Former appraiser wins damages

The State Supreme Court has ruled in favor of a claim for unspecified damages filed by a former Lincoln County appraiser.

The appraiser, Joe Wheatley, said he was fired improperly by former County Assessor Julia Samora in 1989 after running against her in the 1988 election.

The court last week reversed a state District Court ruling in the case.

County Attorney Alan Morel said he will file for a rehearing on the case.

Wheatley worked as an appraiser for the county for four years before running for office. Samora won and fired Wheatley in 1989, citing a violation of personnel rules.

The Nut Festival will be held from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Saturday at the Otero County Fairgrounds.



Repetitive Ruidoso street names will change for emergency calls

Ruidoso residents may want to wait a few weeks before reordering personal stationery or a new set of checks.

Some addresses around Ruidoso will be changing as village officials attempt to ensure emergency personnel can find their destinations quickly.

The Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission Monday approved its recommendations for name changes that will be considered at the village council meeting Nov. 22.

"The primary issue involved is the emergency 911 telephone system," Village Manager Gary Jackson said.

When people dial 911, they connect with a central dispatch point that relays the caller's information to the proper emergency service, such as fire or police. Being able to pinpoint the exact location of the caller is essential to its effectiveness. Streets with duplicate numbers or nonsequential numbering can delay a response, Jackson said.

"We have a situation with streets with 100 at both ends, and duplicate names like El Paso and Wingfield," he said. "As the village grows and there are turnovers in personnel, it's inevitable some error will happen if we rely solely on memory."

About 50 residents attended the zoning meeting and others sent written responses to the proposed changes. Some objected to seeing a house number change, because of the bother and cost of switching signs at their homes and on printed material bearing the old names or numbers.

Zoning commissioners said those reasons were not solid enough to change village plans, but commissioners responded to some other objections.

In White Mountain Heights, the staff had suggested renaming Church Street to Roadrunner, because Church is a duplication.

But residents objected, asking instead for the street to be named Amelia, since Amelia Church was the person for whom the street originally was named.

The zoning board changed its recommendation to Amelia. The board also went along with the name of Apache Hills Drive instead

of Lula Lane, for a name change on part of Wingfield in Apache Hills subdivision.

Residents of Green Meadows Addition convinced the zoning members not to change Ridgcrest to Richards Drive. They proposed the duplicate street name in Pinecliff subdivision be changed instead. A representative of the Texas-New Mexico Power showed that residents on Ridgcrest in Pinecliff tend to be more temporary and would be less affected.

Mayor Jerry Shaw may be honored with a street named after her. Meadows Lane in the Second Addition Wingfield Homestead would be renamed Jerry Shaw Place, if the council approves the zoning recommendations.

The zoning commission rejected a request not to change Evergreen Street to Wintergreen and not to renumber Cedar Place, Spruce and Yellow Pine in Ponderosa Heights Unit Four.

One resident didn't want to change his house number and another didn't think Wintergreen sounded like the other streets in the area.

Lincoln County 7th in federal land payments

Lincoln County ranks seventh in the state this year in money it will receive from the U.S. Forest Service for its cut of income from local forest revenues.

By law, the Forest Service pays states 25 percent of the money it collects from timber sales, grazing, recreation, minerals and land uses. The money is used for schools and roads.

Lincoln County will receive \$40,484 interim and \$53,979 as total payment.

The Forest Service will pay out an estimated \$303 million to reimburse 41 states and Puerto Rico.

Interim payments totalling \$227 million are scheduled to be distributed this month, said Jack Ward Thomas, chief of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Forest Service.

New Mexico will receive \$1 mil-

lion as interim payment and an estimated \$1.4 million for the year. Neighboring Arizona will collect \$3 million as interim and \$4.1 million total.

The interim payment represents 75 percent of the estimated total amount each state will receive as its share of revenue collected during the year from the sale and use of a variety of national forest products and services.

The largest interim payments will go to Oregon at \$91 million and California at \$89 million.

Catron and Rio Arriba counties top the state list, collecting an estimated total payment of \$419,240 and \$283,716, respectively.

Other counties ahead of Lincoln are Taos at \$124,340, Otero at \$77,977, Grant at \$68,500 and Socorro at \$64,078.

Ranchers demand localized brand on federal lands

In a record show of strength, more than 100 ranchers climbed into the bleachers of the Carrizozo school gymnasium Thursday to support state takeover of federal lands.

They urged Lincoln County Commissioners to join the fight by passing a local ordinance creating a public land use advisory council. If the state asserts ownership, the board would put together management plans for the public lands within the county.

The ordinance would become part of a primarily western movement seeking to reduce the impact of the federal government on individual rights.

But county commissioners delayed their vote on the ordinance, with Chairman Monroy Montes and Commissioners Wilton Howell and L. Ray Nunley saying they first want to review legal ramifications and consider opposing comments.

About two dozen ranchers stood at the podium to argue that the lands council will be needed if New Mexico ownership of federal land is recognized and management responsibilities then pass to the county level.

Rancher Tom Sidwell ticked off a long list of what he called abuses by federal agencies, which he said create regulations by administrative action that impact private land owners.

"The main obstacle to all of our lives is government," said rancher David Bonnell. "I'd rather go a little hungry and keep our freedom rather than give it to a bunch of bureaucrats back in Washington D.C."

Ruidoso resident Dave Dale, a lone negative voice from the

audience, said he worries about protection of public lands if management is placed in the hands of a small group of local residents.

Several residents from Otero County, which already passed an ordinance, urged Lincoln commissioners to follow their lead. Joe Bonnell and other members of the Lincoln County Agriculture and Rural Affairs Committee joined in.

Federal ownership of federal land is being challenged across the West. The preamble to the proposed public lands council ordinance says New Mexico and other western states were forced to renounce any claim to the unappropriated lands within their boundaries. Proponents of the advisory council concept contend the requirement to relinquish public land violated the doctrine in the New Mexico Constitution that says it will be admitted to the union on an equal footing with the original 13 states.

Commissioners Stirling Spencer and William Schwettmann were ready to vote on the proposed ordinance.

"This is not about us taking over the Grand Canyon, this is about basic human rights," Nunley said. "I'm in support of the ranching community, but I'm also in support of common sense, and that's what we have to deal with today."

But Nunley said he assured opponents of the proposal they would have a chance to speak at a second public hearing, and he had to stand by that commitment.

Montes pointed out clerical errors in the document. Howell said he wanted another public hearing.

John Howard, an attorney from California with the Individual Rights Foundation, said his firm

Tularosa family winery featured

I've toured and enjoyed the wines of many of the world's great wine regions — Burgundy, Bordeaux, Tuscany, Rhine, Mosel, Napa, Sonoma, Tularosa...Tularosa?

The 19 commercial wineries in New Mexico have a total of 5,000 acres planted in grapevines. Tularosa Vineyards has one-tenth of one percent of that number.

This winery is truly a mom and pop operation. Dave and Teresita Wickham and their son Christopher grow and harvest the grapes on the family farm, just two miles north of Tularosa off Highway 54.

The press, fermentation tanks and visitors' tasting room are housed in an ancient military building on the premises.

Dave is a terrific host. His warm, boyish smile and ready handshake greeted me as I drove up to the winery.

He told me of his rural New York beginnings, and of his retirement from the Air Force in 1976. He then moved to New Mexico and, in 1985, began the task of turning Tularosa desert into a fertile vineyard.

Here, the Wickham family grows Chardonnay, Chenin Blanc, Sauvignon Blanc, Muscat Canneli, Grenache, Cabernet Sauvignon,

Merlot, Zinfandel and Mission. They are experimenting with some exotic Italian varietals including Brunello, Sangiovese and Nebbiolo.

Review

In the tasting room, I quickly picked my favorites. The '93 Chardonnay and Chenin Blanc are both produced in a dry style. The Chard has nice balance and a hint of oak. The Chenin has a superb nose and a fruity finish. The '93 Cabernet Sauvignon has a firm, tannic backbone which is softened, somewhat, by a small amount of Merlot.

The star of the show was the '93 Grenache, with medium body, good ruby color, a big blackberry nose and a long, lingering, fruity finish. I took home a bottle for the bargain price of eight bucks.

On Thursday, Nov. 17, Dave and his wines will be featured at a vintner dinner in the Dan-Li-Ka Room at the Inn of the Mountain Gods.

Dave will be speaking and his wines will speak for themselves.

Chef Mildowney promises to marry the wines of Tularosa with gourmet cuisine. The salmon appetizer will be served with Chenin Blanc. The tenderloin main course should shine in the company of Cabernet Sauvignon. A fruity dessert will arrive with a fruity Muscat Canneli. There will even be a sorbet made with Merlot.

has signed an agreement to represent the neighboring Otero County Commission on the issue, at no charge.

"I think what you're doing is an important step not just for the

people of Lincoln County, but for New Mexico and ultimately, the people of the United States," Howard said. "The time has come to seize an historic opportunity to assert your rights and jurisdiction over lands that properly belong to

the state of New Mexico.

Howard said a federal court action could be filed by a public land permittee who has competing fee bills from the county and the federal government. The filing would seek a court ruling on which government should be paid, and therefore which government had ownership.

Commissioner Spencer, a rancher, volunteered to be the test case claimant.

If the federal government relinquished its claim to public lands within Lincoln County, 35 percent of the 3,109,312 acres in the county would revert to the state.

It also would mean that Payments in Lieu of Taxes (PILT) paid to the county each year for non-taxable federal land would cease. That's about \$325,000 annually, but is supposed to increase.

Spencer, who's known for his tight-fisted approach to the county budget, said that shouldn't stop commissioners from moving ahead.

"Quite frankly, I'd as soon lose the damn payments if I can take responsibility for my life again," Spencer said.

The executive director of the New Mexico Wool Growers, Caren Kowan Bremer of Ruidoso, said it is a constitutional issue.

"We're not talking about grazing fees, we're out fighting for rights and to be able to pass what is ours to our children," she said. "We need Lincoln County to take a strong stand on the issue and join the other counties."

Commissioner Howell said before moving ahead, he wants to know more about Howard's firm and its backers, and he needs assurances that the state can handle the management task and any disasters connected to the land, such as forest fires.

Local funds keep federal office open

The title has changed, but the employees and their reputation for being courteous are the same.

The former U.S. Soil Conservation Service offices in Lincoln County now answer to the name of the National Resources Conservation Service.

"We're kind of a stand-alone agency now," said Sue Stearns of the Carrizozo service office.

The change is part of a two-year effort to restructure the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA). At times during the process, the future of the Capitan and Carrizozo soil conservation offices seemed at risk.

Government officials are now saying that county offices such as Carrizozo will stay open.

Although the Capitan office is scheduled to remain open now, Stearns said the general future is still uncertain because the effects of many of the 1994 Congressional decisions won't reach the on-the-ground offices until the end of the fiscal year (Oct. 1, 1995).

"Our local Upper Hondo district board plans to keep the Capitan office open, although it had been proposed for closing," she said. "The board feels we have to, since they collect (a special property tax toward its support) and we have several conservation projects in progress."

Local money, not federal, will be used to keep it open. Local funds alone could not support the operation, however.

Many of the other agencies under the USDA may be consolidated

in county seats all over the country, she said.

The U.S. Senate passed the reorganization bill Oct. 4 and the House took action Oct. 3.

"It's been a long and difficult process, but the final reorganization bill passed by Congress closely reflects districts' recommendations for streamlining USDA's Washington bureaucracy and more effectively administering the department's natural resource management programs," said Gerald Digerness, president of the National Association of Conservation Districts (NACD).

The Soil Conservation Service is among the agencies that will feel the impact of this year's cuts, said an NACD document.

Congress approved a base funding level for conservation operations of \$556 million in 1995, compared to \$591 million in 1994. Money transferred from unobligated 1994 Conservation Reserve Program funds and \$8.4 million in unobligated Wetlands Reserve Program funds will bring the total to \$588.4 million available in 1995.

Other impacts of federal government streamlining include:

— Money for the service's Watershed and Flood Prevention Program was reduced by more than two-thirds to \$70 million.

— The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service cuts included \$95 million less for its agricultural conservation program, funded at \$100 million.

This was in the days before radio and television, 76 years ago, 1918 in Ashland, Oregon, when I was nine years old.

We had play-like trenches on the vacant lot across the street from our house to play war; but we had now long since grown tired of this, and the trenches were forgotten. As time went on, my brothers and I and the neighborhood children had just about forgotten about the war.



Then on one bright sunny November day, some of my brothers and I and some neighbor boys were playing baseball on the unpaved street in front of the house when the loud steam whistles began blowing down at the railroad yards in the middle of town.

Then the front door opened and our mother came out with her arms extended and tears of joy shining in her blue eyes, calling out, "The war is over! Thank God, the war is over!"

We lived on a hill overlooking the rest of the town, and the sounds of city-wide celebration drifted up to us; people shouting, bells ringing, fireworks exploding.

The whole neighborhood came alive with rejoicing, and boys came running over with

shovels, and we set about covering up our play-like trenches, laughing and shouting,

"Hooray, hooray, the war is over!" The thing I remember most is how it caught us all by surprise, like something too good to be true. People were half stunned by the sudden, unexpected good news.

After some days, The Boys, according to the song, did start coming home to great welcomes down at the railroad station.

A vast sigh of relief swept the nation as we truly believed that the "War to End Wars" had taught mankind its lesson.

On the season of this Armistice Day, let us pray to God that the unspeakable tragedy of war may soon be gone from the face of the earth.

Let us remember all veterans in our wars with thankfulness and let us thank God for the blessing of peace in our land.



In any kennel situation, the possibility of animals contracting kennel cough is high, but the infection is not usually serious.

Jim Riggins, new manager of the Lincoln County Humane Society animal shelter, said he already has received many calls from pet owners around Ruidoso about the cough. Some of the callers purchased animals from pet shops or breeders, while others came from the shelter.

"Kennel cough is a viral upper respiratory infection of a relatively short duration, seven to 21 days," he said. "Dogs show a persistent, sometimes dry cough, and usually there's some clear nasal discharge along with it."

The infection is similar to the common cold in humans and just as elusive to treat. No cure exists; only the symptoms can be treated.

"No (preventative) vaccine has been developed," Riggins said. "Some bordatella vaccines are effective in early stages of symptoms, although their effects are slow. Kennel cough is a fairly minor and non-lethal infection. As with the common cold, however, it can open the door for more dangerous conditions such as viral pneumonia."

"For this reason, a course of common antibiotics often are prescribed as a precaution. There also are other conditions with similar symptoms at onset, such as distemper. See your veterinarian for a correct diagnosis and advice."

Riggins said he spoke with local veterinarian Dr. Lynn Willard of the Ruidoso Animal Clinic about the condition and its treatment.

Willard suggested the following steps for treatment of animals suf-

fering from kennel cough: —Keep them warm and inside, if

at all possible. —Keep them quiet.

Agitation, running or barking begin the coughing and can delay recovery.

Ruidoso's ball hogs win defensive mud battle, 14-7

You could say the Ruidoso football players were a bunch of greedy guests Saturday in Albuquerque.

After all, the Warriors had possession of the ball for 20 of the 24 minutes in the second half of their pre-playoff game with Albuquerque Academy. And it was the Ruidoso defense that scored the winning touchdown, on an interception.

Ball control offense and a stellar defense propelled the Warriors past the Chargers, 14-7, and earned Ruidoso a date with defending state champion Artesia in the Class AAA quarterfinals this Saturday.

"We've been preaching to our kids all year, 'You win championships with defense,'" Ruidoso football coach Les Carter said.

Defensive back Jackie Roe proved his coach right when he snagged a Zac Haas pass early in the fourth quarter and returned it 26 yards for the score. Roe's TD gave Ruidoso a 14-7 lead with 9:44 left in the game and that was all the Warriors would need.

It was a partly cloudy and blustery day for football. The field looked good, but after the first tackles of the game it was apparent that the after-effects of rain would linger and play a role. It didn't take long for Ruidoso's white jerseys and Academy's white pants to become brown with mud.

Both teams had trouble running the ball outside, but neither coach would admit the playing field conditions affected the outcome.

"No, it didn't affect us," Charger coach Kevin Carroll said. "Ruidoso played in the same thing and Ruidoso was just a better football team today."

Warrior coach Carter said, "It was a little tough to get outside, but they did a good job. Their Joaquin Sanchez did a super job. It wasn't an ideal situation, but our kids rose to the occasion. Now we have to get ready for Artesia."

Academy scored first in the opening period of play, after getting the ball deep in Ruidoso territory when the Warriors weren't able to punt the ball away.

The Chargers took advantage immediately, scoring on their first play from scrimmage. Billy Lujan scampered 14 yards for the score. Mike Fanning's extra point gave Academy a 7-0 lead.

Neither team could generate much offense until Ruidoso mounted a drive in the latter half of the second quarter. Junior running back Kyle Humphreys broke open for a 24-yard run and that seemed to give the Warriors some momentum.

Humphreys capped off that 69-yard scoring drive with a 2-yard TD run. Brandon Eamello's kick tied the score with 1:48 left in the half.

The Ruidoso offense moved the ball up and down the field in the second half but couldn't punch it in the endzone. Meanwhile, the Warriors' defense held the Charger offense to three downs and a punt nearly every time.

The Warriors' running game ate up the clock and the yardage.

Humphreys finished with 128 yards on 18 carries. Teammates Rex Commanche, Roe and David LaMay combined for more than 100 yards rushing as well.

"You can't generate any offense when you don't have the ball," Carroll said. "And that's to their credit. They have some kids that played real aggressive. Ruidoso just came out and played better than us."

Academy's last ditch effort in the waning moments of the game accounted for more than half of that team's total offensive output. The Chargers got down to the Ruidoso 23-yard line on a long pass play from Haas to Stephan Walker, but Roe was there to make the touchdown-saving tackle. Then the Chargers ran out of time.

Ruidoso, which improved to 7-5 overall, takes on Artesia at 1 p.m. Saturday in Artesia.



Tigers hang on for victory

Facing the No. 1-ranked Fort Sumner football team on its home field didn't phase Capitan Saturday.

The Capitan Tigers responded to the role of underdog and rallied for a 14-13 victory over the previously undefeated Fort Sumner Foxes.

Capitan's "cardiac kids" will now face Jal High School for the Class A state championship Saturday in Artesia. The traditionally-strong Panthers shut out Escalante, 42-0, to earn their trip to the finals.

This is the first trip to the state championship game for Capitan since the Tigers won the title in 1982.

"These kids always just figure out some way to find a victory," Capitan football coach Ed Davis said.

The Tigers trailed at halftime, 7-0, and then again midway through the third quarter, 13-7, before staging a comeback.

Once again, senior quarterback Michael Fish rallied his troops. His foot proved to be the difference Saturday afternoon.

After a defensive battle in the first quarter, the Foxes put together a drive. They took a 7-0 lead in the second quarter on a 35-yard pass play.

Capitan received the second half kickoff. Fish promptly tied the game when he returned the kickoff 87 yards to tie the game.

Fort Sumner reasserted itself and scored again midway through the third quarter. The Foxes went for two points, but failed and clinged to a 13-7 lead.

Now it was the Tigers' turn to mount a drive. Running back Jayson McSwaine returned the kickoff to the 35-yard line of Fort Sumner, giving the Tigers excellent field position.

But the Fort Sumner defense held and forced a Capitan punt. Then the Foxes were too aggressive in trying to block Fish's punt and were flagged for roughing the kicker, so the Tiger drive was still alive.

Junior Kali Bagby capped off the drive with a 6-yard scoring scamper to tie the game. Fish booted the extra point and the Tigers enjoyed their first lead of the game early in the fourth quarter.

Neither team was finished, and drives by both sides gave the fans lots to cheer about. Capitan nearly put the Foxes away when it got inside the Fort Sumner 5-yard line. But the Tigers were turned away.

Fort Sumner's last-ditch effort nearly succeeded. The Foxes got the ball with 2:30 remaining and drove to the Capitan 35-

yard line, but then the Tiger defense sacked Fox quarterback Ben Segura. Segura followed with two incomplete passes.

On the Foxes' last down, Segura connected with running back Benny Madrid, but Madrid was stopped short of the first down.

"I looked at the clock at that point and there were 19 seconds left," Davis said. "And that was the ballgame."

The physical, defensive game was not without its costs for the Tigers. McSwaine injured his right knee in the second half of the contest and is questionable for Saturday's game.

"We came through it with bumps and bruises and being very sore," Davis said. "It was a real hard-hitting game. We had some kids who stepped up and did their job."

Davis said his team will enter the title game as underdogs again.

"They're well-coached. They're big and they execute perfect," Davis said of Jal. "And they've got all the tradition behind them."

The Panthers make a habit of getting to state finals in football. Last year, Jal was in the Class AA title game.

Both teams agreed to play at a neutral site, Artesia.

Watching the Wild Side

The Department of Game and Fish is preparing for the next session of the State Legislature and one of their proposals is an increase in hunting, fishing and trapping licenses for residents of the state.

Resident license fees haven't gone up since 1983 and remain below the average of other Western

states for similar licenses. Sportsmen have traditionally paid about two-thirds of the funding of the Department of Game and Fish through their purchase of hunting and fishing licenses.

The legislative package also include proposals to refine certain types of licenses. Six different types

of junior, senior and/or handicapped licenses would be combined into just three types that would include them all. A Sportfish purchase would be created to replace the four different types of trout stamps currently available.

The revenue generated would be equal to that spent on hatchery operations and fish purchases for stocking public waters, including warm waters.

A reduced-fee Junior Sportfish Propagation Stamp would be available to recruit new anglers. The proposed legislative package is expected to generate about \$2 million more than the current budget if licenses are purchased in the same numbers as they were in the fiscal year just ended.

Hunting tips

Ben Hanson of the New Mexico Game and Fish Department makes the following hunting suggestions in his column, "Inside the Outdoors."

- 1) Check weather reports -- Look for storms or fronts approaching the area. Even if reports are good, prepare for the worst. Take along extra clothing and food and keep an eye on the weather. Return to camp if it starts to look bad.
- 2) Familiarize yourself with hunting area -- If venturing into a new area get maps and study them before going in. If possible arrange for a pre-season scouting trip. Pick out a prominent landmark as a guide and always plan to return one hour before dark.





1993-94 Iowa Test of Basic Skills Median National Percentile Scores By Test Area






1993-94 Iowa Test of Basic Skills Median National Percentile Scores By Test Area





Percent of 10th Graders Passing All HSCE Subtests By Year





MEAN ACT COMPOSITE SCORES BY YEAR College Bound Students






NEW MEXICO PORTFOLIO WRITING ASSESSMENT Percent of Students at Each Holistic Score





FINAL EXPENDITURES 1993-94\$Y





NEW MEXICO PORTFOLIO WRITING ASSESSMENT Percent of Students at Each Holistic Score Grade 4 District:




NEW MEXICO PORTFOLIO WRITING ASSESSMENT Percent of Students at Each Holistic Score Grade 6 District:




Percent of 10th Graders Passing All HSCE Subtests By Year




MEAN AGT COMPOSITE SCORES BY YEAR College Bound Students




1993-94 Iowa Test of Basic Skills Median National Percentile Scores By Test Area Grade 3, District: of 88

Hardest work lies ahead with gambling

The voters have spoken, and Amendment 8 has passed. We'll have a state lottery and private video gaming next year. But there's a heap of work to do before people start dumping their quarters into the machines, and that work is in the hands of state and local government.

The state legislature will decide what towns get video gaming, and what kinds of businesses. With all the lobbying they will face, those decisions will be a major task. Ruidoso will be represented by a freshman legislator, Dub Williams. We hope he catches on quick.

The legislature must also decide what kinds of taxes will be returned to communities dealing with the growth impacts of new gambling. These communities should receive enough money to insure their infrastructure keeps up with anticipated growth.

While we tend to shake our heads at government studies, this is the time to conduct one. The legislature needs to fund a good estimate of anticipated impacts on local communities, such as increases in population and tourism, and related increased needs. The study is needed before the legislature decides how much of the gambling revenue taxes should be returned to these communities. Without a state study, individual communities will each have to fund their own studies, and that's less cost-effective.

Residents should also have a say about whether they want gambling in their communities. The state's enabling legislation should require a local vote before video gaming is allowed in any community. Ruidoso and Lincoln County voters gave a solid majority to Amendment 8, but the local-option vote would take place after the legislature makes many more details clear, and after much public debate.

Since previous legislative bills have attempted to limit video gaming to a small number of resort communities including Ruidoso, our village council members should already be thinking about what planning needs to be done at the local level. We're already facing more growth than any other small community in New Mexico. Do we have the controls in place to ensure orderly growth if the population or tourism booms here? Do we have the needed infrastructure?

It may be too late to answer these questions if we wait until after the legislative session to discuss them.



Welcome to Santa Fe, Governor Johnson

"This is very exciting," a jubilant Gary Johnson said again and again as the tide of his victory in the gubernatorial race rolled in Tuesday night.

The exuberant 41-year-old Republican was weary but obviously savoring his triumph. He is only the third GOP governor in more than a quarter century. He came out of nowhere in a crowded primary field of Republican veterans. He trounced by almost 10 percentage points one of the legends in New Mexico politics, three-time Governor Bruce King, who just a year ago was widely thought unbeatable in his final run for the statehouse.

But in all the conventional wisdom that now showers the Johnson success, it's easy to obscure the stark morning-after. However remarkable the Johnson phenomenon may seem, this 1994 gubernatorial election was far more a referendum on Bruce King's anachronism than some commitment to an unknown novice, far more voter frustration and near desperation than some mass conversion to Johnson's vague right-wing Republicanism.

Left in the debris of the election night parties are realities no excitement can overcome.

First, Johnson truly is a rank amateur, a political accidental tourist, in the often savage wilds of Santa Fe governance. He not only doesn't know much about the real issues, as his campaign revealed. He understands even less about where and how real power flows in the legislature, where Speaker Ray Sanchez and Senate President Manny Aragon run a highly refined and unforgiving system of patronage and punishment, steamrolling and stoppage. When all the polite talk of election night has faded away, they are likely to cat his lunch.

If that weren't enough, beyond the legislative barons lies the great thicket of bureaucracy, responsive in the end only to its own orders and rule. This bureaucracy is as fiercely impervious to presumptuous, learn-as-you-go governors as it is to more seasoned pols.

Second, there are the very disturbing shadows hanging over Johnson's background — namely, his much-documented sharp business practices in his Big J Construction. Though reports of Big J abuses came early in the race, and then were forgotten or dimmed by the blunders of the Democrats and the sheer momentum of the contest,

they won't go away. Our new governor-elect ran a company that falsified labor certifications and other documentation of important work involving environmental hazards and other serious issues. Johnson claimed the violations and dishonesty belonged to underlings, that he knew nothing about it at the time, that he moved right away to correct the abuses. But those excuses never really washed. There remain many who worked for and around Big J who believe he and his managers knew full well what was going on, condoned if not instigated it, and then got away with a quick, beguiling coverup when the cheating was exposed in the campaign.

Johnson says he'll "never lie" as governor. But there are those who know his past who say he'll have to be watched like a hawk in the state's highest office.

Third, and not least, there is the wishful thinking that a rejection of Bruce King and his heavy regime, and the election of an unknown, I-don't-know-much replacement, will now somehow address the agonizing human problems that confront New Mexico, from still-grinding poverty and inequity to deep-seated prejudice to a slow but unmistakable breakdown of public services

and security. In the ushering out of the old and in with the new, it was too easy to forget that Gary Johnson represents a Republican Party and a right-wing Republicanism that answers all those subtle, demanding challenges with largely simplistic reaction and repression.

Johnson's real distinction is in being the first New Mexican governor even in our checkered history who's ready to see the execution of kids under 15, the first ready to deprive the poorest of the poor of basic medical services, the first to brand hundreds of thousands of our people as willfully dependent and lazy, the first to welcome both gambling and toxic waste, the first to speak the language of populism and "people before politics" while blanketed in the money and advice of some of the oldest pols and most corrupt special interests in the state.

There'll be a new regime on the fourth floor of the Roundhouse. Welcome to Santa Fe, Governor Johnson. But the rest of us can't quite afford to be so "excited." Until proven otherwise, it's by no means clear how much we've won.



“Doctor Finlay II” on Masterpiece Theatre

“Hillary’s Class” — A 25th Reunion —

Doctor Finlay, the cynical yet idealistic young doctor in the post-World War II Scottish town of Tannochbrae, returns to Masterpiece Theatre in six new interconnected dramatic stories filmed on location in Scotland.

In “Doctor Finlay II,” based on characters created by Scots writer A.J. Cronin, David Rintoul again plays the title role. The three supporting stars also reprise their roles: Ian Bannen plays Dr. Alexander Cameron, Finlay’s former partner who, though retired, contributes his expertise to the

Arden House practice: Annette Crosbie plays their caring housekeeper, Janet McPherson, who plans to retire and get married; and Jason Flemyng portrays the new substitute physician, Dr. Neil, who hopes to succeed Cameron as Finlay’s partner.

As in the previous series, Dr. Finlay continues to grapple with his heavy workload and his financial difficulties in grim postwar Scotland.

“Doctor Finlay” on Masterpiece Theatre will be broadcast Sundays at 9:00 p.m. beginning November 13th and repeats Fridays at 11:00 p.m.

“I don’t think [my mother] thought going to Wellesley meant you went on to have a profession,” says Renee Haas, a lawyer who recently ran for the Texas Supreme Court. “She just thought every woman should have a good education in order to take care of herself if something happened to her husband.”

Haas is one of half a dozen members of the class profiled in “Hillary’s Class” who talk about coming into their own at a defining moment for women, the turning points in their lives, the paths they have chosen, and the price they have paid for their choices. Their life stories reveal how traditional roles taken for granted — sexuality, gender roles, marriage, and family — were all abruptly overturned during the past 25 years.
