Voters cast their ballots Tuesday

From 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Tuesday, Lincoln County voters will head to their precinct polling places to elect top state officials, two local judges, a county commissioner and county treasurer.

County Clerk Martha Proctor said Monday more than 15 percent of the county's 7,829 registered voters took advantage of the new early voting procedure. Besides the county's 4,078 Republicans and 3,226 Democrats, 141 minor party voters and 384 non-party voters have registered.

"I'm looking for a 65-70 percent turnout," Proctor said. "I think it will be real heavy."

King picked by state's mayors

Gary Johnson may be ahead in the polls, but Gov. Bruce King is popular with New Mexico's mayors.

Ruidoso Mayor Jerry Shaw, Capitan Mayor Norm Renfro and Ruidoso Downs Mayor Joe Hayhurst joined 13 other southern New Mexico mayors last week in endorsing King for re-election.

With the latest additions, the mayors of 64 of the state's 99 municipalities have come out for King.

Four arrested on drug charges

Four Ruidoso residents were arrested early Saturday by members of the newly formed Lincoln County Narcotic Enforcement Unit after their homes were searched.

April Matjeka and David Brown were charged with conspiracy with intent to distribute methamphetamines. Marla Sowel and Kevin Caloway were charged with possession of methamphetamines, said task force commander Angelo Vega.

Vega did not have information about the ages of the people or the amount of drugs seized.

The investigation was handled by Vega and task force members deputy Frank Hopper and Ruidoso Police Det. Pete Esquibel, in cooperation with Sheriff James McSwane and other local law enforcement agencies.

The renovation of Three Rivers Campground and Trailhead north of Tularosa begins Tuesday, Nov. 15.



Ski area helps Mother Nature

Ski Apache general manager Roy Parker looked out the window of his office at the white 'popcorn' falling from the sky. A smile crept across his face.

This was the real stuff and it was coming down at a good rate mid-afternoon Friday. 'Popcorn' snow makes a good ski base and having a good base is the main concern for Parker and his snowmaking crews at Ski Apache.

To help out Mother Nature, snowmaking crews are working around the clock - conditions permitting - to put down a couple feet of man-made snow before opening day on Thanksgiving, Nov. 24.

The snowmakers started Saturday, Oct. 1, but have had only a couple days to make the white stuff because of temperatures. Thirty-five snowmaking machines are spitting out snow on 65 of the ski area's 800 acres.

They expanded their snowmaking efforts this year to include several of the runs of the Elk Quad Chair 8 lift. Buckhorn, Bull Run and Oscar's are getting man-made snow and so are the Capitan runs off Chairlift 4.

"Already we've gotten more snow than we had in December last year," Parker said. The six inches the mountain received three weeks

ago has stayed on the steep trails at the top. Parker said they've received at least a foot of natural snowfall including seven inches on Friday, Nov. 4.

Both humidity and temperature play a part in the snowmaking process. The higher the humidity, the lower the temperature needed to make snow. The lower the humidity, the higher the temperature can be.

Denny Grover helps supervise the four teams of snowmakers. Each crew will work shifts of eight hours, then put in a 24-hour shift before taking a break.

Grover and his crews are also in charge of grooming the runs. Crew members drive a 14,000-pound tractor that chops up the snow, smoothes out the surface and removes the moguls.

Grover said the beginners' trails will be groomed every day starting at 3 a.m. until the lifts open. The trails for the more experienced skier will be groomed less periodically like last year.

No improvements have been made at Ski Apache this season, other than some remodeling in the restaurant, Parker said.

The early snowfalls have Parker feeling positive about the long-term forecasts for ski season, although he admits "Our forecasts are always optimistic."

Ruidoso Downs mayor pumped river water illegally

Ruidoso Downs Mayor Joe Hayhurst and other residents have been pumping water from Rio Ruidoso illegally, the state engineer's office has concluded.

"The pump was on the property when I bought it years ago," Hayhurst said. "I was told by the previous owner that it was OK to pump the water and really didn't think anything else about it."

Hayhurst said he removed the pump as soon as he was notified.

Violators alongside Hayhurst include Rex Hollon, William E. Hall, Harold Johnson and Bill Wieland, said Craig Hipple, assistant basin supervisor for the New Mexico Engineer's Office. All were found to be pumping surface waters of the

Rio Ruidoso for irrigation purposes, after state field investigations Oct. 21.

"It doesn't appear that the pumping was done with malicious intent," Hipple said. "They simply didn't realize that what they were doing was wrong."

Hipple said engineers have no way of knowing how long the pumping has been going on, or the amount of water pumped.

New Mexico law requires valid water rights in order to pump water from rivers.

Violators of the statute, except for Hayhurst, were sent certified letters saying, "Research of State Engineer Office records indicate that you do not have a valid water right to appropriate surface waters of the Rio Ruidoso. You are there-

fore ordered to immediately remove any diversion works or pumps from the Rio Ruidoso and cease any future diversion from said river. Subsequent field investigations will be conducted to ensure that you are in compliance."

Hipple said that Mayor Hayhurst was contacted in person and agreed to remove the pump from his property.

Landowners must understand that they need to have adjudicated water rights in order to pump from the Rio Ruidoso, Hipple said, and his office will answer questions about water rights.

Judge forum brings on hot debate

The mood turned ugly in the last five minutes of a judicial forum in Ruidoso Thursday, as candidates for district judge jabbed each other's records.

District Attorney Bert Atkins, the Democratic nominee for 12th Judicial district judge, took the first swing. He picked off a number of criticisms of his opponent, ranging from unpaid taxes to a negligence suit.

Attorney Frank Wilson soon punched back, calling into question Atkins' experience in the courtroom.

Atkins said Wilson served as an appointed district attorney for nine to 10 months and then lost a bid for election.

He contended that Wilson's tenure as district attorney was known as "one of the most plea bargaining in the history of the (12th judicial district)."

During this period (1980), Wilson also was criticized by an appeals court judge for his handling of a drug case involving six men, Atkins said.

The case was dismissed and Appeals Court Judge William Henley wrote a special concurring opinion criticizing Wilson for using his office to "satisfy his own personal ends" by trying to ensure a particular judge didn't hear the case. Henley referred the situation to the bar association discipline branch.

Wilson also was sued for negligence and malpractice in 1990,

Atkins said. The case hinged on Wilson's failure to file a notice of appeal on time, Atkins said.

Not finished, Atkins went on to say that Wilson couldn't pay his federal taxes for a couple of years.

A red-faced Wilson, who later said he was steaming at Atkins'

remarks, responded by hitting what he characterized as the district attorney's lack of trial experience.

To date in 1994, 17 criminal cases have been tried by Atkins' office in Otero County, only nine resulting in guilty verdicts, he said.

First union bargaining nets teachers pay raise

Ruidoso educators negotiated a 4.5 percent salary increase during their first collective bargaining process.

The raise covers the 1994-95 school year. Three percent of the raise is contained in the collective bargaining agreement between the Ruidoso Education Association (REA), and the Ruidoso Municipal School District, while 1.5 percent was previously approved by the state legislature.

Negotiations between the REA and the school district started the week before school began and ended Oct. 28 after more than 100 hours of bargaining.

"Negotiations used to be through committees, and final decisions were still up to the school board and the administration. Now we have equal input in policy making," said Cathy Jones, REA spokesperson.

Salaries were not the only issue facing negotiators. Jones said that working conditions and other issues were important as well.

"Because it was our first collective bargaining, both teams were being very cautious," said Jones. "We all felt like it was extremely honest and productive."

Main bargaining points of the REA applied to procedures for transfers and reassignments, employee evaluations and discipline, grievance procedures, reductions in force and employee compensation.

"Everything was addressed to the satisfaction of both parties," Ruidoso Schools Superintendent Mike Gladden said. "This first formal collective bargaining was a win-win situation for both parties."

"We were able to come up with the additional three percent (raise) because of an increase in student enrollment over the district projection," Gladden said.

Enrollment for the district is 2,312 students, an increase of 114 from last year.

The salary increases will raise the school district budget by \$175,000 to \$180,000. The raise affects all employees paid on the teacher's salary schedule and licensed support, secretarial, custodial, and cafeteria personnel in the Ruidoso School System.

Ruidoso's salary schedule is the same as other New Mexico schools, Gladden said. Salaries range from at least \$22,000 yearly, with a maximum of around \$40,000, depending on qualifications and tenure.

"We have just over 200 employees in the system at the present time," said Gladden. "We all feel good about being able to justify the salary increase."

Senate Bill 95 gave the go-ahead for collective bargaining in 1992.

School board members approved the collective bargaining agreement at their regular meeting Thursday. REA negotiators ratified the agreement prior to the board meeting.

Increments and fringe benefits were not addressed in this agreement, Gladden said. Both sides agreed to cover these areas at the next budget discussions, set to begin no later than May 1, 1995.

The agreement is effective from Nov. 3, 1994 until June 30, 1995.

Beginning with the December payroll, the new salary adjustments will be retroactive to the beginning of the fiscal year, (July 1, 1994), and remain intact for the 1994-95 school year. Gladden said employees would receive a portion of the retroactive pay included over the next eight paychecks.

Bargaining for the district were Mike Gladden, Ron Hodges, Caron Snow, and Paul Wirth. Team members for the REA were Dean Hood, Cathy Jones, Sue Keaton, Dabbie Sanchez, and Deborah Thomson.

Grievances, garbage bills on county agenda

Lincoln County Commissioners will meet Thursday to handle regular monthly business and to canvass the results of the general election.

The meeting begins at 9 a.m. in the county courthouse in Carrizozo. On the agenda is a request to schedule a public hearing on a proposed new collective bargaining ordinance.

When the state legislature approved allowing public employees to bargain for the terms of their employment in 1992, the county commission passed an ordinance leaving it up to the state to handle grievances.

But the county and several other government entities were challenged in court over flaws in their ordinances. The issue wasn't a major problem at the time, because it appeared that county employees weren't interested in a union or collective bargaining.

That situation has changed and County Attorney Alan Morel has put together a proposed ordinance that would create a local grievance

board and not cede control to the state.

"It's coming out of the sheriff's department and the Fraternal Order of Police," said County Manager Carolin Cooney. "We're moving to rescind the ordinance we had in place and to adopt a new one. It wasn't done earlier, because we hadn't heard anything and thought nobody was interested in this."

The commission also has scheduled an appearance by Joe Lewandowski, manager of the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority.

Cooney said she Monday was scheduled to meet with Lewandowski and Morel to work out a new approach to collecting overdue bills.

Commissioners have complained about the authority's attorney filing and foreclosing on liens for the bills in the name of the county, even though that power was conveyed under a joint powers agreement.

Cooney said the authority probably will follow a less expensive method similar to that used in Doña Ana County, where liens are

The Dreamer Indian second summer impressed pilgrims

November's First Day

After several days with frosty mornings and light wind, November arrived with a morning temperature of 40.

The sky overhead was the clearest crystal-pure blue sky, with the golden sun beaming down upon a world bright with autumn leaves and their colors shining in their brilliant best, to celebrate a welcome to November's first day.

By ten o'clock, the temperature had risen to 80 degrees, and the very light breeze was fragrant with the flavor of the leaves on the river trees: golden bronze oak, sunlight yellow cottonwood crimson, wild cherry, lemon yellow walnut and pure golden box elder.

The oak brush all along the vast hillsides forms patterns all among the pinon, pine, and cedar of pumpkin yellow, Halloween orange, sunlight yellow, light crimson, pink and light purple, all blending one into the other.

This hillside tapestry all along the running river is softened under a veil of purple mist.

The first day of November was welcomed by perfect Indian Summer weather.

My friend Ernest McDaniel and I were talking about the origin of the name "Indian Summer."

Ernest said that it goes back to the days of our pilgrim forefathers, who were welcomed as

friends and neighbors by the Native Americans whom they called "Indians."

In that northern climate, there would often come severe weather late in the fall. This would be followed by some warm, summer-like days. This would give the Indians a chance to finish gathering in their crops for the winter.

This caused the pilgrims to say, "These people have a second summer."

So the warm interlude between the fall and the late autumn and winter became known as "Indian Summer" throughout the nation. It has special mention in the Encyclopedia Britannica.

The first of November was truly a "Second Summer" for the pinon jays, stellar jays, snow birds, and squirrels, who were busy all day

feeding and storing up supplies for the winter.

Leaves Flying in the Wind

Now, today, the wind is singing down the vale, and playing wind-harp chords in the branches of the river trees, and sending the leaves flying from the trees, whirling and spinning through the air, rolling, and bouncing over the mountain meadows dancing to the music of the Indian Summer Wind.

You might call this day "Indian Spring" since it is so much like March.

Leaf Boats on the River

Some of the leaves fly into the river that glides along crystal clear stream under the tunnel of over-arching trees. Here they become small boats floating along with the shadows clearly outlined on the stream bed, boats of oak, walnut, giant willow, cottonwood, aspen, and wild grape.

They go drifting down the river to the wind music in the trees, "The Lullaby of the Leaves," from the title of a popular song of years ago.

For this first column, Jim Riggins, the new manager of the Lincoln County Humane Society, suggested starting with the basics.

"I find people who come in to reclaim their dogs seem to be vaguely aware they're supposed to spay and neuter their pets, but they just look blank when I mention a license," Riggins said. "Most don't realize that the villages in the county all have licensing requirements."

Pet owners in Ruidoso are required to pay \$5 a year for a cat or dog license, if the pet is neutered. But if an unaltered dog is found wandering loose and is impounded, the price tag really jumps.

To reclaim the animal, the owner faces a \$25 impound fee, plus a \$5 per day boarding charge; a \$25 license for an unaltered pet (a charge that must be paid each year now that the owner and pet are entered into the shelter and village's computer records); and \$25 for a permit to allow the unaltered animal to live in the village as an exception to the mandatory spay and neuter law for pets over the age of six months. If the animal has not been vaccinated for rabies, an additional \$7.50 charge for a certificate to redeem at a veterinary clinic also will be charged.

"If they want to breed the animal, they're looking at a \$25 breeder's license," Riggins said. "The unaltered permit may buy them a year's time, but the least expensive thing to do is to neuter the animal immediately and next year,

the charge will drop back to the regular \$5 license.

"The point I'd like to make with folks is that getting an animal neutered now costs less than if it gets away and ends up here, because all the good intentions mean nothing then. I have to charge the full amount."

In most cases, the neutering also will have a positive effect on the health and personality of the animal, he added.

Riggins said he's only following village ordinances.

"I can't barter with someone on this," he said. "It's the law. They are set in cement and everyone must be treated the same."

While the shelter can dispense the necessary licenses and permits for pet owners living inside the village of Ruidoso, other villages handle their own licenses. All of the villages have enacted leash laws that require pets to be contained on the owner's property or on a leash when off the property. Impound officer Peggy Williams handles the calls in Ruidoso through the police department.

Pet owners in Capitan can buy licenses at village hall (354-2247). The price is \$5 for neutered dogs or cats, \$10 for fertile and half each charge for senior citizen pet owners.

Capitan trustees recently hired Johnny Parker as animal impounding officer, because the problem of loose animals was growing. Under an agreement with the humane society, most lost Capitan pets will be taken to the humane shelter on Gavilan Canyon Road outside

Ruidoso, where the same impound fees will be charged.

The license fees in Ruidoso Downs are \$10 for fertile animals and \$5 for neutered and can be purchased at city hall (378-4422). Impound fees are charged and impound officer Tom Armstrong holds the animals for three days. Limited space places severe restrictions on his ability to keep animals for a longer period.

Licenses in Carrizozo also can be bought at city hall (848-2371). The charge is \$5 for fertile animals and \$3 for neutered dogs or cats. Impound fees run \$3 per day and the owner must appear in court on a citation after the first written warning.

filed, but no action is taken for three years.

"They notify the credit bureau and usually, within three years, the person tried to buy a car or take out a loan, or get a credit card and the lien will prevent that until it's paid," Cooney said.

If the issue is resolved, the commission will cancel a meeting set for 7 p.m. Nov. 14.

Commissioners are expected to approve a contract with Lloyds of Logan to remodel the Corona Senior Center. The project could be completed within 90 days.

A public hearing is set for 10 a.m. for an ordinance that would form a public land use council.

Artist's work displayed in governor's office

A personal distaste for wasting resources of any type led Sandra Hartley into a new field of art and a new look in furniture.

Through Dec. 6, one of Hartley's fiber art creations will be part of an exhibition in the governor's office in the capitol building, as an extension of the Fine Arts Museum in Santa Fe.

Hartley is banking on receiving exposure to a new clientele with the exhibit. Her art can coordinate with any interior design, wall paper and color scheme, and she hopes this will broaden the appeal of her work.

An artist in varying mediums for decades, Hartley started her Unique Creations business after visiting a home of a friend, who had accumulated boxes of five-inch (long) wooden dowels.

"I wanted to do something with my cabinets and thought, just maybe I could use the dowels,"

Hartley said. Soon after, she acquired bags of wool scraps from another friend.

She began wrapping the dowels with the wool, creating a design of subtle shades of colors washing into one another. She then covered the dowels with glass that she had etched. The effect for her cabinets was dramatic, and this convinced Hartley the method could be used in a broader context.

"I really got excited, but I had no money, so I went to several local woodworkers such as Tom Howe, Terry Smith and Randy English," Hartley said.

They created the basic Southwestern furniture and she added the color with her wrapped dowel. The wool designs range from traditional Native American to Hawaiian. Practically anything between can be translated from imagination to dowel, she said. The result appears woven, similar to

tapestry. Her benches, partitions and cabinets have been featured in Ruidoso shops including the *Penton Gallery* on Sudderth Drive, and they can also be seen in the bookings office of the Ruidoso Civic Events Center off Mechem Drive.

"The work is so custom that I almost have to work around what's happening, because if I'm just a shade off, the piece will be unacceptable," Hartley said.

She also handles accessory pieces that are smaller and can be carried to shops more easily.

"But the situation there is that you can't convince someone to show you at most places until you are well-known, and you can't become well-known until you are shown," she said.

Hartley's work will be exhibited in June 1995 at the Sweeney Center in Santa Fe and in October 1995 at the Santa Fe Furniture Expo.

In 1993, 12 cases went to court and four resulted in guilty verdicts.

"On which of those 22 cases was (Atkins) the trial attorney doing the job a judge must do day in and day out?" Wilson asked, referring to Atkins' practice of using assistant district attorneys to handle cases. "He has no courtroom experience and yet expects you to elect him as judge."

Contacted Friday, Wilson said everything Atkins brought out he previously disclosed to the judicial selection group before it recommended him for the judicial appointment.

In answering Atkins' remarks, he said:

—He is on a monthly schedule for payment of back federal taxes. He is not delinquent.

—Although an appeals judge disagreed with his handling of a drug case and his effort to ensure a particular judge didn't hear the case, the state bar association's dis-

ciplinary arm took no action against him. He received no warning or reprimand.

Referring to Atkins' change of approach in the last few minutes of the forum, Wilson said, "It's just unfortunate and disappointing that in a judicial race among professional attorneys that Bert chose to do this."

But Atkins defended his move.

"I believe there were certain issues that needed to be brought to the public attention regarding (Wilson's) claim to expertise," Atkins said. "There are certain experiences he's had that I don't desire to have in my own career. I had been expecting many of these issues to come out (during the forum)."

In reference to Wilson's remarks about his experience, Atkins said he acted as lead attorney on a first degree homicide case in late 1993.

He usually allows his assistant district attorneys to try cases, Atkins said, "because I'm very involved in the administration of that office and it's a time consuming



CVB sends requests to village

Ruidoso should seek a convention planner and hire an advertising firm to cover all municipal tourism advertising, the Convention Visitors Bureau (CVB) Ad-Hoc Committee agreed at its last meeting.

The committee was established to find ways to increase convention business during slow tourism periods, and take advantage of Ruidoso's new convention center.

The committee will recommend village council issue two requests for proposals (RFP's), one for a visitor's bureau/convention planner, and another for advertising.

The convention planner and visitor's bureau will be under the same RFP so overlapping duties can be addressed and money can be saved.

According to a committee hand-out, the convention planner, working from the visitor's bureau, would be responsible for providing "one-stop help" for people organizing conventions or conferences in Ruidoso. The planner would work

with all lodging establishments using the Ruidoso Convention and Civic Center. This "one-stop help" would include booking the necessary meeting facilities, helping to arrange alternate activities, banquets, tours, and other similar functions.

Currently the visitors bureau is located at, and managed by, the Ruidoso Chamber of Commerce.

State Rep. John Underwood said earlier he will sponsor state legislation to get \$250,000 for construction of a visitors bureau facility.

Lodgers tax revenues could help fund the operation of a visitors center, said Village Manager Gary Jackson.

The RFP contract for the advertising would include all of the advertising currently done through the village's Lodgers Tax Committee (LTC), its contracts and the advertising that is currently done in-house for the Ruidoso Convention Center. The LTC would be responsible for overseeing this contract with council approval. By combining all ad dollars, the committee handout states, the village


should realize less duplication of ads, maximum use of advertising buying power and better coverage of marketing areas.

The chamber is eligible to submit bids on the RFPs, committee members said.

Some chamber members had previously expressed concern that the chamber was being ignored by the committee. Those at the latest meeting agreed that communication between civic center operators, the chamber and the CVB would be in the best interest of the community.

Additional funds for a CVB could be affected by a New Mexico Scenic and Historic Byways designation being sought by the Village of Ruidoso for the Lincoln County Loop. The loop runs from Ruidoso along State Highway 48 to Capitan and Lincoln and back through Hondo on U.S. 70. Approval of the designation could make federal money available for tourism promotion along the route.

The next CVB Ad-Hoc Committee meeting is at 3 p.m., Wednesday, Nov. 16, at Village Hall.

The Warriors extended their winning streak to three games, improved to 6-5 overall and finished with a 3-2 district mark.

After a sluggish start, the Warriors played mistake-free football and dominated the game with a defense that put a chill in the T or C offensive attack.

Ruidoso's defense held the Tigers to less than 100 yards in total offense.

"One of the big keys for us has been our defense which has rose to the occasion the last several weeks," Carter said. "Our whole defense did an outstanding job."

After the Tigers fumbled on their first possession and Ruidoso returned the favor, T or C capitalized on the Warriors' mistake. Running back O. J. Hechler swept around the left side 56 yards for the first touchdown in the game. His point after gave the Tigers a 7-0 lead with 3:33 left in the quarter.

That turnover and ensuing TD seemed to wake up the Warriors.

"I think we were a little cautious, a little tight at first," Carter said.

Senior quarterback John Echols said the motivation was simple.

"We realized it was finally time to get to the football playoffs," he said.

From then on, the Warriors dominated. Ruidoso responded with a 10-play, 62-yard scoring drive.

Rex Comanche ran it in from four yards out with 9:46 left in the second quarter. The pass for two failed and Ruidoso trailed 7-6.

On the Tigers next possession, they coughed up the ball on a bad snap exchange. Soules had his second recovery of the night and the Warriors were knocking on the door again.

Kyle Humphreys broke free for a 33-yard touchdown run that put the Warriors up for good. Brandon Eamellos kick gave Ruidoso a 13-7 lead at halftime.

Ruidoso almost scored again in the waning moments of the second quarter, but the Tigers put up a goal line stand.

Ruidoso took advantage of another Tiger turnover at the start of the second half. David LaMay scored from six yards out. Eamello tacked on the extra point for a 20-7 lead.

T or C continued to self-destruct, giving the Warriors a safety when a snap sailed over the head of its punter.

Ruidoso's final score came in the fourth quarter. LaMay ran four yards to cap off a nine-play, 40-yard

drive. While the Ruidoso offense cranked out more than 300 yards in offense, the defense handcuffed the Tigers.


"Once we started to play, we kind of took them out of their game," Carter said. "Our interior defensive line is unselfish because they take out the blockers so they don't make a lot of tackles. Everybody's been very disciplined on that defense."

Carter said linemen Eustace Gallerito, Jesse Fromknet, Robert Guardiola and Zach Turner have been instrumental in the Warrior's success on defense.

Four weeks ago, the Warriors were 3-5 and seemingly out of the playoff picture. Did Carter have any doubts?

"We never quit believing. We just knew if we could turn that corner we could beat some people," Carter said. "They (the players) are sky high. This is something they've dreamed about since they were little kids."

And now, the community will get to see how far the Warriors will take those dreams.

Sophomore America Sandoval took seventh place with a time of 23:12. She was followed by freshman Christy Smith (11th, 24:15), junior Nancy Palmer (14th, 25:09), senior Pam Higginbotham (16th, 26:03), freshman Heidi Mitchell (17th, 27:36) and sophomore Althea Palmer (19th, 28:14).

"The team is very young but competed well on Saturday," Maskew said. "I think we will see some very good things from this team in the future."

Maskew said the boys team also ran well Saturday but the narrow one-point loss was "a big disappointment."

"With seven runners we had seven chances to pick up that one point and we just didn't do it," he said. "Surely, we learned a very good lesson about the importance of all runners on the team. It's a tough way to learn but it may help us more down the road."

Ezra Sandoval led the boys' efforts with a third place finish. Sandoval finished the course in 18:06. Kody Sparks was seventh (18:45) and Johnny Martinez captured eighth place (18:47).

The remaining Warrior finishers were junior Tim Skinner (10th, 19:05), sophomore Eran McManemy (11th, 19:07), freshman Alley Hosetosavit (14th, 19:33) and freshman Michael Hufstedler (17th, 19:48).

For the first few minutes of the first quarter, it looked like the Capitan Tigers might be in for a fight during their quarterfinal football game against Dulce High School's Hawks.

But it was all an illusion. The Tigers quickly and efficiently put the Hawks away and advanced to

the semifinals with a 42-0 thumping in the Class A football playoffs.

Capitan improved to 10-1 overall. Dulce ends the season with a 2-7 mark.

State's early voting law working in this county

New Mexico's efforts to get out the vote appear to be working in Lincoln County. This is the first year voters can go to the polls before the usual election day. In fact, you could have voted 40 days early.

Maybe people want to avoid lines, although lines don't seem to be a problem in this county. Maybe they like getting absentee ballots without giving a reason, so they can talk things over at the dinner table (although this is resulting in some spouses getting their ballots mixed up).

By Friday, 1,152 people in Lincoln County had already voted, with 302 voting in person in Carrizozo and the rest mailing in absentee ballots. Most of the early voters came from Ruidoso, County Clerk Martha Proctor says.

Proctor is surprised by the early heavy turnout, and expects it to carry over into Tuesday's crowd.

This county can be proud that it has one of the highest percentage turnouts in the state so far.


Let's try to make our overall numbers high. If you haven't voted yet, do it. Here in Ruidoso, it's pretty easy because all the village precinct polls are located at the civic events center. Take our election guide from Thursday's paper, mark your favorites, and make it even simpler by taking the guide into the polling booth (that's OK to do - just don't wear a shirt supporting a candidate, or they'll make you leave or strip).

The new system seems to be working well, although it may need some finetuning. As Proctor points out, people can start voting before the deadline to register, so some people come in to register and vote at the same time. Clerks are forced to check the voter's history quickly, and this could cause confusion and mistakes.

Other broader issues crop up, too: are voters filling out their own opinions, or getting them from someone else when they have the ballot at home? Early voters may cast their ballots and then change their mind when an event occurs in candidate debates. And it's hard to analyze voting by precinct when so many people from different precincts are lumped into the absentee column.

But, in the end, anything to get more voters to the polls is worthwhile. We're just sorry they need to be pushed.

Hopefully we won't have to go to the same lengths remembered by Proctor when she was growing up in the Hondo valley. Back then, candidates got out the vote by going door-to-door with offers of whiskey.

Nuclear misinformation

TO THE EDITOR:
The curious letter from F.A. O'Hara printed Oct. 27 contains considerable misinformation, as well as inaccuracies, despite purporting to clear up misinformation.

Dr. O'Hara states that "high-level waste originates from nuclear fuel reprocessing" and goes on to point out that "spent fuel" and reprocessing wastes "are not the same." While it is true that nuclear fuel reprocessing wastes and spent reactor fuel are not the same, they both are classified by the Nuclear Regulatory Commission and the Department of Energy's Office of Civilian Radioactive Waste Management (NRC and OCRWM) as high-level radioactive wastes. Incidentally, reprocessing of spent nuclear fuel was banned in the U.S. in 1979.

His second point, that "disposal" and "temporary storage" (e.g., in a monitored retrievable storage or MRS facility, or an independent spent fuel storage facility installation, or ISFSI) are not the same, is technically correct, but irrelevant. Anyone familiar with the current difficulties at Yucca Mountain, Nevada, the DOE's proposed permanent repository site, has to be aware of the very real prospect that "temporary" above-ground storage at an MRS/ISFSI has the potential to become a de facto semi-permanent storage site. So far as DOE's public policy pronouncements have made clear, "disposal" of spent fuel and other high-level radioactive wastes, with or without "some degree of permanence," is not the aim. Long-term storage, with assurance of retrievability, appears to be the focus of OCRWM's mission. Currently, containment of high-level radioactive wastes and spent fuel does not exist in deep geologic repositories, although that is the present goal of OCRWM at Yucca Mountain.

Governor King's unwavering opposition to the introduction of high-level radioactive wastes from other states into New Mexico reflects an intelligent, principled position on the issue. There are many more reasons to support him in the upcoming election; this merely underscores his unquestionable qualifications to continue as our GOVERNOR.

Response to 911 complaint

TO THE EDITOR:

With the approval of Ruidoso Police Chief Lanny Maddox, I would like to respond to the "Letter to the Editor" printed on Oct. 20 regarding the Ruidoso 911 service as submitted by Mr. Romero of Portales.

I would like to clarify the misconceptions that were portrayed in the article regarding 911 in this area.

The location at which a 911 call is received is known as the Public Safety Answering Point (PSAP). The Ruidoso Police Department is the PSAP for the villages of Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs, and a small portion of Mescalero. The Lincoln County Sheriff's Office is the PSAP for Alto, Carrizozo, Capitan and all other locations and communities in Lincoln County. From my interpretation of Mr. Romero's letter, it is assumed that the call was handled by the Ruidoso 911 system. The call in question, in fact, was not the jurisdiction of the Ruidoso Police Department, and was received by the Lincoln County

Sheriff's Department in Carrizozo.

Mr. Romero goes on to write that her parents inquired about the call in question but were told it was not recorded. She does not state from which Law Enforcement Agency the information was obtained. Of course, if the Ruidoso Police Department was the agency contacted, it would have no record of the call because this was not the location from which the call was answered. The Lincoln County Sheriff's Office would have been the proper agency to contact and may have some record of this call. Audio recordings are made of all calls into the Ruidoso Police Department Dispatch. There are also written logs of all calls that are dispatched, including response times. There is a written Policy and Procedures regarding all 911 calls, and every single call is taken seriously, and handled appropriately. If the call in question would have been in our jurisdiction, it would have been categorized as a suspicious situation, and dispatched as such.

All dispatchers at the Ruidoso Police Department are certified by the State of New Mexico, and are trained in Emergency Medical Dispatch. I would also like to point out there are at least two police officers on patrol duty at all times, 24 hours a day, every day in the village of Ruidoso. This allows response time to be as quick as possible.

I am a communication detention officer at the Ruidoso Police Department, and I believe I speak for my fellow employees when I say we take pride in performing our duties to the best of our abilities, in the Ruidoso 911 system, and in our service to the community of Ruidoso. I hope this letter answers the questions posed by Mr. Romero, and thank you for allowing me to clear up these misunderstandings.

Hunter survival leaflets offered

Members of White Mountain Search & Rescue will hand out survival leaflets to hunters and conduct a survey in the north and south sides of the Capitans, in the Jicarilla area, and around Corona this season.

The leaflet offers some proven common sense rules to help hunters avoid trouble, said Melinda Headly, president of White Mountain Search and Rescue (WMSAR).

These rules include: never hunt by yourself, tell someone where you are going and when you plan to be

back, give yourself plenty of time to get back before dark, and be prepared for bad weather. Wear clothing for the worst potential conditions. Check the weather report before going out. Assemble and carry a practical survival kit.

The leaflet's ideas for the survival kit include a good first aid kit, a plastic whistle for signaling, fire starter and water proof matches.

Search and Rescue officials advise lost hunters to admit they are lost, stop and stay put, and wait for rescue. Think positive and know

how to use the survival kit. The leaflet also give numbers to call to report a lost, injured or stranded hunter.

The leaflets will be available where hunting and fishing licenses are sold, and at cafes and gas stations, Headly said.

New Indian program office in Santa Fe

In an effort to better address Indian trust responsibilities and enhance relationships with Tribal governments, the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) has created a Native American Program Office (NAPO), BLM Director Mike Dornsek has announced.

Located in Santa Fe, the program office reports directly to the deputy director of the BLM and functions as a field staff for the director on Indian policy issues.

"The office's functions are national in scope, will facilitate coordination, and will provide easier ac-

cess to BLM field offices and Native American communities and representatives," Dornsek said. NAPO consolidates, in one place, responsibilities formerly dispersed throughout the BLM.

The office will develop and coordinate guidance, policy and training support related to a broad spectrum of BLM programs affecting Native Americans. Creation of NAPO also ensures more effective BLM coordination with other agencies, departments, and Indian groups and organizations, he said.

Electronic deposits save state food stamp money

The State of New Mexico is saving an average of \$50,000 each month by distributing social service benefits with electronic deposits.

Food stamps and Aid to Dependent Children are paid out electronically to client accounts in Bernalillo, San Juan, Torrance,

Sandoval and Valencia counties. Santa Fe and Dona Ana counties will soon join the program.

The savings come from accounts used by clients who leave the program. The state reclaims the money after accounts are dormant for a year.



"The Battle of the Bulge"

In August of 1944, it looked as if the war in Europe was coming to an end. Hitler was on the run; the Allies had triumphantly regained Paris, as well as Casablanca, Tripoli, Naples, and Rome. Rumors started circulating that soldiers would be back home for Christmas, while headlines in Washington spoke of the challenge of peacetime conversion.

It came as a total surprise when on December 16th, 1944, thirty German divisions — a quarter of a million strong — roared across an 85-mile Allied front, from southern Belgium to the middle of Luxembourg. Secretly planned down to the last detail by Hitler himself, the invasion was designed to split the American-British alliance, setting them to quarreling and permitting the Fuhrer to negotiate a favorable peace. The losses on the first day were massive; in some places, the Allies were outnumbered ten to one.

Hitler, however, had one final card to play. In December 1944, he struck back with a counterattack that has come to be known as The Battle of the Bulge — the single biggest and bloodiest battle American soldiers have ever fought — in which nearly 80,000 Americans were killed, maimed, or captured.

By Christmas, the German offensive had opened a bulge some 50 miles into the Allied lines, forcing the biggest mass surrender of American soldiers since Bataan — some 4,000 men in a single day.

To mark the 50th anniversary of this landmark battle, The American Experience presents "The Battle of the Bulge," a 90-minute film hosted by historian and author David McCullough.

But General Eisenhower decided that this was the Allies' chance to end the war once and for all. Across the rolling hills and dark forests of Belgium and Luxembourg, more than half a million young men were thrown into the cauldron.

"The Battle of the Bulge" looks at the battle through the eyes of U.S. soldiers and combat officers in the field — the young men charged with holding the line and closing the bulge. In their own words, they describe the events leading up to the attack: the unpreparedness and surprise of the Allied forces; and the grueling physical psychological conditions under which they fought.

The Battle of the Bulge ended in late January, 1945, when American troops made their way back to the original lines. Sixteen thousand Americans had lost their lives and 60,000 were wounded or captured; German casualties were said to be twice that. And for many veterans, the terrible battle has never ended.

Packed with newsreel and Army footage, much of it never before seen, "The Battle of the Bulge" offers an intimate, compelling chronicle of war that captures both the action on the battle's front lines and the strategy behind the scenes.

"The Battle of the Bulge" on The American Experience will be broadcast Wednesday, November 9th at 7:30 p.m. and repeats Monday, November 21st at 1:00 p.m. on KENW-TV.
