County meetings set for Ruidoso

Next year, at least three Lincoln County Commission meetings will be conducted in Ruidoso.

Commissioner Wilton Howell last week injected that provision into the motion for approval of a regular meeting schedule and it passed 4-0 with Commissioner Stirling Spencer absent.

Moving a few meetings to the population center of the county for the convenience of those who can't schedule the 45-minute drive to the county courthouse in Carrizozo seems like a small accommodation, Howell said.

Police catch last burglary suspect

Ruidoso Downs police have picked up the sixth burglary suspect accused of a November rash of burglaries along Pippin Street in Ruidoso.

The 17-year-old male was taken into custody Sunday afternoon on a warrant charging him with six counts of residential burglary. He is being held at the juvenile detention center in Roswell, police report.

The five other alleged cohorts are either being held on similar charges, or are out on \$40,000 bonds and awaiting trial. Those five (three adults and two youths) were apprehended on different dates between Nov. 22 and Dec. 3.

The last to be arrested, who will be 18 next month, is the second juvenile arrestee in the group who is being detained; the other is being held in Alamogordo awaiting trial. Both are known runaways, police said. The third juvenile was released to the custody of his parents in Ruidoso.

Lone Apache voices protest Rufina Laws fights plan for tribal nuclear storage

Bundled against the chill that swept down off the mountains above Mescalero Friday, Rufina Laws handed out flyers to tribal members waiting to tour a nuclear storage project information center on the reservation.

She was alone, with a box full of information and a placard taped to her car asking Mescalero Apache tribal members to guard their land against the plan to store radioactive nuclear waste.

When she voices protest outside the reservation, Laws often is joined by environmentalists fighting the storage proposal. But on tribal land, she's usually alone.

Others are afraid of losing their jobs or special favors from President Wendell-Chino and the tribal council, Laws contends. The council is pursuing a spent nuclear fuel rod storage agreement with 33 private utilities.

By tradition, the Mescaleros also are reluctant to speak out publicly or challenge leaders, said Laws, whose mother is a full-blooded Mescalero.

In the beginning, so was Laws. She often reflects on the irony that the early inspiration in her life, the role model who inspired her to attend college, was the man she now openly opposes and has attempted to unseat as president.

"Wendell Chino was my inspiration," she said softly. "He was my role model when I was young, because when I saw him, he was doing so many things I thought were incredible."

"I was impressionable. I remembered the civil rights battle and read about Martin Luther King's efforts to establish freedom for his people. I saw Chino in that role for the Mescalero and for all Native Americans in general. But at some point, something went terribly wrong."

Laws grew up as the child of two hard-working parents, whose careers depended on the reservation. Her mother cooked at the elementary school and then became head cook for Mescalero Head Start. Her father was a logger and spent the last few years before retiring in maintenance at the Apache-run Inn of the Mountain Gods resort.

People respected Chino, because he improved conditions on the reservation by starting the resort, providing better housing and taking over Ski Apache near Ruidoso, the southern-most major ski area in the United States.

In the early 1970s, Laws began to see Chino and the tribal council in a different light.

"I wondered why he was not allowing people to participate in the governing of the tribe," she said. "I realized that this group would always win the elections no matter what happened. The power machine had become entrenched and that didn't allow for the full range of possibilities a tribal community could create for itself."

At that point, Laws felt helpless to initiate any changes and pursued a master's degree in counseling to

add to her bachelor's degree in education, all the while hoping changes would occur.

But they didn't, she said. The Chino-led tribal council decided to pursue a nuclear storage agreement with the federal nuclear negotiator's office, and later a private contract with individual power companies. The site mentioned most often lies on the west side of the Sacramento Mountains overlooking the Tularosa Basin near Three Rivers, between Carrizozo and the community of Tularosa.

The struggle for Laws became urgent, because of the possible consequences of the decision, she said.

The fuel is to be shipped, probably by rail, from as many as 89 reactors, according to Mary Olson of Nuclear Information and Resource Service in Washington D.C. The route could include a rail through the county seat of Carrizozo, tribal consultant Miller Hudson has said.

The power companies are running out of cool pond storage space. They are trying to find temporary above-ground "dry cask" storage for the radioactive spent fuel rods until a permanent repository is constructed by the federal government at Yucca Mountain in Nevada.

Friday, Laws was battling the cold wind to give tribal members the other side of the storage story as they walked out of the nuclear storage information center open house where they had been offered a hot meal and pieces of a holiday cake.

A film crew from CBS Weekend News was busy inside catching frames of conversations and children stuffing down sweets.

"I know that Chino is not used to having people talk and will say it is not traditional for tribal members to go to the press, but he uses the press all the time," Laws said.

"If he's using the press, I have every right, I feel. He's using this system against his own people. As long as I feel the suppression (of tribal members), I will speak up on behalf of our people. I feel I am always pushing against the current, but don't know any other way to do it."

To help spread the message, Laws has incorporated a non-profit group called HANDS, Humans Against Nuclear Waste Dumps.

Speaking from her Washington D.C. office, Olson said she thinks it's more than apathy or a traditional reluctance to criticize leaders that silences many Mescalero.

"These people obviously do not have a democratic process at their disposal," she said. "If they had one, they might feel it was worthwhile to pay attention. But if they don't have one, why pay attention? They've learned long since that they have no option."

"Any of the tribes where there was any degree of democracy, the people prevailed (against storage proposals by the federal nuclear negotiator)," Olson said. "There were 20 that originally applied for the Department of Energy grants that Mescalero got."

Tribe gives Johnson \$20,000

The day before the Nov. 8 general election, the Mescalero Apache Tribe contributed \$20,000 to the campaign of governor-elect Gary Johnson.

The contribution became public Dec. 8 when Johnson's campaign contribution disclosure summary was due at the Secretary of State's office.

In spite of his Republican party affiliation, Johnson met with a chilly reception at a luncheon in this traditionally Republican County

last October when he refused to take a position on the Mescalero initiative to store spent nuclear fuel rods on tribal land.

At the time, Johnson said he had not received any money from the tribe and that, while he had discussed the future of Indian gambling in the state, he had not talked with Mescalero officials about nuclear fuel rod storage.

Johnson said he wanted to know more about the project and pointed to the state's long association with

the nuclear industry at White Sands Missile Range, the site of the first atomic bomb detonation, and nuclear research at Sandia and Los Alamos laboratories near Albuquerque.

Johnson indicated he would try to take a public position before the election, but he did not. He won the governor's race against incumbent Democrat Bruce King by a wide margin and carried Lincoln County by about 800 votes.

Indians discuss student issues with Ruidoso school officials

Discussions about troubled Apache youth dominated a wide-ranging session between Mescalero Apache and Ruidoso school officials Tuesday.

Ten Mescalero middle school students were suspended last month. Paula Papponi, principal of Ruidoso Middle School (RMS), told *The Ruidoso News* that several of the 10 suspended students had weapons (knives) and were involved in fights, while others had tobacco on school grounds. Some were wearing gang-related clothing and were involved in gang-related activities, she said.

RMS teaches 420 seventh and eighth-grade students.

John Shendo Jr., tribal education director, asked why these students were suspended and posed many other questions to the school board. Approximately five hundred students from the neighboring Mescalero reservation attend public schools in Ruidoso.

School Superintendent Mike Gladden told tribal leaders that keeping schools safe is a high priority. Carrying weapons, fighting, and dress violations warrant suspension, Gladden said.

"It's not just the Apache students who are disciplined for breaking the rules," Gladden explained Monday. "If you look at disciplinary figures for the district you'll find a fairly even distribution of ethnic groups represented."

Fourteen Anglos and eight Hispanic middle school students were also suspended in November for various school violations, Papponi said after the meeting.

"We always contact the parents of suspended students," Papponi said. "A student cannot get back in school unless we go over the problem with parents."

"Every suspension offense is listed in the school handbook," she added. "Students know what the consequences of their actions will be and everyone is treated fairly."

"Suspensions are always a last resort."

The reason behind four Apache student transfers were also discussed. Two boys were academically ineligible to play sports, and two girls were expelled, said Ron Hodges, principal of Ruidoso High School.

If a student has less than a 2.0 average for the semester or at least two F's, they are ineligible for sports sanctioned by the New Mexico Activities Association, Hodges later explained to *The News*.

The two ineligible Apache boys chose to transfer to another school where eligibility requirements are not as high as RHS.

"The academic standards at RHS are the highest in the state," Hodges said. "We will not apologize for having those high standards."

Hodges said two Apache girls transferred because they were expelled from RHS after attacking and beating up other students.

Students from other ethnic groups were also declared academically ineligible or were expelled or suspended, but chose not to transfer, Hodges said.

"It's the students' choice to transfer or to wait it out," he said.

The Tribal Education Department requested a list of failing students so they can follow up on student problems.

Paul Wirth, Indian affairs coordinator, responded he would start the list with the second nine weeks of school.

Shendo also asked for reports of attendance and incidents involving Mescalero students on a weekly basis.

Wirth said he would meet with principals and liaisons, and present a proposal to the tribe before the Christmas break.

Other comments and questions from Shendo included:

— The tribe would like an active Indian club in each school.

RHS, White Mountain Intermediate School and RMS all have an Indian Club at present, Wirth said, and he will talk to liaisons about getting Indian clubs in the other schools and reply after Christmas.

— There needs to be more training and workshops about Fetal Alcohol Syndrome (FAS) in order to better serve all students with symptoms of the disorder. Shendo said there should be better ways of dealing with FAS students than labeling them as a behavior problem or placing them in special education classes.

— Reasons for a decline in band members. The program has had six different band directors in the past eight years, assistant RHS principal Danny Flores said.

— Other issues included bus routes, timely mailing of report cards and deficiency notices, monthly activities and workshops in Mescalero, and a request for copies of minutes from school board meetings.

Feds may never see nuclear pact

The federal official responsible for issuing permits to transport and store nuclear waste says he may never see the Mescalero Apaches' agreement with 33 nuclear power companies.

Mescalero officials say they are close to signing such an agreement, but they haven't applied for a federal permit, said Charles Haughney, chief of the storage and transport systems branch of the U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission (NRC).

"I've gotten phone calls occasionally from Miller Hudson, but that's about all," Haughney said last week. Hudson, a former state representative from Colorado, is a consultant to the Mescalero on the nuclear storage project.

Once an application has been received, meetings open to the public will be scheduled, Haughney said.

He will try to arrange the meetings at sites where the most people are affected, he said. But there may be some exceptions and some sessions with short notice.

During the public meetings, compliance with requirements by the NRC will be discussed, as well as layout plans and other pertinent information. But many details of the private contract between the Mescalero and the utilities may never be revealed.

Mescalero President Wendell Chino has said contract terms are a private matter. He has refused to discuss any details or to name where he has been meeting with utility representatives.

However, the terms of the agreement are supposed to be put to public referendum on the reservation before any binding commitment is completed.

Haughney said his focus will be to ensure certain criteria are met, guarantees are issued and that all of the physical plans are reviewed.

"I guess the closest example would be that some reactor plants are owned by more than one utility," he said. "We deal with the majority operator and don't pay attention to the business arrangement between the partners."

"We may just look at the commitments. We may never see their agreements, just the assurances."

If some terms of the Mescalero agreement were "just nuts" and impacted significant issues such as training of personnel, it would become unraveled in the licensing process, Haughney said.

"There's no license until I take my pen out," he said. The plans will be scrutinized by lawyers, engineers, indemnity specialists and technical experts before he signs off, he said.

Laws said even with the obstacles, changes can result, "if we can get them to understand that they have power."

She receives the most support, in the form of telephone calls and brief remarks about keeping up the good work, from the young and the

very old, Laws said.

"It's the young person's future and it has a big hole in it," she said. "The elderly want to see their names live on. In between are the people who are working and are trying to survive. A lot have worked many years and don't want to lose their retirement and all the security they have acquired. Many

come up to me and encourage me to keep it up. They feel they can't stand out here with me. It's not like I want to be doing it, but who else will if I don't."

"Every once in a while I have to sit down and read Martin Luther King's book again about the civil rights struggle. I feel there were two guiding principles in his life:

truth and justice. Sometimes I get discouraged, but I think you can't give up, because this system is not based on truth and justice. It's based on injustice. Maybe it will take rest of my life, but if I can open people's eyes, maybe we can get a new constitution to allow true democracy or some sense of democracy. Then it will have been worth it."

Christmas Spirit Abides Throughout the Mountain Land


This is being sent to you an hour before high noon on December 8, a day of sunshine and light shadow under a sky of thin clouds sailing through a light blue sky.

A breeze is singing through the vale out of the south, rippling the American flag and strumming wind harp chords of Christmas harmonies through the walnut and oak trees down by the riverside. The large arching branches of the giant walnuts during this season of the year remind me of church archways, and bring back memories of Christmas church services through the years.

Christmas service in Valdez, Alaska at age two

On Christmas Eve in Valdez, Alaska a full moon was shining overhead, making the snow sparkle with moonlight jewelry as Father, Mother and brother John, age four, walked from the house to the church about 200 yards away. Father was carrying me, age two; and Mother was carrying brother Mark, age three months.

This was the historic church of the Epiphany, one of the first Episcopal churches



to be established in Alaska.

When we arrived at the church and went in the door, here in the little anteroom was a large Christmas tree, loaded with candy canes, toy bells, horns, dolls and gauze Christmas stockings.

In the stockings were an orange, an apple and candy of all kinds — taffy in three flavors, strawberry, chocolate, vanilla; and gumdrops, jellybeans, and round hard candies we used to call "jaw breakers."

During the services some of my jaw breakers escaped from the stocking and went rolling all around the floor of the church, which was completely filled by the Christmas Eve worshippers.

I got down and went crawling all around under the pews and among the feet of the folks.

When I crawled out from under the front

pew, I looked at the minister who gave me a kindly smile. Then I went running back up the aisle with my stocking and the jaw breakers I had recovered.

The minister was the Reverend Zigler, legendary pioneer Alaska clergyman who continued holding services all over Alaska past the age of 90.

Photographs of this church were featured in school geography books for many years.

It was destroyed in the earthquake and tidal wave along with the original city of Valdez in 1964.

Now a proud little city of New Valdez nestles a few miles from the original location, there beside Valdez Bay.

Before the tidal wave, some records were rescued from the church, including the Baptist certificate of brother Mark.

Clouds Sail Away

Now in very early afternoon, the south wind has carried the clouds away, leaving us a sky of dark blue and sunshine beaming down upon the waving cedar and pinon branches.

Mother Earth is rejoicing, and our hearts are light with the spirit of Christmas abiding throughout our mountain land, as we look forward to the birthday of our infant savior.



Lincoln County artists create cooperative gallery

The idea of an artists' cooperative has been tried unsuccessfully before in Lincoln County, but this time around the emphasis will be divided between creativity and promotion.

Jim Crown, a local contractor who says his 25 years of promotional experience includes an impressive list of ventures, has put together a showplace and retail outlet for Lincoln County artists or art featuring the county. The gallery, showing works in progress as well as those on display, opened late last month a half block east of the post office on Sudderth Drive.

"I was approached a few months ago by several artists interested in putting together a cooperative," Crown said. "I'm not an artist, but I'm a promoter and they knew that was what they needed."

Called the Lincoln County Artisans Co-op, the gallery will be operated on a daily basis by the artisans themselves, Crown said.

Two permanent artisans with diverse talents, Harry Slabaugh and Philip Guerro, work on their pieces at the gallery. Slabaugh produces rustic Southwest territorial Rio West Furniture, and Guerro is a Native American silversmith.

"I've had a lot of fun with this and the people I've met working on it for the past four months," Crown said. He traveled to Boulder, Colo., and Tucson, Ariz., to talk with founders of successful cooperatives.

"Enough artists weren't involved at first," Crown said. "That may have been one of the problems in

the past. I've been able to get 16 involved, but I'm always looking for more."

However, the cooperative group must approve an artisan before his or her work can be shown at the gallery, he said.

"If the artisans agree, from time to time, we will have guest artists from outside the county show here," Crown said.

The 16 current members represent varied forms of artistic expression, including painting, etched and stain glass, functional furniture, porcelain and stoneware pottery, silversmith jewelry, functional wood pieces, weaving, Southwest designed clothing, baskets, bronze sculptures, and Native American art and clothing.


"Those who can, like Kara Matheson who weaves with pine needles, will bring in their materials and work here, which will give the public a unique opportunity to see the process," Crown said. It also is a big boost to the artists, many of whom otherwise have to rely on art or crafts shows to expose their work to the public.

Names that may be familiar include John West, who produces one-of-a-kind necklaces, bracelets, belts and other jewelry; wood carvers Georgia and Mike Lagg;

Sandra Hartley, who creates stain and etched glass as well as fiber art furniture; bronze sculptor Joy; clothes designers Wy Haragan and Diann Sultemier; and Ivy Heyman, designer/crafter of functional porcelain and stoneware pottery.

Each artisan is required to spend a proportionate amount of time working in the gallery. Each must have five pieces of work in show. They pay 25 percent of the sales price to the cooperative. Forty percent of that amount goes to pay the lease, utilities and advertising.

The gallery at 2915 Sudderth will be open from 10 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. daily. In the winter, the gallery will be closed Tuesday and Wednesday.

Lincoln County ranch named tops

Matt and Becca Ferguson of Capitan are the 1994-95 winners of the Young Rancher Achievement award from the state's largest agricultural organization.

The Fergusons have a family ranching operation in Lincoln County. They were presented the statewide award by the New Mexico Farm and Livestock Bureau at its 77th annual meeting in Roswell.

The Fergusons serve on the New Mexico Farm and Ranchers Committee and on the board of directors of the Lincoln County Farm and Livestock Bureau. Mr. Ferguson has served as secretary for the Lincoln County Farm Bureau nominating committee. Mrs. Ferguson, in addition to her Farm Bureau volunteer duties, teaches first grade at Capitan Elementary School.

Mr. Ferguson is a graduate of NMSU with a degree in Agriculture Business, and Mrs. Ferguson has a Masters Degree in Elementary Education.

The couple will now compete on the national level at the annual meeting of the American Farm Bureau Federation in St. Louis, Mo. They also received \$500 from a truck company.

Hondo, Corona teams fight for county bragging rights

Two of the county's smaller schools battled for bragging rights in Hondo Saturday.

The girls from Corona held on for a thrilling 51-50 win over the Hondo Eagles. The Hondo boys returned the favor by fending off the Corona Cardinals, 50-49, in the late game.

Corona built a 25-16 lead in the second quarter behind sophomore Kim Riley. Riley scored nine of her team-high 24 points in that period. The 5-6 guard released down court once her teammates secured the rebound. No one rotated back on defense for the Eagles and Riley scored several baskets on uncontested layups.

The Cardinals maintained their lead throughout the third quarter despite Hondo's attempts to get back in the game with man-to-man defensive pressure.

But Corona got in foul trouble. Junior post player Shayla Marshall fouled out at the 5:54 mark of the final period with Corona leading 43-31.

The Cardinals still had control of the game with Riley handling the ball. Then Riley picked up her fifth foul with 4:04 remaining. Corona coach Danny Chavez put in the only player available, Alirez, to take Riley's spot.

On the court for the Cardinals were senior Ronda Miller, junior Lindsey Bonds and three eighth-graders

— Alirez, Amy Bonds and Janice Tharp.

Hondo sensed the Cardinals were in trouble and took advantage of it. The Eagles' Erica Copeland and Iris Chavez combined to score 16 of Hondo's 17 final points.

The Corona lead slowly evaporated. Chavez tied the game with 15 seconds left. But for some reason, the Eagles fouled Amy Bonds with 11 seconds remaining. Bonds missed the front end of the one-and-one. Alirez scooped up the loose ball and was fouled. She stepped to the line and hit the game-winner.

The Cardinals hit only eight of 20 free throws in the final four minutes, but it was enough.

"Wow what a game," was all Corona coach Chavez could say after the game.

Chavez finished with 21 points and Copeland added 17 for Hondo.

A rather slow-paced, uneventful boys' game became as exciting as the girls' contest in the final minutes. Hondo took lead of the game late in the first quarter. The Eagles maintained a four to five-point lead until the fourth quarter.

Corona chipped away at the Hondo lead. Otalee Brown's two free throws with 1:33 left in the game tied it at 46. The Cardinals rebounded a Hondo miss and had a chance to take the lead for the first time since the first quarter. But Corona's Russell Luera's pass went off Marcus Johnson's hands. Hondo capitalized when Tomas Richardson nailed a baseline jumper for a 48-46 Eagle lead.

Johnson missed two free throws that could have tied it with 29 seconds left. Corona fouled Gomez, who missed the front end of a one-and-one. The Cardinals failed again to score. Corona fouled Gomez again, but this time the sophomore hit both free throws.

Richardson and teammate Jean Baca paced the Eagles with 12 points apiece. Javier Gonzales added nine points for Hondo.

Corona's Brown led all scorers with 20 points. Juan Gonzales pitched in 14 points in the losing cause.

The Warriors' weekend featured moments of brilliance and moments of mental lapses. Ruidoso rebounded well and handled full court presses well, Roland said. But then the Warriors committed unforced turnovers and failed to execute offensively.

"Nobody beat us. We beat us. You can tell we're inexperienced. We're on that inexperienced roller-coaster. At least now we recognize it," Roland said.

Ruidoso opened the tourney with a 53-38 loss to Lovington. Lovington jumped to an early 13-2 first quarter lead and the Warriors played catch-up for the rest of the game.

"Every game we played we had one of those quarters," Roland said, referring to Ruidoso's first quarter against Lovington. "We took ourselves out of it."

The Warriors turned the ball over 24 times, but rebounded well and had 15 assists. Angelica Figueroa led Ruidoso with 8 points. Freshman Chrystal Sumlin had six points and six assists. Tawnya Reynolds pulled down seven boards and Amber Livingston had five rebounds in the losing cause.

Ruidoso picked up its second win of the season by defeating El Paso Yaleta, 43-42. The Warriors held a 12-point lead at halftime before they had "one of those quarters."

Yaleta outscored Ruidoso 15-1 in the third period. The Warriors' Sumlin hit two free throws with seconds remaining for a 43-39 lead. Yaleta scored again but ran out of time.

Figueroa turned in her most solid performance to date. The junior post player scored 13 points to go with her 11 rebounds. Sumlin finished with 10 points, two assists, two rebounds and two steals.

In the fifth-place game, Ruidoso started slow and never recovered. St. Michael's of Santa Fe sprinted to a 19-1 first quarter lead and went on to post a 52-33 win.

Roland said fatigue contributed to her team's performance — it was Ruidoso's fourth game in five days.

"We didn't rebound well at all," she said, but Roland was pleased with how well the team broke St. Michael's press.

"The Warriors walked through a plan to break the press in the parking lot before the game. The

strategy session paid off. St. Michael's pulled off the press in the second quarter because the Warriors successfully broke it and scored several easy baskets.

"They ran through it like it was water," Roland said. Ruidoso outscored St. Michael's 16-11 in the second quarter, but a sluggish third quarter prevented Ruidoso from rallying.

Again, Sumlin turned in another all-around performance. The freshman guard scored nine points and had two assists, two rebounds and two steals. Figueroa tallied eight points and four rebounds.

Kelle Lutterman, one of the junior varsity players along for the trip, had five points, three rebounds and an assist in Ruidoso's last game.

Roland dressed three junior varsity players to take the place of seniors Megan Cumler and Monique Ramos. Cumler left the team for personal reasons and Ramos left the team to pursue other interests in preparation for college, Roland said.

The Warriors don't play again until the Goddard Tournament Dec. 28-30. Roland said she will use the practice time to add defenses, perfect the team's offense and improve the team's overall intensity. Greater intensity might help the Warriors get over their mental lapses, Roland hopes.

Ruidoso is 2-3 overall. The Warriors play Roswell's Goddard at 8 p.m. Wednesday, Dec. 28.

Poop Scoop

Dogs living in the Ruidoso area can be infested with at least four common types of intestinal parasites, according to Sandra Ford, assistant manager at the Lincoln County Humane Society animal shelter.

Symptoms may include diarrhea, prolonged and intermittent.

But don't jump ahead and start worming the dog. Let your veterinarian perform tests and diagnose the condition. Giving a dog worming medication without a

diagnosis and a prescribed treatment can be harmful to a pet, because remedies against one type often are ineffective against another, Ford said.

The most common parasites treated in the Ruidoso area are roundworms, tapeworms, coccidia and giardia. Hookworms and whipworms are rare here, said Dr. Lynn Willard of The Ruidoso Animal Clinic. If they are seen at all, it is in dogs that have come from humid climates where the parasites flourish.

Pets can ingest parasites by eating rodents and other small animals that are already infested. Other ways are from eating grass, being around contaminated feces and living in unsanitary conditions.

Puppies are especially vulnerable. Roundworms can be passed to pups through their mother's milk. Willard said he finds coccidia common in pups raised outside in areas with a dirt floor.

Sanitation is the best prevention. Keep dog bedding clean and dry, pick up feces in the yard

regularly and don't encourage your pet to hunt rodents. Drinking from ponds, gutters and streams, dogs can contract a microscopic parasite called giardia. Infection can be prevented easily by always having a fresh water source available (that advice is good for hikers, too). Running mountain streams often are

contaminated. When planning a long walk or hike with a canine friend, you may want to bring water for both human and dog.

Gambling issues need to be aired in public

Leaders in the New Mexico Legislature say they will hold approximately six hearings in early January to get a head start on gambling legislation. We applaud this move.


The Legislature has a lot of decisions to make concerning the implementation of video gaming approved by voters in November. What communities will host the gambling? What types of businesses will have it? What kind of taxes will be implemented, and what portions of those taxes will be set aside for local communities dealing with infrastructure impacts?

We'd prefer to see some of these hearings held at different regions of the state, although this may not be possible. At any rate, we expect to see our state representative and state representative-elect at these hearings, as well as Lincoln County and Ruidoso officials, because they have a vital interest in the subject. Ruidoso has been pinpointed in past legislation as one of the few communities to host the video gaming.

The Lincoln County commissioners should be applauded alongside the Legislature, since the commissioners decided to form a committee to study potential far-reaching impacts. Even if Ruidoso ends up being the only community in the county to have legalized gambling, the impacts won't halt at the village limits.

We'd like to applaud the governor for forming a 15-member team to study gambling issues. But that's hard to do when he won't name the members of the team, especially since he's already holding meetings with them.

Legislators say they're holding their hearings to make sure lobbying from the gambling interests is done in public. Now Governor-elect Johnson should follow that lead and make sure his dealings are in public, too.

Money party wins again in 1994 elections

The real returns are finally in on the 1994 Congressional elections, and it turns out that neither the Republicans nor the Democrats won. The true winner was that permanent regime in Washington and New Mexico — The Money Party.

Take a close look at post-election campaign finance figures and studies by Common Cause, the Center for Responsive Politics and other non-partisan groups. Behind headlines of a GOP sweep and Democratic debacle, the deeper numbers tell a different story — a story of incumbent dominance regardless of party or policy, and of largely unchallenged money tyranny over the government of the United States.

Consider the following:

- Whatever the appearance of change, 90% of House incumbents and 92% of Senate incumbents kept their jobs, mostly on the strength of an overwhelming superiority not in ideas or service, but money.
- It was only open seat races — where incumbents had quit the field — that produced the big turnover of 1994. It happened that not a single House or Senate Republican was defeated, and most of the vacated seats simply belonged to Democrats.
- In the House, some 328 representatives of both parties ran either completely un-

opposed or else financially unopposed, having anywhere from twice to ten times more money than their challengers — and, big surprise, 96% of them won. But in 60 races where challengers had at least half the incumbent's resources, only 65% managed to win.

— In some 48 close House races which were won by incumbents, money was decisive. In 276 where the incumbent won by 55% of the vote or less, the same incumbent had an average edge in money of at least \$300,000. In all 48 close elections, incumbents averaged some \$667,038 to a challenger's average of \$292,371.

— In the Senate, where 24 to 26 club members win, 22 of the winning incumbents had a 3-to-1 advantage in money, a total of \$92 million to \$27.3 million for their challengers.

— Two incumbent senators who were outmaneuvered by their opponents — Harris Wofford (D-Pa.) and Jim Sasser (D-Tenn.) — both lost.

— In the two other U.S. Senate races where incumbents were outspent but won tight races, the figures were still obscene. In California, Republican millionaire Michael Huffington drew from his personal wealth much of his campaign's \$28 million against winner Sen. Diane Feinstein's \$11 million. In Virginia, loser Oliver North's \$17 million came mostly from out-of-state against Sen. Chuck Robb's \$5 million.

— Here in New Mexico, we mirrored the nation's larger bi-partisan oppression of

money. Senate incumbent Jeff Bingaman outspent and defeated challenger Collin McMillan in the most costly Senate race in state history. Democratic incumbent congressman Bill Richardson and Republicans Steve Schiff and Joe Skeen all won by outspending their opponents by colossal margins, with every House race in New Mexico essentially non-competitive financially — and thus closed.

The new 104th Congress may be under the titular control of Senate Majority Leader Bob Dole and House Speaker Newt Gingrich. But for this Congress, like the others over the past two decades, the real masters will be the big contributors. The real work will be the hours senators and representatives spend raising thousands of dollars each week to protect their jobs next time around, keeping the money tyrant on the throne.

Whether 1994 voters were conservative or liberal, Republican or Democrat, true believers or just fed-up, they lost. The winners were the 1% who are super rich contributors and managers of Forbes Five Hundred corporations who own Capitol Hill, as well as the hundreds of thousands of lobbyists swarming over it every day. And their politics, of course, are ultimately neither right nor left — just themselves.

If you think you live in a democracy, think twice. The Money Party rules a Special Interest Republic. And for most of the seats in its government, only millionaires or their friends need apply.

An article that appeared in the Roswell Daily Record, with a Santa Fe (AF) source (I think), reported on the increases in the cost of state

hunting and fishing licenses being considered by the Fish and Game Department. For example, a resident deer license of \$75 (plus a forest use stamp, don't forget) and similar large increases in other hunting and fishing permit fees.

I am no longer a hunter nor fisherman, but hunting and fishing were about the only activities my family could afford to enjoy together when I was growing up. We made an annual pilgrimage to the mountains each fall, camped out for a week (our only vacation), and enjoyed being together. We kids learned self-reliance, a respect for firearms and the necessity for taking personal responsibility. Contrary to current liberal thinking, we did not develop a taste for wanton killing — just the opposite — we gained a reverence for all forms of life and an insight as to how a careless action can destroy a life. Most often, we returned home without ever firing a shot, not because we didn't see game, but because we didn't have a safe shot or because we just didn't have the heart to shoot. In short, we learned all of the so-called "family values" that are missing and so desired today.

We gained not only an education in values but also a store of fond

memories and shared experiences to discuss for the rest of our lives — the things that form family bonds. These many years later, every time my brothers and I get together, we still discuss our family "hunts." How many families will be able to do that in the future? How many can even now? When society prices such activities out of the range of the less affluent, how much does that decrease family values and add to our state national moral decay?

Even with big increases, our hunting and fishing license fees would still be a bargain to out-of-state hunters (Texas, Oklahoma and Missouri have almost no public lands to hunt on) and I wouldn't object to increasing the out-of-state license fees to an amount comparable to what they might spend hunting at home.

But, why make criminals of some of our citizens by increasing resident fees? Many of our less affluent depend on hunting as a way to supplement their family diets and budgets. With or without fee increases, the same number of animals will be taken each year — the only difference will be that more will be taken illegally if the fees are increased. Why not instead

use our natural resources to help solve some of our societal problems and see if we can't recapture some of the advantages that we of the older generation had?

I propose that the state lower the cost of, or give away at least a percentage of licenses to lower income residents, on their promise to make their outing a family activity. We might also require them to take a hunter safety course, supplemented by instruction designed to teach responsibility and respect for life.

At best, such a policy just might attract and change the attitudes of at least some of the young macho males who are responsible for most of society's firearms problems and street crimes. At worst, all the state stands to lose is a few license fee dollars, while supplementing the diet of families who really need the meat. What can we lose?


