Judicial candidate forum set, Nov. 3

Voters will be given a chance to see the candidates for local judicial offices close up and personal at 7 p.m. Thursday, Nov. 3 at the Ruidoso Civic Events Center. Candidates will give short speeches and then answer questions. They seek the posts of District II magistrate judge (Paul Wersich and William Butts) and Division 4 Twelfth District court judge (Bert Atkins and Frank Wilson). The forum is being sponsored by the Lincoln County Bar Association.

Theater robbed

Tools and extension cords valued at more than \$2,500 were stolen from the Ruidoso Little Theater sometime between Oct. 5 and 10. Most of the tools belonged to volunteers who were working on the set for The Odd Couple, said theater President Steve Norbury. The theater's insurance does not cover volunteers' property, so the fledgling theater must now reimburse the volunteers. Most of the tools were marked with either the theater's name or the volunteer's name. Village opts for scenic highway plan

The consulting firm of Seeley and Associates was hired Tuesday by Ruidoso village councilors to pursue a New Mexico Scenic and Historic Byways designation for the Lincoln County Loop. Joan Reimann, chairman of Convention-Visitors Bureau ad hoc committee, said the designation would allow the village to tap into \$14 million in federal money available for tourism promotion. The Loop runs from Ruidoso along State Highway 48 to Capitan and Lincoln and back through Hondo on U.S. 70.

Let there be light

Street lights are back in the plans for widening of State Highway 48 (Mechem Drive) from Suderth Drive to White Mountain Drive. Ruidoso village councilors Tuesday approved Texas New Mexico Power installing the lights and being paid an estimated annual fee of \$23,115 for power, maintenance and replacements. They rejected the option of buying the lights for \$200,000 and paying \$9,450 a year for electricity and maintenance.

Ruidoso growth tops state's list

by DIANNE STALLINGS Ruidoso News Staff Writer Leap-frogging all competitors, Ruidoso claims the title of fastest growing non-metropolitan community in the state.

Mayor Jerry Shaw and Village Manager Gary Jackson were able to confirm their town's record growth during the Governor's Rural Economic Development Forum in Tucumcari earlier this month. "They passed out statistics showing all of the state's figures," Shaw said. "We noted that Ruidoso was up on the top, past boom level days."

Based on 1993 residential construction values of \$13,027,849, the village is the fastest growing non-metropolitan municipality in New Mexico, Jackson said. Trailing the village were Clovis with

\$11,247,981 and Alamogordo with \$10,403,927.

Non-metropolitan municipalities are defined as communities outside of the metro areas of Albuquerque, Las Cruces and Santa Fe.

"Gary already had been saying we actually were above the early 1980s, before the oil crash," Shaw said. "And this time, it's a healthy market, not inflated like the boom when prices went out of sight."

"We're still far below Santa Fe and Albuquerque and places north. I think that's one of the reasons people from California, Arizona and other states are finding us. Those other areas have priced themselves out of the market."

"And we certainly can compete as far as scenic beauty and clean air are concerned. We've got them."

Jackson said the statistics are even better in 1994.

Candidates in profile

A new district judge will be elected by voters in the general election. The state legislature created the division IV judgeship in District 12 to help ease the caseload of the three other judges. Gov. Bruce King appointed James Counts, a Democrat, to the bench last April, but Democratic voters in the primary picked Bert Atkins as their candidate to face Republican Frank Wilson. District judges are paid \$69,719 a year and serve four-year terms. Below are some vital statistics on the two men.

He also served on the board of directors of the Alamogordo Music Theater and Alamogordo Civic Auditorium, and as an officer of the Otero County Bar Association.

Atkins listed his activities as president of the New Mexico District Attorney's Association in 1992; president of the Otero County Bar Association in 1991; a writer for the 1994 New Mexico Board of Bar Examiners under the criminal law question section, a member of the Governor's Task Force on Crime, New Mexico Street Gang Task Force, Otero County Domestic Violence Task Force, board of directors of the Otero County Boye and Girls Club, the Tularosa Masons and advisory board of Sacramento Demolay.

Judge election race centers on candidates' trial experience

Trial experience, who has it and how much, seem to be the questions surrounding the two candidates for the newly created Division IV judgeship of the 12th Judicial District.

Created by the 1993 state legislature, the division IV post temporarily was filled last April by gubernatorial appointment, but was thrown open to all comers in the June primary.

Frank Wilson, a former district attorney and Alamogordo city attorney, secured the Republican nomination and Bert Atkins, district attorney in the 12th district, was picked by the Democrats.

"I feel I'm the best qualified candidate," Atkins said. "I have over six years background as the district attorney for this judicial district. Prior to that I was the public defender and also an assistant D.A. for two years. My track record for public service is superior."


Wilson was one of the nominees (for the division IV seat) picked earlier this year by the Judicial Selection Commission, a panel of 19 judges, lawyers and law persons that review qualifications and recommend appointments to the governor. Having already served as an assistant district attorney and as an appointed district attorney, Wilson said the judge's seat is the next step in his career.

"I've found most of my success as an attorney has been in finding ways to solve problems for people, to get cases settled, to get things resolved," he said. "That takes an ability to apply the law in a way designed to work to solve problems and I think I can apply those same skills, perhaps more effectively and more broadly, serving as a judge."

Wilson said he's the better candidate, "primarily because the length and breadth of my experience and the type of experience is actually in the courtroom trying cases."

"Although Bert has been a good administrator in the DA's office, that does not qualify a person to be a judge," he said. "There are different types of cases. Judges must make instantaneous ruling on (evidence in) cases day in and day out."

Wilson said he averages a dozen jury trials a year and 20-30 non-jury trials.



Atkins said any perception that he lacks trial experience is erroneous.

"Most of my trial experience has been in criminal law. I have tried homicide cases, both as the defense and prosecution," Atkins. "I have prosecuted the only two death penalty cases that have been brought in the 12th judicial district since the reenactment of the death penalty."

Atkins said he also tried a number of cases as public defender. For the first three years, it was a one-attorney district, he said and he tried several first-degree murder cases at that time.

"I think my trial experience is far superior to my opponent's," Atkins said. "I have to admit that my career has focused on criminal law and public service, but I don't think I'm going to have any difficulty learning the civil procedure."

Atkins said he doesn't think he will be biased toward the prosecution side of cases. Several judges now on the bench formerly were district attorneys, he pointed out. Wilson also served as a D.A., he added.

"I think there certainly will be some initial conflicts," Atkins said

about the possibility that he will have to excuse himself from some criminal cases. "The court this year has been primarily assigning division IV to hear civil matters. We'll pick that case load up. I should be able to hear children's court very quickly, because the time limits on them are so short. I should be hearing criminal cases fairly soon after that."

The question of whether Wilson's religious dedication might improperly influence his actions on the bench has been raised during the campaign. The phrase "Jesus is Lord" is printed on his business cards.

"That was one of the first questions asked by the judicial selection commission back in January," Wilson said. "I make no bones about the fact that Jesus is Lord of my life. It's not something that I try to hang on everybody, but it's important to me."

"There are a number of born-again Christians in judicial positions. It's not a problem for them. I don't think it would be a problem for me. I think some of the people who are uncomfortable with that look at some of the television evangelists, the self-righteous, holier-than-thou aspect and things that have been giving Christians a bad name for 2,000 years."

Wilson said his religious convictions would not affect his handling of death penalty cases.

"That question came up in the judicial commission too," he said. "I don't consider myself an advocate of the death penalty, certainly not the way it is not working now. I don't believe we have found a mistake-free way of determining guilt or innocence and you can't unexecute someone."

"But as a practical matter, nowadays, the decision as to whether the death penalty should be imposed or not, is decided by a jury. If I was presiding at a trial and the jury decided, I would have no conflict ethics-wise in signing the verdict."

Ellis House owners attribute strange events to ghostly woman

House bed and breakfast never pays a dime, because she doesn't require a bed or food.

Owners David and Virginia Vigil have never really seen her in the historic Lincoln lodge, but they're

sure she's there."

Since she's never told them her name, they've dubbed her Veronica. The Vigils first met Veronica a few weeks after buying the structure in January 1993. David was alone in the kitchen after others had gone to bed when he heard "an operatic tra-la-la," as he describes it, followed by laughter. Neither Virginia or friends helping with the remodel would claim the noises.

Instead, their friends' daughter Angela asked the Vigils the next morning, "Did you come into our room last night?" Angela explained she had closed the door to her bedroom tightly, but it opened and closed during the night and woke her up.

The Vigils and their friends decided they just had their first experience with what they believed to be a ghost.

"I've never seen a ghost before, but I've always felt there was something..." David relates.

Since they opened their bed & breakfast, it's not uncommon for guests to query, "Did somebody look in our room last night?" Some guests purposely come to the inn to stay or have dinner because they've heard about Veronica.

An experience the Vigils had while remodeling may help explain Veronica's history, but the Vigils haven't made any connections yet.

David was digging up a floor when he found a cowboy boot and, when he continued digging, a bone. A local historian said the boot was constructed in the late 1800s, and a nurse told them the bone was a human femur. Virginia asked

David to rebury the bone, and he did.

One former long-time resident and owner of the Ellis House, Fronie Ramey, said she never felt there was a ghost in the house. Maybe the digging brought Veronica out. Maybe Ramey didn't experience it because she doesn't believe in ghosts. Or, maybe there is no such thing as ghosts.

But after numerous strange experiences, the Vigils say there is such a thing as a ghost.

If there is, the Ellis House would be a perfect abode for a spirit. It is apparently the oldest standing structure in Lincoln County, since much of it was constructed in 1850 by a man known as Gonzales. Its seven owners include Issac Ellis, a Regulator in the infamous Lincoln County War.

In the end room, once the bedroom of Dr. James Laws, the Vigils often hear "fussing and

chattering" when they're the only ones in the house. Guests report hearing laughter when no one's around. A light unplugged during remodeling was replugged after Virginia was alone in the house. A cake rack disappeared, then reappeared two weeks later on the kitchen counter in plain view. A securely locked screen door came unlocked when David badly needed to get through. And butcherknives, well, "You never know where you're going to find them," David says.

Only once does David believe he got a glimpse of Veronica. He was in the kitchen late at night and saw something, "a wisp," go by. "But she's never really manifested herself," David says.

Stephen Reyes, an artist friend intrigued by his experiences with Veronica, recently drew a painting of her, even though he'd never seen her either.

"He just thought about her," David explains. "He said, 'I really got a good feeling for what she looks like.'"

The painting now hangs over the bar in a prominent place.

"That's where she belongs," David smiles.

New regional forester warns of fire danger here

The new southwest regional forester for the U.S. Forest Service assured ranchers and pledged cooperation in land management work in Ruidoso.

He also warned that homes in Ruidoso are at high risk for a forest fire. "If I lived in a community here, I'd be concerned about a lack of defensible space," said Charles Cartwright, the Forest Service's first African-American regional forester. "Driving up here I see trees right next to houses, old shingle siding and lots of dead on the ground and on roofs."

Fire that swept through sections of Lincoln County last year captured the attention of residents, said, "and now we need to take advantage of that by sharing information with them."

"We have a lot of federal land in Ruidoso that extends into the town and the ranger is going to show people exactly what defensible space means. Those are the kinds of things where we can involve the county and other local agencies. It's going to require interpretation and education."

Defensible space in this context is a wide swatch of "clean" area around a home without trees and fuel sources.

Cartwright was speaking at a reception held at the Forest Service's Smokey Bear District office in Ruidoso.

Cartwright, who will be based in Albuquerque, said he aims to run interference for his staff, to allow them time for on-ground management of the natural resources.

He seeks cooperation, not confrontation, he said. And he agreed that "analysis paralysis"

has hindered the Forest Service from moving forward on many programs.

He promised action. "I tend to make things happen," Cartwright said.

Several ranchers told him they were frustrated with the government's handling of their public lands allotments (used for grazing).

He prefers to involve permit holders in decisions about the land, Cartwright said, but added he has no options in some situations. He has to comply with laws and ensure the permittees also comply.

"The bottom line I'm looking at is the natural resource," he said. "As long as I can see that the grass is there and it will survive after grazing and the resource still is healthy, you'll have the land."

In taking over the regional forester's duties, Cartwright assumes leadership of 11 national forests and one national grassland in Arizona and New Mexico. One of nine regional foresters, he took the position after a 26-year federal career.

It was a career of many firsts, starting in 1967, when he joined the Forest Service as a temporary fireman/lookout tower person on the St. Joe National Forest in Idaho.

In 1979, he became the first African-American district ranger in Washington. In 1988, he was named supervisor of the Jefferson National Forest in Virginia, the first African-American forest supervisor in the history of the Forest Service.

As assistant director for ecosystem management in 1992, his messages on the value of diversity to maintain the health of a natural ecosystem set the guiding principles for both natural resource and organization management in the Forest Service.

This happened to be on my birthday - so here was a birthday cake with the number 85, and a room full of folks including the new regional ranger all wishing me a happy birthday.



Chip said to me: "You have been here this long, and that means that the Lord has something planned for you to do."

Dinner fights domestic violence

A spaghetti dinner, the annual fundraiser of the Family Crisis Center, is set for 5:30 to 8 p.m. on Tuesday at the Inn Credible Restaurant in Ruidoso.

Tickets are available at the door; \$5.25 for adults and \$3.75 for children under 12.

October is recognized nationally as domestic violence prevention month.

"This is a good time to be reminded that we in Ruidoso are fortunate to have a local family crisis center," said Birgit LaMothe, Ph.D., a certified mental health counselor. "The center is there to help victims of psychological or physical abuse in marriage or other intimate relationships."

By calling the Ruidoso Police

Department at 257-7365, persons may be connected with a trained volunteer who can answer questions or help in other ways, said LaMothe, who takes part in the volunteer training courses offered several times a year.

Volunteers can meet victims hospital emergency rooms or the police station, LaMothe said. If shelter is needed, they may be taken to a motel and supplied with food or clothing.

"Ever since the O.J. Simpson case broke, the interest in the subject of domestic abuse has skyrocketed. A frequently asked question is why the victims stay," in abusive relationships, LaMothe said.

LaMothe offered multiple

reasons why. "Through repeated belittling or beating by a partner, the victim develops a dependent personality, an attitude of learned helplessness," she explained. "They often are no longer capable of making sensible decisions and assuming responsibility. They may be fearful of retaliation, and with good reason."

"They may not have money or a place to go, or may stay for the sake of the children."

A free support group meets at noon Monday in LaMothe's office at 1401 Sudderth Drive, Unit 4. The group provides an opportunity to share experiences with others at different stages





Soccer team headed to state tournament

In only its second year of high school competition, the Ruidoso High School boys soccer team has earned a trip to the Class AAA state tournament.

The Warriors, champions of District 3 with a 5-1 district mark and 11-5 overall record, will face Albuquerque Academy in the quarterfinals at 10:15 a.m. Thursday at Sandia Prep in Albuquerque. The semifinals are slated for Friday with the championship game set for Saturday.

Coach Dean Hood's team defeated Silver High School 4-1 Friday to assure themselves of the No. 1 seed from District 3-AAA.

Danny Schrader scored twice to lead the Warriors past the Colts. Cory Hood added another goal and Piper Adamian scored the final Ruidoso goal.

Schrader's first goal came with 12:12 left in the first quarter. Schrader angled the ball to the far right post and past the outstretched arms of the Colts' keeper.

Ruidoso scored again at the 17:32 mark of the second period when Schrader knocked home an easy rebound to the unguarded net.

Hood's third quarter goal was header set up by a nice corner kick.

It came with 12:30 left in the quarter.

Ruidoso was able to control the ball and keep the pressure on the Colts' defense.

They will need a similar effort against a tough Albuquerque Academy team. Coach Hood said his team will have to "stay composed" versus the ball-control style of the Chargers.

Hood said the north half of the state traditionally plays a different style of soccer.

"It's more ball control and defense-oriented. We play a little different style. It's more aggressive offensively and we play the ball longer," Hood said. "They move the ball through your line and use the give and go a lot."

"We're just going to have to keep our patience. We're looking forward to it," Hood said.

The Warriors might have to adjust to quicker sweepers. Ruidoso likes to send a long pass to Schrader, Adamian or Leif Anderson for the one-on-one opportunity.

"I'm not sure we'll be able to outrun their sweepers," Hood said. "That's something we might have to adjust to."

If the Warriors win Thursday, they are guaranteed at least two more games. Friday's losers will play for third place on Saturday.

It got uglier in the second quarter. The Capitan defense consistently pinned Carrizozo deep in its own territory.

Fish ran 35 yards for another to make the score 27-0. Capitan closed out its scoring on a 2-yard run by Jayson McSwane, a 44-yard punt return by McSwane and a 10-yard interception return for a TD by Jeremy McGarvey.

"They have some good young players," Davis said of the Grizzlies. "We were in the same boat four years ago. We started the season with 13 players and ended it with 12. We know what they feel like — we've been there."

This marks the first time since 1987 Capitan has won its district. Davis credits his players.

Henriette Wyeth exhibits at San Patricio, Museum of Fine Arts

The Museum of Fine Arts in Santa Fe will recognize one of America's finest realist painters when it opens "Henriette Wyeth: Painter of Beauty," a retrospective of 48 of her still lifes and portraits, on Friday, Nov. 18.

Wyeth is a resident of San Patricio.

The museum Women's Board hosts a free, public reception Nov. 18 from 5:30 to 7:30 p.m. for the Wyeth retrospective and a companion exhibition, "Recent Acquisitions."

Several related events through the museum's outreach program will be held Saturday, Nov. 5 at Fort Meigs Gallery in San Patricio, just east of Ruidoso.

San Patricio events are scheduled from 1 to 5 p.m. at Fort Meigs. They include a slide lecture on the art of Henriette Wyeth at 1 p.m., hosted by Sandra D'Emilio, the museum's curator of early 20th-century art; a panel discussion about the artists of the Hondo Valley at 2:30 p.m.; and art activities for families from 1 to 3 p.m.

All these activities are free, sponsored by the El Paso Natural

Gas Foundation and the Museum of New Mexico Foundation with assistance from the Council for Art of the West and the Roswell Museum and Art Center.

Wife of Peter Hurd, daughter of N.C. Wyeth and sister of Andrew Wyeth, Henriette grew up in Brandywine, Penn., in a home where drawing, painting and ideas were as much a part of the environment as the forest and river nearby. Henriette pursued her own artistic vision surrounded by the famous male painters in her family.

The 86-year-old Wyeth credits her father as the main influence on her work. Says Sandra D'Emilio, curator of early 20th-century painting, "It was he who taught her to respect the simple: the elemental shape of a flower, a stone, a shell. 'Paint the light and air around the object; paint the mystery,' he would advise her."

Also important was the time she spent in Boston at the Normal Art School where she had access to the Boston Symphony and the opera that left their theatrical imprints on her. She observed that the blue light of the theater transformed small, natural objects into

something larger than life. Her imagination, as the "blue light" of the creative process, allowed her to take small things and invest them with dramatic qualities. In her realism an ordinary pitcher, a commonplace cup and saucer, or an Etruscan bust are enlivened by the interplay of light and shade.

Wyeth's portraiture is characterized by clues to a subject's personality: a portrait of her father, for example, incorporates one of his paintings. Her last portrait of her husband places importance on the much-loved landscape that welcomed her to New Mexico as his bride in 1929.

Publication of "Henriette Wyeth: The Artifice of Blue Light" by the Museum of New Mexico Press coincides with the opening. The book contains 80 color plates and an essay by Pulitzer Prize-winning author Paul Horgan. It is available for \$35 clothbound.




Halloween can be more fun with these simple safety tips

Parents can make Halloween a pleasant memory instead of a nightmare for their children by planning ahead, said a New Mexico State University family sciences professor.

Bobbing for apples, showing off costumes and playing other games are entertainment for all age groups at Halloween parties. But parents should be careful not to mix older children with those who are much younger, said Robert DelCampo of NMSU's College of Agriculture and Home Economics.

"Older children can scare the younger ones with their costumes and actions," DelCampo said. "It's a good idea for parents to escort their children to parties to reassure them of their safety."

Part of the problem with mixing age groups is that younger children easily can confuse fantasy and reality. At Halloween parties, they may become frightened of other guests or of scary stories they hear.

To avoid scaring small guests, start a party without masks on and have children describe who they are in costume.

DelCampo recommended that parents talk to their children before buying or making costumes to find out what the child wants to wear. Parents often select elaborate costumes representing ghouls or scary monsters that are not developmentally appropriate for their children's ages.

"Parents should try to be more child-focused, especially for children ages 4 to 6," he said. "Kids

can have incredibly good ideas as to how they want to dress. At that age, it's better for a child to dress as Barney or even a Power Ranger than to go as Freddy Krueger."

For older children, parents can enhance their safety while trick-or-treating by establishing boundaries and setting curfews before the big night out.

"Parents should discuss in detail the safety aspect of trick-or-treating with their children before

turning them loose on Halloween night," he said. "Remind them not to eat anything until they return home and have their treats checked by an adult. They also should walk in groups and carry a flashlight."

Other tips for trick-or-treaters include wearing comfortable walking shoes, substituting cardboard replicas for knives, swords and staying off lawns because they may have sprinkler heads or other hazards.



Editorial

Our stance on ballot amendments

The New Mexico ballot has 14 proposed constitutional amendments this year, and as usual, some are hard to decipher. One wonders if this is accidental.

The New Mexico Legislative Council Service and the League of Women Voters have drawn up pro and con statements concerning the ballot issues. These can be of immense help. We also found help from our State Rep. John Underwood, who gave us a little insight on what the legislature was thinking about when it put some of these issues on the ballot (it's not always easy to tell).

Here's our picks (minus Amendment 8, which we already took a position on):

— Amendment 1: This would take away voters' right to recall school board members. We oppose it because recall is a fundamental part of the democratic process.

— Amendment 2: This would make it harder to call a grand jury. We oppose it for the same reason as Amendment 1.

— Amendment 3: This would put a student on a university's board of regents. We oppose it because universities often already have a nonvoting student government representative on the board, and under the amendment, the governor would choose the student, not the student body.

— Amendment 4: This would change the name of the state highway commission to the state transportation commission. Fine.

— Amendment 6 (Amendment 5 was withdrawn): This would allow counties to borrow money for building repairs and the purchase of open space. Counties should be fiscally responsible and budget annually for building repair. Vote no.

— Amendment 7: This would change the name of the New Mexico state hospital at Las Vegas to the New Mexico center for gerontology and psychiatry. Under law, a constitutional amendment is needed to change the name. Vote yes.

— Amendment 9: This would allow governments to give land and buildings to businesses to promote economic development. This has too much potential for abuse and interstate battles for big businesses. Our vote is no.

— Amendment 10: This would require judges to receive 57% of the vote to stay in office on retention elections, instead of the current 51%. We're opposed to it because other candidates only need a simple majority.

— Amendment 11: This lowers the voting age from 21 to 18. We figure if they're old enough to fight in a war, they're old enough to have some say about it through the election process. Vote yes.

— Amendment 12: This would change the form of distribution of funds from the state's severance tax fund. It's a good idea because it will stabilize the amount of money that goes into the general fund annually. Vote yes.

— Amendment 13: This would change the form of distribution of funds from the state's land grant permanent funds. We support it for the same reason as Amendment 12.

— Amendment 14: This would raise the legislative per diem to \$75 and travel reimbursements to 25 cents per mile, the same as Internal Revenue Service rates. This would help avoid turning the legislature into a club of retirees and wealthy people. Vote yes.

Johnson needs to get off fence on MRS

TO THE EDITOR:

RE: Candidate Gary Johnson's public non-position on Independent Spent Fuel Storage Facility (for highly radioactive "spent" fuel rods) at Mescalero.

Confucius says: "Man who sits on picket fence ends up with rip in his knickers." Mr. Johnson's professed lack of sufficient knowledge about this issue appears to be a cover for refusing to take a public stand, which might cost him votes and support. (He also denied taking campaign money from Indians, when his campaign finance report disclosed he received \$120,000 from New Mexico Indian tribes.) Actually, Mr. Johnson has received briefings on nuclear waste issues from two White Sands scientists and has had a "sit-down" with DoE Secretary Hazel O'Leary.

However, given Mr. Johnson's "Know-Nothing" approach to a whole lot of other issues and processes important to New Mexicans and to our entire state, his lack of a stand (or candor) about the Mescalero spent fuel storage proposal isn't surprising. Nor is his so-called "challenge" to opponents to "categorically prove the dangers" of the proposed nuclear dump site. Mr.

Johnson's understanding about what is required is turned backward. It is NOT required that opponents of the project prove anything.

On the contrary, it is incumbent on proponents of the project to provide incontrovertible proof 1) that the project poses no risks to the health and safety of the Mescalero reservation residents or their neighbors (why should they or we assume any health and safety risks where none now exist?); 2) that there is equitable, moral and economic justification for out-of-state nuclear power companies to send, and for New Mexico to accept, highly radioactive waste material they don't want to be responsible for in their backyards (never mind that they have benefited from taxpayer-subsidized electricity generation that created the waste, whereas New Mexicans receive less than 1% of our electricity from nuclear generation); 3) that costs and responsibility of management and disposal of radioactive waste products generated by the storage facility (from decontamination of transportation casks and rail cars, handling spent fuel, and associated processes) will be borne by the Mescaleros and nuclear utilities, rather than state

or federal taxpayers; 4) that water necessary to operate the facility and its decontamination processes will not be appropriated and/or contaminated to the detriment of surrounding holders of water rights; 5) that costs of en route transportation infrastructure, such as emergency response team development, emergency evacuation and remediation team development, etc., all along rail routes to Mescalero are borne by the Mescaleros and nuclear utilities, rather than taxpayers; 6) that presence of the facility within visual range of ski runs of Sierra Blanca, and publicity about the facility will not seriously impact negatively on our region's agricultural and tourism industries, and 7) that allowing DoE and the nuclear power industry to sweep nuclear waste problems "off to the vast open spaces of the West," e.g. New Mexico and the Mescalero reservation, for the next 40 years is an economically viable, public health and safety responsible, and politically acceptable "interim" solution to a growing problem.

Just as sweeping household dirt under a rug fails to solve the prob-

lem, parking this waste on Mescalero land for 40 years merely gives nuclear proponents another delay during which to avoid facing up to the hard scientific and economic issues involved in peaceful uses of nuclear energy. Anyone who wishes can, with little digging, uncover hard facts that nuclear energy is not yet safe and harmless, as its proponents would have us believe (remember "Agent Orange" - government said that was safe, too!) Neither is the nuclear power industry economically viable without massive taxpayer subsidies. Palo Verde was a significant factor in the bankruptcy of El Paso Electric, and created havoc with the finances of PNM.

No, Mr. Johnson, opponents don't have to prove anything to you, to Mescalero proponents of the spent fuel storage project, to out-of-state would-be waste "dumpsters," to the DoE, or anyone. If it's your position that they do, then nobody in his right mind would want you for governor of our state, and will prove that to you at the ballot box. New Mexico doesn't need a "Know-Nothing" in any position of power, let alone in the Governor's chair.

Because Douglass' life spanned an era of great historical events, the film features analyses of the abolition movement, the nascent women's movement, the Civil War, the periods of Reconstruction and post-Reconstruction, the end of the 19th century, and the age of Empire.



Little Theater finds permanent Ruidoso home

Little Theater's new home requires big commitment.

Ruidoso Little Theater finally has a permanent home next to the post office on Sudderth Drive, after 14 years of performing at numerous temporary locations.

The permanent home allows consolidation of storage for costumes, furniture, props, lighting equipment, sound equipment, stage construction materials, plus one location for readings, rehearsals and performances.

The Little Theater had to commit to an overhead cost of approximately \$25,000 per year. That includes the costs of producing four plays per year, plus rent and utilities.

For RLT to cover the annual cost, ticket sales for nine performances of each play must exceed 80 tickets sold at \$7 per ticket. This will bring in approximately \$20,000 in revenues. For the balance of monies needed, RLT will continue to solicit play program ads from businesses, and all-important donations. Revenues above costs will be used to upgrade the theater.

Prior to a season of four plays, script reading is necessary to select the plays that RLT can produce, and hundreds of contacts must be made to obtain advertisements and donations for the programs. This must then be assembled for the printer.

For each play, readings are held by the director and assistants to select actresses and actors. Other directors, managers and assistants are obtained for stage, direction, props, lighting, sound, costumes, make-up, copy for radio, newspaper and program use, layout for posters, cleaning, design, building and tearing down of the set, contacts with publicity materials, photography, distribution of posters.

This is all done by volunteers who donate hundreds of hours.

Each play takes eight weeks of preparation, and the 12 board members are constantly involved. During this period, there are approximately 231 rehearsals.

RLT board members hope that, with advanced sales for 1995 beginning now, it can reach its goal in two or three years and be pre-sold out annually.

Home construction up 37% for year-to-date

Despite a drop in August home construction, 1994 remains a strong year in Ruidoso.

Compared to last year, the value of home construction has risen 37%. However, August 1994 saw a 27% drop compared to 1993.

The value of new commercial buildings rose a whopping 231% in August 1994 versus the previous year. For the year-to-date, commercial values are down 61%.

Construction values for this year as of the end of August total \$14.38 million, with \$1.33 million coming in August. A total of 238 permits have been issued.





HOW TO PROTECT YOUR CONCRETE SURFACES

USE OF DEICERS ON YOUR NEW DRIVEWAYS, SIDEWALK, OR PATIO COULD BE HARMFUL

You wouldn't use a strong caustic soap to clean your new wall to wall carpet. Nor would you use lye to clean your new kitchen or bathroom fixtures. In fact, you're pretty careful how you clean and take care of your new home inside, but what about outside concrete walks, drives, patio, porch and steps? Give the exposed concrete around your house the same consideration as your pretty new interior!

Most exposed concrete surface deterioration is caused by deicing chemical solutions dripping from underneath automobiles parked in driveways after being operated on wet, salted streets. Don't use any deicing salts the first winter under any circumstances. The only safe material to use to make the concrete surface skid resistant is plain sand.

Under certain conditions, deicers which contain sodium chloride (common salt) or calcium chloride may be used after the first winter. Even then it is recommended that a surface sealer be applied periodically. Contact your concrete supplier for a list of quality sealers.

If you must use deicers, NEVER use products containing ammonium sulphate. These chemicals are often packaged and sold as deicers, but they will rapidly disintegrate concrete. These chemicals, commonly found in fertilizers, should be removed immediately if accidentally broadcast onto a concrete surface.

REMEMBER

- 1) DON'T USE ANY DEICERS DURING 1ST YEAR
- 2) USE SAND (PLAIN) ANYTIME
- 3) NEVER USE DEICERS CONTAINING AMMONIUM NITRATE OR AMMONIUM SULFATE
- 4) AFTER FIRST WINTER, IF SODIUM CHLORIDE OR CALCIUM CHLORIDE ARE TO BE USED AS DEICERS, APPLY A CONCRETE SEALER FOR PROTECTION PERIODICALLY
