitting on the back of her pick-up truck, Joetyne Wright recalls her first long roundup ride at the age of nine.

"I was always told when I was growing up that I could go, if I could keep up, and I always did," Wright said.

"We ran cattle all the way up to Ski Run Road. We'd gather them there, bring them down to the corral where Innsbrook is now and brand them."

Wright said she can't remember when she didn't ride a horse.

"It's still the most relaxing thing I can find to do, but it's getting harder to get into the saddle," she said. "The years take over. I found a shorter horse."

Keeping cattle also is something she can't give up.

"It gets into your blood," she said. "That's why I keep a few. My mother used to get mad when my father would talk about women like cattle, but when you get to know them, you see a lot of similarities. Their gestation and fertility periods are the same, they grieve for lost babies and when they go away for water, they leave their calves with the same 'babysitter' each time. It's always so much fun watching the calves play in the spring."

At the family's peak, it maintained about 200 head. Her grandfather, Fountain Miller (who owned the land where Ruidoso Downs Racetrack now stands), operated a ranch on land now situated across U.S. 70 from the C & L Lumber yard and hardware store. Her father's ranch, opposite the old Stetson schoolhouse, still is operational on a small

scale with the help of some of her grandchildren.

The ranching business for her family was cut short in 1972 when U.S. Forest Service land that had been used by the family for years was removed from their grazing allotment.

"My father (E.E. Miller) and grandfather didn't have much private land," she explained. "(The government) took it because of the adverse impact of ranching, but I've seen impact from other means that are far worse than a cow."

"We ran cattle on forest land across the lake from the Inn of the Mountain Gods, down by the high school and Cree Meadows golf course, and on both sides of U.S. 70 (from the Stetson school house)."

"When I was 10, my job was to rope the calves out of the herd and drag them out for the men to flank and brand," she said. "When I got older, I sat on their heads and held them, then I graduated to vaccinating them, the easiest job of all. I've branded, ear marked and castrated."

At age 67, she doesn't ride as much as she did back then.

"There's no place to ride," she said. "There's roads, yards and fences. My horse comes to visit at the house, but he loves the cattle and won't leave them."

"The cattle all were raised in my field. I just get in the pick up and holler and they all come to the house."

In her years on horseback, Wright never was bucked off or injured.

"I broke my own horse as a teenager and taught her to kneel, but my dad got furious, because when he tried to shoe her, she would lean her whole weight against him. She was a draft horse and huge. But her slow and cautious nature also is what probably kept me safe.

"I've outlived a lot of horses. You sort

of gauge your age by how many."

Moonshine was another favorite.

"Like Beauty, he could have killed me many times, but he had better judgment than I did as a kid," she said. "I would loan my car, but never loan my horse or gun."

The symposium has been a great boom to the area and a wonderful warm-celebration for the remaining ranchers, she said. The family sponsors a chuck-wagon each year.

In 1980, Tully was inducted into the Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association's Hall of Champions at Colorado Springs, just six years after he decided to get back into competition after staying out 25 years to raise a family and run a ranch.

In 1983, at 78, he was named champion team roper at Ruidoso Downs, taking home a handtooled saddle, two more buckles and a pocketful of money. He competed against 492 teams, roping from 5 p.m. to 5 a.m., and outlasting the spectators.

Dubbed the "Ben Gay Cowboy" by his roping friends, Tully finds it necessary to relieve some of the pain from his damaged shoulder socket. "It's either that or WD-40," he said.

Steer and calf roping are his favorites. When he was younger, he took the head for roping, but he went to heeling later, because it took less overhead rope and stress on his arm.

One of Mrs. Tully's favorite stories is about her husband's trip to a rodeo in Wyoming in 1937. He returned home with first prize, a suitcase full of 1,600 silver dollars.

That same year, he joined the cowboy group, now called the Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association.

"I've got a gold card. After you're 60, you don't have to pay," Tully said. "Now I get on a horse twice a year, in May or June and then for the symposium in October."

He'll be there again this year, he says primarily to watch, but Mrs. Tully said, "Are you kidding? I'm pretty sure he'll see a horse he has to try out."



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
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Ray Reed's dream now reality at symposium


When you sit down and enjoy the many different performers at the Lincoln County Cowboy Symposium, you might wonder just how all of this came to be. The answer can be directly traced to the dream of one man, Ray Reed.

Ray will tell you the idea for the Lincoln County Cowboy Symposium was started on June 22, 1989. Ray had just performed at the inaugural National Cowboy Symposium and Celebration in Lubbock, Texas and he was intrigued by the response he had seen there.

"I have been an entertainer most of my life, and I do all the old cowboy songs from years back. I was raised a cowboy, and that's what I've been all my life, an entertainer and a cowboy," reflects Ray. He was part of the western swing craze that peaked in the late 40s and he took little interest in the style of music ushered in by the 50s.

In his visit to the Lubbock gathering, he found a resurgence of interest in a form of entertainment that he loved.

"I walked around among the crowd during intermissions and asked them what they had found in this material that was so interesting. They told me the material was good and fresh, not loud or loaded with filthy language. They said some of it was really funny and some of it was sad. They could re-

late to this material and every piece was different - and it all seemed to come from the heart. I stayed in Lubbock for three days, watching the crowd, and I got to thinking. You know, they are searching - searching for something they are not finding on radio or TV these days."

To Ray Reed, "cowboys" seemed to be the key. But the "cowboy" that Reed was after was not the Hollywood version - he wanted the real thing. Although the movie cowboy and his life was depicted in an exciting, adventurous and romantic way, Ray felt they weren't describing the true life of the ranching family of the west, and he felt the time was ripe to bring the true romance of the west before the public.

"I said man, this is it, this is the

time, it has come around again."

Excited over the prospect of presenting a forum of western music and poetry, Ray began looking for the ideal location for his dream.

He turned quite naturally to historic Lincoln County, New Mexico. It presented a number of advantages. Historically, it was known for Billy the Kid and the Lincoln County War. Geographically, it was situated in the mountains of beautiful southern New Mexico. It embraced the many cultures that played a role in settling the west - the Indian, the Hispanic and the American Cowboy.

The All American Horse Sales Company provided a natural setting for the proposed symposium because of the size and location of the facility. There would be room to accommodate a large number of people. Trail riders could saddle up and ride the same trails that Billy the Kid took in his overland flights and the adjoining pasture land would be ideal for a chuckwagon cookoff.

Ray's next hurdle was getting his idea off the ground. He approached Ruidoso Downs Race Track owner, R.D. Hubbard, about presenting a cowboy symposium. After listening to Ray's pitch, Hubbard agreed that the time was right to present such an event in

the Ruidoso area. Hubbard agreed to finance and provide a support staff for the first Lincoln County Cowboy Symposium.

Later, Hubbard enlisted the aid of New Mexico businessman R.O. Anderson to help get the first symposium off the ground. From that first meeting in 1989, the Lincoln County Cowboy Symposium has blossomed into one of the premier cowboy gatherings in the country.

Relying on his contacts in the music world, Ray Reed has coaxed the great musicians from the western swing era to the Lincoln County Cowboy Symposium stage. He travels extensively, recruiting the finest poets from around the country.

And now, when the weather gets crisp and the aspens start to turn, the people of Lincoln County know it's time for the Lincoln County Cowboy Symposium. The finest cowboy poets, musicians, chuck wagon cooks and craftsmen congregate at the Ruidoso Horse Sales Pavilion in Glencoe, New Mexico for a four-day celebration of their way of life.

From an idea to reality, it's taken plenty of hard work to make Ray's dream come true. Of course, that's the cowboy way.

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

COOPERATIVES REMEMBER THEIR PAST



This year, cooperatives across the country celebrate their founding 150 years ago. Rural electric cooperatives will take part in the celebration which will be recognized during National Cooperative Month in October.

Cooperatives come in all shapes and sizes from giant, multi-million dollar companies to small farm and crafts cooperatives. Famous among cooperative names are Ocean Spray, Blue Diamond, Sunkist and Land-o-Lakes. You may be a customer of a financial cooperative . . . your local credit union who's governing board is voted in by you, the credit union member, to represent your interests.

Electric cooperatives began in 1935 with the passage of President Roosevelt's Rural Electrification Act. The Act allowed communities to form cooperative organizations which could borrow low interest capital from the government to construct power lines in areas investor-owned companies refused to serve. These "rural" electric cooperatives served, and continue to serve, the sparsely populated regions of the country. They were formed with the spirit of neighbors helping neighbors. Often times these early pioneers would pitch in to dig holes, set poles and string wire so their neighbors could reap the benefits of electric power. Today, there are fewer cooperative members who can remember when the lights came on for the first time.

Electric cooperatives are faced with many new challenges. Among them is the fact that cooperative electric rates are often higher than neighboring investor-owned utilities. One major reason for this difference is customer density. While a cooperative may serve 4 or 5 customers for each mile of power line constructed, a more densely populated urban utility might serve 40-50 customers. It's hypocritical that cooperative rates are compared on a par with investor-owned utilities. After all, it was the investor-owned utilities who initially refused to serve the rural areas because it was not profitable and it was a group of neighbors who united



to form the cooperative to meet the communities needs. Cooperatives still operate that way today.

Electric cooperatives are owned by their customers, frequently called members. Each member, regardless of how much electricity he or she uses, has an equal voice and vote in the control of the organization. Member elected boards of trustees are responsible for policy setting and the overall direction of each cooperative and represent the owners interests.

Cooperatives operate on a non-profit basis and return revenues not needed for system operation to the members who provide them.

In New Mexico, 16 electric distribution cooperatives provide electric service to more than 320,000 homes and businesses. Plains Electric Generation and Transmission Cooperative (Plains), makes and moves electricity to 13 distribution cooperatives—12 in New Mexico and one in Arizona.

Plains delivers wholesale electric service to the distribution cooperatives who then provide the direct service to their customers/members. And just as their customers are the cooperative's owners, the distribution cooperatives own Plains.

While electric cooperatives have a long history, it doesn't mean they're not modern, progressive companies. Many electric cooperatives are involved in helping their members use electricity wisely by offering the latest in high efficiency heating and home appliances. One popular home heating product offered by many cooperatives in New Mexico and Arizona is called electric thermal storage (ETS). ETS is a popular and cost-effective replacement for wood stoves, propane heaters and as a replacement for electric baseboard heat.

When cooperatives were formed to bring electricity to rural areas, they couldn't predict the technological advances that are taken for granted today

and that rely so heavily on reliable electric power. Today's electric cooperatives are indeed the Power for the 90's and beyond.

We hope this supplement will inform you about the many positive contributions electric cooperatives make to our communities and the service they provide.



ELECTRIC COOPERATIVES



Central NM Electric

Keeping up with extensive growth is an immediate goal of Central New Mexico Electric Cooperative's 48 employees. Headquartered in Mountainair, the Cooperative provides electric service to 11,400 customers in nine New Mexico counties. In addition to Mountainair, communities served include

Corona, Moriarty, Estancia, Vaughan and Willard. The Cooperative offers high efficiency electric products including electric thermal storage heating, electric lawnmowers and hot water heaters. Customers can take advantage of 5.5 cent per kilowatt hour time-of-use rates between 9 p.m. and 6 a.m.; on-peak rates are 12.45 cents per kilowatt hour. The Cooperative supports its community through scholarships, the Chamber of Commerce and the Safe Haven program. It also supports local vendors by doing business locally. Eight trustees from eight cooperative districts represent customers of the Cooperative. Central NM was incorporated in 1949. Fain Lawson is Manager.



Columbus Electric

Columbus Electric Cooperative serves its rural electric members through over 1,800 miles of line covering 7,000 square miles of territory in the high desert and mountain country of southwestern New Mexico and southeastern Arizona. Agriculture and minerals are the chief industries in these primarily rural

areas. Columbus Electric serves growing farm, ranch and recreation communities in addition to providing industrial power to the Hidalgo Smelter owned by Phelps Dodge. Our motto, "Power for the Future" expresses our commitment to provide service excellence to members by means of a dedicated and well-trained staff to deliver reliable, high-quality power at energy costs that are economical today, and competitive tomorrow. Members are encouraged to become actively involved with their Cooperative through the nine-member Board of Trustees, the Consumer Advisory Committee or by participation in the many functions, events and scholarships supported by Columbus Electric. Michael D. Fletcher is the General Manager.



Continental Divide Electric

Headquartered in Grants, Continental Divide provides electric service to New Mexico and Arizona including the counties of Cibola, McKinley, Bernalillo, Sandoval, Valencia, NM and Apache County, Arizona. Free home energy audits are provided to customers by a certified specialist at the

Cooperative. The Cooperative will celebrate its 50 year founding next year. In that time it has grown to serve 19,395 customers and employs 63. It makes a significant contribution to the local economy through an annual payroll of \$1,824,522 and property and gross receipts tax payments of \$249,670 in 1993. Most non-electrical equipment and supplies are purchased from local vendors. Continental Divide participates in the child safety program called Safe Haven, an annual safety coloring contest for 2nd through 4th graders and through the Grants Chamber of Commerce. In 1989 the Cooperative began a scholarship program, awarding 18 \$1,000 scholarships to high school seniors; since then the Cooperative has given 30 scholarships each year. A nine member board of trustees represents consumers. Fred Lackey is Manager.



Jemez Electric

Jemez Mountains Electric makes it a point to be a good citizen in the communities it serves. The Cooperative is an active member of the Espanola Chamber of Commerce, and has an established policy that allows its 84 employees time off to participate in community activities. Since 1969, the Jemez Electric Foundation

has granted scholarships; this year \$17,000 was awarded to area high school graduates. Jemez sponsors a Junior Board of Trustees program annually, along with English and Spanish spelling bees for elementary aged children. It strives to award as much business as possible to local companies who bid on various projects. Formed in 1949, the Cooperative has almost 25,000 consumers. A full time employee is responsible for energy audits and handling customer inquiries. Jemez Electric is headquartered in Espanola and has two district offices to meet the needs of consumers in Rio Arriba, Santa Fe,

Sandoval, San Juan and McKinley counties. It has an 11 member board of trustees. Levi Sanchez is the General Manager.



Kit Carson Electric

Celebrating 50 years of service this year, Kit Carson Electric is headquartered in Taos. The Cooperative serves 19,700 customers in Taos, Colfax and Rio Arriba Counties. Its 60 employees work hard to provide electric service to Taos, Eagle Nest, Angel Fire, Red River, Questa and several other communities including

Ojo Caliente, Tres Piedras and Arroyo Hondo. The Cooperative offers time of use rates and space heating equipment. In fact it recently signed a contract with the University of New Mexico-Taos to supply 16 electric thermal storage units for heating the facility. The Cooperative offers a 5 percent bidder preference for local vendors to ensure local business is supported. Luis Reyes, Manager, says a long term goal at the cooperative is "to make electricity competitive and be a bigger role in the community." A nine member board of trustees represents consumers.



Mora-San Miguel Electric

Mora-San Miguel Electric Cooperative's service area extends into four New Mexico counties: Mora, San Miguel, Santa Fe and Guadalupe. The Cooperative has 24 employees serving more than 7,600 customers. It operates two offices for customers—its headquarters office in Mora and a

district office in Pecos. The Cooperative was founded in 1949 and continues its tradition of providing support to the communities it serves—support that includes six \$600 scholarships to high school seniors from the six school districts within the service area, participation in the Mora-San Miguel County Fair and sponsorship of a boy and girl to Boy's/Girl's state. The Cooperative also supports local vendors whenever possible through the purchase of goods and services for the Cooperative. An eleven member board of trustees represents Cooperative members. Ernesto Gonzales is Manager.



Navopache Electric
Headquartered in the beautiful White Mountains of eastern Arizona, Navopache Electric serves 25,000 customers in Arizona and western New Mexico. The Cooperative was incorporated in 1946 and employs 100, with a 1993 payroll of \$3.4 million. The Cooperative paid just

under one half million dollars in property taxes in 1993 and supports its community directly with local vendor support, annual \$1,000 scholarships to eight area high school students and memberships in local Chambers of Commerce. The Cooperative hopes to maintain its current customer base and enjoy some business growth; it also encourages customers to use their electricity during off-peak hours of 9 p.m. to 6 a.m. during which its rates are 5.25 cent per kilowatt hour. On-peak rates are 11.4 cents per kilowatt hour. Eight board members represent Navopache customers. Wayne Retzlaff is Manager.



Northern Rio Arriba Electric
Northern Rio Arriba (NORA) Electric Cooperative, Inc. serves approximately 3,244 consumers in sixteen North-Central New Mexico communities from Ghost Ranch to Dulce including Canjilon, Cebolla, Las Nutrias, Tierra Amarilla, Los Brazos, Los Ojos, Plaza

Blanca, and Chama. The Cooperative's 14 employees don't stop at providing electric service to a vast and rugged geographic area; they work hard to support and maintain a dedicated and loyal commitment to "The Cooperative Philosophy." The Cooperative's annual payroll is approximately \$600,000 and another \$70,000 is paid each year to Rio Arriba County Government in ad valorem property taxes. Capital credits will also be retired to the member-owners in 1995 for the fifth consecutive year. NORA plans to complete a new strategic plan in 1994 that will guide the Cooperative for the next two to three years. Attaining financial stability was the focus of the 1991 Strategic Plan. Scholarships to graduating students at Dulce and Escalante High Schools along with electrical safety demonstrations are part of NORA's continuing commitment to the area's youth. The Cooperative offers a 5-cent per kilowatt hour time-of-use rate and an off-peak rate of 4.5 cents. Area water associations have benefited from NORA's off-peak rates by pumping their water to storage tanks during off-peak hours instead of at electrical peak demand hours, which has also reduced the wholesale power cost to NORA. A nine member board represents consumers. Emery Maez is Executive Vice President/General Manager.



Otero County Electric
Set in the mountains of southern New Mexico, Otero County Electric serves 11,664 consumers and industry over a geographically diverse area extending from the Texas line to Roswell. Otero Electric employees work out of its Cloudcroft headquarters office and district

offices in Capitan and Carrizozo. The Cooperative was founded in 1939 making it one of the oldest electric cooperatives in New Mexico. Otero Electric offers home energy audits along with time-of-use rates and electric heating products for its consumers. The Cooperative also participates in the Safe Haven program and an annual statewide safety coloring contest for elementary age children. A ten member board of trustees represents consumers. Bill Mershon is General Manager.




Sierra Electric
Lakes, mountains, open ranges and wilderness areas are the setting for Sierra Electric and its 3,013 customers. Sierra Electric, formed in 1942, is committed to supplying the present and future electrical needs of its consumers in an efficient and economical manner.

Sierra Electric is equally committed to its 14 employees through training and providing the opportunity to fulfill personal and professional goals. Sierra Electric Cooperative offers the Safe Haven Program and is involved in awarding educational scholarships, the Chamber of Commerce, the Sierra County Economic Development organization and a student work program. Customers can take advantage of off-peak rates of 6 cents per kilowatt hour. Sierra Electric is developing electric product programs such as space heating to take advantage of the incentive rates. Nine board members represent Sierra Electric customers. F.D. McDowell is Sierra Electric Manager.



Socorro Electric
Socorro Electric Cooperative's 32 employees are dedicated to supplying reliable electric service to 9,000 consumers over a large geographical area that includes the communities of Socorro, Quemado, Datil, Magdalena, and San Antonio. The Cooperative will celebrate its 50 year

anniversary in 1995. Socorro Electric provides a wide range of electric products for its consumers including electric thermal storage, water heaters and weatherization assistance. Also available is an electric appliance loan program. Off-peak rates for consumers are 6.5 cents per kilowatt hour. Active in supporting its service area, the Cooperative is involved in the Chamber of Commerce, along with providing students scholarships, electric safety tips and the Safe Haven program. The Cooperative has an 11 member board, Lupe Vega is Manager.




Southwestern Electric
Located in the northeast corner of New Mexico, Southwestern Electric serves ranching, farming and CO₂ operations. With customers broadly scattered across their service territory, Southwestern Electric is one of the least densely populated systems in the United States. Serving a customer base of

789, the Cooperative's fastest growing consumer sector is irrigation. With the Cooperative offering competitive rates for irrigation, the consumers can take advantage of the convenience of electricity. The Cooperative also sells water heaters, ETS heaters, and offers a time-of-use rate for its customers. SWEC, being run by a nine-member board, also offers scholarships to member's children. Ann Garcia is General Manager.



Springer Electric
Founded in 1945, Springer Electric serves ten communities in the northeast New Mexico counties of Colfax, Harding, Mora, San Miguel and Union. The economic contribution of the Cooperative to the local area is significant. It employs 16 with an annual payroll of \$450,000.

Another \$60,000 is paid in taxes and \$50,000 in purchases among local vendors. The Cooperative provides support to the Colfax County Economic Development Organization, Small Business Administration, "Strengthening Quality in Schools" program and is sponsor to a "Top Students" awards program. Cooperative customers can save on their monthly electric bill with time-of-use rates; the Cooperative offers electric thermal storage heating, water heaters, electric lawnmowers, electric grills and water distillers through its Springer office. Energy audits and bill reviews for customers are standard services. A seven member board of trustees represents the Cooperative's customers. David Spradlin is Manager.



Plains Electric
Providing electric power for rural areas was the original goal behind the formation of Plains Electric. The Cooperative was formed in November 1951 for the purpose of generating and transmitting "wholesale" electricity to a number of distribution or "retail" cooperatives in the New Mexico area. Some of these

had already been in existence a half dozen years or more, dating back to as early as 1939. Since then, Plains has grown from a small power system generating for a peak demand of 17 megawatts to an expanding regional network, supplying a record peak of 320 megawatts in July, 1994. Plains has taken several steps to reduce costs. In May, Plains filed for a general rate reduction of 2.1 percent from current revenue levels. The decrease was possible due to recent and planned debt refinancing/repricing activity and the additional margins to the company from the new McKinley Paper Company manufacturing facility near the Plains Escalante Generating Station (PEGS) power plant. Plains anticipates a final decision from the New Mexico Public Utility Commission (PUC) prior to March 1995. Plains has 273 employees, about evenly divided between its Albuquerque offices and PEGS. Each cooperative has a member on the Plains board of trustees for a total of 13; David Highers is Executive Vice President/General Manager.

ELECTRICITY OFFERS AFFORDABLE WINTER WARMTH


Try to remember last winter. If you were tired then of buying, lugging and loading wood, or wonder-

ing when the propane tank was empty, chances are you will be tired of it this winter. Several electric cooperatives offer a cost-effective way to heat your home with the added benefits of safety, cleanliness and ease of use. A technology called Electric Thermal Storage Heating provides the cozy, radiant heat of a wood stove without the fuss and is economical to use.

How does Electric Thermal Storage work? High efficiency electric elements heat an array of surrounding, high density ceramic bricks. The elements and bricks are heated during off peak hours when electric rates are low. The bricks are capable of providing usable heat for up to 60 hours and the retained or "stored" heat is distributed by a fan. Ivory colored cabinets blend in to any home decor. Unit size will depend on the area that needs to be heated.

Electric thermal storage is an excellent alternative to heating with gas and wood. When used in conjunction with time-of-use rates, electricity prices are competitive with gas without its sharp price peaks in the winter. Wood home heating has its own concerns including keeping the fire going, ashes, ventilation and stricter air regulations. ETS offers the radiant heat of wood with an added benefit—it doesn't need anyone to tend to it.

Electric thermal storage receives high approval ratings from customers who have the units installed in their homes and businesses. They are ideal candidates for home remodeling or addition projects. They are also excellent in unoccupied seasonal homes which need some heat during the cold winter.



Thermal storage units cost from \$500 to \$1,200, not including installation, which should be done by a qualified electrician. Models are available for 220v wiring, with some models available for 208v and 110v plug in applications.

Cooperative representatives can determine the appropriate size for your home depending on its square footage and floor plan.

What's the bottom line in costs to operate? Depending on your cooperative's rates, savings can range from 35 percent to 50 percent of a standard electric bill. Don't hesitate to contact your local cooperative for further details and to see a display of a model. Some cooperatives may offer financing and rebates.

Enjoy a no-hassle winter this year in the comfort of clean, convenient and affordable electric heat.




Your rural cooperative has developed a way for you to save money and put time to work for you with Time of Use (TOU) rates. Between 6 a.m. and 9 p.m. when

electric demand is greatest, your cooperative pays more for electricity. Conversely, costs are less during the hours of 9 p.m. to 6 a.m. Some cooperatives have developed a variety of electric products to take advantage of the rates and allow consumers to save on their energy bills.

Energy saving/storing devices and appliances such as Electric thermal storage heating and super capacity water heaters significantly reduce your overall energy bill.

As a consumer, when you sign up for TOU rates, your cooperative installs a special meter that allows the consumer to track electric use during on and off-peak hours.

You're already using time to save money by making long distance calls on weekends, going to movie matinees or taking advantage of early bird specials when you dine out. Let your rural electric cooperative show you how to save money on your energy costs as well! 
ELECTRIC LAWNMOWERS— NEW AND IMPROVED

New electric lawnmowers can store electricity from a rechargeable battery eliminating the fuss of cords and all the hassle of traditional gas mowers. Unlike oil and gas, they're easy on the environment. It is estimated that the total emissions in the U.S. associated with residential mowers is equal to about 3 million cars—each driving 16,000 miles a year!

Many of the new mowers now turn clippings into a fine mulch that decomposes quickly and eliminates raking or catching the grass. And there's no need to worry about running out of battery capacity—the new cordless electric mowers can cut a half acre on a single charge—equal to about an hour and a half of mow-

ing. Buyers also say they appreciate not worrying about fumes and oil leaks in their garages.


HOW ENERGY WORKS

PLAINS ESCALANTE GENERATING STATION

Plains' primary power source is the Plains Escalante Generating Station (PEGS) located about 20 miles west of Grants. The \$420 million plant, completed in 1984 produces 250 megawatts and is designed to last well into the next century and beyond.

PEGS is one of the cleanest coal-fired power plants in the nation featuring state-of-the-art pollution control technology that meets and even exceeds strict new federal clean air standards. In August, PEGS was awarded, for the second time, the Environmental Protection Agency's 1994 Regional Administrator's Air Compliance Environmental Excellence Award for the State of New Mexico. The first award went to PEGS in 1992. The facility was selected for recognition by the State Air Compliance Award Advisory Committee. Their decision was based on an in-depth evaluation of information which focused on facility compliance with Clean Air Act requirements and performance beyond compliance during the past two years.


About 60 percent of Plains power comes from coal; the remainder is from hydroelectric power supplied by the Glen Canyon Dam in Arizona and the Elephant Butte Dam on the Rio Grande in New Mexico.




HOW ELECTRICITY IS GENERATED

Power plants like Plains Escalante Generating Station, which generates electricity for the 13 electric cooperatives, use coal to heat water, creating steam, which moves the blades of a turbine. A generator, attached to the spinning turbine, generates electricity. High volt-

age transmission lines (115,000 and 230,000 volts) carry this electricity from the plant to the thirteen member cooperatives. Substations and transformers reduce the high voltage electricity down to lower levels (120 and 220 volts) for use in homes and businesses.

SAFE HAVEN

Gets Help Fast in Emergency

The Safe Haven program is another way in which cooperatives are working to make their communities safer places to live, work and play. As a responsible and concerned corporate neighbor, your cooperative participates with other New Mexico rural electric cooperatives in the Safe Haven program. Navopache Electric also offers a similar program known as TOPS or Trucks on Patrol Systemwide.

What is Safe Haven?

Under this program, each cooperative works with local law enforcement and emergency services to report possible criminal acts or dangerous incidents, thereby providing assistance to area citizens, and providing a quick way to obtain help. How does Safe Haven work?

A person in need of help, for example a child on the way home from school being followed by a suspicious individual, can find a cooperative utility truck with a Safe Haven bumper sticker and report the trouble. The cooperative employees can use the two-way radio in the truck to call and have the proper law enforcement agency notified. The child can remain with the employee until help arrives. Or a person who sees a fire, automobile accident or some other emergency, but is not near a telephone, can report the incident to the cooperative employees in the utility truck displaying the Safe Haven bumper sticker. The employees will use their two-way radios to notify the proper agency.

The Safe Haven program is one more way your local cooperative is working to make our rural areas safe. The bumper sticker is red and yellow making it recognizable from a distance.

SOME SIMPLE TIPS ON CONSERVATION

Some electric cooperatives offer energy conservation classes for your home and business. The classes are free or very low cost. They provide information on how to improve your home and business energy efficiency. Some cooperatives also offer energy audits. Call your cooperative for more information.

Does it really help to turn off lights and appliances?

Yes, it does. Turning off lights and appliances when you are not using them can save a lot of money. It can also help to reduce the amount of energy used in your home or business. This can help to reduce the amount of money you spend on energy bills.

Is it more efficient to wash dishes under running water or in the dishwasher?

It is more efficient to wash dishes in the dishwasher. Running water wastes a lot of water and energy. Dishwashers use less water and energy than hand washing. They also clean dishes more thoroughly.

Does opening and closing the refrigerator door really waste energy?

Yes, it does. Every time you open the refrigerator door, cold air escapes and warm air enters. This makes the refrigerator work harder to keep the food cold. To save energy, try to keep the door closed as much as possible. Only open the door when you need to get something out.

SAFETY SENSE

Water and Electricity: A Deadly Combination


It's shocking! When water and electricity get together, they can cause danger.

Electricity is safe when you use it right. Using electrical appliances properly in the bathroom or wherever water is present can be a matter of life or death. Teach children the hazards of water and electricity.


- Power is still present even when an appliance is turned off. If an appliance falls in water, unplug it—don't grab it.
- Don't immerse appliances in water to clean them. Unplug portable appliances before cleaning with a damp cloth.
- Don't touch faucets or stand on a damp floor while using an appliance or electrical switch.
- Keep appliances away from sinks or tubs where they can accidentally fall in. Cords should never trail in water. Water and electricity are necessary to run your household. Make the best use of both by keeping them apart.

SCHOLARSHIPS

Don't overlook your electric cooperative if you're planning on pursuing a higher education. Many of those listed in this profile offer scholarships in varying amounts to adults and/or to high school seniors who are members of the cooperative. Those cooperatives offering scholarships provide them through education foundations which review the scholarship applications. The foundations are funded through interest earnings from unclaimed capital credits. Until a few years ago, cooperatives were required to return the unclaimed funds to state government; however, a law change allowed the cooperatives to retain the funds and put them to work in the community. Check with your cooperative to see if scholarships are available and for details about their application guidelines.
